Council agrees to loading zones

Andy Cook, manager of Truss King, appeared before the Colorado City Council Tuesday night to request the closure of the 100 block of East Main Street and part of Elm to passenger traffic or secondly, the awarding of loading zones along East Main Street and the 100 block of Elm. The council granted Cook two loading zones on the south end of the 100 block of Elm Street and a 10-foot wide loading zone on Main Street across from Truss King.

Both Main and Elm streets should be passable for passenger traffic.

Marvin Mayfield and Bud Hill, spokesmen for Omega Properties, asked the council to close the north end of Austin, where it enters Hickory Street and to make a sharply angled turn into Hickory through the triangle maintained by the Garden Club. Mayfield said that he plans to remake the front row of Mini Warehouses into office space and a sandwich shop and needs the additional space for cars which will be doing business at the proposed offices.

Mayor Elmer Martin appointed a committee to work with Mayfield and Hill.

The council allocated the \$10,000 expected from the hotel-motel occupancy tax as follows: City Parks, \$5,500; Historical Commission, \$500; Playhouse, \$1,000; city, \$250; Chamber of Commerce, \$750; Bass Club, \$250; Boys Club, \$250; fire works display, \$1,000; and the mus-

eum, \$500.

The council discussed the Kiwanis Club's request to take over ownership of the Kiwanis Club Park, now owned by the city.

City attorney Pete McKinney said that there is no provision under the law to give the park to the Kiwanis Club.

"Our problem is that our hands are tied," said McKinney.

McKinney said that the city could call a special election to ask the public what it wanted to do with the area or it could accept a friendly suit from the Barber family charging that the city had not fully complied with the deed restrictions, one of which requires a lighted fountain to be in operation 24 hours a day. There is no fountain at the site.

The deed contains a reversion clause and if any or all parts of the deed are not complied with, the property reverts to the Barber family.

McKinney said that he would work with the Barber family in attempting to pass ownership back into their hands.

The council also:

—changed the zoning of the property once owned by the R. J. Wallace family to business at the request of Dale Mathis;

—changed the zoning of property at 11th and Vine streets—the future site of the fire station—to business;

—rejected all bids for Sands Park as over budget and will

Storms dump rain in county

While residents in surrounding counties were dodging funnel clouds Sunday, thunderstorms in Mitchell County dumped more than three inches of rain in Colorado City and pea-sized hail peppered parts of town.

Sunday's deluge briefly flooded some streets in Colorado City. Parts of service roads on Interstate 20 were also under water.

Weather spotters from the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department, the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department and the Colorado City Police Department were on full alert as the storm system moved through

the area.

Howard County reported nine funnel clouds. Eight confirmed tornado sightings were recorded in Dawson County. In Jones County, tornados destroyed or heavily damaged several homes in the Anson area. One tornado was spotted near Hermleigh.

Ira was also struck by high winds and heavy rains where the northwest corner of the Ira Baptist Church was blown away. Services had been under way prior to the storm, but the congregation moved to the church basement and no injuries

Pair arrested here for vehicle theft

A 17-year-old Winnsboro man and his 15-year-old male companion were arrested Sunday night for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle after an abandoned pickup truck found under the Interstate 20 overpass near Mac-Michael's was discovered to be stolen.

Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks said Curtis Eugene Blue and a 15-year-old juvenile had run out of propane and had checked into the Villa Inn Motel to spend the night.

Police officer Tim Atkins spotted the truck and discovered that it had been reported stolen from Winnsboro.

The suspects had apparently tried to find fuel for the truck from local service stations but were told they would have to wait until Monday morning to buy propane.

The pair were given a ride to the Villa Inn where they checked in for the night.

The 17-year-old is on parole and officers were told that he was armed and considered dangerous.

A swarm of officers entered the pair's room at the Villa Inn where the two were on the bed with the television on. A loaded 45 caliber pistol wrapped in a towel was found on the bed and an opened box of shells was found on a table.

The law enforcement officers entered the room from three doors at the same time to catch the pair off guard. Those assisting in the arrests were Sparks, Sgt. Pat Taylor, troopers James Burson and Frank Constible, Deputy Juan Rodriguez and Officers Tim Atkins and David Clark.

The pair were taken to the Mitchell County Jail where Blue was extradited to Winnsboro. The juvenile remained in jail Tuesday pending a juvenile court hearing.

were reported.

Stained glass windows along the west side of the church sustained extensive damage. Hail damage and water damage to the inside of the building was major.

There was also other damage reported in Ira including a sign blown down and a travel trailer blown over. Two major power lines were blown down and hail damage was reported to cars and residences.

The only Mitchell County injury occurred when a woman drove off Interstate 20 into Lone Wolf Creek. She told officers that it was raining so hard she couldn't see where she was driving. She received minor lacerations and cuts on the face

and did not require hospitalization.

Several homes on Hickory Street received minor water damage before the water could run off.

Westbrook received only about a half inch of rain, but north of Loraine, up to four inches of rain deluged the area. South of Loraine, 1.8 inches was reported. Hyman received 1.5 inches.

The warning siren sounded in Loraine, sending many of its residents to storm shelters until the storm moved through the area.

The warning siren did not sound in Colorado City. It is sounded only when a tornado is spotted within five miles of town or if a confirmed tornado is moving toward Colorado City.

rewrite specifications to get lower bids;

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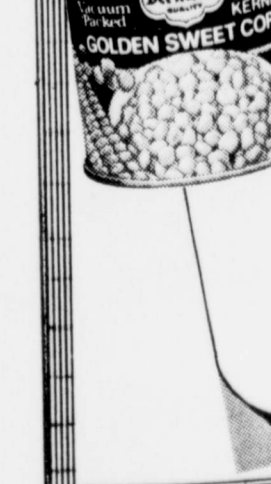


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Lain wins body building championship

One local body building enthusiast is battling a thousand after last week's 1985 Permian Basin Body Building championships held at Odessa's Bonham junior

high school. Kenneth Lain, 27-year-old resident of Rt. 1 in Colorado City, won the Permian Basin Championships, his first ever compe-

tion, and will next compete at Lubbock's South Plains championship.

"The first round I was so nervous I couldn't even stand up," said Lain, explaining the contest procedures.

"You're judged in three rounds. The first round you're judged on overall physique and symmetry, or how muscles are proportioned to each other."

Lain revealed that the second round involves posing to music and the third and final round is "the muscularity round." The muscularity round requires seven mandatory poses.

They are the front double bicep, front lat spread, side chest, side tricep, back lat spread, back double biceps and the abdominal.

Lain won first place in the heavyweight division during day long competition and then during a night show he and the lightweight and middleweight winners squared off for a final posedown.

"You're judged on cut and balance of physique," said Lain. "There's where I won the overall title."

Lain said he wasn't happy with pictures of his back because his pose didn't make for maximum muscle show.

"I sure do feel real good about it," said Lain.

"I've lifted on and off since graduation," said Lain, a 1976 graduate of Colorado High School. "It was like a football game, once the first round was over I settled down and was alright."

Lain won a big trophy and a belt as rewards and will be trying for more hardware during the Lubbock Civic Center meet May 11.

"I've been body building seriously for about two years," said Lain, who owns and operates the downtown Family Fitness health club along with his wife Teresa.

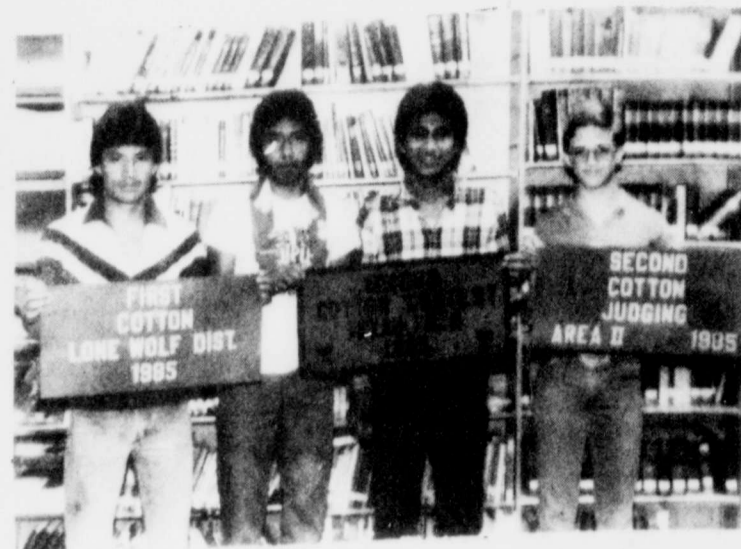

Beware of overseas job claims

The lure of overseas employment has been expensive for many Texans both in terms of time and money. In areas of high unemployment, especially the gulf coast region, we have seen a number of dishonest operators fleecing consumers.

One particular company offered to find high-paying overseas jobs for everyone who could come up with a \$250 fee. The would-be employees were promised they would get their money back if the company could not find them jobs. Instead, the company closed its doors without finding jobs for its clients and without making the refunds. This is not an isolated case. Phoney employment agencies have been bilking consumers off and on for several years. Some operators are fugitives from justice.

Under state law, it is illegal for a personnel service agent to impose a fee for registration of a job applicant unless the agent refers the applicant to a place where he actually becomes employed. It is also illegal to advertise a job that does not exist. In order to advertise a job, the agent must have a "job order" from an employer, that is, verbal or written notification of a job opening.

Companies operating illegally have been charging between \$250 and \$750 deposits to applicants. These companies try to get around the law by calling their fees counselling or job resume fees. But you should be aware that any company making such a request before securing your employment probably doesn't have your best interest in mind and may be breaking the law.

It is particularly difficult to find employment in foreign countries, and many companies do all their own hiring. The areas of expertise most likely to get you an overseas job are those involving management skills, engineering and marketing skills and some computer skills.

Employees working for the U.S. government in foreign countries are hired through the civil service examination system—not through employment agencies.

Be sure to check references of any agency which offers assistance in finding a job overseas. Contact the companies to which the agency claims it has sent employees; if possible, talk to the employees themselves.

As with any contract, make sure you know exactly what it says before signing it. If you have complaints about services rendered by an employment counseling firm, contact our Consumer Protection Division offices in Austin, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, McAllen, Lubbock or El Paso. The Attorney General's Office is the People's Law Firm. We're here to help you.

Bentsen urges changes in Medicare rules

The tragic story of a Texas woman, forced to spend her last days piling up hospital bills when she could have been at home, remains the most compelling example of the need to clarify Medicare rules on home health care.

Last year, I introduced a bill to correct the problem and told of a 70-year-old Big Spring woman who was dying in a hospital. Her doctor wanted to send her home to be with her family and friends, where she would have needed medical treatment once a day.

This should have been no problem since Medicare is supposed to cover home health care bills. But because of inconsistent and increasingly restrictive interpretations of Medicare guidelines, the woman had to spend her last days in the hospital.

Her Medicare benefits ran out, eaten away at \$300 a day, and her husband had to pay some \$30,000 in medical bills.

This was a senseless tragedy for everyone concerned. And it certainly didn't make any fiscal sense either. Care at home would only have cost \$50 a day, which would have not only eased the family's burden, but would have been a savings for the Medicare program, as well.

What makes even less sense is that if the woman had lived somewhere other than Texas, she might have been eligible for long-term treatment at home. The rules governing Medicare for the region that includes Texas limit daily home care visits.

My legislation spelled out, chapter and verse, the home health care benefits that Medicare would allow. These rules would be the same in every region of the country.

I felt home health care changes were especially needed because a new system of Medicare payments to hospitals was going into effect last year. Under this system, hospitals may only charge Medicare a flat fee for a specific illness.

The Senate agreed with my proposal to straighten out the Medicare home care program, but it did not receive final approval by Congress.

I have reintroduced my bill this year. I am disturbed, not only by the harmfully tight restrictions on home health care in some regions of the country, but also by the contradictions and conflicts caused by the needlessly complex regulations.

Nine months ago, for example, the Dallas Visiting Nurse Association stopped accepting Medicare patients for long-term home care. This from a group that has been providing home care services since 1934. Why did they stop? Under the existing rules, there are too many uncertainties about whether they will be reimbursed.

We cannot tolerate a situation like that.

When the Medicare program was established in 1965, Congress made clear that it intended for beneficiaries to have access to home health care. My legislation cuts through the current confusion to specify, clearly and simply, that Medicare coverage is guaranteed for up to 60 days of home care.

Home care is obviously less expensive than hospital care. When patient and doctor agree that it's time to go home from the hospital, fuzzy Medicare regulations should no longer stand in their way.

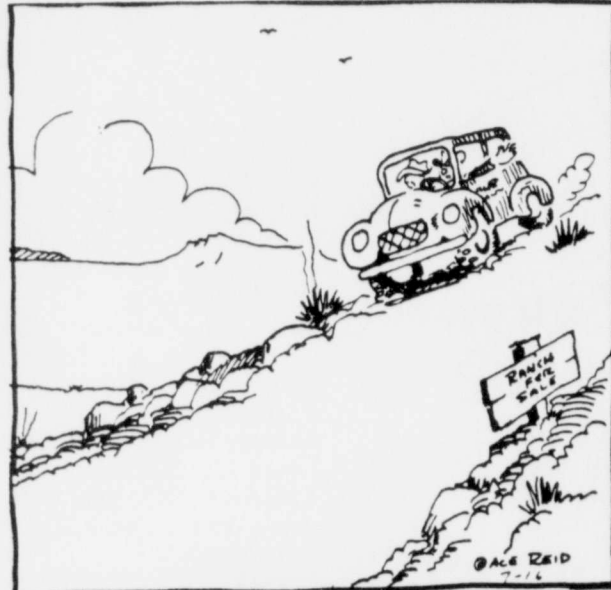

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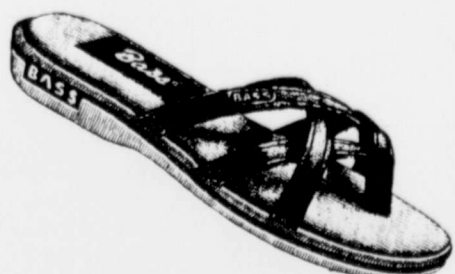
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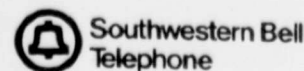

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Southern Peas Are Easy To Grow, Good To Eat

Southern peas, also called cow-peas or blackeye peas, are one of the easiest crops to grow in Texas. They do like it to be hot and don't like too much water.

Southern peas actually are members of the "bean" family and there are three major types—blackeyes, crowder and purple hull. Crowder peas are grown just for shelling because they don't snap as

well as the other varieties.

No matter which type of southern pea you choose, they all are planted and cultivated in the same manner. They shouldn't be planted until seven to 10 days after the last killing frost. Then, you can continue making additional plantings at two to three week intervals until mid spring.

This is one crop to which there

absolutely is no advantage to planting early. Instead of maturing earlier, the seeds will rot if planted

when the ground is too cold. over-fertilize or over-water your growing plants. Apply a complete and balanced fertilizer every four to six weeks. If you fertilize more than that, your plants will grow large but will set few, if any, pods.

Other than watering when the soil is dry and controlling weeds, there is little else you need to do for



Place seed 1 to 1 1/2 inches deep in rows 24 to 36 inches apart. Space plants about 4 to 6 inches apart within the row.

A half pound of seeds will produce 25 pounds of shelled peas, so before planting you will need to determine how many peas you will be able to eat and preserve. Plants usually grow to about 2 feet tall and will be ready to harvest in about 90 days.

Southern peas don't require a rich soil but do need good drainage. Also, it's important to neither

peas. Comparatively, you get more food for less effort with southern peas than with most other garden crops.

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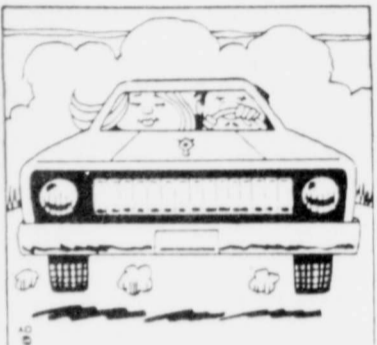

CHS girl, boy tracksters readying for regionals

A fast and optimistic pack of Wolves looks west this week as both the Colorado City boys and girls varsity track teams prepare for Friday and Saturday's Region I-AAA track meet to be run at Odessa's Ratliff Stadium.

"We have more kids going to regional than ever before," said boys coach Rick Robinson, whose Wolves will be attempting to advance to next week's state meet in the running events for the first time since miler Ruben Garcia, half-miler Rudy Garcia and hurdler Ricky Sanchez turned the trick in 1979.

Senior Joey Ritchey has led the Wolves throughout the season with one victory after another in the 100 and 200 meter sprints. He and the 400 meter relay (which he anchors) carry the Wolves biggest hopes for a state meet berth.

"Less than nine hundredths of a second separate the top four or five teams (400 relay teams) entered at regional," said Robinson.

"It's going to come down to handoffs and which team is better rested," said Ritchey, who again led the Wolves during a regional qualifiers meet held at Vernon last Saturday.

Ritchey shaved one hundredth of a second off the Colorado High School record of 10.83 in the 100 meter dash by placing third in 10.82. He had set the 10.83 school and district record at last week's 7AAA meet.

Ritchey also placed second in the 200 meter dash and tied his school and district record of 22.32.

Also shining brightly at the Vernon meet was the sprint relay of Chris Aguilon, Kevin Norman, Perry Conner and Ritchey.

The foursome took second behind regional co-favorite Vernon in a school record time of 43.0. It erased the 43.18 record

the same team ran at Brady two weeks ago.

The Wolves got another second behind Vernon in the 1600 relay where Norman, Doug Chitsey, Perry Conner and Mike Ligon ran a 3:28.0.

Conner and Ligon also ran the open 400 and Armando Rivera competed in the pole vault.

The aforementioned will compete in the same events at Odessa and will be joined by Norman in the 100, Chitsey in the hurdles and Rivera in the high jump.

Colorado High School's girls team, which last week won the district title for the first time since Carol Sue Dakan's coaching era, will also have high hopes for its sprinters and relay teams.

Coach Mark Merrell's troops won a regional qualifiers meet at Wall last Saturday behind victories in both the 400 and 800 meter relays.

The sprint relay team of Juanita Green, Staci Free, Sherry Fite and Sandra Williams won in 50.40 after having run a 49.8 in the preliminaries.

The same foursome ran a 1:49.48 to win the 800 relay. The team had earlier run a 1:48.58 with not so perfect handoffs in the prelims.

Coach Merrell feels that both relays will have to run a few seconds faster to reach state.

A real strong contender at regional will be Williams.

Williams, a two time state qualifier and a junior at CHS, is entered in the 100, the long jump and the triple jump in addition to her relay duties.

Williams also placed second in the 200 meter dash at last week's district meet and could run that event at regional.

At Wall, Williams only competed in the 100 where she took second in 12.52.

District champion Sheri Morris ran her best time ever for third in the 100 hurdles with a 16.38 clocking.

Also competing at regional will be Fite, who won second at district high jump competition with a career best 5'11". Fite will also compete in the 400.

Free won the district's 200 meter dash and will be entered in that event at Odessa.

Ratliff Stadium lies in northeast Odessa in the area behind Permian Mall. Wolf fans should take Loop 338 north from Interstate 20.

Friday's field events begin at 11 a.m. and running prelims at 3 p.m. The shotput and triple jump field events for girls will be held at 12 noon Saturday with running finals to begin at 1 p.m.
