Post Notes

A difference of opinion on the Post City Council concerning funding for the City County Alcohol and Drug Abuse program is a reflection of an age-old political debate in the United States.

It is not a new question... how much should government be involved in social welfare programs?

The question became a heated and serious national problem during the early and mid 1930s, when President Franklin D. Roosevelt pushed through the most revolutionary government social programs ever attempted in this country.

The debate continues today.

The question about funding of the local drug abuse and alcohol counseling program would be a mute point if it weren't for the major cutback in state and federal funding for this kind of help.

With the state and federal governments curtailing financial support, local governments or charities have had to take up the slack.

City council member Weaver McKamie, who has been a vocal opponent of the use of local tax monies for this project, brought the issue up again during last week's regular council meeting.

McKamie, who has said at council meetings, "I

don't think we ought to dole out taxpayers money to throw away on a bunch of drunks," expresses an opinion which keeps surfac-

ing locally.

The real issue is not the funding of this particular program, but the more

engineer Bill Stracener to the contractor specifying structural modifications to the new field house, which is currently under construction just south of the high school gymnasium.

The architect is to present a progress report at the January 14 meeting.

Shiver also reported on the recent Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test, which was completed by 70 students in the junior class at Post High School.

The results showed that 91 percent mastered the test, but Shiver pointed out the figures state-wide was misleading because certain

students in special education were allowed to be exempt from the testing.

"Personally, I would like to see every student take the test," Shiver pointed out, "at least once. It is very dangerous to tell a student that he or she is not capable of passing this test, it sets those people up to think of themselves as less of a person."

Shiver emphasized his point, using as an example an unnamed student, who was considered by some as being unable to pass the test...yet that student passed both sections of the TEAMS.

"It just shows that we are never sure what a student is capable of achieving," Shiver added.

He also told the board that special education should have as its purpose to help a student get back into the main stream of education...not as an escape from learning.

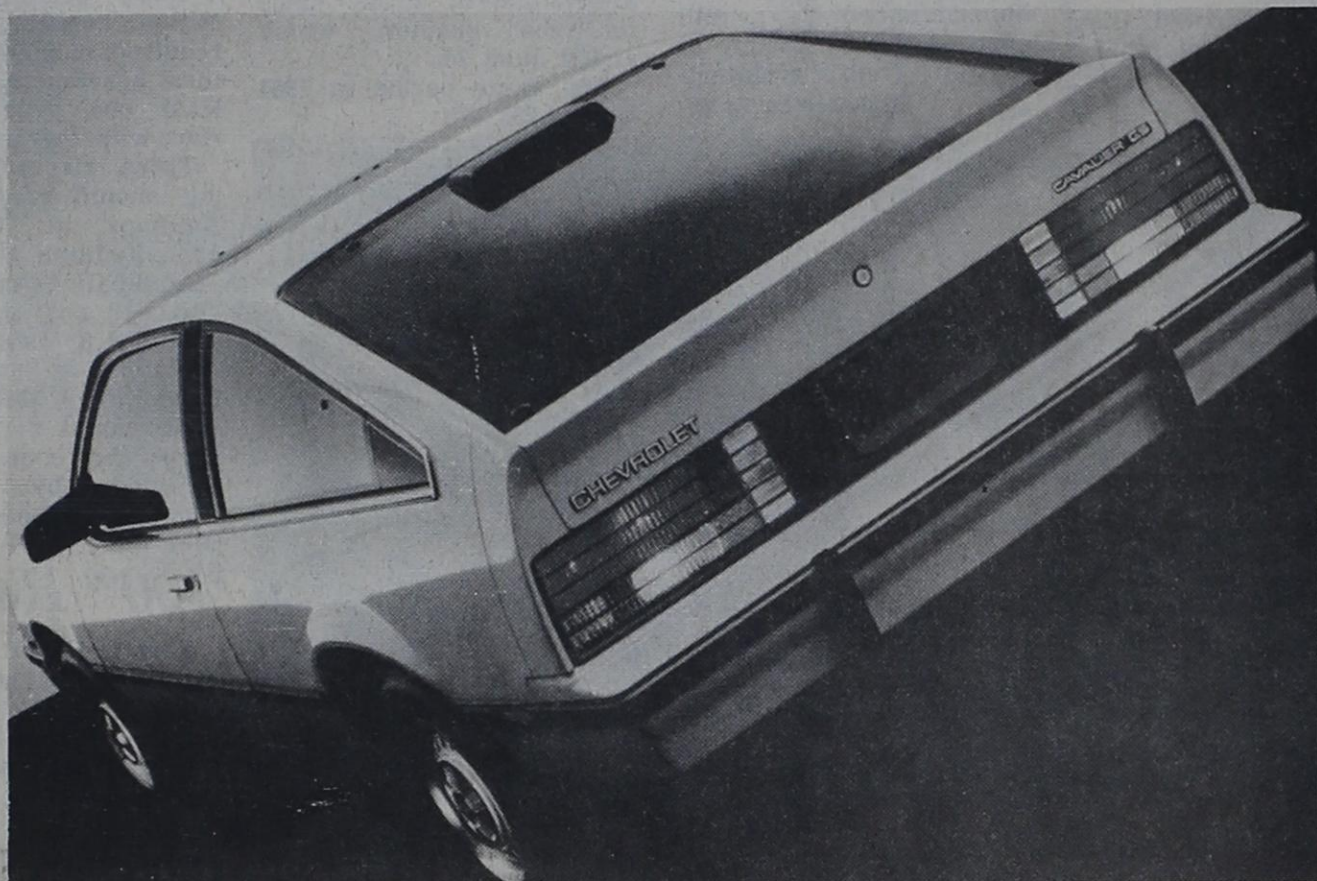
There were 18 students in the junior class who were exempt from taking the exam, eight in language arts and 10 in math.

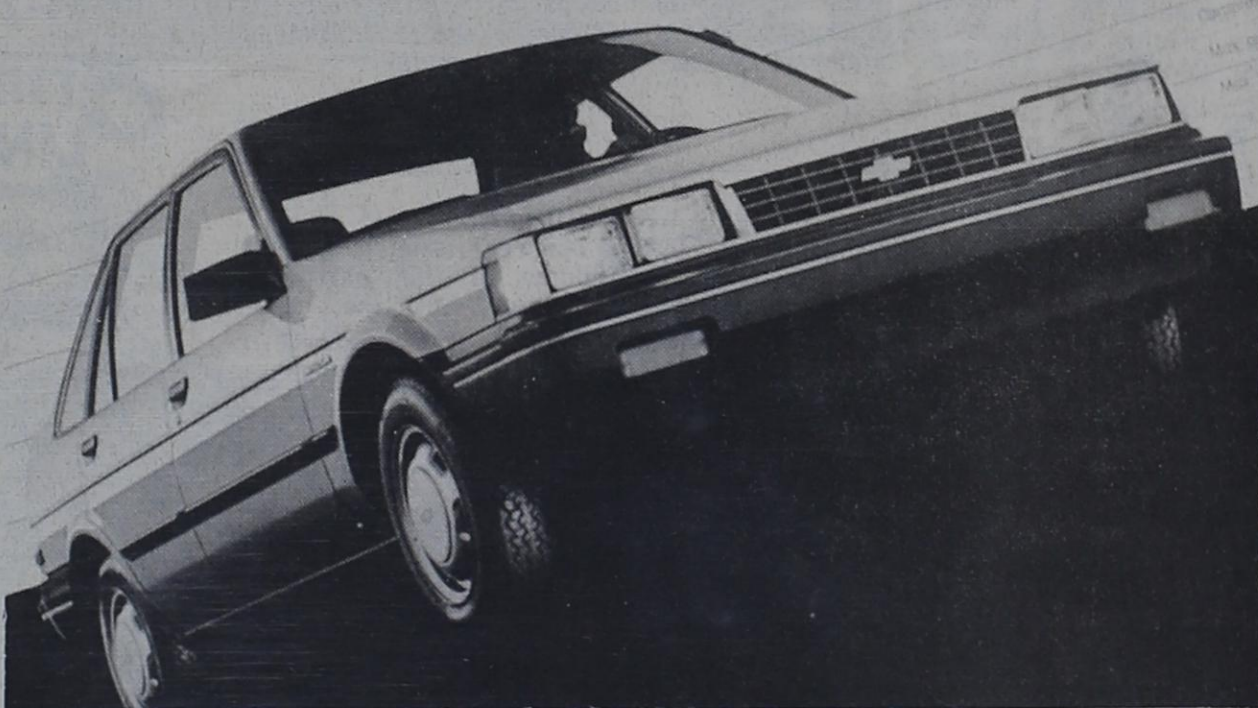

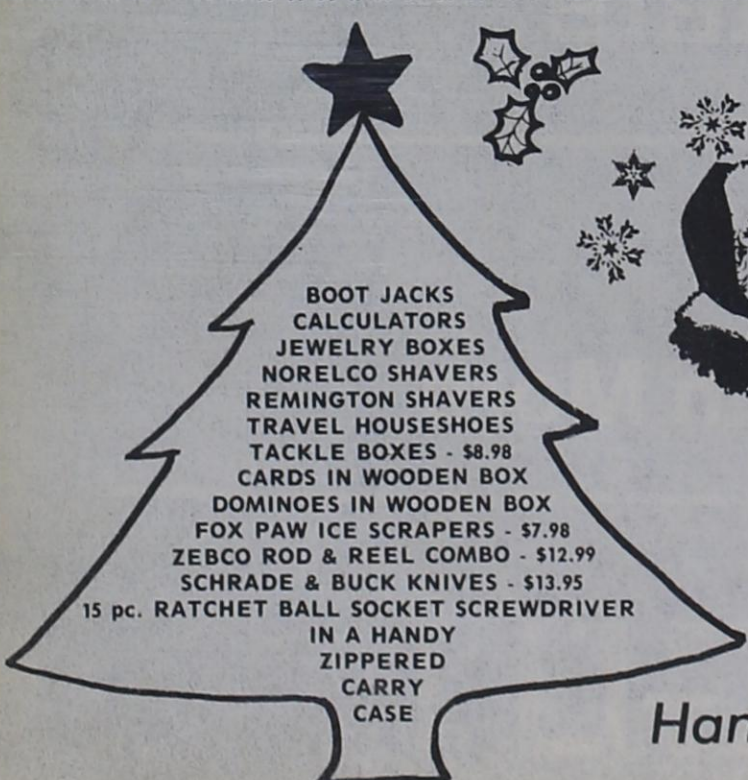

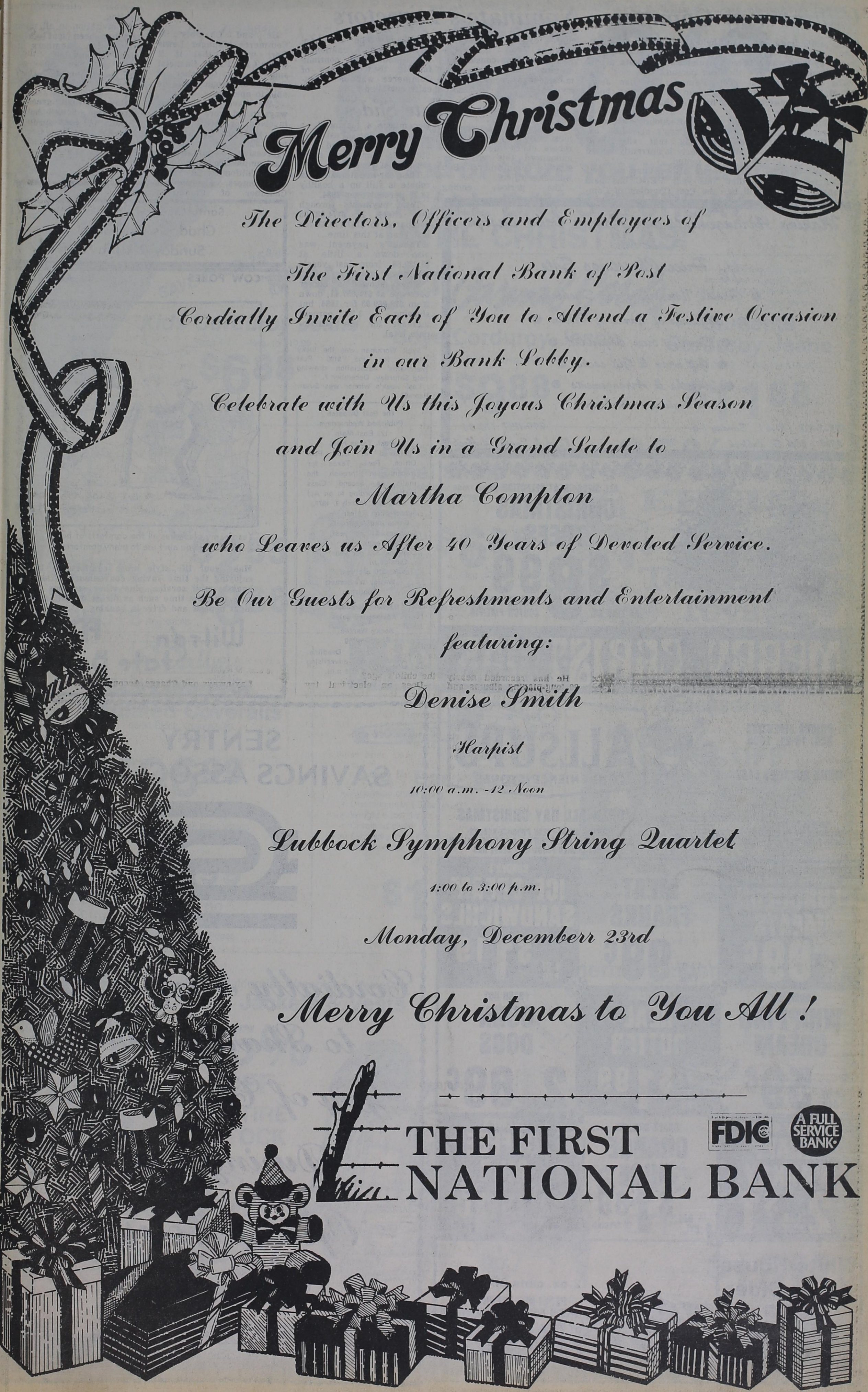

Chamber of Commerce Nominate's Directors

An amendment to the Post Chamber of Commerce by-laws was adopted last Wednesday by the board of directors at its regular meeting, bringing to 11 the number of directors to serve.

Nominated to serve as new directors were Maritta Reed, Gordon Terry, Roger McCaren, Jim Jackson and Joe Harris.

President-elect Patty Kirkpatrick, reported that the annual banquet will be

held February 28 at 7 p.m. in the Post Community Center, with tickets at \$10 per person.

Famous comedian Jerry Clower will be the headliner for the banquet.

Jack King reported on Post Economic Development Corp's activities, explaining that all PEDC property is currently leased or rented.

He also pointed out that this year PEDC has paid the Post Chamber of Com-

merce \$18,000 in fees for services and that the PEDC board is considering the hiring of a full time manager to recruit industry.

Sales Tax Rebate Slides

A slight decrease in the most recent sales tax rebate check to Post was announced this week by state comptroller Bob Bullock's office.

The period, ending

"If and when that happens," King cautioned, "our ability to continue funding the Chamber of Commerce will be drastically curtailed."

December 4, showed a payment to Post of \$9,538.01, compared to \$10,222.35 for the same period last year.

The year-to-date sales tax rebate is still up a healthy 18.29 percent over 1984.

Total payments through this check is \$174,083.03 compared to \$147,170.63 for last year at this time.

Tahoka's payment was also down a little at \$3,229.88, from last year's \$3,518.47.

Slaton showed a bigger decrease at \$11,057.11, down from \$13,969.93 for 1984, but showing a 3.76 percent increase for the year-to-date total.

He and Chamber of Commerce manager Lewis Earl warned that if it weren't for PEDC financial support, the Chamber of Commerce would not be able to operate.

"We have to look for ways to get more members involved, or this organization will not be able to maintain its current aggressive initiatives," Earl emphasized.

In addition to the board of directors, a group of Chamber of Commerce

members attended the meeting.

Financing the Holidays On Credit

During the holiday season many of us overindulge in food, drink-and credit.

Consumers should ask themselves whether they need to use credit, which is really borrowing money for a price.

The answer may be "yes" if you have a good reason and can repay your debt in a reasonable length of time.

Using a credit card to pay for Christmas gifts can be convenient and cost relatively little if you pay the bill within 30 days.

But when you have to carry the debt beyond 30 days, you will be paying 16-18 percent interest, depending on your credit card.

In many households, a

large purchase of a major appliance, television or furniture is made every year as a gift for the whole family.

Before deciding to make this type of purchase on credit, consider the cost of the loan.

You can find the total cost of any loan by multiplying the number of payments by the amount of each payment, then subtract the purchase price.

This resulting figure will be the cost of the credit.

The longer the loan the more it will cost.

Your monthly payments may be smaller but the total amount you pay back in finance charges will be more.

Be sure the payments are affordable.

A loan may seem appropriate by itself, but when added to other payments it

could be more than you can afford.

If your debt load goes over 20 percent of your take home pay, excluding your rent or mortgage, you may wind up in financial trouble.

Ten to 15 percent is a more manageable debt load.

When the cost of credit will be more than you need or want to spend, consider using some of your savings for the purchase, or simply decide to enjoy other aspects of the holiday and give more modest gifts.

Shopping for Accessories

As gifts

Belts, jewelry, scarves, and other accessories are popular items for holiday gift-giving.

With some careful shopping you can find an accessory that will both please and flatter the person who receives the gift.

Here are some principles of design which can help guide your gift selections:

1. Line - Lengthwise and crosswise lines in accessories add length or width to the area where they are located. Example: give a wide belt to a slender friend, but a thin belt is better for someone who is heavier.

2. Size and shape - The size of accessories should be in proportion to the size of the person. In general, tall figures can wear more and larger accessories than petite figures.

3. Texture - Shiny textured accessories create more emphasis and appear larger than dull textured accessories. Polished jewelry, for instance, attracts more attention than dull or rough textured jewelry. Therefore, a person with conservative taste

would prefer more subdued texture accessories.

4. Color - As you select an accessory keep the person's wardrobe in mind to select something that would either compliment or contrast with the most flattering colors they wear often. Remember that bright contrasting color accessories also direct attention to the area where they're located.

5. Becomingness - Most importantly, any accessories should be becoming and appropriate to the recipient's lifestyles. An accessory that flatters the person receiving it will be worn and enjoyed long beyond the holiday season.

Keep Christmas Tree Fresh
This year you don't have to watch your Christmas tree droop and turn brown before the holiday season arrives.

With proper selection and care, you can keep your tree fresh throughout the season.

Start with the freshest tree you can find.

A Texas-grown tree you cut yourself at a tree farm or buy off a lot will be fresher than trees shipped from distant states.

Follow these steps to keep a fresh-cut tree at its peak:

Place the tree trunk in a container of water, since a fresh-cut tree will still be growing when it's harvested, and will initially absorb from one-half to one gallon of water a day.

Store the tree in a shaded area, such as a covered patio or garage.

Before you take the tree inside for decorating, remove the loose interior needles by tapping the tree on the patio or driveway a few times. The interior needles turn brown when they no longer get direct

sunlight, and this is not a sign of dryness.

Cut an inch off the base before placing the tree in a water-holding stand. Then check the water daily for the next week to keep the stand full. Don't let the water level fall below the tree's cut base.

To prevent premature drying of the needles, place the tree away from heat

sources such as warm air ducts, plate glass windows with a southern exposure and space heaters.

Keeping your tree well-watered and away from heat sources will help the tree keep its needles, shape and fragrance throughout the holiday season. A tree which retains some moisture is also less of a fire hazard in your home.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- ☐ Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- ☐ Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- ☐ Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- ☐ Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- ☐ Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- ☐ If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- ☐ Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- ☐ Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- ☐ Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- ☐ Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- ☐ Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- ☐ When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- ☐ Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- ☐ Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby and Post Mayor Giles McCrary in separate actions last week declared this week as "Greater DWI Awareness Week."

"The Christmas and New Year's holiday period is a particularly appropriate time to focus national attention on this critical problem, because more drivers are on the roads, more social functions are attended and more traffic collisions occur."

The "Greater DWI Awareness Week" is designed to emphasize the tragedy of drinking alcoholic beverages and driving.

Simply stated, "if you drive, don't drink...if you drink...don't drive."

fundamental question of what and how much should government be involved in social welfare at all.

One group says none at all.

Another says, well, it depends.

Others will call for total government support for almost every imaginable social welfare program.

Personally, I think the priority of government funding for social programs depends on where you are on the receiving end of the benefits.

Example...I don't think Mrs McKamie would object to the use of local taxpayer funds for the volunteer fire department, ambulance service, maintaining a hospital, garbage disposal, sewer service or water and streets.

All of these are in one way or another social welfare programs.

The question remains...how much should government be involved in helping those who need help but can't afford to pay for the services?

Right now, the state and the federal governments offer little or no help to drug or alcohol related individual problems in counseling or in rehabilitation.

A person who seeks help with either drug or alcohol addiction problems, must either have a private insurance policy to pay the bills, or else pay out of their own pocket.

And there are a lot of folks who need help who just don't have either one of these.

So what happens to these folks if we in Post and Garza County don't help them?

They either will end up without help, or in jail, or out of jail repeating their offenses to society...or worse, perhaps involved in automobile accidents as DWIs, killing or maiming innocent victims.

What is the alternative? What if the city and county don't fund this program?

Although both government units have already gone through the budgeting process and public meetings, discussing the issue thoroughly, it seems there are some who would scuttle the entire program.

What happens if that viewpoint prevails?

The answer, of course, is that many who need help here will not get it.

And then who pays?

Is there a way to measure the economic damage created by just one person with a drug or alcohol problem who want help but can't get it because he or she can't pay the private hospital the money it takes?

Who ends up paying when these people continue to abuse the lives of others, end up unemployed and worse?

It seems to me the \$18,000 total budget approved to be shared equally by both the county and city is a meager investment for a year's worth of help to

who knows how many people.

I completely understand the position that Mrs McKamie and other opposed to this program take, they really question the value of the services offered and do not believe that local tax money should be used in this way.

I just disagree, and I think that if this social program is not important enough for my tax money, then a whole list of other tax supported social programs should be scrutinized.

Do we horde our tax money just for the benefit of those who don't need help?

Surely not.

If we, as a community, are not willing to reach out to those in need and share our wealth to help others find a way out of their miserable condition...then there is something inherently askew with us.

I think our basic Christian charity will prevail.

There was no debate or question about using tax money to support the senior citizen program...which is an important social welfare for our elderly.

Is help to drug and alcohol addiction any less important?

How about the park, the swimming pool...should I go on?

I call on the city council to quit diddle-daddling around and sign the contract with the City County Drug and Alcohol Abuse program and get on with helping people who need help.

If only one person is saved from the disaster of drug and alcohol abuse, it is worth it.

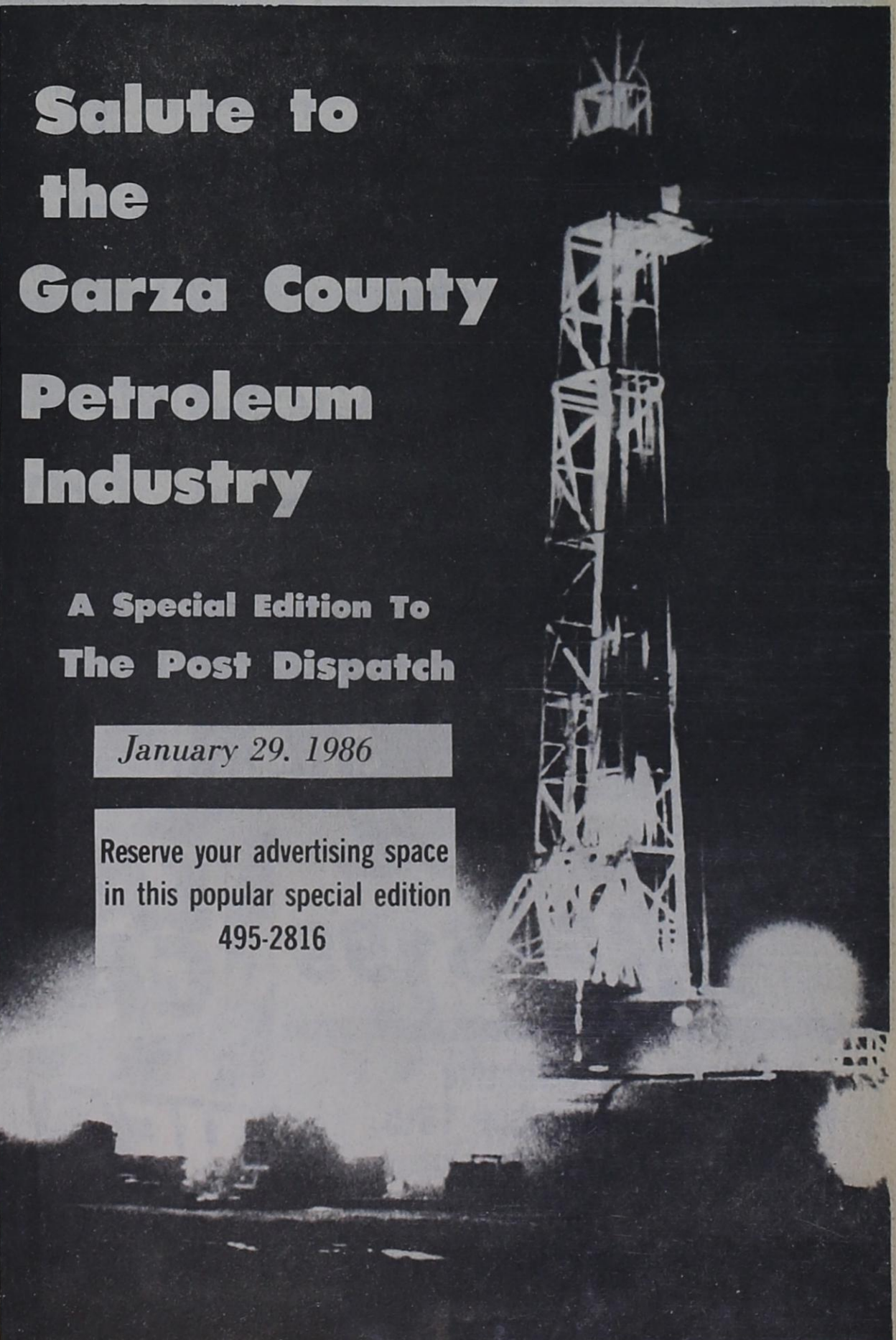

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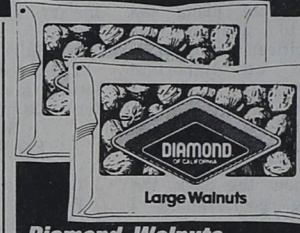
