SAYS ANTI-KLAN TWICE AS STRONG AS KLAN

(By Associated Press)

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Oct. 6.—Dr. R. E. Davis, former ambassador of the Ku Klux Klan at Washington, and now organizer of the Knights of the Flaming Sword, an anti-Klan organization, stated here last night that 30,000 members of the Klan had accepted an invitation to attend the meeting to be held by the new order this week in Whitfield county.

Dr. Davis said that the Knights of the Flaming Sword was fast taking the place of the Klan in Texas, and that its membership in Texas was now greater by two to one than that of the hooded order.

FERGUSON MEETS WITH DEMOCRATS

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 6.—"This is a two hundred thousand majority meeting," declared James E. Ferguson, former governor of Texas, and husband of the Democratic nominee for governor this year, in referring to the State Democratic Executive Committee conference here today.

The meeting was called by E. A. Berry, of Houston, chairman of the state executive committee, for the purpose of laying plans for an active campaign to elect Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic nominee for governor.

The committee went into executive session this morning. Mr. Ferguson was here to attend the meeting and discuss plans for the campaign with the Democratic leaders.

TWO HURT WHEN CAR TURNS OVER

D. D. Mallard, of San Angelo, sustained cuts and bruises about the face, and probably internally injured, and his nine-year-old daughter sustained a broken collar bone and other injuries, and two elder daughters experienced a narrow escape when a Ford touring car in which Mr. Mallard and daughters were travelling turned over on the Ballinger-Coleman road, near Valera Sunday afternoon about 6:00 o'clock.

Mr. Mallard and his daughters were returning to their home at San Angelo from Brownwood, when the driver of the Ford lost control of the car on the top of a hill and the car careened into a ditch and turned over twice. The car was badly smashed up, and it was a narrow escape from death for all the occupants. Persons passing along a few minutes after the accident rendered aid.

GOOD DAY AT EIGHTH STREET CHURCH

Sunday was a good day for the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church. Even one hundred were present at Sunday school, and the collection amounted to \$18.97, and was later made \$20. The collection was appropriated to the Orphans Home, where the local Sunday school has adopted a little girl, and is paying so much per month towards the child's support.

The attendance at both the morning and evening services at this church was unusually good and new members were received into the church.

JAPS ATTEMPT BREAK IN WAR

(By Associated Press)

TOKIO, Oct. 6.—Patriotic agitation for Japanese intervention in the Chinese civil war on the side of General Chang, Manchurian leader, was brought to a climax today when three members of the Taisho, a patriotic organization, invaded the foreign office and forced their way into the private quarters of Foreign Minister Shide Arai.

In their rage the visitors attacked and severely beat the private secretary, foreign attaches and other secretaries. The foreign minister was not present when the attack was made. The invaders were arrested.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 6.—Kiangsu forces representing the Peking government, undertook a flanking attack today Southeast of Sungkiang, twenty-eight miles Southwest of Shanghai. The attacking forces captured the village of Chuking.



Three Convicts Escape from Governor Neff's Honor Farm

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, Oct. 6.—The Houston police today were asked to keep on the lookout for three state prisoners, inmates of the Pat Neff Honor Prison Farm in

Fort Bend county.

The prisoners are the first to escape from the farm since it was established last Monday. The prisoners escaped yesterday.

ELEVEN DEAD IN CIVIL WAR

(By Associated Press)

HAVANA, Oct. 6.—The situation in Camagney, where the police followers of former President Menocal clashed last night with the regular gendarmes, was quiet today, according to newspaper dispatches. Up to this morning the total number of dead was placed at eleven, with about sixty wounded.

Communications which had been severed with Camagney have been re-established.

THREE FINED FOR DOUBLE PARKING

Three parties paid fines in city court Saturday night for violating the parking law. Autos were parked three deep, and where the drivers went off and left their cars, they were made to pay fines for it. In one instance a man is said to have left his car standing out in the street behind autos parked along the curbing for two hours, or until he took in a picture show. When he returned to his car to go home he found a notice to call on the traffic cop and get his keys.

It is a violation of the traffic law to leave your car standing in the street, unless it is parked along the curbing in regulation order. It is not only dangerous, but blocks traffic, and the officers have been instructed to enforce this feature of the law.

COOLIDGE PLEADS FOR TRULY CIVILIZED WORLD

YEATS TRICKED HER, GIRL SAYS

(By Associated Press)

Rev. Joseph E. Yates, who was arrested at Winters last week and turned over to Oklahoma officers in Ballinger on a charge of abduction, performed his own marriage ceremony, according to Associated Press reports sent out of Nowata, Oklahoma, late Saturday.

Georgia Fields, the 14-year-old school girl of Alluwe, Oklahoma, and a pupil in Yates' Sunday school, repudiated the minister after she returned to her home with her parents, and made a statement in which she detailed how Yates had tricked her into believing that he could perform their marriage ceremony.

The girl told the county attorney of Nowata that Yates said he had been told by the Methodist bishop that he, Yates, had authority to marry himself to anyone he chose, and that he could legally perform the ceremony. The only provision, the girl said Yates told her, was that she should answer such questions which he asked her. She said that the ceremony was performed by Yates in Alluwe on Sept. 22nd, and before they left for Texas.

As a result of the girl's statement made in the presence of her parents and County Attorney Anglin, of Nowata, late Friday afternoon, at least five charges have been filed against Yates. The county attorney said he would file charges of bigamy, false swearing, seduction, abduction, and he will also be held by the federal authorities on a charge of violating the Mann act.

Yates told different stories of his alleged marriage to Georgia Fields. He said that his brother performed the ceremony, and first said that he and the girl were married in Missouri. Later he said they were married in Oklahoma. He had only been divorced from his former wife since

OKLAHOMA OIL MAN MURDERED IN MEXICO

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, October 6.—The murder of William Massey, an American citizen, at Tomo, Mexico, was reported today to the state department by the United States consulate at Tampico.

Massey's home is in Muskogee, Oklahoma. He was terminal superintendent of the Metropolitan Oil Company. The report received by the state department said that the authorities had arrested a Mexican for murdering Massey.

SCHOOL DISTRICT VALUES SHOW VERY SLIGHT GAIN

Tax Assessor Padgett has completed tax rolls for the Ballinger Independent School District, and the total taxable values of the district amount to \$3,685,250. This is only a gain of \$147.36 over the values of last year.

At the tax rate of 75 cents on the hundred dollars valuation this creates a school fund of \$27,641.74. This will be supplemented by the state apportionment and by the tuitions collected from pupils not within the free scholastic age.

COURT SETS FERGUSON CASE

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 6.—The appeal of Charles Dickinson in the Ferguson injunction case was advanced on the docket of the Third Court of Civil Appeals today and set for argument next Wednesday.

The appeal is from the judgment of the district court at Austin in which Judge Calhoun recently held that Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson was qualified to be governor of Texas.

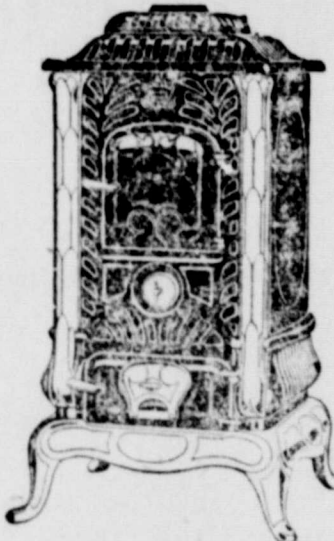

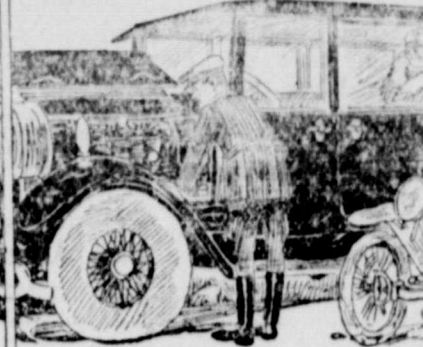

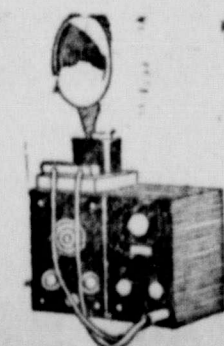
