Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for Accountant (Comprehensive Audits) for positions paying \$3,410 a year in the General Accounting Office in Washington, D. C., and various large cities throughout the country; and for Instructor (Guided Missiles — Radio — Wire — Radar — Photography) for positions in the Signal Corps Center and Fort Monmouth in New Jersey.

A written test, plus experience of public accounting type is required for the Accountant positions. Appropriate education or teaching, or the possession of a certificate as Certified Public Accountant, may be substituted for the experience. Men only are desired. For the Instructor positions at Fort Monmouth, appropriate education or experience is required; no written test will be given.

Big Fall Parade Of Snakes Is Due

AUSTIN, Sept. 12. — Snake lovers or not, Texans may count on seeing a good reptile display for the next few weeks.

In fact, according to the Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission who doubles in herpetology, the big fall parade already is underway.

This is reflected in phone calls and letters to the Commission about identifying various species. The Chief Aquatic Biologist said snakes do most of their day-time traveling during spring and fall because of moderate temperatures. He pointed out that snakes are very sensitive to weather extremes and are usually inactive during the heat of the summer days and during cold weather.

He cautioned Texans to be on the lookout for the four poisonous snakes in the Lone Star State — rattlesnake, copperhead, coral snake and cotton mouth moccasin.

AREA LIVESTOCK PEST CONTROL CLINIC IS PLANNED NEXT MONTH

A five-county livestock pest control clinic, featuring nationally prominent authorities, will be held in Breckenridge on November 9. The meeting will be open to all livestock producers and others interested in the control of livestock pests.

Arrangements for the November 9 meeting are being made jointly by the West Texas Ranchers Association and the Association of Texas Manufacturers and Distributors of Veterinary Supplies. The session will be the fourth annual meeting sponsored in Texas by the latter association to acquaint livestock men with the most recent and up-to-date recommendations, findings and opinions of experts who endeavor to support the livestock industry.

In attendance will be livestock producers, county agents, dealers of veterinary products, and representatives of governmental and state experimental stations, A&M College and its branches, and the state extension services.

Leo Martin, Austin, president of the Association of Texas Manufacturers and Distributors of Veterinary Supplies, will preside at the meeting. Dr. R. L. Rogers, Gordon, is program chairman. No commercial exhibits will be permitted. The entire meeting will be devoted to informal discussions on livestock pest control, mesquite control and other subjects of interest to livestock producers.

Following the livestock pest control clinic, the West Texas Ranchers Association will hold a meeting and election of officers. Officers of the association are: president, A. S. Cool Front Rain Stops Field Work In Many Sections

Field work came to a virtual standstill over the eastern two-thirds of the State as a cool front which moved across the state unloaded general soaking rain over that entire area during the last week. Along the coast and in south Texas, heavy rains were received and general rains tapered out on a line about Wichita Falls, San Angelo and Del Rio. West of that line only scattered showers were received.

Wheat planting continued in the high plains and was starting in low rolling plains counties. A considerable acreage was already up to a stand in the northern high plains, but additional moisture was needed over much of that area to keep it coming along and produce much needed early fall pasture. A large acreage of oats is expected to be planted over the eastern two-thirds of the state as soon as soils dry.

Cotton harvest made slow progress in upper coastal, eastern, and central counties as heavy rains hampered picking and ginning. In the northern blacklands, early harvest, which was interrupted by rains the previous weekend, was further delayed and opening slowed by additional rains. Rains caused some damage to quality of open cotton, particularly along the upper coast, the more advanced blacklands, and the southeast. Irrigated cotton in the high plains continued to make good development with excellent yields in prospect.

Although insect infestations increased in that area, control measures were practiced as needed. In the low rolling plains, late cotton was fruiting and making fair growth. Early cotton in this part of the state was opening with some areas needing rain for boll development. Effective control measures were limiting insect damage in most low plains counties. Increased insect activity was noted in central and eastern counties.

Dryland sorghums in northwest areas have shown further improvement. The late planted crop was making good growth and much of it will provide forage but more rain and a late frost will be needed to mature a grain crop. Some worm damage has occurred. Fall sorghums for roughage were being planted in south Texas as soils dried and growth was starting in some stubble fields.

Harvest of early planted grain sorghums was under way in a few northwest counties. Harvest continued in northern and eastern counties. The fourth cutting of alfalfa was being baled on the high plains. Rains delayed cutting of a second hay crop in central and eastern counties, but growth was good. The peanut crop in central and northern areas made good growth. Rice harvest progressed slowly, with rains and winds causing some damage. Corn harvest was continued in central and east Texas. Sweetpotato digging increased in east Texas.

Fall range and pasture feed prospects over the eastern two-thirds of the State received an other boost as generous rains covered that area. In south Texas, where the prolonged drought was broken the previous week, grass and weeds were starting, but it is expected to take 30 to 60 days to make much recovery.

In much of the high plains additional moisture was needed to keep it coming along. In east Texas and along the upper coast a surplus grass supply was available. Goat shearing continued and sheep shearing in the southern plateau was under way.

Deen, president of the Chest, who expressed the thanks of the organization for the cooperation of Rotarians. Deen told something of the plans and the work of the Community Chest and the details of the united drive.

LEGAL NOTICE

An Ordinance Speedzoning U. S. Highway 80 Through The City of Cisco, Prescribing and Defining The Maximum Rate of Speed of Motor Vehicles in Each of Said Zones, Providing a Penalty for the Violation Thereof, and Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict Herewith.

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, that an engineering and traffic investigation for speedzoning U. S. Highway 80 through the City of Cisco having been made, and the report of such investigation having been duly considered by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, the maximum rate of speed of motor vehicles on U. S. Highway 80 through the City of Cisco is hereby fixed and established as follows, to wit:

From the West City Limit of the City of Cisco to Front Street the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 45 miles per hour.

From Front Street to Avenue I the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 40 miles per hour.

From Avenue I to Avenue C the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 30 miles per hour.

From Avenue C to Beach Street the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 40 miles per hour.

From Beach Street to the East City Limit of the City of Cisco the rate of speed of Motor Vehicles shall not exceed 50 miles per hour.

Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be punished as provided in Section 9-b of Article 827a of the Penal Code of the State of Texas.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

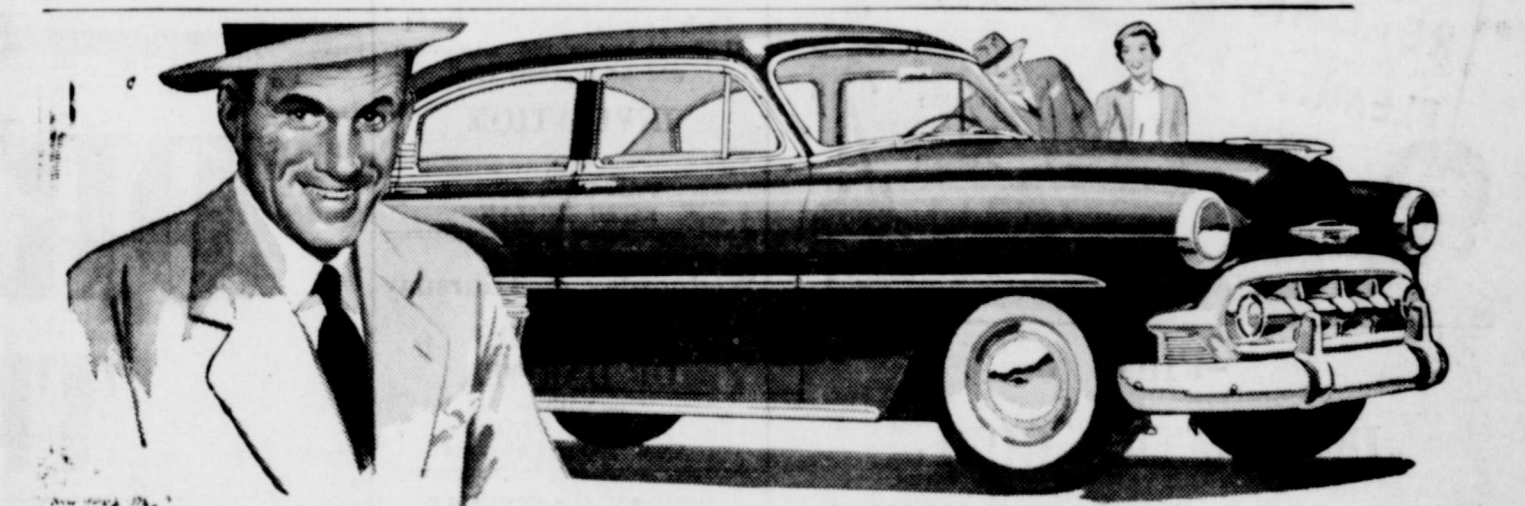

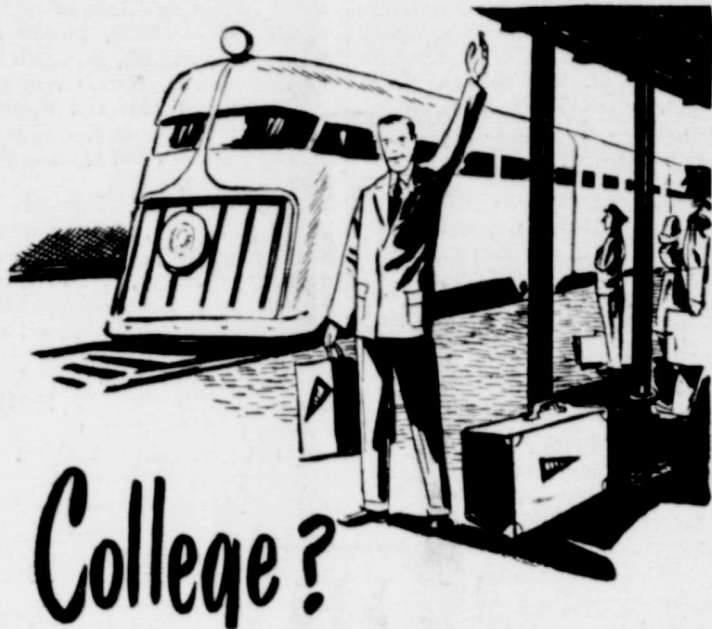
