Three Vehicle Accident Results In No Serious Injuries

A three vehicle accident which included a headon between a semi tractor trailer rig and a pickup Saturday morning produced traffic problems but, almost miraculously, no serious injuries.

The accident, which occurred at 6:05 a.m. Saturday, January 30, happened a few miles east of Rugby on Hwy. 271 and resulted in traffic having to be re-routed for several hours.

According to official DPS reports, Muriel Duncan was in a pickup truck heading southbound on Hwy. 271 pulling his boat on a trailer. Following him was Jay Meek of Powderly, also pulling a boat.

A double-decker cattle truck, driven by Roland Motley out of

Osceola, Missouri, was northbound on Hwy. 271.

The tractor/trailer rig, according to reports, drove into the southbound lane. Duncan swerved to avoid the semi, but the rig struck his boat and trailer, yanking the back bumper from the pickup.

The semi then lost control and swerved to the left, striking Meek's vehicle headon right front to right front, and then overturned onto Meek's pickup.

Bogata Volunteer Fire Department and Clarksville Rescue Units responded to the emergency. The "Jaws of Life" had to be used to cut Meeks out of his vehicle, which was virtually unrecognizable as a pickup, so crushed was it.

Meeks was helicopter flown to a Texarkana Hospital, but he escaped, almost miraculously, without a broken bone or serious injury.

After attending to the human injuries, the "Jaws of Life" were used to cut into the top of the overturned cattle trailer. Portable corral was set up around the area and the calves released. Officials made the decision to destroy three to four calves due to the severity of their injuries, and three or four more were found to have been killed in the crash. The rest were loaded into stock trailers and transferred.

The scene of the wreck was littered with boat motors, fishing gear and other equipment from the boats and pieces of vehicle. Cleanup operations took some time.

Juanita and Silas Taylor live outside of Cunningham, but not all the way to Minter. She and Juanita Sparks designed their lovely new home, built on Silas' old homeplace. Silas says it has 172 rolls of wallpaper in it. He said it with a sigh, as though he could still be a bit tired, since they put them all up themselves. I've never heard of a canning kitchen, but the Taylor's have one. That has to be wonderful. I love to can things, but if you start in your regular kitchen, nothing else can take place in there while you are canning. The Taylor's kitchen table faces a bay window looking out into their pasture. As we sat down to eat some melt-in-your-mouth homemade bread and jelly, I noticed two pair of binoculars in the window seat. I asked if they were for watching their herd, and Juanita said they also enjoy watching birds and small animals, as well as an occasional wolf. Our binoculars are on the clothes dryer next to the back door. We take turns using them, since we have only one pair.

The Taylors have recently retired and still live a home in Enid, OK. Juanita was a bookkeeper for a florist and Silas worked for USDA.

Their daughter, Lynda Reagan and husband Tilman live in Plainview. Lynda has worked for Pioneer Seed since she was in high school and Tilman is a plumber. They have one daughter, Stephanie and a son Larry and his wife Stacy who live in Tulsa. Larry is a computer programmer and they have a daughter, Lauren.

Juanita has an extensive bell collection. She has them from everywhere and every size. She even has some that do things. One is a music box. She also enjoys reading, sewing and cross stitch. One of her favorite meals to cook is Mexican Food. She was telling me that she and her father, Elvis Wright, are diabetic. I asked her how she manages to make all of the rich desserts and bread with out jeopardizing her condition. She said that she just cooks them. She doesn't eat them. That never occurred to me. Maybe that is why my un-diet doesn't seem to be working.

The Cherry Delight recipe is Silas' favorite.

The Pineapple Apricot Pie recipe came from a Lighthouse recipe book she got in West Texas. The Turtles recipe belonged to her mother, Mrs. Pauline Wright. Her daughter-in-law, Stacy, gave her the Payday Dessert recipe and Lynda Reagan gave her the Saucy Chicken Breast recipe. The melt-in-your-mouth bread recipe and starter came from a friend in Enid. It isn't included in her recipes because of the starter, but I left with a loaf of the bread, a bowl of starter, and a five pound bag of the proper flour to use for making the bread. I felt like a nut, carrying all that food out of their home, but I'd like to report that I have made the bread and it is a very big success with my family.

Cherry Delight by Juanita Taylor

1 pkg. graham cracker crumbs
1 stick margarine
MMix and spread on bottom of 8x8 pan. Refrigerate.

8 oz. pkg cream cheese
1 cup powdered sugar
2 tablespoons milk
Mix thoroughly and spread on graham cracker crust.

1 cup chopped nuts
Spread on top of cheese mixture
1 1/2 cups Cool Whip.
Spread on top of nuts

1 can cherry pie filling, spoon over Cool Whip. Refrigerate.

Saucy Chicken Breasts
2 tablespoons margarine
4 chicken breasts, halved and skinned
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup sliced mushrooms
1 pkg. onion soup mix
1 1/4 cup water
1/4 cup white wine Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon cornstarch
3 tablespoons water
Melt margarine in large skillet. Add chicken and brown on both sides. Remove chicken from skillet reserving drippings in skillet. Add chopped onion, green pepper and mushrooms to skillet. Saute until crisp tender. Return chicken to skillet. Combine soup mix, 1 1/4 cup water and Worcestershire sauce in a small bowl. Pour over chicken. Cover and reduce heat and simmer 20 minutes or until chicken is done. Remove chicken to a serving dish. Combine cornstarch and 3 tablespoons water, add to sauce, return to boil. Boil one minute. Serve chicken on bed of rice. Spoon sauce over chicken.

Payday Dessert
1 yellow cake mix
1/3 cup margarine, softened
1 egg

Mix together until crumbly. Press in ungreased 9x13 pan. Bake 12-15 minutes at 350. Remove from oven and cover with 3 cups miniature marshmallows. Return to oven long enough to melt marshmallows. Cool. Heat in saucepan until smooth:

2/3 cup corn syrup
1/4 cup margarine
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups peanut butter chips
Add two cups Rice Krispies and 2 cups salted peanuts (no skins). Smooth over previous mixture.

Turtles

Sift together:
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
Cream:

1/2 cup margarine, add gradually
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
Ad:
1 egg
1 egg yolk (well beaten) reserve white
Blend in:
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1/8 teaspoon maple flavoring

Add dry ingredients gradually, mix thoroughly. Chill dough. Arrange split pecan halves in groups of 3 or 5 on greased baking sheet to resemble heads and legs of a turtle. Roll dough in balls, dip bottoms in unbeaten egg white and press lightly onto nuts. Use a rounded teaspoon full dough for each turtle. Place so that tips of the nuts will show when cookies are baked. Do not over bake. Cool and frost.

Frosting:
1/3 cup chocolate chips
1/4 cup milk
1 tablespoon amrgarine
Place in top of double boiler, melt until chocolate melts, blend until smooth. Remove from heat; add 1 cup powdered sugar. Beat until smooth and glossy. Spread on turtle cookies

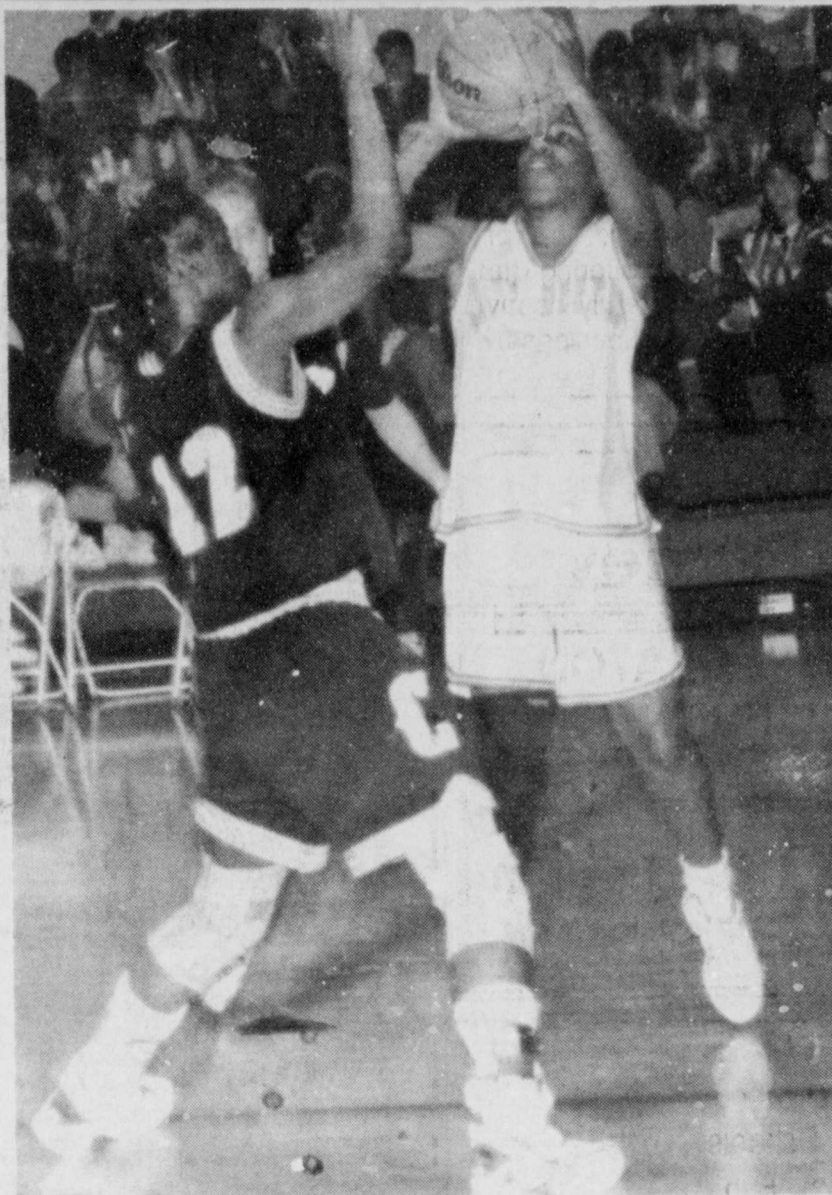

Need For Pre-Kindergarten Being Determined In Area

The Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District is in the process of determining the need of the communities for a pre-kindergarten class for the coming school year.

The eligibility requirements for entering a student in a pre-kindergarten class are as follows:

1. Student must turn four years of age before or on September 1, 1993.
2. Any student that does not speak and comprehend the English language and has another language other than English used in the home is eligible.
3. Eligibility is determined also by the family income which must be at or below subsistence. School districts must apply the formula used to qualify student for free or reduced

lunches under the National School Lunch Program.

The Pre-kindergarten class would be held on the Talco Campus for both communities. The students would attend a half day program. If there is sufficient enrollment, the district would be able to conduct two sessions as follows:
Morning Session: Begin at 8 a.m. and end at noon after the students had eaten lunch at school.
Afternoon Session: Begin at noon with the students having the opportunity to eat lunch at school and continue until the end of the regular school day.

If interested in enrolling a student in a pre-kindergarten class for the 1993-94 school year or should there be questions concerning the program, please direct your questions or requests for enrollment to Utley Nowlin, Counselor, who is located on both the Talco and Bogata campuses weekly.

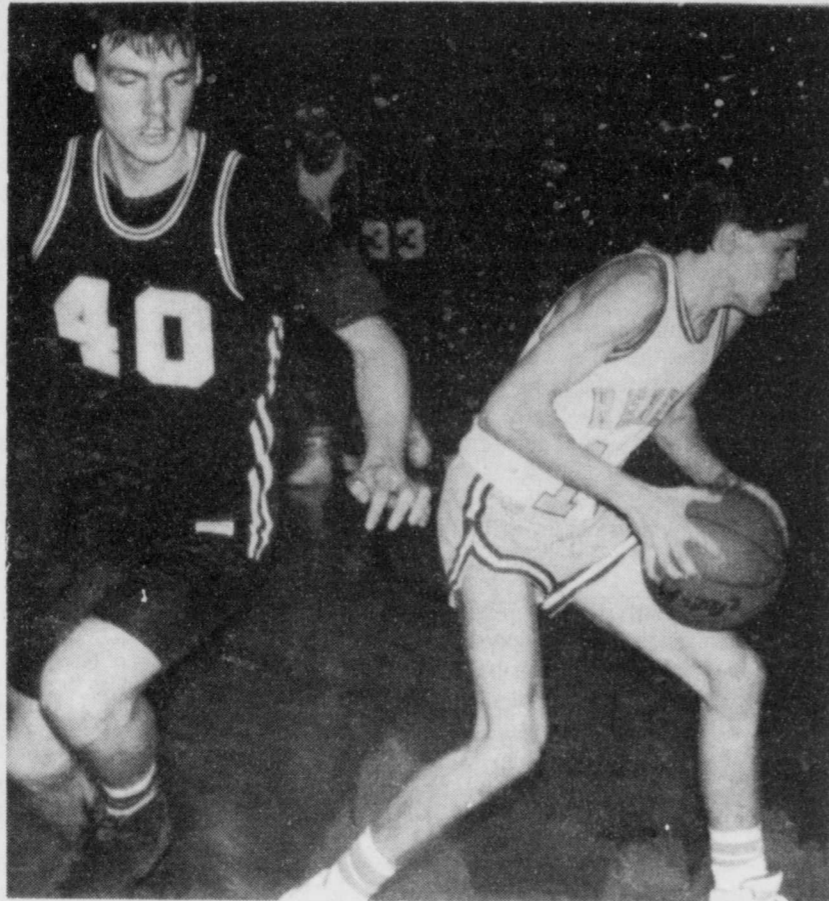

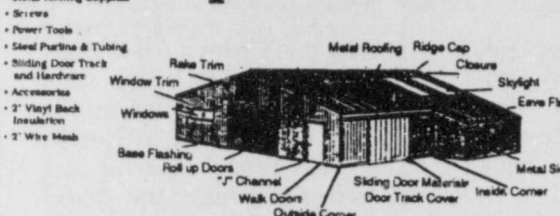
