Married Women Should Announce Change Of Name

When an employed woman marries she should announce the event to the social security office as well as to her personal friends, Ertion F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office said today.

"If she continues to work without notifying the social security administration and has earnings reported in her new name, she may have difficulty getting credit for those earnings," Tate continued.

"This is true because if our central accounting office records show that a certain number is assigned to 'Ruth Doe,' wages reported under that number to 'Ruth Jones' cannot be credited. They are held in a suspense file until such time as the discrepancy can be cleared."

"Of course, the social security office is not interested in an engraved announcement; just get a Form 7003, 'Request for Name Change' from your social security office or local post office. Mail this completed form and your social security card, if you still have it, to the social security office. You will receive a new card showing your name and the old number. In this way, you can be sure your wages are posted promptly without our accounting office contacting your employer or you later."

Post card forms to be used in obtaining a statement of the earnings credited to your social security account are also available at any social security office. Write to your social security office, 411 Federal Building, Wichita Falls, Texas.

Patricia Powell and Doris Hall Serving As Student Teachers

Patricia Powell and Doris Hall of Burk Burnett are among 467 North Texas State University students serving as student teachers in Dallas-Fort Worth-Denton area schools this semester.

Included are 309 students preparing for secondary teaching positions and 158 for elementary. In the secondary group are 52 seniors who will receive an all-level certificate for both secondary and elementary teaching in music, art physical education, speech, speech therapy or library service.

Each student teaches under one of five training plans for the semester. Some are teaching in area schools half a day for 18 weeks. Others will train during the first, second or third nine-week period of the semester. A fifth plan calls for slightly more than half a day's training for 12 weeks.

Miss Powell, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Powell, 501 Park, Burk Burnett, is teaching business at Dallas' Woodrow Wilson High School.

News From The County Agent

Will it pay to fertilize your pastures and meadows? Each dollar spent for proper fertilization will return from \$2 to \$10, depending on the crop, moisture and management.

A big factor contributing to this increased return is the improved quality of the forage, Haws says. Through proper fertilization you can not only increase production but can increase the protein and mineral content of the forage as well.

A soil test can be used as a guide for amounts of fertilizer to use.

FROM BOXES TO A HOUSE



Butch Halverson and Jennifer Lee of Sheppard-Burk Burnett School are making adjustments on the miniature house.

The pupils of Mrs. Wolf's Fifth Grade class at Sheppard-Burk Elementary School made a house out of cardboard boxes. Our first step was to find out whose scale drawing was the best. We voted and Robert (Butch) Halverson's plans were the ones we used. He was our supervisor and also worked on landscaping.

Next we made a list of the rooms needed for the house. We fitted the boxes according to scale and cut in doors and windows where they were supposed to be. Also we found out the scales of the furniture it was 1-2 inch per foot.

Then Mrs. Wolf went to a wall paper, rugs and linoleum store to get some samples for us in our color scheme. We picked out what we wanted and put them in our little rooms.

We then put in our little furniture we had made, little scatter rugs if we had any, and curtains by stapling and pasting. Next we painted wallpaper, hung curtains and made covers, pillows and other things needed to add to our rooms.

Butch Halverson, our supervisor, and his partner, Robert Friley, made the halls, which run through the house. They then put the house together.

This house is as realistic as we could make it.

The rooms we have in our house are: the master bedroom, and bath, three bedrooms, the kitchen, den, living room, dining room, 2 baths, playroom, garage and storage, workshop, sewing and laundry room, nursery, swimming pool and back landscaping.

After that we put on the finishing touches, such as brushes and combs on the dresser and a swinging door on the garage. We put shutters on the outside and covered the outside of the rooms with white paper. Everything in the house except rugs, wallpaper and linoleum we made ourselves. If you ask us we think our room did a very good job on everything.

We did this as an arithmetic project as well as an art project.

The house is being given to the children's ward of the Sheppard AFB Hospital.

SHIPS AND MOTORS

If anyone thinks this country doesn't need ocean shipping, take a look at the automobile industry—an industry which is one of our major employers and which, directly or indirectly, contributes to payrolls and business activity everywhere in the country.

In a recent year close to \$579 million worth of U. S. passenger cars, car chassis and trucks were shipped abroad, along with about an equivalent value in parts.

At the other end of the line, merchant ships brought us imports essential to auto production. These include iron ore, manganese, aluminum, all manners of alloys, raw materials used in paints and lacquers, and so on.

What is true of motors is true to a varying degree of a list of other enterprises that would fill many pages—U. S. agriculture among them. We must have merchant shipping—and, to be more specific, merchant shipping flying the U. S. flag which is under our control and can be used to maximum advantage in any kind of world emergency.

QUICK FISH CLEAN

A couple of tips to simplify the chore of cleaning your catch: On trout or other slim fish, make a small cut back of the head in front of dorsal. Put a piece of paper in your hand, grab head and snap up, breaking backbone. Insides will pull out as you pull off head. Paper catches all. And a fillet is the fastest way of all. Just lay fish down and start a long, sharp knife slicing across side at tail. It's easy to feel the backbone with the blade as you slice forward. Cut up and out at gills. Each fish presents two clean, delicious, boneless steaks. Guts, head, and stripped backbone are thrown away.

FHA Head Cites Role Of Builders

FHA Commissioner Neal J. Hardy, in a salute to National Home Week, 1961, says that the nation's home builders and government housing programs are achieving the week's theme, "A Better Home—A Better Life."

"A variety of model homes are now on display throughout the country demonstrating the advances the building industry has made in designing, constructing and equipping homes," the commissioner points out.

"Home builders are constantly alert to changing trends in the housing market. Their role is a very important one in achieving... higher housing standards and better living conditions for all the people in America. Theirs is the responsibility to produce homes that characterize these qualities—homes fitted to the needs of different groups of people in different income brackets."

"The tools that government provides to facilitate home financing and community planning," Hardy says, "are designed to help builders carry out this responsibility."

"The passage of the new housing bill will permit FHA... to broaden its services—to serve sectors of the housing market not reached through its present programs," he adds.

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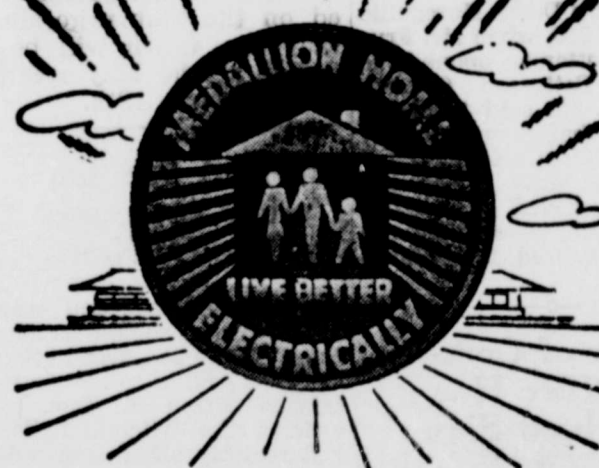

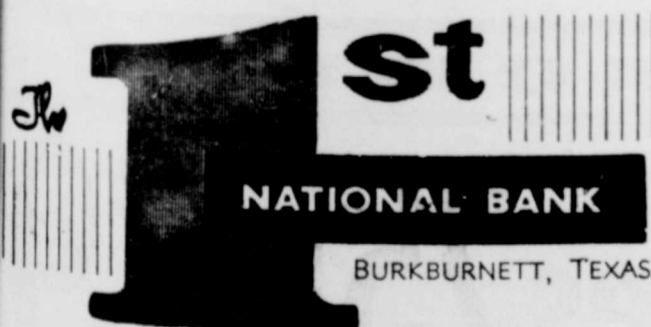

Rep. Obie Jones of Austin was named chairman. Two other Austin members, Reps. Wilson Foreman and Charles Sandhal, will serve on the interim study committee.

Cut the Property Tax?—For three years now a legislator-citizen study committee—the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy—has been mulling the possibility of state abandonment of the property tax. Texas Research League has helped with the study.

The committee should have recommendations ready for legislative action in the January session. Outcome may rest on voter pressure between now and the November general election.

Under the current system, schools get 42 per cent of the property tax dollars; cities take 29 per cent; counties, 18 per cent; and the state government and special districts only get five per cent each.

Texas Municipal League has urged the state to abandon the ad valorem tax and let the cities increase their property taxes.

Hale-Aikin committee asked the state to abandon the tax and let the schools levy it.

Tax experts often have declared that county assessors might place higher values on property, if they felt more of the ad valorem tax dollar would stay in the county.

College Funds Short—Presidents and business managers of Texas' 19 state-supported colleges and universities were stunned this week when Texas Commission on Higher Education reported they will get only 54 per cent of the funds they requested to meet increased enrollment in 1963.

Administrators had set their future needs at \$2,770,951. But

the Legislature only appropriated \$1,500,000 to supplement teaching salaries for enrollment increases. So the commission's staff prorated the fund among the 19 schools.

Dr. F. L. McDonald, president of Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, didn't take the news quietly. "This is one of the reasons why we are never able to raise salaries," he protested. He said the colleges are never allotted enough money, and "have to dig it up."

While the 19 presidents are trying to balance their budgets, Commission of Higher Education will be studying requests from three more colleges which want to join the state system: Odessa, San Antonio and Laredo junior colleges.

Recommendations will be made when the 58th Legislature convenes.

New Shell Game—Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler predicts that Texas never will yield control over any part of Padre Island to the federal government. He charged that some Texans have been "deceived" by talk of an 88-mile-long national park there.

He said the U. S. Senate did not approve a PARK, but a "National Seashore Area." "This status," says Sadler, "would keep Padre Island and Laguna Madre in an undeveloped state."

Sadler urged Attorney Gen-

eral Will Wilson to push recovery of Laguna Madre acreage from private owners before they convey their rights to the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Meanwhile U. S. Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen said the House National Parks Subcommittee will make an on-the-ground survey of the island from May 11 through May 13. They will return to Washington, D. C., to consider legislation on May 14.

Reading Public Grows—Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, State librarian, announced an increase of 13 public libraries in Texas and more than a quarter of a million books on library shelves throughout the state.

He said library service has improved to the point where there are now 106 branch libraries, in comparison to 97 in 1960. More than \$4,400,000 was spent for library construction last year, "possibly the biggest library-building year in more than three decades."

Dr. Winfrey gave much of the credit for library development to the Rural Library Service Division of the Texas State Library. It operates bookmobile services throughout the state; furnishes books for libraries in cities and communities of less than 10,000 population; and provides consultants without charge.

But many of the achievements

can be claimed by communities—like Taylor, Rockdale, Navasota and Alvin—where citizens get out and raise the money for library building funds.

Highest Highway Letting Set—State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the highway department's April bid letting will be the biggest this year. Low bids are expected to total some \$28,600,000.

The April 24-25 letting will involve 952 miles of Texas highways and cover contracts for 422 miles of U. S. and State highways; 148 miles of farm-to-market roads and 382 miles of seal-coat work.

"We are leading the nation in miles of interstate, primary and secondary highways," Greer stated, "and we want to keep that lead."

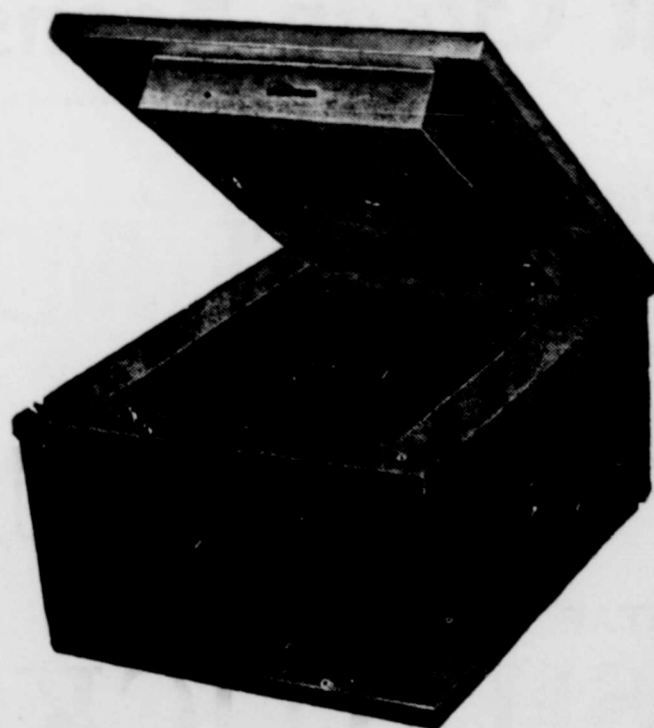

GARDENING BEAUTY AND PLEASURE MR. ROY MAGERS

Series of articles on "Gardening for Beauty and Pleasure" by Roy Magers, will be featured in the Burk Burnett Star. Mrs. Magers, whose address is on Shand, is chairman for the Falls Garden Club.

Magers is one of three judges of the flower show at Burk Burnett. She has been active in Burk Burnett and Falls in various club activities for several years. Her many club activities have devoted a considerable amount of time and effort to garden clubs. Her articles on gardening for beauty and pleasure are of an informative nature, backed by experience and knowledge of the work.

Get the most from your dollar, keep clearly in mind why you are fertilizing. Fertilizer has a definite effect on your soil, the way you grow, and the results you expect. Is your soil aerable or hard? Acid or alkali? Are you fertilizing the plant for its flowers, or roots? Do not quick action from the fertilizer for a short time, or action for a long time? These are the things to consider in selecting a fertilizer. Choice is not only a matter of effort and money, but usually be worse than no fertilizer at all.

Growth of all plants requires nitrogen, phosphoric acid, and plus minute amounts of minerals. Nitrogen is the most quickly used, therefore, the one must be replaced most often. Phosphoric acid encourages the development of fruit. Potash stimulates growth of roots. A "complete fertilizer" is one which contains all of these nutrients. Since different types of plants require different amounts of each food, no one fertilizer is "best" for all plants. The fertilizer that makes your lawn thrive may cause the tomato to go to foliage. The one that makes the wisteria bloom may cause the caladium to wear out producing unwanted leaves instead of fancy leaves. You are growing leafy plants—lettuce, ivy, or select a fertilizer high in nitrogen.

Under the trade name of each sack will be three numbers, for instance, 5-10-5. The first number indicates the percentage of nitrogen, the second of phosphoric acid, and the third of potash. Thus you can easily select a fertilizer that is high in whatever your plant particularly needs.

For a potato patch you may select the formula 5-8-7; for celery, 8-4-4; for roses, 4-12-4. A general all-round mixture is 5-10-5. The base of a chemical fertilizer is usually sand.

Chemical fertilizers must be applied strictly according to the directions on the sack. An overdose can burn a plant or even cause it to die. A teaspoon holds about one-half pound of fertilizer. Always water the fertilizer in thoroughly, and never let it touch the foliage or stems.

Chemical fertilizers use up the humus in the soil. They are short lasting and often leave a residue in the soil that causes an acid or alkali reaction. You should not use the same chemical mixture on the soil year after year. You must also add large quantities of humus to replace that which is lost.

Organic fertilizers are slow acting, long lasting, and build up the soil over a long period of time, because of their slow action, they may be used more freely with less danger of over-fertilizing.

Any fertilizer can be over-used, however. Every plant has a saturation point beyond which more fertilizer is bad. The plants seem to be affected by too much fertilizer as human beings are by too rich a diet. Some plants such as nasturtiums and certain herbs prefer a rather poor soil.

A good rule of thumb in choosing between a chemical and an organic fertilizer is this: If you are primarily interested in the crop of that year—annual flowers, tomatoes, etc.—use chemical. If you are interested in long term growth as in the case of shrubs, long-lasting bulbs, and perennials, then use organic.

Organic fertilizers high in nitrogen are manure. Cotton seed meal, and the by-products of slaughter houses—bone meal and rock phosphates.

Potash is found in the ash of hardwood trees and seaweed. The food value of organic fertilizers varies so that they cannot be labeled as precisely as the chemical ones. Organic mixtures are now being packaged, with the approximate percentage of each nutrient on the bag.

The oldest of all fertilizers—and still the best—is manure. In addition to its nitrogen and other food content, it is high in humus and contains bacteria which improves the soil.

With the advent of the motor age, manure has become hard to obtain and rather expensive for the city gardener. If obtained direct from the farm, it has the further disadvantage of often containing seeds which sprout in the flower bed.

Air dried manure in which seeds have been killed is available commercially. Sheep manure is the most commonly sold. Poultry manure is the highest in nitrogen.

Guano is the droppings, feathers, and decayed bodies of bats and marine birds. It is very high in nitrogen, but it is not available in Wichita Falls.

Bone meal is high in nitrogen and phosphoric acid and is very slow acting. As long as it is not placed in direct contact with the roots, it can hardly be overused. It is especially recommended for bulbs and for plants like peonies which should not be disturbed for many years.

Tankage and dried blood are so high in nitrogen that they must be used with care and are best used in compost.

Manure and bone meal have a slight alkali effect on the soil. Cotton seed meal has an acid reaction and is valuable for use around acid-loving plants such as azaleas or on soil that is inclined to be alkaline.

Lime and aluminum sulfate are found on the fertilizer shelf at stores, but properly speaking, these are not fertilizers. They do have a definite purpose in the garden, however.

The sole purpose of aluminum sulfate is to acidify the soil. It may be used on soils that are too alkaline, around acid loving plants and around hydrangeas to pink.

Lime has the opposite effect. It counteracts acidity. It has the further effect of improving heavy clay soils by making the particles of each stick together. Many gardeners use small amounts of lime on the compost pile to sweeten such acid reactors as sawdust and pine needles. It hastens decomposition, but at the same time releases valuable nitrogen to the air so must be used sparingly.

In addition to fertilizers that may be purchased, there are others that you must make yourself. A compost is what you make it. You may add leaves, grass clippings, clean garbage—potato peels, carrot tops, weeds—sawdust, corn cobs, and any other such materials available. Sprinkle with manure or tankage and add chemicals if you like. Besides the food value, compost add invaluable humus to the soil.

Humus is decaying organic matter. The texture of the soil and its water retaining qualities depend upon the humus. A humus soil has good drainage, is well aerated, and yet retains moisture. Humus is also obtained from decaying mulches.

It is important that you fertilize at the right time. In general, fertilizer should be applied as new plant growth begins.

Hot summer suns and cold winter frosts are alike hard on tender plant growth. You should therefore, fertilize early in the

spring after frosts are past so that the growth will harden before summer. If you fertilize in the fall, do it after the burning heat of summer is past but in time for new shoots to harden.

Bulbs should be fertilized with a slow acting fertilizer when they are set out. They may also be fertilized—but not with a high nitrogen fertilizer—after they have bloomed and when the foliage is ripening and next season's flowers forming.

Trees may be fertilized by punching holes at the edge of the leaf line and tamping in fertilizer.

Do not fertilize any plant immediately after transplanting, wait a few weeks until it is established.

Always water fertilizers into the soil. Plants can absorb only solutions. Dry fertilizer is not only unusable but is likely to make the flowers blue instead or burns the roots.

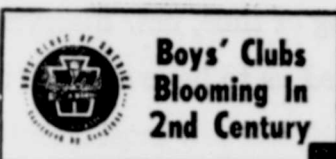
C. J. Lippard To Head Red Cross Drive May 7th

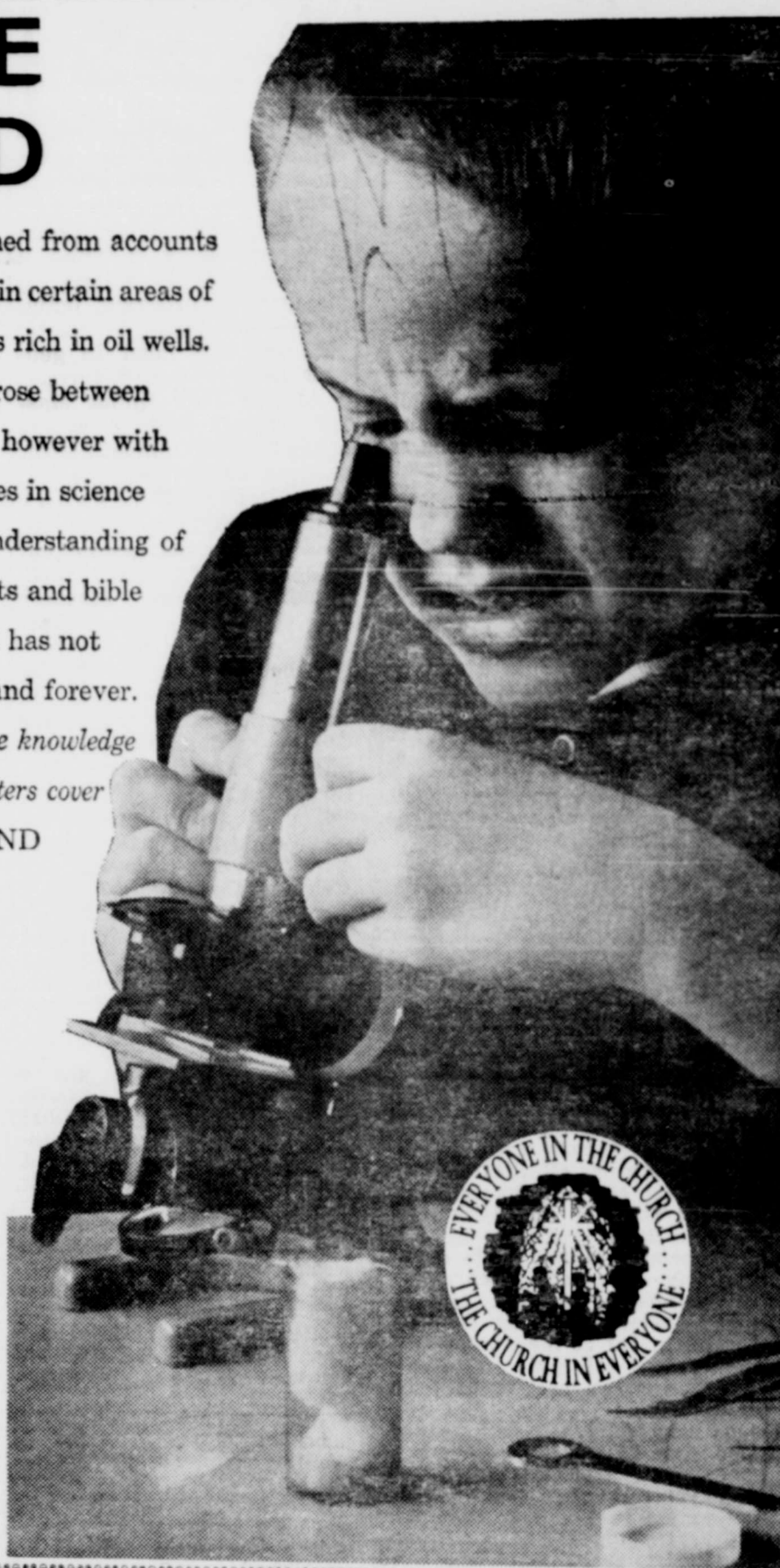
Not too long ago, a man determined from accounts in the bible that oil could be found in certain areas of bible lands . . . now this country is rich in oil wells.

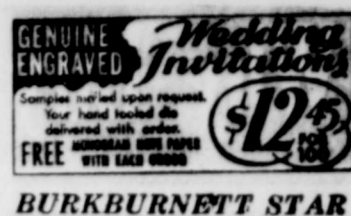

The Chicago-born star of Columbia Pictures was chosen as the favorite all-time actress in the world in a poll taken at the Brussels World Fair to demonstrate America's voting machine. The next runner-up to Kim had less than half as many votes.

A conscientious credit union member, Kim saves diligently and puts into practice a lesson she learned as a little girl at home. "My family was far from wealthy," Kim explained, "and I was always taught that everyone should save a certain amount of her pay."

Kim is one of 15 million credit union members who will be celebrating International Credit Union Day on October 19, the 115th anniversary of the credit union idea.

These members are saving their money together and making low-cost, provident loans to each other in some 27,000 different credit unions throughout the world. Each one is independent of the other, and each is entirely owned and operated by its members.

These nonprofit thrift organizations are formed by groups of people sharing a common bond, such as working for the same employer, belonging to the same church or fraternal organization, or living in the same closely knit community.

Family FINANCIAL PROTECTION

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. Quite often I read proposals that a life insurance policy be taken out for the purpose of paying estate and inheritance taxes, but isn't this a vicious circle, since the additional insurance would increase the tax?

A. Naturally, in adding a policy for the specific purpose of paying taxes, an effort would be made to write the policy large enough to cover the additional tax required because of the larger estate. But



the important reason for this "tax insurance" is to enable the estate or the family to meet the required tax payment without having to sacrifice any of the estate. This is particularly important when business interests, property or any investments subject to fluctuating value are involved. One cannot predetermine the timing of the need for this tax money and it might occur in the middle of a deflationary period when a material loss would have to be taken through forced sale of parts of the estate.

Q. If one can own only one small life insurance policy, what kind should it be?

A. Of course, the answer to this would depend on your circumstances and needs. If it can be afforded, this one, small policy should probably be a straight life plan, as that is a basic, lifetime protection and something is started on a guaranteed basis. If, however, the premium on such a policy is too large to fit into the budget, then at least immediate protection should probably be set up through a convertible term insurance policy, with the thought of converting it to a straight life policy when the term ends. By then, there should be some budget improvement, to enable you to carry the larger premium. Depending on how you measure "small," you might compromise between the two, getting a combination Family Income policy, part straight life and part term. But this is the kind of decision on which you should have on-the-spot advice from your life insurance agent. He can help you measure your most essential needs and fit the best policy into your budget.

Temporary Pastures Are Good

If you plan to plant Coastal Bermuda grass this spring, here is a word from B. T. Haws, county agent, that may help you get a good stand. He says there are three major reasons for failures to get stands. These are: 1. Planting in plots that have stands of other grasses; 2. Using dried out sprigs and 3. Grazing before grass is established.

Plant sprigs on a clean, moist seed bed that is free of other growing grasses.

Use fresh sprigs, with at least 3 nodes or joints. Haws suggests planting sprigs the same day they are dug, or better still, the same half day.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. What is a "joint and survivor" benefit? If I were to apply this to my policy, what would it do and would it cost me anything?

A. The phrase "joint and survivor" is usually applied to annuities or retirement income plans and refers to a provision to make the income payable to either or both of two people, as long as either lives. It has great value for retired couples, as a straight annuity on the husband would give him an income until he dies, but would leave the widow with nothing—and in most cases, she will outlive him. The joint and survivor annuity gives the income continuously until both have died.



This feature can be written into the retirement use of cash values of regular life insurance policies, as well as in the retirement income policies and annuities. It naturally costs something, as the greater amount of money could not be paid out, without a greater principal sum. The difference in cost is not fixed, but depends on the ages of the two parties included. In the case of the use of cash values, the cost difference is usually reflected in differing size of income rather than different premium rates.

Pension plans often provide that the retiree can choose a joint and survivor retirement income for a smaller monthly income, instead of the established pension.

Q. The other day, I read a magazine piece referring to a typical family's wealth and listing the items that made up its wealth, including life insurance. This might apply for a beneficiary, but how could it apply for a policyholder?

A. Life insurance is a basic part of every family's "wealth" on a current basis, provided cash-value policies are included in what they own. All life insurance except term insurance is cash value insurance, however, and thus the greater part of all life insurance is included in any tabulation of family wealth. For instance, if you have had a \$15,000 straight life policy for a great many years, you may well have as much as \$5,000 or even more of cash values in that policy, which can be drawn on by you in case of emergency, just as effectively and possibly more quickly than from many of your other resources.

To get a picture of your present total net worth, this cash value of your life insurance should be included.

Fallout—What it means to you

Planning

Last week we defined the "alert" level of radiation. When this is reached it becomes important to determine the amount of different radioactive substances present in the fallout area. This is necessary because different fallout materials are distributed in the body differently and are retained in the body for different periods. The retention time will depend upon the "half-life" of the fallout components. "Half-life" is the time required for a radioactive substance to lose one half of its radiation strength. From a health standpoint the most important fallout elements are:

Iodine¹³¹: half-life 8 days
Strontium⁹⁰: half-life 58 days
Cesium¹³⁷: half-life 27 years

Having determined the composition of fallout material, the next step is to determine the health hazards by use of guide-lines set up by the Federal Radiation Council. These guide-lines express the potential hazards of the radiation against the reasons for accepting the hazards. The answers are expressed in three different ranges, which help scientists determine what action is called for. As our readers are by now aware, the fallout problem is very complex and involves top-level planning on the part of many people to assure maximum protection.

Antibiotic Deodorant

Q. The deodorant I use contains neomycin. (Why does it use a deodorant with the new old ingredients?) Are the products safe?

A. Thoughtful physicians generally opposed to the use of drugs of any sort in cosmetic preparations continuously might be questioned. For one thing, the use of such creams may lead to skin "hypersensitivity." Second, the bacterial flora of the skin, delicately balanced, to keep balance by prolonged use of antibiotic preparation encourages overgrowth of organisms resistant to the antibiotics, with possible development of infection.

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Wall Units Newest Idea In Cooling

Families who visit model homes during this year's National Home Week will find that more and more builders are installing through-the-wall room air conditioners.

This type of air conditioner is similar to a window unit but is installed permanently in a special mount built into the wall of a house.

In addition to dehumidifying, cooling, circulating and filtering the air, through-the-wall room air conditioners offer other advantages:

1. Wide choice of location. Although one may be installed below a window, practically any spot in the wall is satisfactory. Placing the unit high often is preferred because this permits a more efficient distribution of air.
2. Quality units are designed to fit flush, or nearly flush, with inside walls. They look like what they are—permanent elements of a room.
3. They permit selective fingertip temperature control in individual rooms because each unit is equipped with its own controls.
4. Units can be removed for servicing without cutting off cooling in the rest of the house. A recent trend among development builders, as well as families who build their own homes, is the installation of metal sleeves or concrete forms during construction of the house. This permits installation of individual room air conditioners one or two at a time over a period of years until the entire house is air conditioned.

Many owners of small homes report that one or two through-the-wall units comfortably cool their entire house even in the hottest weather.

If you're stalking chucks, crows, or foxes where the slightest foreign noise means a lost opportunity, tape loose shells with scotch or masking tape. Tear off as needed.

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
