Charles Ball memorial fishing tourney slated

In the past, Lockney area residents have had a spring fishing tournament which was organized by the late Charles Ball. Participants have elected to continue this tradition with the first annual Charles Ball Memorial Fishing Tournament, which is set for Saturday, April 16, at Lake Mackenzie.

The top three participants this year will split all the proceeds from entry fees. First place winner will receive 50 percent of the entry fees and a traveling trophy, second place will get 30 percent of the entry fees and the

third place winner will receive 20 percent of the fees.

Entry fee for the event is \$5.00 per person. The winner will be selected by catching the largest number of pounds of legal fish. The tournament is scheduled for 9:00 to 5:00. Following the tournament will be a barbeque, and entrants are asked to bring their own steak.

Anyone wishing to enter the tourney may do so at the Consumers Fuel Association office in Lockney by April 15. Entry fees and registration must be turned in by noon that day.

Cloud watchers brace for storms

Despite the availability of sophisticated weather equipment on the South Plains, the best weather warning system Lockneyites have is the eyes of volunteer firemen and law enforcement personnel.

These cloud watchers are ready for action with the first approach of a dangerous cloud.

Fire Marshal Lonny Hooten explains that continuous blasts of the fire sirens, "eight to 10 times," is the signal that a dangerous cloud is approaching. "We'll probably do this twice," Hooten says. Normally, persons have time to reach a cellar or basement after the siren sounds. However this is not always the case. The Lubbock tornado "just dropped out of the clouds."

If people believe that they do not have ample time to reach a cellar or basement, Hooten explains that the safest place is "in a closet in the center of a house" and away from windows. Individuals should cover themselves with blankets to help shield against flying debris.

The fire marshal says that the two

worst places for persons during a tornado is in a mobile home or a vehicle. Studies have revealed that a 100 mile per hour wind will overturn a mobile home, and virtually all tornadoes contain winds in excess of 200 miles per hour.

"You are safer in a ditch" than in a mobile home or vehicle, Hooten says.

CABLE TV WARNING

Verbal weather announcements will be issued over all cable television stations. A "pre-warning" is to be made that a storm cloud is approaching. Updated statements will be forthcoming concerning the movement of a dangerous cloud which may produce a tornado, hail or high winds.

Firemen and lawmen will feed messages to the cable TV system via telephone. Lockney Lions Club last year spearheaded a project to fund this system.

"We try not to get people needlessly alarmed," Hooten says of warnings. However, the cloud watchers use a common sense approach and attempt to

give early warnings.

Lockney Volunteer Fire Department and EMS service has "about 25" members. A minimum of "around 10" of these men will be available at any time to watch approaching clouds. In addition, the sheriff's department, police department and DPS troopers also are available to assist with cloud watching.

Hooten says the spotters take different vantage points along the storm's path, "without being directly in front of the cloud."

WEATHER CLASSES

Firemen and lawmen have weather classes each year to become as informed as possible about severe weather. National Weather Service personnel and others who study weather continue to learn more about the causes of storms and early detection.

During a severe weather conference recently, Lubbock TV weatherman Steve McCauley explained to the Lockneyites how such factors as dew point, heat index, humidity and other factors

are involved in severe weather.

McCauley pointed out to the group that "ninety-nine percent of the time" tornadoes emerge from the "back side of a cloud." Therefore, persons on the southeast side of the cloud normally have a better vantage point to spot tornadoes.

Rain and/or hail generally emerge from the "front part" of the cloud. Hooten quotes McCauley as saying that "the bigger the hail (stones), the bigger the storm."

A tornado comes down with the updraft.

Annual pre-school clinic April 13

The 38th annual pre-school clinic, sponsored by Athena Study Club, will be held on Wednesday, April 13, at Lockney Elementary School, from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Purpose of the annual event is to pre-register youngsters who will enter the Lockney school system for the first

time in September 1988. Included in this category are children who will reach their fifth birthday on or before September 1, 1988, and who are attending school for the first time. Also, children who are six years old and have never attended school previously should be at this clinic.

As in years past, children will receive a physical examination, vision screening, dental exams and speech screening. Conducting the physicals will be Drs. W.J. Mangold, Gary Mangold, and W.E. Prater. Dr. Stewart Webb will conduct vision screening, Dr. Jimmy Jones will examine teeth and Karen Quebe will hold the speech screening.

Also on hand will be South Plains Health Provider, which will give free immunizations for those who need them.

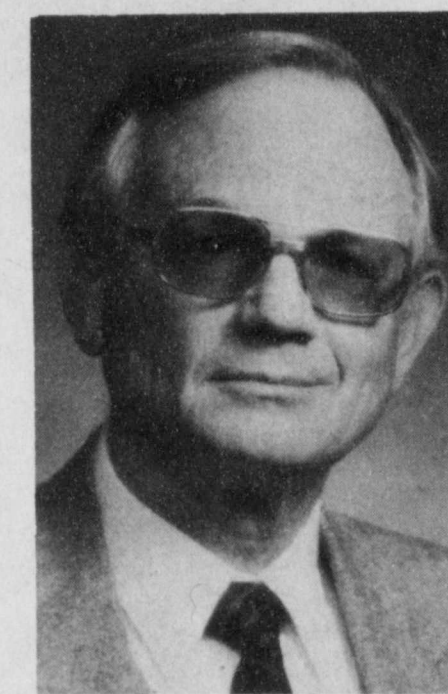
The entire clinic is free to all those who have children who will be entering Lockney schools in September 1988.

It is very important that parents bring the child's birth certificate and immunization records, school officials say.

In addition to being screened for health, vision, dental and speech problems, children will also be pre-enrolled in kindergarten. Pre-registration of

children saves time for both parents and school officials in that youngsters may come to their first day of school with a minimum of fuss since all but the usual first of school paper work is filled out.

Also by pre-registering, school officials will know the approximate number of kindergartners to plan for.

Family supports, loves ill child

Kristi Ochoa kept alive with expensive nutritional formula

"I noticed that she looked different from the other babies in the hospital," Ninfa Ochoa remembers soon after the birth of her second child on Jan. 18, 1979.

When Kristi Ochoa was five weeks old, Dr. W.J. Mangold, who had delivered the child at Lockney General Hospital, referred her to a pediatrician in Plainview.

The infant was hospitalized in Plainview for five hours before being transferred to Lubbock General Hospital.

"She wasn't supposed to make it out of the hospital," her mother remarks. "She had pneumonia and a long list of other things."

She defied the odds and survived. When Kristi was released from the Lubbock hospital 2½ weeks later, "They (doctors) told us she would be getting worse as she got older."

The girl's health problems began even before her birth, according to doctors. She contracted cytomegalovirus while still in her mother's womb. This "left her with palsy, blind and deaf in the right ear" from the time of her birth. She also has microcephaly (abnormally small head), epilepsy and respiratory difficulties.

Although her lifespan has surprised doctors, Kristi's parents were informed by specialists following her hospitalization in Lubbock General from March 9-18 that "Kristi is wasting away...that she is not going to make it," her mother says while blinking back tears. "Your mind just blanks out," she

adds, "because your mind doesn't want to hear that."

Her husband, Ubaldo Ochoa Sr., an employee of The Tye Co., explains that "the doctors told us she could go at any time. Every time she gets sick, she's getting that much weaker."

The Ochoa family — which consists of three other offspring: Ubaldo Jr., 12, April, 6, and Jessica, 2 — cherishes each minute with Kristi.

"When I told the older kids about Kristi, they were as hurt as we (parents) were," Mrs. Ochoa says. "They said, 'Mom, that's not true.'"

Despite the heartaches created by the nine-year-old's fragile health, "Our family has gotten closer. We've learned to live with Kristi's problems. The other children have become more responsible."

FINANCIAL HELP NEEDED

In addition to the psychological trauma experienced by the family, there are also financial woes.

When the Ochoa girl was released from Lubbock General Hospital in mid-March, her doctors placed her on a diet of "Vital," a special formula food. The product is "a nutritionally complete, partially hydrolyzed diet."

"That's all (food) she can have," her mother explains. Fed every three hours around the clock, the child consumes "about a box a day" of Vital.

Available to the Ochoas through

Lubbock General Hospital, the food costs over \$100 each week or in excess of \$400 monthly.

The family is covered by medical insurance, which pays for most of Kristi's hospital expenses. However, "The insurance won't pay for the formula because they don't consider it a medication," Ubaldo Ochoa says.

He adds that with Kristi "in and out of the hospital pretty frequently, it's been very expensive." He says that his wife stays with their daughter when she is hospitalized and that he travels to Lubbock after working hours "to check on Kristi."

The only means of financial support available to the Ochoa family has come through a fund at Lubbock General Hospital.

Ochoa's fellow employees of The Tye Co. "kicked in to start the fund."

PROBLEMS MOUNT

The family's problems — financial and emotionally — began to mount "when Kristi started getting sicker and sicker about a year and a half ago." She has spent "about five months" in the hospital during this period, including "three months at one time just a little over a year ago."

Doctors have suggested surgery on three different occasions, "and

we've turned it down," Ochoa says. He is quick to explain that "the only reason we've turned them down is because she's too weak" and the parents don't want to subject her to the additional ordeal of surgery.

"You never know," her father says, "she might be okay today and have trouble tonight or tomorrow." She has been "having trouble breathing and a lot of stomach cramps later," Mrs. Ochoa adds. "There is something different this time. She is blinking (rapidly) her eyes. I don't know if she's scared or what."

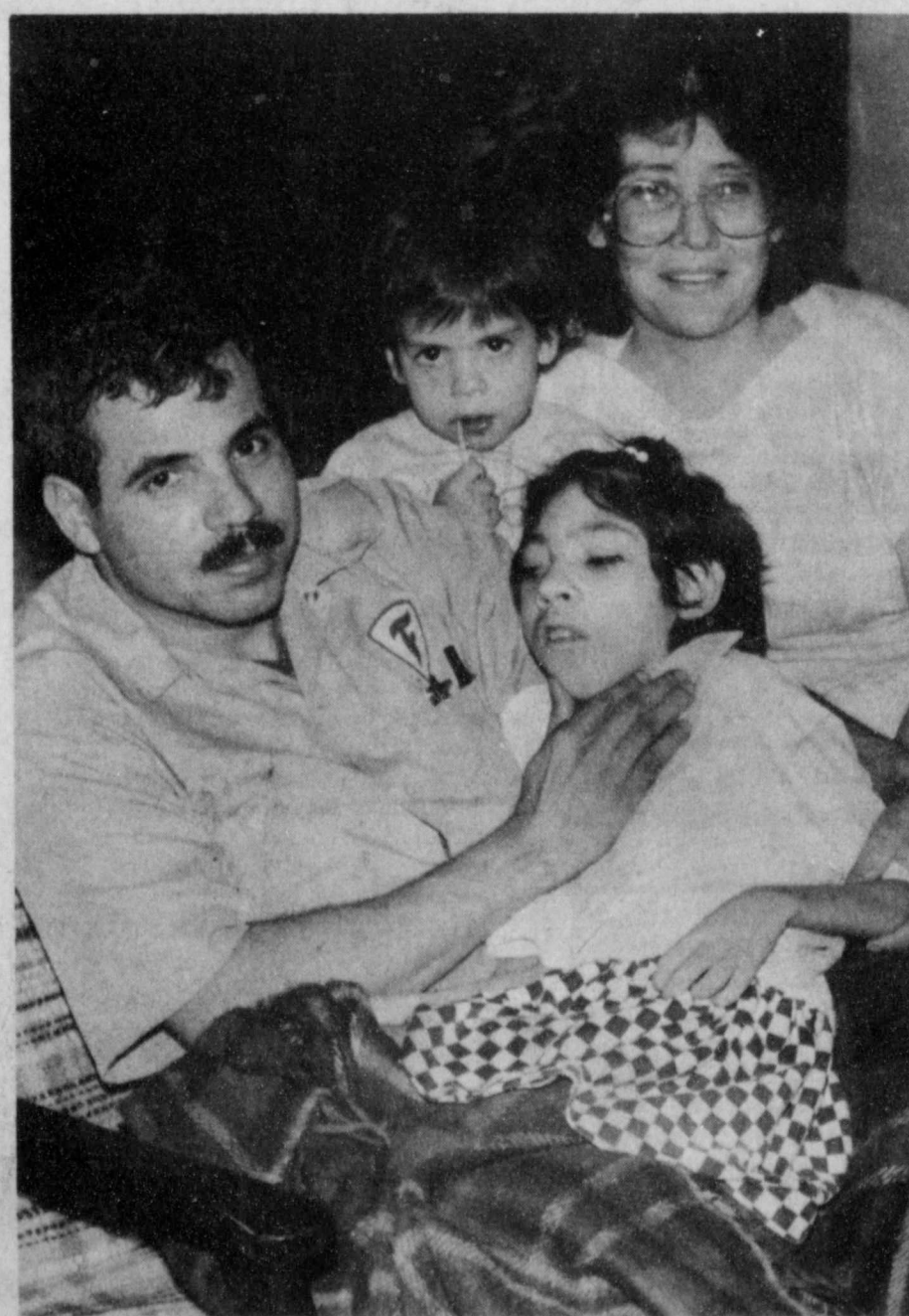
Ubaldo and Ninfa Ochoa want to keep their critically ill daughter at home — which is a neat, double-wide mobile home located at 109 Southwest Sixth Street — as long as possible, despite the hardships it brings. The mother is with Kristi around the clock, including the task of feeding her every three hours.

She sets her alarm clock at three-hour intervals, although "I'm getting used to it now." Each feeding requires "about 20 minutes; the doctors told us to go real slow."

The youngster is fed the supplement through a tube which protrudes from her abdomen and "which goes directly to her stomach." Her mother says that "water is about the only thing she can have" orally.

She has gained "about five ounces" since being released from the hospital in March despite

having diarrhea since that time. Mrs. Ochoa says her daughter's body weight fluctuates little from her normal 29 pounds. When the daughter is hospitalized and Mrs. Ochoa stays with her, Ubaldo says "I've had to be mother and father to the two older children. I see that they get off to school, wear warm clothing and things like that." During these periods, Mrs. Ochoa's mother, Lupe Balderas, has

kept "the baby," two-year-old Jessica, "who was born on Kristi's seventh birthday."

COMMON BIRTHDAYS

"That's a blessing to us," the father says. "If Kristi passes away, we will keep her in our hearts and we will still celebrate both birthdays at the same time." One important ingredient for which the ill girl does not lack is love...from her entire family. A grin spreads over her thin, pale face as her father holds her

close and speaks softly to her. "We all give her a lot of love," he says. Frequently held by one of her parents, she has a special chair with wheels for travel, but spends much of the day on a mat or "sponge" placed on the living room floor. Her mother says, "We have to move it every 20 or 30 minutes." Mrs. Ochoa adds, "She sleeps in a crib right now because we're afraid she might roll off a bed." Ubaldo Ochoa, who has resided in Lockney for 13½ years, and his wife, who "started to school here in

the third grade," are thankful for family and friends who have supported them during their difficulties. They express "thanks to Father Jack Gist, (pastor of San Jose Catholic Church) for his donation and help in other ways and to everyone for their prayers and help." Ubaldo and Ninfa realize all too well that time is running out for their nine-year-old daughter, but they cherish every minute with Kristi.

Funnels are not always visible from

clouds, sometimes being masked by a "debris cloud." Hooten says that "any

time there is a debris cloud, there is usually a tornado there."

He adds that individuals sighting a "rotating wall cloud" should seek shelter immediately because "more than likely it will put out a tornado." He points out that "white tornados" are "nothing more than the sun hitting a cloud" and causing it to appear to be white.

The public occasionally mistakes a "dust devil" or a "whirlwind" for a tornado. However, the dust devils and whirlwinds usually emerge from the front of a cloud while most tornados are spawned from the back side of a cloud.

EYES ON THE CLOUD

Community residents are comforted by the fact that volunteer firemen and lawmen have their eyes trained on approaching clouds and will give them the earliest detection possible of approaching severe weather. Firemen operate their cloud watches in two-man teams.

All of their vehicles are equipped with CBs to allow for constant communication between the various teams. Four of the units — twice as many as last year — have radios in order that these spotters can talk directly with the sheriff's department and the base radio unit at the fire station.

Should a vehicle not equipped with a radio spot a tornado, this information can immediately be relayed by CB to another unit with a radio which can submit the information to lawmen, Hooten says.

Although it means leaving their families and homes, the volunteer firemen are prepared to watch threatening clouds at any hour of the day or night.

Ringbearer was Nathaniel Yowell of

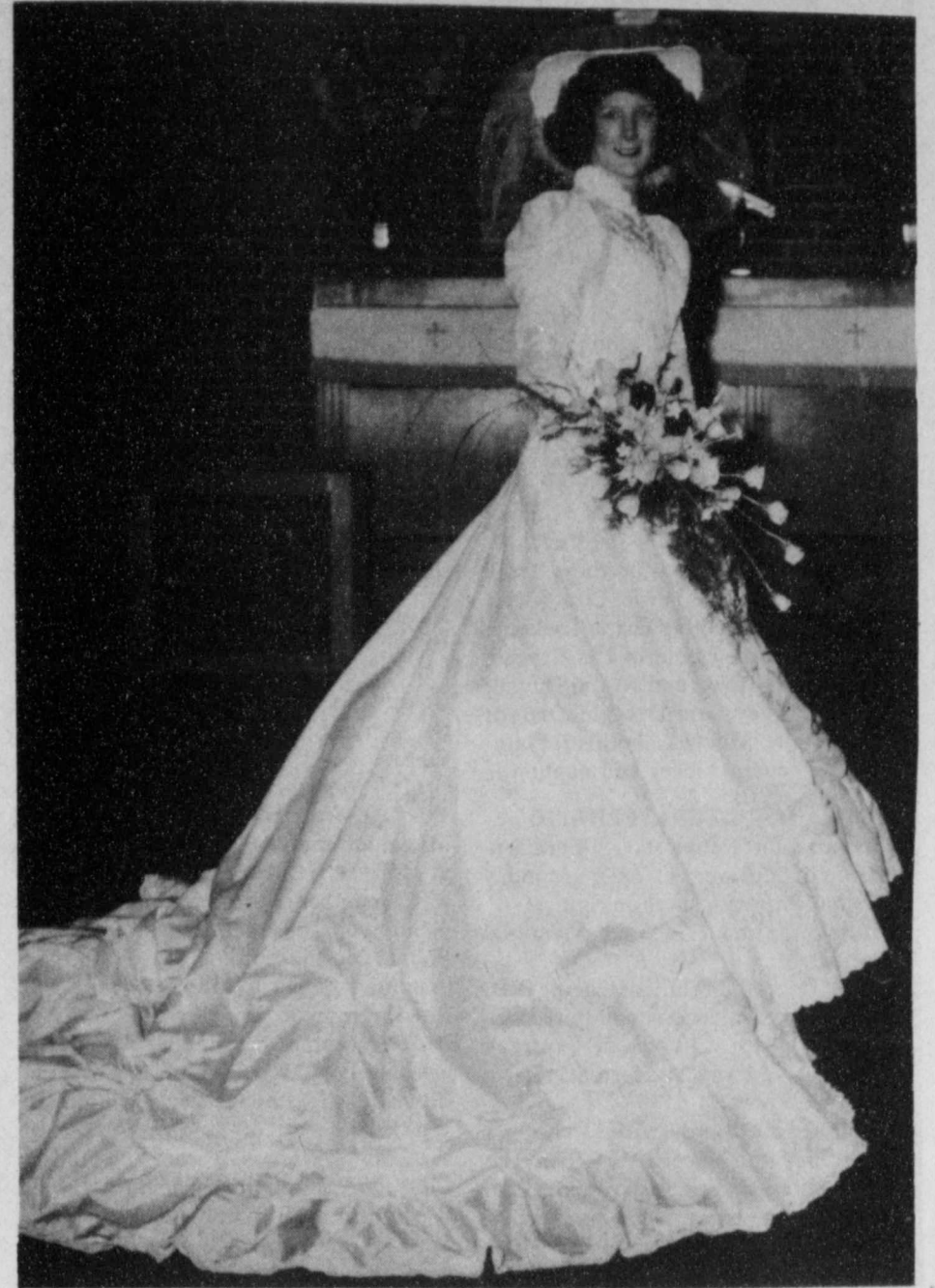
Carrollton, nephew of the bride.

Krystal Yeats is from Kermit and was visiting her great-grandfather, Garland Thrasher, here at Lockney Care Center. Krystal is a regular nursing home volunteer in Kermit. She enjoys working and playing with the elderly. Perhaps some of the young people here in Lockney would also enjoy being volunteers, if so, see me for an application. Those between ages 14 and 18 must have parents to sign the application, but we will be happy to have some who care for the elderly.

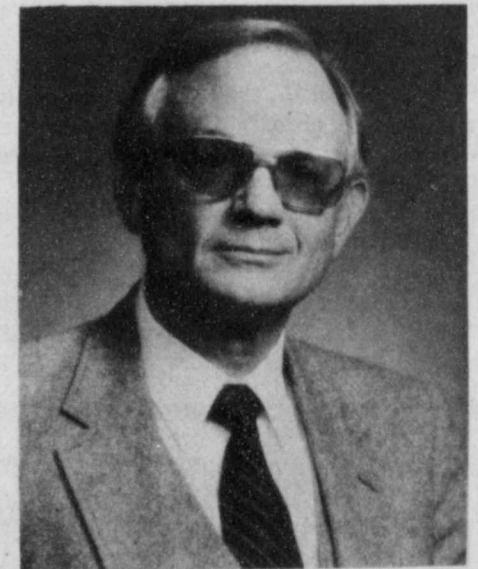

Social Security News

A number of beneficiaries in the local area were unpleasantly surprised last year with a penalty for not filing an annual report. The amount of the penalty is one months benefit check. The deadline is now drawing near for filing the 1987 annual report. Beneficiaries are urged to determine whether they should file the report, and to file the report if required.

People who get Social Security retirement or survivor checks and who earned more than the annual exempt amount in wages from a job or in self-employment in 1987 have until April 15, 1988, to file an annual report of their earnings.

The 1987 exempt amounts were \$6000 for people under 65 all of the year and \$8160 for people 65 or over any part of 1987. In general, a person has \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 of annual earnings over the exempt amount.

Social Security uses the annual report to decide whether the person received

the correct amount of benefits during 1987. If too much or too little was paid, any adjustment necessary is made based on the annual report.

A special monthly test is used during a person's first year of retirement. Under this test, a person can get a benefit for a month in which he or she did not earn wages over the monthly limit and did not perform substantial services in self-employment. This monthly test can be used only in the person's first year of retirement.

Most people who need to file a report should have received one in the mail. If a person did not get a form, or lost or misplaced the one he or she did get, another copy of the annual report form can be obtained at any Social Security office.
