Band School Opens Monday

Bill Hulso, director of the Eagle Band, said this week that the Summer Band and Twirling Camp will be held here from June 18 thru June 30th at the school. All students interested in band are urged to attend. Classes will be from 8 a. m. to noon with instruction in twirling, marching and instrumental music for beginners as well as students who have had advanced band work. No age limit has been set and being a member of the regular band is not a requirement. Fee for the two week school is \$10 per student and will cover the use of recreational facilities that are being made available for students attending the camp. PIONEER TAIKOKA LADY DIES

Funeral services for Mrs. J R Singleton, 80, widow of an early day mayor of Tahoka, were held at First Methodist Church with the Rev. J. Frank Perry pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Tahoka Cemetery. Mrs. Singleton died Thursday in West Plains Hospital in Lubbock after a lengthy illness.

At Last -- The Rains Come

If rodeo-time in Big O brings sky juice and frogs as it has for the past several years, most of us would like to see at least four shows next year -- say, one in early May followed by shows in June, July and August -- especially in August.

At any rate the rains did come after eight months of drought. A fast moving storm last Wednesday paved the way for a stormy weekend including high winds, and sand. The storm of Wednesday nite dropped 3 inches on the Wells-Moore area and 8-10ths inches in town. The area covered was largely to the west and the north with the south area neglected. Then Saturday nite a general rain in a slow fall wet down nearly all of this vast trade area netting 3-4ths inches in town. Most of the fall was from 1 to 2 inches.

Monday saw farmers and hands putting those cotton picking seeds in the soil. July 1st is generally considered as the "point of no return" for cotton plantings. This should be a possibly cheap crop as weeds are up and can be controlled by cultivation.

Monday nite another 3-10 in. of rain fell after being ushered in by a red sandie. The fall up to half an inch was general. It is interesting to note that since last November less than 3 inches of rain has fallen. If rainfall a erazes hold the second half of the year should be very wet. A normal crop planted in June also depends on the freeze date as well as rainfall.

An Annual Battle With Insects

Mankind is poised to begin the annual grudge fight with insect hordes that flourish in the warmth of spring and summer. Inevitably the insect will lose as mankind-armed with noxious sprays and dusts and aerosol mists--seeks to ward off the bites and stings and the destruction of his food, clothing and home.

Only by constant fighting has humanity been able to hold its precarious own against more than one million different insect species which inhabit the world. Some 6000 7000 new species are identified each year to lengthen the list of known kinds. The United States is inhabited by approximately 600 injurious species, some of them vectors of human disease.

The vast majority of insects are neutral or indifferent where man is concerned, apparently content to let humanity go its way and demanding he same privilege. Others are highly beneficial, feeding on noxious weeds or troublesome insects, or pollinating crops. At least 50 different seed and fruit crops would be ruined without insect pollinizers. On the other hand to fix a price on depredations of harmful insect varieties, you have to re-gear your thinking or get lost in a maze of zeros. Just counting field crops and stored grains they wreck a yearly havoc of \$4 billion in the U. S. alone.

Flies, fleas and mosquitoes were and still are bernd some of the most calamitous scourges the human race has ever endured, including plague, malaria, yellow fever, and others.

The fact that most insecticides are toxic for humans as well as for insects has caused some apprehension. It is true that people who use them carelessly do run real risk. But there is no evidence to suggest the general population is being inidiously poisoned.

A dealed study into the extent to which widespread use of agricultural insecticides might adversely affect the health of humans and domestic animals is scheduled to begin in coming weeks, under auspices of the Texas State Department of Health and Texas A and M College. Insecticides, despite their great value as weapons against insects, are only supplements to other control activities, he most important of which is proper personal and community sanitation.

A person can live three weeks without food, three days without water but only three minutes without air.

Would you know what to do if a member of your family or neighbor became unconscious and stopped breathing and there was no doctor around?

In just a few minutes anyone can learn the technique known as mouth to mouth breathing. This method has been known to man since biblical times but has recently been proven much more popular than any other method of artificial respiration.

This technique may be used to revive all unconscious and non-breathing victims of drowning, electric shock, smoke or gas inhalation, drug or chemical poisoning, injuries to head, chest, neck and abdomen, convulsions, cardiac arrest and other causes.

Mouth to mouth rescue breathing starts with clearing the mouth of any foreign objects such as tobacco, food, seaweed, toys, loose teeth or other small objects.

Then, with one hand grasp the victim's chin, placing the other hand on top of the head and with a rotating motion tilt the head backward. A roll of clothing or blanket placed under the victim's shoulders will help keep the neck in favorable position.

Insert the thumb of one hand between the victim's jaws. Grasp the lower teeth and pull the jaw forward. Never let the victim's chin sag or let his head return to normal relaxed position. Stop air leakage through the nose by pinching the nostrils closed with the thumb and index finger of the other hand.

Next, take a deep breath and place your mouth over the victim's mouth as firmly as possible in order to prevent air leakage. Keeping the mouth open wide breathe deeply into the victim's lungs.

As soon as you see the victim's chest rise you have delivered adequate breath. You must then remove your mouth so that the victim may exhale naturally. Repeat rescue breathing about once every three or four seconds, about 12 to 20 times a minute, until the victim breathes naturally or until a doctor arrives. If the victim is an infant or small child, breathe gently using only small puffs from the cheeks and throat.

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**Free Speech Issue
In Court Proceeding**

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court." State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

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**Sucker Day Recalls
Big Bamboozlement
To Oklahoma Town**

WETUMKA, Okla.—The city slicker who bamboozled almost every merchant in this community received some high tribute recently from the very town that he slyped.

The town celebrated its third annual "Sucker Day," to memorialize the fortune that turned bad luck into good for this community.

Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) and Sen. Kerr (D-Okla.), who were named the "top suckers of 1952" sent their regrets because they could not attend.

Slick F. Bam Morrison visited Wetumka three years ago and sold a bill of goods.

The community held a party to get rid of the unusable surplus merchandise and found itself with a profit-making festival.

Morrison was invited to this year's celebration. But, with everything honest, he stayed away.

The history of the event goes back to the day Morrison arrived here as the self-announced advance agent for a circus.

He canvassed every merchant for advertisements in the circus program.

"Yessiree," Morrison's glib tongue promised, "the circus is coming and it's a humdinger!"

The confidence man persuaded local merchants to import hay to feed the elephants.

Came the big day, there was no big top. There was no Morrison.

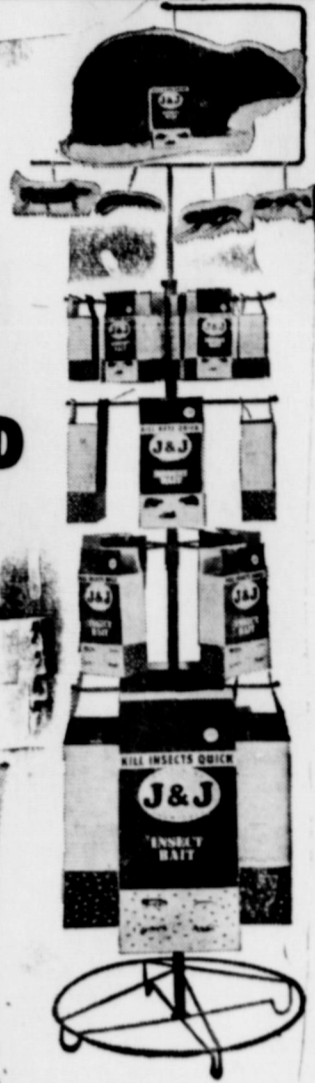

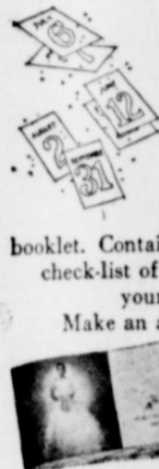

Still, by working at it, he thought he could make at least \$2,500 a year from the remaining land - about half of what he had been making recently. At 69, with all of his children grown and married, that would do him and his wife all right. In fact, they would have the time to do the many things they had put off over the years. He'd be sort of retired.

The farmer knew social security benefits would be payable to him and his wife if he retired - he wondered about partial retirement. Next time that man from the social security office was in town, he'd have to ask him.

He did, and the social security man had good news. Yes, the farmer was, according to his expected earnings, eligible for part of his social security - \$750 a year to be exact. And when he was 72, he and his wife could redeem all of their social security, regardless of his earnings. In this farmer's case, that would be \$1800 a year.

If you are over 65, still working and have never applied for social security, check with your local S. S. office. The people there will be glad to help you with your application. It may mean money in your pocket - money that rightfully belongs to you.

INSTALLMENT INCOME TAX DUE JUNE 15

Taxpayers paying estimated federal income taxes are according to District Director, Ellis Campbell, Jr. of Internal Revenue Service in Dallas, required to pay their second installment of tax due on 1962 estimated income by Friday, June 15.

If the income expected to be earned during 1962 has changed, taxpayers should file an amended declaration of Estimated Tax. A blank form for use as an amended return is printed on the back of the bill which taxpayers receive for an installment of Estimated Tax. The IRS representative explained.

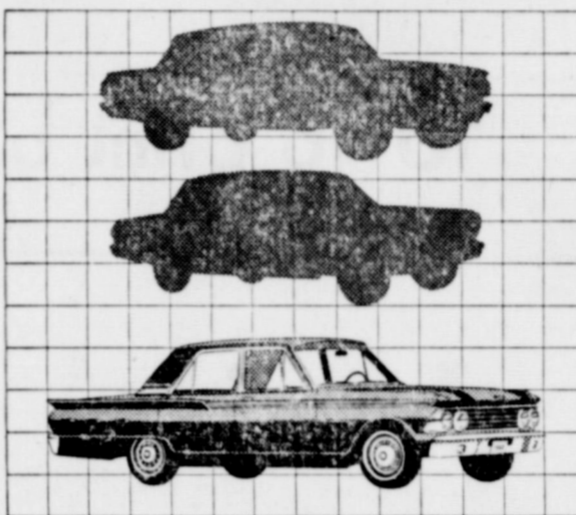

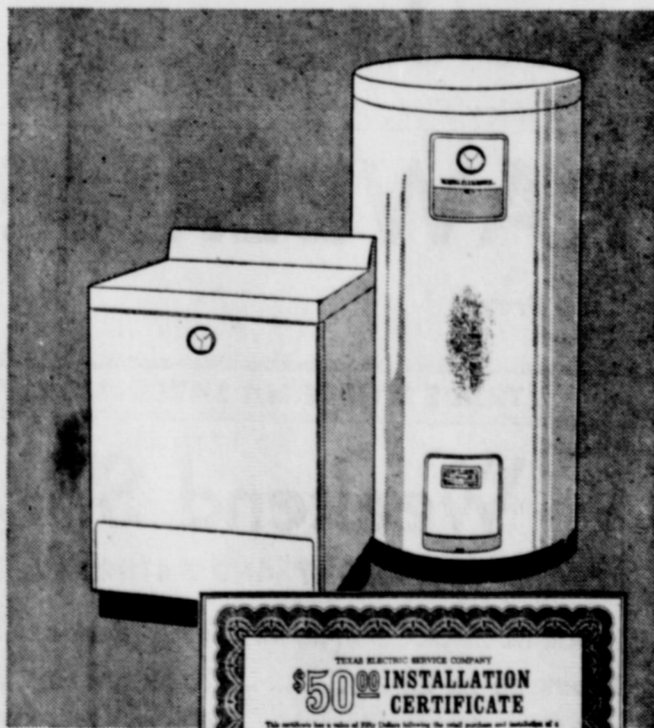
