## Local schools in new districts

The University Interscholastic League (UIL) announced new football and basketball districts Monday, and there have been changes for the three Mitchell County schools.

Colorado City has been placed in District 3 of the Class 3A Division II. The jump to 3A from 2A comes from a new adoption by UIL for next year's sports contests. Schools have been bumped up one class, as former 6-man teams are now classified as 1A schools, 2A schools are now listed as 3A and so on.

### COLORADO CITY

Teams now competing in Colorado City's football district include Ballinger, Coahoma, Post and Stanton. Basketball realignment puts C-City in District 5 with Reagan Co., Coahoma, Sonora and Stanton.

Class 3A Division II includes schools with enrollments between 220 and 314.

Athletic Director Dan Gainey said he wasn't too surprised by the football district realignment.

"It was exactly what we thought it would be," he said Tuesday.

Gainey pointed out two things he thinks makes the football realignment good: 1. Colorado City is centrally located in the district, making travel for away games shorter and easier and 2. The district includes two historic rivals, Coahoma and Ballinger. "I think that's good," he said.

"I was a little confused by the (basketball) district," Gainey said, pointing out that the Wolves will pass right through San Angelo, bypassing two potential opponents, on the way to Sonora. But he



also said he's happy with the basketball realignment as well.

According to CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer, Colorado City turned in 286 as enrollment of students in grades 9-12, making the Wolves one of the bigger schools in their

district. Ballinger's enrollment was 302.

### WESTBROOK

Westbrook will compete in District 7 of Class 1A Division 1 6-Man with Hermleigh, Ira and Highland. In basketball, Westbrook and Loraine will compete against Borden Co., Hermleigh, Ira and Highland in District 12 of Class 1A.

Westbrook submitted an enrollment of

63 to fall in the Conference 1A Division I category. Other schools in the division met enrollments of 55-104.9.

### LORAIN

Loraine will be in District 7 of Class 1A Division II 6-Man with Blackwell, Moran and Trent.

Class 1A Division II includes schools with enrollments of 54 or less in grades 9-12. Loraine turned in an enrollment of 38, according to LISD Superintendent Travis Edwards.

UIL determines many of the details associated with sports contests for high schools, including first playing dates. In football, the first playing dates for the 2014 season are August 28-30 and dates for the 2015 season are August 27-29. Schools are limited to no more than 10 games.

Football schedules will be released in two weeks.

## Local RV parks beginning to open in Colorado City

New RV parks in and around Colorado City are starting to open. It was this time last year that planning was underway for some, with construction on most starting in mid-2013.

In Colorado City, five new parks are either open or near opening and will provide 292 new RV spaces for oilfield workers, pipeline crews and etc. to use.

The Colorado City RV Park (formerly Speakeasy) will open this week when the utilities and water are hooked up. The facility has 24 spaces, which are full in the old park and 79 new additional spaces opening probably this week.

Located directly east of this park but in the same block, Randy Bullard plans to open

Adams Street RV Park with 16 spots. He's waiting on a fence to be built.

The C-City RV Park, located near Sonic, opened a couple of weeks ago and activity has been brisk around the park. It has 56 new spaces with over 20 already rented out. Tom Whitesides is the go-to person there.

## Volunteer firemen busy with traffic control, fires

Volunteer firemen with the Colorado City Fire Department have been quite busy this week helping with traffic control at the scene of several accidents, as well as responding to a house fire and dumpster fire early Tuesday morning.

All the action began for the volunteers on Sunday, as icy roads paved the way for several accidents on I-20. CCVFD members helped with traffic control on the interstate from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday. TxDOT

personnel put down gravel on problem spots, helping diminish the ice and cutting down on accidents.

Nearly 20 members of the fire department attended a fire meeting Monday night, and the meeting was just about over when the call came in regarding a structure fire seven to eight miles northeast of Colorado City. All firefighters responded and found the home with heavy smoke pouring from the attic.

The department supplied four

trucks to fight the fire, and firefighters had to suit up with air packs to enter the home numerous times to extinguish flames in the kitchen. Assistant Fire Chief Tom Carlock said that the floor and walls in the kitchen were ablaze, and flames were spreading up the walls into the attic.

Firemen used regular ladders and roof ladders to climb onto the roof of the home, which was covered in ice and snow, to cut a hole in it, allowing for better ven-

## 2014 Election year is a busy one

### CITY, SCHOOL ELECTIONS

Several citizens have filed to run for seats on local boards for the upcoming May 10<sup>th</sup> election. The filing period began January 29<sup>th</sup> and continues through Friday, February 28<sup>th</sup>.

As of Tuesday, two candidates have filed for election to the Colorado ISD Board of Trustees. Steve Komppa filed for Place 2, a seat currently held by John Martinez. Veronica Boone filed for Place 1 which is currently held by Mike Alexander.

No one has turned in an application to run for any seat on the city council of the City of Colorado City. The District 3 seat currently held by Marcelo Alvarez,

District 4 held by Ed Blake and District 1 held by Andrew Fuller are up for election in May.

A couple of candidates have also filed to run for a spot on the Loraine ISD Board of Trustees. Incumbent Ron Gibson has filed for re-election, and Geory Martin, former school board member, has filed to run again. LISD Superintendent Travis Edwards said that the other two incumbents, Joe Lujan and Frank Sanchez, have both expressed their intent to seek re-election also.

No one has filed for the three seats available on Loraine's city council. May-See CITY, page 5

### COUNTY, STATE ELECTIONS

Primary election for county and state offices will take place on March 4<sup>th</sup>, and candidates' campaigns are well underway. Locally, there are two contested races on the ballot.

Three candidates have filed for the position of District Clerk. Belinda Blassingame, Sendia Blake and Teresa Hughes have filed to run on the Republican ticket for the office. The probability of a run-off election is possible, as one candidate would have to garner 51% of the votes to avoid a run-off.

Normalinda Perez, Republican, will face incumbent Rick Grissam, Democrat, for the office of Justice of the Peace,

Precincts 1 and 4.

Other candidates running unopposed for local offices are: County Judge Ray Mayo, County Clerk Debby Carlock, Precinct 4 Commissioner Bill Preston, Precinct Justice of the Peace James Williams, Precinct 2 Commissioner Jeremy Strain, and County Treasurer Jennifer Rivera.

Victoria Harmon will run for Democratic County Chair and Teresa Beckmeyer will run for Republican County Chair. John Beckmeyer has filed to run as Republican Precinct Chair.

## Fire danger on rise in county

It is not an uncommon pattern in West Texas. Grasses grow tall in the summer and fall, and winter freezes kill the plants. Long periods without rain reduce the once-healthy foliage to kindling. According to Loraine Fire Chief Doyle Mitchell and Colorado City Fire Chief Rick Goodney, the pattern has come full circle in Mitchell County, and as the spring winds blow, the danger of fire rises.

The Mitchell County Commissioners enacted a burn ban, as of Monday, January 27<sup>th</sup>, and Goodney was at the meeting to make the request for the ban. He said that while a ban doesn't mean there will be no fires, it lessens the risk greatly.

"Everything is primed for fires," Mitchell said, a fact that was evidenced by the structure fire at the lake a couple of weeks ago.

Throwing lit cigarettes out of car windows can start fires that can grow into large, damaging burns. Goodney cautions folks about driving with a flat also. He said that vehicles driving with a flat tire have been known to cause fires, because the rims against the pavement produces sparks.

And though there's not much that can be done about the lack of rain, with the exception of prayer, there are several things

citizens can do to reduce the risk of losing their homes and property to fire.

Mitchell said that the first line of defense is to mow down any tall grass or vegetation standing near homes or sheds. He said that while short grass burns, tall grass burns hotter and faster. Keeping tall grass away from structures can sometimes mean the difference between minor damage and complete loss.

Goodney reminds rural citizens to be sure and put a screen over burn barrels when burning household trash, and warns people not to burn at all when it's windy.

Fire breaks are also at the top of the list to reduce fire danger, especially for landowners with CRP property adjacent to their home plots. Mitchell suggests plowing a strip of land at least 20 feet wide between homesteads and CRP pastures.

He said that many of the ranches in the county use this practice as a way to cut fire breaks around fence lines. The act has two positive effects: it keeps fires from spreading to adjoining properties and it often protects the owner's fence posts.

Mitchell cautions property owners not to overlook the other things with tall grass growing around them, such as parked ve-

hicles. "Those vehicles will burn too," he said.

Oftentimes, vehicles are the cause of fires. This time of year, drivers should be aware of pulling off into bar ditches, as the catalytic converter gets hot enough to cause a grass fire to ignite. Small pickups and cars are usually the vehicles that cause this type of fire, according to Mitchell, due to their low profile.

"When those red hot catalytic

converters touch that grass, it's just like sticking a match to it," he said.

Citizens should heed Goodney's best advice: "Call 9-1-1, get out and stay out when the house is on fire," he said.

While fires are going to happen, a few precautions can greatly reduce the risk. So, take note and take care in these dry conditions. And, as Mitchell said, "Pray for rain."

## C-City police chief going to jail for a good cause

Colorado City Police Chief Luis Aguilar is going to jail... to raise money for a good cause. Aguilar has agreed to participate in the MDA Lock-Up, and he will be thrown in the slammer on Wednesday, February 19<sup>th</sup>. He's counting on Colorado City citizens to pay his bond in order to raise funds for the charity benefiting those with muscular dystrophy.

At approximately 11 a.m. on Wednesday, February 19<sup>th</sup>, the police chief will be handed over and "locked up" at the Sweetwater Fire Department. His bail is already set at \$800, but Aguilar said he's shooting for more. He said he wants to raise over \$1000 for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

The first Kiwanis Club Pancake Supper was held at the Kelley Elementary Cafeteria on Friday, February 15, 1974. Adult tickets were sold for \$1.25, and children's tickets were \$1 each.

This year, club members are procuring plenty of pancake batter, sausage, bacon and drinks which will be served hot and fresh in the Colorado Middle School Cafeteria. Like always, all-you-can-eat pancakes and all the accoutrements will be served from 5 to 7:30 p.m.

Ticket prices have risen a little since 1974, with adults eating for \$7 and children under 12 for \$4 each in 2014; still a cheap price to get a good meal and raise funds for a charitable organization.

Proceeds raised go toward scholarships and other youth activities in Mitchell County.

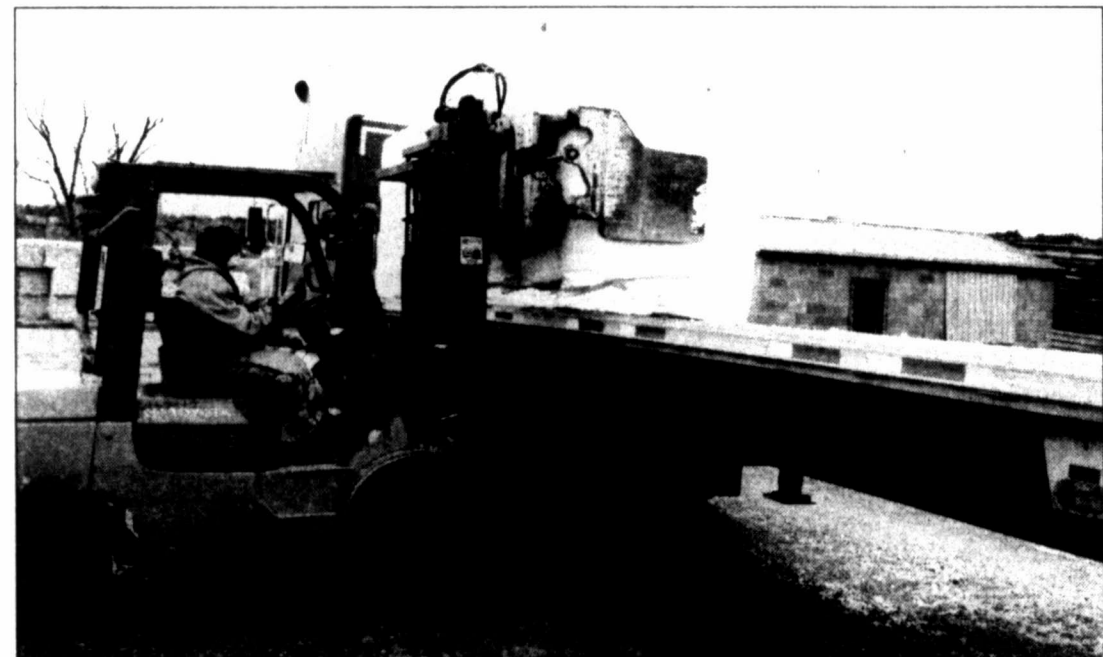

## Tax help available at library

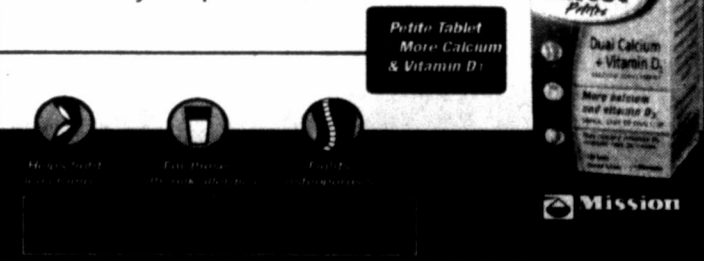

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH Acting out local historical characters

Lavyn Sisco is a retired kindergarten teacher in Sulphur Springs who portrays characters from local history. "When I rode in the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train in 1986 I made a dress and an apron and a bonnet for that occasion. When the ride was over, I began to be Mrs. Hopkins for my students. Hopkins County is named for the Hopkins family. I took antique items like rub boards and churns to school and demonstrated them to the students. I was in costume as Isabella Hopkins all day long."

She has pretended to be half a dozen pioneer ladies from Hopkins County. One of them is Sarah Atkins. "She was the first business woman in Sulphur Springs. I did a lot of research on her history and wrote a script about her life. She was important because she showed what women could do prior to 1900. She did things that usually only men did."

Lavyn also did Myra Wilson, who did lots of the cataloging of graves in the county. "Then I did Lizzie Carpenter, who broke up the saloon at Black Jack Grove in 1894 after everybody said it couldn't be done. She talked twenty-five ladies into helping with the project. They wanted the saloon closed and the men wouldn't do it, so the ladies took hatchets and axes and demolished the saloon."

Each character she plays has a different costume. "One of my favorites is Frances Thornton, who became a widow in 1894. She had young children and didn't really want to re-marry, so she began making bonnets. Her business grew into a factory and she hired dozens of widows to work for her. She became known throughout the state of Texas."

The last lady she did was Blanche McMullen, the first lady in Hopkins County to have a degree in music. "All of these ladies have been fantastic to learn about because they did something that ladies just didn't do prior to 1900."

Lavyn's scripts are lengthy and contain authentic information about the characters she plays and the time they were active. Her ability to memorize is rather amazing. "I'm not a speaker. I'm a storyteller. I can write the story and by the time I get through with it, I can pretty well recite it to you without referring to the script."

She is active in Hopkins County historical groups. At one of the board meetings, members were trying to decide on what program they could get for an upcoming event. The chairman looked at Ms. Sisco and said, "Why don't you play Mrs. Hopkins or one of the ladies you do at school?" Although she had never considered doing the characters outside of school, she agreed to do one.

She gave me a sample of one of her presentations, which begins with an introduction: "My name is Frances Thornton and I was born on a plantation in Louisiana. I had the advantage of a formal education. My mother also taught me how to sew, crochet and make quilts...."

## Forty years ago in Mitchell County A look back at 1974

I recently had the pleasure of cracking open a large book containing all the editions of the *Colorado City Record* published in 1974 to take a look back at the first-ever Kiwanis Club Pancake Supper. I've been told that the local newspaper is a historical record of what is going on in the county at any given time, and I certainly found that to be true in 1974.

The following highlights some of the things making the paper in January and February 40 years ago.

Bobby Lemons was elected Chamber Board President. He named three resources he found plentiful and important in Mitchell County: agriculture,

minerals and young people.

Gubernatorial Assistant Reagan Brown served as speaker for the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

Several old buildings were being torn down at the corner of 2<sup>nd</sup> and Oak Street to make room for the construction of a new Civic Center.

Bobby Matlock exhibited the 1<sup>st</sup> place Heavy Hampshire swine in the Westbrook Stock Show.

The portion of Walnut Street, extending from 17<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> Street, was paved.

Over 52,000 bales of cotton were ginned in Mitchell County, the most ever. The cotton was ginned at eight gins within the county's boundaries, Broughton Gin, Buford Gin, China

Grove Gin, Farmers Gin, Loraine Co-Op Gin, Mitchell County Gin, Planter's Gin and Producer's Co-Op Gin.

The nationwide gasoline shortage caused four stations in town to close.

The speed limit was reduced from 70 mph in daylight and 65 at night to 55 mph all the time.

Truckers protesting the low speed limits and high fuel costs blocked the fuel pumps at Fuller's Trucktown truck stop.

Wayne Oliver was named Outstanding Conservationist by the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District.

There was much more to read in the *Colorado City Record* back then, so watch the Record for more on what was happening 40 years ago.

## Getting ready for God's blessings

When you pray, what do you expect? Do feel that God will send all that you ask? Will He ignore you? Could He possibly send an abundance that you had not expected? Have you ever been so desperate that you thought there was no hope at all?

Then she asked what they were to do with all these vessels of oil. He told her to sell the oil, pay their debts and live off the rest.

Could it be that we limit the Lord's blessings when we fail to believe in a large fashion and borrow hundreds of "vessels" instead of a few dozen? Even destitute people have some resource available. Begin with that. It may be a talent you can develop or a collection of junk that seems worthless. It may just be a clever idea or a love to share. It may seem inadequate, but God is in the creating and increasing business. Trust Him to supply not just the need, but the abundance.

Malachi suggests that when we pay tithes (commercial break!) that God will send meat to your house, pour out blessings that you cannot contain, and rebuke the devourer for your sakes. The devourer may be debt or unhappiness, rotten social or family relations. It is anything that chokes you down so that you feel there is no hope. You may say,

"How can I afford to tithe when I can't pay my bills?"

That is exactly God's point. Do you trust your billfold or God's promises? I know personally this works. Because we are faithful, God has kept His promise countless times.

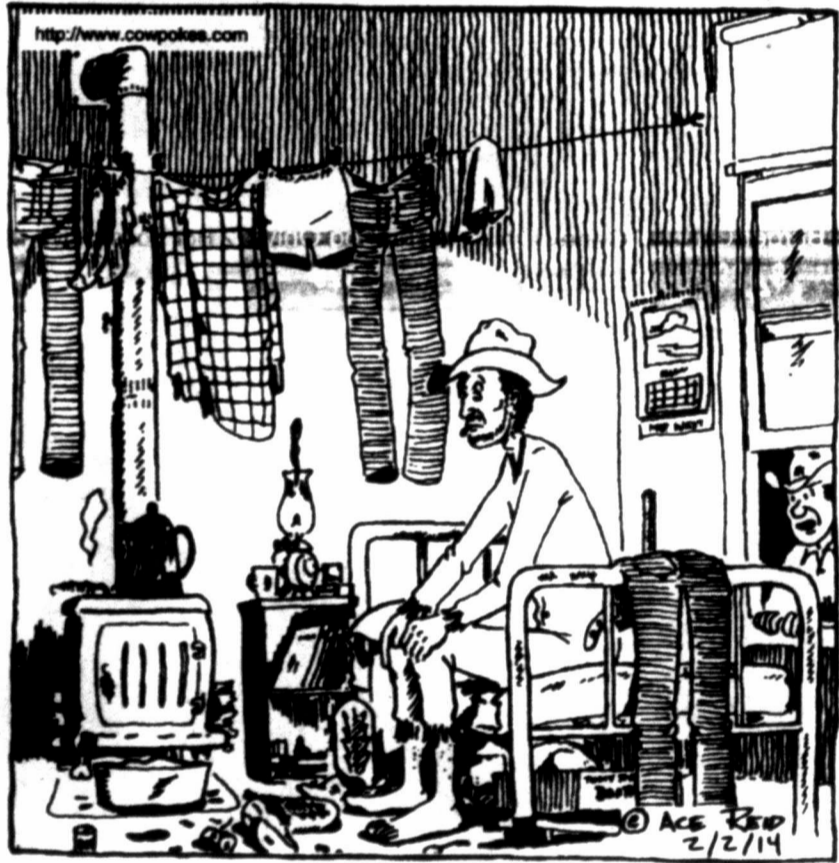
What will the New Year bring? More debt? More responsibility? Or more promises fulfilled, more blessings flowing, more vessels of abundance?

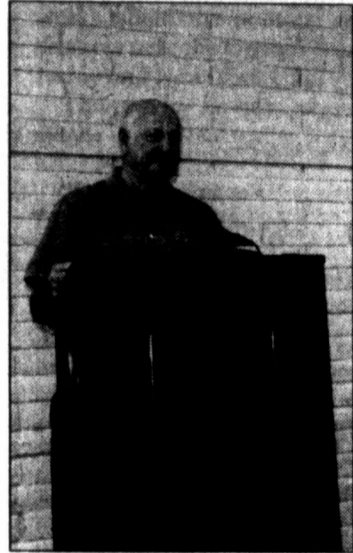

## Baum shares insight into first official city council



**HISTORY BUFF** - Colorado City Mayor Jim Baum was the guest speaker at the Lions Club meeting Friday.

Colorado City Mayor Jim Baum spoke at last Friday's Lions Club meeting, giving club members a few inside details of the first official city council. Baum covered the highlights of the first minutes book of the council from back in 1882.

The first council was directed to stand as members addressed the "president" of the council. The city's first mayor was Frank Lester, followed shortly by J.M. Warren. There were four mayors from April of 1882 to August of 1883.

One of the first ordinances on the books dealt with street obstruction. Ordinance offenders were fined up to \$100, a good deal of money for the time. A litter ordinance prohibited trash being thrown on the street, and a fine of \$75 was levied against those who ignored it.

Back in 1882, vagrants loitering on the street were charged a fine not to exceed \$10. Fortune tellers, beggars, and anyone loitering to perform trickery on passing citizens were considered vagrants. The first code-type ordinance came about during this time as well. Installing stove pipes without something to protect the wood became a violation and was put into place to reduce the risk of house fires.

On May 30, 1882, the council proposed and eventually adopted the first tax rate. Taxes in the amount of 2.5 mills were levied on all taxable property. A mil was approximately 1/10<sup>th</sup> of one cent. After the proposition was advertised in the town's first newspaper, the *Colorado Courant*, it passed on July 18<sup>th</sup> that year. The town marshal was instructed to collect the taxes.

Jail inmates were hired out to local companies needing general labor, with all proceeds of the labor to be used to pay their fines. Each inmate was paid approximately 50 cents a day, and they worked every day except Sundays.

In the late summer, a petition signed by 133 town citizens was presented to the council. The petition expressed the citizens' desire to stop solicitation by prostitutes. Signatures of 114 women and 19 men were on the petition.

Apparently, there were several issues with outdoor bathrooms, or privies, as council members found themselves dealing with outhouse maintenance. All privies, public and private, were to be kept clean enough not to emit a foul odor. The city footed the \$15

cost to build a public restroom. J.M. Marshall was appointed marshal for Colorado. He was paid \$50 per month and got to keep all fees collected as part of his duties. On November 21, 1882, the town's population had grown to over 1,000 citizens.

On December 9<sup>th</sup>, council members approved for the city's jail to house area prisoners for 45 cents per day.

Small pox was a grave concern during those days, and citizens were invited to speak at a council meeting to give their opinion on the creation of a small pox quarantine area. At that time, a case of small pox had been discovered in El Paso. It was the determination of the council that a quarantine area be created if a case of small pox was found locally.

The first water mains were laid in 1883, and the council passed an ordinance to set water rates. It was also in 1883 that the town was first designated as the City of Colorado.

In September of '83, a school tax in the amount of 1/2 of 1% was approved. The measure was brought before the voters, where 40 voted for the tax and five voted against. Breaking the Sabbath became against the law in September also, and a fine of \$50 was set for the offense. Those caught horse racing on the Sabbath were fined \$20 to \$50, as were those who dared to sell groceries on the day.

Later in the year, payments of \$3 per meeting were approved for council members and the mayor; a nice sum considering citizens fulfilling the duty now are paid \$10 per meeting minus taxes.

## New bridge planned for CR 337

### Munoz to negotiate easement

Mitchell County Commissioners Court convened Monday morning to approve an interlocal agreement and authorize Commissioner Jesse Muñoz to negotiate an easement for a new bridge planned to be built on CR 337.

Court members approved an interlocal agreement between the county and the City of Loraine to allow for shared use of the county's equipment. The agreement makes it possible for city crews in Loraine to use the county's heavy equipment for street repair within the city limits. In return, Loraine will supply all the water needed for the county to make road repairs of their own.

"This is something I've been trying to get for a while," Commissioner Bill Preston said. He moved to approve the agreement, Muñoz seconded and the motion passed.

Munoz was authorized to negotiate easements on property surrounding the location of a new bridge which will be constructed by TxDOT. Traffic will use the newly constructed bridge on CR 337, but the old, single-lane bridge will remain as it is the

site of an historical marker.

Munoz said that he has met with TxDOT officials, and they have given him the go-ahead to secure the easement, because the agency will seek bids for the project in May. New fencing will also be put up as part of the project.

Easements will be on property owned by Ron Coffman of Midland, who, according to Muñoz, has been agreeable during the

process thus far.

In other business, commissioners approved a request made by Lynn Bradbury to waive the fees for the use of the county arena in July. Bradbury plans to hold another benefit bull riding event on July 12<sup>th</sup>.

Payroll in the amount of \$83,240.34 was approved as presented by County Treasurer Jennifer Rivera.

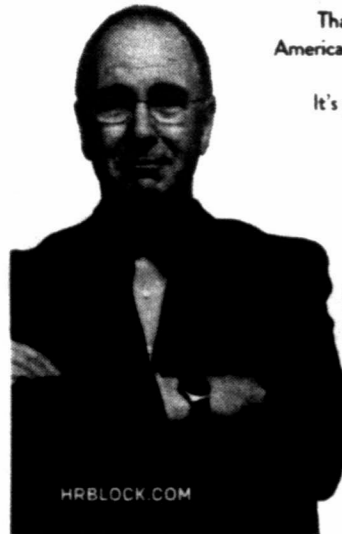

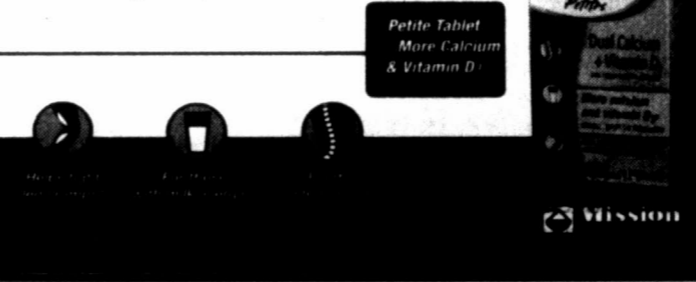
