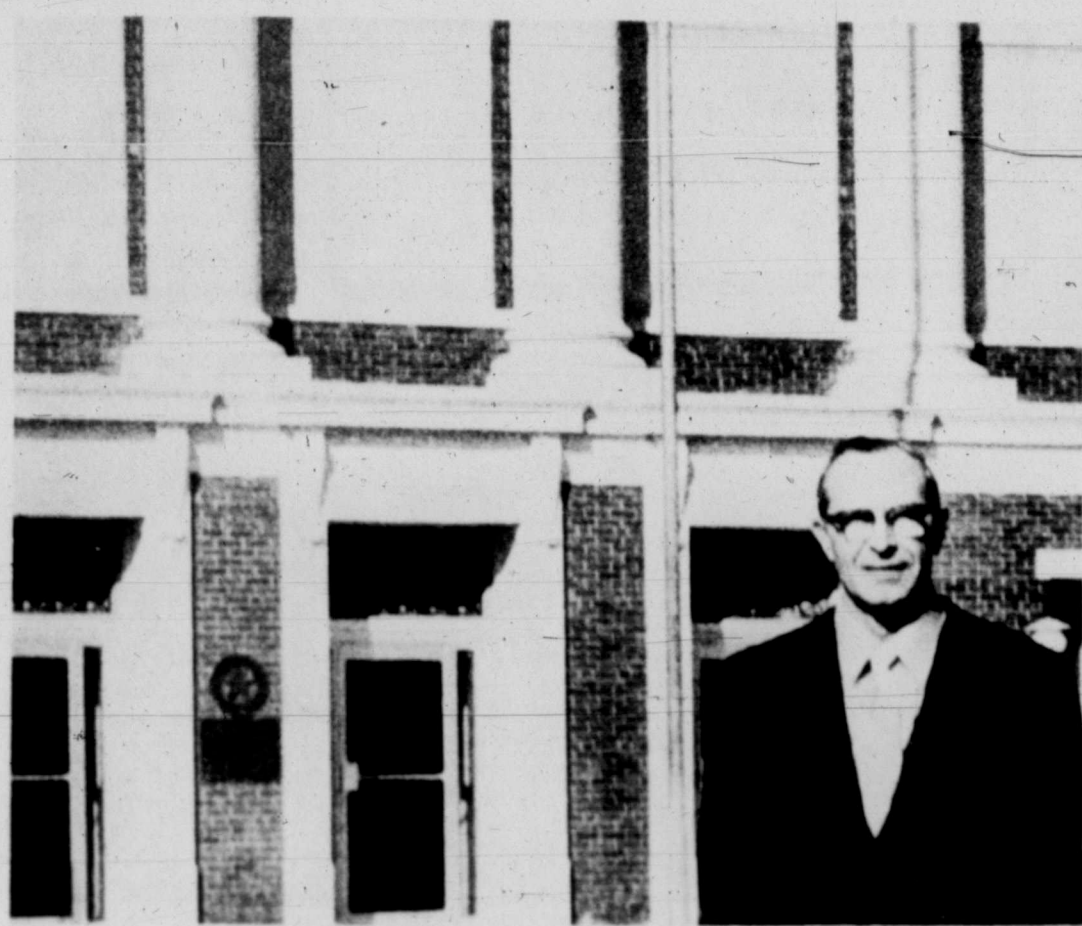




New Face At Courthouse

Parkway Beauty

Club Completing 2 Projects

A new street beautification project moves to the completion stage this week with planting of two parkways.

Plantings will be by Colorado City Garden Club who has hired a San Antonio landscape engineer to assist with the project.

City crews already have prepared the two parkways for the final beautifying.

The parkways are on Vine and Hickory, between 17th and 18th Streets, and on Austin between 19th and 20th.

These are the third and fourth street parkways to be completed by the Garden Club in residential areas.

First two were on Austin Street and have proved to be lasting beauty spots after being transformed from previous eyesores.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. has had city crews to clear and level the parkway areas, construct concrete curbing and install water facilities.

In addition, the city has hauled native rock from historic Lone Wolf Mountain to be included in the parkway decor.

Garden Club members early in the week will begin the final arrangements. Among the plantings in a lawn of rock will be black pine and native oak.

Judge Appoints Hunter To Commissioner Post

Paul B. Hunter, 47-year-old city councilman and business man will be Mitchell County's new commissioner for Precinct 3.

He was appointed by County Judge Elmer Martin to fill the vacancy created by unexpected death of Jesse C. Northcutt Oct. 28.

Hunter's appointment is effective Nov. 16 and he will resign his non-paying City Council position Monday.

The new commissioner will fill the remaining two years of Northcutt's unexpired term.

Accepting the appointment, Hunter left no doubt that he intended to be a candidate for an elective term at the conclusion of his interim 2-year term in office.

Judge Martin, who conferred with other county commissioners before filling the Precinct 3 vacancy, said his appointment came after careful consideration.

"Paul Hunter is qualified by commendable citizenship and service in every phase of our community life."

"His background of business, farm, municipal administration, civic work and integrity are assets which should serve well the citizens of Precinct 3 and all Mitchell County."

"I regret only that his appointment is necessitated by the untimely death of a fine commissioner, Jake Northcutt."

Hunter, a native of Mitchell County and now mayor pro tem of Colorado City, is owner and operator of Better Cleaners.

He has been in the dry cleaning business since June, 1946; when he returned from World War 2 military service.

His service on city council has spanned 5 1/2 years.

Hunter's civic and community activities have been in numerous areas. He has chaired committees of Chamber of Commerce and served as director and first vice president of that organization.

His efforts have criss-crossed almost all community-wide projects from hospital to city-county airport. He is a Mason and was an active Jaycee, president and campaign chairman for Mitchell County United Fund.

At First United Methodist Church he has served in various capacities on the official board and currently is a church trustee.

His wife is past president of Mitchell County Classroom Teachers Association and a leader in the study and work that resulted in a professional consultation agreement for Colorado Independent School District teachers and administration.

"I didn't have to think long about this opportunity to service as Precinct 3 commissioner," Hunter said.

"I knew what I wanted to do."

"When you have worked in civic and charitable organizations, you become interested in the welfare and well-being of your community and its people."

"And, as I worked in city government I learned more of the needs and desires of the community."

"Thus, I have become interested in the entire community, city and county."

"My plans," Hunter emphasized, "are to do the kind of a job that will be acceptable to the people of Precinct 3... and that I will continue on as their county commissioner for years more, not just for the interim 2-year period."

The new appointee said he had no plans for "revolutionary change" in county government procedure.

"I go along with the pay-as-you-go policy established."

"I will press for closer cooperation between county, city and schools for, after all, we are one community."

Hunter's appointment will place him on Commissioners Court with W. M. Vest, Precinct 1; Drue Cawthron, Precinct 2; and Moody Richardson, Precinct 4, and County Judge Martin, who will be succeeded Jan. 1 by Bill Carter.

The official appointment entered in minutes of Commissioners Court by Judge Martin States:

WHEREAS, the undersigned, Elmer Martin, the present duly elected and qualified County Judge of Mitchell County, Texas, is authorized and empowered, under the law, to appoint a Successor County Commissioner of Precinct 3 of Mitchell County, Texas, such vacancy occurring by reason of the untimely death of Jesse C. Northcutt on October 28, 1970; and,

WHEREAS, having given due consideration to the filling of such vacancy by a proper qualified person, having offered such appointment to Pearl

Northcutt, surviving widow of Jesse C. Northcutt, and she having declined same;

Now, Therefore, I, Elmer Martin, County Judge of Mitchell County, Texas, do hereby appoint Paul Boyd Hunter, Commissioner of Precinct 3, Mitchell County, Texas, for the remainder of the unexpired term of Jesse C. Northcutt, deceased, such appointment being effective November 16, 1970, conditioned that the said Paul Boyd Hunter take the oath and file the bond as required by law before entering upon the duties of such office.

7,277 Bales Ginned

Loraine, C-City Coops Lead

Mitchell County's cotton crop counted 7,277 bales Friday.

All eight gins within the area were busy processing the '70 crop.

Leading the ginning at this stage of the season were co-ops in Loraine and Colorado City.

Loraine Co-op had ginned 1,894 bales and Colorado City's Producers Co-op had processed 1,607 bales.

Farmers Gin in Colorado City was third on list with 1,058 bales. China Grove Co-op counted more than 1,200 bales but approximately half -- 642 bales -- was tagged as Mitchell County cotton.

Westbrook's Planters had ginned 646 bales, Buford Co-op 690 bales, Loraine's Guitart 232 bales, Colorado City's Guitart 490.

U. S. Department of Agriculture Cotton Classing Office in Abilene reported 29,000 samples were classed for the week ending Friday. This compares to only 1,200 for the same period last season.

For the entire 1970 harvest season, the Abilene office has classed 55,800 samples -- more than twice the 24,200 for the same period a year ago.

Sixteen per cent of the cotton classed was in the white category, according to B. B. Manly Jr., officer in charge of

classing. Eighty-one per cent was light spotted and 3 per cent was spotted.

Predominant grade was 32 to 48 per cent, Manly said.

Predominant staple lengths were 30, 47 per cent and 29 per cent. Micronaire readings showed 75 per cent in premium range, Manly said.

Pressley or strength readings showed 83 per cent, reading 80,000 pounds per square inch and better.

Average gross prices reported by Consumer & Marketing Service, Abilene, for predominant qualities were 20.70 cents for 3229; 21.05 cents for 3230; 20.20 cents for 4229, and 20.50 cents for 4230.

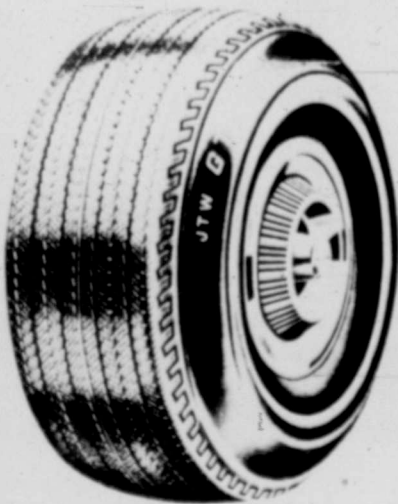

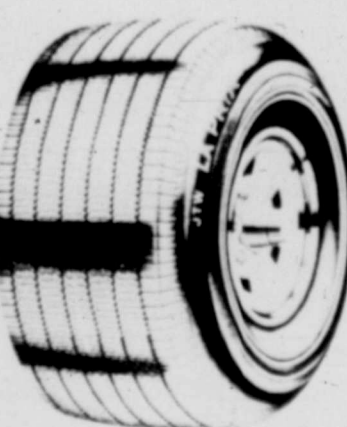

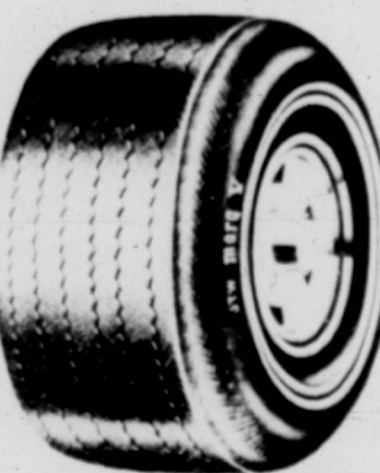

CONVERSATION CORNER

ALWAYS, always in November. . . When the year's a dying ember. . . Come the days when hearts remember. . . Remember, remember. . . The theme for now. . . For now in November.

NOT ALL the songs of November are sad songs. There are glad songs of the season. . . Autumn leaves drifting in waltz time. . . Colorado High School homecoming music. . . Chrysanthemums and football. . . Pecan pies and fruit cake. . . The countdown before Christmas.

Still, no matter how long ago it all was, there always is an echo of a sad song for November 11, now called Veterans Day in this country.

When some of us were very small, people called it "Armistice Day" and we remember it as probably the "biggest nationwide celebration of a whole lifetime."

IT WAS such a glorious day to begin with! Sirens blew and school children marched, en-

mies embraced with happy tears on the crowded streets.

The war to make the world "Safe for Democracy" was over.

News reached the little town called Teague by telegraph wires and the town went wild with joy.

After the parade, people gathered in the churches for prayers of thanksgiving and hymns. The war was over.

THAT NIGHT, around a public bonfire, people gathered again to sing songs of the World War I era.

Remember "Long, Long Trail . . . Keep the Home Fires Burning. . . My Buddy. . . Over There. . . Little Blue Star In My Window. . . How You Gonna Keep 'em Down on the Farm. . . Where Do We Go from Here, Boys. . . Hinky Dinky Parlez Vous. . . Long Way to Tipperary. . . Goodbye Broadway, Hello France. . . Somewhere in France?"

Those were the sounds which filled the night. War was over.

AND THAT is why November 11 gradually came to be a sad day whenever it makes a heart start to remember.

Songs of World War I were so beautiful, so romantic, so full of bravado. . . so cocksure. It was fun for a little girl to sing the words at the

top of her voice. War was over.

Two decades and two years later World War II blackened the earth. With its coming, Armistice Day became an ambiguous holiday, an anachronism.

It was harder to sing the new crop of songs which came in with World War II. Some little girls had grown up by then and developed a chronic lump in the throat. War was not over any more.

WHEN VE Day and VJ Day arrived, people were pretty quiet about it here—except for high school youngsters "making the drag" by way of celebration.

Can not, at any rate, recall singing "White Cliffs of Dover. . . When the Lights Go On Again All Over the World. . . Praise The Lord and Pass the Ammunition. . . Johnnie Doughboy. . . Or even Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree" on either of those days. Recall only incoherent prayers all day and long into the night. . . maybe prayers that the lights all over the world would STAY on this time.
