Formation Of New Cabinet Made For France In Crisis

Andre Tardieu, War Time Commissioner, Completes Task After Longest Row In Republic's History

PARIS, Nov. 4. (AP)—Andre Tardieu, war time high commissioner of France in the United States, tonight succeeding in forming a cabinet after one of the longest and most confused ministerial crises in the history of the French third republic.

The radical socialists, who failed in attempts to build ministries around Edouard Daladier and Etienne Clementel, chief figures of the party's left and right wings respectively, refused to collaborate in the new government. This obliged Tardieu to recruit his ministers from the center and right center.

Cabinet Strong
With Aristide Briand remaining at the Quai d'Orsay, Henri Cheron at the ministry of finances, and Tardieu himself at the ministry of the interior, the cabinet presents a fairly strong appearance as far as the capabilities of its personalities go. Whether it will be able to muster a working majority in the chamber of deputies seems doubtful.

The groups whose representatives are included in the cabinet number about 200 deputies out of a total of 512. Tardieu, who must depend on the support of these groups despite his affirmation that he intended to ignore them, must therefore draw about 100 votes from parties who have no share in the government.

Hope For Support
He hopes that most of the 100 members of the republican union on the right will support him for patriotic reasons. But the inclusion of Briand, which adds so much strength to the government on the left side of the chamber, may elicit the sympathies of this group, which was largely instrumental in overthrowing the Briand cabinet October 22.

His other hope is that the radical socialist party will split and the right wing, headed by Clementel, give him from forty to fifty votes. In any case, the margin of safety is expected to be very narrow.

The new Tardieu cabinet will be largely based on the old Poincare combination.

Death Sentence For Armed Robber Brings Praise, Protest To Jurist

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 4. (AP)—Judge Saul Yager, who has been devoted to crime upon the streets or highways, and search of his victim perhaps, to kill him, a duty?

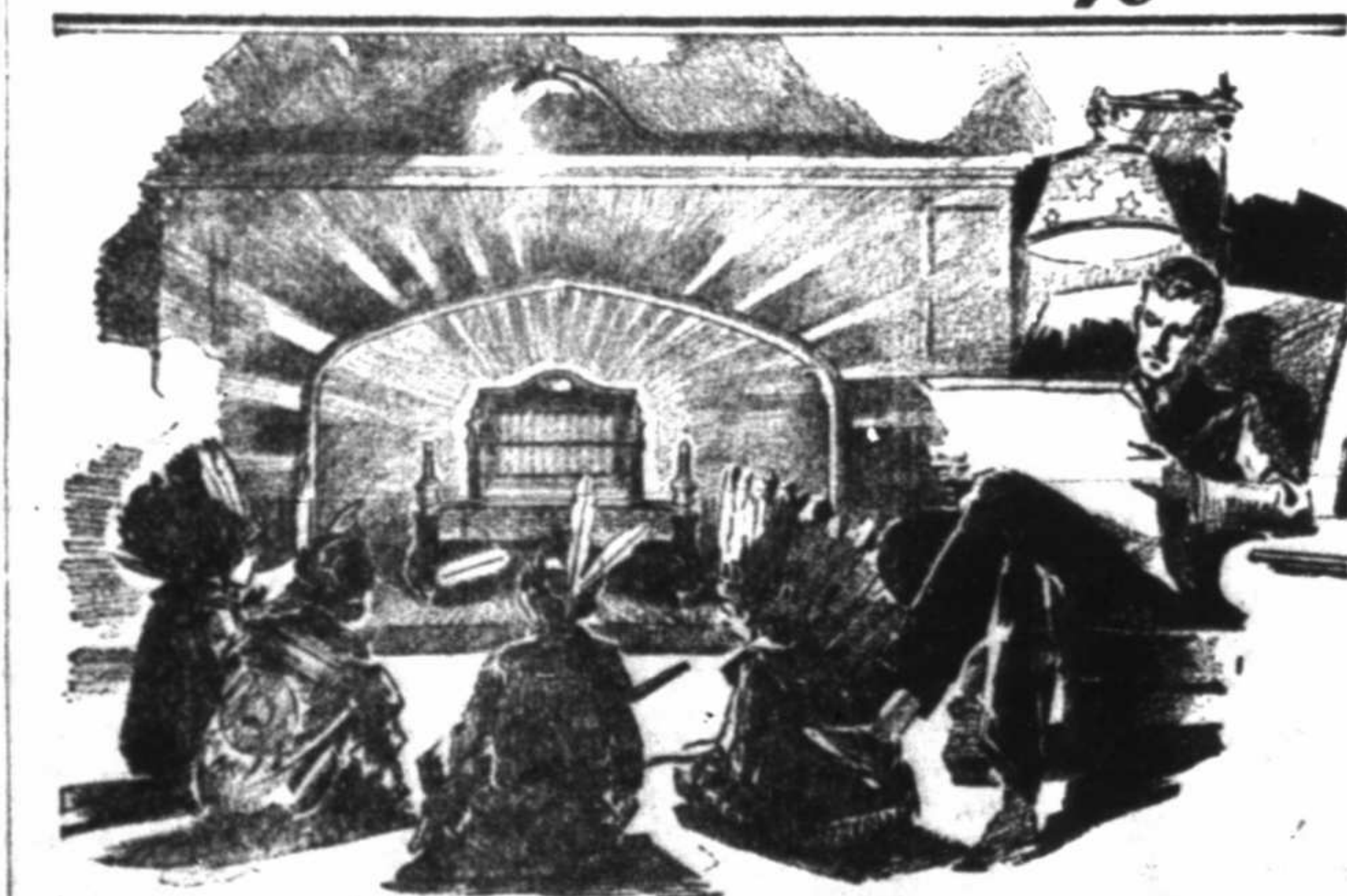
No, says District Judge Saul Yager from his judicial bench in Tulsa. And he emphasized this after he had attracted nationwide attention by sentencing a 15-year-old boy to the electric chair and a 23-year-old youth to life imprisonment.

He looks upon the bandit who call them hijackers now as a potential murderer. He explains against whom society's extended swift, certain justice and heavy penalty alter.

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urgency charge. Unmoved By Youth His youth might have had some effect upon the majority of judges. But Judge Yager, who already has made the courts of the country sit up and look about by the suddenness with which he dispenses justice, followed the law as he saw it. The Oklahoma legislature has provided that persons who commit the crime of robbery with a gun shall be subject to death. The southwest has been a breeding place for bandits for years. Many notorious names have blazed into infamy out of this young, rapidly growing territory.

The names will remain out of history if more judges will take Yager's attitude, authorities believe.

The Judge's Code
Here is the code of ethics which this young district judge has set forth:

"The interests of the armed hijacker, who goes out with the purpose of holding up and perhaps killing his victim, is directly opposite to the interests of society."

There is the question. Whose interests are paramount, society's or the hijacker's? To me there is but one answer, society's.

"I have a feeling of compassion for the man accused, whether he is 17 or 77, but at the same time it is my duty and desire to protect the interests of the citizens who may be the next victims of these potential murderers."

"But I do not propose to wait until someone is killed before acting to check such a danger."

Tulsa and the county gasped at the swiftness of his judgment.

Twenty-four hours later another gasp went out. Judge Yager sentenced Emmett Kelly, 29, Wellston, Ohio, youth, to life imprisonment when he entered a plea of guilty to a charge of stealing \$115 worth of gasoline and oil at the point of a gun.

Production Heavy In Terry County

Crop Yield Greater With Land Deeply Plowed In Brownfield Area; Method Tried By Farmers

BROWNFIELD, Nov. 4.—Crops on deeply-plowed land in Terry county this year will produce from a third to a half more than those on land that has not been plowed, according to a report from the county agent, Roy B. Davis.

The primary purpose of this extraordinary breaking, in some cases being as deep as 16 and 18 inches, is to conserve the oil from wind erosion and to prevent the blowing of crops by wind. The land in Terry county is plowed in a series of ridges and furrows, and the crops are planted in the furrows.

At the present time, Davis, county agent, is in the field, making a survey of the land in the county. He is also making a survey of the crops in the county.

Expert To Study Handwriting For State Attorneys

District Attorney Plans To Introduce Testimony To Rebut Letters Made Public By Defense

DALLAS, Nov. 4. (P)—The Dallas Times-Herald today printed an exclusive news story quoting Edward W. Thomerson of Amarillo, district attorney in charge of the prosecution of R. H. Hamilton at Weatherford, as saying testimony of a handwriting expert would be introduced in the murder trial.

Thomerson frankly admitted that the state will endeavor to prove that, in many instances, the enclosures of certain letters introduced at the trial were written at a different time from the date shown on the envelope post mark and with different pen and ink from the shade of ink shown on the outside of the envelope, said the Times-Herald's item.

Expert Consulted.

Mr. Thomerson was accompanied here by Leo Parks, Potter county attorney, and Grady Hazelwood, assistant district attorney under Thomerson, and visited William A. Weaver, handwriting expert of national reputation. To him they submitted a number of letters said the Times-Herald, adding:

"Mr. Weaver examined these letters, both envelopes and enclosures, and he is prepared to testify as to his conclusions about them Tuesday for the state," District Attorney Thomerson said. "I am not at liberty at this time to reveal just what his testimony will be, but you can say that it will stand the defense on their ears."

Numerous letters introduced at the trial dealt with alleged threats against Hamilton.

Daily Potential Production High

(Special To The Avalanche)

BIG SPRING, Nov. 4.—The daily potential on 128 wells receiving proration in the Howard-Glasscock county fields totaled \$7,022 barrels during October according to report issued by E. E. Andrews, proration umpire. The field is under a 37,500 barrel per day allowance, the amount run the past month totaling 34,212 barrels. The Western extension field which has received the principle play during the past thirty days which yielded four wells that tested over two thousand barrels each. This field was placed on a 40 per cent proration allowance by proration umpire instead of the 75 per cent allowance allowed by the railroad commission to meet the demand for the maximum amount of oil the pipe line companies would use. The pipe lines refusing to buy more oil than their outlets. The proration allowance was recently lifted on the wells produced from the 2,500 foot sand by the railroad commission but retained on the wells produced from the 3,900 foot and 2,200 foot horizons.

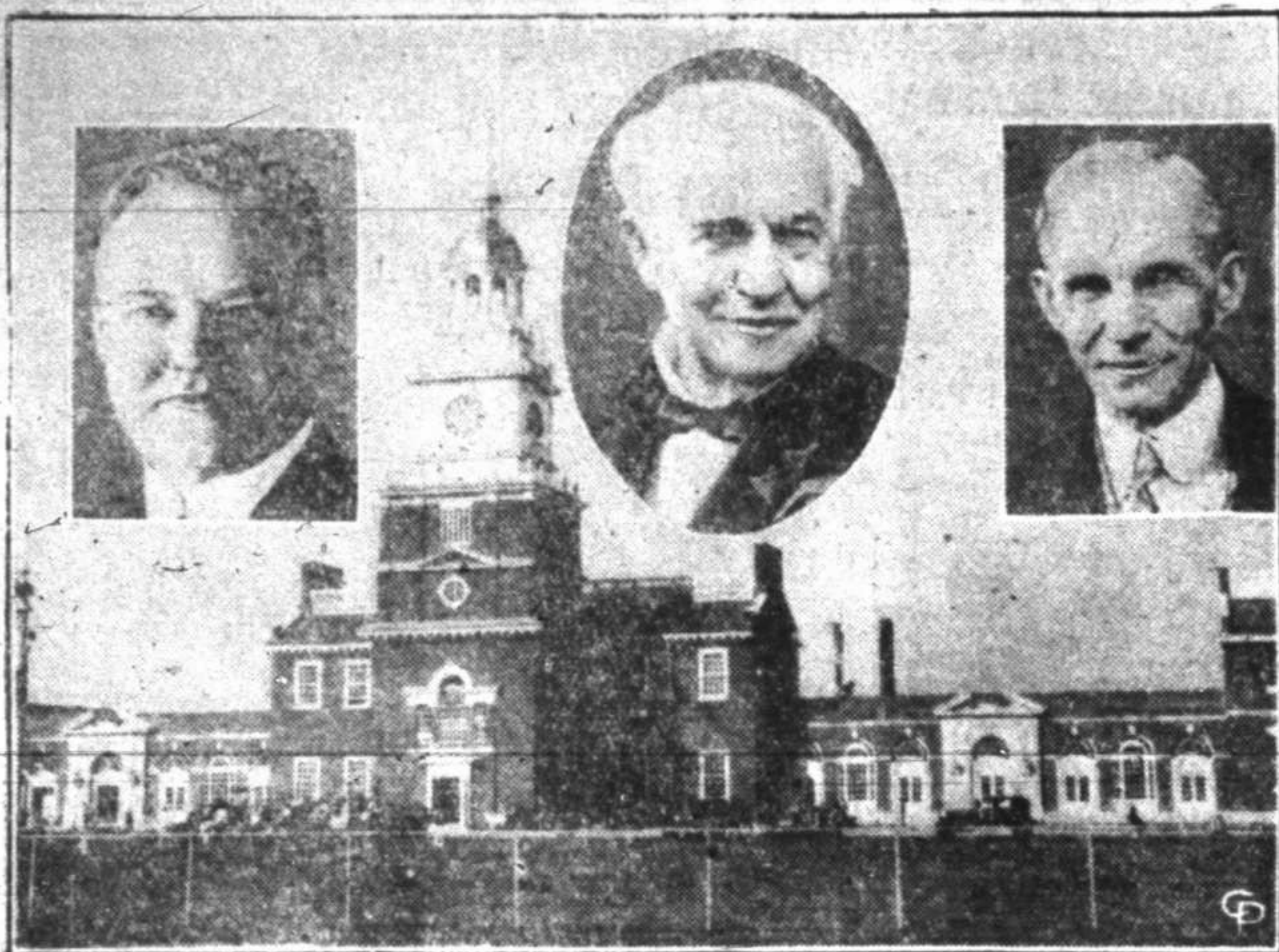

WHEAT PRICES SAG

CHICAGO, Nov. 4. (P)—Wheat prices sagged heavily today, under the weight of a bearish stock market and an unexpected increase in a visible wheat supply. Closing prices were 3-1/2 to 3-7/8 cents lower than Saturday. December futures, trading at 1-1/2 to 1-3/4, March 1-1/2 to 1-3/4 and May 1-1/2 to 1-3/4. The visible supply alone is 1,200,000 bushels. A drop had been expected. Export demand was weak.

Another Problem Raised in County's Latest Attempt For Road Bond Issue With Circulation of Two Petitions

Two Proposals Being Made At Slaton For County-wide Projects; Hearing Set For November 13.

Another problem has been raised in Lubbock county's endeavors for a road bond issue to make possible for state and federal highways through the county. With the hearing on petitions, calling for an election in road district number two, set for Wednesday, November 13, information gained in Lubbock yesterday was to the effect that two petitions are now being circulated in Slaton for a county-wide bond issue election.

The hearing on the 12th is to decide whether or not the commissioners will call the election for voting \$1,025,000 in bonds to pay highways 1, 9, 33 and the road area from Lubbock to the Rockwell county line.

The two petitions, which are

ported, are similar in some respects. One asks for a county-wide election to vote bonds to pave highways number 7 and 9, all the way through the county and the other includes these two and 33, from here east through Idaho.

Indications are that proponents of the election in road district number two, which is composed of all of Lubbock county except the southeast portion, in which Slaton is located, will oppose any attempt to call a county-wide election.

Action on the Slaton petitions will probably be taken by the commissioners during the hearing set for the 13th. In the meantime the Lubbock County Good Roads association, of which Chas. P. O'Neill is chairman, is making pretentious plans for a large campaign committee. This committee will attempt to secure a large number of signatures on the petition, each from one of the 10,000 voters in the county.

The two petitions, which are

representatives from each of the county's 20 or more school districts. This will make a committee of approximately 100.
