BROOMCORN PRICES ADVANCE IN LINDSEY DISTRICT

Broomcorn marketing continues active in the Lindsey district, particularly at Lindsey, according to G. B. Alguire of the Hay, Feed, and Seed division, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture. The peak of the marketing, however, is over as the bulk of the crop now is out of the farmers' hands. Most of the broomcorn still remaining is of the larger crops, which, it is felt, was held more firmly than were the smaller crops. The better qualities held by free sellers, for the most part, has been sold.

Scarcity of the better brush, a firmer holding attitude on the part of farmers, reports of damage to Illinois brush, a dwindling of receipts as against a continued active demand has reflected in some market reaction with upward price tendencies and increased country driving. It is generally felt that from \$15.00 to \$20.00 per ton advance on the various grades is a conservative reflection of the market trend the past two weeks. This advance perhaps is most noticeable in the higher grades of broomcorn although all qualities have shown upward trends.

Shipments to date are 642 carloads. Of these, Lindsey has moved 367, Purcell 14, Blanchard 24, Wayne 1, Pauls Valley 48, Maysville 8, Bradley 18, Alex 17, Marlow 87, and Chickasha 62. Storage for the district remains about the same, being 86 carloads as against 81 two weeks ago. Little broomcorn is being held longer than is necessary to load and ship.

The movement of broomcorn to date in the Lindsey district has exceeded all previous records for a like period. Up to September 13th, 732 carloads, representing both shipments and storage, have changed hands. In addition to this there are possibly 25 carloads already bought for delivery to the country. It is estimated that over one-half of the shipments have moved direct to factories. A check on the bank loans and on information obtained from the dealers indicates that the movement of broomcorn from farm to market, for the most part has been heaviest from the outlying districts or tributary to the larger shipping points. Pauls Valley reports 80 per cent sold, Marlow 90, Maysville 65, Purcell 30, Chickasha 85, Blanchard 75, Alex and Bradley 60 per cent. Estimates placed on the district, as a whole, are that fully 65 per cent of the Lindsey crop is out of the farmers' hands.

Prices show a material advance over those of two weeks ago. In this connection, it is significant to note that the marketing trend has reflected firmer holding on the part of producers and more liberal buying on the part of manufacturers. The September report of the Division of Crop and Livestock Estimate recently released which shows a decline in the tonnage forecast of the broomcorn crop of approximately 2000 tons under the August forecast doubtless will give added strength to the future markets of broomcorn as this estimate indicates a production well within the needs of the manufacturers, and but a slight amount over prospective requirements for the year.

U. S. IMMIGRATION OFFICERS USE CHEVROLETS

Smugglers and undesirable immigrants attempting to cross the border between the United States and Mexico will face a still more efficient barrier with the announcement that the government has purchased four Chevrolet touring cars for its immigration patrol squadron.

"Modern law evaders use automobiles and not horses," said D. P. Gay, Jr., border patrol chief, at Brownsville, Texas, where the United States Immigration Service purchased the four Chevrolets.

"With smugglers using cars to transport their contraband and aliens endeavoring to speed by our inspectors in fast automobiles, we decided to speed up our own organization with more cars. We must be equally as well mounted as our adversaries."

Illegal entrance to this country has naturally been sought by the smugglers at the most inaccessible points to the border, remote from well-traveled roads at spots where automobiles are subjected to the most severe tests in deep sand and gullies.

Government inspectors found their transportation needs demanded a car of rugged construction, free from necessity of frequent repairs, and with ample cooling facilities to withstand the torrid heat.

The Chevrolets were purchased in open competitive bidding. In the official specifications it was detailed "the cars are for scouting work, will be required to run on an average of from 1200 to 1500 miles per month on both smooth and rough as well as rocky roads and through mud and sand country of mesquite vegetation."

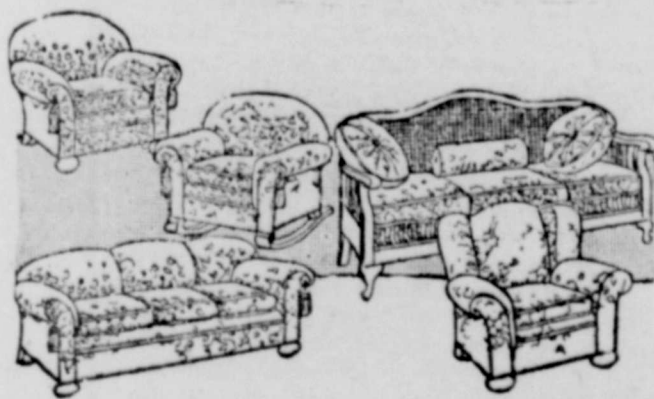

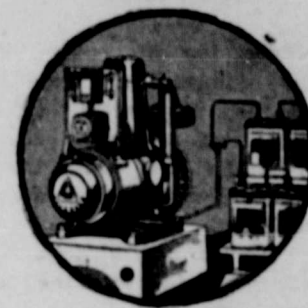

The Federal Land Banks are probably the greatest and most outstanding successful farmer's co-operative institutions. Their success has been due to the machinery of the law itself and to a generally good business management in co-operation among the borrowers, the Farm Loan Associations, the Banks and the Farm Loan Board, with safeguards placed here and there designed to prevent selfish exploitation and political management, which often threaten the life of co-operative institutions.

The magnitude of the business done by the Federal Land Bank in Texas is shown by the loans that have been made—approximately \$138,000,000, to approximately 48,000 borrowers, including mortgages on approximately thirteen million acres. The Land Bank organization in Houston has 61 officers and employees, there are sixteen Federal appraisers actively at work in the field, and there are 2250 officers and directors of National Farm Loan Associations.

**The Farm Loan Association—
the Local Organization**

The Farm Loan Association is a chartered corporation, with all of its borrowers stockholders. Its capital stock often exceeds the capital stock of the local commercial bank. The

associative covers one, and sometimes more than one, county. It has its own board of directors, elected at an annual stockholders' meeting in January, and its own president, vice president, and loan committee. The active officer is the secretary-treasurer. The combined capital of these associations in Texas is \$6,200,000. The net earnings of the bank, after reserve and surplus are set aside, go to the Farm Loan Associations in dividends. This dividend is now 10 per cent per annum. This becomes funds of the association, and after expenses of the association are met and any possible delinquency taken care of, the dividend is distributed to borrow-stockholders.

The wealth that has failed the farmer because of lack of satisfactory conditions of production or unprofitable markets gives rise to problems which affect him deeply,

but the serious problem which existed a decade ago—that is, the problem of saving the farmer's wealth after he had made it, by the cutting off of high interest rate and costly expense in connection with the financing of farm mortgages, was successfully solved by Congress when in 1916 it passed the Farm Loan Act creating the banks of the Federal Farm Loan System. After less than ten years of continuous operation the Federal Land Banks of the United States have loaned to four hundred thousand farmers over

a billion two hundred fifty million dollars, which represents largely a refunding operation taking up high interest rate loans.

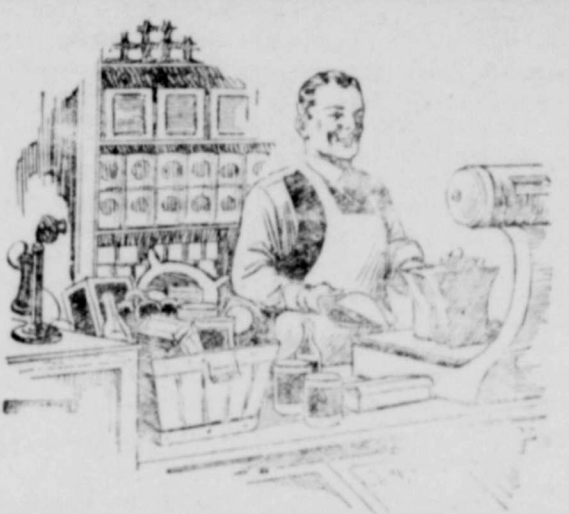
