

First VEE Serum Here In 2 Days

First VEE vaccine for horses in Mitchell County is expected to arrive here Monday or Tuesday.

How much supply or exactly when it will be delivered, nobody can be sure.

"I'm hopeful our first serum will be here sometime Monday," said Dr. J. D. Williams, local veterinarian, "but neither state or federal officials can be definite."

The veterinarian emphasized,

however, that inoculation of animals will begin as quickly as possible on a first come basis after the vaccine arrives here.

Initial shipments of the vaccine, still in the testing stage, have been rushed to the South Texas areas where Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis has spread with rapid disaster.

The threat has become so acute — with approximately 1,000 horses already dead and

VEE cases reported now among humans — that it has been declared a national emergency by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin.

A strict quarantine of horses already is in effect in Texas, preventing the movement of animals across county line. The clamp down is so tight that every horse taken onto a highway is subject to immediate check by authorities.

Dr. Williams urged Mitchell County farmers and ranchers to

be attentive to these facts as the arrival time for VEE vaccine here nears:

1. The vaccine will arrive in desecrated form and will have to be reconstituted here before it can be shot into horses.

2. When reconstituted into ready vaccine, the serum will be in bottles each with 100 shot quantity. And each bottle of 100 shots must be used within 12 hours.

3. Those who first signed up at the veterinarian's office will be at the top of the list for the vaccine. All vaccine will be administered — on the basis of the sign up.

4. Because of the 100-shot bottles of vaccine and the number of horses to be inoculated (already between 800 and 900 animals are on the list), Dr. Williams will map a vaccine route each day.

5. Owners of horses, mules and other equine animals — after they have signed up for the vaccine — are urged not to call back to the veterinary clinic for their vaccine schedule. Dr. Williams said each owner will be notified by phone of the morning or afternoon to expect the doctor.

6. The vaccine must be administered by a veterinarian. Also a must requirement is that the owner of an animal sign an official paper releasing the government from liability before that animal can be vaccinated. If that paper is not signed or if the legally responsible person is not available, then the animal will be passed up and veterinarian will be required to move to the next owner.

7. Horses receiving the vaccine are protected fully within 14 days. Dr. Williams said. Protection begins 7 to 10 days after the animal is vaccinated.

8. If an animal has received immunization for eastern or western sleeping sickness (this vaccine can be administered by any person) within a week, it can not receive the VEE vaccine at that time. Therefore, it is important that the veterinarian be notified of any recent regular sleeping sickness inoculations.

New Firm Opens

Franklin-Britton Funeral Home

Colorado City's new Franklin-Britton Funeral Home has opened for service under license from the State Board of Morticians.

The announcement that the establishment, located at East 5th and Elm, is now accepting calls and providing full funeral service was announced Friday.

Owners of the firm, which occupies the former Fifth & Elm Church of Christ building, are J. C. Britton, Thomas Franklin and Emil G. Franklin.

Also associated with the firm is Britton's father, Curtis Britton, whose father moved to Mitchell County in 1904.

Remodeling of the Franklin-Britton Funeral Home building has been in progress for 2 months and is nearing completion. This final phase of renovation will continue as the firm inaugurates its service.

The facility, with new wall paneling throughout and wall-to-wall carpeting, features private family rooms, spacious chapel and display room, modern preparation room facilities in conformance to state licensing, access ramp from the parking lot into the building — all in a compact, one-floor plan.

With the rosewood paneling and carpeting will be central heating and refrigerated air-conditioning.

The firm's "gold fleet" of cars includes 2 ambulances — a Cadillac Superior and Chrysler Town & Country — to serve Mitchell County.

Home of Franklin-Britton was originally completed as a church in 1930 with W. W. Whipple as architect and F. H. Strong as contractor. Building committee at that time was the late J. W. Watson, the late J. A. Thompson and John Hale.

J. C. Britton, owner of West-

ern Auto Store here, said he is convinced the citizens of Mitchell County "are definitely fortunate to attract professional men with the funeral experience and ability as the Franklins."

Britton is prominent in business and civic development within the community. He is immediate past president of Colorado City Chamber of Commerce and is now a member of City Council.

He left the Safeway organization to return to his hometown several years ago to open his own firm, Western Auto Store. When fire severely damaged his store in 200 block of Walnut, he immediately reopened at its current location, Walnut & East First, with expanded facilities and stock.

His service includes leadership in Lions, Colorado City Industrial Team Inc. and numerous welfare and development groups.

His father, Curtis Britton, has been associated with his son in Western Auto. And he remembers many trips "to town" in a buggy.

The elder Britton's father first moved into the county in 1904 at a farm 4 miles north of Lorraine.

Probe Is Tedious

It's Around-Clock Check

Investigation into the cruel slaying of 56-year-old Major Bell has entered tedious, painstaking check appreciated by few persons outside law enforcement.

It is the gathering, sifting, running down and carefully checking every report, rumor and hearsay available.

It is the matching of theories, possibilities and reports with factual collaboration.

And, it is slow work night and day.

Because Bell, night attendant at J&J Gulf Service Station on Interstate 20, was gunned down with 5 bullets in his back after midnight, most of the tips are from "night people" — those who work or circulate a lot at night.

This means extra night work for city, county and state officers.

Five days and nights of this

intensive investigation — with Texas Rangers constantly co-operating — has not produced the slayer's identity or a bona fide suspect.

"We've been working around the clock," reported Police Chief Jesse Browning Saturday. "But the clues are meager and few."

There is no witness to the murder as far as officers know. That makes the odds weigh heavily in favor of the criminal.

Each report of suspicious persons or automobile in the area is being checked by officers for minute detail.

Especially important is the linking of these reports with the time element.

Policeman L. C. Devorce stopped at the station and talked to Bell at about 12:20 o'clock Tuesday morning. Twenty minutes later, Bell was discovered dead by 3 youths who

drove into the station almost simultaneously.

Each report or rumor must fit into this time period between the moment Devorce drove away from the station in his patrol car and the 12:41 clocking of the phone call notifying police of the robbery slaying.

"We can't say for sure this is a crime by outsiders," spoke the chief. "Our inclination is to believe that it was the work of out-of-town criminals passing through or operating in this West Texas area."

"But with no known witnesses we cannot be certain."

Chief Browning's police force, Sheriff Lewis Claxton's staff and state highway patrolmen have been steadily investigating on the local level.

Fire Tab Studied

County Faces Decision

Commissioners Court will study for a while before making a decision on new proposed fire fighting contracts for county fires.

They listened to City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. outline the new contract provisions — to be effective Jan. 1, 1972 — then tabled the proposal until its regular August meeting.

Sadler and City Council had listened Monday night while Colorado City Fire Chief Pat McKenney requested the 6-point new fire fighting deal in City Hall.

Since the city's rural fire fighting is carried out under a yearly contract with the county, Sadler walked across the street the next day to pass the proposal to Commissioners.

A major change sought in the new proposal is for the county to pay \$2 for each fireman in attendance at a rural fire for every 2 hours after the first 2 hours of fire fighting. The usual lump sum of \$60 would be paid the city by the county for each of the fires, including the first 2 hours of fire fighting.

The new contract — with its \$60 minimum per rural call and \$2 per fireman for each 2 hours after the first 2 hours — would eliminate the present annual county guarantee of \$1,500 to the city.

Also, the contract would be for 2 years duration with renewal clauses.

of Sweetwater and Sid Merchant of Abilene, in and out of Colorado City every day and night since the slaying, are coordinating the investigation in the area and across the state.

Foot tracks leaving the service station area are still considered important in the investigation.

Police have checked carefully into every report or bit of hearsay concerning individuals in the area of the station before and after the slaying was discovered. One of these involves 2 persons and officers are still considering one possible lead.

They have carried out the same minute investigation of reports about automobiles seen in the vicinity. One reported to have been observed turning around and driving slowly by the service station Monday night.

There has been no let up either in the investigation surrounding an automobile seen in this area of West Texas Monday night — a car believed to belong to the wife or girl friend of a known criminal.

Tabs for dinners and other foods at highway restaurants Monday night have been included in the police investigation. These are checked with restaurant employees, related to hours and minutes of the night, then checked out with other patrons who were in and out of the cafes during the night.

Same type investigation has, of course, included service stations in the area.

"We don't know when the break will come that will begin to match it all up," said Chief Browning. "Only thing we can do is keep working and carefully checking every report or tip which comes our way."

In the meantime, about the only thing known for sure is that Bell was slain in the back by five .22 caliber long bullets either from a pistol or rifle — most probably automatic.

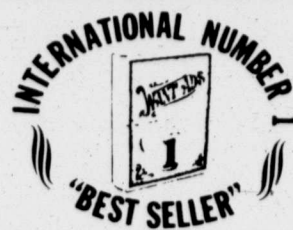

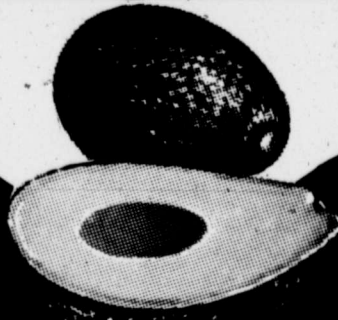
