V. L., who entered the service in January of 1941, was either on Bataan or Corregidor when they fell, and it is not known whether he was among those taken prisoner by the Japs. His fate will not be known until a list of prisoners of war is released by the Japanese government.

His parents had not heard from him since he sailed from San Francisco in November of 1941.

WATCH YOUR CREDIT, WARNS UNCLE SAM SINCE NEW CREDIT REGULATIONS PUT IN EFFECT

How is your credit? Every citizen needs to watch his credit rating after recent new credit regulations went into effect. Business houses must cut down on unlimited credit to those who do not meet their obligations promptly, under Regulation W. Here is the substance of the new ruling which merchants MUST operate under: Charge accounts during June must be paid by Aug. 10, or the account is considered in default. No additional credit may be extended to persons in default until he has made ample provision to take care of his account. Keep your bills paid promptly to help avoid inflation.

"In order to do more work, the local Red Cross group will hold an all-day meeting Wednesday, July 8, beginning at 10 a. m., at the home economics cottage. All women who signed up for sewing in the Civilian Defense registration are urged to attend.

A Letter From Home To Boys In Service

Dear Boys in the Armed Service: Even though it shall probably not be the good fortune of every one in our community to be able to write you through the medium of our home town paper, I know full well that I bespeak their true and full sentiment when I say that we are with you — a hundred % all the way —

As we review world conditions tonight, we can hear the plaintive cry of those millions of down trodden (though innocent) peoples, who are crushed under the heels of ruthless and heartless dictators — asking for deliverance — and as surely as the sun continues to rise and set, that deliverance shall come — and ours, after all is a blessed heritage to be able to have a part in that deliverance. It would be a weary struggle, indeed, if we were not bolstered by the hope that a better world, a more charitable world, a more understanding world will rise out of these ashes of ruins.

We are convinced that no nation could contribute a better, more stalwart and a more trustworthy group of young men than the boys from the USA — and we glow with a sense of pride when we say that you Abernathy and surrounding community boys are to a man among the cream of the nation's crop.

It is interesting to call to mind in a sort of service inventory, your names, where you are and in what capacity you are serving. We find boys who live here or have in the recent past, are making good in almost all branches of the Armed Forces. There are finished airmen doing actual combat duty in foreign fields, others finished, now teaching flying themselves, others are training, soon to win their wings. We find doctors, engineers, coast guard men, men of the Navy, Marines, mechanics, men in tank divisions, medical and first aid, cavalry, infantry, etc.

Back here at home everything is doing nicely — some of you recall that last spring, on account of the unusual amount of rain we got, we concluded that the elements had become confused and was making another Florida Everglades out of the Plains. However, this spring, they have definitely returned to normal, and, as usual with us West Texans, we have a good bottom season, but we need a few more showers for the top.

11. By volunteering my services to the various civilian defense programs which will be conducted from time to time.
12. By being conservative in my kitchen, home, on the farm or in the shop, store or office, thus saving materials needed in the nation's war program.
13. By trading at home to save tires, cars, valuable motor fuels and auto parts.
14. By giving my president my faith and support as our leader in this national crisis.
15. By growing a Victory Garden to help produce the Food-For-Freedom nations of the world expect from Uncle Sam.
16. By keeping my present farm machinery, car, and/or truck, and all kinds of equipment used in my personal or business life, in good operating order, replacing all needed parts, and making repairs where possible to keep them running, thus saving production of new machines for my use, and allowing the industries of the nation to produce war materials.
17. By producing more chickens, eggs, dairy products, pork and beef for Food-For-Freedom; feeding my livestock better, keeping their barns, sheds and other buildings in good repair to enable them to produce more and better food.
