W. N. Chapter Brings Famous Missionary To Speak In Lubbock

Dr. Frank Laubach, one of the world's most famous missionaries, and a popular author of books and articles dealing with the illiterate three-fifths of the world's population, will be in Lubbock Friday, Nov. 12, and will speak at both the First Baptist Church and the First Christian Church.

He is coming to the South Plains through the responsibility of the Dickens County Chapter of World Neighbors and will be accompanied by Dr. John Peters, founder and president of World Neighbors, Inc.

Dr. Laubach, who is Honorary President of both World Neighbors, Inc. and World Literacy, Inc., has devoted his whole life since 1935 preparing charts for the underdeveloped and illiterate of the world. For many years he has been "doing it alone" and has visited 64 countries. He has "made lessons" in 239 languages or dialects, many of which have never before been reduced to black on white syllables. Though it is difficult to calculate, an estimate has been made that he is directly or indirectly responsible for approximately 15 million people's learning the fundamentals of reading and writing.

Dr. Laubach will speak on "Prayer" at 3 p. m. at the First Christian Church, and at the First Baptist Church at 7:30.

The Dickens County Chapter of World Neighbors, the first in a rural area in the world, now has 46 members.

Moyne Kelly Is New President In County

Three new directors were elected and 17 resolutions were passed at the annual convention of the Dickens County Farm Bureau last Thursday evening in Dickens.

Only a small number of the organization's 170 members attended the meeting. C. W. Nickels, outgoing president of the organization, expressed that area football games and other activities on the same evening was the reason for the light attendance. It was estimated that 35 were present, including some from the Girard area of Kent County.

Directors re-elected were C. W. Nickels and C. P. Witt. Moyne Kelly was elected as a new director and then elected president of the organization at the meeting of the board Monday night.

Other directors included Jeff Randolph, Byron Hamer, Harold Hardy and Floyd Watson. O. L. Kelley of Spur was the principle speaker at Thursday's meeting, and is reported to have made a very interesting talk on farm bureau.

Nickels states that he has enjoyed serving the bureau as its president the past two years and that he appreciates the cooperation and interest shown by county farmers in the bureau program of work. He solicits the support of the county for the incoming president and urges a bigger and better organization as time goes by.

Resolutions Passed

1. Farm Financing—longer terms, more money.
2. Tractor Gas Refund—opposed to any attempt to discontinue refunding road tax on tractor fuel.

3. Parity—based on net income in comparison to industry and labor.

4. Grain Sorghums—should be eligible for Commodity Credit Loan with maximum moisture content of 14%.

5. REA—the power to make, alter, amend or repeal the by-laws of the Texas Electric Co. operative, Inc. shall be vested in the membership.

6. ASC—the provision that diverted acreage be allowed on two-in and two-out planting.

7. That a noxious weed control be set up.

8. That any farmer failing to plant his allotment of any designated crop be penalized the following year only if the failure for not complying is within his control.

9. That a long-term credit system be arranged for novice farmers.

10. That grain sorghum be placed on the same basis as corn for support price.

11. That the Texas Farm Bureau acreage retirement plan be endorsed.

12. That social security for farm operators be accepted.

13. That the reciprocal trade agreement act dealing with foreign markets and set to expire in June, 1935, be extended from three to five years.

14. That publicity be given to the fact that the farmer receives no more subsidy than other industries, but on the contrary receives a less degree of aid than many other industries according to the percentage of investment.

15. Taxes—favor a tax on natural resources; oppose general sales tax.

16. Oppose any legislation to eliminate all or any part of the present funds now being used in the counties for rural roads, and that rural roads they should be built under local administration.

17. Cotton—(a) that support price program be amended to recognize light spots and pluses and values assigned thereto; (b) that any samples be classed without reference to former class card or grade sheet; (c) that a minimum moisture condition be set and standardized.

A committee consisting of Jim Barron, Dave McAteer and Guy Goen, was selected at a recent meeting of a group of county citizens to organize the county to raise at least \$3,050 to pay the county's part of the salaries of the county agent, HD agent and trapper for six months.

E. S. Lee is treasurer for the fund and will receive donations at the Spur Service Bank.

Write-Ins Fail In General Election

Only a light scattering of county voters went to the polls Tuesday to vote in the general election. The top number of votes cast was 841 for County Clerk Fred Arrington.

Write-in candidates for commissions of precincts 1 and 3 caused some interest in the election but failed to do much else. Here in precinct 3 there were 49 who scratched Arner Watson to write in Floyd Green. In precinct 1 65 voters wrote in Horace Nichols after scratching Roy Ward. Watson received 330 votes and Ward 268.

On the State Constitutional Amendments the county disagreed with the rest of the state on six and voted in favor of five of them.

The strongest county opposition was against No. 5, granting pay raises for members of the state legislators. The vote was 366 against and 245 for. Other amendments opposed by Dickens county voters were No. 3, granting social security for state employees; No. 6, dealing with toll roads and turnpikes; No. 7, requiring women to serve on juries; No. 8, four year terms for elective offices; and No. 9, the creation of county hospital districts.

There were 30 voters in the county voting the Republican ticket.

The turnout for the election was less than half of 1932's total of 1989.

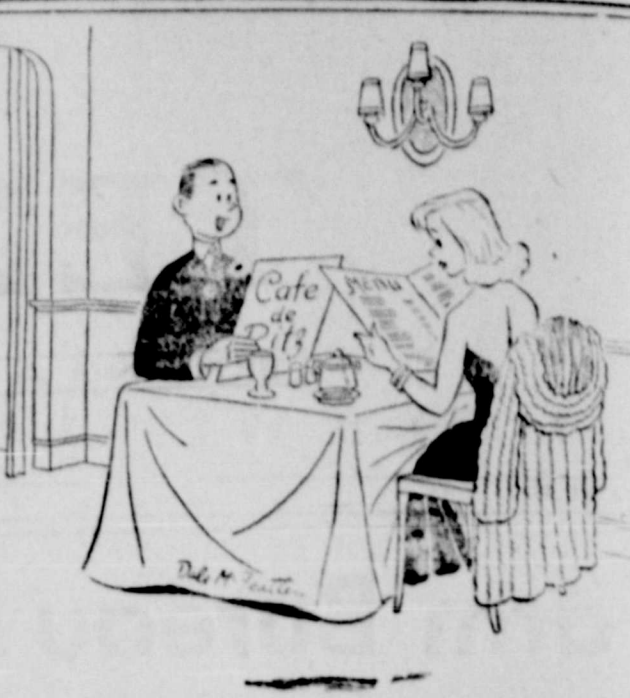
Balancing livestock numbers with the feed on the range is described as a major problem of livestock producers. The tendency is to remember stocking rates during good years. Base the rates on the average years.

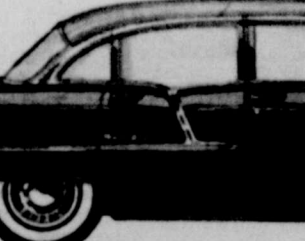

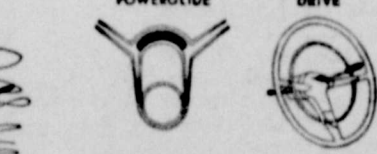

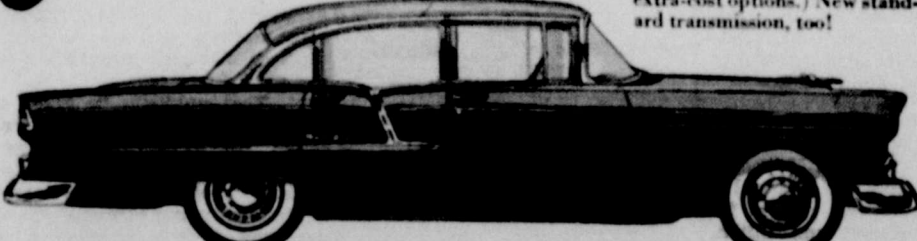

SOIL-SAVING FARMERS GET TAX BREAK UNDER NEW LAW

Expense incurred by farmers in the prevention of soil erosion have been given favorable tax treatment under the new 1954 Internal Revenue Code.

Prior to enactment of this new provision, the Internal Revenue Service had attempted, with varying success, to require the capitalization of expenses incurred in contour forming, terracing and other erosion work. Under this rule, expenditures could be deducted over a period of years, but the courts in some instances had allowed farmers to deduct these expenses in the year incurred.

The new law permits farmers to deduct in each year all expenditures incurred in that year for "soil or water conservation in respect of land used in farming, or for the prevention of erosion of land used in farming."

This deduction is limited, however, to 25 per cent of the gross income derived from farming for the taxable year. Any excess over and above the 25 per cent is deductible in succeeding years, but in each year the entire deduction is limited to 25 per cent of gross income.

This liberalization provision does not allow the deduction of expenditures for the purchase, construction, improvement or installation of depreciable machinery, tiles, masonry, metal or wood structures, appliances and facilities such as tanks, pipes, reservoirs, canals, dams, wells, pumps and conduits. Such expenditures, as under the prior law, must be capitalized and deducted over the estimated useful life of the asset.

Those expenses which may be deducted include the cost of leveling, grading, terracing, contour furrowing, construction, control and protection of diversions, earthen dams, water works, outlets and ponds, brush removal and planting of windbreaks and other treatment or moving of earth, provided that these expenditures are incurred for the prevention of erosion of farm lands.

A farmer may elect to deduct these expenses incurred in 1954 on his 1954 tax return, or if no such expenses were incurred in 1954, may make the election on his tax return for the first year in which such expenditures are incurred. However, if the election is not made at that time, the taxpayer must obtain the consent of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue before being allowed to expense these items.

Once made, an election is binding for all subsequent years, unless the taxpayer requests and obtains authority to make the change.

Social Security Rep. To Be Here Nov. 10

The Social Security representative will be in Spur at the Post Office at 2:00 p. m. on Nov. 10 to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

The amended social security law brings Federal old-age and survivors insurance to most farm families, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security district office. The amendments, make two main changes concerning farm people:

(1) Farm operators - people farming for themselves - have not been covered by the social security law up to now. Beginning January 1, 1955, all of them who make as much as \$400 profit in a year will have old-age and survivors insurance protection.

(2) Farm employees - people doing work for others - are already covered by the law if they work regularly for one farm operator. The new law brings old-age and survivors insurance protection to all farm workers who earn as much as \$100 cash pay in a year from any one farmer, whether the work is regular or not. Cotton gin workers will be covered beginning January 1, 1955, under the same rules that apply to people who work directly on the land.

Hutton stated that farmers could not acquire eligibility for benefits based on self-employment until after 1954.

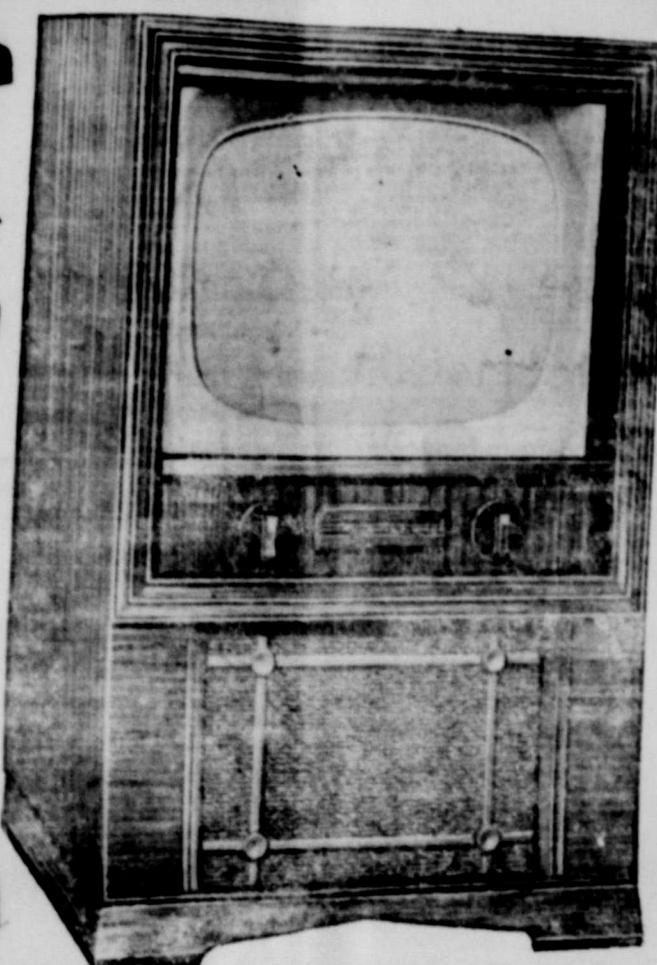

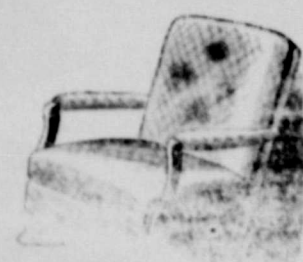
