Council plans to hold election in November

The city council approved an ordinance ordering a special election to be held November 6th to ask citizens to weigh-in on financing the newly-formed economic development corporation. If the measure gets the support of voters, it would mean 1/8th of 1% of sales tax rebates would go toward funding the EDC.

There is a complication to the process of holding a joint election with Mitchell County in November. The city will have to

have two trained election judges per polling location on a Tuesday. Election judges available during the week can be hard to find, according to city officials.

The city pays \$14 per hour, and City Secretary Donna Madrid estimated some would work up to 14 hours that day. Anyone interested in making the extra money for the one day should contact city hall.

If approved by voters, funds would be used to hire a direc-

tor for the EDC and for training EDC board members. Going forward, that money could be used as incentives to draw businesses to Colorado City.

Covenant Communities Partners (CCP), a development company, has contacted city officials about deeding two manufactured homes and one lot in the Hillcrest Subdivision to the city. CCP is the owner of the properties and has been unable to sell them. The company has a loan

secured by the mortgages on the properties, which would be forgiven, and the city would get a clear title.

City Attorney Eileen Hayman said she would like to see the loan forgiven and mortgages released before the council approves an agreement with CCP. The council agreed and postponed the measure until further action can be taken.

Fees associated with renting the Colorado City Civic Center

are increasing for the first time in about eight years. Civic center cooks have been preparing home-style meals for civic clubs for \$6 per plate for many years, but now those meals will cost \$8 per plate.

Rental of the facility for large groups will be \$200, up from \$175 and \$100 for small groups, up from \$75. Kitchen use and security costs are also increasing. Kitchen use will go to \$100.

Hickory Street construction now underway

According to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), construction is set to begin this week on the repaving project on Hickory Street. Knaol Jordan, Field Supervisor with Price Construction, said crews began the first steps in the project on Wednesday.

The TxDOT press release states R.K. Hall Construction was awarded the contract for this construction project with a bid

of \$1.2 million. Jordan said R.K. Hall is the road construction division of the company that purchased Price in January of 2018.

During construction, crews will mill out two inches of the riding surface, perform spot base repairs and resurface with a two-inch overlay. Jordan said the milling process will continue throughout this week.

After the initial milling process

State Park boat ramp closing because of low water levels

Lake Colorado City State Park Superintendent Jeff Ellis announced earlier this week that the public boat ramp at the park has been closed. While there's plenty of water for kayaking, swimming, canoeing and fishing, the closure of the ramp is

due to low lake levels.

"The safety of our guests is our number one priority," Ellis said. "It is no longer safe to launch from the cemented boat ramp without the chance of tearing up vehicles or equipment in the unstable sand and mud."

As of Monday, July 16th, the boat ramp will be closed for boats and personal watercraft such as jet skis. Kayaks, canoes and one or two-man fishing boats can still be launched by hand from the ramp.

HS student safety concerns discussed by CISD board

School board trustees recently attended a training session, and student safety was a topic frequently discussed. During the Colorado ISD board meeting Monday night, the board discussed certain options for securing Colorado High School.

The newer elementary and middle school campus is equipped with state-of-the-art

security, such as a single entry point, safe rooms and more. While the high school has been recently renovated and updated with the latest in technology, its many entryways and outbuildings are a challenge when considering security options.

One option discussed during Monday's meeting was the possibility of putting up a fence

between the ag, gym and home economics outbuildings to form a physical barrier around the campus. CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer is getting price quotes for fencing. There was also talk of moving the offices within the high school to form a single entryway, with all other doors staying locked from the

Berman brothers to visit Colorado City

Berman is an historic name in Colorado City. While the family no longer lives here, Berman is a name still easily recognized, and the Berman brothers still love their hometown. That's why they are planning a visit, and everyone is invited to join them!

The three brothers of H.I. and Alice Berman are planning a trip to Mitchell County. All three are in their 90s, and Harold and his twin brothers, Stanley and Irwin, will present the program at the annual Mitchell County Reunion in September.

Harold called the *Record* office Monday morning to announce the good news. He said his dad, H.I. (not to be confused with Uncle Max) Berman, served as mayor of Colorado City for a couple of years many decades ago. Harold is 92 and is still a

practicing attorney in Dallas.

The men plan to share stories of Colorado City in the 1930s, 40s and 50s. Harold said he even remembers some things from the 1920s, but his brothers would not because they were born in 1929.

"Twin boys born in the middle of The Great Depression was news back then," Harold said Monday. "They're sort of legends."

Harold graduated from Colorado High School in 1942 as the class valedictorian. His brothers graduated three years later in 1945 as the valedictorian and salutatorian.

The trio realize many of their classmates may not still be around, but they want to extend a sincere invitation to all. They would enjoy the chance to recon-

nect with their classmates.

Not only are they coming to town to be a part of the reunion, they are bringing lots of people to help celebrate. Harold said they are chartering a bus to transport many family members from locations near and far. One family member is even coming

from Mexico City.

So, if you know anyone who may have gone to school with Harold, Stanley or Irwin Berman, give them a heads up and let them know the Berman boys want to see them. The Mitchell County Reunion is held the last Saturday in September.

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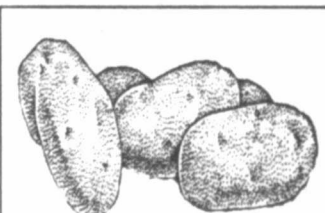
C City Opry brings back Urban Cowboy night July 19th

4-H Day Camp will offer learning opportunities

Are you interested in learning more about the local 4-H program? Have you ever wondered about the programs offered by 4-H? The chance to learn more is coming up.

The Lone Wolf 4-H chapter is planning to hold the first-ever 4-H County Camp on Tuesday, August 7th from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Kelley Café. There will be plenty of learning and leadership fun for the youth of Mitchell County.

All kids ages 6 to 18 who are residents of Mitchell County are eligible to participate. Cost for the one-day camp is \$10 per kid and includes a lunch from Kelley Café.

Adult leader Margo Connell said kids attending will get to experience archery, STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) time, some fun in the kitchen, and a trash n fashion show. The day is designed to give kids a taste of a little of everything the local 4-H club has to offer.

Anyone planning to attend should register at the extension

office at the corner of Hickory and 2nd Street anytime between now and Aug. 7th. Late registration will be held the day of camp.

There will also be ice-breaker games, a rocketry project, science project, preparation of a nutritious snack and the construction of a bow and arrow. Campers will also learn the 4-H motto.

At 4 p.m. that day, there will be a camp demonstration for parents and grandparents, so they can see what their kids have been doing all day.

"It's a great way to experience what 4-H is about," Connell said.

The local 4-H chapter is also actively looking for adult volunteers to help grow the program. Kids are willing to take on new projects, but responsible adults are needed to oversee such programs. All volunteers must pass a background check.

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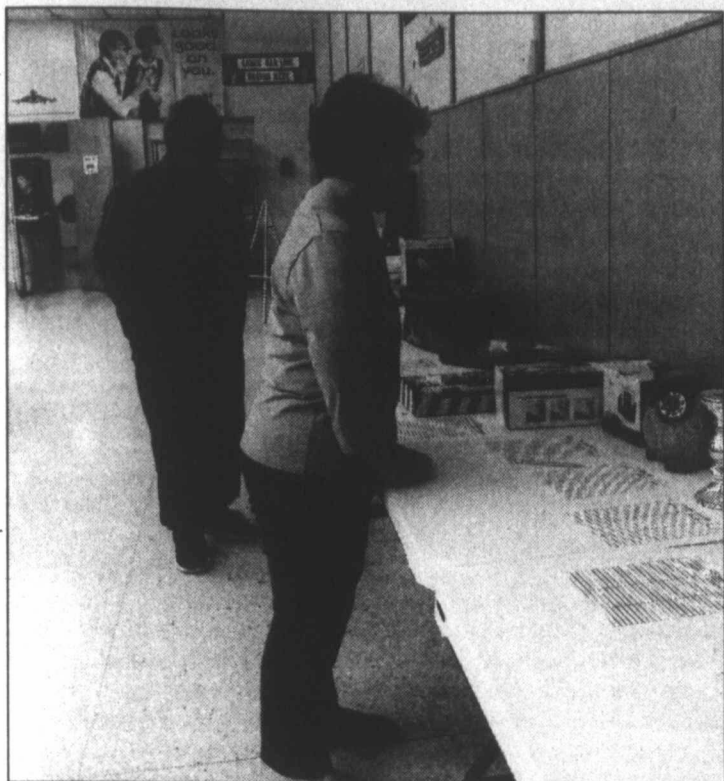
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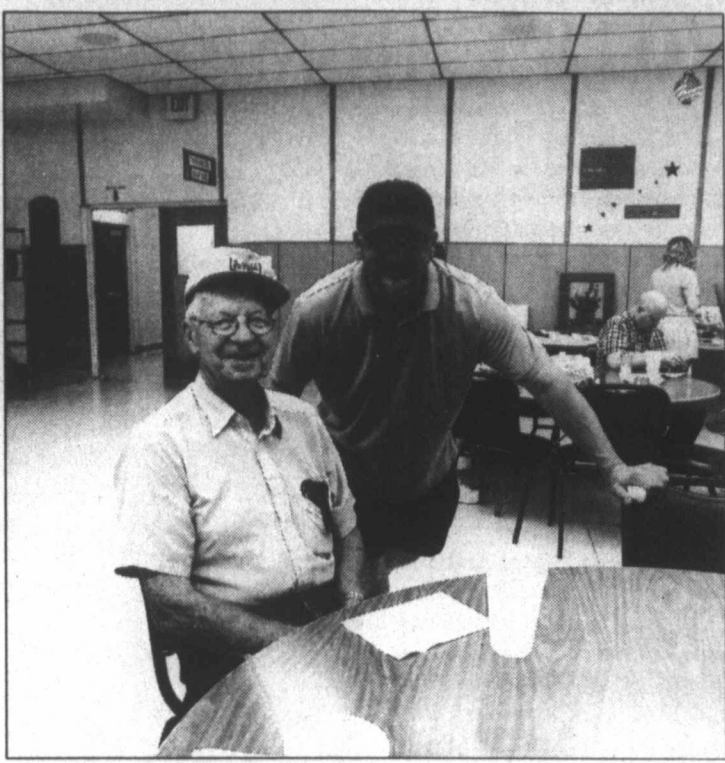

Colorado ISD has already taken several steps to make attending school here safer. Unnamed members of the faculty will be armed at school and at school functions this year. Also, Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers will have an office inside CHS and will be a presence in and around the school. The staff has also undergone active shooter training by the DPS.

The discussion about school safety continued as board members talked about the budget for the upcoming school year, but no decisions were officially made. With school shooting numbers on the rise, it's a subject that will be discussed again and again.

In other business, full-pay lunch prices had to be increased again this year. Section 205 of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 directs school districts how to figure the price of full-pay lunches. Thanks to these federal regulations, elementary and middle school students who pay full price to eat lunch at the school will now be charged \$2.20, up 10 cents from last year.

Staff prices for breakfast will also increase to \$2.25 and lunch to \$3.75. High school lunches will remain at \$2.25 for the upcoming school year. Price increases will not affect reduced-price lunches.

Bids have been sought for dairy products, bread products and fuel. The board awarded those contracts during the meeting. Borden Dairy will supply dairy products again for the upcoming school year. CFO Shelia Redwine said Borden's prices are low and they have what the cafeterias need. Lowe's Market won the bid for bread and bread products, and Matlocks will supply the fuel for the district for the 2018-19 school year.

from \$75, and security will now cost \$275 for events with alcoholic beverages, instead of \$225.

City Manager David Hoover said, "We're not trying to make any money off of this. We're just trying to get close to breaking even."

The entity which supports the Women & Infant Children (WIC) program in Colorado City is changing hands, and the new organization is seeking an agreement with the city to continue using the Bob Reily Early Learning Center for office space.

South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. is seeking to lease the east end of the building for office space, but the council wasn't persuaded to take such action during Tuesday's meeting.

Hoover said WIC has been paying \$450 per month to use part of the building, but utilities increased and there have been instances of unattended children running up and down the hallways of the building, a potential liability for the city. Councilmen cited other issues about continuing with the arrangement.

Councilmen Travis Lynch and Larry Chaney expressed their concern regarding how the lease will limit the city's use of the building in the future. Councilman Timothy Boyd said he doesn't think the arrangement is worth the risk to the city.

Boyd moved not to accept the new agreement, and Hayman will be negotiating the city's desire to get out of the contract with the other entity. The WIC program will have to find office space in another location.

David Molina from Interstate Solar Group LoneStar Division, LLC, presented an opportunity to the council to put solar panels at the city's wellfield. Molina cited the city's recent water issues after a storm.

He said the City of Snyder has

put in solar panels at their wastewater facility and is paying for the infrastructure with the savings the city is seeing on its electric bills. He invited city officials to talk with Snyder officials and take a trip over to see the solar panels and equipment.

Thanks to a green energy incentive, the City of Snyder received a \$125,000 check from Oncor for "going green". However, the City of Colorado City would have to have the project in place by November 1st to be eligible for such benefits, according to Hoover.

Councilmen expressed their interest in getting a better plan in place and are interested in looking at solar energy. However, no one was ready to give the okay Tuesday night.

Hoover said he thinks the city is not quite ready to approve such a plan right now. The project is preliminarily estimated to cost around \$1 million.

During the city manager's report Hoover said the city does have a better backup system in place in case of another storm like the one that knocked out water to the city for a few days. A new diesel generator producing 120 Kw of electricity has been purchased and will be housed in a sea contained which is anchored.

Bob Brookshear has been working on behalf of the city with the Strain family to secure the entryway into the Colorado City Airport. Anyone visiting the airport may need to use the entryway, but so do the Strains and their employees. It is the only entrance to one of their pastures behind the airport.

In the past, the Strains have retained ownership and the city uses an easement agreement to access the property. Hoover wants the city to get ownership of the entryway, which is less than one acre of land, so the airport can be annexed into the

City of Colorado City. By annexing the airport, the city will be able to use it as part of the Economic Development Corporation.

Brookshear said the Strains have indicated they may donate the land to the city in return for an easement agreement.

An unforeseen difficulty has arisen in the taxing entities being able to deed 19 properties to the city. All entities have okayed the deal, but the Mitchell County Hospital District cannot give away property legally. They have asked for \$10 per lot, and the money is no problem.

However, Hoover said if the city accepts that deal, he will have to go back and bill all entities for maintenance done on the properties over the years. The item was tabled until attorneys can further negotiate the deal.

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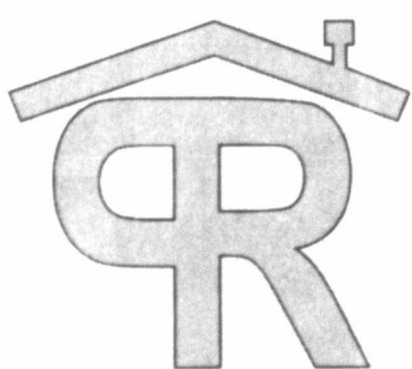

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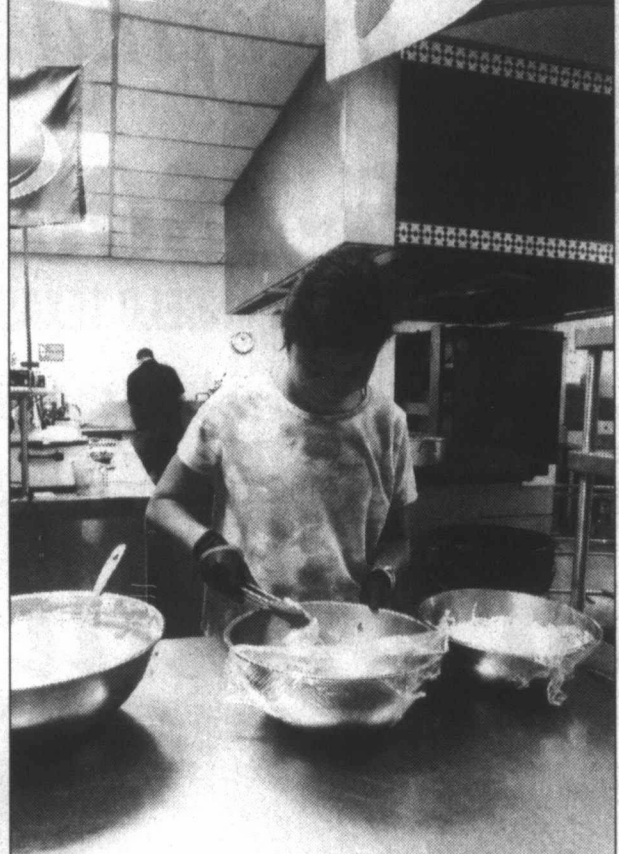
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Memorial Golf Tourney to be held Aug. 18 & 19
