Rural Electrification Program Assured with Low Electric Rates

Good prospect for securing city from the Buchanan at rates as low as those in the Tennessee Valley is held by Mills County families who applied for the service. Those who would like to be charter members may file application with County Engineer W. P. Weaver or with M. J. W. P. Weaver in Big Valley.

A following letter was received from Mr. Weaver: "The Rural Electrification Administration is now in the process of making a survey of the Buchanan area. It is expected that the survey will be completed by July 1, and for this time it will be impossible for the Buchanan area to make an appropriation for a project until after July 1st. We are expecting that the survey will be completed by July 1st."

Highway No. 7 a \$640,000 Project

Work on completing highway 7, from eight miles west of Waco to the Coryell County line, a distance of around 14 miles, was started last week.

Finishing up of the concrete slab from where it stops, near South Bosque through McGregor and to the Coryell County line will cost \$320,000. Cage Bros. and L. A. Turner are doing the gravel and sub-grade treatment processes, as preliminaries to pouring of concrete.

A crushing plant for work on the Oglesby-Gatesville job has been set up by Cage Brothers, who have the contract. This portion of the project will amount to an expenditure of \$100,000.

Erection of new bridge across the Leon River, grading and drainage construction is being done on the strip between Gatesville and Arnett by Thomas and Ratliff, contractors. Completion of this job will mean spending of \$220,000, the biggest part of which goes for building of the bridge.

Advertising for bids on contracts to be let February 21 for construction work from the Coryell County line near Evant to the Mills County line near Star has been announced by the highway department. A crushed stone base will be used for the road with building of drainage structures and grading also included in the job.—McGregor Mirror.

His death apparently was caused by a heart attack. Only his wife was with him in the apartment. She said that his last words were a request to her: "Turn your face toward me so I can see you."

Colorado Bridge Building Put Off

Judge R. J. Gerald and Mayor H. G. Bodkin went to Austin last week for an interview with Julian Montgomery, state highway engineer, with regard to the building of the proposed bridge across the Colorado River between San Saba and Goldthwaite. They were joined in Austin by a delegation of officials from San Saba on the same mission.

Despite the fact that Mills County has purchased three separate sites for the bridge, the last time with the written assurance of the highway department that construction would commence as soon as the state received titles to the new right of way, Mr. Montgomery stated that there were no funds available for the building and suggested that Mills County's representatives "come back in July." He stated that he was unable to give any idea as to when construction might start.

Tolbert Patterson For Representative

The tradition of granting every office holder a second term if he has made good in his first term gives Hon. Tolbert Patterson a big advantage should anyone seek to contest his candidacy this year.

The probabilities are that he will not be opposed, experienced political observers state, but if he is, the opposing candidate is likely to find himself hard pressed for campaign issues. Mr. Patterson made a fine record in the legislature last year, and his ability was acknowledged in various ways. For a second term the experience he has gained should be a big advantage, not only for him, but for the constituents he represents in both Mills and Comanche counties.

Mr. Patterson did not pussyfoot on any of the issues which came up for a vote. His record is open and clear, and he has proven himself willing and able to discuss any and all issues with those interested. His formal announcement was published in The Eagle last week.

High point man for the tournament was Adolph Kunkle of Priddy with 43 points. Gerald Head of Star second with 23 points. R. L. Atcherson of Star next with 21 points. Duron Kirby of Goldthwaite was next with 19 points. Houston Duron was high point man for Mullin with 7 points.

Piloting Locomotive Offers Problems

Every man who's half a man has dreamt some time in his life of piloting a giant locomotive.

Suppose that boyhood dream could be fulfilled—what problems would the delighted embryo engineer find on his hands?

His new vehicle might stump him for a time. And seriously. Here, first cost isn't the least cost. His gasoline carriage cost him about \$700. His new, wonderful dream-come-true lists at \$86,000. Or if he has been dreaming of a rugged cargo-tugger of the rails, a freight engine would set him back around \$104,000. This will secure for him a 95-foot Berkshire type locomotive with an 82-foot wheel base, including tender and weighing nearly 700,000 pounds. The builders, by the way, throw in the tender as standard equipment for the price of the engine alone!

For a small, sport model Hudson type passenger flyer, the builders will deliver at the nearest siding a light weight passenger speedster of 76-foot wheel-base weighing a mere half million pounds and able to sprint an easy 80 miles an hour with full quota of Pullmans. The Pullmans, of course, would cost extra.

Both the fast passenger locomotive and the "plodding" 50-mile-an-hour freight job are rated equal horsepower of 4000, but with increased cylinder size and smaller driving wheels the freight mover develops 80,000 pounds tractive power, while the passenger "sport model" rates only 55,000 pounds. The maximum pull is developed with use of the booster auxiliary driving the trailer wheels under the cab. Trading every couple of years, the former autoist would discover, has no place in locomotion. The life of his new conveyance is 20 years.

But driving to Boston on 10 gallons of gas and a pint of oil becomes just a fragrant memory. A fleeting dream. His railed power plant will reduce nearly 10 tons of coal to ashes, send almost 20,000 gallons of water as steam through its boiler pipes, cylinders and husky stack in the journey across the State. The freight hauler will consume nearly twice as much fuel and water on the trip and would not be considered for a Sunday afternoon pleasure drive.

Driving this bewildering new machine the erstwhile autoist will discover has nothing in common with shifting to high and stepping on the gas. Nor does he release the air brakes and simply pull on the throttle to increase speed. Aside from a delicate technique of feeding steam as the engine gains speed, the driver does things with the reverse lever.

This is called "couping it up" and paradoxically reduces the amount of steam entering the cylinders much as the motorist would advance his spark under like conditions. At high speed the cylinder valve opening may admit vapor only during a small part of the stroke, expansion completing the power impulse.

Without this precaution the engine would "knock" with all 4000 horses kicking the running gear and causing much strain and damage.

Boiler pressures are nothing for the novice driver to conjure with! If he has trouble with the boiler at home he had best take an expert along. Pressures on the rail giants are 240 pounds to the square inch. Steam temperatures are 650 degrees. These are figures beyond the ken of men whose steam problems consist of how to get heat into the living room radiator!

Besides watching the in-rolling track ahead of the pilot truck for stray cows and thoughtless motorists, the new driver must keep in mind about 25 accessories, from air compressors with 120 cubic feet a minute capacity each, to a 3100 revolutions-a-minute generator of 800 watts rating. There is a feed water heater with 80,000 pounds an hour capacity; a centrifugal pump turning 7150 times a minute; a soot blower and a stoker; and a sand box carrying over two tons. And many other "apparatuses" too technical to mention.

Somewhere near Chester we can imagine the man who'd dreamt of driving an engine looking for a highway crossing where he could stop and thumb a ride back. Dreams, he would realize by then, are pleasant diversions—only until they come true!

Mall Structures At New York Fair To Break Records

NEW YORK (Special)—Not only will the New York World's Fair 1939 be the largest exposition in history, but it will have the most luxurious Central Mall ever designed, a mile-long walk to cost \$60,000,000, Grover A. Whalen, president of the Fair corporation, announced.

And, not only will the Mall be the most magnificent ever laid out, but it will contain a number of other "large-est"—structures and works of art that have never been surpassed for size or elegance, he added.

In addition to the Trylon, tallest triangular spire ever raised, and the Perisphere, largest ball ever made by mankind, the Mall will form a setting for the largest portrait statue fashioned since the Egyptians hewed the likeness of Rameses II from rock in the land of the Nile. It will portray George Washington as he arrived for his inauguration exactly 150 years previous to the opening day of the Fair. It will be 65 feet tall and its mass will be more than 500 times that of an average six-foot man.

The tallest sundial ever erected, supported by a life-size tree sculptured by the celebrated Paul Manship, will actually tell time for Fair visitors, for the numerals denoting the hours of the day will be set in a huge, circular plot where the sundial's shadow will fall from 50 feet above.

More than a million plants and a thousand trees will be used in landscaping the Mall.

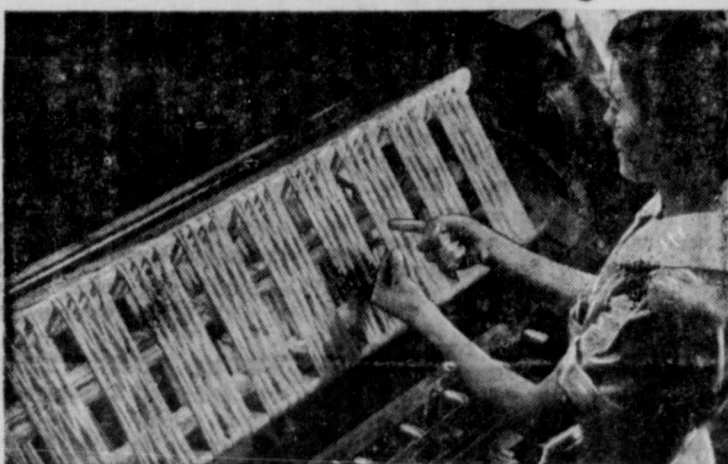

PROGRESS THROUGH CHEMISTRY
By Dr. Jas. K. Hunt. E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Co., Inc.

Man-Made Textile Fibers



IN the entire realm of industrial chemistry there is no development more thrilling than that of rayon. Born in the year 1884 as the brainchild of a French chemist, Count Hilaire de Chardonnet, and for many years only a poor imitation of silk, this once scorned stepchild of the textile industry now stands proudly on its own feet along with cotton, silk, linen and wool as a worthy member of the family of textile fibers.

Since the silk worm feeds on mulberry leaves, Chardonnet first tried the leaves and twigs of the mulberry tree as raw material in his efforts to create "artificial silk." He treated this material with nitric acid and from a solution of the resulting mass was able to spin filaments which, although highly inflammable, looked somewhat like silk. Chardonnet later used cotton for his raw material, and learned how to reduce the inflammability of this new man-made yarn. In the meantime chemists were working on other processes for making synthetic fibers.

In the viscose process, which was developed around 1891, purified cellulose from cotton linters and the spruce tree is treated with caustic soda and carbon bisulfide to form a syrupy liquid known as viscose. This liquid is forced through microscopic holes in the end of a thimble-like cup, known as a "spinneret," into a bath which changes the "liquid cellulose" back into solid cellulose, in the form of a continuous yarn made up of many small filaments. Today, about 85% of the world's rayon is made by this process. Most of the remainder is made by the acetate process, which involves making a cellulose spinning solution by treating purified cotton linters with acetic acid.

From its humble beginning some fifty years ago the rayon industry has travelled far. The world production of this synthetic fiber in 1936 amounted to some 1,300,000,000 pounds, and in the United States alone a sufficient amount of rayon

was made last year, if woven into dress goods, to supply each and every one of the 43,000,000 women in this country above the age of fifteen with six dresses. Last year this country used more than five times as much of this synthetic fiber as silk.

What factors are responsible for this sensational textile development? Improvements in quality and appearance, brought about by years of research. The strength of rayon is now comparable with that of silk, and for certain specialty purposes much greater. Rayon now being used in the cord fabric of automobile tires is notable because of high strength and durability at elevated temperatures. For dress fabrics rayon is made in any desired luster, ranging from a brightness greater than that of silk to the dullness of chalk. Filaments finer than silk give rise to fabrics of extreme softness. Rayon cut into short lengths, so-called "staple" yarn, and the new irregular thick and thin yarns, give rise to effects not obtainable with other textile fibers. Transparent velvet, a worldwide fashion, was born of rayon. Rich lustrous satins, dull satins, tree-bark crepes, spun yarns that resemble wool, and textiles rivaling in beauty the finest cashmere, all are being made of rayon.

And the end is not yet. Rayon fabrics based on cellulose are just beginning to take their rightful place in the modern world. We can say what is in store for us in the way of new synthetic fabrics.

"I believe college students of today are ahead of those of 30 years ago in many ways," says Dr. Clinton Lockhart, professor of Old Testament at Texas Christian University, who will be "80 years young" Monday, Feb. 21.

"They make no more mistakes than we older people do. Boys and girls today are just as intellectual, moral, courteous and aspiring as they were in my youth."

A volume of original poetry—titled "Apples of Gold"—will be brought out on his birthday. He took up the writing of poetry six years ago (and the study of the violin 10 years ago) because he did not want to "stagnate."

But his own idea of a suitable observance of his 80th birthday is to "teach my classes in Old Testament. My greatest joy is in my work. I am not planning to retire nor to take a vacation."

Dr. Lockhart is T. C. U.'s oldest faculty member, both in age and in years of service. He came to the school in 1906 from Drake University, Des Moines, Ia. Before that he had been president of Culver-Stockton College, Canton, Mo. He received his Ph. D. degree from Yale University in 1894.

He served as president of T. C. U. from 1906 to 1911, which includes the time of the school's great fire and the subsequent removal from Waco to Fort Worth. He has published many articles on Biblical and archaeological subjects, and is an authority in both fields.

"Athletics? I think they are a valuable part of education. Intercollegiate sports add a spice to college life that we did not have in the old days."

"Growing old? Well, age cuts down one's physical activities and lessens one's interest in romance, but it gives a broader, richer outlook on life. One has full compensation in a better understanding of life."

FIRE TRAP SCHOOLS

Again the North American continent has been the scene of a ghastly school fire—a small college in Montreal, in which the death list was more than a score. The hundred-odd pupils and teachers who were saved owe their lives to miraculously good fortune.

As many authorities have pointed out, the condition in thousands of American schools presents a constant hazard to their occupants. And this is true not only of old wooden buildings which were erected before much was known of fire-resistive construction. Many a relatively new school, though handsome and massive in appearance, is honeycombed with unnecessary hazards. Inadequate stairways, doors that open inward, poorly situated fire escapes—these are but a few of the dangers that can be found in schools built at great cost in recent years, as well as in the ramshackle buildings of yesteryear.

The school boards which have jurisdiction over these buildings didn't consciously approve hazardous design and construction. They simply didn't know any better. But here is a case where ignorance is no excuse—where, indeed, it is in the nature of a crime. No school should be built until qualified experts have examined the blueprints. And every existing school—no matter how safe it may seem to the layman—should be inspected to unearth and correct possible dangers.

Thousands of children died in school fires that would not have occurred had the buildings been properly constructed. Every parent should demand fire-safe schools.

ESSENTIALS OF U. S. DEMOCRACY

A short time ago, a number of Senators, principally members of the majority party, conferred with a view to creating a definite program for promoting recovery. Their conclusions, embraced in ten proposals, were presented to the Senate by Josiah Bailey of North Carolina. A digest of these ten vitally important points follows:

1. The capital gains tax and the undistributed profits tax should be thoroughly revised at once, so as to encourage the normal flow of savings into productive enterprise.
2. A start should be made toward balancing the Federal budget, in order that public credit may be preserved and fears which deter investments, ended.
3. The Constitutional guarantees of the right of the worker to work, and of the owner of property to its possession, must be preserved and enforced.
4. Government should stay out of fields which belong in the realm of private industry—and if the government does propose to compete in any field, due notice should be given so that private investment may avoid it.
5. The competitive system must be maintained—as against either private or government monopoly, and business' right to a reasonable profit must be guaranteed.
6. Private credit must be preserved—and that means that the nation's collateral on which all credit depends, must be preserved.
7. There must be an assurance that taxes will not be further increased, and that they will be reduced at the earliest possible time.
8. States' rights, home rule and local self-government must be vigorously maintained, unless proven definitely inadequate.
9. The needy must be aided under a system which is non-political and non-partisan.
10. Lastly, the nation should rely, in the future, as in the past, upon the American system of private initiative and enterprise.

This program needs no comment. It is a real prosperity program. It is based upon the principles that have made America great. If Congress will adopt it, it will make a magnificent contribution not only to recovery, but to the maintenance of U. S. democracy.

The WEEKLY CONSTITUTIONAL

Supreme Court Principles

How does the Supreme Court work?

1—The Court confines itself to the judicial duty of deciding only upon cases brought before it. It does not originate cases, or advise the Executive or the Congress as to pending legislation or laws already passed.

2—The Court will not deal with questions purely political rather than judicial.

3—The Court, if possible, decides a case so as to save its constitutionality. Out of over 24,000 laws passed by Congress in 150 years, it has found only 76 such acts, or parts of acts, unconstitutional.

4—The Court will not review questions of legislative policy. It does not decide whether acts of Congress are unwise, arbitrary or unnecessary. This is a legislative function of Congress. Similarly, as to the motives of Congress, Mr. Justice Brandeis said in a court opinion: "No principle of our constitutional law is more firmly established than that this Court may not, in passing upon the validity of a statute, inquire into the motives of Congress." The Court invalidates a law not in regard to the policy or motives of Congress, but only when it finds that Congress has exceeded the powers granted it under the Constitution.

The Supreme Court is not advisory, legislative or political. It is exclusively judicial.

Health Notes

From reports reaching the Texas State Department of Health it seems as though measles are quite prevalent throughout the State. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has the following to say in regard to this disease.

"Many persons still insist that measles are nothing serious and that children should get them early and get it over with. However, measles are a very wide spread, highly contagious disease and over 100 children in Texas die of them each year.

Children generally have active disease seven to 14 days after contact with a person ill with measles. Children must be excluded from school for a period of 21 days from onset.

"One never knows at the beginning how serious the attack will be, so a physician should be called when measles is suspected. Most deaths from this disease occur in children under five years of age. If you have a baby or very young child, your first

consideration must be to keep him out of houses where measles exist. Prevent him from playing with children with children who, you think, may have the disease.

"If your child shows signs of measles, running nose, sneezing, eyes red and watery, put him to bed at once. While waiting for the doctor see that the child is kept warm. The room should be well ventilated, but glare and draughts prevented. Give him a light diet of milk, soup, and cereal. Keep him in bed until the doctor permits him to be up.

When recovering from measles he is less able to withstand other diseases. The doctor should see the child two or three times in a year following recovery to guard against bad after effects."

Albanian Romance

Edward VIII of Albania had to give up his throne to marry an American woman. Zog I of Albania is not expecting any such complications. Of course the two cases are not exactly parallel. The woman Zog plans to wed in April has not been married and divorced. Also she is of noble rank; although half American she is a member of Hungary's famous Apponyi family.

Poor Zog had been looking for a bride for a long time. Naturally he preferred a princess, but none was interested in becoming queen of his primitive little country. Then a few years ago he was reported to be on the outlook for an American heiress, but these proved unexpectedly indifferent. In the Countess Geraldine Apponi, Zog has found a sort of compromise candidate. She has a title, is said to be beautiful, and as she is half American the king is managing to follow the new royal tradition.

So all in all Zog is doing quite well by himself. Yes, he is pretty lucky. After all he is only an upstart king of an insignificant country. He became Albania's monarch in 1928 after serving three years as president. It is said that he goes heavily guarded when penetrating the mountain fastnesses of the country. That is because the Moslems, who represent more than two-thirds of the 1,000,000 Albanians, don't like his new-fangled ideas such as forbidding the wearing of the veil.—Houston Chronicle.

Avoiding Wars

There are those who profess to see, in the efforts of our government to protect American rights and American nationals in China a jingoistic attitude calculated to involve us in war. Others see in it merely "big business" or "Great Britain" inducing us to pull their chestnuts from the fire. To those who have such fears the logic and restraint of Secretary Hull's letter to Vice-President Garner should provide a reassuring answer. In response to a Senate resolution asking for information on the position and policies of the United States was deeply interested in "supporting by peaceful means influences contributory to preservation and encouragement of orderly processes. This interest," he continued, "far transcends in importance the value of American trade with China or American investments in China. It transcends even the question of safeguarding the immediate welfare of American citizens in China. There is a broader and much more fundamental interest which is that orderly processes in international relationships be maintained." This statement means precisely what it says. Such Americans as are in the war zone are there under treaty rights that Japan is obligated to recognize—the orderly processes of international relationships. The Japanese troops are in China in violation of those treaties and those orderly processes. Every move our government has made in the Far East—situation has been a move calculated to prevent us from becoming involved in war and to preserve the international ma-

Cemetery Road

When the final and official figures are tabulated, it will probably be found that the automobile death toll in 1937 reached a new all-time record, exceeding the 1936 slaughter with its 37,000 victims.

There is no reason for being surprised at the continued increase. Each year cars are made faster and more powerful—and a dangerous percentage of them become the property of drivers who couldn't be trusted to operate a bicycle safely. Roadways and surfaces are improved, thus offering a new temptation to excessive speed. And the number of accidents in which John Barleycorn is a factor tends to rise steadily.

This doesn't mean that the automobile accident toll cannot be reduced. It can be—but it is going to take action, not words. The individual responsibility of each motorist when he slides behind the wheel of a projectile weighing a ton or two and capable of doing 80 miles an hour, must be driven home. Law enforcement must be strengthened. The "fixer" of traffic violations must be eliminated. It must be realized that driving a car on the public highway is a privilege, not a right to be abused—and license laws must be more stringent. Finally, there must be swift and sure punishment for the reckless or drunken driver.

There are several hundred thousand graves in this country that constitute mute testimony to our past laxity in controlling the automobile. Unless public demand forces a change, you may fill one of the thousands of new graves that, figuratively speaking, will be dug by motorists in the years to come.—Temple Telegram.

Ending Poverty

The best way to attack the problem of poverty in this country, to raise the standard of living and increase the welfare of those at the bottom of the economic ladder, is to produce more wealth. The only way to produce more wealth is to see that the primary industries, agriculture, mining, fisheries, lumbering have enough income and to work through our secondary industries to obtain it. It is impossible to produce more wealth by placing such enormous burdens upon industry that it cannot produce efficiently. The sound way is to co-operate with them to aid them, in producing more goods so they can be distributed more cheaply.—Syracuse Post-Standard.

Frank Dobie Writes Of Hidden Treasure

Austin, Texas—Legends of "lost mines" of the Southwest and Mexico are being studied by Prof. J. Frank Dobie of The University of Texas for another book of romance on legends of these regions. Dobie has been able to unearth and assemble a voluminous amount of lore of mysterious mountains and ledges of gold and silver which but for his energetic efforts would in course of years be lost to memory.

Last summer he spent several weeks delving into the legendary "Adams Diggins" story—a vivid legend of a vast mountain of gold, deep in the recesses and little explored mountain region to the north of Silver City, N. M. It would appear that there is more evidence and testimony to establish the truth of this alluring tradition than is attached to most stories of "lost" mines. While much has been written about "Adam's Diggins," Dobie has given the subject elaborate treatment, to the extent of thirty thousand words in his forthcoming book.

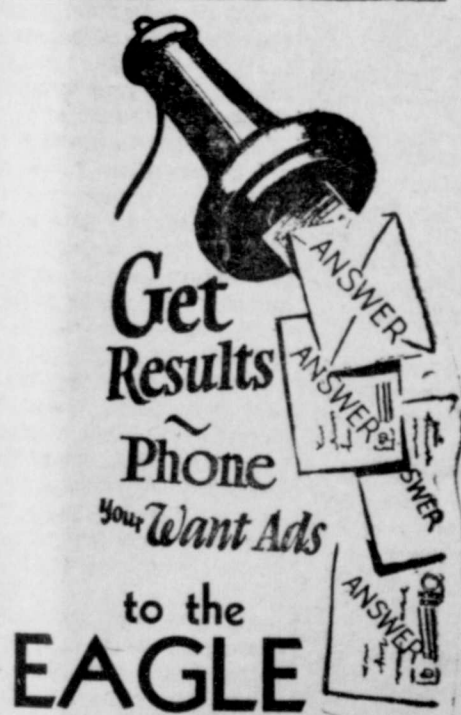

This legend stirred the imagination of Mr. Dobie so deeply that a few years ago he made a mule-back trip into the Sierra Madres of western Chihuahua, guided by an old-time prospector, and they were able to locate what was believed to be the exact spot where the legendary mine with its great fortune of gold was supposed to be.

Dobie in his researches, however, always stops short of finding the "lost" mine, although he might thereby gain fabulous personal wealth. He leaves them still undiscovered so he can write more about them at some future time.
