DALLAS COWBOY TO SPEAK AT BURK SPORTS BANQUET FRIDAY

The big play man... the big gliding runner... the ignored quarterback in college... but now one of the mainstays of the Dallas Cowboy offense... all wrapped up in the person of Dan Reeves, will be in Burk Burnett Friday night.

He will be here for the annual Burk Burnett Booster Club all-sports banquet, when he will be the guest speaker.

Reeves will be unknown to few in the audience. Many cultivated the fall habit of watching the Cowboys in action on television.

Most sports fans know that Dan is a 4.7 speedster, and that he has a knack for running pass patterns and that he ranked third among receivers with 19 catches for 490 yards and six touchdowns, and also rushed 17 times for 603 yards and 30 points.

Among the more elusive facts of his career is that he came to the Cowboys as a free agent, and he ranks as the ignored quarterback from North Carolina.

How he entered the free agent ranks is a mystery, for Reeves, in college, was on the second team All-ACC team in 1962. In 1964 he was quarterback under Marvin Bass. He set 10 school offensive records. And he threw for 348 yards against Big Eight Champ Nebraska in 1964.

But he was passed over in all the professional football drafts. His solid 200 pounds on a 6-1 frame and his record failed to impress the scouts, who no doubt

GIFTS MAY BE DEDUCTED

Gifts to approved charities may be deducted on 1968 Federal income tax returns by persons who list deductions.

In addition to cash, gifts of new or used clothing, furniture or other property can be deducted, explained Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas. For deduct is the fair market value, he said, the amount to be deducted.

A new IRS publication, "Valuation of Donated Property," explains rules and methods for determining fair market value. The booklet, Publication 561, discusses problems and pitfalls in making the valuation. The booklet is available free of charge. Just drop a card to Supply, Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas 75221.

Taxpayers who claim charitable contributions should be sure to keep records needed to substantiate the gifts, Mr. Campbell said.

Deduction should be supported by cancelled checks, receipts and other evidence showing the amount of the gift, date made and the organization involved, Mr. Campbell said.

Juice Is Dangerous

Now that we have presented a series of the more common drugs and narcotics, their different characteristics and repercussions, we would like to step off the "deep end" of the board.

Realizing the danger in the use of these drugs, let us analyze some of the things that may be the reason why a teenager would have the urge to try one of these drugs.

First, we know they are easily available in our area now. Unless we, the people, give the law enforcement back to the law of officers, there is very little that they can do to these people more commonly known as "pushers." There have been many arrests made of these people and through some powerful influence of some sort, all these people have received, at the most, is a suspended sentence.

Until last week there was no stronger sentence given in our immediate area for these offenses. Now, how can we expect the people we pay to protect us

and our children with so limited authority?

Second, we parents have a tendency to deprive our children of the great opportunity of learning the meaning of responsibility. In this, we think: "I didn't have this or that, or I had to do this or that when I was young, so my children will have the things that I didn't have or they won't have to do what I had to do when I was young." What I am trying to say is this: The average teenager of today has not been made aware of his or her responsibilities. They have more money to spend without having to learn it, etc. The thing that we have failed to give is the most important — that of love and attention.

In many families both parents are working in an attempt to keep up with the fast moving world of today. They, therefore, do not have the time, or fail to take the time, to give their children enough "attention."

In many instances the kids have to find their own ways cov-

ering this complex by amusing themselves until they have nothing left to try but some of the earlier described drugs.

In many cases, they are caught in an accidental first time "trap." This can happen by just being in the company or group where these things are tried just for "kicks." (fun) They can be given some of these drugs in drinks, food or cigarettes without knowledge of it. When this happens, often times it is too late before they realize what has taken place. If we parents are paying proper attention, then we will automatically be screening our own children's friends or buddies.

The blame can not, however, be placed on the friends or buddies, because it mostly belongs to us, the parents. We need to, individually talk to our own kids and explain these awful drugs and the damage they can

do to anyone and everyone who uses them.

At a later date we will have speakers and more film on these drugs. Both parents should be there.

Third, our city needs more playgrounds, summer ball parks and other means of recreation for my children and your children. Contact the Community Service Council, City, or some other organization and find out how "YOU" can help. This is OUR City and OUR children and we can help, both at home and at many various locations within our city. By doing this, then you can look forward to taking part in our summer swim club, baseball church camps, teen dances, Boy Scouts and Girl Scout Organizations, and many other helpful events that will give these youngsters something to occupy their time.

A final thought to remember, "Behind every delinquent teenager, there will usually be two delinquent parents."

Your Baby Sitter Needs Instruction

Play fair with your teen-age baby sitter and you can leave your little children in her charge with greater peace of mind. Tell her what her responsibilities are, and be sure you leave safe surroundings for both your children and the sitter.

The Council on Family Health, a non-profit organization sponsored as a public service by leading members of the drug industry to promote home safety and family health, suggests some ways to help a proxy parent do a better job.

Put all medicines in their proper storage places where they cannot fall into the hands of your children.

Even though you have stored household cleaners and chemicals beyond the reach of little children, you should instruct both the sitter and the children that the kitchen is "off limits" for the youngsters. There are too many things that can cause accidents to children in the kitchen. Put matches and lighters where youngsters can't find them.

When the sitter arrives, hand her a written list: the address and telephone number where you may be reached, the telephone number of your doctor and the telephone number of your nearest friend or neighbor. Tell her when to expect you back.

Instruct her to keep the doors locked and not to admit anyone except her friend or yourselves.

If she is to feed or bathe the children, be detailed in how to do it. Show her where the food is



kept. Tell her of any habits or problems she should know about the children.

And, above all, speak to your sitter in a way that will increase her trust in you. If your sitter is afraid of being scolded if she tells you something went wrong, she may be inclined to keep important information from you — such as a fall or other accidents that may have happened while you were out.

BUSINESS****Happy 72nd Birthdays**

All persons in poor or moderate circumstances who reach 72 this year should rejoice.

Because the government says that as soon as anyone reaches the age of 72 they can work their heads off, if they like, with no penalties.

But there are signs that the new administration will take action on revamping the operation of Social Security, long voted for by the nation's independent businessmen.

As the law now stands, any person 65 or over cannot earn more than \$1680 per year without losing part of the Social Security benefits. In the last Congress the Senate wanted to raise this to \$2400, but labor pressure in the House held the limit to the lower figure.

But on the other hand, if a person reaching 65 has an unlimited income from stocks, bonds, real estate, or other investments, that person can still draw full benefits. This has resulted in the strange paradox of millionaires drawing full Social Security benefits.

This regulation applies not only to retired workers, but also to qualified widows, but when a widow does reach the age of 72 she can step out and carve out a new career for herself. Thus, it might be said that from the viewpoint of Social Security life begins at 72.

This rather fantastic regulation is a holdover from the confusion of the Depression.

The thought was that if older workers were encouraged by Social Security to retire, then younger people would have a chance at the then scarce jobs. In addition, the government at that time needed more tax income to borrow for other purposes. Hence, Social Security was sold as an insurance plan whereby both the worker and his employer, or employers, jointly paid the premiums.

But even this myth has now been exploded. When the Federation research staff recently published an analysis showing that the young worker today could not live long enough to collect the taxes collected from him and his employer, plus accumulated interest, the Social Security Commissioner attacked the supporting figures in public print. Commissioner Ball flatly stated that the Social Security Taxes collected from the employer are not credited to the account of any particular employee.

Thus, perhaps for the first time, it was publicly acknowledged by the Social Security administration that the tax on the employer is a general welfare tax. Thus, with this tax scheduled to increase periodically over the next few years, it can also be considered that Social Security taxes are a form of built in inflation, as any increase in the cost of employing people must necessarily result in increased prices for the goods produced.

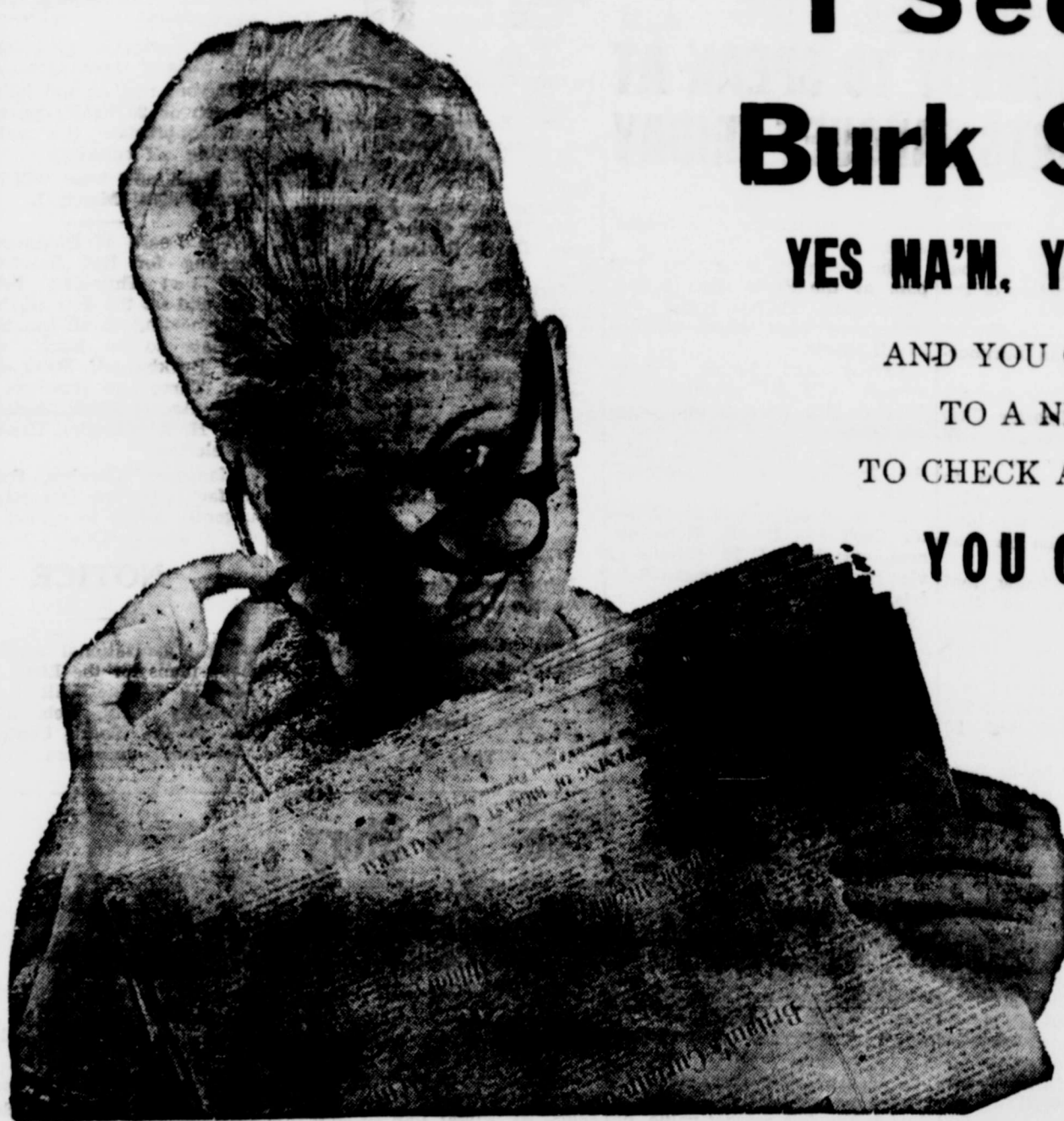
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"Little Miss Burkburnett" Candidates

Duroc Winter Congress Set At Duncan This Year

DUNCAN, Okla. — The 13th annual national and Southwestern Duroc Winter Type Congress and Sale will be held here for the first time Feb. 20-22, according to Waylon R. Carroll, secretary-treasurer of Lubbock, Tex.

The three-day event, scheduled at the Stephen County Fairgrounds, is expected to draw 130 consignors from 17 states. Already consigned are 40 bred gilts, 245 open gilts and 155 boars.

The 1969 event is being dedicated to the longtime fieldman of the Duroc breed, Leonard Stoehr of Platts Mouth, Neb. Col. John Hall of Aberdeen, S.D., and Col. Howard Parrish of Edon, Ohio will handle the auctioneering.

Bruce Henderson of Peoria, Ill., head of the United Duroc Swine Registry said, "The Southwestern Duroc Congress was the record hog sale of modern times for all breeds last year. We can expect the greatest sale offerings this breed has ever seen at Duncan, Okla."

Entries will be accepted on Feb. 19-20, and barrow and bred gilt judging will get underway at 2 p.m. on Feb. 20. Following a welcome by Henderson and introductions by Dick Morton Hennein, president of the Southwestern Duroc Breeders Association, judging of junior open gilts, senior open gilts, junior boars and senior boars will be the program on Feb. 21. Later, a committee will select classes for the type conference.

A banquet and business meeting will be held at the Fairground at 6:30 p.m. on February 21.

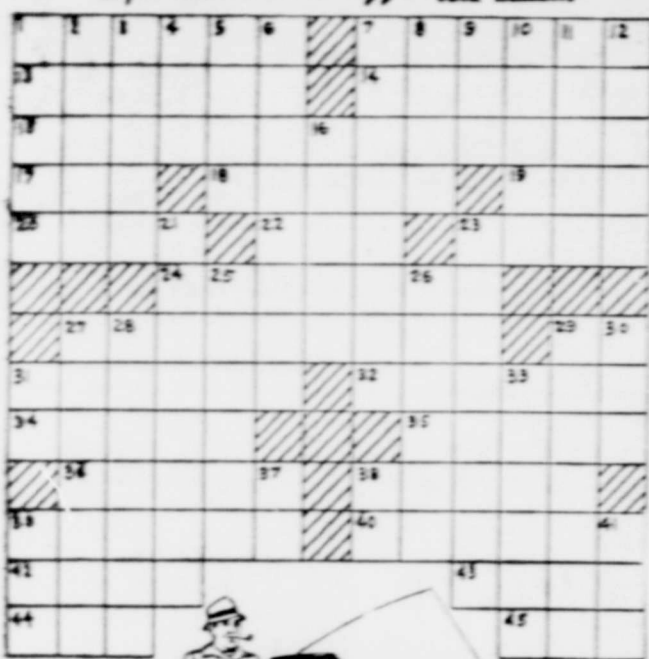

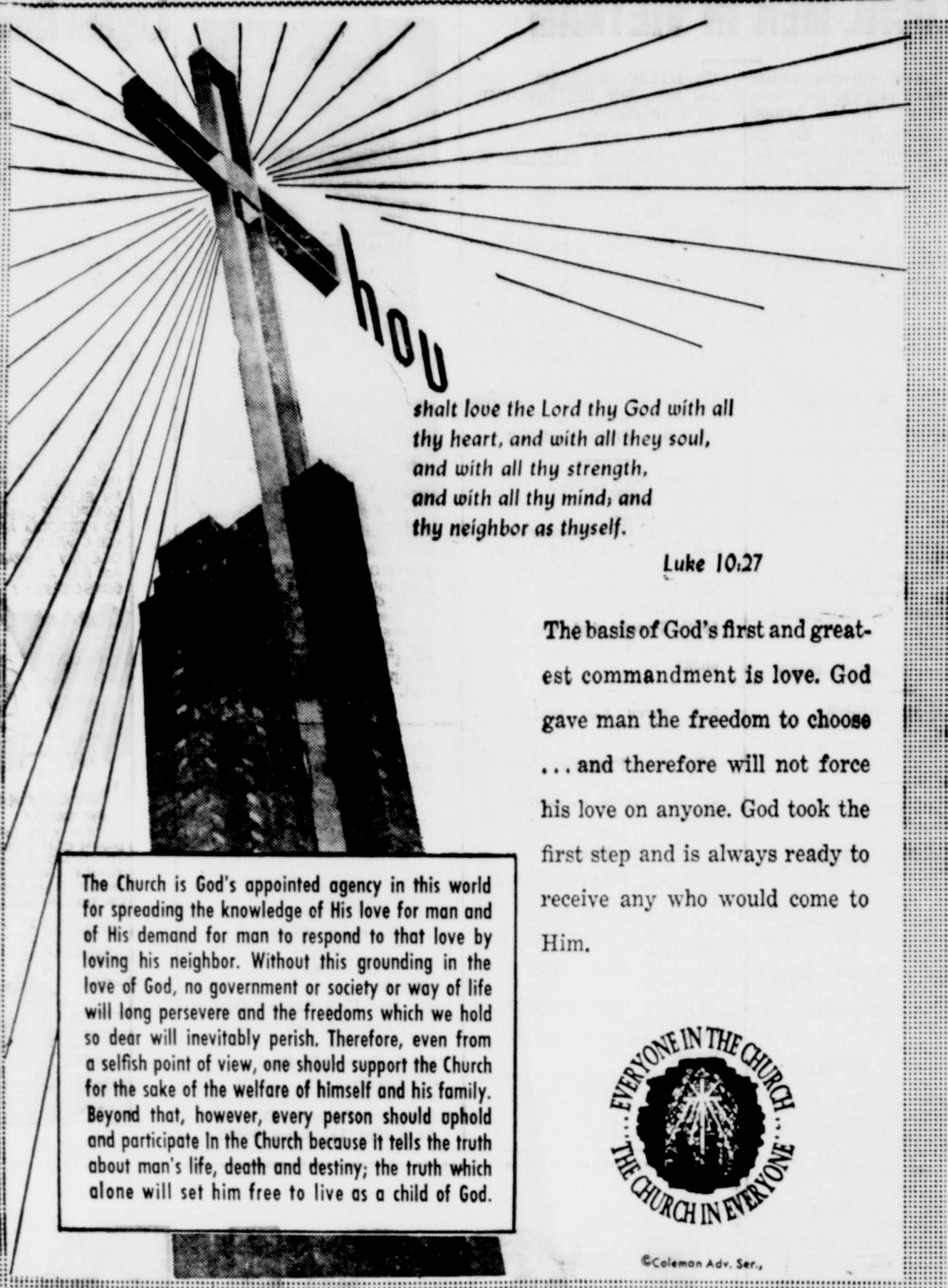

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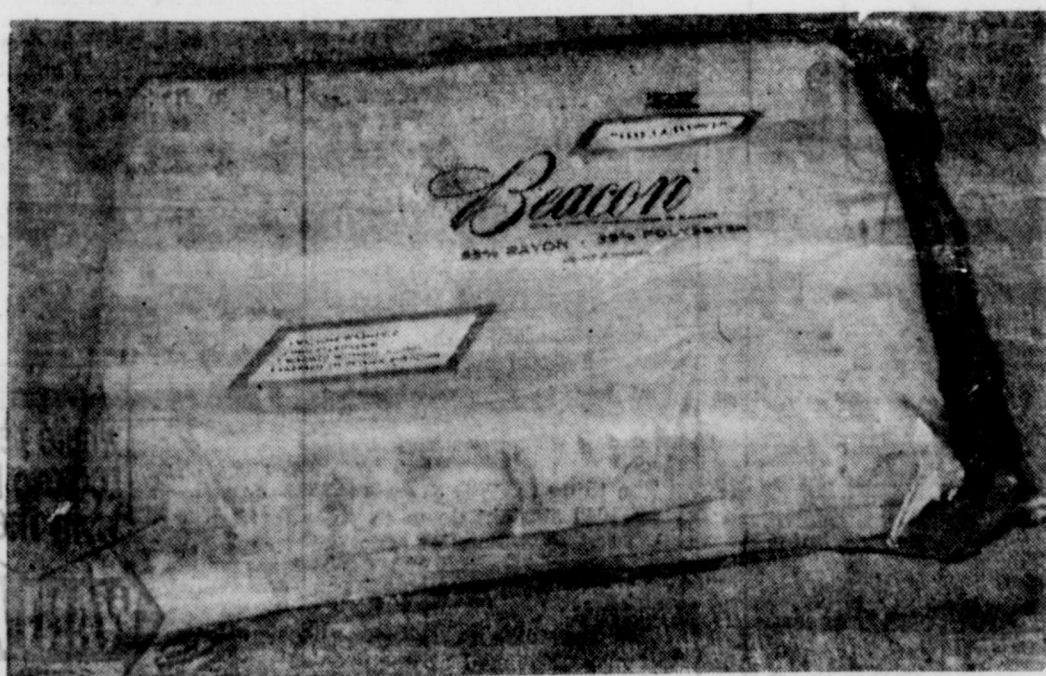
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
