Tornado Damage in the Millions

Millions of Dollars in Damage

Damage estimated at 20 to 30 million dollars was inflicted to Sheppard Air Force Base and the area southwest of it last Friday afternoon. This was the most damaging tornado ever to hit in this vicinity. The funnel, which formed along the Iowa Park Road near Highway 369, first dipped down south of the highway, raised for a short distance, then released its fury on Sunset Terrace housing area.

Next in line of destruction was hangar 1010. It was left a complete wreck; roof removed, windows all blown out, and the siding snatched from the outside.

The vast job of cleaning up has been pressed since shortly after the tornado passed through.

The miraculous part of it is, only eight casualties have been announced.

Burkburnett was not damaged.

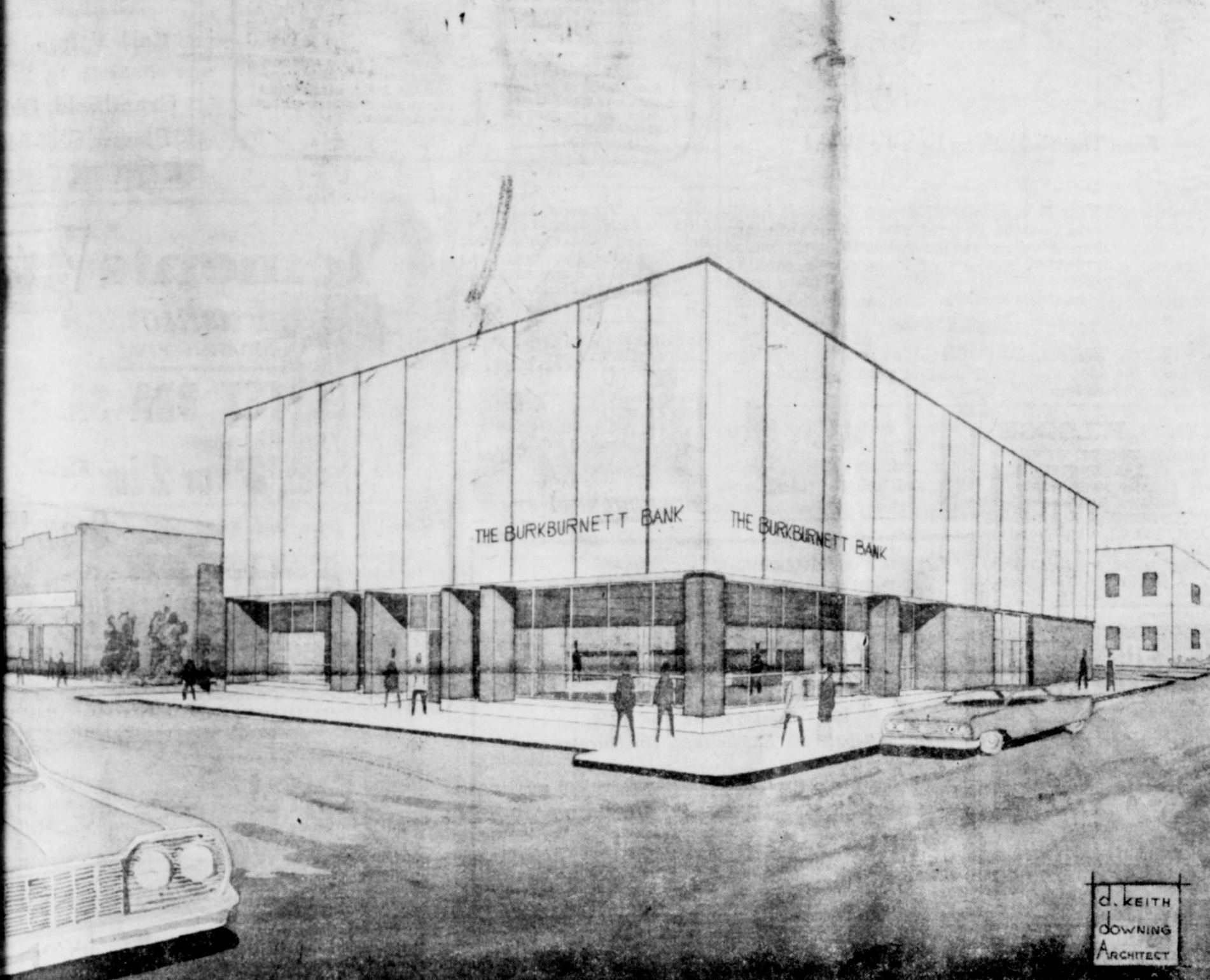

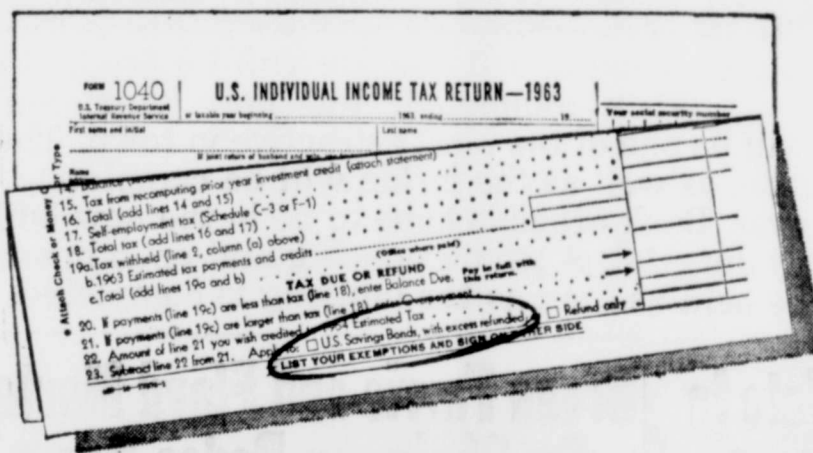

Having trouble tearing toddlers away from comic books and television long enough to serve a peaceful meal? For many of the nation's mothers, logic and colorful new melamine dinnerware have provided a solution to this all too prevalent problem.

The dinnerware—featuring Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck, Pluto, and all the gang—has been introduced by Stetson Corporation of Lincoln, Illinois. The logic involved in its use is simple enough. A host of comic strip characters present at mealtime provides all the lure needed in most households.



The thing not to be done, say experts, is to try and force food into children. You'll just meet with solid resistance.

But you can try to lure them into eating in subtle ways—the same ways you use to make food appealing to adults with finicky appetites.

Bought: One Home, 749 Ideas

Only about one person out of every 750 who look at a model home ends up buying it. But the other 749 aren't wasting their time. They come away full of ideas—ways to improve their present homes and new features and products to use in their future homes.

One innovation house-hunting families will see a lot of in model homes this year is the high-oven electric range. Introduced only a few years ago, the high-oven

range has caught on with homemakers who like to see what's cooking without stooping and husbands who like to see quality equipment in their homes.

As the name suggests, this type of range has an oven—or ovens—at a convenient, eye-level height above the surface elements, which are slightly lower than standard counter height for comfortable cooking.

There are several models to choose from. The larger, 40-inch electric ranges have two side-by-side ovens, one larger than the other. Each oven has its own automatic controls. There are also one-oven models to fit narrower spaces. Both types can be either hung on a wall or set on a base cabinet.

Another two-oven model is a free-standing range with one eye-level oven and another oven in the traditional position below the surface elements.

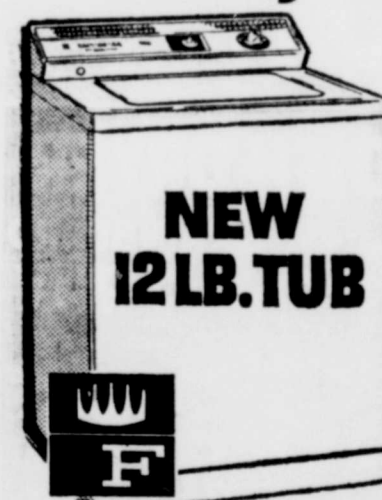

Presumably this is because such plates are tough, long lasting and least expensive. And they can be made thin enough to mail economically—a pair of Illinois steel plates weigh less than six ounces.

As for the increasing diversity of slogans—they usually express what's on a state's mind. Food is the preoccupation of many: Georgia plumps for peaches, Idaho, potatoes and Wisconsin says it's America's dairyland.

There are those who argue that it's wrong to clutter plates with any information other than number, name of state and expiration date. For example, M. H. Yost, one of the nation's authorities on license plates—he's had a hand in designing the license plates of many of the 50 states,—argues that license plates are a car's fingerprints and police have enough trouble spotting them hurriedly without having to separate the figures from slogans and other decorations.

Legibility accounts for the predominant use of steel in plates, says Yost, an engineer with Pittsburgh Stamp Company, producer of the dies from which most license plates are made. He points out that such plates are more rigid and otherwise more desirable than those made of other materials that have been used from time to time.

During World War II, Illinois used a pressed fiber containing soybeans that turned out to be a favorite snack for livestock and dogs. Aluminum is used in some states but others don't like its softness and consequent susceptibility to bending and pulling out of its bracket holes. Pennsylvania, for instance, is changing from aluminum to steel.

Another license plate idea that came a cropper was roof identification—an easy spotting of speeder—borne cops!

VETERANS Questions & Answers

Q—How much is paid to a war orphan or eligible peace-time orphan taking part in the VA's Orphans Educational Assistance program?

A—Students enrolled in the VA's War Orphans Education Assistance program may receive \$110 a month for up to 36 months of schooling or vocational training.

Q—I have never asked the VA for anything, but I am a war veteran. Can I get free physical examination?

A—You can get a free examination, but it will have to be in connection with your application for some sort of benefit such as hospitalization or to determine if some condition you have may be found to be service-connected. A free examination cannot be had for some private purpose of your own.

Q—Some years ago, the VA denied my claim for disability pension. I am becoming increasingly worse. What steps can I take to have my claim considered again?

A—Write or visit the VA office which previously studied your claim and enclose a statement from your doctor as to the nature of your disability and its increasing severity. The VA will then send you further instruction.

Q—Are widows of veterans eligible for GI home loans.

A—Veterans' widows may be eligible for GI home loans if they meet these requirements—they must be unmarried widows of veterans of World War II or the Korean Conflict who died in service or after separation from service as the result of service connected disabilities. Entitlement for World War II widows expires July 25, 1967, and for widows of Korean Conflict veterans January 31, 1975.

Q—Why is a so-called "C-number" necessary in connection with veterans benefits? Shouldn't the veteran's name and proof of service be sufficient?

A—There are many veterans (sometimes hundreds) with the same name and middle initial. Periods of service are often duplicated. A C-number (claim number) positively identifies the record of the individual veteran.

Q—Can a War Orphan who has his entrance into VA educational training delayed or interrupted by military service have his completion date extended?

A—Yes. He has five years from the date of his first release or discharge from military service in which to complete his training.

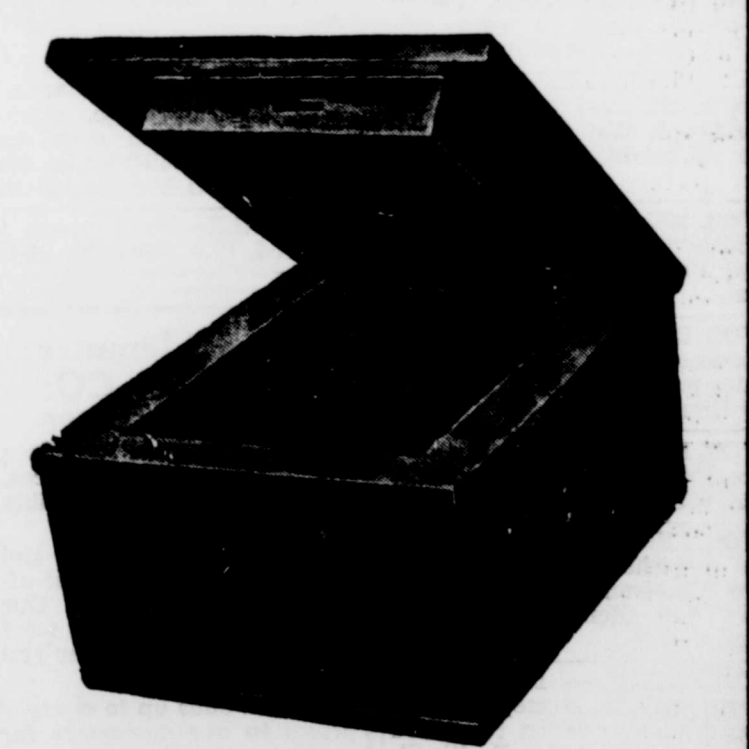

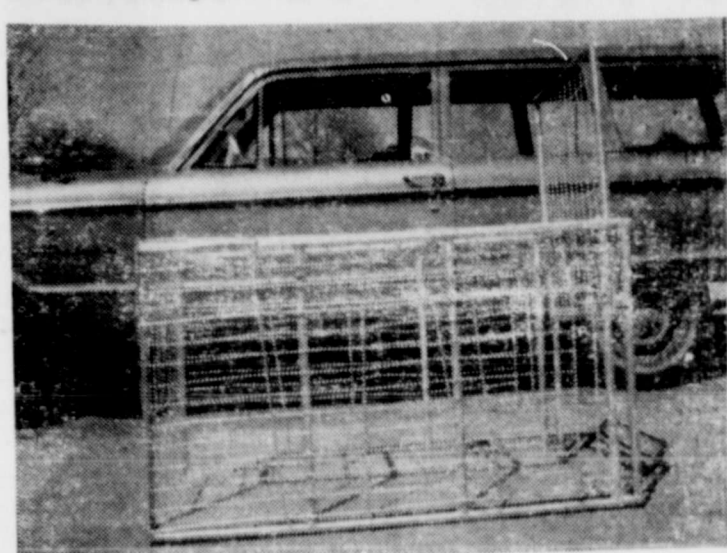
