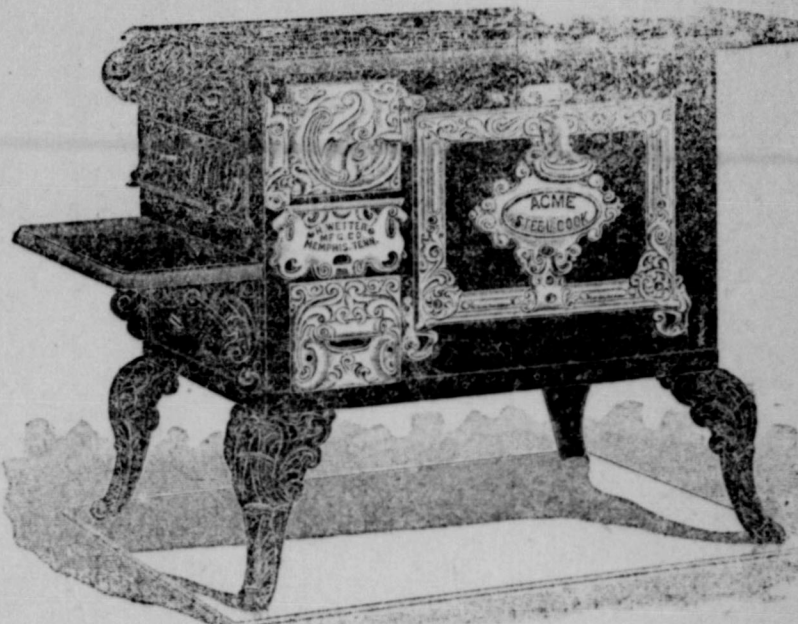

Talk for the Plains Country.

A prominent cattle-ranching interest in the country, is in the city for the first of the week. The direct from his Adobe Walls over the route of the new rail-road to Amstillo. This is a road which will be completed and in operation within

eighteen months. Harry T. Bibb, of this city, is interested in the project, and has already secured a large amount of right-of-way and a number of bonuses from the counties to be traversed by the road. The terminal of the new road will be at Engwood, Kansas, and it is proposed to run it southwest through Beaver county, Oklahoma, touching Ochiltree county, passing through Hausford county to the northern border of Hutchinson, thence west

through the northern part of that county to Moore county, where the road will then take a direction south through Dunns and thence to Amarillo, which will be its southern terminus.

Mr. Coble states that already the promoters have secured a number of land grants, right-of-way through many of the larger ranches, including his own, and at many points the citizens of the various counties are raising the bonus required by the company. He states that everybody throughout that section of the Panhandle interested is enthusiastically in favor of a road such as proposed, and he believes that the promoters will have but little difficulty in carrying out their plans.

Some question has been raised as to the Santa Fe's connection with this proposed project, but the men interested in the new road disclaim any connection whatever with the Santa Fe system, which has an Englewood terminal out of Wichita, Kansas. It is also stated that the Santa Fe has thousands of ties stacked at Englewood to be used in extension work from that place, but there seems to be no knowledge whatever

of the intention of the Santa Fe in this extension work. Some think that the road will run west out of Englewood, intersecting the Rock Island at Dalhart, while others discredit this story. At any rate the new road as proposed is of immense value and importance to the northern Panhandle, and it is hoped that the preliminary arrangements will shortly be effected and the road will be ready for operation within eight or ten months time. —Amarillo Herald

In accordance with Section 57, Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas, and Title 64 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, notice is given that the Southern Kansas Railway Company of Texas hereby petition the governor of Texas to have him submit to the Legislature at a special session called to meet on Monday the 26th day of March, 1906, and as well as intend to apply to the State Legislature in person assembled for a special act and law the substance of which is, to-wit:
authorizing said Railway Company to change its line of road to run in Carson County and Amarillo in Potter County, to make its line of road run direct from Panhandle to Amarillo running via Washburn and the line of the Fort Worth and Railway Company, and authorizing it to take up that part of a line of road beginning about one and one fourth (1 1/4) miles from Panhandle extending to Washburn in Armstrong County, in lieu thereof, building and laying its track from said point to a direct line and a general southwesterly direction to Amarillo in Potter County, Texas.

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SIGNS OF YIELDING

SPEAKER CANNON MAY YET
GIVE WAY ON STATEHOOD.

AN AGREEMENT IS PREDICTED.

In the Meantime Every Possible Ef-
fort is Being Made to Whip the In-
surgents into Line For Original
House Bill.

Washington, March 15.—While on
the surface there is no indication that
the speaker and his lieutenants, back-
ed by the president, will back down
in their determination to carry the
Hamilton statehood bill in defiance
of the senate there are sub-surface
signs that they will not let matters go
to the extreme and defeat any kind
of statehood legislation rather than
yield to the senate in any particular.
To an inquirer, Speaker Cannon said:
"We will agree. The bill will go to
conference and may remain there for
some weeks, but in the end there will
be legislation, and it will be before
the end of this session of congress."

One who knows the speaker's views
said that the Foraker amendment
would be considered by the conference
when the speaker amendment has
bound his following together to handle
the conference reports. It is known
that if the conference agree to restore
the two-state form of the bill, and in-
clude the Foraker amendment, which
will refer the question of acceptance
of statehood to the people of the terri-
tories, the speaker will not object. He
will probably suggest that, if this is
done, the referendum be made to in-
clude Oklahoma and Indian Territory,
and these territories be permitted to
vote separately on the acceptance,
just as is proposed for the other two
territories. Word was quietly passed
over to some of the members of the
senate that this was a possibility. It
was sent to those senators who, as
members of the senate committee on
territories, are in absolute sympathy
with the position of the house. They
made careful inquiries, and found that
if this solution could be worked out
in conference, it would receive ap-
proval in that body. Even some of
the Democrats were ready to say that
they would vote for the approval of
such a conference report. Such rad-
icals and party men as Bailey of Texas
and Stone of Missouri, were ready to
say that they would accept the house
bill with the Foraker amendment.

In this discussion of probable set-
tlement of the statehood question it
should be borne in mind that such a
solution is in the distant future and is
not to come at once. It may not come
at all in that form, but this is the form
of proposal that is now under consid-
eration. The mere fact that it takes
such concrete shape indicates a spirit
of tolerance and the probable arrival
at a solution of the present con-
troversy.

It has been decided on the house
side to call a caucus of republican
members for Thursday afternoon at 3
o'clock. The call was issued and met
with stubborn resistance from a num-
ber of the insurgents, who declare
they will not enter the caucus, but
will remain outside. Representative
Babcock is ill and has been confined
to his house for several days, and
there has been no concentrated action
of his forces so far.

All the old tactics are being used to
force the insurgents to submit. They
are plainly given to understand that
they will share in no future benefits
at the hands of the organization un-
less they come into the fold.

FROM FRYING PAN TO FIRE.
Change of Cabinet in France Com-
pletes Disaster to Church.

Rome, March 15.—The Vatican has
been following the French cabinet
crisis with the keenest interest, but
its solution is considered to com-
plete the disaster to the Catholic
church in France. A prominent pre-
late exclaimed:

"We have fallen from the frying
pan into the fire."

The Vatican authorities received a
dispatch giving the names of the
members of the new cabinet, with the
additional statement that its com-
position will not be officially announced
until a later date, because the 13th
day of the month is considered to be
unlucky. The pontiff smiled sadly
when this information was conveyed
to him, saying:

"Evidently being a free thinker does
not exclude superstition. Bad days
are preparing for the dear, dear
Catholics in France."

Princess Ena in London.
London, March 15.—Princess Ena
of Battenberg, the future queen of
Spain, arrived here and was met at
the railroad station by the Spanish
ambassador and other members of
the embassy. The princess proceed-
ed to Kensington palace.

Window Glass Up Again.
Pittsburg, March 13.—Announce-
ment was made that the American
Window Glass Company had again ad-
vanced the price of window glass 5
per cent.

2-Cent Fare in Virginia.
Richmond, Va., March 10.—The
Churchman bill fixing railway pas-
senger rates at 2 cents per mile for
500 and 1,000 mile tickets passed the
house. It has previously passed the
senate and now goes to the governor.

Initiative and Referendum.
Columbus, O., March 10.—The sen-
ate by a vote of 25 to 13 adopted a
resolution providing for the submis-
sion to the people of a constitutional
amendment permitting the people to
initiate and to vote on legislation.

BANKS OF CANADA GAIN;
PEOPLE'S SAVINGS BIG.

Record of Financial Institutions for
the Year 1905 Shows Remarkable
Prosperity All Over the Dominion.

Ottawa, Canada, March 1.—The year
which has just closed has been one of
the most satisfactory and progressive
with the financial institutions of Can-
ada, and the business of the chartered
banks reflects the unprecedented
prosperity enjoyed throughout the
country during the year 1905.

The increased demands made upon
the banks of the Dominion by the com-
mercial and agricultural expansion of
the year were provided for without
the monetary disturbances sometimes
noted in the United States. Whatever
opinions may be held as to the com-
position of the Canadian banking sys-
tem, it is claimed that its flexible
currency has many commendable
features, and without which the last
few months of the year must have pro-
duced a money stringency with prob-
ably disastrous results. It is felt that
a wider field of credit in the Dominion
is needed, and consequently the capital
of many existing banking institu-
tions has been increased and several
new banks are in progress of organiza-
tion.

The chartered banks of Canada to-
day enjoy the confidence of the gen-
eral public to a greater extent than
ever before. The total deposits of the
people in these institutions last year
were \$322,317,000, which shows an in-
crease of over \$5,000,000 for the year.
In actual money in bank probably no
other country in the world, compara-
tively speaking, can make a better
showing than Canada.

The total deposits of the Canadian
people in the Government savings
banks, in special savings institutions,
and in the chartered banks alone
amounted last year to the enormous
sum of \$609,454,000. This represents
an average credit balance of over
\$100 per head of the population of the
Dominion, and it is stated that the
only other country in the world that
approaches this record is Denmark,
where the average credit balance is
about \$96.50 per capita. The above
figures, however, do not comprehend
money deposited with private bank-
ers, loan companies, mortgage cor-
porations and trust companies, or
what is hoarded up in secret hiding
places.

The annual report of the Dominion
finance department, which has just
been issued to the public, shows a
surplus in the Dominion treasury for
the fiscal year of \$7,863,000, and refers
to the remarkable increase in the pub-
lic revenues during the year.

Rich Deposits of Naphtha.
The Journal Kauph calls the atten-
tion of those interested to the fact
that deposits of naphtha have been
discovered near Staniza, Russia, which
are as rich as those at Baku and Gros-
ny. Staniza is only thirty-nine miles
from the Black sea, whence the naph-
tha can be transported at a cost of
1-4 cent per thirty-six pounds, while

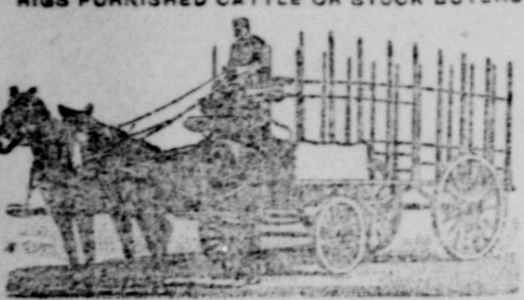

CITIZENS IN MASS-MEETING CALLED.

The committee selected to promote

establishing feeding pens on the rail-
road. If such as this is brought about
it would further insure a market for a
staple and never failing crop.

WORK OF "THOUGHT READER."

EGGS ALL CONTAIN A POISON

Action of Gastric Juices and Bile Pre-

principles in eggs. It seems that the
fact of the eggs of hens, ducks and
geese contain a poison which, if

stance.

These eggs are not poisonous as or-
dinarily used or even when eaten raw

eggs at a particular stage of digestion
