'Horns advance to regionals Overtime win thrills fans

LOCKNEY--Continuing their undefeated ways, the Lockney Longhorns came back from a 20-6 fourth quarter deficit Friday, November 22 to defeat the West Texas Comanches 26-20 in a thrilling overtime Area Playoff game at Bulldog Stadium in Plainview.

The victory sets up a regional play-off showdown with the Stamford Bulldogs Friday at 7:30 p.m. November 29 in Stamford.

The Comanches started off quickly as Todd Hopkins took the opening kickoff and rambled 86 yards to the Longhorn 10. On the third down, tailback Jerry Greene fought his way into the end zone behind the right side of the Comanche line. Hopkins kick gave West Texas a 7-0 lead.

Both defenses dominated the remainder of the first quarter and the early part of the second stanza. But

West Texas punched in another touchdown with less than two minutes to go in the half when Hopkins scored from the 1 yard line to complete a 44 yard drive. The extra point failed, leaving the score 13-0.

Staring at 80 yards of real estate and going into a stiff breeze, the Longhorns quickly answered with an impressive drive of their own. Phillips started the drive with a 16-yard run. Pass completions from Adam Cummings to Charles Van Zandt, Thad Lusk and J.R. Walker set up a final play from the Comanche 23. Cummings turned to his big play receiver, Walker, and the junior made a leaping catch at the one yard line and fell into the end zone to complete the 2-minute drill. The extra point failed and the Horns went into the dressing room down 13-6.

The Comanches put up the only points of the third quarter. Quarter-

back Casey Scott eluded a Longhorn defender at the line of scrimmage and scampered into the endzone from 22 yards out. Hopkins extra point raised the score to 20-6.

But the Longhorns refused to die and fought back. Following a defensive stand led by defensive end Hernandez, Van Zandt broke through the line to block a West Texas punt which gave the Horns possession at the Comanche 22.

Three plays later Miguel Guerrero popped into the end zone to cut the Comanche lead 20 to 12.

Horn linebacker Josh Lambert provided another big play for the Lockney special teams when he blocked the second West Texas punt of the night giving possession of the ball to the Horns at the Comanche 34. The Longhorn offense was stalled but Carson Johnson's punt traveled to the

Jerry Cannon submits formal resignation to Fisd

FLOYDADA — Trustees for Floydada Independent School District met in a called session for discussion of the procedure to be used in hiring a superintendent to replace retiring Jerry Cannon. Cannon submitted his formal resignation effective with the end of the 1996-97 school year during the Monday morning session.

Board members approved a plan to advertise the vacancy in statewide educational publications in the January and February editions. A brochure will also be sent to all school districts in the state announcing the

position. Grant Hambright and Mitch Probasco will be responsible for preparation of the brochure to be mailed. Mr. Cannon will handle placement of the position in the educational publications and on the Internet.

Board members agreed to accept applications from qualified individuals who are superintendent certified. Applications will be accepted until February 24, 1997. The board expects to have a selection made in time to present the new superintendent and family to the public at the April regular board meeting.

Adjacent landowners object to "Rec Hall" Floydada Council denies variance

FLOYDADA — Floydada City Council members were presented with a report of a meeting held November 7 by the Floydada Planning and Zoning Commission. The report concerned a request by Albert Juarez for a zoning variance which would allow him to operate a recreation hall at 503 South Wall Street.

After hearing the request and objections raised by adjacent land owners as well as viewing 26 signed letters of objection, the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended that the council not allow the vari-

ance.

During a regular session held Thursday, November 21, Councilman Clar Schacht made a motion to approve the recommendation and not allow the variance. The motion was seconded by Councilman Jon Nielson and all voted in favor.

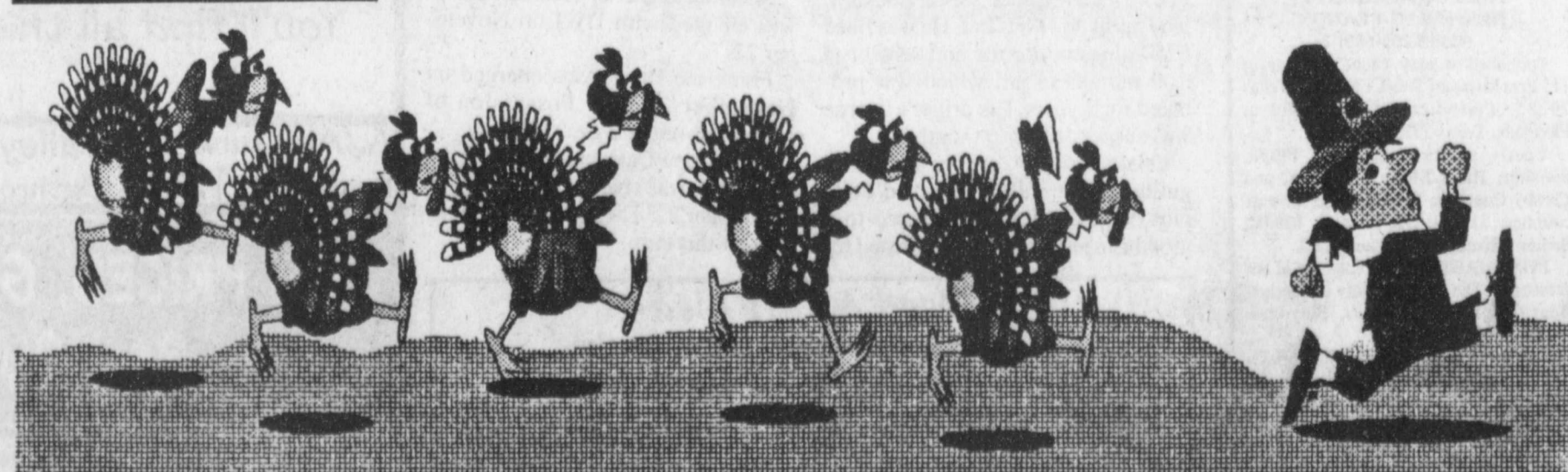
Ruben Reyes, attorney for Juarez, notified the council that he wanted to appeal the decision and requested a public hearing. The public hearing was scheduled for the next regular session of the council on December 19 at 7:30 p.m.

Reyes also asked the council to

authorize two wedding dinners at the hall, one on December 31st and one on January 4. He indicated that the hall would be rented for the events, but no music or alcohol will be present. He said it would be too late for the wedding parties to rent another hall if the appeal was denied on December 19.

City Attorney Karen Houchin advised the council to deny the request at this time. She stated the council should not allow unauthorized uses of the property until a variance is

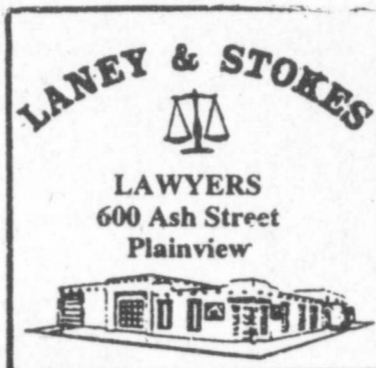

 approved. The request was denied. Lex Herrington, attorney for the First Baptist Church (located across the street from the property in question) presented a position paper from the prospective of the church and told the council a number of people could be expected to speak at the public hearing.

OTHER AGENDA ITEMS
 Bids on railroad right-of-way property were opened and read. There were no duplicate or competitive bids. Six pieces of property were sold to bidders for a total of more than \$5,000.00. Purchasing property were

L.B. Stewart Jr., Floyd County, Floydada Growers and Marketing Association, John R. Hollums and Harriet Purvis, Terra Vaca, Inc., and Pyle Grain Company.

Bids were also reviewed on a 1983 Chevrolet advertised for sale by the city. Tony Felan (\$501.00) and Mike Arwine (\$711.00) submitted bids. The vehicle was sold to the highest bidder, Arwine.

Garbage pickup and dumpster service were approved for Monty Hysinger. He requested service to a location 7/10ths of a mile past the last city pickup on the Lakeview Highway. He will pay the usual fees for out-of-city services.

Roxanna Cummings and Joe Stepp were reappointed to two year terms on the Floydada Housing Authority. An FHA tenant, Victoria Pleasant,

was appointed to a one year term on the board.

Council members approved a resolution concerning the city's Affirmative Action Plan as required for the 1996 TCDP Water Grant. A second resolution was approved in support of Senator Tom Haywood's proposed senate bill to seek the return of five cents on every dollar spent for lottery tickets to the city or county of original sale.

Advertising for bids to purchase a police car and two pickups for city use was authorized by the council. The three vehicles are budgeted for in the current year.

Hiring an additional police officer is within the scope of City Manager Gary Brown's job under city ordinances. He is down to considering two applicants for the position. Police Chief James Hale said that 25 inquiries were received and 12 or 13 applications returned.

Council members convened a short executive session to discuss pending or contemplated litigation. No action was taken following return to regular session.

Brown reported offices at City Hall will be closed next Thursday and Friday for Thanksgiving. City employees will be on call for emergencies.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Payment of monthly bills was authorized following a review of financial reports.

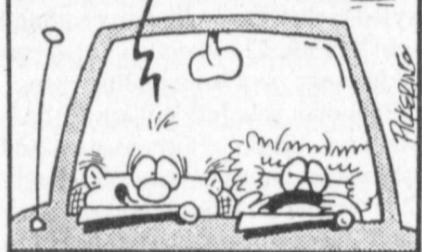

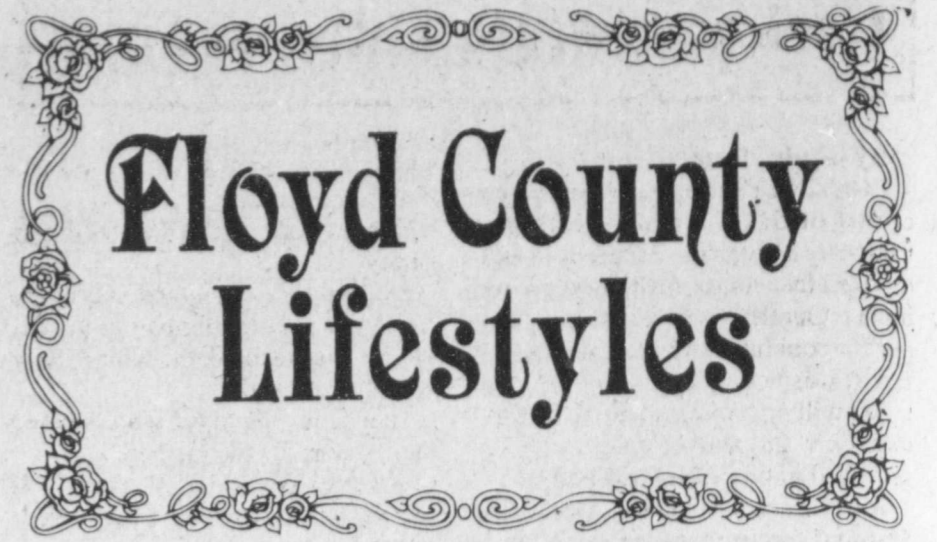

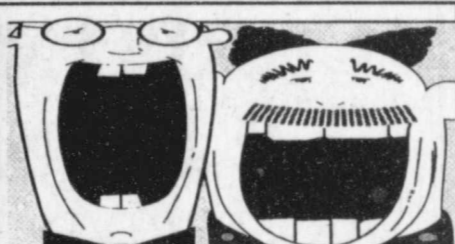

Hospice Care: Making beautiful memories

At the most critical times in a person's life, the need for love and support from family and friends is at its greatest. This need is especially significant when a loved one has been diagnosed with a terminal illness.

Hospice care was created out of the need to provide patients and their families with critical services during the dying process. The premise of hospice is that life can be savored fully, even at the end, and therefore creates beautiful and lasting memories for families.

Although the nation is divided on whether physician-assisted suicide should be legalized, the majority of Americans say that they would not choose it for themselves if they were terminally ill, according to a survey conducted by The Gallup Organization released today.

The survey found that seven out of ten adults would seek a hospice program if terminally ill, until death occurs naturally. "Though much attention has been given lately to physician-assisted suicide," said Jay Mahoney, president of the National Hospice Organization, "hospice remains the overwhelming choice for comprehensive, compassionate end-of-life care, last year caring for nearly 390,000 patients across the country."

Hospice is a comprehensive, medically directed, team-oriented program of care that emphasizes pain control and symptom management rather than curative treatment. It is a philosophy of care that accepts death as a natural part of life, and addresses the psychological and spiritual needs of the patient and family.

The National Hospice Organization was founded in 1978 as a non-profit, public benefit charitable organization advocating for the needs of terminally ill persons in America. It is the largest national nonprofit membership organization devoted exclusively to hospice care.

While hospice services are rapidly growing throughout the world, there is still some misunderstanding as to what hospice is. Following are some of the more frequently asked questions about hospice care.

What is hospice?

First, hospice is not a facility. It's a unique care program designed to meet the physical and emotional needs of terminally ill patients and their families. The services offered under hos-

pice care can be provided in hospitals, nursing homes, or in the comfort of a patient's home. The hospice plan of care provides palliative, rather than curative, treatment. Palliative care is designed to relieve pain and suffering, whether that be through medications or therapy, but does not attempt to delay the dying process. Death is recognized as a natural part of life.

How is care provided for the patient?

The hospice program of palliative and supportive care is provided by a multi-disciplinary team of professionals and volunteers. This team approach is designed to help patients and families cope with the physical, emotional, social, financial and spiritual aspects of terminal illness.

Some hospices offer a team of doctors, nurses, social workers, home health aides, pastoral counselors, therapists and volunteers, among others. Each team member plays a significant part in the overall continuity of care for the patient.

It is the responsibility of the team to plan for a patient's total care and for the care of the family, to help them through the dying process. It is understood that terminal illness affects the entire family; therefore, services must be administered that cater to everyone's particular needs.

How much does hospice cost and what is provided?

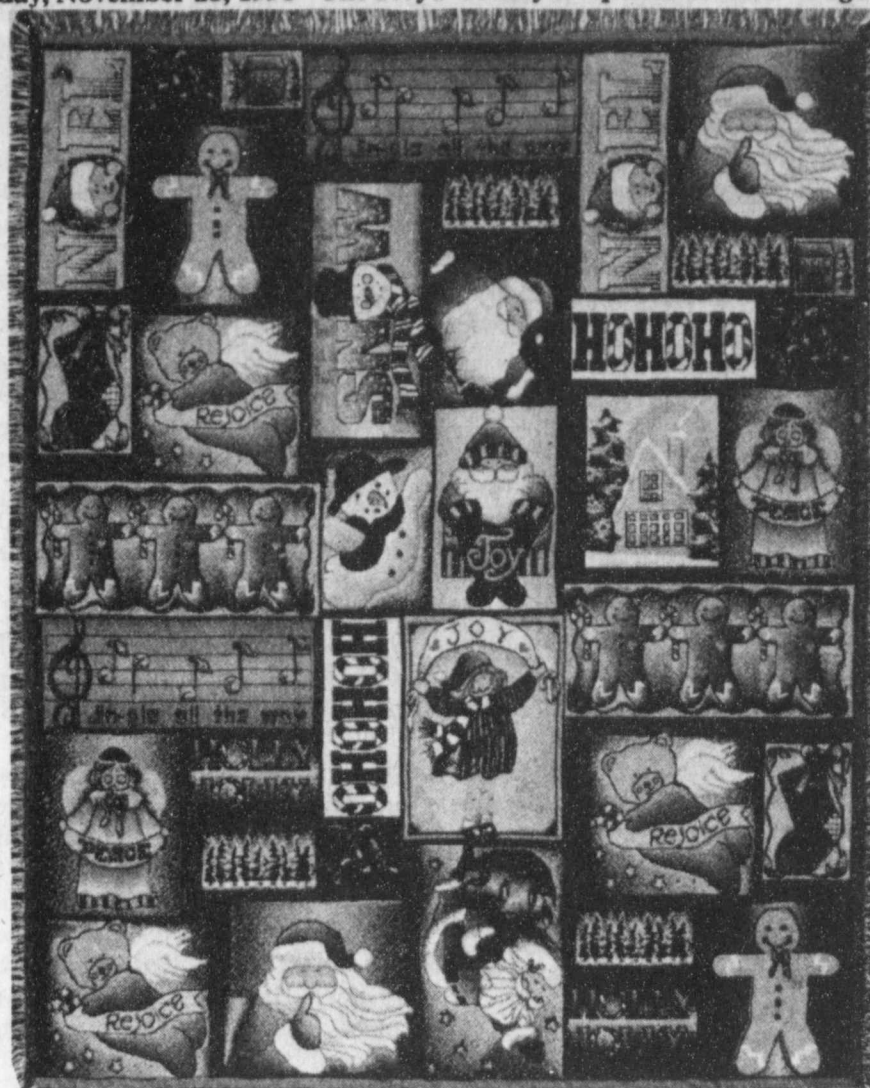
Hospice is a part of the Medicare benefit and services are paid in full, thus preserving a family's financial resources. All services provided by the hospice team are covered as are the cost of drugs, therapy and medical equipment.

Other sources for payment include private insurance, Health Maintenance Organizations, and personal payment.

How can a patient request hospice service?

If a patient and his or her family think they may benefit from hospice care, this option may be discussed with the physician. The doctor in turn can contact the hospice to discuss the next step in the patient's plan of care, or, if preferred, the patient or family can call the hospice directly.

The goal of hospice is to help patients live their fullest in the last stages of life. With hospice, every individual can live out his or her remaining days with comfort, independence and dignity.

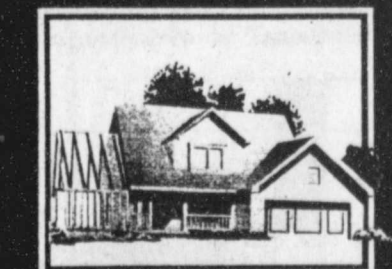

College football scholarships were awarded to Floyd Murry by West Texas State; Malcolm Bridges by Hardin-Simmons; and Buck Jackson by West Texas State, where he was team captain.

Also, in 1930, other FHS students excelled in outstanding accomplishments. Buster Smally and Marion Heald were District Doubles tennis champions in 1933; Thelma Crawford, Business; and Lowell Gamblin, mile run, 2nd at State and Malcolm Bridges, high-jump, were district champions and went to Austin to compete for state championships.

In 1933, Bridges won 2nd in Ex-temporaneous Speaking and the winner went on to win the State Championship.

FLOYDADA - Floydada's 7th Grade Breezers fell to Lubbock Trinity 55-53 in five overtime periods of the championship game of the All Saints Basketball Tournament last weekend in Lubbock. According to Coach Jimmy Burns, "I have been a part of some great games, but I have never been prouder of a group of kids. They represented their community and Floydada schools well."

The Breezers advanced to the tournament finals with a 33-28 victory over Crosbyton, and soundly defeated All Saints 38-13 in the semi-finals. Sean Holster was the biggest point producer in the first two games, scoring 12 and 10, respectively. Scott Nixon led all scorers in the tournament finals with 20.

Recapping the championship finals, Coach Burns said, "Your 7th graders were part of a never-say-die five overtime championship game which offered everything anyone could ever think of in a basketball game. We tied it up (in the fourth quarter of regulation play), with about 20 seconds remaining, to go into the first overtime."

Each team scored three points to go into a second overtime. In the third

Coach Burns was very enthusiastic about Floydada's efforts. "Those

who didn't see this game missed a real 'burn-burner.' There was a standing ovation given for both teams at the end of the marathon contest."

In other 7th Grade action on November 18, the Breezers handed Littlefield a 29-15 loss. Sean Holster's 10 points led all of the Breezer scorers, Edward Porter had 7, Amado Morales had 6 and Juan Gonzales had four points.

"This team has come around quickly," said Coach Burns. "They are very quick and run the ball naturally. Those not producing points on offense are getting those needed rebounds. I am very proud of their overall performances and their efforts."

FLOYDADA - Floydada remained undefeated for the young season with basketball victories over Abernathy and Hale Center last week. Coach Jim Knight's balanced offense features four players averaging double figures per outing. Omar Eguia leads the team with a per-game average of 18.7 points, followed by Vernon Cooper's 15.7, Michael Palacios' 13.3 and Tomas Barrientos' 10.0. Mario Nunez and Daryl Henderson are each scoring 7 points a game, and Angel Aleman is averaging 5.3 points-per-game.

As a team the Whirlwinds sport a respectable 49.5% in field goal accuracy while holding their opponents to 39.3%. Floydada is controlling the boards in spite of not having a player over 6'1". The 'Winds have grabbed

100 rebounds to 76 for their four opponents. Cooper is leading the team in that category with 21, followed closely by Eguia's 20.

Eguia scored 20 points to pace the Whirlwinds to a 57-51 victory over Abernathy on November 19. Cooper added 14 and Barrientos had 10 as the 'Winds continued their balanced attack. Free-throw shooting, which had been just mediocre in the first two outings, improved to 13 of 21 for a team average of 61.9 percent.

The Whirlwinds jumped out to a 12-8 lead over the visitors in the first period, and held a 26-23 lead over the Antelopes at intermission.

Vernon Cooper knocked down 23 points in the Whirlwind's 63-30 victory at Hale Center last Friday. Coach Jim Knight said, "Our defense was excellent in the second and third quar-

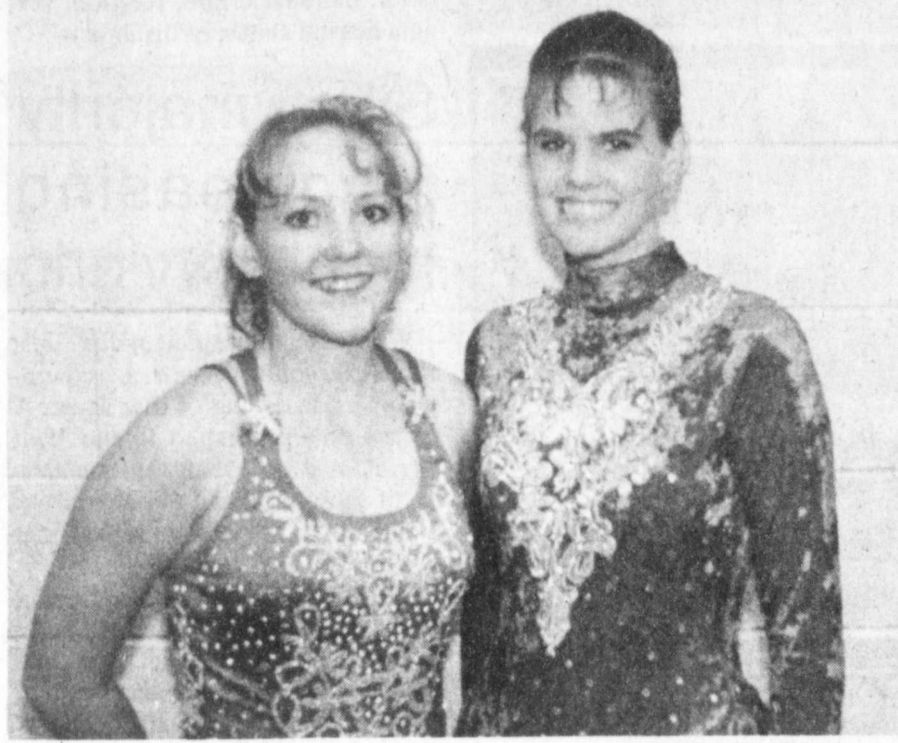

Expiring contracts eligible

One of the questions that has been raised concerning the new Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) rules is whether acreage in expiring contracts—contracts that can not be extended according to law—will be eligible for enrollment under the new rules expected to be out early in 1997.

The answer is yes—if the criteria for either the continuous sign up or the practices in place under the new rules are met.

Landowners that wish to continue participating in the CRP should take a look at the practices now eligible for continuous sign up, and consider what might fit their operations. Landowners should also become aware of

the new CRP rules, to prepare for rebidding their CRP acreage that will be expiring.

For all CRP participants, looking ahead and planning will help landowners make the transition to the new program rules.

The CRP is still the Department of Agriculture's primary program for controlling soil erosion, saving some 694 million tons of soil each year. This program also creates wildlife habitat, enhances wetlands, protects environmentally sensitive lands from pollution damage, enhances flood protection efforts, and improves environmental quality for millions of Americans.

No other conservation program is as large, is designed to run as long, as is the CRP. In addition, the CRP is fully funded. The only limitation on the program is a Congressionally mandated 36.4 million acre cap on nationwide enrollment at any one point in time.

For further information and details on CRP, continuous sign up, and the proposed new rules, landowners should contact their local USDA Farm Service Agency office.

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Silent majority favor easing regulatory grip

Who is an environmentalist? Just about everyone, it seems, sees themselves as deserving of that name. A recent poll published in the *Wall Street Journal*, reveals that a majority of those claiming to be environmentalists have much more than that on their minds.

The WSJ poll suggests that finding even one American citizen claiming to be "anti-environment" would be difficult. Contrary to conventional thought, 80 percent of those claiming to be environmentalists are not activists. These people support environmental protection, but they don't subscribe to the many disaster scenarios of some environmental groups.

Monty Teeter, president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau, sees the poll as good news.

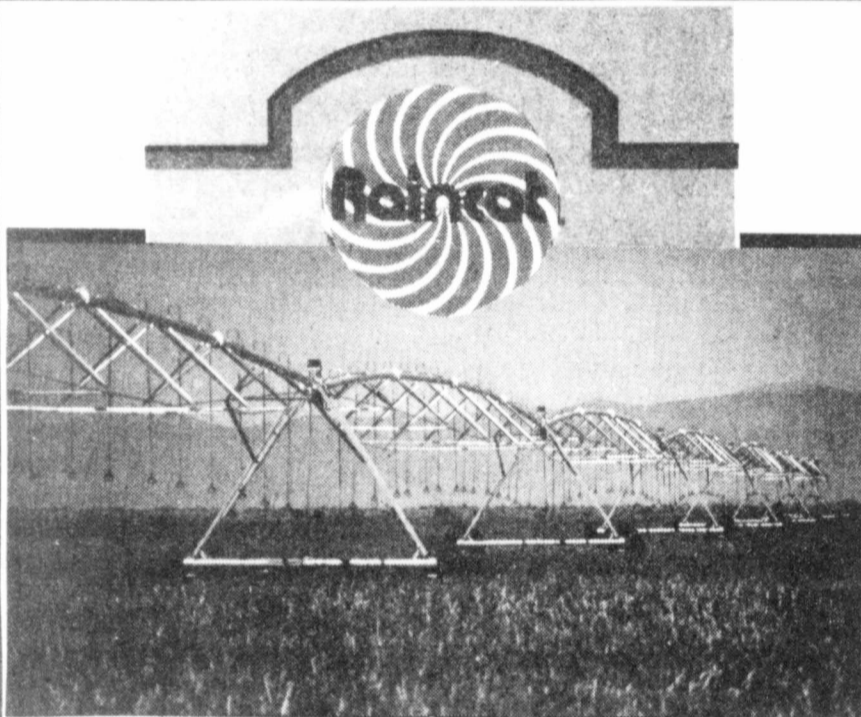
"Like farmers, this silent majority of environmentalists favors easing the current regulatory grip Washington has on certain segments of the population," Teeter said.

Indeed, the poll indicates that most Americans are almost as concerned about the affects of regulation as they are about the environment itself.

A strong majority of Americans believe private property owners should not have to waive certain constitutional guarantees because of environmental protection regulations.

"The poll shows public support for compensating landowners fairly when environmental regulations restrict land use or reduce property values," Teeter said. "We are very pleased to see that common sense environmental regulation has public support."

According to the WSJ poll, the majority of Americans also believe wetlands regulations and the Endangered Species Act should be less cumbersome for property owners. Nearly half of Americans favor government incentives, not land use restrictions and penalties, as motivation for landowners to keep endangered species on their property.



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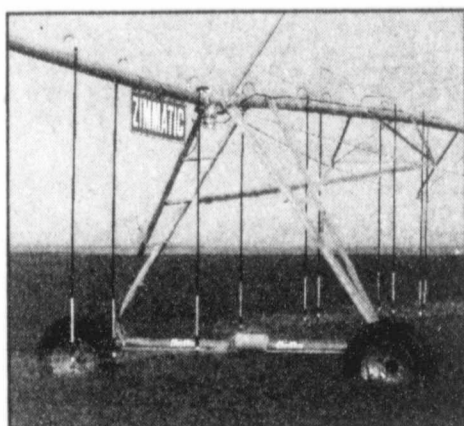
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Projects scheduled for funding

Focusing on the future could have been the major theme at the Texas Food & Fiber Commission's (TFFC) Industry Advisory Committee meeting, November 7, 1996.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers the TFFC committee met at the Texas Tech International Textile Center to preview research projects set to be carried out during the 1998-1999 biennium.

"The TFFC's main purpose is to support Texas natural fiber and oilseed industries through the oversight of research projects conducted at major research institutions around the state," explains TFFC Executive Director Steve Verett. "Research funding is provided directly from the Texas Legislature. Hopefully, this provides a mechanism for research to more easily respond to the needs of the cotton, wool, mohair and oilseed industries."

Verett says a number of research projects scheduled for funding, following approval of budget requests by the legislature, are cotton oriented and directly benefit producers.

Verett notes that an ongoing project funded by the TFFC provides funds used by Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) agents to do fiber testing on cotton produced in county demonstration projects. These results provide valuable information to producers as they decide on the varieties they feel will best fit their operations. Another TFFC project provides fiber testing to all Texas A&M University cotton breeders for evaluation of new breeding lines and varieties.

Other research areas being addressed by the TFFC in cotton include developing reliable tests to determine and possibly combat fiber stickiness, increase disease and pest resistance, develop improved management systems and to increase the value-added aspects of cotton fiber and seed.

Total funding requested to carry out TFFC research in 1998-1999 is approximately \$2.5 million.

"The TFFC's role has really been focused in the last few years as all commodity groups attempt to chart their courses into the next century," concludes Verett. "An excellent example of this work is the outstanding job the wool and mohair industry has done following elimination of government support programs designed to help them."

"Wool and mohair producers have refocused their pertinent research and commodity promotion efforts. They are now industry driven, helping insure that wool and mohair continue to be a viable economic force within the state."

Harvesting activity is proceeding throughout the Texas High Plains, despite the lack of a true killing freeze in many areas.

Overall, estimates indicate about 35-40 percent of the crop has been stripped. The difference in percent harvested, however, appears to vary widely from area to area.

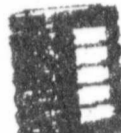

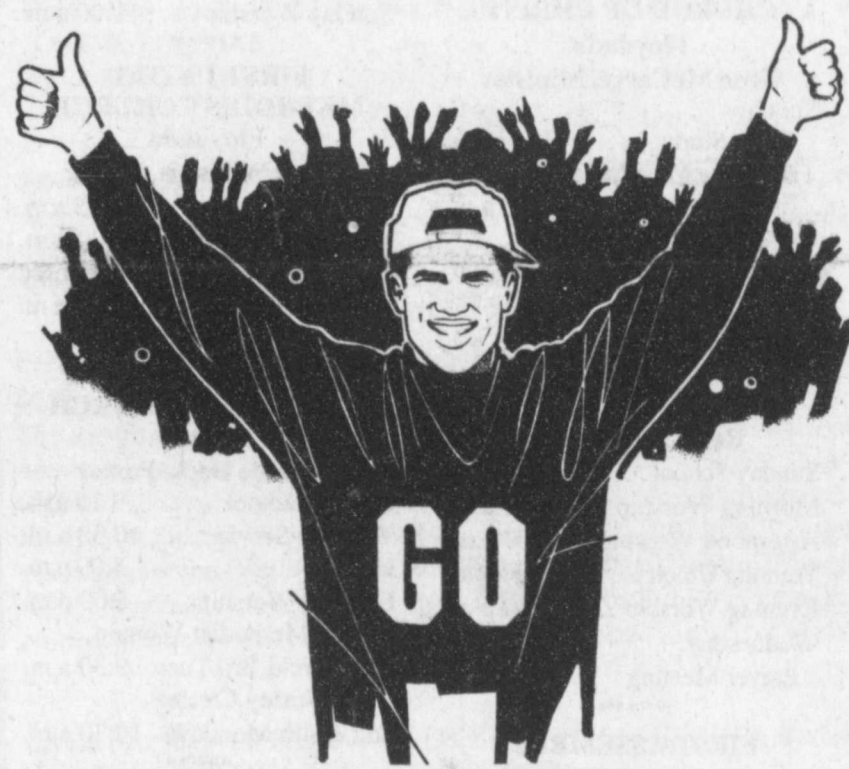

"FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

QUESTION: My son Brian is now 14 years old and he has suddenly entered a period of rebellion like nothing I've ever seen. He is breaking the rules right and left, and he seems to hate the entire family. He becomes angry when his mother and I try to discipline him, of course, but even during more tranquil times he seems to resent us for merely being there.

Last Friday night he arrived home an hour beyond his deadline, but refused to explain why he was late or make apologetic noises. We are in the midst of a nightmare I never anticipate when he was younger.

This is my question: I would like you to tell me exactly how to approach the situation, even role playing my task of confronting him. I need to know what to say when that moment arrives.

Dr. Dobson: I would recommend that you invite Brian out to breakfast on a Saturday morning, leaving the rest of the family at home. It would be best if this event could occur during a relatively tranquil time, certainly not in the midst of a hassle or intergenerational battle. Admit that you have some important matters to discuss with him which can't be communicated adequately at home, but don't "tip your hand" before Saturday morning.

Brian, I want to talk to you this morning because of the changes that are taking place in you and in our home. We both know that the past few weeks have not been very pleasant. You have been angry most of the time and have become disobedient and rude.

And you mother and I haven't done so well either. We've become irritable and we've said things that we've regretted later. There has to be a more creative way to solving our problems. That's why we're all here.

2. As a place to begin, Brian, I want you to understand what is happening. You have gone into a new period of life known as adolescence. This is the final phase of childhood, and it is often a very stormy and difficult few years. Nearly everyone on earth goes through rough years during their early teens, and you are right on schedule at this moment.

Many of the problems you face today were predictable from the day you were born, simply because growing up has never been an easy thing to do.

There are even greater pressures on kids today than when we were young. I've said that to tell you this: we understand you and love you as much as we ever did, even though the past few months have been difficult in our home.

3. What is actually taking place, you see, is that you have had a taste of freedom. You are tired of being a little boy who was told what to wear and when to go to bed and when to eat. That is a healthy attitude which will help you grow up.

However, now you want to be your own boss and want to make your own decisions without interference from anyone.

Brian, you will get what you want in a very short time. You are 14 now, and you'll soon be 15 and 17 and 19. You will be grown in a twinkling of an eye, and we will not longer have any responsibility for you.

The day is coming when you will go to whatever school you choose, select the profession or job that suits you and marry whomever you wish. Your mother and I will not try to make those decisions for you. We will respect your adulthood.

Furthermore, Brian, the closer you get to those days, the more freedom we plan to give you. You have more privileges now than you had last year, and that trend will continue. We will soon set you free.

4. But Brian, you must understand this message: you are not grown yet. During the past few weeks, you have wanted your mother and me to leave you alone to stay out half the night if you choose, to fail in school and to carry no responsibility at home. And, you have "blown up" whenever we have denied even your most extreme demands.

The truth of the matter is, you have wanted us to grant you 20-year-old freedom at age 14, although you still expect to have your shirts ironed and your meals fixed and your bills paid. You have wanted the best of both worlds with none of the responsibilities. So what are we to do?

The easiest thing would be to let you have your way. There would be

no hassles and no conflict and no more frustration. Many parents of 14-year-old sons and daughters have done just that. But we must not yield to this. You are not ready for the complete independence and we would be showing hatred for you (instead of love) if we surrendered all the time. We would regret our mistake for the rest of our lives, and you would soon blame us, too.

And as you know, you have two younger sisters who are watching you very closely, and must be protected from the things you are teaching them.

We have responsibility as parents to do what is right. Mothers and fathers are expected to train their children and discipline them when required.

5. That brings us to the question of where do we go from here. I want to make a pledge to you: your mother and I intend to be more sensitive to your needs and feelings than we have been in the past. We're not perfect, and it is possible that you will feel we have been unfair at one time or another. If that occurs, you can express your views and we will listen to you.

We want to keep the door of communication wide open between us. When you seek a few privileges, I am going to ask myself this question: "Is there any way I can grant this request without harming Brian or other people?" If I can permit what you want in good conscience, I will do so. I will compromise and bend as far as my best judgement will let me.

6. But here this Brian: there will be a few matters that will not be compromised. There will be occasions when I will have to say "no". And when those times come, you can expect me to stand like the Rock of Gibraltar. No amount of violence and temper tantrums and door slamming will change a thing.

In fact, if you choose to fight me on those remaining rules, I promise that you will lose dramatically. I can make your life uncomfortable and that will be my goal. Believe me, Brian, I'll lie awake nights figuring out how to make you miserable. I have the courage and determination to do my job during these last few years you are at home, and I intend to use all my resources for this purpose, if necessary.

So it's up to you. We can have a peaceful time of cooperation at home, or we can spend this last part of your childhood in unpleasantness and struggle. Either way, you will arrive home when you are told, and you will carry your share of responsibility in the family and you will continue to respect your mother and me.

7. Finally, Brian, let me emphasize the message I gave you in the beginning. We love you more than you can imagine, and we're going to remain friends during this difficult time. There is so much pain in the world today. You haven't felt much discomfort yet, but you'll taste it soon enough. So with all that heartache outside our door, let's not bring more of it on ourselves. We need each other. We need you and, believe it or not, you still need us occasionally.

8. Do you still have things that need to be said to us?

The content of this message should be modified to fit individual circumstances and the needs of particular adolescents. Furthermore, the responses of children will vary tremendously from person to person. An "open" boy or girl may reveal his deepest feelings at such a moment of communication, permitting a price-less time of catharsis and ventilation.

On the other hand, a stubborn, defiant, and proud adolescent may sit immobile with head downward. But even if your teenager remains stoic or hostile, at least the cards have been laid on the table and parental intentions explained.

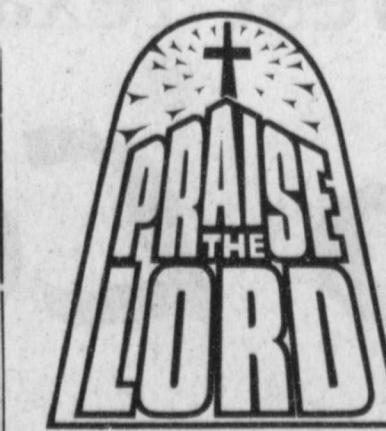

Congressman Thornberry offers assistance to veterans

In response to an announcement by the Pentagon that up to 20,000 U.S. soldiers may have been exposed to chemical agents during the Persian Gulf War, U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry is offering his office's assistance to any area veteran who took part in that conflict and believes he or she may have been exposed.

"The Pentagon and Veterans Department have set up several 800 numbers for Gulf War veterans to call

if they think they may have been exposed," Thornberry stated. "In the event these lines are busy or there's any other trouble getting through, I'm encouraging people to call one of my local offices and we'll make sure their questions and concerns get to the appropriate person or agency in Washington."

The Pentagon reported that it was sending letters to 20,000 veterans of the Gulf War who may have been exposed to sarin nerve gas when Iraqi rocket shells were demolished at two weapons sites on March 4 and March

10, 1991. In the letter, soldiers are being asked to call the Pentagon at 1-800-472-6719 with any information about these two incidents.

The Pentagon has stated that it has established no connection between exposure to chemical agents during the Gulf War and resulting illness. It

is asking soldiers who think they may need medical assistance to contact the health registries at the Pentagon and Veterans Department.

The number for the Pentagon's health registry is 1-800-796-9699. The number for the VA's health registry is 1-800-749-8387.

Local municipalities get monthly sales tax rebates

November 1996 sales tax rebates made to Floyd County cities from the state comptroller's office have been received, with Floydada showing a decrease and Lockney exhibiting an increase for the month when compared to rebates for the same period in 1995.

Total rebates received in Floyd County this month were \$13,688.87, an overall decrease of 7.71 percent when compared to the \$14,833.13 received in November of 1995. Year to date rebates now stand at \$159,568.57, an increase of 1.80 percent over the \$156,739.71 county total at this time in 1995.

Lockney displayed an increase of 1.12 percent from the same period for 1995 in over all receipts. The city's November check was in the amount of \$4,531.71 compared to \$4,481.26 received in November, 1995. Lockney has received a total of \$47,785.35 this year, compared to \$46,347.06 in 1995. This is an overall increase of 3.10 percent.

Floydada's check from the state comptroller's office was in the amount of \$9,157.16 showing a decrease of 11.54 percent from the \$10,351.87 payment received in November of 1995. The total received in Floydada at this time now stands at \$111,783.22, the 1995 total at this time was \$110,392.65. This displays an overall increase of 1.25 percent for the city.

November payments totaling \$206.2 million in local sales tax rebates went back to 1,083 Texas cities and 116 counties, according to the state comptroller's office. This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on sales in September and reported to the comptroller in October by businesses filing monthly returns. Rebates also reflect sales made in July, August, and September and reported to the comptroller by quarterly filers.

Sales taxes are collected by merchants and forwarded to the state which retains a 6.25 percent share and returns the city sales tax portion to each city, county, hospital district or transit system. Neither Floyd County nor Lockney General Hospital District and Caprock Hospital District levies a sales tax at this time. No qualifying transit system, which could also levy a sales tax, operates within the county.

Program enhances participation in environmental permit decisions

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) today announced a major new initiative to give citizens unprecedented access to agency permitting process. The Office of Public Assistance (OPA) was unveiled at press conferences in Amarillo, Houston, and San Antonio.

As the state's comprehensive environmental agency, the TRNCC is charged with assessing and permitting all discharges to the air, soil, and waterways of Texas.

"This new Office of Public Assistance will empower the people of Texas with the information they need to fully participate in all our permitting processes," said TNRCC Chairman Barry McBee, who made the announcement in San Antonio. "We recognize that the permitting process can be confusing and frustrating for individuals unfamiliar with the language and procedures prescribed by statute. With OPA, we are setting up a one-stop forum that the public can turn to for clear, concise information on how they can play a role in the agency's permit decisions."

"We've reallocated existing agency resources to this important effort, and staffed OPA with 11 long-time employees who are well versed in the ins and outs of air, water, and waste permitting," said Commissioner Ralph Marquez, in Houston where TNRCC

regional staff oversee almost one fourth of the agency's active permits and registrations. "The office reports directly to the Commissioners and is completely separate from the administrative, permit-processing part of the agency."

"To ensure the accessibility of this office, we've set up a toll-free number for citizens to call with their permitting questions said Commissioner John Baker, in the Panhandle for the Amarillo announcement. "Texans in communities across the state can call 1-800-687-4040 for straight answers on permitting issues. A voice-mail system will take your calls outside normal working hours. We respond to all inquiries and, of course, OPA is staffed with bilingual public assistance specialists."

OPA is the latest initiative to increase public participation in agency process without creating a burdensome procedure or spending additional funds. Last fall, the then newly-appointed Commissioners adopted a set of guiding principles affirming the agency's commitment to full participation by the public in its permitting and rule-making process. In April, they issued a resolution to further strengthen TNRCC public assistance and outreach activities in order to provide greater responsiveness to the public and additional opportunities for public participation.

Sweepstakes Clearing House has a long history of many inquiries and complaints to the BBB of Dallas and currently has an unsatisfactory record with that BBB. Just remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Call the BBB at

ORDINANCE NO. 227

An ordinance regulating the issuance of licenses for operators of a pool hall, billiard parlor or game room; providing for the cancellation thereof; providing for the supervision of any person, firm, association of person, or corporation owning or operating a billiard parlor, pool hall or game room within the incorporated city limits of the City of Lockney; providing the terms under which said pool hall, billiard parlor or game room is to be operated; providing opening and closing hours; providing a penalty; and repealing ordinance numbers 116 and 120 and all other ordinances, orders, or resolutions in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS:

(A) The terms "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room", as used in this ordinance shall be synonymous. The term "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room", as used are defined as being any place where a billiard table or tables are used, maintained, kept or exhibited for the purpose of profits, or any place where any billiard table or pool table is kept, used, maintained or exhibited where a charge is made for playing billiards or pool on said table.

(B) A "billiard table" or "pool table" - defined as being any table surrounded by a ledge or cushion with or without pockets upon which balls are impelled by a stick or cue regardless of the size of the table.

(C) The term "pool hall operator", "billiard parlor operator", "game room operator", as used in this ordinance shall refer to and include every person, firm, association, or every other organization, owning or operating for profit a pool table or billiard table or electronic games, by whatever named called, and where the player does not or is not required to make a coin deposit causing an electrical connection of any nature or kind before such game make actually commence. Wherever the word "operator" is used in this ordinance, the same refers to both a "pool hall operator", "billiard parlor operator", "game room operator", as those terms are herein defined.

(D) By the term "City Council" as used herein is meant the City Council or the governing body of the City of Lockney, Texas.

(E) Wherever the word "manager" is used herein, the same means and refers to the active manager or supervisor of a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room".

(F) "Gambling as herein used is defined as the staking, betting, or wagering of any money or other thing of value on an uncertain event.

(G) Coin activated pool or billiard tables are not electronic games;

SECTION 2.

No person, firm, association or persons, or corporation shall operate or exhibit or maintain a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room" within the City Limits of the City of Lockney, Texas for the purpose of profit unless such operator has valid license to operate such establishment issued in accordance with the terms and provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3.

No person shall manage, supervise or be in charge of a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room", except an owner or part owner unless such person has a valid manager's license to so manage or supervise said establishment in accordance with the terms and provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 4.

(A) and person, firm, association or person, or corporation desiring to operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room", within the City Limits of the City of Lockney, Texas shall make application to the city council for a license to so operate such establishment. A separate license is hereby required for each separate place of business wherein billiard tables, pool table, electronic games, are kept, maintained or exhibited for the purpose of profit.

SECTION 5.

All applications for a license applied for under this ordinance shall show:

(A) The location where the billiard table or pool tables or electronic games are to be exhibited.

(B) That the place where said billiard table or pool tables or electronic games are to be exhibited is not in violation of or in conflict with any existing zoning ordinance of the City of Lockney.

(C) That there is adequate toilet facilities on said premises where the billiard table, pool tables or electronic games are to be exhibited.

(D) That the said place, building and location, has adequate safeguards for the safety of the occupants in the event of fire.

(E) That such "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room", shall be located on the ground floor only of any building.

(F) That the said building shall maintain and provide sufficient lights as may be reasonably required by the City of Lockney.

(G) See attached page 140.

SECTION 6.

(A) No license to operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", "game room" shall be granted to any applicant if the owner, owners, part owner, a partner, the manager thereof of any of them:

- (1) Is not a person of good moral character;
- (2) Has been convicted of a felony;
- (3) Is under probation or suspended sentence pursuant to the prosecution of a felony;
- (4) Has been convicted of a violation of the liquor laws of the State of Texas or any other state.

(B) If a corporation is the applicant for a license to operate either a billiard parlor, pool hall, game room, the officers and directors thereof shall have the same qualifications as are required of an owner who is in supervision of such establishment, and the said manager shall be the person who has a license to act as a manager of

SECTION 7.

(A) No person except the owner or part owner of a pool hall, billiard parlor, game room shall act as the manager or supervisor of such establishment unless and until he has obtained a pool hall manager's license from the City of Lockney.

(B) The said manager's license shall be issued by the city council upon the same conditions and with the same procedure and subject to the same conditions and provisions for cancellation thereof as is herein provided for licenses for the operator of such establishment.

(C) No managers license shall be granted to any applicant who:

- (1) Is not a person of good moral character;
- (2) Has been convicted of a felony;
- (3) Is under probation or suspended sentence pursuant to the prosecution of a felony;
- (4) Has been convicted of a violation of the liquor laws of the State of Texas or any other state.

(D) The license of a manager issued here under may be cancelled by the city council or may be suspended upon the same grounds and in accordance with the same procedures as is herein provided for the cancellation or suspension of the

license to operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room".

(E) Any violation of the terms and provisions of this ordinance by a manager of a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room", or manager shall be grounds for the grounds for suspension or cancellation of his said license by the City council subject to the procedure prescribed herein for the cancellation and suspension of the license to operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room".

(F) The city council may, pending the investigation, issue a temporary "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" manager's license not exceed thirty (30) days.

(G) A "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" manager shall have the same duties and responsibilities pertaining to the operation of such establishment as is required of the owner or operator of such establishment.

(H) Where the owner or part owner is the actual manager and supervisor of "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room", it shall not necessary for a person holding a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room", manager's license to be in charge of each separate establishment.

(I) Where the owner or part owner of said "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" is not the active manager or supervisor thereof, said establishment shall not operate unless it is managed and supervised by a person who has a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" manager's license as the active manager or supervisor. The operation or attempted operation or supervision of said establishment by anyone who does not have a manager's license as provided for herein and who is not an owner, part owner thereof shall constitute grounds for cancella-

SECTION 8.

Each applicant for an operator's license or manager's license shall at the time of filing his application for license pay to the City of Lockney a fee of \$50.00, which fee is hereby levied for the purpose of paying the cost of investigation to be made by the agents of the City of Lockney and for clerical work in connection with the issuance of said license. In the event the license is refused or revoked the fee will not be returned. License shall be renewed every 3 years.

SECTION 9.

The manager, operator, owner or any agent, servant or employee of the manager, operator, or owner of any said "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" shall not:

(A) permit persons who have a detectable presence of intoxicating substance or controlled substances about their person to remain on the premises.

(B) permit any drinking of intoxicating substance or use of controlled substance upon or within the premises.

(C) Manager or employee shall not consume or have a detectable presence of any intoxicating or controlled substance about their person while on the premises,

(D) knowingly permit anyone to remain on said premises who is carrying a firearm or weapon of any type as defined in Section 46 of the Texas Penal Code.

(E) knowingly permit any gambling on the premises.

(F) knowingly permit any card playing on the premises.

(G) knowingly permit any dancing at said premises.

(H) knowingly permit any dice games on said premises.

(I) knowingly permit any outside beverages in any type of container into the building or on the premises.

SECTION 10.

Every person, firm, association of person, or corporation, owning or operating a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" or combination thereof within the corporate limits of the City of Lockney, Texas shall remain closed and permit no persons including owners, managers or agents to loiter or play therein with or without charge except during hours that the same is herein permitted to remain open, which said hours are in accordance with the following schedule:

(A) Sunday through Thursday the establishment shall close at 12:00 p.m. and remain closed until 8:00 a.m. Persons under the age of seventeen, (17), shall vacate the premises by 10:45 p.m. on these days. During the times that the public school system is in session, persons that are enrolled or that should be enrolled in the public school system shall not enter the establishment until after 3:45 p.m.

(B) Friday and Saturday the establishment shall close at Midnight and remain closed until 8:00 a.m. Persons under the age of seventeen, (17), shall vacate the premises by 11:45 p.m. on these days. During the time that the public school system is in session, persons enrolled or that should be enrolled in the public school system shall not enter the establishment on Friday's until after 3:45 p.m.

(C) It shall be the duty of the owner, operator or manager of the establishment to enforce this provision. Failure of operators or manager's license to operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the City of Lockney, Texas.

SECTION 11.

Persons under the age of seventeen, (17), and persons that are enrolled or should be enrolled in the public school system shall be allowed to remain in the establishment during day hours as long as they are accompanied by one of their parents and the parent or parents remain in the establishment. It shall be the duty of the owner, operator or manager of the establishment to enforce these provisions. Failure to do so shall be grounds for cancellation of said owner's operators or manager's license to operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the City of Lockney, Texas.

SECTION 12.

In the event that any billiard table, pool table, electronic game is exhibited for the purpose of profit on business property and the business is to gain in excess of ten (10) percent of its gross profits from the tables or games there is to be no other business conducted on the business property; other than the buying or selling of candies or soft drinks.

SECTION 13.

(A) It shall be the duty of the operator of any billiard parlor, pool hall or game room and the duty of the manager thereto, to maintain the peace and decorum of all persons coming into and remaining on the premises where the establishment is operated. Any breach of the State of Texas occurring is located within the city limits of the City of Lockney shall be considered spawned by reason of said operation of the said establishment and shall be and constitute grounds for cancellation or revocation of the license of the operator of such establishment.

(B) It shall be the responsibility of the manager, owner or operator on duty to notify police department of any breach of the peace, assault, affray or any other violation of the penal laws of the State of Texas immediately. Failure to do so shall be and constitute grounds for cancellation of or revocation of the license of the operator of such establishment.

SECTION 14.

(A) City Council of the City of Lockney shall have the authority to cancel or suspend for any length of time not to exceed thirty, (30), days and "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" operators license for a violation of any of the terms and provisions of this ordinance, or in the event of failure in the part of the operator or manager to keep, observe, and comply with any and all of the provisions of this ordinance. In this connection the said operator or manager shall be responsible for the acts and conduct of his agents, servants, and employees, and the acts and conduct or omissions of said agents, servants or employees in connection with the operation of said establishment shall for the purpose of cancellation or suspension of a license be considered and taken as the action and conduct or omission of such operator. The operator of said establishment shall be responsible for the acts, conduct, or omissions of the manager of said establishment in the event of the operator is not the active manager and supervisor of said establishment.

SECTION 15.

No person, firm, association of persons, or corporation who has had a license cancelled shall be re-issued a license for a period of twelve, (12), months subsequent to the date of cancellation of said license.

SECTION 16.

In the event of the cancellation of said license, no license shall be granted for the operation of a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" upon the same premises where said establishment was operated for a period of twelve (12) months thereafter, not shall a license be granted to any operator who proposes to use the same billiard tables or pool tables in the operation of said business for a period of twelve, (12), months thereafter, unless and until it is definitely shown and proven to the satisfaction of the City council that the operator whose license has been cancelled does not have an interest, financial or otherwise, in and to the said place of business or in any of the billiard tables, pool tables, or electronic games. The term "financial interest" as used herein shall include any liens, mortgage, or any other type of claim or interest in and to said place of business is to be conducted, whether is be a fee simple interest or a leasehold interest.

SECTION 17.

Any person who shall, either for himself, or as employees for another operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the City Limits of the City of Lockney without having valid license as required and provided herein shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum a not less than one dollar, (\$1.00), nor more than Five hundred dollars, (\$500.00). Each separate day such person shall operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the city limits of the City of Lockney without having a valid license as provided for herein, shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 18.

Any person who shall manage or supervise a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" without having a valid managers license to do so manage said establishment issued by the City of Lockney in accordance with the terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction there shall be fines in a sum of not less than one dollars, (\$1.00) nor more than five hundred dollars, (\$500.00). Each separate day such person shall manage, operate or supervise a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the city limits of the City of Lockney without having a valid license as provided for herein, shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 19.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance for which a penalty is not specifically provided for the Section 19 or Section 20 hereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum of not less than one dollar, (\$1.00), nor more than five hundred dollars, (\$500.00). Each separate day such violation shall be considered and shall constitute a separate violation.

Section 20.

Any person who shall either for himself or as a manager for another operate a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the City limits of the City of Lockney after a license to so operate said establishment has been cancelled or during the time said license to operate said establishments has been suspended, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum of not less than one dollar (\$1.00), nor more than five hundred dollars, (\$500.00). Each separate day such person shall manage, operate or supervise a "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" within the city limits of the City of Lockney without having a valid license as provided for herein, shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 21.

No person shall have a vested right in any operator's license granted him, and the City of Lockney reserves the right acting by and through its governmental authorities, to amend or repeal this ordinance or to promulgate and pass amendments to this ordinance in lieu thereof regulating and controlling or banning "billiard parlors", "pool halls", or "game rooms" as herein defined, or regulating controlling and licensing the owners, supervisors, or operators thereof.

Section 22.

If any part or parts of the ordinance shall be held to be invalid, such decisions shall not effect the validity of the remaining parts of this ordinance and the City Council hereby declares that it would have passed the remaining parts of this ordinance if it had known that such part or parts thereof would be declared invalid.

Section 23.

All ordinances, including Ordinances No. 108, 116, and 120, other orders and resolutions, or parts thereof heretofore passed and adopted by the city council in conflict herewith, shall be and are hereby repealed.

Section 24.

(A) It is hereby directed that a copy of this ordinance be posted and maintained on the premises of each and every "billiard parlor", "pool hall", or "game room" which operates under the terms and conditions of this ordinance.

(B) It is hereby directed that the license to operate the establishment be prominently displayed.

Section 25.

All licensed premises and persons found on the premises are subject to inspection by the office of the Chief of Police or his designate at any time. Violations found during inspections are subject to prosecution as a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of not less than one dollar (\$1.00), and not more than five hundred dollars, (\$500.00).

ORDINANCE NO. 277

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 277 BY CLARIFYING AND DEFINING TERMS:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF LOCKNEY, TEXAS THAT ORDINANCE NO. 277 BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

- (1) coin activated pool or billiard tables are not electronic games;
- (2) any location where billiard or pool tables are to be exhibited is deemed to be a pool hall, regardless of whether other kinds of businesses are also operated at said location;
- (3) all persons employed and working in pool halls, billiard parlors and game rooms, are subject to the provisions of §6(a) of Ordinance No. 277, and shall pay the City's actual costs of conducting criminal record checks, as determined, from time to time, by the City Secretary;
- (4) this ordinance shall be construed with Ordinance No. 277.
