BRITISH BACK AMERICA IN OPEN DOOR POLICY

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Nov. 27.—Preparation for a separate treaty between Turkey and the United States is under consideration at Lausanne, says a dispatch to the Paris Temps by its correspondent. This report suggests that this perhaps was the subject of yesterday's long conversation between Ambassador Richard Washburn Child, the American representative, and Ismet Pasha, Kemalist representative.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Nov. 27.—Lord Curzon, British foreign secretary, today authorized the official statement to the press of the world, saying that England supports the United States in the "open door" policy in dealing with Turkey. The British also regard the San Remo agreement for a division of the Mosul oil district as null and void. The Mosul oil fields are a part of Turkish property it was declared.

"When the time comes to make oil concessions to foreigners in that rich district, Americans will get first chance," Dr. Rizanur Bey, one of the Turkish plenipotentiaries at the conference, declared to press correspondents today.

Dr. Bey said that American capital was needed in Turkey and he declared that Turkey preferred to deal with the Americans because they worked concessions on a strictly business basis, and without seeking to advance the interests of their government by mixing in politics.

MAN HELD FOR ROBBING STORE

Harry Rednick is being held in the Ballinger jail in connection with burglary charges growing out of the burglarizing of two stores at Winters last Friday night. Rednick was apprehended at Moran by a ranger Saturday and Sheriff Flynt went to Moran Sunday and brought the man and a truck load of goods back with him.

Mr. Flynt was called to Winters Saturday morning to investigate the robbery. Some time during Friday night the store of the Harwell-Clements Co., and a Jew store at Winters were burglarized. The robber, or robbers, broke the glass in the door and opened the door from the inside. It was difficult to determine what the burglars got away with, but a considerable quantity of goods was missing.

Getting a clue the officer communicated with the officers at Moran and asked them to watch out for a truck loaded with goods. The man being held was arrested at Moran as he was backing his truck up to the back door of a store at that place preparatory to unloading the goods. He had about \$800 worth of goods on the truck, and it is alleged that the goods corresponded with the goods stolen at Winters.

It is claimed that Rednick was connected with the Jew store at Winters, where the robbery was committed, and had been sleeping in the store.

TOTAL GINNINGS IN COUNTY NEAR 40,000 BALES

Runnels county gins must tie out 1301 more bales of cotton to bring the grand and final total for the season up to 40,000 bales. According to figures compiled by Oscar Pearson, the gins of the county had ginned up to Saturday night a total of 38,699 bales. It is believed that there is sufficient cotton in the county to bring the season's run up to 40,000, the maximum estimate made during the early fall. This is compared with 24,400 bales ginned last season. Following are the figures as reported by Mr. Pearson:

SINGERS CALLED ON TO MEET FOR PRACTICE

The members of the various choirs of the city are requested to meet at the Carnegie Library at seven o'clock tonight for the purpose of arranging music for the union Thanksgiving service. All members of all choirs are urged to be present.

DENTON.—More than 100 acres of berries will be planted during this fall and winter in Denton county. The varieties are both dewberries and blackberries and the new fields will range from one to twenty-five acres.

Jim Dalton, John Drake and J. H. Seay were allowed bond in the sum of \$500 each, following filing of charges in the justice court at Ballinger Monday morning, charging the men with transporting intoxicating liquor in violation of the prohibition law. The men were placed in jail Sunday night. All the men live at Winters, or at least have been making headquarters there for some time. It is said that they would have no trouble making bond, which will hold them over to await action of the grand jury.

The officers held in connection with the charges a Ford touring car, the property of Seay, and a truck which was in charge of Dalton at the time the men were arrested. The officers confiscated these vehicles together with several gallons of liquor, and will hold the cars subject to action of the court.

Three men were in the Ballinger jail Monday morning waiting preliminary hearings, or action of the court, on charges of violating the Dean prohibition law. According to the officers they will be held pending the action of the grand jury, at which time it is expected that they will be indicted either on charges of transporting intoxicating liquors, or on charges of possession. The men are J. H. Seay, J. M. Drake and T. L. Dalton, and they were all arrested on the Winters Abilene road a short distance North of Winters about nine o'clock Sunday night, by Sheriff Flynt, and two deputies, C. Kornegay and C. R. High-tower.

It was an accidental catch for the officers, and was perhaps due to Mr. Kornegay's keen faculty for locating booze other than by the eye. The officers were returning from Moran where they had been after a man charged with robbing a store at Winters, and were driving along at a pretty good clip when they passed a Ford standing by the side of the road. Mr. Kornegay remarked to the sheriff that he "scented the stuff," and the officers drove on for a short distance, switched off their lights and turning around, drove back to the Ford parked by the side of the road, and flashing the lights on the party caught them in the act of sampling the liquor.

The three men were placed under arrest, the Ford car which was said to be the property of Seay, and the booze, was confiscated. The booze consisted of white corn whiskey, about three gallons, contained in quart bottles and fruit jars. It is alleged that one of the men in a statement to the officers stated that they got the whiskey at Abilene.

FRENCH TIGER SAYS HE CAME TO TELL TRUTH

EN ROUTE TO CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Georges Clemenceau today declared that he would speak his piece out in his own way, no matter whom he offended. He is deep in his campaign for France, and he has already brought attacks by democrats and republicans on the Senate floor, and criticism from the British government. He has also been urged by friends and well wishers in France, it was learned today, to tone down his remarks.

In reply to his critics and would be advisors who have urged him to tone down, Clemenceau said that he came to America "to tell the truth, and to say things which will be of value to help preserve the peace of the world."

M. Clemenceau is due to arrive in Chicago this afternoon.
