

'GREATER LUBBOCK' TOPS 23,000

Frost Prepares For Mass Funeral Of Storm Victims

PALL HOVERS OVER LITTLE TEXAS TOWN

FUNERAL HELD TODAY; RE-BUILDING WORK IS STARTED

(By Associated Press)
FROST, May 8.—A pall of gloom, far darker than the cloud that spread destruction through this little town Tuesday, hung over Frost today as it awaited the hour for the mass funeral for victims of the storm in the debris-strewn cemetery in the afternoon.

But through the blanket of sadness appeared a spirit of grim determination. Throughout the morning a paean of hammers and saws

DALLAS, May 8 (AP)—The deaths of five injured today brought the toll of dead in the tornadoes that swept sections of Central and South Texas Tuesday to 75. A number of other injured were not expected to recover.

The deaths were at Hillsboro, bringing the toll for that county to 16, and near Runge, where the death list was increased for 26 to 28.

Working through the storm-torn town as dozens of carpenters rushed to completion the huge temporary structure that will house the Frost merchants until their establishments can be rebuilt.

Carpenters from Corsicana started work on the building yesterday afternoon, and a firm of Corsicana electricians volunteered to wire the house. Ten trucks sent by Governor Dan Moody to aid in the rehabilitation work arrived this morning and immediately began hauling debris from the wrecked business section as huge tractors made great inroads on the mass of wreckage.

Under the command of Lieut. J. D. Moffatt, six state highway patrolmen directed the dense traffic as thousands of people from all parts of the state attempted to visit the ruins. The patrolmen included C. E. Talbot, R. M. Walling, Wayne Davis, M. R. Mallory and E. D. Hinkle.

FERGUSON'S FIGHT OPENS

AMNESTY BILL IS DECLARED FULL PARDON

SPEER LEADS LEGAL BATTLE FOR FORMER GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, May 8.—Declaring that the general amnesty bill passed by the legislature in 1925 restored the rights of former Governor James E. Ferguson to hold political office, the legal battle to require the state democratic executive committee to certify his name on the ballot was started in the Supreme Court this morning. Ocie Speer of Waco, former member of the commission of appeals, led Ferguson's fight to obtain a place on the ballot.

Speer charged that the only question involved in the suit was one of validity of the amnesty act passed during the administration of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson in 1925 and later repealed under the administration of Governor Dan Moody. Ferguson's attorney held to the contention that the legislature had inherent pardoning power and that the passage of the amnesty act was the voice of the people as expressed by the legislature.

He asserted that the effect of the amnesty act was to grant Ferguson full pardon and restore him to all rights of citizenship, regardless of the fact that it later was repealed.

Speer claimed the Supreme Court had original jurisdiction in the case and that the plea of the executive committee that it be dismissed on this ground was futile. He also asserted the executive committee was sitting in bad faith when it asked the dismissal of the suit on the ground that it had not had time in which to act on the application of Ferguson for a place on the ballot.

He declared the democratic executive committee had no power to postpone Ferguson because of his impeachment, contending that in the light of the law his position as a citizen was the same as before the senate impeached him. He also stated the legislature has sovereign pardoning power.

Speer asserted that the legislature had as much right to pardon Ferguson as it had to impeach him.

DR. BAUGH NAMED MEDICAL OFFICER

Dr. W. L. Baugh, of Lubbock, was elected this morning as vice president of the State Medical association at the annual convention of that organization in Mineral Wells, according to a message received here shortly before noon.

Dr. Baugh is president of the board of directors of the West Texas Hospital, and was formerly president of the Panhandle District Medical society and also was at one time president of the Lubbock-Crosby Medical society.

The state convention closes tomorrow. Other than Dr. Baugh, those attending from Lubbock are Dr. O. W. English, Dr. D. D. Cross, Dr. L. L. Powers, Dr. J. T. Krueger and Dr. F. B. Malone.

Unimproved Homes Are Listed Here

Reports from four of eight districts in the city reveal that premises of 150 in number are not yet improved, officials of the Lubbock Cleanup campaign announced today as they planned to complete the program by Saturday night.

Every resident is being urged to take advantage of the remaining two days in order that the city might be cleaned of all trash and unsightly lots. The worst conditions are on lots near the mercantile districts, inspectors announce.

Aiken Given Fifty-Year Term For Cox's Slaying

JURY DELIBERATES ONE HOUR, 45 MINUTES ON VERDICT

LAMESA, May 8 (AP)—(Bud) Aiken is behind Dawson county bars today, sentenced to 50 years in the state penitentiary last night by a jury which found him guilty of the murder of D. F. Cox, cafe owner, February 28.

The verdict was returned at 7:30 o'clock in 196th district court, following a deliberation of one hour and 45 minutes.

Court Room Crowded. Six hundred people packed and jammed the court room on the third floor of the courthouse. They occupied every chair on the main floor and gallery of the room, they lined the walls of the large hall of the justice, they crowded into one corner of the room behind the judge's rostrum and packed the aisles of the floor and gallery. There were men standing in the windows and boys sitting on the edge of the balcony, their feet dangling over.

DANIELS AND CANNON CLASH ON PRO WORK

FORMER SECRETARY OF NAVY LEADS FIGHT FOR ENFORCEMENT

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, May 8.—That the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, plans a more emphatic manifesto in favor of law enforcement than even Bishop James Cannon, Jr., could devise was indicated today on the floor of the conference when Josephus Daniels clashed with Bishop Cannon and won overwhelmingly the approval of the conference delegates.

Bishop Cannon is chairman of the church board on temperance and social service. Daniels was elected chairman of the conference committee of the same name.

Brings Protest. This morning Cannon presented the report of his commission, and asked that two resolutions which were a part of the report not be referred to Daniels' committee. This brought an immediate protest from the former secretary of the navy.

"We want to make a declaration as strong and powerful on behalf of prohibition," Daniels shouted, "that it will be heard throughout the republic. For this reason the committee wishes to consider all suggestions on this subject before framing this declaration."

The Resolutions. The two resolutions which Bishop Cannon had asked to be considered by the whole conference without committee reference were:

That the conference petition congress to comply with the request of President Hoover for speedy action on all law enforcement measures. That the conference express its gratification at the "sweeping decision of the Supreme Court" on May 8—the so-called "bottle ruling" which makes it plain that the prohibition act was designed to suppress the "entire liquor traffic" and "clearly indicates that any legislation to nullify prohibition will not be countenanced by the court."

NINE OFFICIALS ARE ORDERED ARRESTED IN OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 8.—Hearing on application for appointment of a permanent receiver for the \$1,500,000 Universal Oil and Gas company whose nine officials were ordered arrested yesterday on charges of using the mails to defraud, will be held Saturday before Judge Edgar S. Vaughn in federal court.

Government Finds Fortune In Rich Oklahoma City Field; 'Run' Staged

EX-SERVICE MAN MAY BE HOMESTEADER OF LOST PLOT

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, May 8.—The government has found a treasure here. It has become known that two acres of land in the heart of the Oklahoma City oil field still is government soil, "lost" for years. An enterprising ex-service man has homesteaded the plot as was customary in pioneer days.

Following the "run" for land

20,612 LIVE IN LIMITS OF CITY

Smashing all known Texas records for percentage of population gain in the 15th Decennial census thus far reported, 'Greater Lubbock', comprising residents of the corporate limits plus those of the immediate environs, today was accorded a population of more than 23,000.

Population within the corporate limits of Lubbock, without enumeration of any save those residing in the city proper, was announced as 20,612 by Dr. Irwin E. Barr, census supervisor for the Seventh District of Texas. In addition to the 20,612 in the city proper, approximately 2,406 persons reside in sections adjacent to the city, figures showed, giving the approximate population of 'Greater Lubbock' as 23,018.

408.8 PERCENTAGE OF GAIN PHENOMENAL

Lubbock's percentage of gain, in the corporate limits alone, is officially listed as 408.8 percent. This figure easily tops Amarillo's 177.7 percent gain; Sweetwater's 151 percent and Abilene's 125.1 percent. Lubbock, Amarillo, Abilene and Sweetwater are the only West Texas cities of 10,000 and more population listed thus far in the 1930 enumeration.

Lubbock's phenomenal drive from 4,051 persons in 1920, Federal census figures, to its present 20,612 has been made without aid through oil discovery or other booms of unusual nature, instead being accomplished through agricultural and business expansion. The South Plains Hub is expected to rank among the highest in the nation, in its class, from a percentage of gain standpoint and will probably rank in the high 10, excluding cities prospering through discovery of oil or other minerals.

Census figures for Precinct 1, Lubbock county, which comprises a radius of approximately 6-7 miles with the county courthouse as the center, were also released today by Doctor Barr. Excluding the city's population, Precinct 1 was listed as 3,066, with 2,406 of that number applying upon the 'Greater Lubbock' estimate.

Tabulation Explained. Doctor Barr estimates the Benson-Arnett addition, joining Lubbock on the southwest, and Stanton Acres, bordering the Elwood addition on the southwest, as 800 and 800 population, respectively. There are also approximately 40 persons residing on state-owned property adjacent to the city. Total of these three areas, 840, plus 1,566 other residents of Precinct 1, who in all respects and purposes list Lubbock as their home, brings the 'Greater Lubbock' total population to 23,018. Tech students whose homes are elsewhere, are not tabulated in Lubbock.

Thirty years ago, when the 1900 census was taken, there were so few people residing in what is now the city of Lubbock that no figures were reported. The 1900 census listed Lubbock county as a unit, reporting the population as 283.

1,588 Here In 1910. Twenty years ago, the 1910 census did include Lubbock, the population figure being 1,398 for the city and 3,624 for the county. In 1920 Lubbock rose to 4,051 and the county to 11,996, recording a neat gain in both respects. The present census for Lubbock county has not yet been completed but will be ready for announcement within the next three or four days, Doctor Barr reported. The county's population gain is also expected to be outstanding in percentage.

Today's census figures give Lubbock unchallenged possession of fifth place in West Texas population statistics, being topped by El Paso, with 101,975; Amarillo, with 43,044; Abilene, with 33,120; and by San Angelo, expected to be 23,018, although yet unreported. Wichita Falls and Fort Worth, both regarded as West Texas in affections, at least, will both take places ahead of Lubbock, but their geographical locations are not so practical purposes, in West Texas.

Wires Carry Story. A special Associated Press dispatch to The Daily Journal today said: "Your census increase so far is largest reported in Texas. The 408.8 percentage gain is expected to remain at the top in Texas cities of 20,000 and over, if not for the entire state. Lubbock's census was accorded a special story by the Associated Press, so outstanding was its gain. Usual Associated Press census reports are held to one line and containing only bare statistics. Texas cities thus far accorded stories on Associated Press wires are Lubbock, Dallas, El Paso and Amarillo. Census-taking in Lubbock began on April 2 and was finally tabulated this morning. In Doctor Barr's Seventh District of Texas are included 17 counties, principal communities of which will have all been announced by the close of this week, he said. Counties under his supervision include an organization of more than 120 persons and are: Lubbock, Borden, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Frazier, Garza, Garza, Haskell, Hooker, Lynn, Scurry, Terry, Tarrant, Garfield and Kent counties.

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U. S. FLEET ANCHORS IN THE HUDSON

SIXTEEN NAVAL SHIPS
COME IN FROM SEA;
PLANES APPEAR

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, May 8.—With pennants flying and guns booming an answer to shore salutes, the Atlantic fleet swept in from the sea Wednesday and lay anchored today along Riverside Drive in the Hudson river.
From 57th street to Yonkers the vessels stretched in gray silhouette against the lofty palisades.
Sixteen ships of the line, seven battleships and nine cruisers were led into port by the U. S. S. California escorted by supply ships, mine sweepers and floating machine shops and a swarm of destroyers, which had arrived last night.
The U. S. S. Texas, which escorted the Leviathan with its returning London naval delegates into port last Tuesday already was at her place off 72nd street flying the four-starred pennant of Admiral W. A. Pratt, commander of the fleet.

**AIR FLEET OF 139
PLANES ABOVE CITY**
NEW YORK, May 8 (AP).—In close formation ranks like a flight of birds, an air fleet of 139 navy planes swept over the city yesterday in a spectacular demonstration.
Taking off from the aircraft carriers Lexington, Saratoga and Langley at Norfolk, Va., the fleet kept rendezvous over Staten Island shortly before noon and then flew over the city in a mock attack.
Thursday they will fly north over Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, returning here for the night and taking off Friday morning for their floating nests off Norfolk.

A high wind took a hand Wednesday afternoon to hold back the early qualifiers in the Lubbock Country Club open tournament, the result being that none of the eleven who turned in scores were able to do better than an 80. This was registered by Bill Yager, one of the fast-improving members of the local golfing fraternity. Yager is likely to make things hot for the boys in the first flight if his woods perform up to standard.

A tendency to "sluff off" in the qualifying round in order to keep out of the ranking flight has been noticed. Rather than turn in a score that will rank them with the leading shots, many have been known to play at their worst so as to get in a lower flight where the competition is not so keen. This brings up the question as to one's preference to be a big fish in a little pond or a little fish in a big pond. But, after all, it's in the match play that a golfer's mettle is tested.

We note with interest that Dennis Lavender, holder of the state amateur crown, has made the sweeping announcement that he will compete again this year in the West Texas association tournament, which is to open at Brownwood May 28. The athletic sensation is in Dallas now, preparing for the 1930 state tournament to be held in Houston one week prior to the West Texas classic. "I'd rather miss the state tournament at Houston than miss the West Texas, especially since it's to be held in Brownwood," said the state champion.

This means that Clinton Bussey, of this city, who captured the West Texas title last year, will have to show their eyes out if he gets by the Abilene shark. And there will be others on hand just about as tough as Lavender. Brownwood officials have worked over the entire Country Club course in preparation for the invasion of golfers from this section of the state. New markers have been installed and the entire course re-measured and remarked. All fees have been rebuilt.

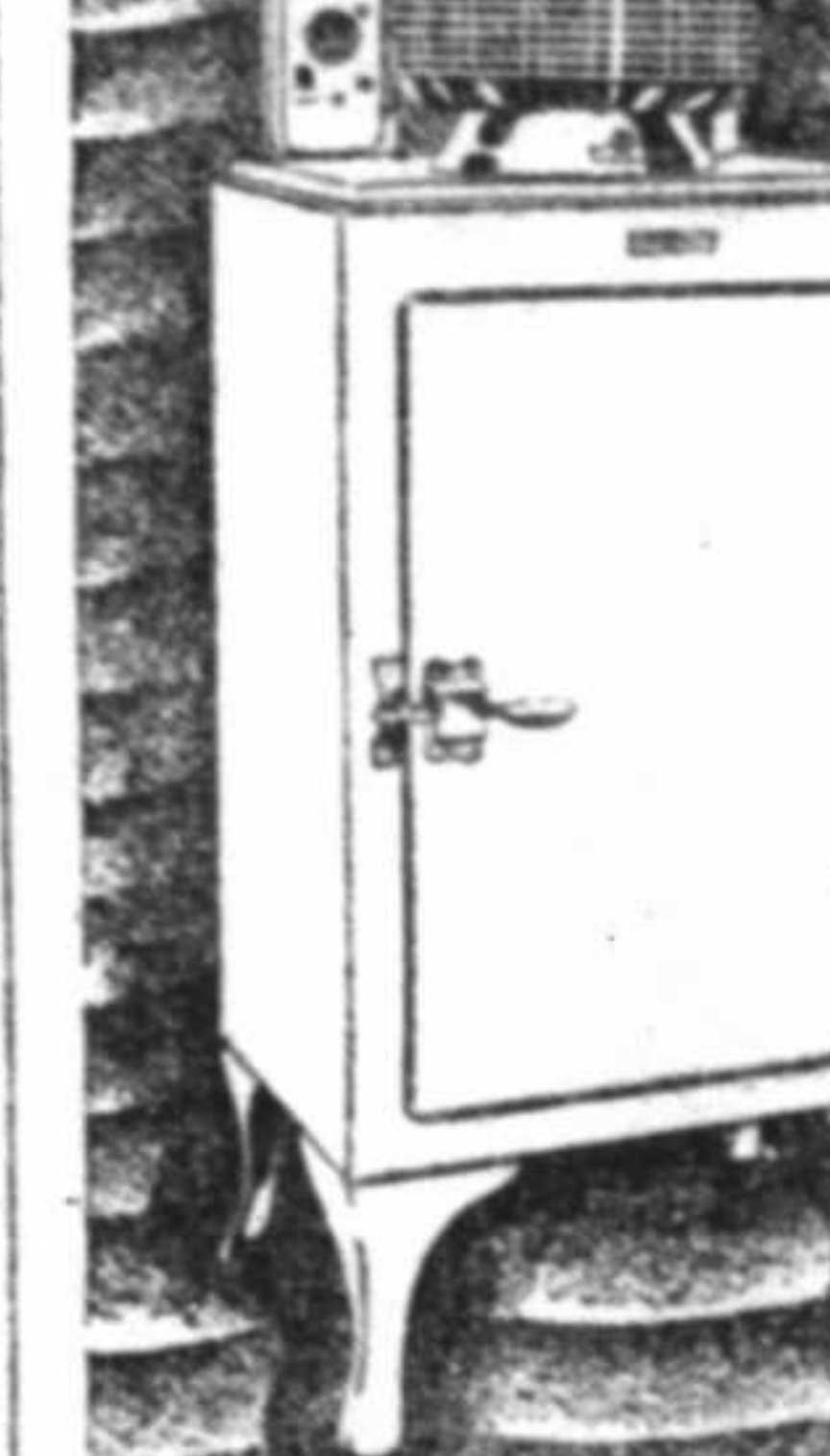

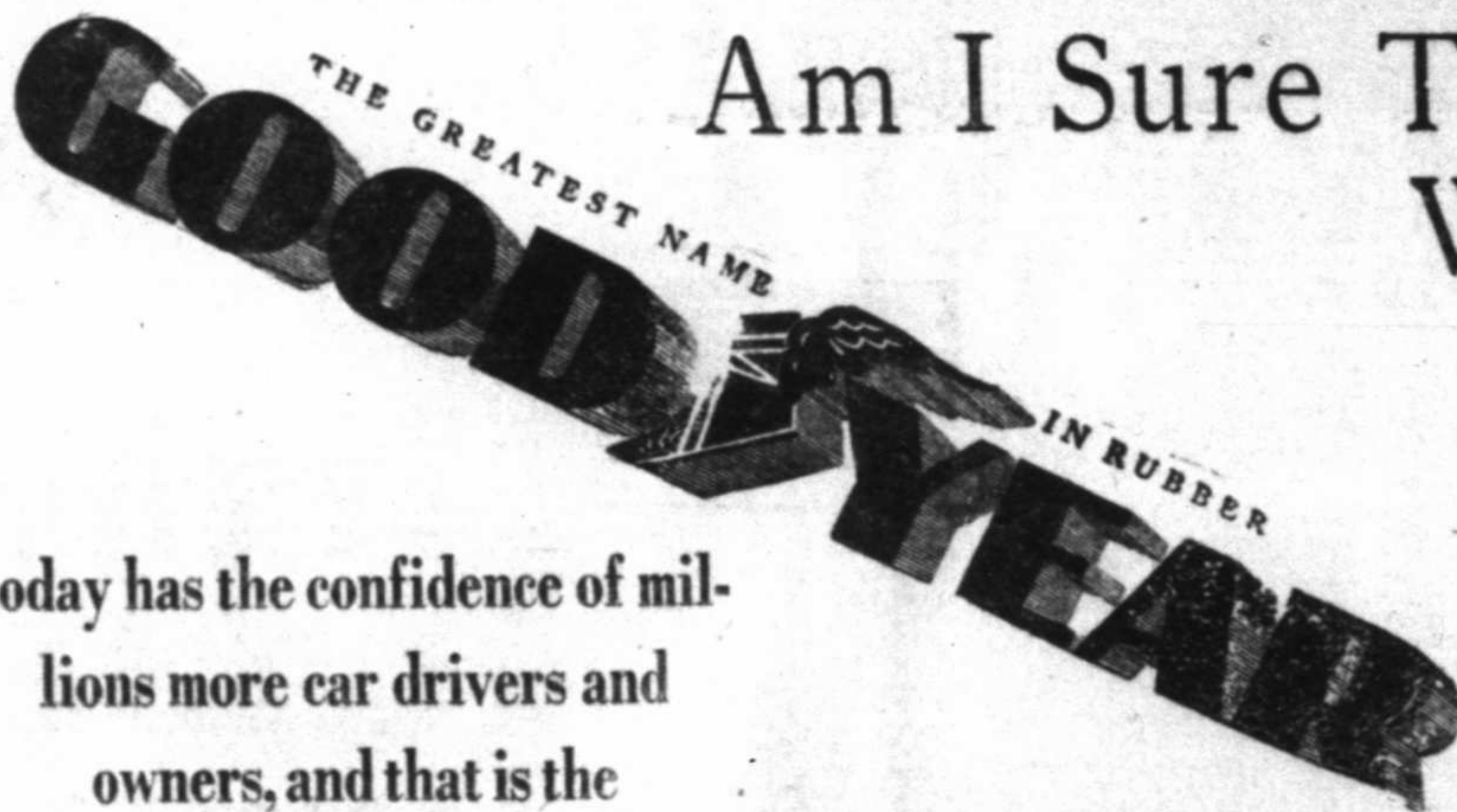

Didn't Pay

Twenty-one years ago a young
Englishman named Norman Angell
wrote a book called "The Great Illu-
sion." The book gave him a cer-
tain amount of fame; it also drew
down on his head a good deal of
very severe criticism.

The thesis of the book was that
war does not pay. You will re-
member that 21 years ago modern
Europe was moving rapidly toward
war, and every student of interna-
tional politics knew it. Germany
and England were having a feverish
naval race. France and Germany
were having a similar race in land
armaments. All over Europe people
were getting ready to fight.

Angell, sizing up the situation, de-
clared bluntly that they were all
wasting their efforts. Never again,
he asserted, would it be possible for
a victory in war to bring prosperity
or security to the nation that won
it.

This, then, was his "great illu-
sion"—the theory that any nation
stood to gain anything of lasting
value by going to war.

Angell was bitterly criticized,
branded an impractical pacifist and
an idealist. A few years later the
war that he foresaw came, and all
the world took a hand.

The other day he celebrated the
21st anniversary of his book—and
found his British government offi-
cials ready to congratulate him
and tell him that he had been right
all along. The country that had
condemned him two decades ago
was ready to admit that he might
be something of his argument.

For the World War, after all, did
teach us something. It compelled
us to learn that modern war is a
profitless business all around.

Germany, beaten in the war, has
gone through an uncomfortable ten
years. It has experienced nearly
every form of hardship that can
come to a nation. The war that was
to win Germany a "place in the sun"
was most assuredly a losing ad-
venture.

But the conquered always fare
poorly. How about the victors?
There is England: England, which
has had a colossal unemployment
problem ever since the armistice,
which has a tax rate so staggering
as to be almost incomprehensible to
Americans, which has seen her trade
and financial supremacy more vi-
olently shaken since 1918 than ever
before, which has had to grant an-
other nation joint rulership of the
sea, which skirted closer to a revo-
lution, in the 1926 general strike,
than any Englishman likes to think
of, and which has a Socialist prime
minister.

That is what England got out
of the war.

You could go down the line with
the contesting nations and get a
similar result in nearly every case.
Angell's thesis has come close to
being proven. If the World War
"paid" anyone it is hard to figure
out just how.

Criticisms

The cause of higher education in
America is a popular one. Conse-
quently, there is bound to be a good
deal of interest in remarks recently
made by Dr. Clarence Cook Little,
former president of the University
of Michigan, and undoubtedly they
will provoke some very heated re-
sponses.

Dr. Little believes that "meddling
women" constitute a very detri-
mental factor in most colleges and
universities. He says of them:
"They are the militant feminists—
the older women executive, fac-
ulty members, faculty wives and lo-
cal club women. They thrive on a
diet of emotional pap. They tend
to breed and to foster a sex anxi-
ety based on unwise and unreal
falsities."

"They demand, among other
things, that there be an equal num-
ber of men and women on college
faculties, regardless of the compe-
tence of the women. They are too
highly emotional in their approach
to all problems."

We are just waiting now, for the
battering to begin striking about
Dr. Little's scholarly hand.

THE PLAINSMAN

Says:

That Girl on Broadway says what

THE PLAINSMAN hates to be a
nuisance but he's got so much
curiosity that he can't help but
wonder what and when, if ever, the
city commission is going to take
some action on Lubbock's municipal
airport.

Of all the beautiful pieces of
side-stepping he has ever seen, The
Plainsman hands the
laurels to the present and past
city administrations for their
wonderful demonstrations of doing
nothing of consequence
about a problem of vital inter-
est to the entire community—
and which, at the polls, was
given an unqualified stamp of
approval by the people.

More than a year ago—so far
back, in fact, that The Plainsman
doesn't even have to consult a cal-
endar—the proposition of voting air-
port bonds was placed before Lub-
bock. Citizens with their heads up
and in tune with modern times,
marched to the polls and voted the
bonds by a big majority. Since then,
aside from a little grumbling, there
has been nothing done.

The administration just past,
said the bonds couldn't be sold,
because there was no market for
them. But other cities were sell-
ing bonds and that bedtime
story vanished into thin air. Now
the present regime, already more
than a month old, says it can't
sell municipal bonds at a loss
—but it does find a market for
sewer and underground bonds
and apparently forgets about
the airport. There's a fly in the
soup somewhere and if you ask
The Plainsman, the city dads
need a darn good selling on
the benefits to be derived from
an airport.

Lubbock is basking along in a
horse-and-buggy age while other
cities are getting somewhere with
air transportation. If you doubt it
keep watching this column for The
Plainsman will soon be in possession
of figures on air business from Tul-
sa, Oklahoma City, Wichita Falls,
San Angelo, Amarillo, Abilene, El
Paso and Midland. And when
those figures are released in this
column a lot of people in Lubbock
are going to realize that we've been
nothing short of asleep at the
switch.

TO BE brutally frank about it,
we are a bunch of chumps.
Dilatory tactics such as have been
practiced on the airport, never
built any city. It's a good thing sim-
ilar practices don't apply to other
things in these parts.

A good many citizens, including
The Plainsman, conferred with
members of the last city administra-
tion concerning action on the air-
port and a good many, again in-
cluding The Plainsman, have dis-
cussed the matter with present offi-
cials. In both instances officials
were highly in favor of doing some-
thing—but that's as far as they've
ever gotten. They're in favor of it
—but nothing has been done to
put Lubbock on the air map along
with every other city of any con-
sequence in the entire United States.

If you want to know the un-
qualified truth, Lubbock, Texas,
—the same city we boast of
as being so all-fired progressive
—is the only city of its size in
the United States without ade-
quate airport facilities! If you
don't believe it, ask airman,
write air transport companies
and appeal to the United States
Department of Commerce, Bu-
reau of Aviation. They'll all let
you have the facts in short or-
der.

And whose fault is it? Surely
somebody's been asleep somewhere
and The Plainsman doesn't see
where it can be checked up on any-
body but the municipal authorities.
The bonds were ordered sold for
the people. Citizens, generally, see
the need of the airport or they
wouldn't have voted as they did.
The monkey-wrench was tossed in-
to the machinery after—not before
—the people were given an opportu-
nity to speak their minds.

MAYBE The Plainsman is "crack-
ed" on airplanes and air trans-
port—then maybe again, he has
studied it a little more than the
average person. At any rate, it is
the opinion of this column that ad-
equate airport facilities are as es-
sential to Lubbock—if not more so
at this time—than extension of
sewer mains.

Perhaps the past and present city
administrations are right, and The
Plainsman is wrong—but never-the-
less everyone's entitled to his own
opinion and ours is that something
ought to be done about the airport
on an airport before this time, and
that something should be done
right away. The law says munici-
pal bonds shall not be sold at a
loss—unless an emergency is ap-
parent. This column doesn't want to
see the city lose on its airport
bonds but would rather see a "paper
loss" on the bonds than a much
larger loss which can be entailed
by our continued failure to embrace

The Parker Case Is So Entangled In Politics That It's
Hard To Follow, Rodney Dutcher Observes In Washington

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Politics
runs much more rampant in the
woof of the controversy over the
appointment of Judge John J.
Parker to the United States supreme
court. Politics may not be the
most important factor because
there are vital and fundamental
issues involved, but politics
seems to have been a determining
factor in each development
from the very start.

All of which is not calculated to
put the public at ease. The eight
sitting justices
very happy. Goodness knows they
had their feathers ruffled during
the bitter, unprecedented Senate
fight over the Hughes nomination.
A majority of senators finally got
Hughes on the bench, but only after
a strong minority which contained
the best constitutional lawyers in
Congress had well nigh destroyed
the sacrosanctity previously as-
sociated with the highest tribunal.
Now the court has found its va-
cancy involved in a political mess
which couldn't help but effect its
prestige still further, regardless of
the outcome of the contest.

In the first place, the youthful
Judge Parker's public record was
largely political. He has been on
the bench only since 1925. He had
made some good campaigns as a Re-
publican candidate for office and
his appointments as an assistant to
Attorney General Daugherty and
to the federal circuit bench might
properly be regarded as political
rewards. No one has charged that
Parker was merely a politician, but
politics was his main background.

In the second place, not even the
White House appears to deny that
the political factor was very im-
portant in Parker's appointment to
the supreme court. Nothing seems
to have been found in his record to
inspire his elevation to such an
exalted judicial position. President
Hoover in making the appointment
failed to cite anything of the sort
and he refused to follow his cus-
tomary practice of issuing a list of
those who had recommended the
nominee. Naturally, nearly every-
one jumped to the conclusion that
Parker had been nominated be-
cause he was a very eminent North
Carolina Republican and because
North Carolina is a southern state
where the Republicans have a
chance in elections that ought to be
nourished.

Partisan politics has to be count-
ed in again when one considers all
the Democrats opposing Parker.
Senators Norris and Borah, leading
the anti-Parker forces are not com-
monly suspected of selfish motives
in this case, but some of the
strength behind them has been ques-
tioned because some senators are
happy to embarrass the adminis-
tration at any and all times.

But for anyone who can stand
off and view the situation with a
cold, unprejudiced eye the most
amusing angle arises when one con-
siders that the same brand of par-
tisan politics supposed to have
figured in the nomination was re-
sponsible for the desertion of the
administration by senators who con-
sidered the preservation of their
air transportation. That emergency
is here.

negro organizations were very
violently opposed to Parker's con-
firmation. But they didn't write
long; each one had thousands of
votes at stake and those up for re-
election this year especially had no
trouble making up their minds.

Densen of Illinois had been hear-
ing from the Chicago "black belt."
Robinson of Indiana has thousands
of negro voters in his state and
Steiwer of Oregon recalled the union
labor strength in the north-
west. Thus it wasn't surprising that
those three stalwart regular Republi-
cans on the Senate Judiciary Com-
mittee walked out on Mr. Hoover
and a majority for the proposal that
the committee recommend rejection
of the nomination.

Of course the only honest issues
were Parker's fitness for the job,
his attitude on social and racial
problems and the general economic
slant of nominees to the court.
These furnished the material for
the fight on the Senate floor and
solidified the center of opposition to
Parker. But politics figured at all
times.

Please don't anyone get the idea
that this writer is trying to suggest
that all this politics in the Parker
case is a bad thing. Figure that
out for yourself, just as Mr. Hoover
presumably has been trying to fig-
ure whether he didn't pull a bad
boner. Goodness knows politicians
have to live like the rest of us.
Possibly they even have to make a
political football out of the supreme
court. The interesting thing about
this is that it's so unusual

tion from your work), and the anti-
septic gargles. You may find that
sipping hot water will help you,
especially if a little lemon juice is
added.

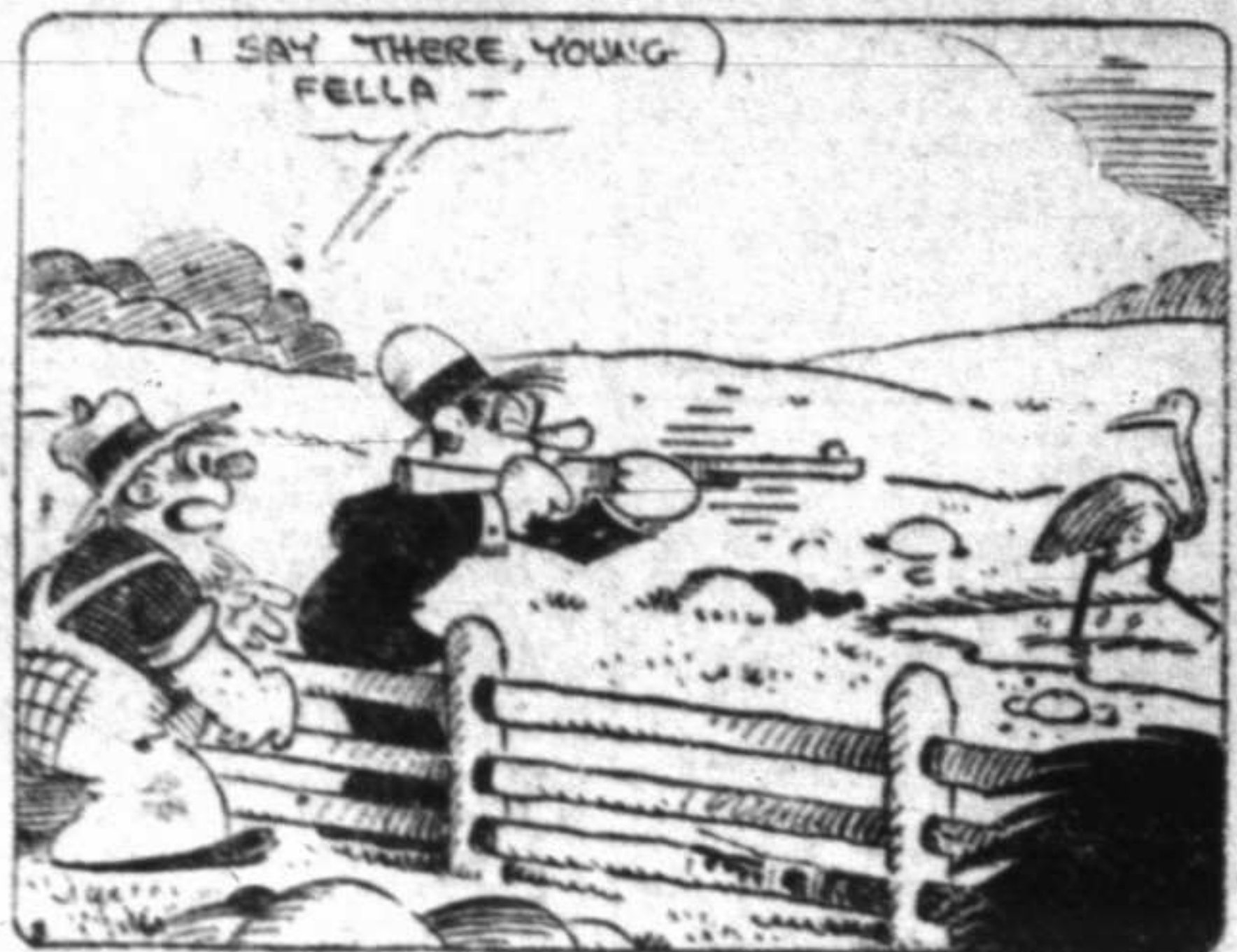
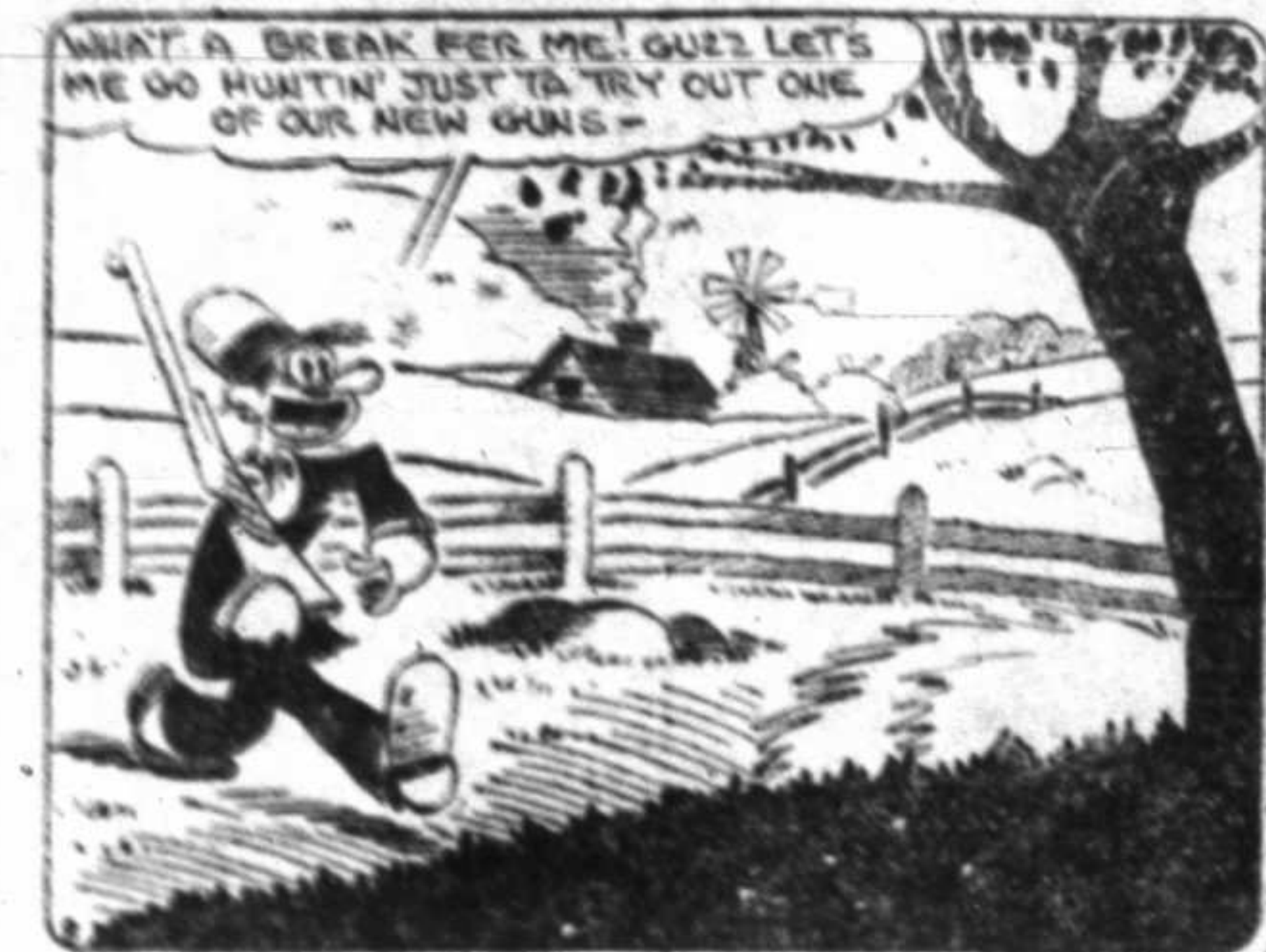

COTTON OPENS FIRM TODAY

FIRST TRADES RECORD GAINS OF 10 TO 13 POINTS

NEW ORLEANS, May 8. (AP)—Cotton had a rather firm opening in sympathy with very good cables, and first trades showed gains of 10 to 13 points. Right after the start, right traders resumed yesterday's process of undulating strategies by selling July and buying October. July advanced to 16.00, or 15 points up, while October traded at 14.61, 30 points above the previous close. At the end of the first hour the market was steady and near the high.

The market ruled quiet all morning, prices remaining within the early range. While July eased off about 9 points from the early high to 16.00, October remained steady, only 1 point under the early high of 14.61. The close of the day under July has not narrowed to 130 points. New York reported that there of cotton being shipped back to New York from Italy and even from Japan for delivery on July contracts.

OPENING IS FIRM IN NEW YORK ALSO

NEW YORK, May 8. (AP)—Cotton opened firm at an advance of 5 to 7 points with the new crop relatively active on covering and buying, promoted by the failure of the early weather map to show any rain of consequence in the eastern belt.

Some further liquidation of old crop months was in evidence, but it was absorbed by spot houses, and while fluctuations were somewhat irregular, the market was 9 to 10 points net higher on old crop positions, with May selling at 16.35 and about 38 to 39 points net higher on the new crop at the end of the first half hour.

Trading was less active later, but there was further undulating of spreads which involved sales of old months and purchases of new crop months and a further narrowing of the differences between the near and late deliveries.

Old crop positions seemed to find comparative little support aside from spot houses buying of July on the dips and May worked off to 16.22, or 3 points net lower. New crop positions also reduced following the sharp early advance, with new October selling off from 14.60 to 14.53, but this price showed a net advance of 27 points, and new crop positions were 22 to 23 points net higher at mid-day.

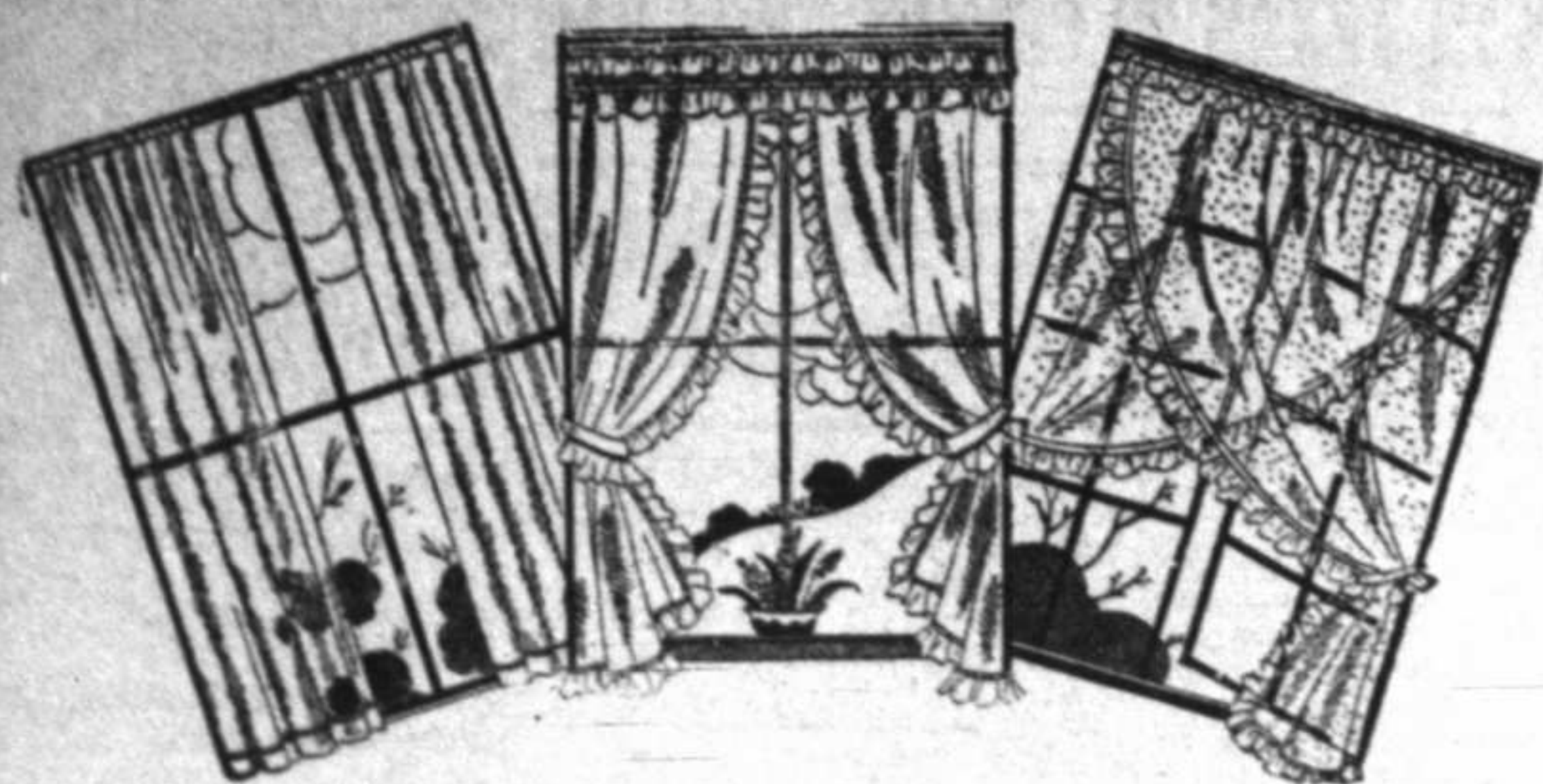

BISHOP SAYS EDUCATION IN NEED OF GOD

ADDRESS IS FEATURE OF FIRST NIGHT'S SESSION

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, May 8.—Knowledge may become "a cold and calculating thing" and may produce "frigid characters" who cannot find "joyful souls upon the pavements of any main street," unless it has the Christian protection—the spirit of love—Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes of the Chicago area, Methodist Episcopal Church, told delegates to the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in an address last night.

The first night meeting of the conference, which met in quadrennial session Wednesday with the 13 members of the college of bishops in attendance, was observed as educational night, in the interest of the Southern Methodist system of 71 schools and colleges.

Summarized Legislation Bishop Edwin D. Mounson of North Carolina, president, and Dr. H. H. Sherman, general secretary of the church's board of education, summarized some church legislation educational leaders desire the general conference to enact.

"The simple truth is that there is no necessary connection between intellectuality and goodness," he said. "Educated people are some times mean; uneducated folks are some times good; and both vice versa. Pope in America, Byron in England; and Burns in Scotland can hardly be classed as saints, yet often their biographies deal softly with their plain aims."

He declared that "John Wesley's Oxford education was a helpless thing until it was touched by the power of God."

"Our problem is to keep in our ministry and laity the combination of head and heart, the old mood of inspiration and the new spirit of education, until both shall be made the servants of Christ in the bringing in of His kingdom," he said. "Our colleges and universities are without Christian mission and purpose unless they offset these four perils by the full doctrine and challenges that came alone from the God and Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ."

But whether this population center, left ten years ago in a country spot 1.9 miles west of Whitehall, Indiana, will jog southward, as in seven previous census, or northward, as in six, remains to be determined by more complete 1930 returns.

If Texas and Florida gains can counter-balance Detroit and its adjacent auto-centers, and if southern California can outweigh developments in the states of Washington and Idaho, the seeming southward trend of the early returns will triumph. Contributing to this trend, Dallas, Texas, came in heavily today with a 290,397 total, a 63.8 per cent increase.

NEW YORK, May 8. (AP)—The North Atlantic seaboard wiped its collective brow Wednesday in the heat, and it wasn't from the forest fires.

Before the march of summer heat, records fell like starched collars in many places in the east, especially in New England. At Boston a 12 year old record was shattered when the thermometer registered 94 degrees. Brockton, Mass., reported a new record at 94.

In New York City the thermometer reading twice broke the record for the date, registering 87 at 11:45 E. S. T. Turning cooler for three hours and then rising to 87 again at 3:30. It was the hottest May 7 in 54 years, the previous high mark being set at 83 in 1878. Three protrations were reported to the police. Record breaking temperatures also were reported from other eastern cities.
