Houston Negroes Barred From Vote In Primary

Monday Rain Boosts July Total To Record Amount

Total Since Last Saturday Night Is Now Five Inches

Farmers Jubilant, With Prospect For Bumper Cotton Crop In South Plains This Season.

BRINGS PRECIPITATION IN CITY NEAR NORMAL

Rains Yesterday Add More Than Inch To Heavy Fall Of Saturday and Sunday Locally.

Following on the heels of a record-breaking rain over the South Plains and the entire Panhandle Saturday and Sunday, rainfall again drenched the area late yesterday afternoon in a heavy down-pour which lasted several hours.

Lubbock's rainfall since Saturday reached the high total of about five inches last night, the largest amount of rainfall which ever fell in a similar period of time in July, according to an official statement of Don L. Jones, of the Experimental Station, near this city.

According to reports compiled yesterday, no section of West Texas within a radius of more than a hundred miles in every direction of here was missed by the three day period of heavy rains. Virtually every district reported precipitation ranging from .50 of an inch to four inches.

Beginning at about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon the rain fell in sheets for more than an hour, then settled to a heavy steady drizzle until about 8 o'clock. Rainfall amounting to 1.43 inches fell here within the twenty-four hours up until 8 o'clock last evening, the heaviest at the experimental station showed.

Farmers in this territory were elated following the drenching rains. It was said that the crop prospects were brighter than they had been for years.

The rain which began Saturday night broke a drought ranging from one to several weeks over different sections of the South Plains. Crops were beginning to suffer in several places.

Four Cars Swept Into High Water

Four Narrowly Escape Drowning When Headrise Comes On Yellowhouse Canyon At Justiceburg.

Tourists coming into Lubbock yesterday told stories of being stranded by high water on many of the highways leading into the city. Many declared the recent rain to be one of the heaviest ever visiting this section.

Four automobiles were reported buried in the mud and water that flowed in a head rise, down the Yellowhouse canyon near Justiceburg, yesterday morning.

Occupants of one automobile narrowly escaped death, being caught in mid-canyon when the headrise came. The car, a sedan, was swept from the concrete that forms the highway here and plunged into the mud downstream. Occupants escaped by lowering windows in the car and swimming to safety.

Those in the car were Oscar Hodge of Stephenville, Miss Alma Hodge, his sister and Miss Lola Price of Cleburne, Tex. students; and a six-year-old girl by the name of Callahan from Plainview. Water was nearly to the top of the car when the windows were opened. The doors were held fast by force of the rushing water.

Two hundred cars were reported halted at Justiceburg by the high water and mud, and being towed across via the team-and-mule route.

Roads in all directions were veritable quagmires, progress being extremely difficult though some hardy drivers were ploughing through from every direction. Bus traffic was disrupted.

Carranza's Body Lies In State At National Palace

Squadron of Planes Escort Funeral Train Into Mexico City; Entire Nation Mourns Loss.

MEXICO CITY, July 23.—Captain Emilio Carranza's body lay in state in the Mexican National Palace today while his countrymen and his friends across the border to the north mourned his passing.

Flowers of every hue were heaped high on the casket of the good will fighter and filled almost to overflowing the state chamber in which it lay surrounded by soldiers of the presidential guard.

Tomorrow all that remains of the man who gave his life to strengthen the ties between Mexico and the United States will be buried in his country's "Field of the Illustrious Dead," Dolores cemetery. It has been proclaimed a day of national mourning and government offices and schools will be closed while all private business functions will cease.

Planes Are Escorts.

Captain Carranza came back to his nation's capital today with an escort of planes flying overhead and school children along the ten mile route from Mexico to the palace strewn flowers in the path of the artillery column that carried his body. His homecoming was marked by one of the most impressive demonstrations of mourning in Mexico's history. It is estimated

COTTON CONFERENCE

Stabilization of Price Will Be Sought

DALLAS, July 23 (AP)—A south-wide conference to determine a profitable price for cotton and to stabilize the price will be held here August 6 under auspices of the Farmers' Marketing Association of America, president W. B. Yeary said today.

The call for the conference was signed by Senator John Davis, W. Kirby, John J. Simmons and T. W. "Whit" Davidson, together with other members and directors of the association. Mr. Davidson will preside.

Business men, bankers, representatives of chambers of commerce throughout the south and cotton farmers are expected to attend. Methods to prevent harmful influences on the profitable price from either authorized crop reports will be sought.

Would Eliminate Local Bond Issues For Texas Highway Construction

Police Hunt For Morones, Foe Of General Obregon

Former Secretary of Labor In Mexican Cabinet, Resigns and Is Believed To Be In Hiding.

MEXICO CITY, July 23.—Luis Morones, political foe of General Alvaro Obregon, and who resigned the ministry of labor at the behest of Agrarian elements, was today the object of a search by police. General Antonio Rios Zertuche, appointed chief of police to investigate the assassination of Obregon, said that Morones was reported to be in hiding. He added the police were investigating a rumor that he was concealed in Mexico City.

The chief also stated that Jose De Leon Toral, that art student who killed General Obregon, had made a "complete confession."

Catholic clergy had been cooperating with the police in their investigation. The first pronouncement by President Calles after the killing of Obregon laid the blame for the crime on Catholics generally and members of the priesthood in particular. This sentiment was echoed by General Zertuche. He did not go into details respecting the cooperation which he is now getting from leaders of the church.

Tracing the pistol which De Leon used, police said they had discovered it had been furnished by one Manuel Trejo. They assert he has fled to the United States.

TEXAS BANK CLOSES

Fort Arthur Officials Reassure Depositors

FORT ARTHUR, July 23 (AP)—Officials of the Seaboard Bank and Trust company, which failed to open for business today, said tonight that the affairs of the bank were in a solvent condition and the institution undoubtedly would reopen within a few days.

The bank was ordered closed by the board of directors and affairs of the institution placed in the hands of the banking commission. A state bank examiner arrived today from Austin.

FERGUSONISM ISSUE

Moody Says Question Is Same As In 1926

FORT WORTH, July 23 (AP)—Declaring the issue in the present gubernatorial campaign is similar to that of two years ago, Governor Moody, candidate for re-election, spoke here tonight before a crowd of approximately 4,000 persons, defending and reviewing his administration during the past two years.

Governor Moody charged the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram is supporting the candidacy of Louis J. Wardlaw, Fort Worth citizen, for governor and declared it the Ferguson Forum are the "Mutt and Jeff" of this campaign. He attributed lack of the Star-Telegram's support to his refusal to make an appointment. "Which I was requested to make."

Need Of More Hard Surfaced Roads For Lubbock County Impressed By Spur Highway Meeting

"Lubbock county needs hard surfaced roads," three Lubbock good-roads boosters declared last night, stronger than ever after a trip to Spur where they attended the annual meeting of the Texas Transcontinental Trail highway association and returned following the heavy rains.

Tom Garrard, Ollie Clem and Garnet Reeves, represented Lubbock at the meeting and got back to Lubbock last night at 10 o'clock after a seven-hour trip from Spur. Three hours were spent on the road from Idaho to Lubbock and the three declared that the rain is the heaviest they have ever seen in Lubbock county. The road is practically impassible, they report.

The worst place is about a mile and a half north of the Canyon school where they were pulled through by a team. The

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, July 23.—A policy that would eliminate the practice of counties and districts helping build state highways through them with local bond issues, and local funds, was adopted by representatives of three regional Chambers of Commerce of Texas here Monday.

Taxes on fuels and lubricants used in motor vehicles, and registration fees, "equitably adjusted as to tonnage and use, were recommended as the sole revenue for construction and maintenance of state highways.

The conferees recommended that this policy be made retroactive by providing that the state pay interest and maturity of such portion of county and road district bond proceeds as has been invested in constructing highways incorporated into the state system.

Favor Fees to Counties.

A policy of giving all registration fees to the county to be used first for retirement of local bonds used in building parts of state highway with remainder going to county road purposes, also favored by the conferees.

Further recommendation was made the state constitution be amended to give the state "wide latitude" in the use of highway revenues by declaring gasoline and fuels a constitutional revenue, authorizing the legislature to provide for a larger allotment of such revenue for highway purposes. Schools get one-fourth of the gasoline tax now.

Representatives of the South East and West Texas chambers of commerce will report back to them for consideration, the policies adopted here.

To Meet With Board.

Before the contemplated legislative program based on the recommendations is adopted, however, the conferees expect to meet with members of the highway commission and its engineering staff.

A draft of recommendations was prepared by a committee composed of a representative from each regional chamber—Clarence Osley, Dallas, for East Texas; J. P. Williams, Mineral Wells for West Texas, and State Representative Leonard Tilton of Ealy, for South Texas.

Believe Stanton Fugitive Caught

Man Thought Missing Bank "Frame Up" Suspect Is Arrested by Officers At California Town.

(By Associated Press) MODESTO, Calif., July 23.—A man giving the name of William Carter, 44, was held in the county jail here today suspected of being C. C. (Cal) Baze, who escaped from jail at Midland, Texas, March 18 after over-powering the guard.

Baze was arrested with Lee Smith and charged with the murder of two Mexicans at Stanton in December.

Speeches of Both Candidates To Be Sent Over Radio

Acceptance Addresses Of Hoover and Smith Will Be Broadcast by National Chain of Stations.

INTEREST IN SERVICE DECLARED VERY HIGH

N. B. C. Offers Broadcast Over Extensive Chain As Public Service, Without Charge to Parties.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 23.—Acceptance speeches of Hoover and Smith will be broadcast to the entire nation by the National Broadcasting company and associated stations as a public service and without cost to the candidates. It was announced tonight by M. H. Aylesworth, president of the N. B. C. The Hoover speech is to be made August 11 and Smith's at a date to be set by him, probably during the week of August 19.

"Arrangements have been completed with the republican national committee for the National Broadcasting Company and associated stations to carry the acceptance speech of Herbert Hoover from Palo Alto, California, on August 11, to radio listeners throughout the entire United States," said Aylesworth. "We have offered the N. B. C. nationwide system to the democratic national committee subject to the approval of a definite time by Governor Smith."

The National Broadcasting Company's system has been offered gratuitously to Secretary Hoover and Governor Smith because the acceptance speeches are of national importance.

The campaigns to follow, utilizing radio broadcasting will be on

SEEKS RELEASE

Man Held For Hold-up Slaying Requests Write

WICHITA FALLS, July 23 (AP)—George Duckett, held in the Wichita county jail on charges of murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Charles McDaniels Wednesday in the attempted robbery of the First State Bank of Dundee, will seek his release through a writ of Habeas Corpus, his attorneys announced today.

Duckett was identified by Chas. Drummond of Dundee, an eye witness of the shooting, as the man who shot McDaniels. Residents of New Castle, where Duckett was arrested, testified at a hearing, however, that Duckett was in New Castle at the time of the shooting.

RULING ON PRIMARY

Participants Must Support Nominee, In S. C.

COLUMBIA, S. C., July 23 (AP)—The Democratic state executive committee decided today that members of the Democratic who vote in the state primary must vote for the party nominee in the national election.

Immediately after the vote was announced D. A. Spivey, of Horry county, introduced a resolution that it was the sense of the committee that the matter be left to the conscience of the individual voter, but this resolution was voted down 20 to 19.

Hearing Opens On Orient Railroad Sale to Santa Fe

Several Objections to Proposed Merger In Texas Are Voiced to Interstate Commerce Commission.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 23.—The project of the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad for acquiring the Kansas City Mexico and Orient was put under examination today jointly by Interstate Commerce Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission.

The transaction was first explained in detail by W. T. Kemper, former receiver and now president of the Orient line; and this was supplemented by F. B. Houghton, vice president of the Santa Fe system. Chairman Gilmore of the Texas Railroad Commission was aided by Examiner Davis of the Interstate Commerce Commission in conducting the hearing.

The New Orleans Joint Traffic Bureau, an organization representing shippers, obtained leave to intervene in the proceedings with an objection to the entire transaction. The bureau's petition contended that inclusion of the Orient line in the Santa Fe system would eliminate railroad competition to a considerable degree, and would constitute a combination of parallel lines.

Railroads Intervene.

Two railroad companies, the Missouri Pacific and Fort Worth and Oversee lines, also intervened, asking that the commission maintain open traffic routes over the Orient system for the joint use of other

Raskob, chairman of the democratic national committee, said today.

The chairman said he believed the governor's "personality" is a very important item in the campaign.

BOY HELD; WAS DRUNK

14-Year-Old Lad In Jail Awaiting Decision

Arrested Sunday night on a charge of being drunk, a fourteen year old local boy is in the Lubbock county jail pending the disposal of his case.

His companion of Sunday night, Paul Walker, 17 years of age, yesterday paid a fine of \$5 and costs in county court on a charge of drunkenness. Being a juvenile the younger boy could not be tried on the drunkenness. An effort was being made yesterday to locate his parents.

The two youths were picked up by county officers after it had been phoned in that they were drunk and "whooping it up" on Avenue H.

Judge Holds That No Legal Right Of Negro Cancelled

Negro, Filing Petition, On Behalf of South Texas Blacks, Declares Case To Be Taken To High Court.

REGULATION RIGHT OF PARTY DEFENDED

Judge Declares State Statutes On Primary Elections Are Not Contrary To Federal Constitution.

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, July 23.—Negroes will be barred from the Democratic primaries in Harris county as the result of a decision handed down late today by Federal Judge J. C. Hutcheson Jr. in the case of J. B. Grisham, negro, against Guy Harris, chairman of the county executive committee.

The negro, whose suit was filed in behalf of all members of his race in the county, asked an injunction to prevent members of the executive committee and county election officials from barring negroes at the primary.

Judge Hutcheson held that political parties may prescribe qualifications of members and declared in his opinion that no legal right of the negroes was nullified by barring them from the Democratic primary elections.

The injunction suit attacked state statutes delegating right to fix qualifications of membership of the Democratic party to the state executive committee, as contrary to the 14th and 15th Amendments to the constitution of the United States.

Judge Hutcheson ruled, however, that the state statutes were constitutional and that they did not regulate the elections or make the Democratic party a state party.

The case will be appealed to the supreme court of the United States attorneys for the negroes said.

Youth Held For Snyder Burglary

Posse Pursues 21-Year-Old Alleged Thief Through Muddy Field; Money Is Found In Possession.

(Special To The Avalanche) SNYDER, July 23.—After a thrilling five mile chase through muddy fields, Denny Adams, age 21, was caught by a posse from Snyder yesterday afternoon, on charges of burglarizing Snyder's filling station at Snyder Sunday and of taking a car belonging to Joe Blake of this place.

Adam's car became embedded in mud on a side road leading out of Brownfield. He left his car and went to a farmhouse nearby where he was located by the posse in a side room where he was hiding.

It was said that about \$100 was taken from the filling station.

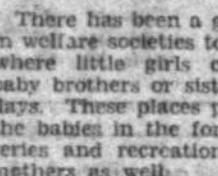
UNWED MOTHERS

YOUR CHILDREN

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There has been a great movement in welfare societies to provide places where little girls can take their baby brothers or sisters on summer days. These places provide care for the babies in the form of day nurseries and recreation for the little mothers as well.

It is one of the greatest humilities extant. There are many families where mothers must be away all day earning, in which the oldest little girl must take the place of the parent. Everywhere in certain districts of large cities we see these "little mothers" caring for babies. They carry them around, often the babies almost as big as themselves, and never know a free moment away from their charges.

In other homes where the mother is busy all day long, it is often the custom to call upon an older child to help in taking care of the baby. While mother washes or feeds or sews or cleans, the little daughter of the house will be wheeling her baby brother out for his airing, watching him while he plays on the porch, directing his little journeys on his kiddy car, or even bathing him, feeding him, and dressing him. And that is all right as far as it goes. Or rather if it does not go too far. I have known mothers who never thought fit to relieve their little girls from this responsibility from one summer's end to the other. There is another thing about children taking care of babies. They may hurt their backs or bend their soft cartilaginous bones out of shape by carrying a heavy baby around. Whenever I see a woman with misshapen shoulders, particularly with the right lower than the left, I say to myself, "She has probably helped to bring up her mother's family when she was a child."

And think of the baby! Is he safe with his ten-year-old sister carrying him around? Isn't she likely to let him fall?

In a house with endless work to be done, I should reverse the order of things. A little girl of ten can learn many household duties and relieve her mother that way. It seems a much safer plan for everybody, and is certainly kinder to her.

Vacation should be as much of a vacation as possible. All children must play.

These commands are all very well.

The 34 unmarried mothers seem happiest by the simple process of parking their children with "the old folks," stepping out and getting a job, and proceeding to have a good time again. Once more, the parents pay and pay and pay! But it's their own fault—they raise children to expect it!

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Tunney Predicts He Will Finish Heeney By Kayo Route

Champion Avers He Is Far From Over Confident

Gene Tells Them His Punch Is Better Even Than It Was On Times He Defeated Jack Dempsey.

LUBBOCK, N. Y., July 23. (AP)—Although not overconfident, Gene Tunney believes he has an excellent chance to score a knockout next Thursday night when he defends his heavyweight title against Tom Heeney in the Yankee stadium.

"I feel in better condition for the coming contest than for either of my fights with Jack Dempsey," the champion told the Associated Press.

"My hands are stronger than they have been in years and this in view of the fact that I am confident that I am punching harder than since I began professional boxing."

"I am not overconfident, but I believe I will win and I agree with my camp members that if I can land a solid punch against the contender—punches such as I have shown in training, that a knockout is likely. I will do my best."

Billy Gibson, the champion's manager, is of the same opinion.

"Gene is in the best condition of his entire career," Gibson said. "He is sharp in boxing judgment and he is punching with a viciousness that means business. He does not underestimate the contender as many champions have done, but I will be personally disappointed if Gene does not stop the Britisher."

Tunney was down to 190 pounds, the weight he will carry into the ring against Heeney. He spent the day resting up after taking a brief workout on the roads during the morning. His final training session will take place tomorrow afternoon when he goes through his paces before an audience of newspapermen only.

Heeney Concludes Training Grind

FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 23. (AP)—It is all over now but the clouting for Tom Heeney.

The hard rock finished six weeks of training at the Rumson Kenney Farms today with four rounds of boxing and four rounds of gymnasium work.

After the last glove whizzed through the hot air of the hot bath in which he worked, Heeney considered his training ended. There will be no more boxing. He will not see another glove until he crawls into the ring in the Yankee stadium next Thursday, to battle Gene Tunney in quest of the world's heavyweight championship.

Heeney merely breezed through his boxing and did not appear to take it seriously. He worked better than he did yesterday but there was nothing outstanding. He faced James J. Braddock for the first two rounds and then a board of strategy sent Eddie Crozier, a New York 145 pounder, into the ring to speed him up for two rounds.

Crozier appeared timid and afraid that Heeney might accidentally let a punch fly at him. He continually peeked away with long lefts and was in retreat with Heeney in his pursuit. Once Heeney nailed him with a left hook, but otherwise he made no serious attempt to cut loose.

Leo P. Flynn, the Grey Old Fox of fistiana, took issue with Jack Dempsey today over Heeney's chances against Tunney. Flynn, who trained Dempsey for his second battle with the champion, unhesitatingly picks Tunney, whereas Dempsey yesterday gave Heeney an even chance.

"Tunney will win," Flynn said. "I don't know about him knocking Heeney out."

WAYBOURNE TRIAL

Seek To Show Woman Wanted to Collect Insurance

BASTROP, Tex., July 23. (AP)—The State attempted by testimony in district court Monday to place out its theory that Mrs. Rosa Waybourne, 46 year old widow, conspired with H. H. Middleton, neighboring blacksmith, in the killing of her husband, W. W. Waybourne, Smithville man, to collect his insurance.

Mrs. Gertrude Garaway, seamstress living near Smithville, testified under questioning of district attorney Merton L. Harris that Mrs. Waybourne, talking of her husband, said she "would bump the old fellow off." The witness said this declaration was made in a conversation while she was sewing for Mrs. Waybourne.

Irate Father and Novelist at Peace

Dr. Martin Loeb and Maxwell Bodenheim Are Reconciled After Daughter Found

HYANNIS, Mass., July 23.—Dr. Martin J. Loeb, irate New York father, who pursued Maxwell Bodenheim, novelist to Provincetown in search of his 15 year old daughter, Gladys, an aspirant to literary honors, was believed peacefully on his home today and with him were the Bohemian author and his erstwhile Greenwich Village protegee.

They boarded a New Bedford bound bus here after a night spent at an inn where under the title of "Martin J. Loeb and family" they recuperated from an exciting week and that furnished sensations aplenty for staid Cape Cod.

As they quit the inn in the New York physician, who had a short time before denounced the novelist as a "tramp" and a "bum," strode out in front followed by Gladys. Recently the girl attempted suicide because Bodenheim had criticized her work adversely.

The poet, novelist and self-described "genius" whose literary criticism caused another girl to drown herself last week and brought Bodenheim temporarily under the eye of the police, trudged wearily behind in need of a shave, a shine

and a press.

Gladys was credited with bringing her father and the poet to terms. Dr. Loeb had arrived in Provincetown Saturday shortly after it became known his daughter was missing and while New York authorities were seeking the novelist to question him with regard to the suicide of Miss Virginia Drew, who jumped into the Hudson river after an interview with Bodenheim in which he told her her poetry was "hopeless."

Shortly after the physician, with chief of police John Williams, had roused the novelist from slumber in the "shack" which he had rented, a messenger arrived with a telegram from Gladys announcing her impending arrival from Boston.

Dr. Loeb met Gladys at the train and succeeded in getting her into a taxi-cab and half a mile down the road when she announced her intention not to return to New York unless "Max" came with them.

Finally they left the cab and the taxi driver was rushed back for the poet, who packed his "baggage" in a spare newspaper and soon joined them.

Soviet Part Of Kellogg Pact Is Not Yet Decided

No German Initiative To Be Toward Participation, Advice From Berlin Declared Yesterday.

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, July 23.—Soviet participation in the Kellogg multilateral pact to outlaw war has not been discussed in German governmental circles and there will be no German initiative toward it, at least in the near future, it was learned today.

Competent opinion in German officialdom is assuming that if the Soviet government wishes to be a signatory of the pact, it will indicate so in good time.

Occasion for this may come after Germany has signed and has notified Russia of the act. The treaty of Berlin provides that Germany shall notify Russia of all formal treaties and pacts which she signs with other countries and when this is done with regard to the Kellogg pact, there would be opportunity for Russia to act.

The Soviet government then could intimate to Germany a desire to be added to the list of signatories and Berlin would feel obliged to inform the United States and other interested powers of Russia's readiness to sign.

German parliamentarians generally are hopeful the Kellogg treaty will result in speeding up universal disarmament. Their predominant feeling is the pact has justification only if disarmament is accomplished.

For, they argue, powers which are armed to the teeth can command but scant credence for their willingness to outlaw war.

There is a direct bearing too, in German eyes, on the occupation of the Rhineland. "What has France to fear if war is outlawed?" is the question asked on that aspect of the treaty. On this point, however, the government prefers to maintain a non-committal attitude, believing that there are more immediately dangerous spots in Europe than the occupied Rhine districts.

NICARAGUAN NEWS

Wilbur Declares He Has "Good Report"

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 23. (AP)—Good news of great importance regarding America's present efforts to pacify and stabilize Nicaragua was brought to President Coolidge today by Secretary Wilbur of the Navy department.

Mr. Wilbur, who stopped off here on his way to the Pacific Coast, upon detouring said he could not reveal the specific nature of his information before telling Mr. Coolidge at the Summer White House.

He indicated, however, that it concerned United States' effort to quell and disperse bandit bands which, under the guidance of Augusto Sandino, have kept Nicaragua in a state of turmoil since civil war was stopped last year by the efforts of Henry L. Stimson, acting as Mr. Coolidge's personal representative.

\$200,000 FIRE

Refinery Blaze Finally Brought Under Control

WOOD RIVER, Ill., July 23. (AP)—After burning for five hours, a fire in the oil and gasoline tank field of the White Star refinery here was brought under control today. Loss was estimated between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

Philologist

MME. LIS JACOBSON

PARIS, July 23.—Deciphering the ancient Norse inscriptions to which the Vikings praise their heroes and left their cryptic story of conquest and discovery, is the job of Mme. Lis Jacobson, professor at the University of Copenhagen and a foremost woman philologist.

Mrs. Jacobson is carrying on the work of her late husband, one of the first persons to decipher Runic inscriptions. His discoveries and those that Madame Jacobson has made since his death are changing the world's ideas of the role the Norseman played in the world's history about the year 1000.

When she lectured before professors of the Sorbonne recently they were startled to find in the feminine philologist a bobbed haired woman who wore fashionable cut clothes with short skirts and used a subtle French perfume. She left the stage to marry her scientist husband, and says that she never has regretted giving up the footlights for hieroglyphics.

GRAIN MARKET DOWN

Wheat Touches The Lowest Level of Season

CHICAGO, July 23. (AP)—All grain prices dropped on the Chicago Board of Trade today, wheat leading the recession and wheat touching the lowest prices of the season.

Improved crop prospects, indifference to demand, good reports from Canada, and a big Canadian carry over of old wheat contributed to the drop in bread grains.

Selling of corn futures was prompted by the break in the wheat market and by ideal weather for advancement of the crop. Corn

prices declined rapidly with December making a new low, although there was fair buying on the break, but no active support was developed and receipts were large.

EX-DEPUTY HELD

Is Charged In San Antonio Payroll Robbery

SAN ANTONIO, July 23. (AP)—Walter Lewis, former Bexar county deputy constable, was held under \$10,000 bond here tonight in connection with the \$4,255 payroll robbery of the American Building company last Saturday.

Lewis, who has consistently de-

nied he is guilty, was identified from the stand, in a habeas corpus hearing, by one of the victims of the robbery, A. F. Hubbard, who was struck over the head by the robber and then forced to crouch in the bottom of the automobile and dierobe, was positive that Lewis was the bandit.

But It Won't Be Served, Judge Assures

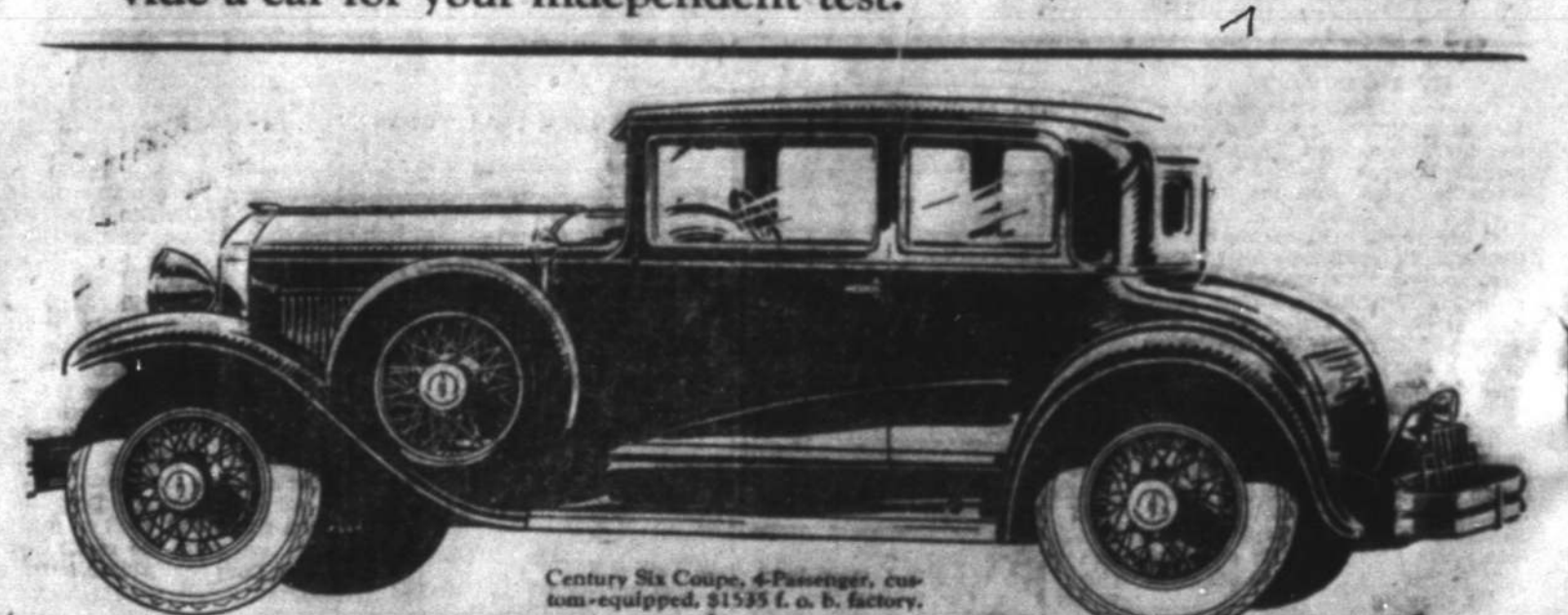

Difficulties of Police Described

Chicago Commissioner Declares Scotland Yard Detectives Would Be Helpless

(The Associated Press.)
CHICAGO, July 23.—Commissioner of Police Hughes believes Scotland Yard's famous detective forces would be "as helpless as rank amateurs" if they were moved into Chicago to suppress crime.

"I could name 20 men who could accomplish more in a given time than 100 of the best men of the Yard," he said last night after perusing a history of the Scotland Yard force and its accomplishments.

Named by Thompson
Commissioner Hughes was appointed by Mayor Thompson after a successful mayoralty campaign which claimed international attention because of Thompson's attacks on "King George of England." During the campaign, the mayor urged the voters to elect him so he could "put King George on the spot" and oust "King George from the Chicago public school system."

Following his election, the Mayor was instrumental in ousting William McAndrew, to whom he referred as "a stool pigeon of King George," from the superintendency of schools here.

Discussing the comparative merits of the Chicago and Scotland Yard forces, the police commissioner said: "We have an entirely different situation to contend with, handicaps that we cannot overcome, but have to meet every day. To begin with there are more than 50 racial groups in Chicago, each with its own customs and attitude toward the general scheme of things."

ward the general scheme of things. Over in England the population is overwhelmingly English. Contrasts Are Cited
"Anyone convicted of murder in England is hanged within three weeks. Here the murderer is first convicted; then he gets a delay to have his case appealed; he has his execution deferred pending a rehearing; next it is postponed to examine him as to his sanity; later he might win a new trial on some technicality and finally he is acquitted or his sentence is changed to a few years in the penitentiary."

That difference has a tremendous bearing on crime and criminals here are scores of similar contrasts I could cite. It is really a wonder the police accomplish as much as they do with so many overwhelming obstacles in their way."

She will be one of the speakers at a large public meeting in London in the early fall, which is being arranged by 23 interested English organizations. British leaders will be invited to participate in a similar meeting in New York in October.

Miss Morgan will conclude her series of conferences with visits to Miss Rosa Mann, of Holland; and Miss Malvina Seller, of Paris, vice president of the International Alliance.

Hussey was served a commitment to the county jail in lieu of \$500 bail to facilitate the handling of the case while Mrs. Sauveur was released on her own recognizance.

Both will be given a hearing when Mrs. Hussey is able to appear against them.

Hoover Works On Acceptance Talk For Notification

Also Divides Time For Conferences Between Coast Political Leaders, At His Home In Stanford.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. July 23.—Herbert Hoover divided his time today between political conferences and work on his acceptance speech to be delivered two weeks from next Saturday in the Stanford University bowl.

Senator Hiram Johnson of California and Albert Ottinger, attorney general of New York state, gave the republican presidential candidate reports on political situations on the two coast lines of the country and these proved highly encouraging to Mr. Hoover.

The California senator came from San Francisco in company with Mark L. Requa, close friend of Mr. Hoover. They were luncheon guests at the Hoover home and spent more than an hour afterwards on the piazza overlooking San Francisco bay.

Attorney General Ottinger, on a vacation, came in later in the day, other guests of the candidate included George Cameron, publisher of the San Francisco Chronicle, and Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Hale of San Francisco, who had dinner with Mr. and Mrs. Hoover.

Preliminary plans for the notification ceremony were announced during the day. Gov. C. G. Young of California will preside and will introduce Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire, chairman of the notification committee, and permanent chairman of the Kansas City convention. The senator will speak for about fifteen minutes and will present the presidential candidate.

Mr. Hoover now plans to speak not more than forty-five minutes at the outside and if he finds it possible to limit himself. His will be one of the shortest acceptance speeches in recent years.

The committee in charge of arrangements expects more than 100,000 people here for the notification.

railroads. In addition those petitioners asked that, in event of the Orient's purchase by the Santa Fe, reasonable divisions of joint freight rates be enforced.

Kemper described the Orient line as running from Wichita, Kansas, to Alpine, Texas, a distance of 745 miles, which the Santa Fe would acquire by paying \$144.50 per share for all or nearly all of the 35,000 shares of Orient common stock now outstanding.

Describing the price as fair, he said, the Orient had struggled hard to maintain existence during recent years, but could be developed in the public interest by the Santa Fe system to a condition of reasonable profitability and usefulness.

The sale price agreed upon, he added, would give the Orient enough money to meet the \$2,500,000 which was borrowed from the Federal government. He agreed with Chairman Gilmore that during recent years the Orient had

shown better earnings from oil traffic particularly along its Texas lines. Houghton described the Orient as of value to the Santa Fe system in furnishing an alternative route to a number of southwestern points, saying it could also be utilized in combination with the existing line of the Santa Fe to shorten some of the distances in freight movement.

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Mussolini Avers Thorough Quiz of Italia Is Planned

All Phases of Polar Disaster To Be Investigated By Federal Government, Premier Pledges.

(By Associated Press) ROME, July 23.—Premier Mussolini told the council of ministers today that a complete investigation into all phases of the Italia disaster would be made by Italy and that any other proposed investigation would be immediately rejected.

Such inquiry, the premier stressed, "will naturally be made in Italy and by Italian personalities. Any other hypothesis is absurd and offensive and whatever it might be or where the proposition came from it would immediately be rejected."

Meanwhile, it should be recorded, he said, that the first to see the beleaguered group was Major Maddalena, the Italian flier who went north with a Savoia-Marchetti machine.

The premier added that the council of ministers would be interpreted as the sentiments of the Italian people in thanking all those contributing to the rescue operations, especially the crew of the Russian ice cutter Krassin, and in paying homage to the memories of Dr. Einn Malmgren, Swedish meteorologist and Vincenzo Pontella, motor attendant.

The premium paid tribute to the brilliant flight of Ferrarin and Del Prete from Italy to South America as "having excited the nation's righteous pride."

Reviewing the foreign situation, he noted the cessation of diplomatic relations with Austria and the resumption of normal relations between the two countries, the signing of a commercial treaty with Hungary, Italy's adhesion to the Kellogg pact, the conclusion and initialing of the Tangier agreement, the signing of an accord with Persia, and the initiation of conversations with China's new Nanking government following denunciation of the old treaty.

Indicted for Murder of Radio Man

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 23.—Charges of murder were filed today against Paul Reed, 24-year-old draftsman, accusing him of the slaying of Vernon Plager, Rockford radio man who was killed when a bomb exploded in his automobile last Thursday. The complaint was filed by State's Attorney W. D. Knight before Police Magistrate Burton Norton who signed the formal charges holding young Reed for the murder. The coroner's jury previously had recommended Reed be held for action by the county grand jury.

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ENJOYING LIFE

Recently we made an automobile drive covering more than three hundred miles of road. It was into several of the important towns to the West of us, and the weather was rather hot and dusty.

One of our fellow journeymen daubed his face with his handkerchief and brushed aside the perspiration from his brow, and perfunctorily exclaimed, "Phew, she's hot". But after all even with the thermometer is on a spree and the thermometer is flitting around with mercury while she is 105 in the shade, we still maintain that the summer weather is the best and the summer season is the most enjoyable of any.

"There are many desirable circumstances which offset the irritation due to the heat," he stated.

True enough; and recognition of that fact should cause men and women to forget the temperature and concentrate on the innumerable pleasures of midsummer. Every season has its liabilities as well as its assets, and by stressing the good features we can drive pleasure and happiness. It rests with us whether or not we will enjoy life.

And just how the summer is offering us her cornucopia of delights. She is calling our attention to her swimming pools, her lakes where we might fish, her woodlands which can be utilized for picnicking and camping; her open highways with their almost limitless space for touring so that distance might be obtained and remote points connected through rapid transportation.

The blossoms, the foliage, the fruits, the birds of summer and the wide sweep of blue sky also are instruments of enjoyment; one can not fail to find pleasure in the informality which is featured at this season. This informality manifests itself in the carefree and cool attire of men, women and children; the suspension of busy club and social life; the relaxing of the business routine; the indulgence in numerous outdoor sports and pleasures.

And yet we hear tirades against the summer every day. Discontentment is so ingrained in us all that it is indeed that we find anybody who truly enjoys his present condition. When it is summer we visualize the cool days of autumn or the colder ones of winter during which the evening shadows fall quickly and cheery fires glimmer through the dusk of cozy rooms. But let winter come and there are sighs for the freedom and fresh sunlight of the summer, and for the joys of tramps in the woods and vacations. When the rain falls we weary of it; when there is drought we are distressed. And so it is in other instances. Always we are a bit restless, a little inappreciative despite perfectly ideal circumstances. And we continually are straining ahead wishing our lives away, trying restlessly to reach some coveted goal.

Obviously we should derive more joy from life if we would determine to make the most of the present instead of concentrating on the past and future. The gifts of life bestows upon us today are valuable, and the person who recognizes this fact and exhausts the possibilities of these attributes experiences true satisfaction.

POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT

Real political development the last week have been almost wholly on the democratic side. Secretary Hoover has taken his leave of the department of commerce, has had man conferences, has confirmed the selection of Representative Good as campaign manager for the West and is on his way to California, where he will remain until after his acceptance, August 11. On the way he was entertained by Vice-President Dawes, with whom he conferred, especially on farm relief, and he spent two days with President Coolidge at the president's summer camp. But the republican nominee has said little and probably will not say much more until he makes his formal address.

Meanwhile, however, there has been a lively stir in the democratic camp, enough to get a lot of attention throughout the country. Governor Smith has chosen to accentuate more and more the departure in party policy, as dictated by him, from

the old standards. His nomination alone marked such a departure. His independence of the conviction in declarations making the coming election, as far as he could make it, a referendum on the liquor question, was another.

But the most startling departure, because it was wholly unexpected, was the appointment of John J. Raskob, multi-millionaire head of the finance committee of General Motors, as chairman of the national committee; the naming of Senator Gerry of Rhode Island, another multi-millionaire, as advisory counsel, and Frank Hague, New Jersey boss, closely allied with Tammany, as vice-chairman in charge of the North Atlantic states. The appointment of Raskob was almost a sensation. He has been a republican, but he is a wet and a Catholic and he represents big business in a very big way.

Governor Smith knows, of course, that this change of policy does not delight the democracy of the country as a whole. The politicians, so far as they believe it is good strategy, will be satisfied. But the rank and file have been brought up on different policies. They have been taught to regard the republicans as the agents of big business and special privilege, and the only participants in political corruption when it comes to that. Now there is a frank and deliberate bid for Wall Street support, for favor from the great industries, for the confidence of the banking interests.

Another significant thing, Tammany has been told by Smith to stay at home, to work only within its own jurisdiction, to organize Greater New York as it never has been organized before, and from other sources it is learned that a plurality of 600,000 is expected in the metropolitan area in order to make sure of overcoming Hoover's plurality up state. In other words, Smith and his advisers assume they can not win without New York and that if they do carry New York the chances are good. Therefore, the main strategy is to carry the state, which can be carried only by overwhelmingly carrying the city. If, then, Smith should win solely by carrying his own state, more particularly by carrying his own city, then New York City, the least American of all our population centers, would determine the election of a president.

HIGHWAY-BUILDING UNDER THE MOODY ADMINISTRATION

During the 18 months of the Moody Administration, Texas has progressed farther toward creating a state-wide system of permanent highways than under any previous regime. Up to July 1—State Highway Engineer Gilchrist reports—contracts had been let for \$21,341,107 worth of road work in Texas. Of this sum 11 1-2 millions represented new construction, most of it classified as permanent. The 18 months saw 771 miles of highway graded preparatory to paving 441 miles surfaced with concrete, 220 miles given bituminous macadam treatment and 1,056 miles of asphalt topping laid. Few States can match that record of achievement for alike period. The affluence which has come to the State Highway Department through the 3-cent gasoline tax and the receipt of past-due Federal aid, has been put to wise use. The temptation to extravagance was present, of course; but the funds have been expended economically.

The Commission's announced policy—which it has carried out so far as the support of counties and districts will allow—of giving first attention to bridging gaps in present primary routes, obviously amounts to putting each dollar where it will do the most good. The record thus far appears the more creditable when the handicaps under which the new administration took over the highway system, are recalled. The state organization was demoralized as a result of contract scandals, and nearly bankrupt. Federal aid had been discontinued.

Of course, credit for what has been done under the Moody administration, in fairness, is widely distributed. The new personnel has been accorded means to work with and has received co-operation from communities alert to the value of permanent roads which lead somewhere. Without industry, leadership and vision at Austin, nevertheless, such assets easily might be sacrificed.

SWIFT JUSTICE

Texas should be told the facts at all times. This in order to dissipate the argument of the very limited number of campaign orators who are willing for "swifter justice and fewer technicalities." Only 19 cases were carried over by the Supreme Court of the state from this term to the next, which begins in October.

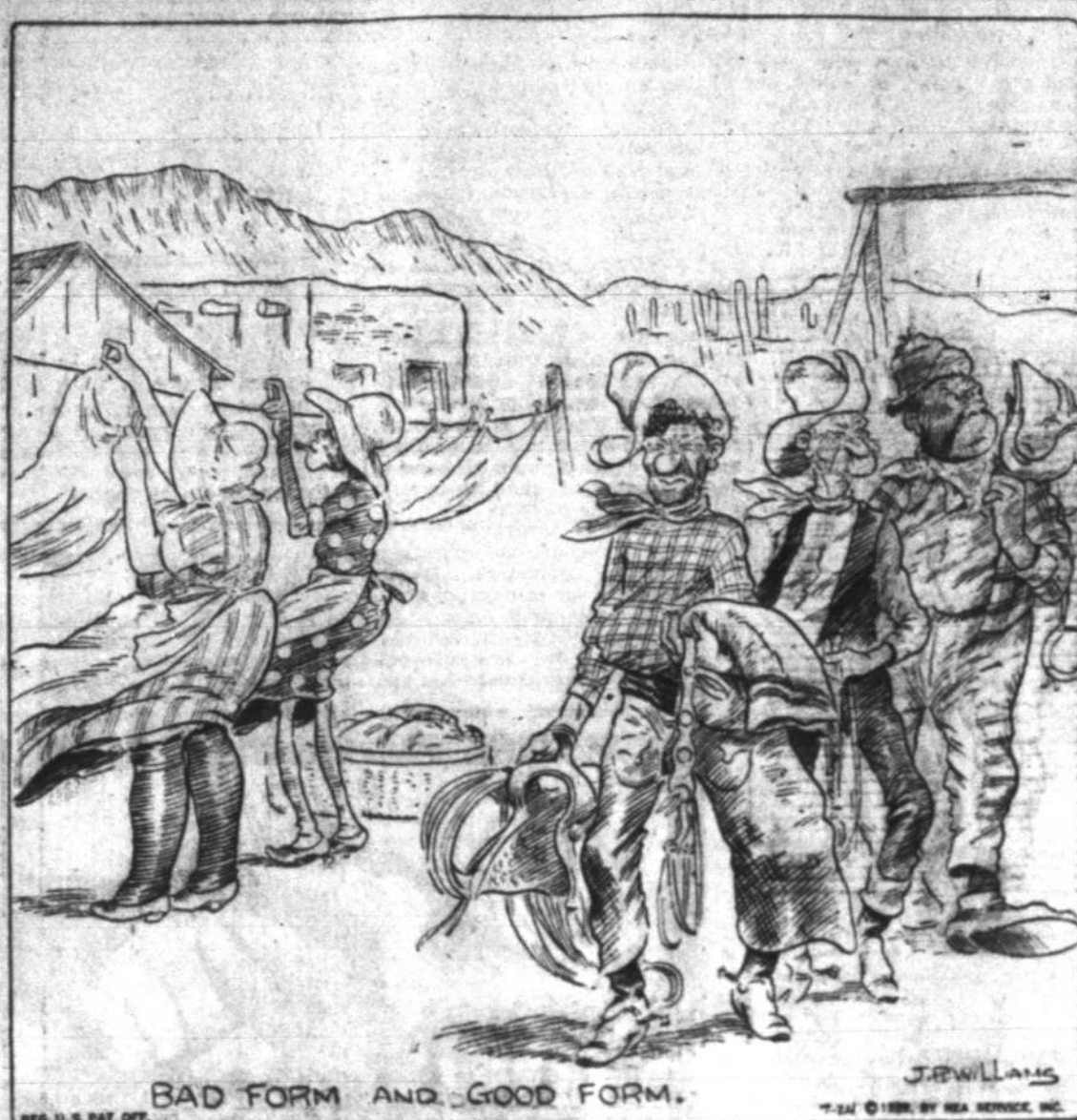
A few years ago the Supreme Court was seven and one-half years behind its docket. Of the 19 carry-over cases nine had been submitted and 10 were pending for submission. Seventy-four are pending in each section of commission appeals, 10 cases are awaiting references and one case before a civil court.

There is no law's delays in Texas. As for the criminal side of it, there are more convicts in prisons and on the prison farms than ever before in the history of the commonwealth, and the electric chair is never idle. Facts are facts.

PRSSS COMMENT

The champion workers among the boys and girls in 4-H Clubs have just returned from Washington where they were royally entertained and are full of enthusiasm imbued both from the discussions and talks with other boys and girls from far distant states who are doing the same sort of work. Come to think of it it is rather surprising the way that these boys and girls should be able to have this wonderful experience and that it comes to them in return for their own efforts to make good, gives it added value, both educationally and in character building, were it not for the opportunity offered by club work, few boys and girls in this part of the country would ever hope to see Washington and those who were fortunate enough to visit our National capital would have scant appreciation for the fact that all doors were open to the Club boys and girls and they are much more than they are given the casual tourist to see. They are received by the president of the United States, an honor that is accorded comparatively few grown-

ups they are entertained by the Secretary of Agriculture, they are "personally conducted" by government employees whose explanations on sight-seeing trips add greatly to the interest and value of the scene visited. Who wouldn't be a 4-H boy or girl with all these possibilities before one? And that does not take count of the money made through the work and the experience, which is worth more than all the rest in after life. Parents should encourage their boys and girls to enroll in club work and give them all the assistance possible. It will mean much even though the boy or girl never achieves the distinction necessary to win a trip to Washington. It adds interest and enthusiasm to what young folks are prone to regard as uninteresting tasks and each year of the work makes them more capable and efficient farmers.—Southwestern Plainsman.

IT IS REPORTED

It is reported that the San Antonio Express is lamenting the fact that out of the sixteen experimental farms in Texas, there is not one in the hilly counties of Kimble, Kerr, Mason, Kendall, Gillespie or Llano.

It is reported that people are overlooking a very important matter in planting the Black Walnut trees in Texas. West Texas is planting a very large number of shade and ornamental trees that bear no fruit while they might just as well be growing shade trees that will serve both purposes. The San Antonio Express says: "It has been a long time since anybody has reported planting black walnut trees anywhere in South Texas. Yet such an investment made now, would be one of the most profitable kinds of insurance which the owner of land covered by creeks could contrive in favor of his descendants. The original black walnut trees which were plentiful in Comal and Gillespie counties were nearly all sold long ago. German pioneers in those counties made furniture from the timber, and most of that furniture is still in use. Single walnut tree stumps have sold as high as \$1,000 and single trees bringing \$300 or more have been common. It takes about fifty years to mature a tree to profitable size, but the dividend paid at the end of that time is generous."

YOUR HEALTH

The American Heart Association has developed statistics indicating the relationship of occupation to diseases of the heart.

Of 11 occupations in New York City, butchers had the highest per cent of death from heart disease, with 33.6 per cent.

Tailors, cigar-makers and shoemakers were next, each with more than 25 per cent, which is the average for all occupations.

Clerical workers and painters had the lowest percentage of deaths of any workers examined.

Miners suffer severely with heart disease, tin and copper miners being affected more frequently than coal miners.

In Textile Trades

It was found on investigation that textile workers in every branch of industry are subject to heart disease. This includes cotton card and frame tenders, cotton strippers and grinders, and workers in wool and worsteds as well.

The clothing industry does not show such a poor condition, although tailors and shoe operatives have high rates. Hat formers have even higher rates than boot workers.

These rates are still further exceeded by metal grinders.

Among the professional occupations, lawyers have the highest rate, musicians next, and music teachers next.

Tuberculosis is no longer the leading cause of death among industrial workers, since deaths from heart disease now are greater. Since heart disease represents in most instances the results of infections with insufficient or incorrect care in early life, the way to prevention is clear.

HALF MILLION BUSHEL OF WHEAT SHIPPED FROM PAMPA

More than 500,000 bushels of wheat have been shipped out of Pampa over the Santa Fe railroad from the local grain elevators at this time this season. The elevators are still full to capacity and shipping is regular. The Santa Fe is supplying cars upon demand and expect to be able to do so until the grain is shipped.

Indications are that the crop will exceed all expectations, as less than half has been harvested. If the weather conditions continue favorable, this trade territory should make nearly a million and a half bushels—Pampa News.

TWO GOOD FARMERS TALK DEEP FLOWING

Two of the best farmers in the county called at the Herald office Saturday, and naturally the conversation drifted to farming and how to farm. Both men are leading farmers of their respective communities and have each made a success farming both here and where they came from, thus making their words worth something, and their advice of real value to other farmers.

We found that both were thoroughly sold on the idea of deep plowing, and both are watching with much interest the deep plowing experiment being conducted by the County Agent in Gaines county. However, both men have been practicing deep plowing and flat breaking for some years, and they want the experience of others.

One of these men was W. G. Carter of route one, this city, and the other was Tom Verner of Meadow. The former informed us that he had for the past three years practiced deep flat breaking in his field with the minimum of blading, and although part of his field was rather sandy, he further said that his neighbors told him when he began to flat break that all his land would soon blow away, and that he in-

formed them that he wished that about half of the loose sand on top would blow away and that he would then have a better farm. His contention in a measure is true. Anywhere in the field where he has been able to turn up clay and let the loose sand sift down through the openings, he has a good stand of crops which are doing well.

Mr. Carter is selling about \$4.80 worth of cream a week, and is not feeding any cows, but they are running on a good sudan pasture. All the dry feed they get was shucks, he said.

Mr. Verner has moved from the farm west of Meadow, which he sold from the farm a mile or so northwest of Meadow. Mr. Verner said he sold about \$40 worth of cream a month, or plenty to pay all the running expenses of the farm. His new farm has one very sandy spot that he turned up this year, but he plans to try and turn some clay there next spring if he can go below the sand, and stop it from blowing.

Both men maintain that Terry county will be better off when they let a lot of the sand blow away from the farms and get more of the deep red soil, which most of us call clay, on top. Experiments have proven that this too, is soil, and will when cultivated make good crops and will not blow. One can no more control the blowing sand than they can a herd of stampeding cattle, but with a mixture of sand and clay, it becomes an easy job.

We talked with another farmer Tuesday of near Gomez, Mr. A. C. McNeel, who was trying to plant some soybeans. He said that he had planted the first of August last year made a good crop. But says he, "I am of the opinion that I am doing the wrong thing. I think I ought to let it lay out this year, harvesting it about every two or three weeks this winter and next spring, and in about two-thirds of the sand blow off and then break it deep and I will have a good farm out of the strip of deep sand." Terry County Herald.

Public Opinion

TEXAS NEEDS BIRTH RECORDS

(By Joseph F. Leopold, manager Southwest Central Division, United States Chamber of Commerce.)

Texas is the only state in the nation that does not keep a record of the births and deaths of her citizens. Five and six million people, almost none without the legal protection insured by these records. All of this in spite of the fact that there has been a law in the statute book for 25 or 30 years requiring that such reports be made.

The 46th legislature (1927) enacted a new law known as the "Moral Law," which will secure these reports if properly and adequately enforced.

Texas is organized under this new law and is all set to put it into operation. No community can expect to grow unless it can show that it is a good place to live and one of the surest ways to prove it, is by the correct records of births and deaths, which are accepted by the United States Census Department as being accurate. Some of the cities of this state, eight of the largest ones, are in what is known as the "death registration area." They, therefore, report their deaths and are supposed to report their births, but the births unfortunately are said not to be accurately reported and a fair check shows that 50 per cent to 60 per cent of them are all that ever get into the records making a serious situation of having a death rate higher than the birth rate which is not true at all. The government will not entertain claims for insurance, compensation, pensions, passports, and many other things unless accompanied and approved by certified copies of legal birth and death records and for this reason several of the leading organizations of this state, American Legion and others, are backing and urging the administration of this law to the limit.

Insurance companies are now requiring birth records to prove age, and death records to prove claims. If the deaths are reported and the births are not reported, it appears that the community is losing population, and therefore, argument to say nothing of being a very unhealthful place in which to live.

Page after page of argument as to why the records should be properly kept might be recited. Every day our courts are showing cases involving inheritance and many other things which would have been avoided had there been legal records available to establish the facts. It must, therefore, be evident to the intelligent citizen that these records are much more necessary to human affairs than the records we now keep so well on blooded hogs, cattle and horses.

The Chamber of Commerce managers should know and become acquainted with the local registrars of their city, and stir and when a birth or death is not reported bring

local pressure to bear to secure the reports and prevent future neglect. The best enforcing agency for any law is the pressure and demand of public opinion, and it is the function of the Chamber of Commerce to mold public opinion, to educate, stimulate and lead.

CHURCH AND FARM

A very careful and important study has just been made by the Theological Seminary of Chicago at the Rural Field, to ascertain the conditions that prevail in a farming community, of church membership and religious feeling. And out of a large quantity of material based on actual facts, true of an entire county in the State of Illinois, of all the farmers in a thickly settled farm section of a whole county, has never had, in the course of an entire year, a single call from a minister of the Gospel, nor a single effort made to reach them or their families with any religious influence. One cannot help wondering what the real relation of the town or city church is to the country district when such facts can be shown. Over against the beauty of natural surroundings and the many things that might seem favorable to religious impulses, the farmer's life in farming communities where young men and women spend Sunday in hunting, and amusements and dissipation. Meanwhile the city churches are many of them, richly equipped with physical attractions and all the varieties of inspiring preaching and pleasant companionship. But what about the rural fields that may, and do in many cases, lie just an easy automobile ride from the civic center? What about the great crowds of well-to-do church members who spend their Sunday afternoons riding over the city boulevards, and spending their evenings, as many of them do, in social entertainment (a number of churches have given up all evening services because members will not support them with their presence), while 40 per cent of the people who happen to live out in the country, year after year without a single call from a minister of the church members? This offers several serious questions which the town and city churches can not very well refuse to face.

Sante Fe Acquisition of Orient Is Topic

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(P)—Consideration of the proposed purchase of L. & N. Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad by the Atchafalaya and Santa Fe systems, was begun today at a joint hearing conducted by the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission. Chairman Clarence Gilmore of the Texas Railroad Commission, sat with Examiner N. C. Davis, representing the Federal agency as the witnesses concerning the proposed transaction was taken.

The records relating to the Orient sale, incorporated in an option contract taken by the Santa Fe were but in preliminary to the calling of "bids." The Santa Fe was shown to have agreed to pay \$41.50 per share for the outstanding stock of the Orient line, which amounts to about 35,000 shares in return for which it would obtain 735 miles of railroad operating between Wichita, Kan. and Alpine, Texas.

Peace Dominates Turbulent Europe

After Centuries of Wars And Ramors of Wars, Continental Nations Join In Pact To Abandon War.

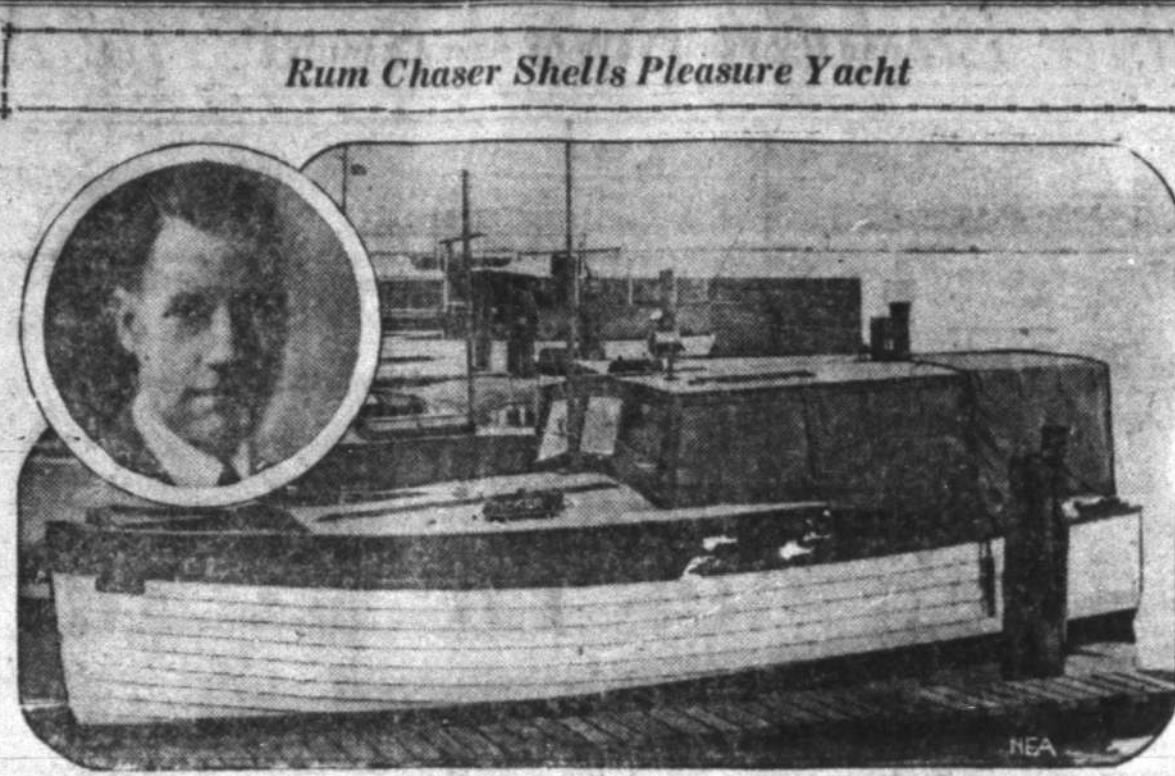

After centuries of wars and ramors of wars, leading governments of the world are placing nations on the same basis respecting use of force to settle international disputes. Within a week Poland, Belgium, Japan, Great Britain and her six dominions and Czechoslovakia have followed Germany, Italy, France and Rumania and Jugoslavia in accepting the proposal of the United States that war be abandoned as an instrument of national policy. The privilege of self-defense, guarded to the individual by virtually every formulated or unwritten bill of rights, is reserved to the nations by Secretary Kellogg's own interpretation of the pact.

While skies were thus clearing over much of the civilized portion of the globe, a cloud gathered in the far east. Japan warned Chang Hsiang-ling, successor of his assassinated father, Chang Tso-Lin, as war lord of Manchuria, not to join that province to the nationalist government in China.

Premier Tanaka and the Japanese army chiefs say they fear bloodshed if this warning is disregarded but there is a strong element of opposition to the move in another Japanese government circles. Earlier there

had been indications that Marshall Chang was contemplating the alliance.

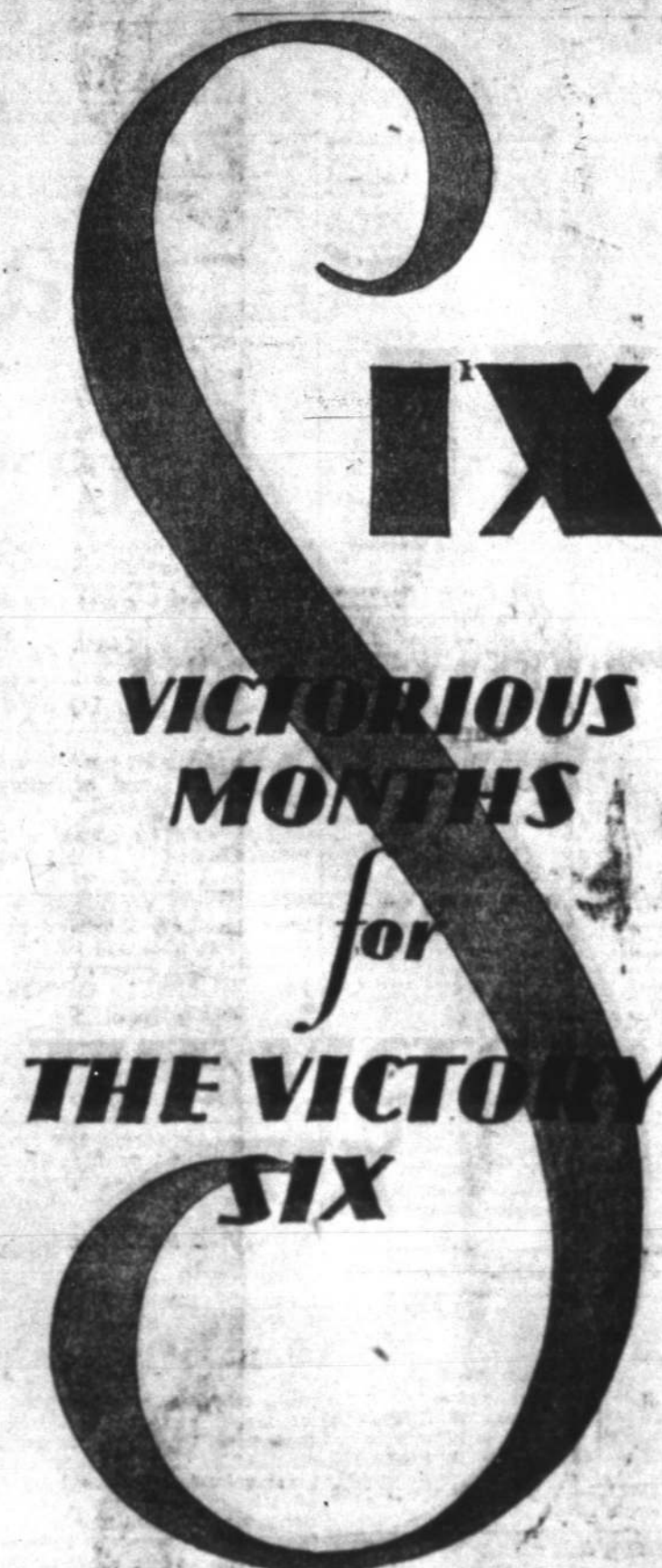
