OFFICIAL SAYS GOVERNMENT MAY EXERCISE ITS SEIZURE POWERS TO OPEN REFINERIES

Refinery Shut-downs Cut Crude Oil Production

AUSTIN, Sept. 26 (AP) — The Texas Railroad Commission today issued a supplemental emergency order slicing the state's crude oil production an additional 400,000 barrels daily, bringing production down to nearly pre-Pearl Harbor figures.

Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson, announcing the order, said it is for 15 days, giving the state an allowable of 1,300,000 barrels daily. He said the cut was necessary because of refinery strikes.

New York building service employees made new strike threats today, and labor and management sought to bring an end to the oil strike as the number of workers made idle by work stoppages throughout the nation climbed toward a million.

In Chicago, the executive board of the Oil Workers Union issued a statement which a spokesman said was intended to strengthen the hand of the union president in negotiations with the oil companies and make it possible for him to call a nationwide strike of his union members if he should find such action necessary.

O. A. Knight, international president of the Oil Workers' Union — CIO — denied that he had issued orders for an immediate nationwide strike of 250,000 oil workers.

About 26,000 oil workers are now on strike in six states. Others are maintaining normal operations in areas unaffected by the walk-outs.

While union, company and government conferees attempted to settle the strike in the Chicago meetings, an official source at Washington revealed that the federal government may exercise its seizure powers to get the closed refineries operating again if the dispute is not settled by Saturday.

Throughout the nation, 669,000 workers either were on strike or had been made idle by strikes. This total did not include the uncounted thousands in addition to garment workers who were kept from their jobs by the New York elevator strike.

The most serious dispute outside of New York are the oil workers' strike, which has cut the flow of gasoline from 24 big refineries, and the lumber workers' strike in the Pacific northwest.

UP TO LABOR BOARD.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Sept. 26 (AP) — The 20-day-old strike of 1,000 CIO United Fuel Gas Co. pumping station operators was settled today contingent upon War Labor Board approval of a new wage schedule.

Patton Summoned to Present His Side of Matter

FRANKFURT, Sept. 26 (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower called Gen. George S. Patton today to give an account of his stewardship in Bavaria, where he favored the detention of Nazis in certain minor administrative posts.

Patton was ordered to appear personally at American occupation headquarters within a week to present his side of the controversy and to report on any Nazis who may be holding office in the Bavarian province of which he is military governor.

Lt. Gen. Walter B. Smith, Eisenhower's chief of staff, announced the summons to Patton at a press conference here today.

Eisenhower yesterday ordered the removal of all Nazis throughout the American occupation zone from any administrative positions, civil or industrial. The order was effective today.

EATS WORTH MORE.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP) — Housewives will be able to cash in on fat salvage at the rate of four red points and four cents a pound after Sept. 30, instead of the present two points, and two cents a pound, it was learned today.

Lady Will Have Permanent FEPC Law or Explode

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26. — Chairman Mary T. Norton (Democrat, New Jersey) of the House Labor Committee, today began a parliamentary move which she hopes will bring House action soon on her bill to create a permanent Fair Employment Practices Commission.

She said she was "confident" that the measure, now bottled up in the Rules Committee, will be finally acted upon "before many weeks are past."

Southern opponents of the FEPC countered with the statement that parliamentary device or no, it will be "many, many weeks—if ever—before Mrs. Norton can get that bill on the floor."

M'Arthur's Order Strips the Jap Navy and Army

TOKYO, Sept. 26. — General MacArthur issued another order Wednesday as the final step in the complete demilitarization of the Japanese army and navy.

The supreme Allied commander directed that all Jap army and navy war equipment be turned over to Allied authorities and that food and clothing held by the Jap armed forces be diverted to Japanese civilian relief.

Army and navy supplies other than implements of war will be doled out for the relief of the populace by the Japanese home ministry with a strict accounting being made to General MacArthur's headquarters.

Jap war implements will be assigned to United States occupation troops which were reinforced today by the arrival of the first unit from the European theater.

ALL WANT A VOICE.

LONDON, Sept. 26 (AP) — Australian Foreign Minister H. V. Evatt said today that all active belligerents must have a share in the framing of the peace, which cannot rightfully be limited to the five powers represented on the council of foreign ministers.

SITUATION GROWS SERIOUS.

HOUSTON, Sept. 26 (AP) — With 80 filling stations in Houston already cut off from any supply of gas and 16 refineries in the gulf coast area closed, the local situation looks very serious.

New Wrinkle In U.S. Postal Notes After October 1

Effective October 1, postal notes will be placed on sale at Cisco postoffice.

The notes will come in denominations from one cent to ten dollars. A fee of five cents will be charged for each note. Heretofore, the minimum fee on any money order was six cents on amounts from one cent to \$2.50, 8 cents from \$2.50 to -5 and 11 cents from \$5 to \$10.

No application will be required in the purchase of postal notes. The purchaser shall write in the name and address of the payee on the face of the note, as well as his or her name and address on the back of the note. This must be done in ink or indelible pencil. If a postal note is spoiled by the purchaser when writing in the name and address of the payee, it shall be treated as repaid and a new note issued in lieu, the fee for the new note to be paid by the purchaser.

Postal notes can be paid at any

postoffice within the continental United States regardless of whether such postoffice is authorized to issue postal notes. Payee shall sign the postal notes before they are paid and payment shall be made only upon proper identification of the payees, as is now required for the payment of money orders.

The notes are not negotiable or transferable through endorsement and may be paid only at postoffices and banks; they are valid only for two months from date of issue and must be cashed before the end of that period.

Claims for lost or destroyed postal notes must be submitted through postmasters on a form to be provided by the postal department.

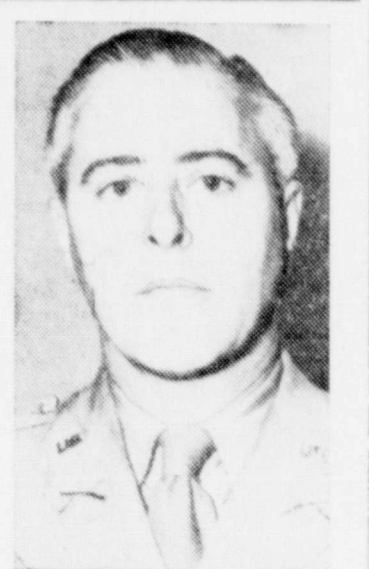

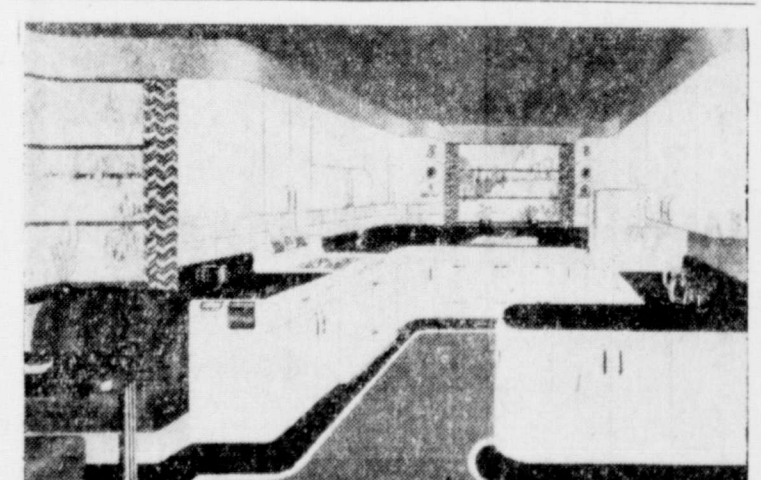
