## Robbers Hit Fina Station

Two armed robbers discovered Tuesday that "Crime Doesn't Pay," at least not in Mitchell County.

Clayton Hardin had begun his day's work at Northside Fina Station on the Snyder Highway a little after 8 a.m. Tuesday morning, when he noticed a car drive past on the Vine Street side, he said.

Hardin said he didn't really pay too much attention to the car and continued his routine of placing the petty cash in the register getting ready for the day's sales.

He still didn't think anything was wrong when seconds later two men appeared at the door of the station requesting to use the restroom and telephone.

"One man went into the restroom and the other stood in the office with me, waiting," Hardin said.

The man came out of the restroom and used the phone, according to Hardin.

As the man hung the phone up, Hardin said

the other man reached into his pocket and withdrew what appeared to be a revolver, pointing it at him.

"This is a holdup," Hardin said the man stated.

"Are you kidding?" Hardin recalled saying to the man.

"No, this is really a holdup," Hardin said the man said.

Hardin said he opened the register and the two men took the cash and fled.

"One of the men stopped at the door and said I would be shot if I stepped out of the office door," Hardin recalled.

Using the pay phone in the office, Hardin telephoned the Sheriff's Office.

## Hammond Named As 'Fireman Of The Year'

Colorado City Volunteer Firemen honored First Assistant Fire Chief Jerry Hammond as "Fireman of the Year" Monday night during the annual firemen's banquet.

Hammond, elected by secret ballot, was given the honor for his outstanding service to the department during the year.

In his introduction of Hammond, Secretary Don Webb stated, "This outstanding young man has put forth a great effort. He has answered calls during work hours, after work hours and in the middle of the night. He has missed more than one meal in service to the department."

During the year 1980, firemen fought 198 fires, of which 193 were fought using the booster truck and five were fought after connecting to a fire hydrant, he said.

Of these fires, 10 involved major vehicle accidents which resulted in four deaths and five live rescues were made using the "Jaws of Life," he noted.

"The department had the 'Jaws of Life' for 18 months before they were ever used, except in practice, and they more than paid for themselves the first time out," Webb stated.

He said the department had discovered, while using the tool, an additional tool was needed to insure rapid and safe removal of persons trapped in wreckage.

"We started accepting donations for the new tool about two weeks ago and have already raised \$600," Webb said.

He noted the total cost of the new tool is estimated at \$1,600.

In a brief review of the year's activities, Webb recounted several of the projects in which

the firemen have been involved.

"We received a new truck from the county, for which we are very grateful, and rigged it up ourselves. We attended the July 4 Fly-In. We patrolled the highways and helped people out of flood waters and snow. We relieved the regular fire truck drivers while they were without a fire marshal. We remodeled the fire station living quarters and sent three men to school to learn how to use the 'Jaws of Life.' This is besides all the time we spent working with the law officers on wrecks," Webb said.

The total active firemen's payroll was \$4,333. Each member of the department was present for at least 50 per

cent of the meetings and fought at least 25 per cent of the fires, Webb said.

"Webster's Dictionary defines the word volunteer as one who gives of his services and efforts of his own free will," Webb said, "and this is what we are and are proud to be, Volunteer Firemen."

## Weatherization Funds Available

Federal funding is available at this time for certain low income persons or families, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor David Marion announced.

These federal funds may take the form of a one per cent interest loan, which may be paid back over a ten year period or, in certain cases, grants may be obtained.

Marion noted the ceiling limit on the loans has been increased from \$5,000, established last year, to \$7,500.

These funds will be loaned to an eligible applicant for conservation of thermal energy and are basically aimed toward senior citizens, Marion said.

"A money savings usually results when these homes are weatherized," he said.

Applications may be made for roof repairs, insulation, storm doors and windows, weather stripping or other improvements designed to weatherize a home, Marion said.

A note of less than \$2,500 may be secured by a signature only, in most cases. On a loan for more than that amount, the applicant's home will be used as security, he said.

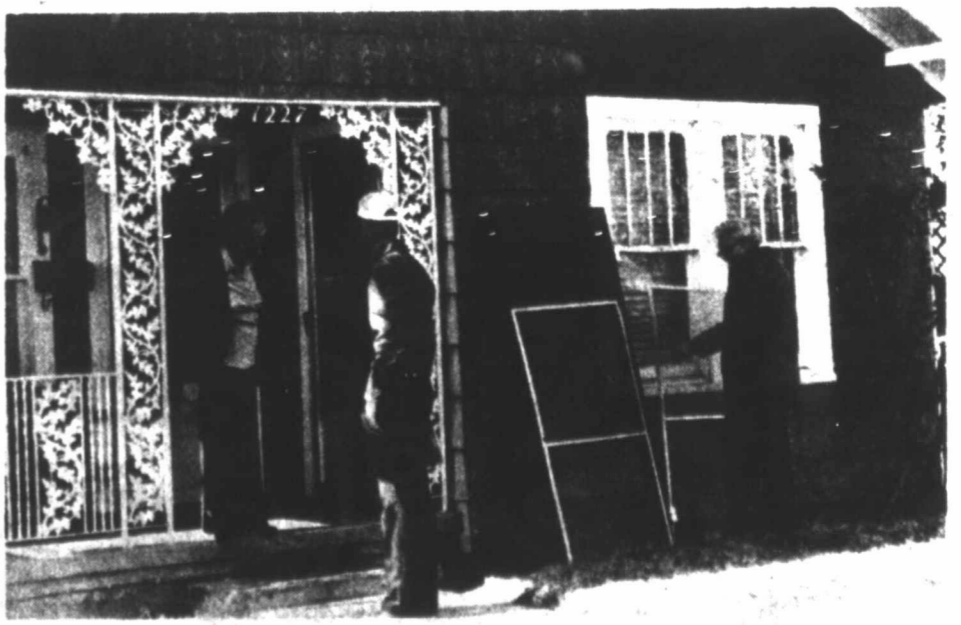

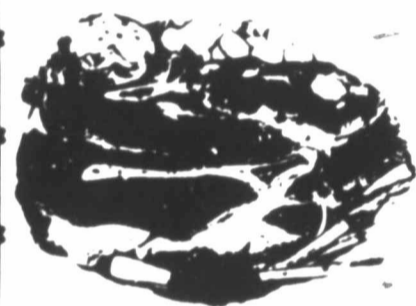

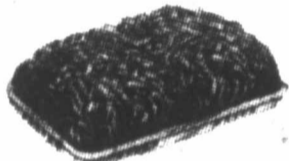

lice, who broadcast an all points bulletin on the two suspects, relaying a brief description, given by Hardin, of two men driving an older model blue and white car, according to Assistant Chief of Police Jimmy Roundtree.

Deputy David Ginkinger and Texas Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger were in the Sheriff's Office when the telephone call came from Hardin, Ginkinger reported.

They rode together in the THP car to Interstate 20. There, they decided to search for the fleeing robbers to the west.

As they approached the county line at Iatan Flats, Hertenberger drove up behind a green and white older model car containing two persons who matched the

description given, Ginkinger said.

"Buddy turned on his red lights and the car did not pull over. Then, he got on the PA and told them to pull over to the right," Ginkinger said.

"The car began to pull over and the man on the passenger side leaned over," Ginkinger said.

"Careful, he's got a gun," Ginkinger said Hertenberger stated.

As the two vehicles came to a halt on the shoulder of the highway, the driver of the green and white car and Hertenberger both got out of their cars, Ginkinger said, and he followed moments later.

Hertenberger pulled his revolver and told the suspect to raise his hands.

Ginkinger walked cautiously to the passen-

ger side of the green and white car and told the other suspect to climb out with raised hands, Ginkinger reported.

The suspects were read their rights and their hands were cuffed behind their backs. They were placed in the patrol car and taken to the police station, Ginkinger said.

Ginkinger said he then drove the green and white car back to the station, following Hertenberger.

According to the official police report, the actual robbery occurred at about 8:15 a.m. and the suspects were apprehended 17 minutes later, at 8:32 a.m.

About \$100 taken in the robbery, two target pistols and a shotgun were found in the suspects' vehicle.
