FFA-FHA Awards Banquet Scheduled For Next Thursday

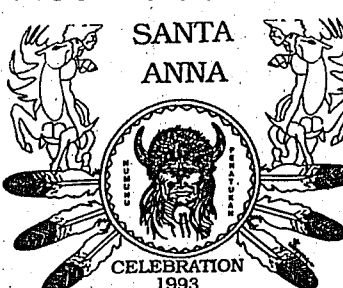

Santa Anna Penatuhkah Comanche Chief

A Series By Linda Pelon

The trip to Washington made the desired impression on Santa Anna. He was impressed by the power and the technology of the United States. Rupert Richardson reported that it was said that the Indians were paralyzed with fear when they boarded their first steamship and that "it was with difficulty that their escort prevented a panic". While in Washington the delegation was taken on a tour of the Capitol and "were much impressed with the glistening dome and delighted with the statuary in the rotunda as well as the colorful specimens of stuffed birds of display". They also visited the U. S. Patent Office and they were taken on a steamer excursion on the Potomac passing by both Fort Washington and Mount Vernon. A very interesting visit to the Congressional Library was documented in the *Cherokee Advocate* and summarized by Stan Hoig in his biography of Jesse Chisholm:

At the Congressional Library their attention was caught by the Indian painting of George Catlin on exhibit there, some of the original sketches having been made twelve years earlier in their own camps. The prairie tourists gazed with varying emotions upon the scenes of buffalo hunts, chases after wild horses and wolves, and Catlin's extensive presentation of Indians in their native costumes. The women of the party conducted an animated conversation as they pointed to illustrated aspects of their prairie milieu.

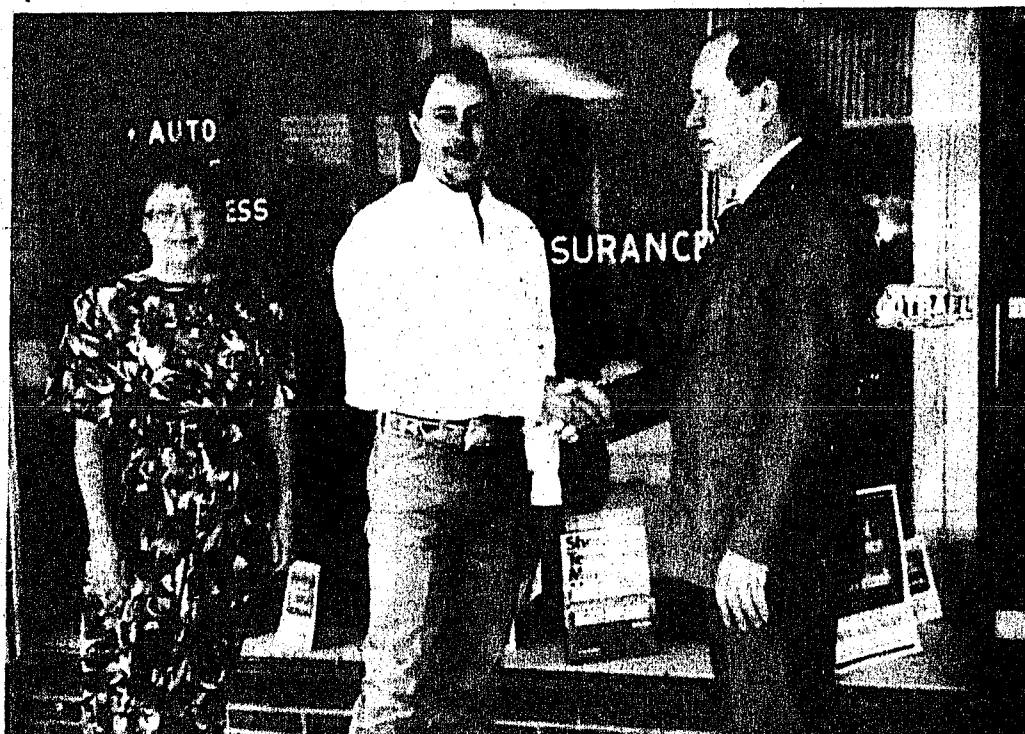
No School Friday, 16th

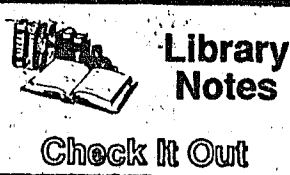

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Santa Anna Subject Of Special Project For Baylor Student

A Baylor University student with local roots used Santa Anna as the subject of a special project for one of her classes last year. Tara Leigh Smith, a junior art major at Baylor, prepared her spiral-bound book about our community after hearing local history and lore from her grandfather, Marion Smith of Brownwood.

In addition to information gained from books on local and area history, Tara visited Santa Anna several times, interviewing people about the town's history and folklore and making photos of people and places. She also had copies made of early-day photos of the town for inclusion in the book. Since the project was for a geology class, Tara used information from the Soil Conservation Service and also hiked on the mountain to secure fossil and soil samples. As a result of her work, Tara received an A-plus for the project.

While a student at South Garland High School, Tara served as student body president her senior year and was a member of the varsity debate team, drill team and several other clubs and organizations. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Damon Smith of Garland.

Tara's grandfather, a Brownwood businessman, was born and reared in the Santa Anna and Buffalo area and still has many connections with

the community. Tara was encouraged and helped by her grandparents with the project and expressed appreciation for the welcome and courtesy of the local people with whom she visited.

The original transcript of Tara's project has been placed in the Texas Collection of the Carroll Science Project on the Baylor Campus. It is the first Santa Anna history project compiled by a Baylor student. The transcript includes the original photos and taped interviews Tara made with area residents as she researched her project.

A photo copy of Tara's book has been presented to the Santa Anna Library to be included in the collection of publication on local history and information.

Recognizing Those Who Have Helped Shape Local History

Mr. & Mrs. Bruce Hibbetts

Bruce Hibbetts was born in Caldwell County, Texas in 1902, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Robert Hibbetts. The family came to Coleman County from Comanche County in 1920, settling 3 miles west of Santa Anna where they lived about a year before moving 4 miles north of Trickham.

The William Lee Baugh family moved to Coleman County from Cleveland County, Texas in 1892 settling near Rockwood, later moving to the Cleveland Community in 1901. Ruth Baugh was born and raised in the Cleveland Community, where as a youngster her parents farmed and ranched and had a telephone switchboard in their home which connected the Cleveland and Trickham communities.

Bruce Hibbetts and Ruth Baugh were married August 4, 1923. In 1938 they purchased the "old R.V. Cupps place" where they farmed and ranched and raised their three daughters. Kathleen (Mrs. Charlie Avants) now lives in the Gouldbusk community. The other daughters, Eva Nell, who was married to Alton (Buddy) Bengé, died in 1972; and Dorothy, Mrs. Joe Wallace, passed away in 1982.

Bruce Hibbetts died in 1985. Ruth continues to live in the same place the couple made their home for all those years, with daughter Kathleen looking in on her regularly. In fact the two were



in Brownwood one day week before last "fooling around" and having lunch marking Ruth's 87th birthday.

When asked about hobbies, Mrs. Hibbetts replied, "I never had time to develop a hobby since I always worked in the fields." And, of course, those three active daughters also kept her busy. She did in later years quilt with the Cleveland quilting club until it disbanded. Her eyesight won't allow that kind of work now. Members of the Methodist Church, Mr. and Mrs. Hibbetts always took an active part in church activities as long as health allowed.

Ruth said about their life together, "We lived here on the farm, took care of our family, and were always happy.....that's about all I can say."

This writer happens to think that's saying a lot.

Capitol Comments by **BOB TURNER** State Representative - District 73



The speed and pressures of the 73rd State Legislative Session is increasing, almost to the point where it is impossible for us to keep up with the pace. As a member of the National Resources Committee, we approved a Chapter 52 water district bill for Uvalde County. Representative Pedro Nieto is their state representative. A number of other local and area bills were approved as well as getting into the issue of the Edward Aquifer. Testimony was heard concerning the creation of a comprehensive water plan that will satisfy Judge Buntyn's court mandate concerning the Edwards. The process of hearing testimony went on until approximately 11 p.m. one night. Even though the House will not be in session Monday, I and a few of the other Natural Resource Committee members and staff members will take a tour of the Edwards Aquifer and recharge area, in an attempt to make ourselves more knowledgeable with the issues we face there.

A compromise was reached between opponents and proponents concerning trucking deregulation, that was apparently acceptable to both the Motor Transportation Association and those seeking total deregulation. This, like all other issues has two sides, I am sure, both of which have a great deal of validity. If due to deregulation of the industry, so many enter the business and competition forces prices below the cost of operation, needless to say, only the largest and most financially fit will survive, and then you can guess what will happen to freight rates, with unregulated rate-setting practices. On the other hand, it does currently cost most to ship freight within the state than it does to an out-of-state point, since intrastate freight is at least partially deregulated. Most of the airlines haven't really fared to well since they have been deregulated, have they?

A number of bills have been passed out of the House this week which will make it tougher on crime. Bills such as those controlling the activities of street gangs and authorizing school districts to employ and commission peace officers and armed security guards for those public schools who are having trouble with crime and violence in their facilities have passed. Quite a few of our major cities are currently having such school related crimes daily.

Representative Bob Glaze and I got a bill through the Agriculture Committee, and the entire House which will entitle nursery stock producers to have property tax exemption on the tool of their trade, as other segments of the agricultural industry already enjoy. Representative Chisum of Pampa, introduced House bill 1233 on the House floor this week. This bill authorizes county commissioners courts to grant access to your private property, which was unacceptable to all of us in rural areas who are landowners. I, along with the number of other rural members have worked with Representative Chisum and I think we have tightened up the bill to a level that makes it acceptable and specific enough that it only pertains to such incidents as range fires, floods, and extreme snow storms—then only for the protection of livestock and persons and only with permission of the land owners. Thanks to a number of you for catching this bill, and noting what it could have done to landowners. It is worthy of note that House Resolution 52, recently approved in the House, expresses our concern to our U. S. Congressional Delegation about the endangered species act's need to be re-evaluated. More consideration needs to be given to people and economics. The number opposing such an action is a good indication of the attitude of our own Texas House toward endangered species versus the economic feasibility and actualities that we face in Texas and the U. S. today.

The pace of the House floor goes so rapidly that it is difficult to make sure that certain pieces of legislation on the day's calendar doesn't do harm or present a problem for those of us in rural and West Texas. A good example of what can happen if one "naps" for a few minutes, took place this week. On Monday night I got a bill approved in Natural Resources Committee which will restructure the Edwards-Real Water District. This was a piece of legislation that was being carried by a friend in the House for the Texas Water Commission, which was meant to eliminate those water districts which had not been active. I simply visited with my friend and got the bill pulled off the day's calendar, which allowed me time to prepare an amendment that will preclude our water district's elimination. I simply tell this story to stress how important it is that we work together, you, my staff and I, to be sure that nothing slips by unnoticed. With literally thousands of pieces of legislation in the mill during the session and the speed with which all of this moves at this time during the session, it would be easy to miss something, such as this water district issue, that could be a disaster for those of us in our part of the state.

We need your help to make sure that we get approved those issues that are good for those of us in the rural areas, while at the same time making doubly sure that we are on our toes to defeat those issues that will create problems for us, our way of live and livelihood.

During the next week, we will see House bill 1776, which is the "right to carry" bill come up for House vote, as well as the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport bills, and hundreds of other pieces of legislation. My bill, which places burden of proof on persons making claims about food being unsafe and making those who make such disparaging public statements responsible, financially, to those producers to whom they cause financial loss, will be on the House floor this week. This will be especially important to agricultural producers, but will be actively fought by the consumer groups and anti-chemical advocates. The House Appropriations bill will probably also make it to the House floor during the week. Representative Junell, who Chairs the Appropriations Committee is holding briefings for we members early in the week, before the appropriations bill come to the House floor. I will be attending these briefings, in an effort to become more familiar with exactly what this appropriations bill contains and does to and for us. There are a number of cuts in some areas of this budget, to provide the additional funds that are required for prisons and the Department of Criminal Justice and Public Education, since both of these areas are under court ordered mandates. The Governor's immunization bill is also adding additional expense to the budget, if it is in fact approved. Even though the state's projected income is greater, even without a tax bill, for the next two years, these additional expenses that I have just named will necessitate cuts in quite a few areas. Of course, we have received lots of letters and phone calls advocating budget cuts and living within our means, but chances are, some of you will not like the cuts, especially if these cuts take place in areas of special interest to you. However, I think it is important to live within our state's income and we will simply have to face up to

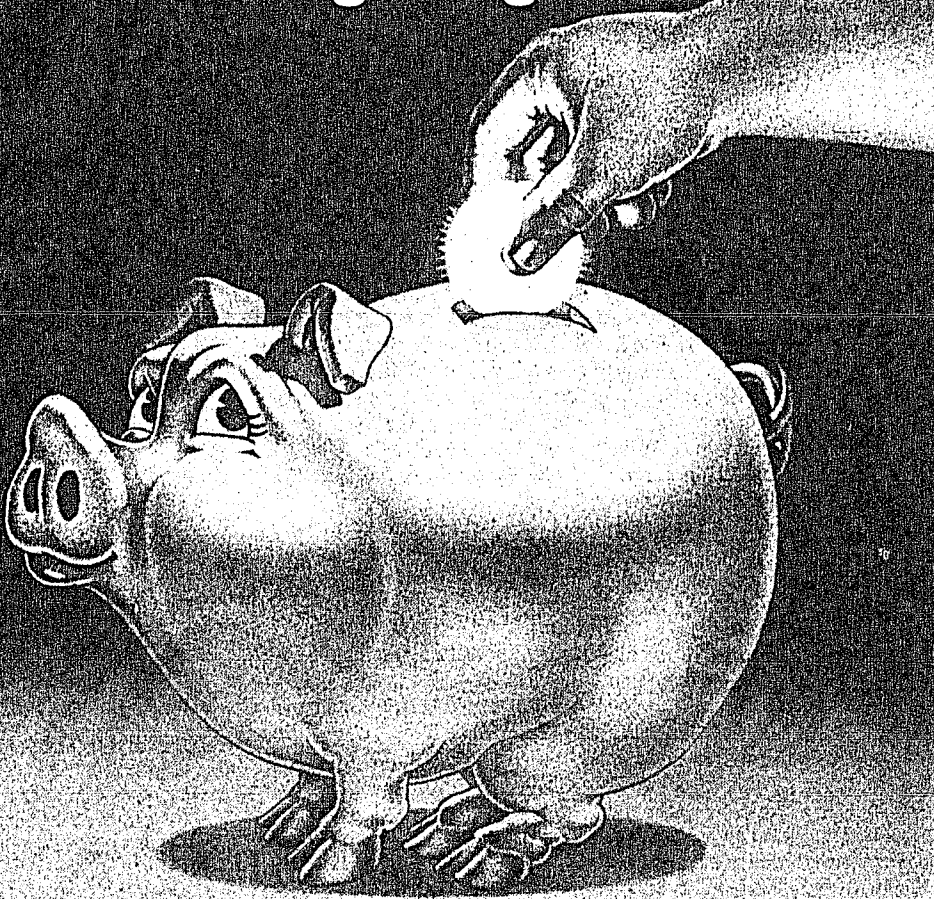

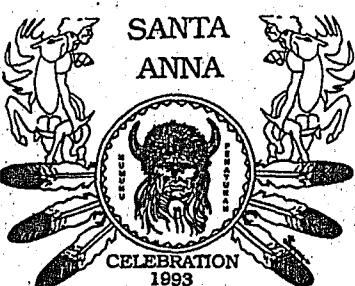

District Court Hears Number Of Cases Recently

The following cases were presented for disposition by District Attorney Ross L. Jones before the Honorable John Weeks in the 42nd District Court of Coleman County, Texas, on Thursday, April 8, 1993:

The crisis in this aspect of health care is acute because nursing schools have neither the resources nor the faculty needed to accommodate the thousands who want to enter the profession. In 1992, more than 6,000 prospective students were rejected, primarily because of a shortage of qualified teachers.

One Survey estimates that each month, 50,000 new positions open for nurses in the nation's health care system.

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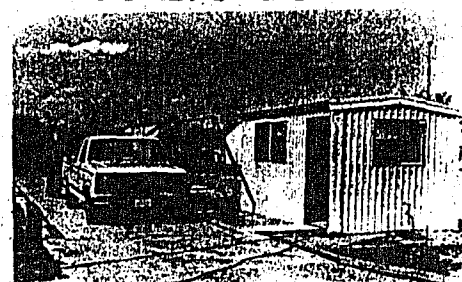
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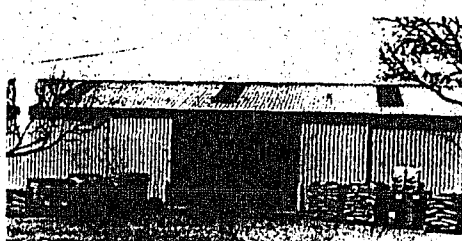

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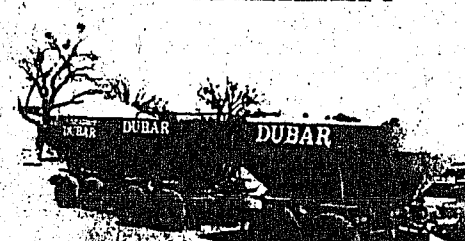
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
