## Brock, Schlee Set New Transcontinental Record Morrow Wins N.J. Senate Nomination On Wet Plank

### Ambassador Is Leading Every Box in State

Prohibition Is Dealt Severe Blow as Franklin Fort, Crusader for Dry Law, Downed Under Heavy Vote

### Victory Conceded

Republican Primary Attracts International Interest with Heavy Voting Over State; Half Districts Reported

NEWARK, N. J., June 17.—With half the district reported tonight, Dwight W. Morrow led his opponents for the republican nomination for United States senator in every county in New Jersey.

Returns from 1,478 of 3,304 districts in the state. Fort 38,218; Frelinghuysen, 15,390; Morrow 128,638.

Nomination Conceded  
NEWARK, N. J., June 17.—Representative Franklin W. Fort, who crusaded in the cause of prohibition, in the campaign which came to a close in today's primaries, tonight conceded the nomination of Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow as the republican candidate for the United States senate.

Ambassador Morrow was assured of the short term for United States senator on the face of early returns, leading his only opponent, John A. Kelly, by 27,500, to 1,500 on returns from 343 districts of 3,304 in the state.

Interest International  
NEWARK, N. J., June 17.—New Jersey nominated party candidates for United States senator, representatives in congress, and legislative and local offices today in a primary which has attracted national and even international interest.

The polls were open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. Morrow was the chief participants in the last hour run.

### No Verdict in Herman Trial

Jury in Federal Court Will Resume Deliberation This Morning in Liquor Case of Father and Son Here

When three hours and 45 minutes of deliberation had failed to bring an agreement, Judge Jas. C. Wilson released the jury in Lubbock division of federal court trying the case of E. W. Herman and his son, Vernon Herman. The two are charged with two law violations.

Trial of the two men was started last Monday and continued Tuesday afternoon. Deliberations by the jury will be taken up again this morning at 9 o'clock.

The two were arrested several weeks ago by state rangers, state and Lubbock county officers when a raid was made on a farm in Lubbock county which resulted in confiscation of more than 300 gallons of whiskey.

The case of Sam Taylor and Will Frazier, being tried yesterday in that district court before Judge James L. Frazier, resulted in a hung jury. Both were charged with violation of the prohibition law.

### Two Tech College Students Make Good Record In Yale Engineering School

JEROME SANDERS, of Haskell, and Paul Lettice, of Amarillo, both graduates of the Texas Tech engineering school in 1928, were the only two students of a class of six in the first year chemical engineering graduate course at Yale university to survive the examination, according to an announcement received here Tuesday.

"We feel very proud of these two Texas Tech representatives," said Dr. W. T. Read, head of the chemistry department, last night. "Both of them were very bright students but their success also shows the light of recognition on Tech broken to make such success they must have had a good foundation."

### Clara Bow Pays \$30,000 Heart Balm To Wife Of 'Misunderstood Husband'

DALLAS, June 17.—The Dallas Times Herald today prints a news story stating that Clara Bow, the "IT" girl of the movies, is in Dallas to straighten things out with a young married man of Dallas to whose wife Miss Bow paid \$30,000 in settlement of a \$150,000 alienation of affections suit.

"I met him out on the coast," the Times Herald quotes Miss Bow as saying. "He was good looking, and smart, and had nice ways about him and I fell for him pretty hard. He told me he had just been married and that he and his wife were always squabbling and didn't understand each other. I never had a date with a married man before in my life and I wouldn't have had dates with this one if he had had any kids. But of course he didn't."

Sued For \$150,000

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### R. M. Allen Dies At Home; Note Found Giving Cause

SLATON, June 17.—R. M. Allen, 48, well known farmer of Lubbock county, living one mile west of Slaton, died at his home here Tuesday afternoon as a result of a self-inflicted shotgun wound in his head. A verdict of suicide was rendered at a coroner's inquest.

A note was found which indicated that Allen had worried over his apparent ill health. He is survived by his wife.

No funeral arrangements had been made late today.

Dallas Pair Arrested Here by Lubbock Officers and Large Quantity of Bonded Liquor Confiscated

Two Dallas men were arrested in Lubbock last night at 11 o'clock and lodged in the county jail after officers had seized their car which contained a quantity of bonded liquor. Charges probably will be filed this morning.

Included in the confiscated lot were 23 quarts of Three Star Hennessy cognac and 18 quarts of London gin, all neatly packed in a large suitcase and boxes. A Ford coupe, belonging to the two men, also was seized.

### Hawley-Smoot Tariff Put in Effect Today

President Hoover Signs Bill Tuesday; New Rate Goes in Effect at Midnight Last Night After Year of Work

WASHINGTON, June 17.—President Hoover, in a simple ceremony at the White House, signed the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill today and turned over to the treasury the job of putting into effect overnight a law which has required congress nearly a year and a half to write.

Theoretically the new law was to take effect at midnight, but actually by the more than 1,000 new duties and administrative features will not become operative until the customs houses open at 8 a. m. tomorrow Eastern Standard Time.

New Rates Effective  
Orders have gone out from the treasury that collectors were to close their offices today at the usual hour of 4:30 p. m. Eastern Standard Time, so that all ships whose cargo declarations have not been filed up to that hour will pay the new rates at tomorrow's opening.

Taking half a dozen ordinary pens handed to him by Lawrence Reheby, one of his secretaries, Mr. Hoover affixed his signature to the huge declaration and the bill was signed at 12:30 p. m. At least that was the time given him by Clayton Moore of the house ways and means committee, whose watch happened to be three minutes fast.

"Somebody give me the time," said the President as he peered up his sixth pen.

Moore announced it was 12:38, but did not discover the inaccuracy of his wrist watch until it was too late.

### Believe Eight Dead in Lake

Body of Victim Found After Prominent Toledoan Missing Since Saturday When Speed Boat Overturns

(By Associated Press)

TOLEDO, O., June 17.—The belief that eight prominent Toledoans who have been missing since Saturday when they started for Pelee Island in a speed boat lost their lives in Lake Erie was accepted as relative and true here tonight following the recovery of the body of John Lipstick, 25, mechanic on the boat.

Lipstick's body, encased in a life preserver, was found this afternoon by the crew of the coast guard cutter 173, two miles southeast of West Star Island, a few miles from where the speedboat was found Saturday night, minus the passengers.

REFUSE EXAMINATIONS

Osteopathic Grads Barred by State Medical Board

AUSTIN, June 17.—The state board of medical examiners today refused to grant four graduates of an osteopathic college the right to take the examination to practice in Texas. They were barred on the ground they had not had two years of pre-medical work.

Immediately after the action of the board, the four announced they had employed counsel and would make a test case of the right of this board to bar applicants on this ground in the event a license was refused them tomorrow. They indicated mandamus proceedings would be brought against the board.

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### Fliers Begin Return Flight Across Nation

Hope to Reach Florida Coast Thirty Hours After Hopoff Westward Early Tuesday to San Diego, California

### Average 165 Miles

Airmen Expect to Return by Way of West Texas; Storms Predicted Over Arizona, New Mexico and Texas

(By Associated Press)

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 17.—Having set a new record for the westbound crossing from Jacksonville, Fla., to San Diego, Aviators Edward P. Schlee and William A. Brock took the air tonight at 5:11 o'clock (PST) on the return trip, hoping to reach the Florida coast within 30 hours of their hopoff westward at 5:04 a. m.

Brock and Schlee ate a frugal luncheon, sitting in an automobile near the runway, while mechanics put 353 gallons of fuel into their plane. There were 197 gallons of gasoline in the machine when it landed here.

Expect Favorable Winds  
Brock estimated it would take about 50 gallons less for the flight to Jacksonville than coming west, because he expected favorable winds much of the way.

The take-off for the run east was made perfectly, the big plane slipping into the air without any trouble once the engine was warmed up.

Brock was at the controls, with Schlee behind him in a separate compartment where he worked the radio with which the plane was equipped to get weather reports and to give bulletins on the progress of the flight. Schlee said that the T. A. T-Maddux lines would keep the fliers informed as to weather

### Fergusons to Talk in City

"Ma" and Jim Scheduled for Campaign Here Next Friday In Interest of Her Candidacy For Governor

Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas gubernatorial candidate, accompanied by her well known campaigner husband, Jas. E. Ferguson, will speak in Lubbock Friday, June 27, according to an announcement received in this city late yesterday.

Speaking place for the two famous political characters has not been announced, but probably will be held out of doors.

Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson are at this time touring the state in the interest of her candidacy for governor and on several occasions "Jim" has hurled responsive bombshells into the ranks of supporters of other candidates from the platform.

With candidates now turning their eyes toward the South Plains, political interest is expected to take a rise within the next few weeks.

### The Weather

WASHINGTON, June 17.—In a statement telegraphed from Louisville, Ky., Bishop James Cannon, Jr., today termed Representative Tinkham, republican, Massachusetts, a "blustering coward" for attacking him on the floor of the house under immunity from prosecution for libel.

"When Congressman Tinkham shall give to the press over his personal signature the statements reported by the press as made by him today on the floor of the house of representatives, where he is immune from prosecution for false libelous statements," the Cannon statement read, "he may command the respect of honorable men, but making such attacks on the floor of the house where he knows his immunity from prosecution, brands him as a blustering cowardly congressman appealing especially to his yet Roman Catholic voters to retain him in office." ## Church Board Asks Passage Of Measures

Law Enforcement Legislation Requested by Hoover Asked By Methodist Church Board Of Temperance Tuesday

WASHINGTON, June 17. (AP)—The board of the Southern Methodist Church of Temperance today for enactment at this session of law enforcement legislation requested by President Hoover, and a while later was informed that tomorrow it would be presented with a report concerning Bishop James Cannon, Jr., chairman of that board.

Senator Sheppard, a dry democrat from Texas, introduced the plea—which was made public previously by Cannon.

Chairman Caraway, of the lobby committee, revealed the committee would report tomorrow on the extensive examination it made of the churchman.

No Stand Expected  
The committee is not expected to take any stand in its report, which probably will consist of a transcript of portions of Cannon's testimony.

The transcript shows the questions Cannon refused to answer concerning his 1928 Anti-Smith activities.

Sheppard presented the petition from the church board without comment.

Senator Caraway explained to the senate he had intended to present the report today but he was withholding it because of a previous agreement which gave other business priority throughout today's session.

Cannon Attacked  
Later in the house, Representative Tinkham, a Massachusetts wet, made his expected attack on Cannon, asserting "in the eyes of all honest men" the churchman "will stand convicted" of appropriating to his own use \$48,500 that E. C. Jameson, New York capitalist gave him for anti-Smith work.

Tinkham, when a witness before the lobby committee, charged Cannon had violated the corrupt practices act by failing to report how he spent the money. The Bishop denied this.

Plays Action  
The Massachusetts representative said if Cannon's transactions "would stand the light of day" he would have testified before the lobby committee without hesitancy. He said the Bishop owed an explanation to his church and added he would not have been exonerated at a recent church conference if it had had the facts presented to the lobby committee during Cannon's examination.

Tinkham, said Cannon, to divert suspicion aroused by his refusal to answer lobby committee questions had appealed to sectarian prejudice. He continued the Bishop charged Roman Catholics with conspiring against him.

"They were made by me, an Episcopalian," Tinkham said.

Reviewing the circumstances surrounding contributions by Jameson to Cannon during the 1928 campaign, Tinkham reiterated charges of lobbying evasion and law violation in connection with the funds.

## White Chosen GOP Nominee

Congressman Defeats Former Governor in Republican Primary for United States Senator from Maine

PORTLAND, Me., June 17. (AP)—Congressman Wallace H. White, Jr., representative in the national house for 12 years, today was the republican nominee for United States senator to succeed Arthur H. Gould.

With all but 70 of the state's 632 precincts reported the vote was: White, 42,197; Former Governor Ralph O. Brewster, 25,877. White took the lead early in yesterday's primary election and increased it through the night. A total of 6,264 votes was received by Dugald B. Dewar, who ran on a wet platform.

For the second time in two years, White was defeated by 33,000 votes in a primary in which 728,000 republicans went to the polls.

Nomination on the republican ticket is tantamount to election in Maine and Congressman White undoubtedly will succeed Senator Gould of Presque Isle, who is retiring.

In the only wider statewide contest, Governor William Tudor Gardner, seeking re-nomination, swamped Mayor John Wilson of Bangor, who had attacked the chief executive as a "tool of the interests."

Gardner polled 52,000 votes to Wilson's 34,721.

### Wins Suit On Beauty

Denver, June 17. (AP)—A bald spot on a woman's head is worth \$150 in damages according to a jury in Judge Henry Bray's court. The jury awarded that sum to Mrs. Audra Arnold, who had filed suit for \$5,000 damages against Lillian Kretschmar, beauty parlor operator. Mrs. Arnold claimed a permanent wave machine burned the top of her head, causing the spot.

## Military Affairs Proving Difficult

According to Sgt. W. C. Hawkins, local U. S. army recruiting agent, Uncle Sam is having a time with his military affairs. Many of the famous fighting regiments of the first division are being disbanded, and their strength transferred to different aviation units in Texas. Local recruiting is so restricted that only those with good recommendations from local business men may enlist.

Sergeant Hawkins has been on duty here since August 1929 and has sent 30 Lubbock boys to military camps in the 8th Corps area during that time. To date this month, three men have enlisted. They are Sydney A. Andrews of Lubbock who enters Field Artillery at Fort Bliss; Litteral Hedding, Tech student who is in the aviation school at Kelly field, San Antonio, and Conrad H. Holland, former teller of Abernathy, in the Quarter Master Corps, Fort Sam Houston.

At the present time there are seven vacancies open for enlistment in this Corps area.

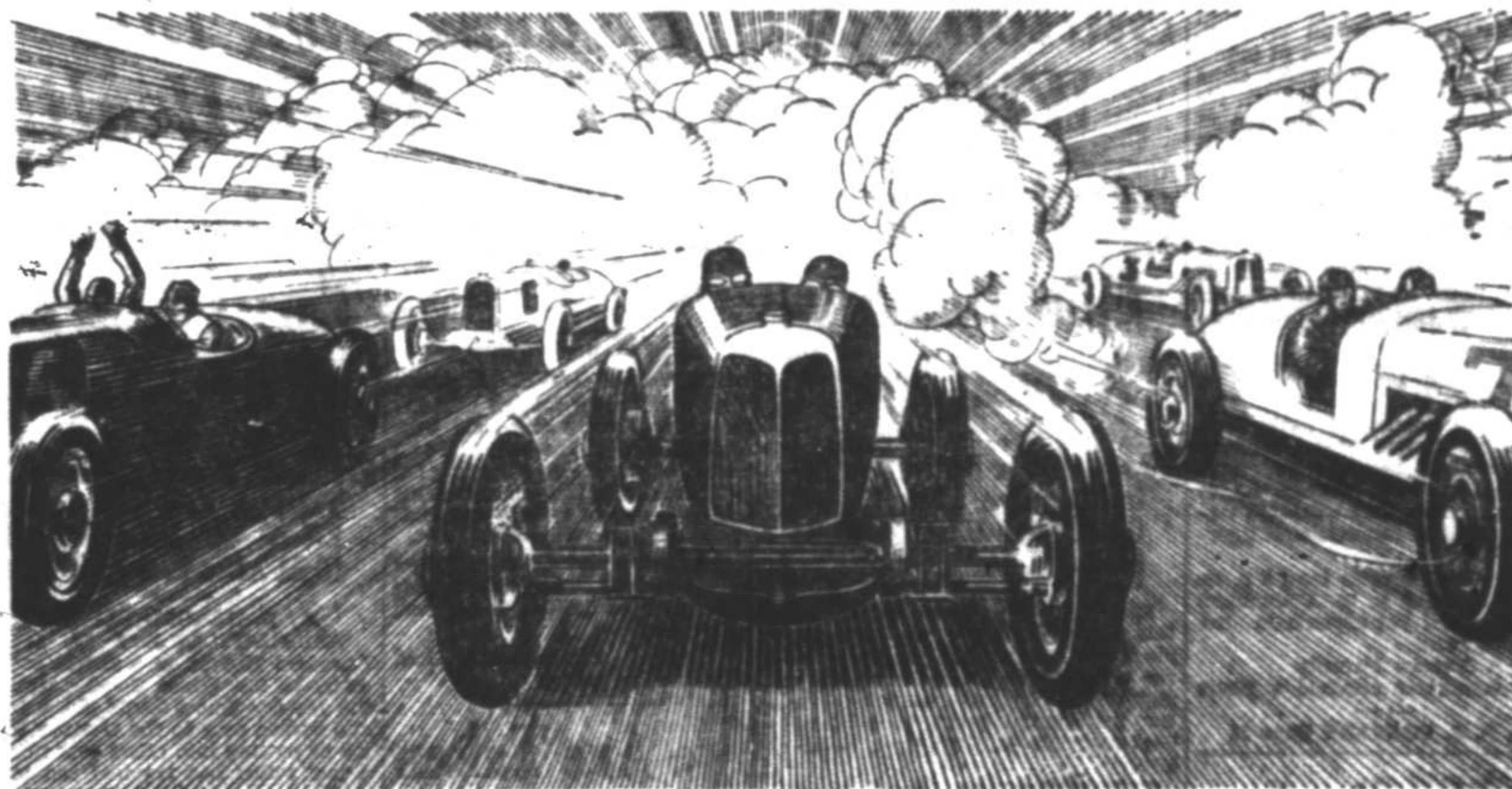

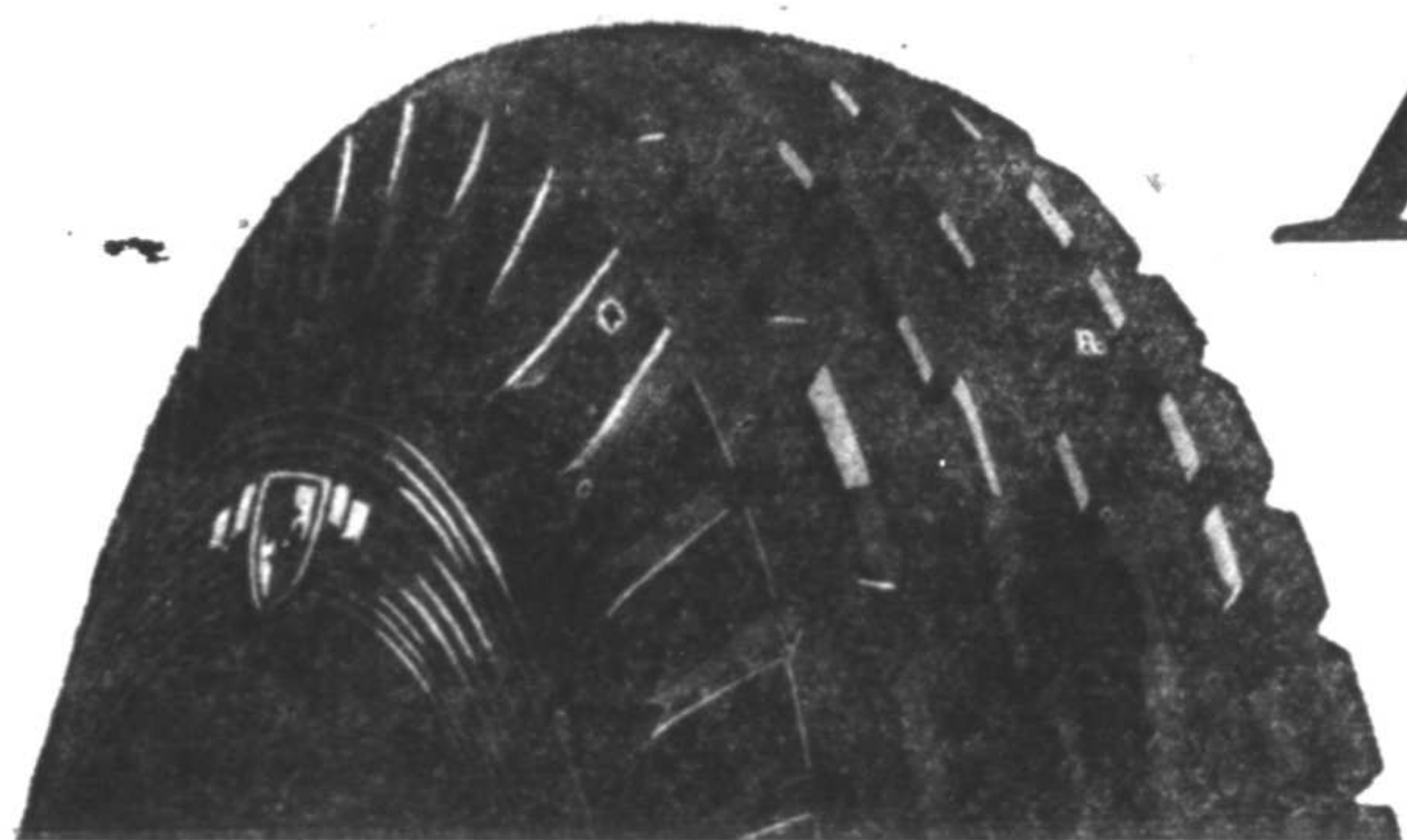

## Giant British Golfer Leads Brilliant Field in Annual Qualifying Rounds of Event

Bobby Jones and Seven Other American Contenders Trail Behind; 112 Will Tee Off for Real Championship Grind; Cotton Second

HOYLAKE, Eng., June 17. (AP)—Archie Compston, giant golfer from the English midlands, with medal rounds of 70-71-141, today led the qualifying round for the British Open, with Bobby Jones and seven other Americans trailing him.

All the serious contenders from the United States, Leo Diegel, Horton and MacDonald Smith, professionals, and Jones, George Von Elm, Don Moir, and F. C. Stevens, Jr., the amateurs, were tonight in the second round of 112 who completed the 100 lowest scores and ties for the hundredth place.

Others of the 200 odd who started yesterday are free to go home with their slabs while the rest fight the real championship battle—72 holes medal play—during the coming three days.

Compston not only led the field, but Henry Cotton, young British pro, was second with 143, and W. T. Twiss, former Kent professional champion and yesterday's leader, stood third at 144.

Diegel tied with Percy Alliss, British pro resident in Berlin, at 145 to lead the American group, while George Von Elm tied with Cyril Tolley with 147 to lead the amateurs.

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## On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

CARAWAY'S ABSENCE FROM CAPITAL DURING QUESTIONING OF BISHOP TAKES STING FROM LOBBY PROBE

WASHINGTON, June 17—It was Senator Thaddeus H. Caraway's Committee, remember.

Caraway of Arkansas.

The vitriolic, carboic, sulphuric Senator Caraway.

The ablest, fiercest heckler in Congress.

The prosecutor who throws witnesses into hysterics, under the torture of cross-examinations. Remoteless, merciless, implacable.

It was Senator Caraway's lobby investigating committee that Bishop James Carroll, D., scoffed at, snorted at, refused to testify before, and finally got up and walked out on, right in the middle of a question Senator John J. Blaine of Wisconsin was trying to ask him.

UP TO THAT POINT Senator Caraway's lobby investigation (believed me) had been a hum-dinger of an investigation.

For a long time Caraway had been howling about the pest of lobbyists in Washington—tariff lobbyists, power lobbyists, all sorts of lobbyists. He wanted a committee to investigate their activities. At last the senate gave him one—made him chairman and told him to go to it.

Turned back thus, to do his worst Thaddeus did it good and plenty.

HIS FAVORITE stunt was to seize some unlucky (but well-known) night's correspondence files and prove him guilty, out of the victim's own letters, of everything from petty larceny up to conspiracy to loot the U. S. treasury.

It is amazing what evil intent an accomplished cross-examiner can read into a letter whose author had no idea of its criminality when he dictated it to his stenographer.

To be sure, the victim complained that this correspondence-seizing habit violated the fourth U. S. constitutional amendment. At which Caraway laughed raucously; a senate committee is not answerable to much of anyone and can afford to disregard a lot of formalities that courts treat very respectfully—a difference that astrophysics plenty of folk, just having their first experience with a senate investigation.

OLD JOE GRUNDY, Senator Hiram Bingham, Chairman, Claudius Huston and John J. Raskob of the C. O. P. and Democratic national committee, Capt. W. H. Clayton and Dr. F. Scott McBride of the Anti-Saloon league!—Caraway panned them all impartially—and scores of other notabilities.

Poor Senator Bingham!—the committee caught him fool and put him in so bad that the senate had to adopt resolutions, censuring him.

And Claudius Huston!—Caraway snarled up Claudius in Muscle Shoals and Wall Street ramifications until half of this year's Republican congressional candidates are yawning for his resignation as their party chairman—and Claudius is President Hoover's own personal selection for the post!

Does all this go to show that it was a rip-snorter of an investigation?

IN DUE COURSE, it came Bishop Carroll's turn. And, as we have seen, Bishop Carroll defied the committee—slapped its chops, in fact, and then robbed it in and calmly took his departure leaving Senator Blaine with his mouth open, still attempting to frame a question.

Offhand, one would say that this would have been the signal for Senator Caraway to do something awful.

But the truth is, Senator Caraway was not present.

He was unavoidably out of town—about 100 miles away—in Arkansas. He had to make a speech at a college commencement exercises. Or was it a high school?

SENATOR ROBINSON of Indiana was absent also, busy, he notified the committee.

So was Senator Borah.

That left only Senator Blaine and Walsh of Montana, and the two of them were not a quorum—a quorum being necessary to adopt measures to make a bulky witness answer a senate committee's question or take the consequences.

Senators Robinson and Borah never were red-hot lobby investigators.

But Senator Caraway? It was unfortunate—but he was in Arkansas, where there is considerable dry sentiment, by the way.

Your Health

PRAISE 'MECHANICAL ICEBOX' BUT ASK MORE SAFETY RESEARCH

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of two articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein, America's outstanding health authority on mechanical refrigerators.

In its survey of the present studies of mechanical refrigeration, the committee on toxic gases, appointed by the American Medical Association to study the hazards pointed out that household refrigeration is a factor for good in the promotion of public health and of economic living, and that for this reason no attitude is warranted that will tend to hamper the manufacture and use of safe refrigerators.

It is, however, much more necessary to safeguard refrigerator installations in homes, hospitals and institutions for children than in industrial conditions that involve only adults. The three main refrigerating substances used, ammonia, sulphur dioxide and methyl chloride, are all dangerous under certain conditions, particularly when the amounts with which human beings may come in contact are large enough to cause irritation or poisoning.

The installation of the multiple units is especially dangerous because a very large amount of the entire charge of refrigerant may get loose in some area or one apartment. Some mechanical check must be developed that will limit the amount of refrigerant that may get loose in any one apartment to an amount below that definitely poisonous.

The addition of substances with unpleasant or noxious odors to refrigerants that otherwise would not be noticed is not considered a sufficient safeguard for the simple reason that it will not provide adequate protection for infants, children, invalids, or people who are mentally incompetent.

As a result of the excitement created by deaths from this cause last year, numerous cities have endeavored to develop health laws controlling the situation, and these differ in various states.

The committee feels that some attempt should be made to coordinate the laws so as to make it possible for the manufacturers with nationwide distribution of material to make one type of device to meet laws everywhere. The committee urges particularly that manufacturers conduct research with various substances used in daily life before placing them on the market, rather than attempt to control the hazards after deaths have occurred.

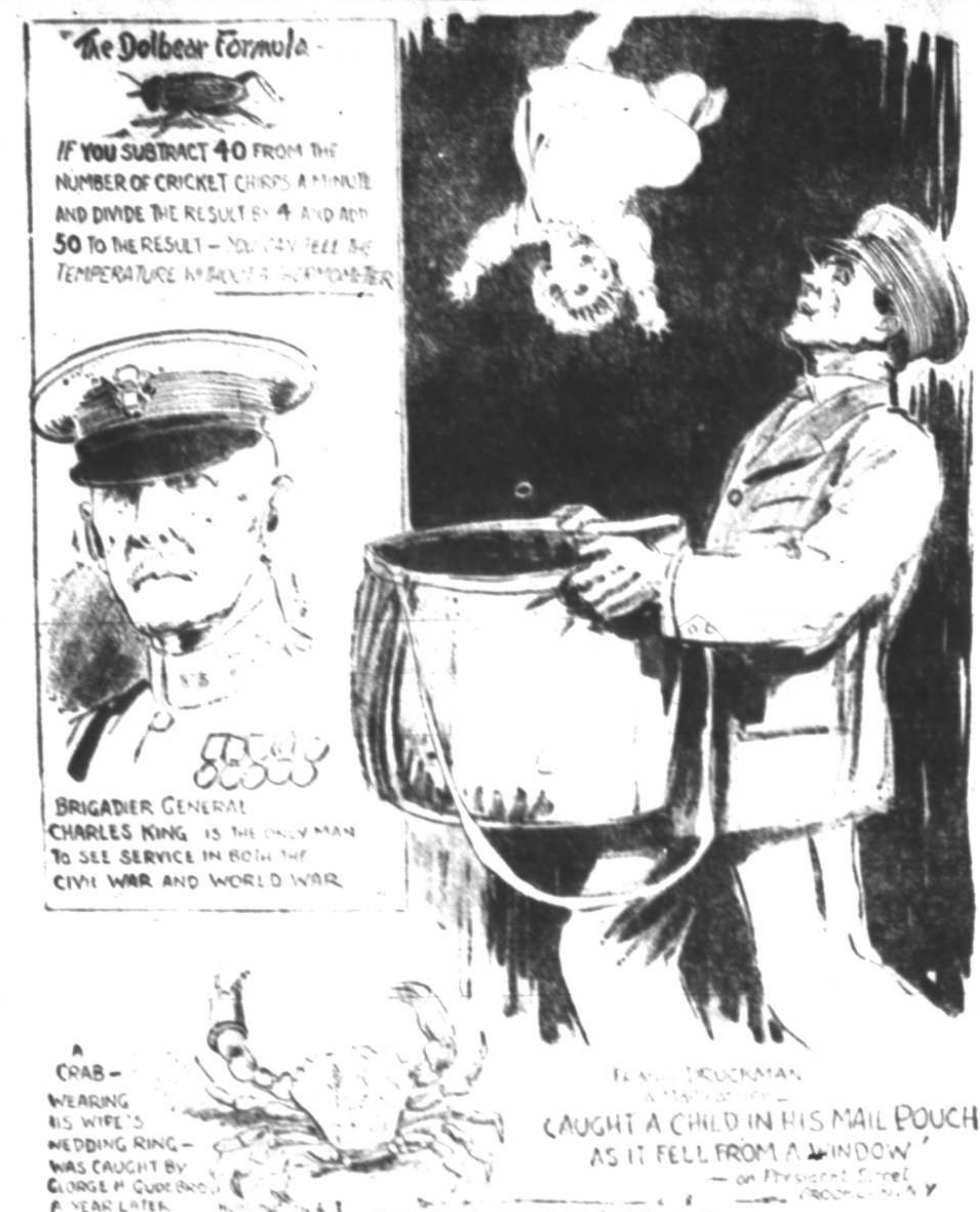

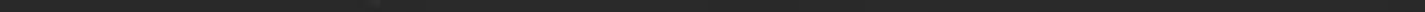

## Unemployment Is Considered

**Plea for Cooperation Between  
Government and Local  
Authorities Made by Prime  
Minister MacDonald**

LONDON, June 17. (AP)—Plea for close cooperation between the government and local authorities to speed plans for reducing unemployment was made by Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald today in opening an important conference of governmental and local officials at the Guild hall.

Addressing a representative gathering from all parts of the country, he urged his hearers to face the present unemployment figures in no state of panic or "fussy energy" out of which only evil could come.

**Cooperation Asked**  
"What I and my colleagues of the government ask you to do is to conspire together—the government and local authorities—first of all to expedite schemes and then to renew our efforts for what I might call national development. We are not really so efficient as we might be."

"I want to enlist active, vigorous social minds of representative men and women like you with us, putting our energies into a common pool, and from it extract schemes that will not only benefit the unemployed but will be an added capital asset to the whole efficiency of the country."

Mr. MacDonald alluded to Great Britain as not alone in her unemployment difficulties and spoke of world conditions as similar to those of 100 years ago.

"A certain event," he said, "which took place yesterday in New York"—which was accepted as an allusion to the Wall street slump—was bound to have its repercussions here.

### Confirm Legge To Farm Board Post

WASHINGTON, June 17. (AP)—The senate today confirmed the nomination of Alexander Legge for re-appointment as chairman of the farm board.

Legge was approved by the senate without a record vote and after brief discussion.

The senate also confirmed the nomination of Charles C. Teague, of California, for re-appointment on the farm board representing the fruit and vegetable industry.

Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, voiced opposition to Legge, declaring "I regard him as wholly unfit for his post." With a chorus of ayes the senate then approved the farm board chairman. McKellar alone voiced a "no" on the viva voce vote.

HOUSTON, June 17. (AP)—A story of dramatic adventure in the Gulf of Mexico and off a 16-foot sailboat between Seabrook and Bayport Friday night was told today by Robert Lindsay, 20, deputy in the city tax office.
