## City Council Awards New Engineering Study Contract

The Colorado City Council met in a marathon four hour session Tuesday evening that included the awarding of an engineering study to Freeze and Nichols of Fort Worth.

The engineering firm has quoted a price of \$6,000 to the city to study the water treatment plant.

The council also previewed the 1982-83 budget and

approved a pay classification for city employees. By way of explaining the preliminary city budget, City Manager Richard Crowley said high pay would be given police officers in Colorado City, but the expense would be made up by using one less man on the force. The budget calls for a three percent increase in spending.

## Local Sales Taxes Are Safe From Corporations' Appeals

State Comptroller Bob Bullock told officials in nearly 1,000 Texas cities who levy the one percent local sales tax their city coffers are safe from a legal challenge that could have forced the refund of millions in local tax revenue.

"The other shoe has fallen," Bullock said in announcing that U.S. Steel Corporation has dropped its appeal to a ruling upholding the way Texas local sales and use taxes are collected.

The corporation had attacked the constitutionality of the local option sales tax and State District Judge Hume Cofer ruled in favor of the state last April. If

U.S. Steel had pressed and won its appeal on Judge Cofer's ruling, Bullock said, many cities might have faced economic chaos, because city sales tax revenue would have been subject to claims for refunds.

Retailers in cities which have adopted the local sales tax collect the state four percent tax and an extra one percent tax, while only four percent state tax is collected in other cities and non-incorporated areas.

Texas cities, Bullock noted, received more than \$650 million last year in city sales tax rebates.

These officers were sworn in on March 14th by State Chairman Ed Bernaldez of El Paso.

The Manuel G. Martinez Chapter of the American G.I. Forum began January 7, 1982.

In the men's chapter the officers are as follows: Chairman, John Munoz; Vice-Chairman, A. A. Lujan; Secretary, Raymond Zamarripa; Chaplain, Gilbert Gomez and Reporter, John Salazar.

In the women's chapter these are the officers: Chairperson, Ginger Zamarripa; Vice-Chairperson, Cecilia Munoz; Secretary, Alice Lopez; Treasurer, Mary Helen Gomez; Chaplain, Mary Heredia and Reporter, Adelia Ceballos.

These officers were sworn in on March 15, by National Regional Director, Jose Alvarado of Fort Worth.

Both Chapters are now in the process of raising funds for a scholarship to help some young person in school.

The American G.I. Forum of the U.S. is a patriotic national veterans and non-veterans family organization that is known throughout the United States of America, composed primarily of Mexican-Americans. Mostly all individual Chapters have or are in the process of forming Women's and Youth organizations.

The American G.I. Forum was founded in March 26, 1948, in Corpus Christi by a group of interested persons that was formed to issue complaints to the proper authorities at various levels of our government and specifically to the agencies involved in the discriminatory practices. In spite of the protected legislation that had been passed by our government guaranteeing all veterans certain rights and privileges, the returning Mexican-American Veterans were being subjected to certain discrimi-

natory practices in the areas of Education, Employment, Medical Attention and also Housing. This group was led by a young doctor named Hector P. Garcia. He had served in the Armed Forces in combat as a Major in the Medical Corp. His dynamic leadership incited these Americans to action and they were successful in correcting some discriminatory practices in the Corpus Christi area. The dedication of the young doctor and the success attained brought many requests for other G. I. Forum Chap-

ters in the State of Texas. Dr. Garcia and other dedicated persons soon toured the State of Texas pointing out the reasons they should form American G. I. Forum Chapters. Many Chapters were formed and immediately began to work. It was only a matter of time before the organization spread into New Mexico and there another leader by the name of Vicente T. Ximenes joined the organization and set up the mechanics of the organization. Both he and Dr. Garcia gained national prominence in

organizing and fighting for the objectives of the American G. I. Forum. Dr. Hector P. Garcia is still very active in the American G. I. Forum and has traveled around the country attending the various functions of the American G. I. Forum and organizing. He holds the position of Founder on the Board of Directors of the American G. I. Forum and is nationally recognized and respected. He was appointed by the late President John F. Kennedy to the delegation which formulated a treaty with the West In-

dies and is usually consulted by high government officials in matters dealing with the Hispanic population.

He was also appointed as an alternate delegate to the United Nations, the highest position to ever have been acquired by a Mexican-American. Dr. Garcia also gave the first Spanish speech in the history of the United Nations.

**YOU AUTO KNOW**

Q. How do you test for shock absorbers? How long can I expect a set of shock absorbers to last?  
A. On the average, standard shock absorbers should be replaced every 20-30,000 miles. However, a lot depends on your driving habits and the kind of roads you normally drive over. There are two simple tests for defective shock absorbers. The first is to literally test them by the "seat of your pants". The ride will tell you whether or not your shocks are in reasonably good shape. Bottoming out, vibration and what is called "sloppy front end" are all indications of bad shocks. Then, bounce the car by pushing down on a fender. The car should remain still as soon as you stop rocking it. If it continues to bounce, your shocks are probably bad. One final tip: Never replace one shock. Always replace both front or both rear shocks. If one is bad, the other is sure to follow.

**TREMENDOUS TRIFLES**  
THE PLAYING CARD THAT LED TO THE DISCOVERY OF PRINTING

Modern society's complex ways of work and play could hardly exist without the practice of printing in its various forms. Yet the beginning of this great industry may be found in a simple game of cards played by a man and his wife to pass an evening hour.

Johannes Gutenberg, a lapidary, or gem-polisher of the fifteenth century was carrying on his trade in the city of Mainz, Germany. At that time few people could read. The art of printing was unknown and there were no books such as we see today. The few that were available were handwritten on vellum, usually by monks. The supply hardly met the demands of the monasteries and the few universities then in existence.

Gutenberg was a man of keen mind and much curiosity. While playing a card game of the day with his wife Anna one evening after work, he suddenly paused and gazed reflectively at the card he was holding. "What is wrong?" asked his wife. After a moment he explained that the idea had occurred to him that he himself could cut these designs on wood blocks and impress sets of cards in his own shop. After several experiments he printed playing cards better than any previously seen.

From the reproduction of playing cards and simple pictures, Gutenberg's enthusiasm soon led him to attempt to print an entire book from engraved blocks. He chose the "History of St. John the Evangelist." With the help of his wife and his apprentices the venture was successful, and after several months the world's first printed books were ready for distribution.

The famous Gutenberg bible was printed between 1450 and 1455, from movable type. By the end of the century thousands of books had been printed in the various countries of Europe and a new age of learning had begun. Yet the impetus for this vast and important industry resulted from a gem-polisher's curiosity over a playing card.

**Native Largemouth Black Bass Plentiful**

The attention that the largemouth black bass receives in Texas leaves little doubt about the status of this popular sportfish. The northern largemouth bass (native or Texas bass) occurs in most Texas streams and natural lakes. Extensive stocking programs over the past 50 years have resulted in its introduction into thousands of man-made lakes and ponds.

Introduction of the Florida largemouth bass started in Texas during the early 1970's, according to Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Florida subspecies is known to grow larger than our native largemouth. Although this characteristic was initially attributed to the long growing season and warm waters of the Florida's original habitat, research has indicated that it's ability to grow larger is also genetically influenced.

The Florida bass has several negative characteristics that must be considered when stocking a pond or lake. Tests have shown that Florida bass do not grow as fast as our native largemouth during the first year of life. This may contribute to poorer survival, due in part to predation, during the first year. Additionally, Florida bass are unable to tolerate cold, harsh winters as well as native bass. Small shallow ponds in areas of the state subject to extreme cold are poor candidates for Florida bass.

The Florida and native bass are very similar in appearance and are difficult to distinguish with the untrained eye. However, Florida bass appear more golden-brown in color as compared to the greenish hue of the native bass. A better method of differentiating between the two subspecies is to count the scales along the lateral line. The Florida bass has 70 or more lateral line scales, while the native bass has 68 or less.

In waters where both fish occur, hybridization is common and from available information, highly desirable. The resulting offspring, called the "superbass," is probably superior to either parental strain in growth and survival. The current state record, a 15 1/2 pounder taken in 1981 from Lake Echo, has been verified as a hybrid. The hybridization of the two subspecies is upgrading the genetic composition of native bass populations; an impact that is sure to have positive effects for fishermen.

The life histories of largemouth bass are very similar. Florida bass begin spawning when water temperatures warm to approximately 60 degrees F. Native bass spawn slightly later, when the water warms to 64 degrees F. or higher. If conditions favor rapid growth, one year old bass at least ten inches in length may spawn. Nests are dished out on firm bottoms in water

two to eight feet deep by the male. The male then attracts a ripe female to the nest by aggressive courting behavior, which includes rapid and vivid color pattern changes. The female then lays from 2,000 to 100,000 eggs which are immediately fertilized. Since the female's eggs do not all ripen at one time, she may spawn once or twice more during the spring.

Eggs hatch in two to five days and the fry begin feeding four to eight days later. The male guards the eggs and fry, but after the young leave the nest, they become prey for adult bass, each other and other fish. The young bass feed mainly on zooplankton the first few weeks, but at two to three inches, their diet is mainly small fish and aquatic insects. As fingerlings grow to adulthood, the size and types of food in their diet increase. Adults feed mainly on shad, sunfish and a variety of other

aquatic and terrestrial life.

Growth rates vary according to food availability and water quality, says Higginbotham. The hybrid largemouth usually grows faster than either parent and may reach lengths of 12 inches or more at the end of one year. Native largemouth grow faster than Florida for the first year or so, but the Florida equals and surpasses the native in growth thereafter. The life expectancy of largemouth bass is six to eight years, but reports of older fish have been documented.

Bass fishing has become a highly complex and technical sport with the advent of high performance boats, electronic depth finders and oxygen-temperature probes. The sport has turned into a year round activity, but the best time to fish is during the spawning season, usually February through June in Texas.

Largemouth bass will hit a variety of artificial

baits, most of which resemble natural food. Basically, bass strike a lure or bait in response to one of three stimuli: hunger, protection of nests or young, or a reflex response to a food item.

Largemouth bass rely largely on sight for feeding, but a well developed lateral line sensory system enables them to locate food items due to slight vibrations through the water. Plastic worms, spinners, crankbaits and topwater lures are all effective on largemouth bass. Minnows, particularly golden shiners, are favorite live baits.

Largemouth bass prefer areas that are not subject to direct sunlight such as weedbeds, flooded timber and boat docks. Underwater structures such as submerged islands, creekbeds and brushpiles are also likely candidates to attract bass.

Whether you prefer to fish large lakes or the local farm pond, spring is tops for bass fishing.
