WASHINGTON, March 15.—Invitations to France and Italy to participate "in some manner" in the three-power naval conference at Geneva were made public today at the state department. While similar in form and also in language in part they differed in that reply was made to the arguments advanced by each country in rejecting the original five-power conference invitation.

Assurance was given both governments that while the United States had no desire to reopen questions as to naval limitations already settled by treaty, it regarded all other questions as open for discussion and had no preconceived ideas as to French or Italian tonnage ratios in the classes of auxiliary ships to be dealt with.

To the French suggestion that success of the preparatory commission at Geneva, organized by the League of Nations, might be aided by simultaneous treaty negotiations between the naval powers, the American note said:

"The government of the United States is of the opinion that all appropriate measures taken by the large naval powers, such as the League of Nations, might be aided by simultaneous treaty negotiations between the naval powers, the American note said."

Italy's assertion of the interdependence of every type of armament was answered similarly, that in the American view "limitation of the naval branch of armament most greatly contribute in advancing the solution of the problem as a whole."

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The new federal radio commission completed its organization today and took several steps toward solidifying its authority over communication by air.

Its first order settled all immediate concerns, which radio users on shipboard or in the amateur field, have felt as to how the new regime might affect them, by continuing all licenses of that character hitherto granted by the commerce department for an indefinite period.

A second decision touched upon the most congested radio phase, and by it all operators of broadcast stations are notified to apply in the near future for a renewal of permits to operate.

Official Report
WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—An official report that Chinese soldiers of the northern forces had fired upon the American destroyer *Petrels*, striking the ship's bridge three times, was received today by the navy department from Admiral Williams, commanding the Asiatic fleet.

The destroyer returned the fire with its machine guns but did not use heavier rifles into action. Williams was informed by Rear Admiral Hough commanding the Yangtze patrol squadron.

Hough said an officer and five men from the *Petrels*, which was at Wuhu at the time, were sent to investigate reports that northern soldiers had confiscated certain Standard Oil properties at Taping. The investigation making the trip in the Standard Oil launch *Meien*.

Returned Fire
After upon advice that the *Meien* had been heavily fired upon by the Chinese, the *Petrels* itself proceeded last Friday to Taping, but found reports regarding the *Meien* to be false. The Chinese fleet instead fired upon the Standard Oil ship *Meien*.

Admiral Williams also reported that Chinese troops had fired upon the American ship *Meritt* near Anhwei.

Klick May Be Future Ad Wolgast

JACK DEMPSEY SAYS "DOUBLE" OF FORMER CHAMPION IS GREAT NATURAL FIGHTER

SAN FRANCISCO, March 15.—"The 'Portero Pippin' admirer and 'double' of Ad Wolgast, whom he hopes to emulate in achieving the light-weight championship of the world, on Friday night in the same arena in the ring—this is Frankie Klick, San Francisco boy marching rapidly up the pugilistic ladder.

Frankie hopped into new fame in San Francisco with a decision over 'California Joe' Lynch, experienced ring brawler.

The six-round bout was closely watched by Jack Dempsey, who may have lost his championship, but who is a keen judge of battlers.

"When a green youngster can out-punch and outfight a cagey, battle-scarred veteran, he must be a pretty good prospect," declared Dempsey.

"I think Klick has a good future. He is fast, he punches sharp and ac-

curately, he is aggressive, and he is always on his toes. He still has plenty to learn, but he has all the earmarks of a natural fighter.

The memory of Ad Wolgast is not so dim but what Klick's resemblance to that fighter can be seen even in photographs. Those who have seen him fight declare that his style is similar to that of the old master of the ring.

Bobby Jones Makes Hole-in-One as He Rounds Out Eleventh Golf Year

ATLANTA, Mar. 15.—St. Patrick and Bobby Jones have the same birthday and this date March 15 marks the turning of the quarter-century for the young man who is rather generally regarded as the world's greatest golfer.

At any rate, in the year before becoming 25, he achieved the distinction of being the first and only golfer rated officially as the champion of the world, by winning in the same season the open titles of Great Britain and the United States while at the top of American amateur golf. The latter title he won a short time later to George Von Elm.

Then, too, Bobby's first hole in one came just a few weeks ago, as if to bring his 24th year to a fitting close. It was Number 11, on the Post Lake course of Atlanta, and was a half-shot with the Number four tee to the green 170 yards away. The ball hit five yards from the cup, bounced twice and rolled in.

Bobby is generally regarded as being older than he really is because of his prominence in national and international golfing affairs for the last eleven years. It was at the age of fourteen years and six months that he entered his first national competition, the United States amateur championship at the Merion Cricket Club, Philadelphia, in 1916.

He qualified handsily and defeated Eben Dyer, a former national champion, and Frank Dyer before losing a grueling match to Robert A. Gardner, then champion, in the third round. Since then Bobby has been a national figure in golf.

Bobby started playing the game before he was six years old, at the East Lake course of the Atlanta Athletic club, still his home club. His remarkable style was modeled on that of Stewart Maiden, still the professional instructor at that club.

Briefly, his career has to date included competition in twenty-one national championships, ten open and eleven amateur, sixteen in the United States, one in Canada and four in Great Britain.

He has won every major golfing title except the British amateur championship. He has won the United States open championship twice, in 1923 and 1924; the British open once, in 1925; and the British open once, in 1925.

In the United States open event, he secured an unapproached. In the last five years, beginning with 1922, he has been either first or second in every tournament.

Bobby also has won innumerable lesser competitions, having been Southern amateur champion three times, up to 1922, when he won the title at East Lake with an aggregate score of ten under par for all the rounds he played, and since has not competed in that event.

During the war years of 1917 and 1918, he competed in matches for the Red Cross all over the country, playing in four ball matches with Perry Adair, his famous partner in golf. Miss Alva Stirling, of Atlanta, and Miss Elaine Rosenthal, of Chicago. The four young people helped to raise something like \$150,000 for the Red Cross fund.

Bobby was married in June, 1924, to Miss Mary Malone, of Atlanta, and now is the father of two children, Clara Malone Jones, not quite two years old, and Robert Tree Jones III, aged not quite four months.

The open champion, after being graduated as a law student at the Georgia School of Technology in 1922, went to Harvard for a B. S. degree and after a year in business went back to Harvard to study law at Harvard University, preparatory to entering his father's law firm in Atlanta.

Bobby is now in the first year of his law studies at Emory.

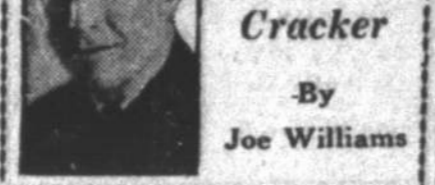

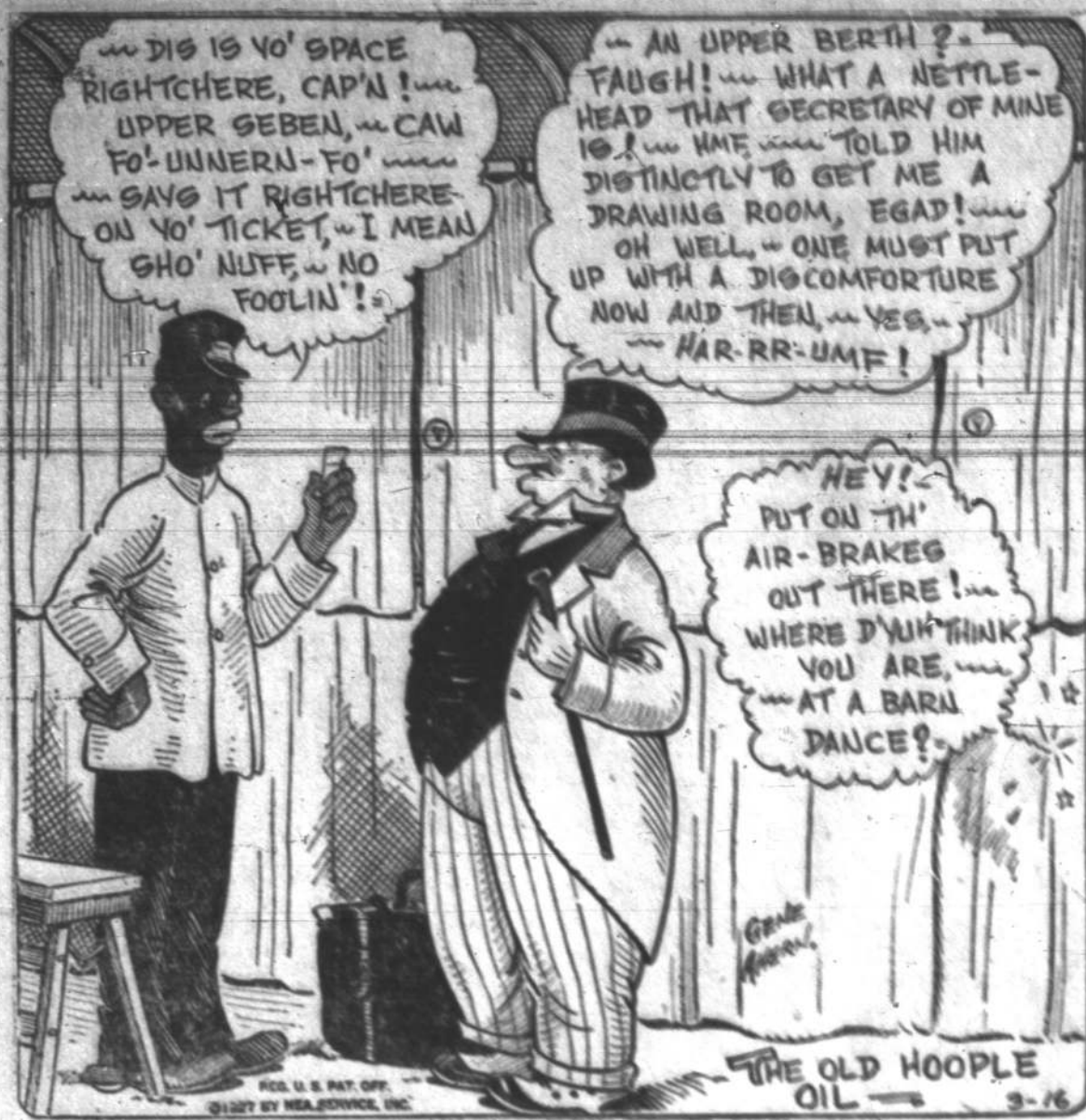
