WILSON HANDS REPLY TO RAILWAY WORKERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—President Wilson handed to the representatives of the two million railroad workers today his decision in their demands for an increase in wages.

At the same time the President submitted a proposition in which it is expected to lead to further negotiations between the leaders and the President over the proposed increase in wages.

The nature of Mr. Wilson's decision and proposal was not made public up to a late hour this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—President Wilson had a personal conference today with three representatives of the railroad brotherhoods to discuss the wage demands of two million employees who are

to be referred to him by Director General Hines. The announcement said it is not decided which of the brotherhood representatives will be invited to the White House. Secretary Tumulty, who made the announcement yesterday added that the selection of the brotherhood representatives will be left to Director General Hines. The union leaders will see the president on the south lawn at the White House, where the president spends a portion of each morning. The Director General conferred with Secretary Tumulty this morning and then returned to his office to complete the memorandum for the President who will be asked to make a final decision on the demands which were presented by the railroad workers nearly a year ago.

The decision to lay the entire controversy before President Wilson was made late yesterday by Director General Hines after he and the representatives of the railroad workers had failed to reach an agreement.

GERMANS FLEEING TO HOLLAND

THE HAGUE, Feb. 13.—Grand Duke Hesse and eight other Germans of prominence who are named in the list of the war guilty demanded by the Allies for trial, arrived in Holland today and are seeking political refuge.

Several generals who served in the German army against the Allies are reported to be in the party, who are seeking to get where the Allies can not get hold of them.

FIRE INSPECTOR COMMITTS SUICIDE

AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—Capt. R. L. Pollard, chief inspector for the insurance commission, committed suicide at his home today.

The man shot himself in the head with a pistol and was dead when friends reached him.

Captain Pollard was sixty-eight years old. He was a warm personal friend of Senator Culberson, the two men being class mates in the Virginal Military College.

NEW DUTCH MINISTER APPOINTED BY WILSON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—William Phillips, assistant to Secretary of State, is President Wilson's choice for Minister to the Netherlands, it was authoritatively stated today.

The name of Phillips has been sent to the Dutch for their approval.

W. F. Gorman shot C. R. Cubbs through the right arm when the two men met on the streets in front of Jeanes Produce Co. shortly after noon Friday.

Gorman used an automatic pistol and fired one shot which went through the lower right arm of Cubbs, the bullet breaking the arm and plowing its way out about six inches from where it entered.

Gorman surrendered to the officers immediately after the shooting, and Cubbs was carried to the office of Dr. F. M. Hale, where the wound was dressed, and he was able to be on the streets the remainder of the afternoon.

Gorman is a prominent and well-to-do farmer, and lives six miles south of Ballinger. Cubbs came here with his wife and five children last fall, coming from Ellis county. He was employed to pick cotton on the Gorman farm, and later rented land for the year from Mr. Gorman, according to his statement, and was arranging to make a crop on the Gorman farm, when trouble between he and Gorman broke.

To The Ledger reporter, shortly after the shooting, Cubbs said: "Mr. Gorman and I have been having trouble, and I left his place and came to town. I have been trying to get another farm to move my family, but have been unable to do so. I was planning to take a trip and see if I could not find another place to move my family, when my little boy came to town and told me that Mr. Gorman had been shooting over their heads to scare them."

"I saw him on the streets, and asked him what he meant by it, and had no idea that he was armed. He would not discuss the matter with me at first, but later warned me not to put my hands on him and reached in his pocket and pulled a gun, and shot me as I threw up my arms."

Mr. Gorman was incustody of the officers and a Ledger reporter had not been able to get a statement from him.

THE OPULENT JANITOR

After reproducing an editorial from The Ledger in which we stated that the negro janitor in the Ballinger schools drew a salary higher than a majority of the teachers, and after referring to a news dispatch from Ballinger telling about the move on the part of the Ballinger people to raise a fund to pay the teachers a better salary, the Temple Telegram offers the following comment:

"That the remuneration of the teaching profession is not in keeping with its value and importance to society is a well known fact. It is ancient and proverbial information. But that in no sense justifies the continuance of the injustice neither does it necessarily imply that this condition will al

ways obtain.

"We are not one of those wisely to declare that what has always been will always be henceforth and forevermore. That bugaboo has been too often shattered for us to stand in dread of it now. Aren't the women voting and the men drinking water—something that no woman and some men never did before? We have been trying out a lot of new things in this wonderful and uncertain age of ours.

"And even so we are inclined to believe that the unprecedented publicity which has been given to the question of the inadequate pay of teachers will turn the trick and cause the sound thinking fair minded citizenship of this country to remedy this evil. Doubtless remedial legislation will soon be proposed to cope with the situation and to place the teaching class on a permanently better standing as to salary.

"But already we have seen numerous hopeful signs in this section. Some cities are amending their city charters to enable them to increase the rate of taxation, the additional tax fund to go to the city schools. Some are proposing large endowment funds that would yield a yearly income to the schools of several thousand dollars. And some are just digging down in their pockets and paying by straight contributions the amounts that are needed.

"This is not only commendable as a means of meeting the emergency needs of the school but it is encouraging as to the future attitude of patrons toward the profession. Knowing that the character of the citizenship and hence the destiny of the nation is largely centered in the schools of the country and that adequate salaries is an absolute essential to better schools we look forward with hope to a thorough and permanent correction of this unfortunate condition that has so long existed."

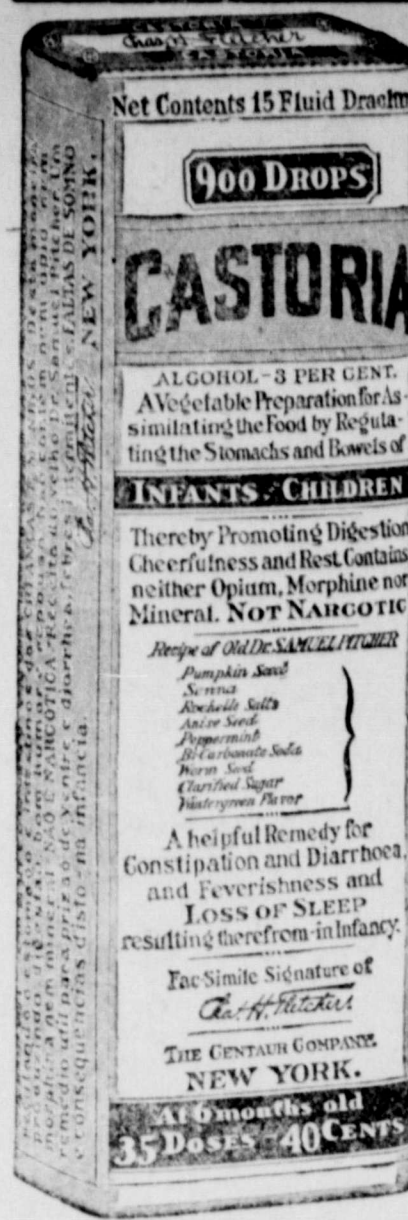

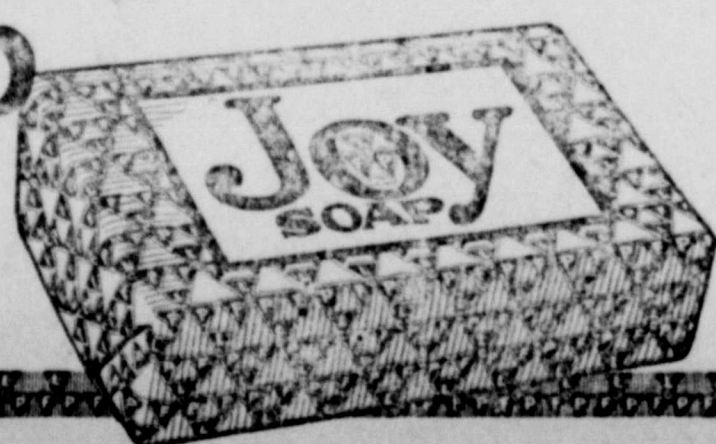

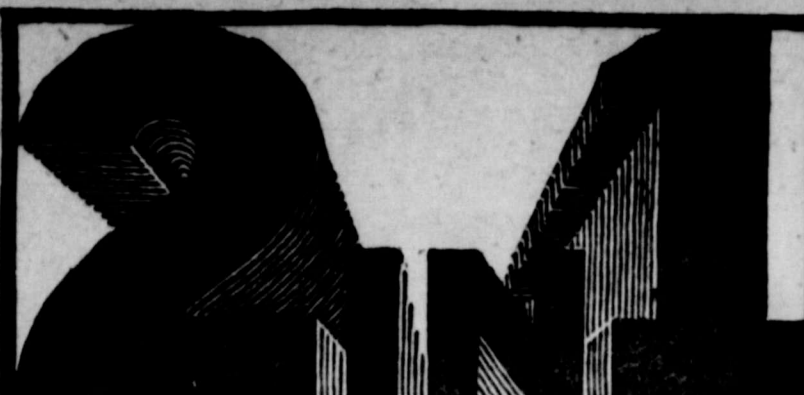

SYRIAN PRINCESS TO LECTURE HERE SOON

When Princess Rahme Haider, who comes from a long line of princesses of ancient Syria, and who will be heard at the Methodist church in a lecture "Under Syrian Stars" raises her dark eyes that seem to hold the mystic splendor of the East, the message of heartbreak, of torture, of anguish—all seem to flash in her eyes as she thinks of her mission,

to bring before the public a better knowledge of her own people. It is not often that Ballinger has the rare pleasure of entertaining a real Oriental princess and one who proudly traces her lineage back through Biblical records.

Princess Rahme will appear at the Methodist church on Tuesday presenting her inspiring and instructive lecture: "Under Syrian Stars" telling of her political and social conditions of her home—Palestine.

On Wednesday at 8:00 at the same church the Princess will present her wonderful drama of: "Naaman the Leper" based on the old Bible story and which has been dramatized by her during her college careers in this country.

It tells how the Syrians were turned from the worship of Baal to the knowledge of the true living God of Israel and the part the little Hebrew captive maiden played in bringing about this great change. It is given in scenes and costumes with Miss Burgess playing with the Princess in the role of Marian. In this story Princess Haider makes a great contrast between the two religions—one the old material form and the other the new.

Loving her people and her home with all her heart, Princess Rahme has toured several lyciums and chautauquas, telling of the inner life of her people as only one who has been born and reared under the Syrian skies. She was born at the foot of Mt. Lebanon and has been educated in the best schools and colleges of the old East and of the new West.

In her appearances here, she will wear her royal robes of damask blue satin with gold and jewels with a magnificent headdress befitting one of noble birth. This robe is ancestral, worn by princesses of former generations and made by the simple folk of Damascus, who deemed it an honor to toil months and months, taking stitch after stitch by hand on this robe for the royal wearer.

With the Princess in this interesting tour of America is her college chum, Miss Lucille Burgess who is a gifted musician and who has transposed the difficult music of the Syrians into suitable music for the piano. The music of El-Oud, a stringed instrument resembling a mandoline but six times as large, the instrument David used before King Saul, is the most difficult of the folk music of any land and will be interpreted by Miss Burgess on Tuesday and Wednesday when she will present for the first time in Ballinger the ancient Arabic music.

Ok-In Officials Inspect Refinery Site In Fort Worth

The Ok-In Production & Refining Co., held the monthly meeting of officers, directors and salesmen Tuesday in their offices at 12 and Jennings streets.

G. Whitmore Merrell, president and general manager, who has just returned from a trip in behalf of the Ok-In company through Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona, reported that the company expected to acquire a block of acreage in New Mexico in addition to the 5,000 acres owned in Texas at the present time. The report also showed that the company's scout in Louisiana had contracted for several leases in that state in the Homer and Bull-Bayou fields which could be purchased by the Ok-In company at an attractive figure.

The sales force and directors visited the refinery site five miles north of Fort Worth, thirty-six acres owned by the company, in between the T. & P. and Cotton Belt railways. This site is adjacent to Magnolia and Pierce and is about half a mile from the intersection of the nine principal pipe lines feeding from the oil fields of Texas and Oklahoma.

The advisability of the ultimate construction of a 15,000 barrel capacity refinery was considered by the board and officers. The Ok-In company will hasten the materialization of their present plans for a 15,000 barrel capacity plant.—Fort Worth Record.

PROBING WEST TEXAS RAILWAY CONGESTION

STAMFORD, Feb. 11.—The appalling rail congestion of West Texas will be thoroughly probed by U. S. Railway Administrator's Special Representative, Felix M. Williams in an exhaustive trip of inspection in connection with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in an effort to solve the present grievous situation. The representative who reached Stamford today, will be accompanied on the trip by an official of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He was detailed to inspection by the U. S. Railway Administration upon the insistent solicitation of Congressmen Hudspeth, Lanham, Jones and Parrish, following endless complaint filed through the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The cotton situation will be given particular study to the end that recommendations for its clarification may be made. It is reported that many towns in the Panhandle and Central West Texas are filled with cotton which has been seeking movement for many weeks. The special representative the West Texas Chamber of Commerce official will leave tomorrow for Spur, the first town to be visited, to make a thorough inspection, five thousand bales of cotton lie exposed to the elements there because the railroads have declined to handle it. The situation at other places is represented as equally as bad.

Repetition of complaints lodged with the organization and subsequent appeals to the railroad administration to eliminate the situation have at least gained the ears of Washington authorities. The organization and the complainants now have the opportunity to prove their assertions about the bad rail situation. It is a foregone conclusion that the places visited will reveal an urgency of action which could not be adequately described or expressed in correspondence. Following the special representatives examination it is believed that extraordinary procedure will be taken by the government to ameliorate the undesirable conditions stifling the progress of the West.

JAMES COUZENS OF DETROIT

Fourteen years ago James Couzens was a clerk in the office of a coal dealer in Detroit. Henry Ford was organizing his automobile company and Couzens had a chance to invest in it. He looked into the project and decided that it was going to be very profitable.

Having once come to the decision Couzens put into it every dollar he had and could borrow. He was a poor man on a small salary. He had saved \$400 and he invested that in the new business, and \$100 he borrowed from his sister, and \$500 he borrowed from his employer. Also he gave his note for \$1,500 making a total investment of \$2,500. He had embarked his all in the new venture and had gone heavily in debt besides.

The new company paid a 2 per cent dividend when five months old, a 10 per cent dividend a month later and a 68 per cent dividend when nine months old. Last year Couzens got \$5,000,000 in cash dividends and \$5,200,000 in stock dividends.

Couzens did not simply pay back to his sister the \$100 she loaned him, but he paid her dividends of \$97,000 on that \$100, and his employer has made \$175,000 on his investment.

Some will say that good luck made Couzens rich. But good luck had little to do with it. Good judgment, energy, character and courage enabled him to take advantage of an opportunity which a man with these qualities in lesser degree would have overlooked. Many men have judgment, but lack the courage to back it. Many others have courage but their judgment is so poor that they back the wrong thing and lose. Still others are wanting in the character which gives credit and makes it possible for men to enlist the cooperation of their fellows. The combination of these qualities is what counts.

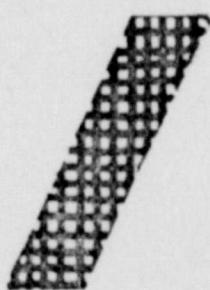
Mr. Taylor retains his home and ten acres of land, near the Colorado river and will confine his work to truck farming activities.
