His parents have not heard from him since he sailed from the West Coast Jan. 30 of this year.

Lieut. Thompson was graduated from Abernathy high school in 1938 and attended Texas Tech two years before entering the Air Corps in September of 1940.

His primary flight training was taken at Sexton, Mo., and from

From there he went on maneuvers, and later he was stationed at Aberdeen Proving grounds in Maryland, where he did test pilot service.

He was moved to Fort Wayne, Ind., arriving there about Dec. 7 and immediately he was ordered to California. His parents visited with him briefly at Midland when his flight landed there enroute to the West Coast.

While on the West Coast, Lieut. Thompson put planes through their paces for observation by high army officials. He is a flight leader.

Another son of the Thompsons, J. P. (Pete), has been accepted for aviation cadet training in the Army Air Corps and he is here waiting to be called.

A. C. Koeninger Seeks Second Term As School Superintendent

"Fifth: I have raised the standard of the schools under my supervision until at the present time more than 4,200 children of Hale County are attending fully accredited schools.

"Finally, as an officer and as a citizen I have supported and given my influence to every cause that was calculated to advance the cause of education, promote the happiness of the people of Hale County or aid the defense and security of our state and nation.

"It has been a pleasure to me to serve you during my first term in office. If you think my record merits your support for a second term, I

Florida for Starke. We are about 10 miles from there. It is really a nasty looking place—a mixture of black mud and white sand, but I guess we will get used to it.

Now for our trip down, we spent the first night in Terrell, Texas, the second in Arcadia, La., the third near Jackson, Miss., the fourth in Montgomery, Ala., and the fifth in Thomasville, Ga. At Thomasville, I spent one of the grandest evenings of my life.

A lady came up to our company and invited 16 of us to her home for supper. There were 14 non-commissioned officers, another private and myself invited.

She said she lived about a mile out there in the forest. As we neared the place one of the sergeants looked out and said, "what a nice home," but as we got nearer we saw it was not the home at all, but the garage with two big Packard cars and a Packard station wagon in it. There beyond it and among the trees was one of the most beautiful homes I've ever seen. I can't even begin to describe it.

The people were an old lady, Mrs. Slatter, and her son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Slatter. We had supper and such a swell time. We had been there some three hours when we discovered a picture of the man in uniform and saw that he was a retired colonel. We asked him why he hadn't told us he was a colonel and he said he wanted us to feel at ease and was afraid we might not with a colonel. Oh, they were really great!

When we were ready to leave they tried to get us to take the station wagon and one of the cars and look "over the town." We refused, however. We had made the trip to their place in one of our ambulances.

They had us sign their guest book. It so happened I signed my name first. The last man to have signed his name the day before was the former U. S. Ambassador to Poland. Did I feel prominent?

We have an open invitation to go back at anytime and even to spend the summer, if we get any time off this summer. They promised to take us hunting and fishing and had plenty of saddle horses for riding. In other words, they have a real southern plantation such as you see in the movies, but never thought really existed. The name of their place is "Green Ridge."

Some of the boys looking forward

to going back and spending some week-end with them as it is only 150 miles from here.

They had us promise to have a picture made of the boys who were there and send it to them. When we left the colonel's wife cried as if she had known us always. And we felt almost the same way. They were so refined and cultured, yet so common and sensible.

In their guest book after "Remarks," I wrote "To some of the grandest people in the world—Thanks for such a wonderful evening and one I shall never forget as long as I shall live."—and I'm sure I shall never forget it.

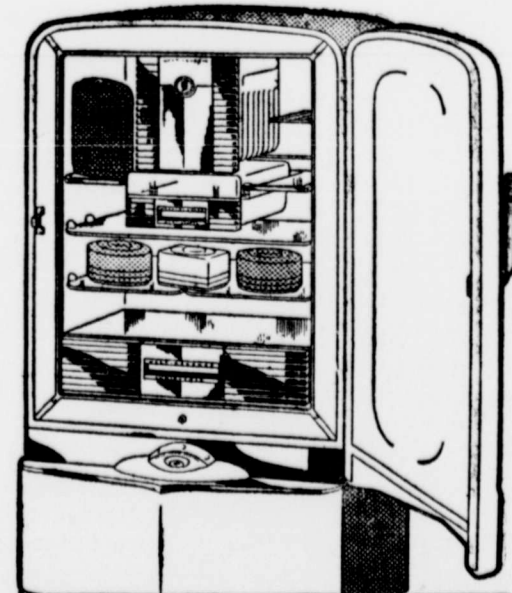
