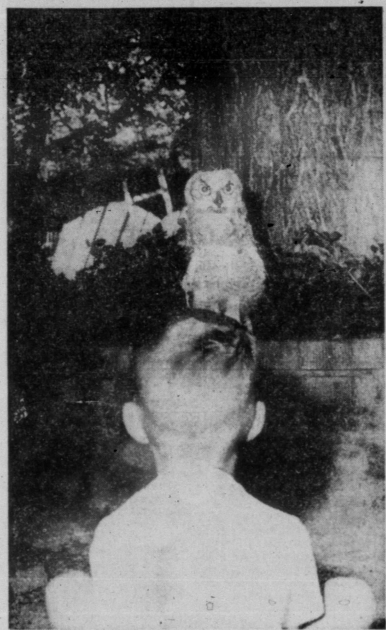


Cubans Say Prisoner Panel Returning

Living Costs Show Decline

WASHINGTON (AP)—The cost of living dipped one-tenth of one per cent in May because of lower meat and grocery bills, the Labor Department reported today. At 127.4 per cent of the 1947-49 consumer price average, the index has not fluctuated up or down by more than a small fraction in the last eight months. In May, there was a decline of four-tenths of one per cent in food prices, caused mainly by an unseasonal drop in meats and poultry. On the other hand, there was an advance of two-tenths of one per cent in nonfood items which go into the living costs of the average family.

Yugoslavia President Reported Ill Monday

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Tito Monday was reported ill with an acute inflammation of tonsils and fever. A bulletin issued at Belgrade by three doctors said "the general condition indicates considerable improvement, but it is indispensable to continue treatment under the control of doctors."

16 Reported Killed In Venezuela Revolt

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—The government today placed casualties in Monday's brief revolt by the Barcinona army garrison at 16 killed, 9 wounded. It was reported earlier that 40 persons died before the 250-man garrison in the port city surrendered under threat of annihilation by forces loyal to President Romulo Betancourt. The government did not say whether the casualties were given loyal troops or rebels.

Say Mission Has Failed

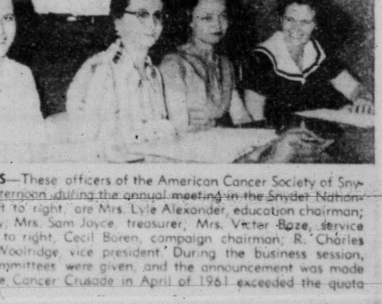

However, an immigration official here who has been dealing with the prisoners said he had heard nothing of their immediate return to Cuba. "I don't believe it," he said. "There are no such plans."

### County-Wide 4-H Committee Holds Meeting

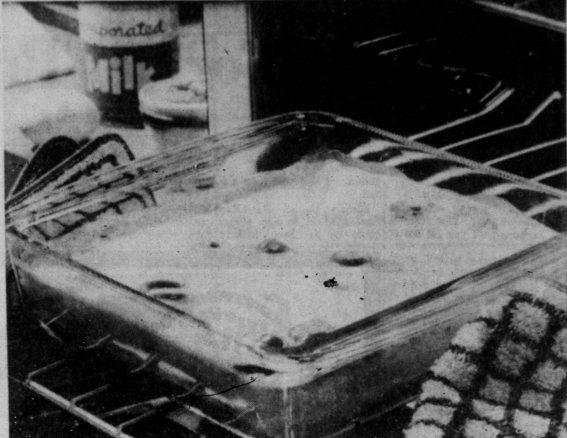
County-wide 4-H Committee met on Saturday to plan activities for the summer.

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 tablespoon flour
- Dash of pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups evaporated milk
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1/3 cup sliced stuffed olives
- Spread 4 slices toast with deviled ham; top with remaining toast slices. Cut sandwiches in half diagonally; place in baking dish. In saucepan melt butter; blend in flour, pepper and salt to form a smooth paste. Gradually stir in evaporated milk; cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens.

**Bleach Vase**  
Get a tall crystal vase clean by letting a chlorine bleach solution stand in it for a few minutes. Then wash in soapy suds with a sponge on the end of a stick.

### Strawberry Rice Dessert

1/4 cup short-grain rice  
2 cups milk  
2 eggs (separated)  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup water  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 pint basket strawberries (6 left unutilized for garnish with remainder hulled and sliced)

Cook rice and milk in top of double boiler over boiling water until very soft and milk is absorbed; this may take as long as 2 hours; replenish boiling water as needed. Beat egg yolks until frothy colored; gradually beat in 1/4 cup of the sugar and salt. Gradually stir egg yolk mixture into hot cooked rice; cook over simmering 1/4 cup sugar and 1/4 cup meringue water about 2 minutes. Mix water in a saucepan; cook until mixture spins a thread (about 228 degrees on candy thermometer); beaten egg whites; continue beating meringue until very thick and beat in lemon juice. Reserve about 1/4 of meringue; fold remaining meringue and sliced strawberries into rice custard. Turn into six 6-ounce custard cups. Spread with remaining meringue and garnish with whole berries.

# Ike Enjoys Former President's Role

EDITORS NOTE: Arthur Edson, veteran Washington Associated Press political writer, gives his impression of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower since he left office.

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP)—The nice thing about being president is what happens once you get out of office.

A big "welcome home" party was held for Dwight D. Eisenhower Monday night. During it the former president gave glimpses of an Eisenhower no one saw, or even suspected, during his eight years in the White House.

Who would have thought that Eisenhower, so long hovered over by Secret Service men, would give out autographs so generously that admirers would jam about him until it looked like a junior grade mob scene?

Or that he would leap nimbly to his feet and, along with former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, join a male chorus in singing a parody, "Jack the Knife," mildly poking fun at President Kennedy?

Or that he would have Negro waiters line up for him to shake hands in a personal demonstration of how Republicans can win friends and presumably influence votes?

Through it all, Eisenhower acted as if he were having a ball. This was a money-raising affair. Tickets cost \$100, \$50, \$25, \$10, \$5, and \$100 going to the GOP.

At such a price, there were serious moments, of course.

Eisenhower took a dim view of Kennedy's legislative plans. "Now for the school program, I can't describe it, and the farm program that's been offered Congress, it's even more of a monstrosity," Eisenhower said.

He sized up the new administration thus:

"The picture of government, as I see it, is of a gigantic Santa Claus, and we're dancing around the Christmas tree, hoping for our presents. But each package is marked in fine print, so we don't have to read it, you don't have to pay for this, but your grandchildren will."

But while Eisenhower went about his chores relaxed and

folksy, Nixon was businesslike as usual. Nixon returned to a theme he used when he first broke his imposed silence on the Kennedy administration more than a month ago.

Nixon's thesis, that Kennedy has failed in foreign affairs because he has been "talking big

and acting little" is more arrogant, more cocky and more belligerent," Nixon said. He got a big hand from the 1,500 diners when he added: "The eight years of Dwight Eisenhower were successful in keeping the peace and keeping it without surrender of principle."

But mostly this was like an overgrown — and overly plush —

neighborhood party. Eisenhower was given a bust of himself. Mrs. Eisenhower studied the bust critically and then said: "It looks like he's got a lot of hair."

Eisenhower laughed so heartily that the place where his hair used to be got very red.

car. He had been shot in the chest. At city jail, the Gil girl said she and Escoto had been drinking and riding. A quarrel ensued and she said she was slapped about. She said she drew the pistol but didn't know it was loaded.

There is more than a sneaking suspicion these days that a large percentage of American tourists go abroad primarily to do comparison shopping. It's more chic, really, to be able to discuss the price of cashmere sweaters at Harrod's and the cost of gloves Aux Trois Quarters than to try to get someone to listen to a little lecture on the fine points of Chartres Cathedral vs that of Milan.

The news is that the day is rapidly approaching when the American shopper abroad will never know he's left home. Department stores and specialty shops all over the world are being transformed into reasonable facsimiles of their smart, abnormally merchandised American models by a New York architectural firm specializing in store planning and design.

The firm of Copeland, Novak and Israel built and designed more than 10,000,000 square feet of store space in the United States, but it is responsible for American look stores in England, France, the Netherlands, Brazil, Australia, South Africa, Mexico and Ireland, to name a few.

Right now Peter Copeland, who heads the firm, is planning a new store in Amsterdam. His clients want the American look and he believes the conservative Dutch housewife will buy it wholeheartedly, too, with perhaps one balky exception.

"She must be educated to pre-packaged goods," Copeland said recently in his midtown office. "She still likes to pinch the merchandise. Will she be satisfied to pinch through cellophane?"

"The steady rise of substantial middle class in Europe since World War II is causing a revolution in merchandising on the continent, including the creation of suburban stores," Copeland added. "In Eng-

At the moment his drawing board is full of plans for the 1964 New York World's Fair.

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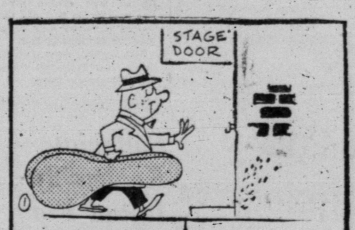
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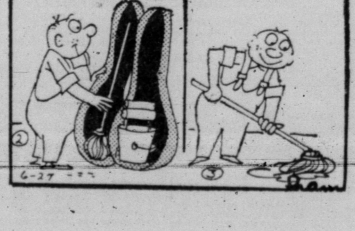

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### Test Program For Redstone Is Concluded

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Redstone, the "old reliable" rocket which became America's first big ballistic missile, satellite booster and man-in-space vehicle, has ended its military test program after eight years.

The slender, 69-foot rocket experienced its final practice firing as a military weapon Monday night and it performed in characteristic fashion, smacking a target 200 miles down the Atlantic Range. The Army reported the success, 41st in 43 test launchings.

Only three more Redstones are scheduled to be fired from the Cape. These are modified rockets which will hoist three human astronauts on suborbital space flights similar to that of Alan B. Shepard Jr. on May 5. Shepard's space capsule hurtled 115 miles high and 302 miles down range.

As the Redstone blazed into a cloudy Florida night, Navy technicians sought the cause of a Polaris missile failure earlier in the day.

A second-stage malfunction plunged the Polaris into the ocean far short of its intended 1,600-mile goal after it was launched from a tube in the deck of the USS Observation Island. The missile-firing ship was cruising about seven miles off the Florida shore.

The failure was only the fourth in 13 firings of the "second generation" Polaris A2 model.

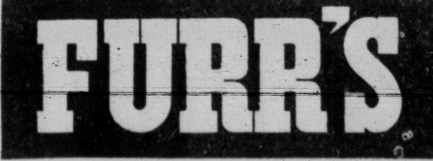

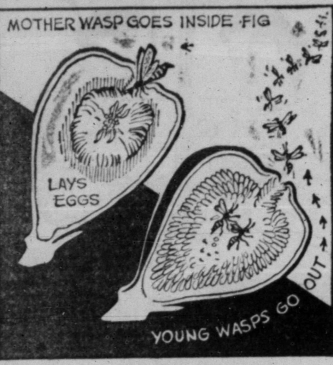

Opposition To Reservoir Is Heard

By BOB ROOKER -AUSTIN (AP)—The State Board of Water Engineers heard opposition today to the proposed Toledo Bend Dam and reservoir on the Sabine River.

Proponents presented their case Monday. Testimony came from the Sabine River Authority, the head of an engineering firm which did the feasibility study of the project, and a Louisiana official.

The authority is asking the board to approve the Sabine River project 23 miles northeast of Newton.

Also, he said, the reservoir would be destructive to large areas of natural resources and would be detrimental to many people now employed in the area.

If approved the reservoir would be 100 miles long and would hold 4,477,000 acre feet of water. It would cover about 181,000 acres of land in the two states, including 35,000 acres of national forest lands.

Testifying for the project were D. N. Beasley, president of the Texas Sabine River Authority, John Simmons, executive vice president and general manager of the authority; Homer Belanger, of the Louisiana Department of Public Works and the Louisiana Sabine River Authority; and James Cotton, consulting engineer from Dallas.

Of the \$54 million estimated cost of the project, \$30 million could come from the two states with the rest from revenue bonds.

JFK Doing Best On Home Front

By JAMES MARLOW Associated Press News Analyst WASHINGTON (AP) - President Kennedy is doing best in the fields he knows best: politics and Congress. His biggest setbacks have been in foreign affairs.

There, where his experience is least, he's still an unknown quantity. The domestic program Kennedy asked Congress to approve is pretty much middle-of-the-road.

It's the kind of program Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson might have offered if he had won the presidency. He's a middle-roader, too.

Johnson, when he was the Senate's Democratic leader, was a superb manager, which also means compromiser, in getting action on legislation he wanted.

In his 14 years in Congress Kennedy learned the ropes, too. The result: Kennedy's aides, helped by his personal prodding, have worked hard on the legislators to bless his programs, although this necessary but behind-the-scenes kind of day-to-day chore doesn't make headlines.

Before Congress goes home this month Kennedy may have suffered complete defeat on some major programs, but his overall record should look pretty good. It does already.

In foreign affairs—where he has not shown the same kind of sure-footedness he has in domestic matters—he cannot take credit for a single outstanding action.

Because of his performance in his biggest foreign moves so far—Cuba and Laos—former Vice president Richard M. Nixon cracked "timid" at him.

His judgment was bad, as approving the half-baked, and therefore disastrous, Cuban invasion. And, while he talked studiously about stopping the Communist advance in Laos, his follow-through was the essence of mildness.

Other tests, some unphased now, lie ahead. But the most immediate one, and perhaps the biggest, is a showdown with Premier Khrushchev over Berlin. At the moment #6 seems firm on this, but pretty quiet on the other.

Of the "big five" major domestic programs Kennedy wanted Congress to approve, he has already won out on three: a huge housing bill, help for depressed areas, and raising the minimum wage.

But the other two—federal aid for schools and old age medical care—he may get exactly nothing. Here is a quick rundown on major items in his domestic record so far—

Passed by Congress and signed into law by Kennedy: Aid for depressed areas—This \$304-million measure is aimed at attracting new industries into areas which need them and to train workers with skills no longer needed where they are.

Increased minimum wage — This raised the present \$1-an-hour minimum to \$1.15 this year, to \$1.25 in two years, and added 3.6 million workers to the 24 million already covered by the minimum wage requirement.

Foreign aid — This \$4.8-billion program is running into trouble, for one reason because Kennedy wants to give aid on a long-range basis instead of for one year.

Still pending and in danger: Federal aid to schools — The Senate passed a bill on this but now it's locked up in a House committee and may never get passed this year. Still a big stumbling block is whether such aid should go to parochial schools, too. Kennedy opposes aid to church and private schools.

Medical care for the aged — This may wind up in the soup this year, at least. Farm program — Some kind of program probably will pass, but the one Kennedy offered seemed sure to be badly chopped up.

Complete defeat—Congress said a "flat no" to his request for authority to reorganize the Federal Communications Commission and the Securities and Exchange Commission, two of the government's most important regulatory agencies.

2 Critically Hurt As Acrobatic Pole Falls

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A 110-foot aluminum pole used in an aerial acrobatic act toppled over and crashed into a crowd of 50 screaming persons Monday, injuring nine, two critically.

Celeste Farnsworth, 9, and Mrs. Martha McCoy, both of suburban Whitehall, were hospitalized with brain injuries.

The pole collapsed at West View Park as "Kayletta," a woman acrobat, was only a few feet from the ground after a side down a sloping rope from atop the pole. The acrobat, whose real name is Kayletta Burn, had performed on top of the pole for 25 minutes while 1,500 persons looked on.

Cause of the collapse was not learned immediately.

### New Eye Treatment Discovered

NEW YORK (AP)—A Texas doctor reported today a new treatment to save some eyes from blindness.

He finds some stubborn ulcers of the cornea or window of the eye are caused by fungus rather than germ infections.

The eye infections due to germs are easily cured, said Dr. Wendell Gingrich of the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston. He spoke to the American Medical Association.

About one in 50 eye ulcers is caused by a fungus, carried into the eye by a speck of floating dirt or other object.

Fungus infection could be suspected if the ulcer doesn't heal through usual treatments.

Then special techniques can be used to identify the fungus. Gingrich said it can be cured by using a mercury compound and a sulfa drug, and that this treatment has saved the eyes of ten fungus victims in recent years.

The drugs can be pushed through the eyeball to get at the fungi by use a weak electric current, he added.

One man, 75, already blind in one eye, was found to have a fungus infection which already had broken through the cornea, he said.

An eye bank donation of a cornea gave him a new seeing window, while the drug treatment killed the fungus, and he still has one good eye.

### Kennedy To Honor Ayub Khan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy plans a state dinner for the president of Pakistan at Mount Vernon, George Washington's home on the Potomac River in Virginia.

As far as anyone at the White House could recall, this will be the first time that a state dinner has ever been given at Mount Vernon.

The President's wife drove to Mount Vernon Monday afternoon to make preliminary arrangements for the state dinner July 11 for Mohammed Ayub Khan.

Press secretary Pierre Salinger said Mrs. Kennedy was impressed during her recent trip to Europe with the use Austria and France made of historic landmarks for entertaining on formal occasions.

Mount Vernon is owned by the Mount Vernon Ladies Association of the U.S.A. The group purchased it and restored it as a public shrine in the 19th century when the government declined to purchase it.

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—The National Education Association, whose ranks have been split in the past by bitter battles over school desegregation, appears ready this year to take a stand on the issue with a minimum of hickering.

The powerful resolutions committee of the NEA convention has offered the strongest policy statement on desegregation in NEA history.

It falls far short of what many Negroes and many Northern and Western whites would like. However, it seems to have at least token support from them, and from Southern whites as well.

action at other NEA conventions. For instance, the NEA, with a membership of 765,000 educators, never has said flatly that it approves of the 1954 Supreme Court decision on segregated schools. This year's proposed resolution at least acknowledges that decision and the changes it has brought to the public schools. It is the first one ever to carry even a hint of action by the NEA.

It directs the officers and directors of the association "to be alert to the possibilities for planning and initiating action" which will among other things, "assure the schools; promote good will, fairness and respect for law; offer possibilities of reducing hostility."

## N. Khrushchev Says Russia Wants Treaty

MOSCOW (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev said Monday night the Soviet Union "will do everything" to have a German peace treaty signed by the end of the year.

The message, signed by the Soviet premier and President Leonid Brezhnev, was in reply to a routine East German telegram sent on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of the Nazi invasion of the Soviet Union.

## Dominican Republic Police Name Changed

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (AP)—President Joaquin Balaguer said Monday he has ordered the Dominican Republic's secret police agency reorganized and its name changed to the Central Information Agency.

Balaguer said the reorganization is designed to increase efficiency and protect citizens from excessive authority and unnecessary police action.

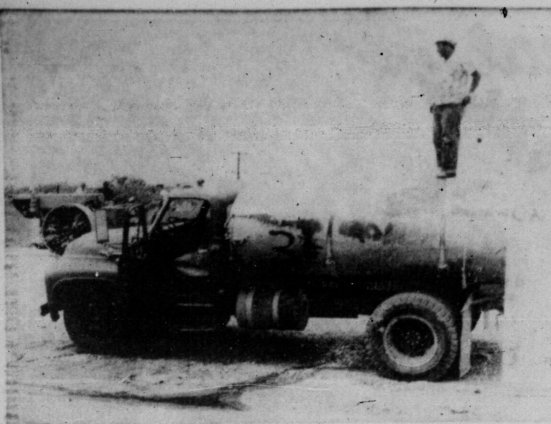
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## Missing Plane Is Found In Houston

## Berlin Taylor's First Big Issue

WASHINGTON (AP)—The crisis over Berlin stands out today as Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor's first big problem when he dons his Army uniform again Saturday to become President Kennedy's military adviser.

The White House announced Monday that the 60-year-old former Army chief of staff and World War II paratroop commander is being recalled to active duty.

This was especially true when Eichmann was in the field himself, directing the evacuation of 600,000 Jews from Hungary, defense counsel Robert Servatius told the court today.

## Sam Believes Education Aid Bill To Pass

WASHINGTON (AP)—House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas predicted today the House would pass an aid-to-education bill this session.

Rayburn did not say whether he and other Democratic leaders had their weekly breakfast with President Kennedy that House committee members were trying to produce school legislation that would win approval.

The administration's public school bill, however, is stuck in the House Rules Committee, where the majority has refused to act until legislation to provide aid for public schools and committees on both sides of the Capitol are considering measures that would authorize loans for private and parochial schools.

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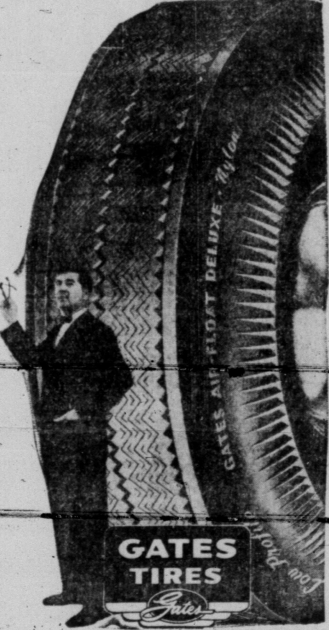
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
