DEVELOPMENT AT INTERESTING STAGE

No. 2 to be Drilled in Today. No. 1 and Enders-Cushing 1 Nearing Production Depth

Cushing Well Attracts Attention. Word of folks can be found at Enders-Cushing well No. 1 most of the day at this test is at a most interesting depth and everything looks like for bringing in a producer the drill goes much deeper. The past two hundred and fifty feet has been producing. Its alternating strata of gray, black lime and blue shale, or four feet of a formation geologically as being Ranger black was encountered this week and it is stated it will be encountered and then production may be expected. The geologists state the present formation is very bituminous and declare that everything looks like for bringing in a real producer. It is the fact that a caving formation in the McIntyre well makes it very hard to keep the drillers from running down on this test. Cushing Ranch Drilling Association is indeed fortunate in having test wells going down since it is them to retain their expert by pushing work on one of the tests when it is necessary to temporarily suspend work on any of these. It would be difficult to assemble these drillers if it was necessary to charge them everytime a temporary down occurred and yet the test could not afford to carry the pay roll when work was suspended.

This well is north of Brook and is an offset to Morris No. 2 which well has produced 200 to 300 barrels of oil daily for months. Account of the increasing amount being encountered the boiler at T. & P. No. 2 was moved back, Thursday everything shaped up to bring today. Additional storage tanks also been put in place. A few of our folks plan to go to Brook today to see this well in.

The Strike Situation Locally

With the strike of the seven shop crafts now about to start on the third week there is no change in the situation and from all points comes the report of the men standing firm for their rights. Disturbances are reported at a few points; in most cases the trouble being started by sympathizers rather than strikers, but such disturbances have made it possible for the railroads to raise the cry that service is being interrupted, mails delayed, etc. and as a result they have been given the assistance of U. S. Marshals and deputies and in some instances state troops.

Even in our own city where the men have kept entirely away from the railway property guards armed with shotguns and pistols are to be noted, and deputy U. S. Marshals have been assigned to duty. Not satisfied with all this warlike preparation the railroad company is not satisfied but would like the addition of state troops, according to the daily papers.

The men on strike here have obeyed instructions to keep away from the company property, have no desire to destroy said property and it would seem that the company is going to a lot of needless expense.

The men however welcome the coming of the U. S. Deputy Marshals, for they believe they will at least get a square deal at their hands. The following U. S. Marshals arrived Tuesday and are in command of W. S. Swan of Tahoka; A. M. Duke, Belton; James M. Bennett, Houston; R. E. Acers, Dallas; H. K. Sinclair, Fort Worth; F. R. Knowles, Waco, and T. H. Cook, Waco. These men are here to see that the U. S. mails are not delayed and to prevent interference with interstate commerce.

There is a likelihood that measures looking to a settlement of the strike will take place within the next week or so as the public is not satisfied with the service the railroads are offering throughout the country.

A MYSTERIOUS SHOOTING

T. & P. Employee Shot Near Railroad Shops—Mystery Surrounds Shooting—Men Want Investigation

Antonio Costello an old employee of the Texas & Pacific railway was shot last Friday night about 10:30 o'clock as he was on his way to report for duty at the shops. He is employed as night fire builder and went on duty at 11 p. m.

As he was walking along the track towards the shops two shots were fired at him, one striking him in the head and making a painful scalp wound. After his assailant fired the second shot he is said to have fled and was not recognized by Costello.

As Costello is employed in the Maintenance of Way department and in no way concerned in the present shopmen's strike the cause of the shooting is a mystery.

Warned by their officers that there seemed to be a nationwide plot to have mysterious shootings and disorders occur so the men on strike might be discredited the local strikers are remaining entirely away from railway property and are assisting the officers in probing these occurrences. So far an investigation has failed to disclose the identity of the man who did the shooting last Friday night or his reasons therefor.

Below are copy of affidavits from Costello and one of the railroad company's armed guards, made before Justice of the Peace J. A. Stephens: THE STATE OF TEXAS

County of Howard. In the matter of Investigation, in this Court sitting as an Examining Court, of the shooting in the head of one Tony Castillo on or about the 7th day of July, 1922, came before me, on this the 12th day of July A. D. 1922, Tony Castillo, who first being sworn, states on his oath as follows:

I was shot on the night of the 7th July, 1922, about 275 yards north of the Shops on the "Y" railroad, near the old green houses on the West side of the Y, and about on the brow of the hills. I was walking in the middle of the track.

It was about 10 o'clock at night. I go to work at 11 o'clock at nights.

I was walking along whistling, when I noticed some weeds rattling and I turned around and then some one shot at me and hit me the first time. He was on the west side of the Y. When I heard the rattling of the weeds or bushes I turned and looked towards him, and he fired. When he hit me I fell back and balanced. He then fired the second time at me and missed. That's all the times he shot at me—twice, and then he ran.

As to the details of the firing, the second time he fired I shoved him or his gun and he missed me. Then just after the second firing, I played like I was getting something out of my pocket and he ran out around the shops west. He tried to keep his face away from me, but I did see his face when we were close up together.

He was about six feet tall, and a heavy large man. He had a small hat or cap. He had what I thought to be overalls; clothes stayed close to his body. I do not know who it was. If I ever saw that man before or since I did not know it. It was a white man, I believe.

Bloomingdale, Potton and some others came to see me about this matter and I did not tell them that I had told the officers who the man that shot me was, and further I told them that I did not know who he was. He was smooth face, young-looking fellow; if he were to come to my house I don't believe I would know him, for I did not get to see him long enough or close enough to recognize him or to know him again.

I was at home that afternoon, eating supper between 5 and 6 o'clock, and stayed at home till about 10 o'clock when I started to the shops. When I got shot I stopped there a while, wiping my face with my jumper, and then I came back home, without first going to the shops, and at home I washed up, and stayed at home nearly an hour and went to the shops arriving there at about 11:05, the first time I had been there that night.

I went to my foreman and told him about it. P. A. Newland, W. R. King, came, and made an examination, sent me home, and told me to report for further examination at his office the next day—and I did and have had treatment every day since then.

I can't tell exactly, but the gun sounded like a .32. The bullet hit my head from the back-like on the right side and ranged on towards the left side and front side of my head.

I did not holler or yell at all when the bullets were fired, I usually go to the shops just about 10 to 11 o'clock at night on the Y. The shots were too far away from the shops for any one to be able to likely hear the shots. I never saw any watchmen that far away from the shops, but they could have been that far away from the shops, and have thought that they stayed close around the shop.

I was standing up when the man that shot me ran away. Then I went home after the shooting, I washed my head and went to the shops at about 11 o'clock, arriving at the shops the first time that night, a nephew going with me, and I went around a different way.

When I arrived, I talked with Moody Newlands, King, and Timmons, and others. I did not tell anybody that I had been hit over the head with something. I told my foreman that I got shot.

I have read the above over—I can understand English very well and read English, and swear that the above is all I know about the matter and that the statements are every one true and correct.

THE STATE OF TEXAS

County of Howard. My name is John Andrew Paschall, and I live in Dallas, 4319 Bexar Street, Texas, and I am 24 years old, and married. I came to Big Spring in the employ of the Texas & Pacific Ry. as guard, and worked actually one night, that being last night. This afternoon I was intending to go back to Dallas tonight.

I went on work last night about 7 o'clock P. M. and was assigned to the beat on the side of the shop near the "Y" and about 9 o'clock I heard two shots; Moody was with me and Phillips at the time the shots were fired, and he broke and ran to see what the matter was about.

Phillips and I were together on the same beat, off and on all night, but on the same beat till after the firing of the pistols and then after that we were on different beats and adjoining beats.

I was intending to go to Dallas tonight because I did not like the job, and Phillips said he was going back home because of his wife and children.

I had a thirty-eight and a thirty-two pistol; the thirty-eight being my gun, but no account.

Just after the firing of the guns, about nine o'clock, a large man, clean shaved, wore black hat, red-complected fellow, went in shirt sleeves, when he put us on the force (he was a sorter of a boss,) as he put us on work and duty and told us that Mr. Moody might come along and fire us anytime, stated to us that he had just shot at a fellow out on the Y; that he was sitting down with his gun lying in front of him, when the fellow came along, and he thought he was slipping upon him, and he fired at him twice, and the fellow fired and hollered "Oo," and ran.

I have stated that, also, that the above is all I know pertaining and concerning the firing at and alleged shooting of a Mexican about 9 o'clock last night.

At a subsequent meeting bylaws will be adopted and a membership campaign inaugurated.

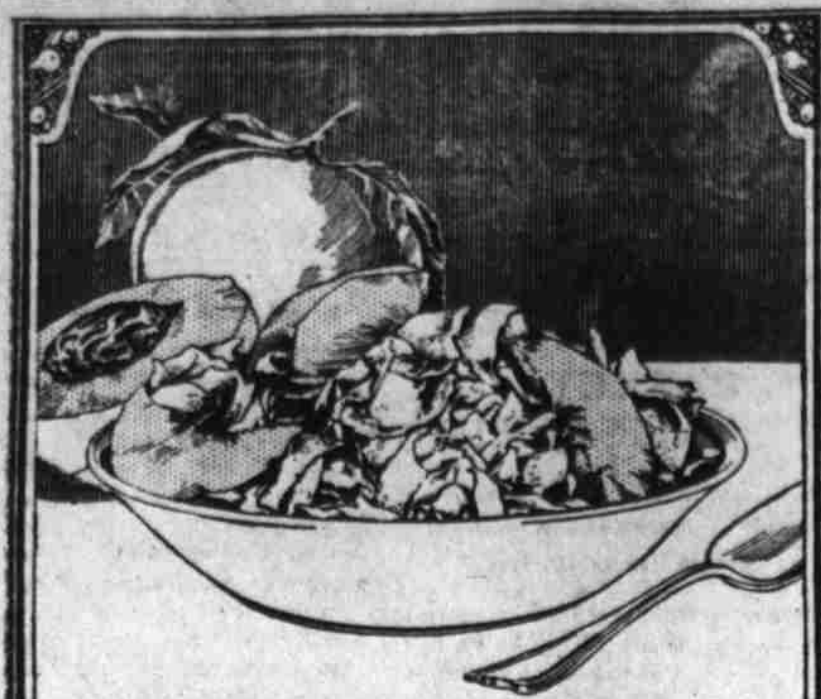
Candidates Speak Here 20th

The Supreme Court

That business should not profit at
the expense of the health of little chil-
dren is a universal belief. That child
labor is expensive to the nation, an of-
fense against decency, undesired by
those who put the welfare of the race
and their country above immediate
monetary profit, is undeniable.

But there are worse things than
child labor; things which could wreck
these United States much quicker even
than the exploiting of many little chil-
dren.

One of these is the overthrowing of
those foundation stones upon which
this nation is built; let there be no
foundation and the superstructure will
crumble. Let there be no nation, and
children here will be as are the chil-
dren of Russia—starved, helpless,
dead by thousands.

The Supreme Court of the United
States has just ruled that the 1919
child labor law was unconstitutional. Doubtless the exploiters of children re-
joiced. But there are many who love
children who have not criticized the
decision, just as there have been many
who are heart and soul for prohibition
who believe the eighteenth amendment
and the Volstead Act have done more
harm than good. Admittedly, the 1919
child labor law would have stopped
child labor. But it would also open the
doors to the federal government taking
over all rights not reserved to and by
the states, a thing expressly forbidden
in the fundamental law of our land.

Let us, by all means, do away with
child labor. But let us do it by
aroused public sentiment, by state leg-
islation, by education, by willingness to
follow Him who would have little
children suffered to come unto Him,
not by tampering with the strength of
the country where children are most
free, where children have most oppor-
tunity, where children are best pro-
tected.

Let us thank God for a Supreme
Court which can think of the country
as a whole, even before it thinks of
exploited children.

Not a Firemen's Day?
A fitting tribute it would be to the volunteer firemen who guard the property of so many millions of people if a common day were set aside to show public appreciation of the splendid service of these splendid fellows in the coats of men on fire. Day are beautiful and inspiring. There is even a little sentiment there for Father's Day, and this idea may grow to greater dimensions.
But, however, can wait, and he is glad to wait if we can see a day come into being. When let us hope it will take a turn. State laws pretty generally fail to protect the volunteer firemen. In some villages are quite incapable of guaranteeing any fund to take care of the widows of those who die for us or for the fireman when rendered incapable of further work.
Some extent insurance can be used, but this form of protection has not been adopted. Pending some state or local recognition every village can do to assume leadership and a local fireman's day. The authorities undoubtedly would not mind such a plan. Games could be held in the afternoon and at night for entertainment could be given.
Every person in the community should pay one dollar for a ticket. It will not take long to raise a fund which would be practically beneficial. It could be administered by a committee of citizens in whom the people have confidence and whose interest in the matter is well known.
Some other and better ways of raising such a fund might be suggested. The point for our folks is that something should be done quickly.

West Texas Pays More Taxes

July 10, 1922

Editor Standard:

I have just read the article in your Sunday edition of the 9th, with reference to the unjust tax that West Texas is paying in comparison to the Eastern counties of the State. This article sets out the facts as I referred to them in my opening announcement for representative of this the 91st district. I stated that West Texas is now paying more than her proportionate part of the taxes, and, that when I go to Austin as representative of the people of this district, I shall correct this wrong.

I would go into the matter more fully, but it would take up considerable space to do so, and, Mr. Reininger has shown where many counties pay more than they receive back. He illustrates the matter by bringing to point the conditions in the 91st Representative district, where the tax payers in this district pay into the available school fund from the ad valorem tax the sum of \$100,835 and received back through the apportionment from the ad valorem tax the sum of \$61,720 resulting in this district paying \$39,115 over and above the amount received back. Therefore, this matter should be speedily corrected, and this is one of the first planks in my platform that I promised the people that I would work in behalf of.

It is further pointed out in this article, that many—in fact, most of the counties in West Texas are paying in more tax than they are getting back, while over in East Texas, it is just the reverse. Take for instance, the following cases in the 39th and 53rd representative districts: In the former, they pay \$44,550 and receive back \$124,508 or a refund of \$79,958 over and above the amount paid in. In the latter, they pay in \$47,222 and receive back \$117,586, or \$70,364 over and above the amount they pay in." From these it is fully demonstrated that West Texas needs men to look after her interests. I have had correspondence with our State Senator, Hon. R. M. Dudley; also Hon. Adrain Pool, representative from El Paso, and with Hon. W. W. Stewart of Pecos, all of who are deeply interested in this matter, and they promise their cooperation in correcting the matter.

My fifteen years residence in West Texas has proven to me that there are many things in which this part of the state is not given proper consideration. I have close friends in the legislature from the East and North part of the State. In anticipation of going to the legislature, I have written them on some very important matters, and on which they promise me their wholehearted cooperation, therefore, and in view of these facts, I feel that I will

be in in position to give the people of this district real worth while representation, and I pledge myself to work unflinchingly for a correction of these tax matters, as well as all other issues in behalf of West Texas.

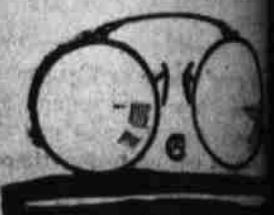

Measles and Mosquitoes

Dr. Royal S. Copeland, Commissioner of Health for the City of New York, makes the flat assertion that measles can be completely wiped out in this country in forty-eight hours. In the same breath we are authoritatively advised that the pestilent mosquito cannot fly more than one thousand feet and live.

What a reflection on the United States Government, if these assertions be correct, and there is no reason to doubt them. The one great necessary step, namely, passing this information under government authority directly to the people, is ignored. Consequently, measles still carry death and suffering to the young, and mosquitoes spread their poison over almost every inch of the United States.

It may be possible for the press, unaided by the government, to bring some relief, though lack of unified action undoubtedly must end in failure.

If the mosquito cannot fly more than one thousand feet, then every householder has it within his power to establish for himself at least a mosquito zone. Clean up for one thousand feet. See that old bottles and tin cans containing water are destroyed or emptied, that cesspools are kept closely sealed, that house gutters are kept clear. Sprinkle suspected spots with kerosene.

For measles Dr. Copeland's recipe is even more simple. Keep the patient absolutely isolated for forty-eight hours. How easy it would be for the government to lay down practical rules to destroy these evils and to enlist the people in a united campaign to that end, asking in plainly signed advertising under the signature of the President of the United States, if necessary, the cooperation of every citizen.

If the gentlemen, now so busy flitting for the vote, would press thorough legislation of this character, perhaps they might stand a better chance than they will by rolling the pork barrel.

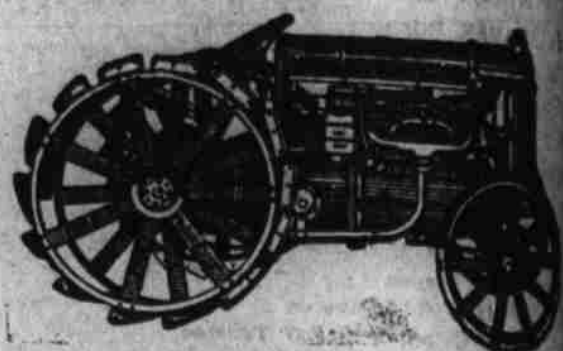

The Why of Things

To one who faces and deals with the problems of poverty and want and sickness and suffering, which makes up what we call the nether side of life, there comes a continual questioning as to why these things are. The reconciling of existing conditions with ideal theories is the most insoluble of problems, and yet somehow or other, either in harmony with those who strive to better conditions, or, for all we know, in spite of us, the world goes on and seems from age to age to make appreciable progress. We should be lost in darkest pessimism if we did not believe that that was true.

The whole domain of nature seems dominated by this strange contradiction at which we wonder in its ethical aspect. There does not seem to be anything that is not opposed or attacked or destroyed by something else, and yet that something else always faces its own doom a little further on—and so the thing seems to progress in an endless chain, and nature goes on ceaselessly. If she leaves behind her the fossil bones of species that have perished, she flings down the years new developments that make for progress. So we may possibly take comfort in Tennyson's conclusion, when he found himself stumbling in the dark, that

"Through the ages one eternal purpose runs."

All of this reflection is suggested by a statement of the Department of Agriculture that more than one billion dollars worth of damage is done annually in this country to farm crops, parks and forest trees by insects of various kinds. From the time that the seed is planted in the ground there is scarcely a plant that does not have to contend for its life with its enemies. It would seem a bad outlook for the plant world were it not for the fact that nature has introduced birds as a check against bugs. It has been estimated that 21,000 bushels of insects are destroyed by birds in Massachusetts daily during the growing season, while a Western authority states that 170 carloads of insects were destroyed daily by birds in the State of Nebraska. Just what becomes of the birds the Department does not say, but evidently in this whole matter nature has an automatic check upon destruction.

It is interesting, though, to sit down for a summer time reverie about the "why" of things.—Red Cross Courier.

Sabath of Chicago, widely known arbiter of family troubles, when he asked for a temporary transfer from the divorce court. In two years he has handled 6,500 divorce cases. He has managed to effect reconciliation in 550 cases and has helped complete the wreck of nearly 6,000 families. The judge is a happily married man and the father of children. He believes in matrimony. So this wrecking of families got on his nerves. It would get on most any man's nerves. It is the ghosts of the little army of children that gave him sleepless nights and caused him finally to ask to be relieved of the work. He says: "It is the children upon whom the greatest tragedy of divorce falls. They suffer not only from the decree which makes a divided home, but also from the notoriety. Their playmates at school point fingers of scorn at them. They are shunned, whispered about and made self-conscious and unhappy without any realization of the cause. But it is trying to decide the heart-breaking question of the custody of the children which has—if you will pardon me—got my goat." The growing number of divorces has come to be looked upon as a very serious and very perplexing social problem. Students of the problems of society have given it a great deal of study, the chief result of which are numerous compilations of statistics and the general conclusion that divorces are so many because human nature is what it is. Perhaps there is no solution to the problem. Divorce laws seem to be necessary, even though they are sometimes shamefully absurd. Still there is the wailing of the children. Apparently there will continue to be until selfishness and intolerance are banished from the world.—Omaha World-Herald.

This amounts to \$16,712.54 a month, or \$200,550.48 a year, against \$6 a year which you actually pay for your daily newspaper.

Candidate For Representative Favors Union Labor

Barnhart, Texas, June 24.—At an
all day celebration here, all candidates
were requested to address the voters.
First called were those for representa-
tive. It was learned that Judge Hill
had withdrawn from the race, and W.
J. Carson refused to talk, so W. D.
Riser was introduced by Col. J. R.
Brooks, and spoke in part as follows:

Ladies and Gentlemen: It is with
a great deal of pleasure that I accept
the privilege of meeting you here today
—not alone for the purpose of espous-
ing my candidacy for representative of
this, the 11st district, but to meet and
greet you with hearty handshake and
enjoy that big, broad, wholesome hospi-
tality so characteristic of the Western
people, the best people on God's green
earth. (applause.)

Ladies and gentlemen, I shall not at-
tempt to make a political speech here
this evening, for, I feel that on an oc-
casion like this you do not wish to
listen to a long speech, but that you
had rather spend the time in a more
enjoyable manner. Although I have
lived in this section of the state for
more than fifteen years, as I stand
here before you today, I see among you
some unfamiliar faces, and, for this
reason, I shall give you some facts con-
cerning myself so that you may better
know the man who proposes represent-
ing your interests in the legislature. I
feel that each voter in this district is
justly due such information concerning
any man who proposes representing them.
They have a right to know him
and, to know how he stands on the
different issues.

I was born in Jackson, Miss., Aug.
24th, 1884, and with my parents, came
to Texas at about the age of five
years, where my father settled upon a
small ranch and farm in North Texas,
where I lived until up in my teens. I
was educated in the high schools of
Paris, Texas. My father wishing to
make me useful in life, sent me away
to school, but after some time spent
there, I set out to sow my wild oats, or,
to see the world, as the boys put it.
After about two years spent in the
northern states, I heard the call of the
West, and sixteen years ago Sept. 12th,
I landed on the Flat Rock ranch in
Upton County, remained with this work
long enough to learn to love the range
and the cowboy's life. The big-heart-
ed, broad-shouldered spirit of the Western
people always appealed to me, and
there is no man who more deeply ap-
preciates these fine stockmen and their
splendid business. After I quit the
ranch, I soon purchased a newspaper,
and for the past twelve years or more,
I have spent most of my time in that
business. I soon realized my mistake
in not finishing my school work, so
by burning midnight oil, I have finish-
ed a course in law and, otherwise
equipped myself to be of service to my
fellowman.

I will briefly outline some of the
more vital issues which I favor and
for which I shall work in behalf, when
you send me down to Austin:

First—I shall work for an equaliza-
tion of taxes so that West Texas will
not pay more than her proportionate
part of the tax as she is now doing. I
shall work for a reduction on all tax,
when practical, thus lifting the tax
burden from the shoulders of the
people.

Second—I shall work for the estab-
lishment of an A. & M. College for
West Texas.

Third—I have always been highly in
favor of higher education, better schools,
better facilities and laws. Especially
does the rural schools need it. 90 per
cent of our children do not have the
advantages of a college course; the
rural schools is where they get most
of their education; it is at least the
foundation of their schooling, there-
fore, these schools should be made the
best possible, and I shall labor faith-
fully in their behalf.

Fourth—I shall work for the passage
of measures in behalf of the stockmen,
farmers, and sheepmen of West Texas,
realizing that they need many things
done in their behalf.

Fifth—I favor Union Labor; I be-
lieve that the laboring man should be
given a square deal. Most of us labor.
I believe that they, like every other
line of industry, have a God given
right to organize to protect their rights.

Sixth—I favor a lower freight rate
so that when our stockmen and farm-
ers ship out a car of cattle or pro-
duce, they will not have to borrow the
money to pay the freight on same as
have been the case in the past.

Seventh—I favor the soldier bonus.
God knows they earned it. Even the
great state of Texas could well afford
to give them a bonus, many states not
so large have given the boys a bonus.
I haven't the honor of being an ex-
service man, but, there is no man on
earth who more deeply appreciates our
soldier boys than I. With a wife and
three children, I was not accepted for
service, although I offered myself,
however, I was for months secretary of
the local exemption board, and later
until the close, chairman of the
board. I was county chairman of the
United War Work Campaign and
county chairman of the Salvation Army,

Is Hanging the Greatest Punishment?

A woman in Georgia is under sen-
tence of death for murder. The fore-
man of the jury which convicted her
said the jury was convinced a cold
blooded crime had been committed and
that there was no reason for clemency.

But from all over the State—aye,
and from all over the country—come
the usual protests whenever a woman
is to be hanged.

It is an encouraging sign; some day
the protest will be equally strong when
the criminal is a man.

"An eye for an eye and a tooth for a
tooth" was good law in ancient times;
it is good law yet for frontiers, for
places and times where a man must de-
fend his own with his own strength
and wit.

But there came One with a new law.
"Thou shalt not kill," say the lawyers,
was never meant for governmental au-
thority in modern states! One is
tempted to wonder how they know.

But it is not upon Biblical, religious
nor moral grounds that the protest
against legal murder—of either man or
woman—is gradually gathering head-
way. It is upon the ground of common
sense. If hanging was a deterrent to
murders, murders would cease. If
hanging is a revenge of the state
(which it is not supposed to be), it is
a very poor one: Indian and Inquisi-
tion and Chinese bandits can show much
better ones! If hanging was an ad-
vantage to state or society, more men
would be hanged!

Hanging—any death penalty—is un-
economic, unsound, degrading. The law
allows visitors to the penitentiaries,
but hides its legal murder from all
except "official" witnesses.

That is another good sign; some day
the thing now done under cover, al-
though legally, will be as extinct in our
civilizations as breaking on the wheel,
the auto-de-fa and the iron maiden of
the middle ages!

The Church Will Carry On

A single headline in the daily paper
tells nothing beyond the context of the
article it heads. But a dozen of them
may tell quite another story. For in-
stance, consider this collection, made
from four papers within two days:

"Charge Movies Ridicule Pastors;
Higher Critics Take Church Unawares;
Baptists Want Books Free of Evolution
Error; Science Conflicting With Re-
vealed Religion; Clergy Declare Di-
voiced America Doomed; Deacons Ob-
ject to Church Unity; Pastor Leaves
Church for Business; Explains Con-
tradictions in Bible; Dancing Enemy of
Church; Flappers Cause of Irreligion."

Evidently there is a cry in Mace-
donia, which comes from someone hav-
ing toes heavily stepped on!

It would seem, on merely casual
analysis, that the church which started
with a Carpenter and some fishermen
two thousand years ago and managed
to live through the destruction of
Rome, the evils of the Dark Ages, the
debauchery and crime of a few hundred
years ago on the Continent, the world
war and the spirit of unrest of this
year of grace 1922 can probably con-
tinue to exist, whether the movies
make fun of pastors or not, whether
Baptists or Methodists or any other
sect think evolution is an error or not,
whether the various denominations are
unified or remain divided, whether
Americans get divorces or not, whether
the Biblical contradictions be explained
or not, and whether we have the flap-
pers dancing or staid!

There is probably something wrong
with the church. There is something
wrong with most things. Nothing hu-
man is perfect, and the church is a
human institution, ministering a divine
truth. But the "something" wrong
would seem much more to be the man
who thinks that a flapper or divorce, or
higher criticism or unity or the lack of
it can definitely interrupt the march of
true religion, than the various, sundry
and almost always puerile causes they
assign for any failure of any church
to be perfect!

"Rubber and Auto Gas Made From
Corncoals"; "Prints Taken from Cows'
Noses Afford 'Finger Print' Identifica-
tion for Breeders"; "Juror Husband
Votes Wife Divorce; Valid, Say Law-
yers"; "Keep Jewelry in Shoes, Loses
\$4,000 Worth When Shoes Go To Be
Mended"; "Doyle Exhibits Spirit Let-
ter From Mother"; "Divers Seek Gold
in Lusitania"; "Office Boy and Day
Laborer Rise to \$30,000 Salaries."

"No man is educated merely because
he graduates from an institution of
education," continued Prof. Gregory.
"Education is never to be finished.
Wise readers of the daily and weekly
press can win for themselves that wide
knowledge of facts which make the
learned man wiser and the wise man
learned."

Men of 50, 60, and thereabouts can
recall as among the sentimental mem-
ories of boyhood their recital on de-
claration day at school of the famous
and mournful speech attributed to
Logan, the Indian chief, whose family
was slaughtered by the whites, in
which he pathetically pictured his de-
solation and asked "Who will weep for
Logan now?" or words to that effect.

Senator McCumber must feel something
like Logan as he reads the ghastly re-
turns from the Republican primaries in
North Dakota. The ingratitude of this
assassination is even greater in Mc-
Cumber's case than in that of the
Indian warrior. Logan was the white
man's friend. But McCumber was ev-
erybody's friend. He made love to the
farmers, he slept in the bonus trenches
with the soldiers, he was true to Re-
publicanism and yet he saw virtue in
the Non-Partisan league. He was ac-
cused, it is true, of being "a radical at
home and a standpatter at Washing-
ton," but that only shows that he de-
sired to be friends with everybody.

And yet in spite of his efforts to en-
rich the farmers of North Dakota with
the highest of tariffs, and his valiant bat-
tle to compensate her soldiers by a
bonus from the national treasury, he
is slaughtered and scalped and his hide
is hung up in the radical wigwam—
Baltimore Sun.

To What Extent is Law Responsible for Crime?

Legislators at the National Capital, especially those with legal training, and lawyers are much interested in the report of the committee appointed by the American Bar Association to investigate the causes of crime. It is understood from preliminary reports of the committee that among other things crime in volume in large cities is largely laid to "years of mollycoddling and sympathy by misinformed and ill-advised meddlers" which has "disintegrated the administration of justice." It has also been said that crime increases or decreases in a community in step with the swiftness or slowness of the administration of justice. Where the courts act quickly, crime decreases; where there are the proverbial "law's delays" between arrest and trial, crime increases.

What no committee from a Bar Association could be expected to report is called attention to by many who have the best interests of the law at heart; that much crime is caused by inequalities and injustices within the body of the law itself. A case in point is the committal to jail on contempt of court sentences three years old of a number of women in Chicago. During the interval between the offense and the punishment the women have married and have babies, and four mothers with children in arms were incarcerated. Governor Small, taking cognizance of their changed conditions, promptly pardoned them, but the jailer could not turn them loose, even though he had to pay for the keep of the children from his own pocket, because the lawyers held the pardoning power of the governor does not extend to contempt of court offenders! They were finally released by action of the judge.

Law which makes innocent children suffer, and which finds difficulties in correction of its injustice, it is pointed out in Washington, is bad law, and bad law makes for crime.

A further cause for crime is stated to be the intolerance and fanaticism of the reformer, which brackets an offense against a law of man with an offense against a law of nature and makes no differentiation between the two offenders. As an instance of this, Congressmen in Washington point to the statement of a well known Senator that the offender against the dry law is as criminal as one who commits murder, a sentiment which finds no echoes in any judicial mind.

That the United States government is not by any means free from the taint of unnecessary delays and injustices has been pointed out with an interesting if absurd example. Chairman Fordney of the Ways and Means Committee told the House that he was threatened with arrest for failure to pay a bill of 72 cents in his 1917 income tax. He made the point that if the government was four years behind in auditing and could find no better method of correcting errors than by arresting men who had done their best to meet the laws of the country, it was time the laws were revised.

Temporary Teeth—When They Are Abscessed

If you had a pet rattlesnake around the house it might not do you any harm, but of course you could not reach an agreement upon that subject with the limited brain power of the snake and so you would be taking a big chance that the armistice would be broken.

Your child could have one or even several abscessed temporary teeth with no apparent injury to his general health but what assurance have you that the apparently harmless collection of pus is not poisoning the child?

When the abscess really strikes and becomes acute, then there is no question about the damage it does.

Then abscesses may not only cause rheumatism and heart inflammations but the eyes and kidneys and any or all of the bodily structures may be attacked.

When a temporary tooth abscess burrows down the inside of the jaw and gets behind one of the protective walls of fibrous material that separates the layers of muscle in the neck, called the cervical fascia, a very serious infection develops which is frequently fatal.

In order to save the life of the child a very delicate operation must be performed, and that quickly. Don't take chances with abscesses of the temporary teeth. They are not only very dangerous, but the abscessed teeth cannot be used and the good teeth are not allowed to do their work because one tender spot in the mouth will interfere with chewing.

Of course, the best plan to avoid abscessed baby teeth is to take good care of children's teeth from the day
