FALL FOOTBALL TRAINING BEGAN YESTERDAY

Coach Burk Issued Several Suits; Backs and Ends Start Work

Fall Camp at Raton

Coach Burk started to work yesterday with his 1938 edition of the Perryton Rangers. Most of the evening's work dealt with the backfield and end candidates on fundamental training. Work will gradually increase until the entire team is busy with everything that pertains to the national fall sport.

Burk plans to leave with about thirty Rangers on August 23 for their fall training camp at Raton, N. M. They have been given access to the gymnasium and stadium of the Raton high school for a period of ten days. They will return to Perryton the night of Sept. 3rd all ready to take the field in conference play.

"I hope that every eligible high school boy will report at the high school as soon after work each evening as he can during this pre-training period prior to going to Raton," said the coach. "Even though this year's squad will be new, I have hopes for their coping the district title," added Mr. Burk.

Perryton-Pampa Highway is Theme of Meeting at Pampa

Highway and chamber of commerce officials from Perryton, Pampa, Amarillo and other Panhandle cities were guests at the Tuesday noon monthly luncheon meeting of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

The meeting was devoted to discussions of the highway situation in the Pampa area and to the north and south. One of the highways in which Pampa is interested is the extension of State Highway No. 88 from Pampa south through Clarendon, Turkey, San Angelo and on to Del Rio has an active organization and indications point to a designation as a Federal highway soon.

The distance from the Oklahoma state line north of Perryton to Del Rio is 549 miles. Of this 549 miles, only 196 miles in unpaved and 97 miles is impassable. A step to close a section of this impassable portion was recently made when the state highway commission authorized the purchase of right-of-way for a new highway between Clarendon and Turkey. The commission indicated

that they would let a contract for construction just as soon as the land for the highway was deeded to the state.

The other impassable portion of the route is across the Canadian river between Pampa and Perryton. It is planned to run this route north from a point nine miles east of Pampa on the Pampa-Miami across the Canadian river, joining with Federal Highway No. 83 six miles south of Perryton. The road would run over No. 83 to the Canadian border.

Perryton was represented at Pampa by Irvin R. Buchanan and Oscar C. Flowers, and W. L. Anderson. Mr. Flowers recently appeared before the state highway commission at San Antonio with a Papalinde delegation when the purchase of right-of-way for the Clarendon-Turkey connection was authorized.

COUNTY ALLOTMENT IS NAMED FOR OCHILTREE

Forty Per Cent of Land To Be Left Out Of Wheat for 1939

221,500 Acres to Sow

The 1938 wheat allotment for Ochiltree County was announced last week at 251,771 acres. This allotment was set for the purpose of computing the 1938 Agricultural Conservation payment, and will not affect the compliance for 1938 since wheat was included in the general base this year. It is also indicated that the 1939 allotment for the county will be approximately 63 per cent of the 1938 allotment which means that a total of about 221,500 acres may be sown to wheat this fall under the program. This figure approximately 60 per cent of the cultivated acreage on the average 1939, or 40 per cent to be left out of wheat. A portion of the 40 per cent may be planted to other cash crops such as wheat, barley and grain sorghums. And the balance must be sown to sudan or other conserving crops, or summerfallowed, or the entire 40 per cent may be summer fallowed.

No information is available as to payments for 1939, however it is reasonable to assume that total payments will not vary greatly from former years. In addition operators and landowners are eligible to receive additional parity payments on 1938 wheat if both years are complied with Loan privileges are also based on compliance with the program.

AMENDMENT IN INSURANCE ACT

PROVIDES ADDITIONAL OUTLET FOR SURPLUS WHEAT TO THE INSURED WHEAT GROWERS HERE

COLLEGESATION—"An amendment to the Federal Crop Insurance Act provides an additional outlet for surplus wheat to insured wheat growers in that it enables them to put aside wheat now for payment of premiums next year when the price of wheat is likely to be higher," Roy M. Green, manager of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation advised the Texas Agricultural Committee at Texas A. and M. College.

"We understand that the deposit is not the same as a premium payment, although the advantages to the wheat grower are about the same," George Slaughter, chairman of the committee, said in commenting on the information.

The Corporation is not permitted to sell crop insurance policies for

RATES HIGH WITH FORD

Grasshopper Poisoning Campaign is Renewed in County

Grasshoppers are becoming numerous in some parts of the County according to reports to the County Agent's office, with the northwest part of the county most heavily infested. Some farmers report volunteer wheat has been destroyed with very heavy infestation around the edges of fields.

Apparently the black wing migratory hoppers have moved into the county from other areas where they hatched out in the spring.

At a meeting of the County Agricultural Association on Tuesday it was decided to follow the same plan that was operated successfully a year ago and again this spring.

This plan was to have specified days for putting out the poison grain in different communities. The hoppers are congregating along the edges of fields and along the draws in the pastures and may be poisoned very effectively by spreading the mixture at the rate of about 20 pounds of the wet mixture per acre along these strips.

It is recommended that the poison be spread only in the early morning beginning at daylight and finishing soon after sun up.

The schedule for days for the different communities has been set as follows:

New Hope - Farnsworth - Waka, Saturday, August 13.

Twichell - Hunton Monday, August 15.

Perryton - Tuesday, August 16.

Lone Tree - Ochiltree, Wednesday, August 17.

Black - Thursday, August 18.

McMillen - Friday, August 19.

Alfalfa - Notia Saturday, August 20.

Operators should come in the previous day and get the poison from the mixing plant in Donley Building.

Orders for the material is to be secured at the County Agent's office.

For Monday's date the poison must be secured on Saturday.

Ample supplies of poison are on hand and if all farmers will cooperate in putting out the material, damage to wheat sown this fall will likely be avoided.

Amateur promoters of several towns of north Texas have been contacted personally by the local organization, and all enthusiastically are behind such a program.

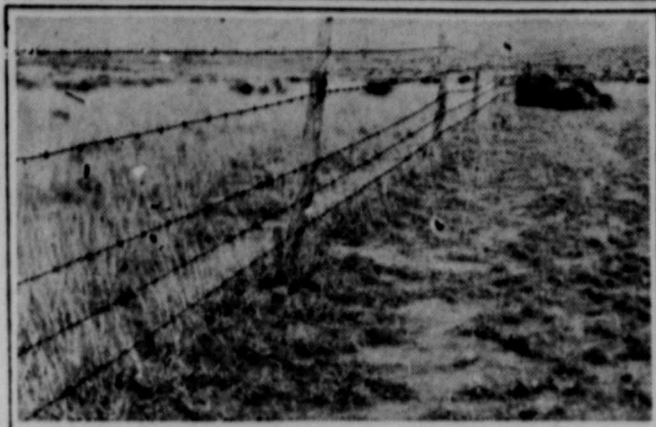
Amarillo, Pampa, Borger, Canyon, Stinnett and Perryton all ready have teams, and several other Panhandle towns are in the process of organizing teams.

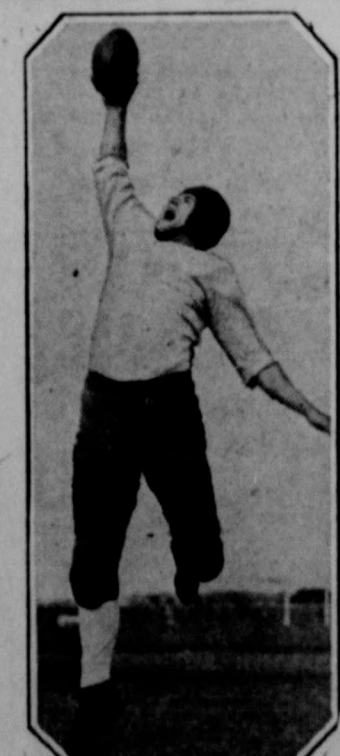

He becomes a successful criminal in the course of his allegedly scientific dual existence as he is a surgeon. In fact, his facile brain soon enables him to become the leader of a big-time band of robbers previously dominated by Humphrey Bogart and for whom Claire Trevor is the stylishly garbed "fence."

Leading his band in one big robbery after another, the doctor seems to manifest a strange zest for his illegal enterprises until he is suddenly brought up short by arrest for the murder of Bogart, who had threatened blackmail.

Placed on trial for his life, the doctor escapes the penalty for the murder he has undoubtedly committed by a shrewd manipulation of the psychology of the jurors. It is one of the strangest denouements ever related in any film, but convincing nevertheless and highly amusing.

Other members of the impressive cast, besides those already mentioned, include Gale Page, Allen Jenkins, Donald Crisp, Henry O'Neill, John Lital, Thurston Hall, Maxie Rosenbloom, Ward Bond, Curt Bois, Bert Hanlon and Vladimir Sokoloff.

HORSE ILLNESS APPEARS AGAIN

SIEGE OF SLEEPING SICKNESS GRIPS HARPER CO., OKLA. FOR SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

An epidemic of encephalomyelitis, sleeping sickness among horses, has appeared in Harper county again, and W. E. Bland county agricultural agent, warned that proper precautions should be taken by all farmers immediately if the disease is to be prevented from reaching the wide-spread proportions of last summer.

While deaths from the disease have been low so far this year, Mr. Bland said that the sickness is spreading to all parts of the county and might reach "an alarming stage" if not checked within a few days.

Dr. W. P. Dunaway of Guymon, federal veterinarian, announced he has found numerous cases of the disease among county horses and urged the use of the proper vaccine before the epidemic becomes more widespread.

Attacks the Brain The disease may be checked or its severity lessened by the use of encephalomyelitis serum prepared for that purpose. It was explained that the vaccine should be administered

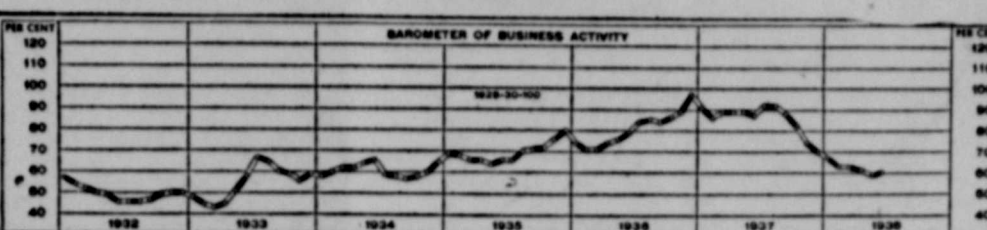

only by a licensed veterinarian and warned against the use of influenza or hemorrhagic septicemia vaccines and those for other diseases which are of no value in the treatment of sleeping sickness.

Sleeping sickness is a virus disease which attacks the brain tissue to cause the various forms of brain symptoms such as sleepiness, staggering gait, incoordination, inability to get up when down, blindness and walking in circles, usually to one side. The animals so affected sometimes bruise themselves badly.

May Be Prevented Mosquitoes, flies and in some places ticks are the cause of the spread of the disease. These vectors will carry the virus from carrier animals such as horses, birds or other animals that are not noticeably sick but are responsible for spreading the disease.

Sleeping sickness can be prevented by vaccination with the specific vaccine prepared for that purpose. The vaccination should be done about 30 days before the disease is expected to appear.

Another important preventative measure is the use of fly sprays to keep flies and mosquitoes away from horses, and when possible horses should be kept in dark barns.

In caring for an animal suffering

from sleeping sickness, one should keep it in a dark place, as cool as possible, in a stall well bedded down and the bedding should be stirred as often as necessary in order to keep the bed soft. The animal should be fed and watered with most appealing foods and fresh water.

It may be necessary to pad stalls for horses that are excitable and indicate nervous symptoms. This type of animal may have to be kept in

OVER-GRAZING DAMAGES LAND

GRASS SHOULD BE ALLOWED TO GO TO SEED EVERY TWO OR THREE YEARS FOR A BETTER GROWTH

AMARILLO, Texas.—Controlled grazing is doing much to improve the grass stand on Texas Panhandle range land which has been subject to damage from drought within recent years. Soil Conservation Service range examiners report.

Ranchers have observed that where the range is overgrazed and trampled by livestock the pastures are unproductive and the grass stand remains poor. On the other hand, many ranchers are finding that their pastures are improving rapidly where grazing is rotated and the grass is allowed to seed.

Where the grass is permitted to go to seed every two or three years, ranchers are observing that the plants are being strengthened and become more dense.

Dense grass growth is being found effective in preventing loss of water by run off, checking of gullies, and stopping loss of soil. Tests on Soil Conservation Service erosion control demonstration areas in the Texas Panhandle show that water from the spring rains penetrated to greater depths on pasture land where grass growth was maintained after being allowed to seed during the 1937 growing season than on areas where the grass was grazed off.

Every effort should be made to maintain a good grass stand at all times, the Service range examiners say. It is pointed out that early spring grazing often damages grass that is short and thin and prevents production of sufficient forage for the number of livestock being carried on the pasture.

By practicing rotated grazing, ranchers are finding that they not only can maintain a good stand of grass, but increase the actual grazing capacity of their pastures.

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more than the current year and can enter a contract with a wheat grower for only one year. However, it may accept deposits of wheat for 1940 premiums. The Corporation will pay storage costs on such deposits as in the case of wheat premiums paid in for 1939 insurance.

"When a wheat grower pays above his premium for 1939 crop insurance, an additional amount of wheat as deposit with the Corporation, he will be issued a receipt. He cannot deposit more wheat than the number of bushels he pays as premium for 1939 insurance. This amount of wheat may be more or less than his 1940 premium, which will not be determined until next year, but it is expected that it will approximate the amount of the 1940 premium," Slaughter explained.

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the farms are being rushed at this time in order to be prepared to certify the farms as soon as the blanks are received. Indications are that a large volume of Ochiltree county wheat will be placed in the loan.

How to Get
When grain is stored in an approved commercial warehouse, the farmer who wishes to apply for a loan will apply to his county AAA committee. If he is eligible, the committee will so certify. He can then present his certification and warehouse receipts showing the quantity, grade and quality of his wheat to his bank or local lending agency or to a loan agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and obtain a loan by depositing his receipts as collateral.

Farm storage has been approved for 55 Texas counties including Ochiltree. The farmer who wishes to obtain a loan on farm stored wheat will request his county AAA committee to inspect his storage facilities in order to make certain that his bins are in condition to store the wheat. If the loan is made another inspection will be made at least thirty days after the storage has been made.

Farmers lacking the proper storing facilities to store the wheat will be eligible for a building or repair loan, according to information received from various lending agencies.

The charges on commercial storage will be paid by the Commodity Credit Corporation if they take over the wheat while producers of farm-stored wheat will receive a payment of seven cents a bushel for storage if they delivered their wheat to the corporation in proper condition on or after May 31, 1938.

The loan rate governing Ochiltree county is 72 cents per bushel F.O.B. Kansas City, Mo., with a reduction of the 17 1/2 cent rate and a 4 cent handling charge at local points.

LOVE TRIANGLE ENDS IN DEATH

BEAVER HOTEL KEEPER KILLS MERCHANT AND THEN TURNS GUN ON SELF IN LOVE QUARREL MONDAY

BEAVER, Aug. 8.—The loves of two 60-year-old men for the same young woman resulted Monday in the murder of one and the suicide of the other.

Sheriff Ford Householder said Ben Bogue, a hotel proprietor here, shot and killed Tom Angleton, operator of a Beaver feed store, Monday afternoon because of jealousy over a 30-year-old woman.

The sheriff said Bogue telephoned him at about 1 p. m. and said: "I want you to come down and pick up a man—Tom Angleton."

When he arrived at the hotel, Householder said Bogue told him: "I just shot Angleton."

Entering Angleton's hotel room, the sheriff discovered him dead with three bullet wounds in the chest and one in the stomach.

Householder said Bogue left him to "get a drink of water" while the body was being examined. Then the sheriff heard a shot.

Rushing to Bogue's room, Householder discovered him dead of a bullet wound in the temple, and a 45 caliber "six shooter" at his side.

The sheriff said Bogue became angry when he learned Angleton had "cut in" on his love affair with the 30-year-old woman who also lived at the hotel.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of "murder and suicide."

tuned meter, the winner in the truck class averaged 19.4 miles per gallon while the lowest score in this class was 13.4 miles per gallon. On the basis of a full tank of 18 gallons, the difference in distance traveled by the two trucks would be 108 miles.

Now looking at this from a different angle, consider these two trucks as having a 400 mile daily run. One truck getting 13.4 miles per gallon would use 29.85 gallons. With gasoline at 18c the daily fuel cost would be \$5.37. The other truck getting 19.4 miles per gallon would use 20.62 gallons at a daily cost of \$3.71, or a saving of \$1.66 for the daily run. For a 26-day month the saving would be \$43.16.

Of course the mileages in this contest were obtained under very favorable conditions and under regular road conditions the mileage might be less but with a full load the difference in gasoline used would be greater with an attendant greater saving.

The same general conditions were found in all three divisions of the contest.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—

"I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

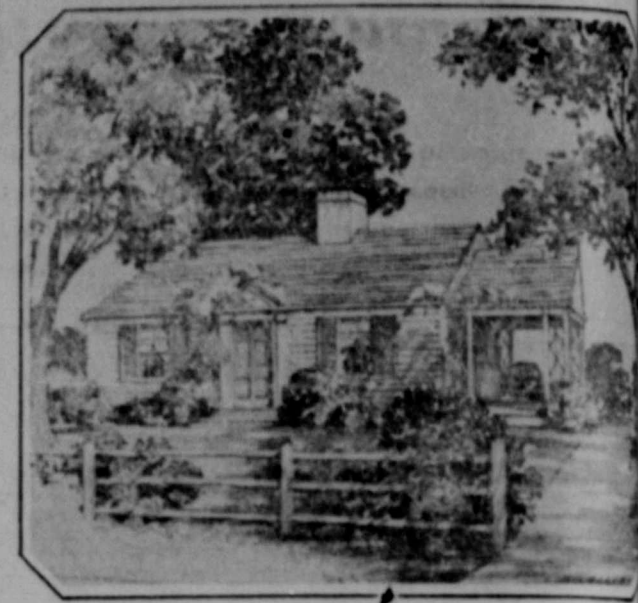
Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Architect Service Brought in Reach of Small Builders

THE day when the small home builder had to "shop around" for a design for his house is just about ended. So say officials of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board in Washington, who are now making available to the homeseeker of moderate means the largest selection of good small house designs ever offered in the United States.

The plans are being offered through the Board's Federal Home Building Service Plan, a far-reaching program of supervised construction which already has been adopted by some 120 savings and loan associations in 42 communities.

THE 300 designs already approved mark a new era for the small home builder, according to Donald H. McNeal, technical director of the Bank Board, who explains that the architectural profession previously had never found the small home field worthwhile.

As deputy general manager of the Home Owners Loan Corporation, a subsidiary of the Bank Board, McNeal saw his agency forced to reconsider nearly half of the million homes it tried to save, in order to make them

good security. It was apparent that the small homes would continue to be put up on makeshift plans—unless something was done.

So McNeal and Pierre Blais, architect adviser to the Board, outlined the program known as the Federal Home Building Service Plan, adopted in 1936.

UNDER the plan architects approved to work for the house architectural bureau serving the larger cities and to co-operate with lending institutions toward smaller communities. The architects provide a modified office at a fee not too stiff for average man's pocketbook, that is included in the total construction cost.

The architects not only supply the designs, but adapt them to family needs, site and neighborhood, advise on the selection of a contractor, specify materials and check on those they specify, and supervise construction.

The 4000 member institutions of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, with assets of more than \$400,000,000, are eligible to operate under the plan.
