Lovett Files Motion To Disqualify Guest-Moore

A motion has been made by attorney Jim D. Lovett to disqualify attorneys Austin Guest and Hardy Moore, who are jointly representing both the City of Clarksville and City Police Officer Donald Parks. The motion was made on the grounds that it creates a conflict of interest.

Lovett also states that there may be a conflict of interest in the joint representation of the County of Red River and Sheriff Bob Storey by the same counsel, Tommy Allison of Longview, Texas.

The action came after the failure of a settlement of a

\$300,150 dollar lawsuit action against Red River County, the City of Clarksville, and several law officers, including Chief Deputy Doug Jackson, on brutality charges.

On Friday, January 30, a meeting was scheduled to sign an agreement. At that time it was Lovett's understanding that all parties involved, including Doug Jackson, had agreed to accept the settlement. Along with the agreement there were two collateral documents, one a letter of resignation for Doug Jackson, and one an

agreement by plaintiffs Glen Shadid and Peggy Mitchell that they would not criminally prosecute following settlement of the civil suit.

However, Jackson's attorney, Jim Hooper, was

unable to attend, and the meeting was postponed until the following Monday.

According to Jim D. Lovett, between Friday and Monday, Hooper apparently advised Jackson not to sign the proposed letter of

resignation, and prepared one of his own. However, that letter of resignation was not acceptable to the plaintiffs.

On Monday, February 2, Lovett took the position that he would not agree to a

partial settlement, stating that Jackson's resignation had to be part of the settlement or there would be no settlement.

On February 10, Lovett submitted his motion to disqualify Moore and Guest

as attorneys to the U.S. District Court, Eastern District of Texas. He stated that precedent had been established that the joint representations were an inherent conflict of interest.

Lovett maintains that there is a serious conflict of interest between the City of Clarksville and Donald Parks. It might be in the best interest of Parks to contend that if the alleged events did take place, he was acting at all times in good faith, within his official duties as dictated by custom. However, the City of Clarksville could try to avoid liability by showing

that the officer was acting without authority. Therefore joint representation would not be possible.

In attempting such joint representation, the attorneys would also, Lovett says, find it difficult if not impossible, to protect the confidence of their individual client while serving the interest of their municipal client.

Before any more attempts at a settlement can be made, the matter of the conflict of interest of attorneys will have to be settled, Lovett said.

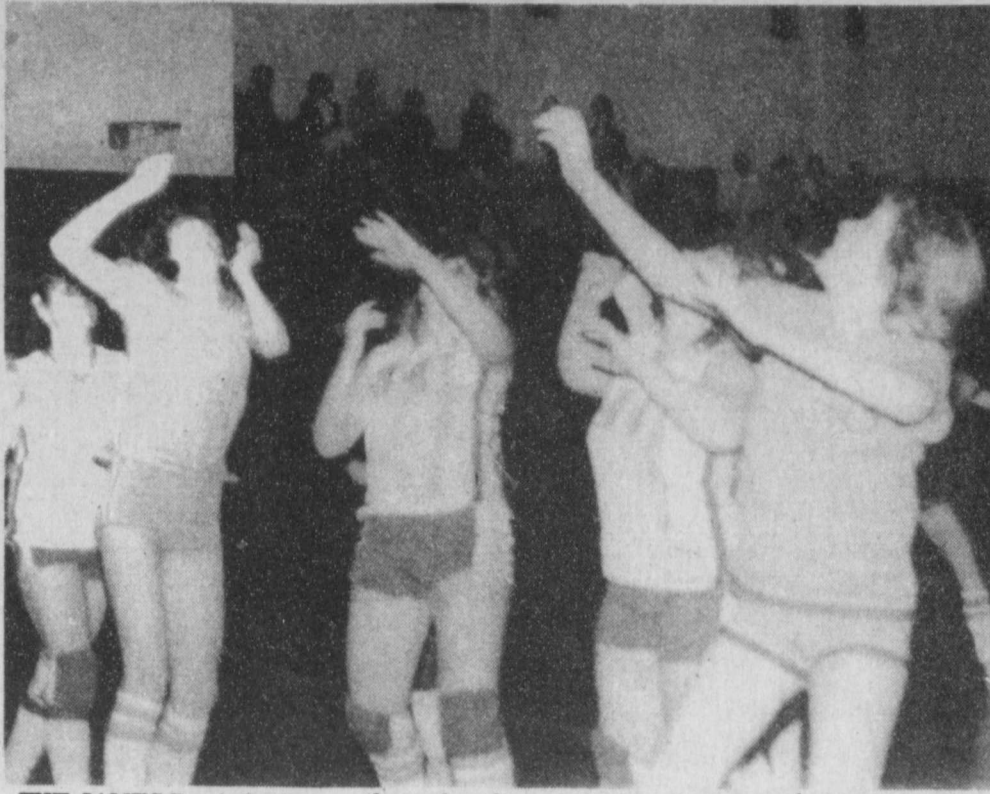

Bogata-Talco Trustee Election Called

Normally, only three school trustee positions are filled each year, but due to the fact that a two-year unexpired term is to be filled from Talco, a total of four trustees are to be elected. The two-year unexpired term is due to the resignation of Jerry Clemmons. This position is presently being filled by Jerry Russell until the election.

One three-year term is to be filled from Bogata; one three-year term is to be filled from Talco; one two-year unexpired term is to be filled from Talco; and one one-year term at large will be filled from either Bogata or Talco according to the number of votes received. For the two-year unexpired term from Talco, it will be necessary for candidates to sign up specifically for this position.

School Lunch Income Eligibility Changes

Recently enacted Federal legislation has revised the income eligibility standards for the school lunch, breakfast, and special milk program.

The new requirements will take place in the Talco-Bogata Schools sometime in March and will remain in effect until September 30. The changes may effect some of those now participating under the

programs. Basically, the requirements in the lower income brackets have been raised somewhat and lowered some at the upper levels of eligibility.

Plans are to review the applications on file and to notify those parents whose program benefits may be reduced or terminated.

The new guidelines based on an annual income are:

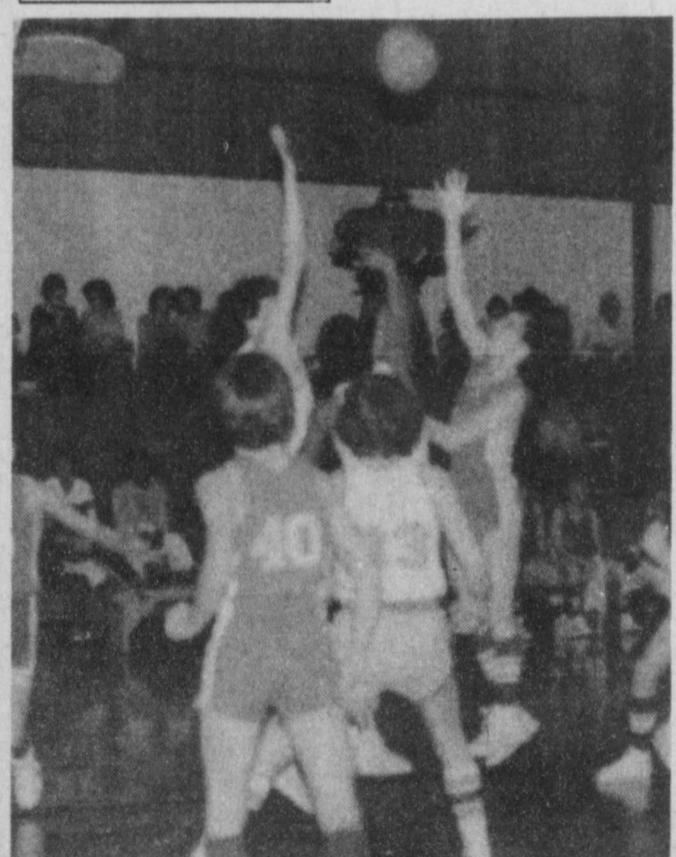
