County OKs workcamp agreement

Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Tuesday gave approval to the first step in locating a 500-bed prison workcamp here.

The commissioners signed a private prison application agreement with Private Prisons of America Ltd., Inc. (PPAL), a Midland-based company head by Frank Powell, chief executive officer, and Sonny Emerson, director of operations.

Powell said his company will donate 100 acres of land to the county which in turn will deed the property to the state for the workcamp which will be run by PPAL.

"Residents" in the workcamp will be prisoners with not less than one year nor more than 2 years remaining before eligible for parole. The residents will manufacture Waffle-Crete structural precast concrete modules that will be used

to construct 1,025-bed private prisons in Hale and Howard counties and possibly

A meeting will be held in the Colorado High School auditorium on the night of April 26 to answer questions from the public. In the meantime, the company is soliciting comments from citizens. Comments may be mailed to PPAL, 731 West Wadley, Building M, Midland, Texas 79705.

Mitchell County.

PPAL estimates that the workcamp will create about 325 jobs for the area.

The agreement written by the county's attorneys and signed by the commissioners' court Tuesday states that Mitchell County will be the participating entity in

the making of an application to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, Pardons and Parole Division, in an answer to their request for proposals regarding the construction and operation of a 500-bed work facility to be constructed under their Community Justice Programs.

PPAL will be responsible for the creation of the application. Mitchell County will not bear any costs and will be obligated only for the support, approval and signing of the application.

The agreement "obligates Mitchell County only for the said application. In the event that Mitchell County and PPAL are the successful bidder, then an operating agreement and contract will be drafted to the mutual agreement of all parties concerned with sufficient time to resolve all legal questions involved."

Deadline for application is April 27.

PPAL has proposed to share in the revenue with the county at \$1 per day per prisoner for the first 250 prisoners. The annual revenue to the county would be about \$100,000 a year, Powell estimates.

The project received endorsements from both the Colorado City Industrial Team and the Mitchell County Board of Economic Development.

In other business, the commissioners gave its approval for Brenda Smith to pursue whatever avenues she can in obtaining services for Mitchell County citizens through a community action program.

Smith said that a variety of services can be provided to citizens using federal funds. Sweetwater's People for Progress, Inc. is one such community action or-

CHS sweeps district academic/literary meet

The Colorado High School academic literary contestants teamed up last Friday at Greenwood High School to win the District 7-AAA Literary Championship, sweeping 358 total points.

Runner-up Crane High School had a distant 320 points. Coahoma was third with 227 points followed by Kermit, 200 points, and Greenwood, 179 points.

Several outstanding performances by Colorado High School students have earned 18 different students the right to compete at the Regional Contest with 20 qualifications. This is the largest group to advance to regionals in the history of the school. UIL Coordinator Carl Moore was especially proud of the work of the CHS team.

"We were forced to ask our students to give up the final weekend of their spring break and return for the district contest," Moore said. "That's asking a lot, since they have earned as much of a break as the rest of the student body. New county agent named

Dana Davenport has been named Mitchell County Extension Agent - Home Economics effective April 16 according to an announcement made Tuesday by County Judge S.L. (Mac) Morris and Extension Director Carolyn Gilbert.

Davenport will be headquartered in the Extension offices in the Mitchell County Annex, adjacent to the courthouse in Colorado City. In her position, she will be responsible for all Extension home economics endeavors in the county.

"We feel fortunate to have hired an individual with Miss Davenport's strong background and varied job and professional experience," said Gilbert. "Mitchell County is recognized as a strong supporter of Extension programs. Miss Davenport brings

qualifications to the position that can only enhance the program in the county and district. She has also had an outstanding record in working with the 4-H school enrichment curriculum through the Kaufman school system."

The new agent is a presently County Extension Agent - Home Economics for Kaufman County, a position she has held since November 1987.

She holds a bachelor of science degree in home economics education from the University of North Texas.

In her Extension work, she has provided leadership in planning, implementing and evaluating programs in adult home economics and youth education. She is a member of the Texas Association of Extension 4-H Agents and the Texas Association

Landfill sides present videos

A group of Westbrook citizens Tuesday night heard what was called the other side of the story concerning the regional landfill and hazardous waste incinerator proposed for Mitchell County.

Darlene Hines, a member of the newly formed group Texans Against Pollution (TAP), showed a video at the Golden Age Club concerning what some communities in other parts of the country have encountered after hazardous waste incinerators were built in their areas.

National Waste & Energy Development, Inc., a Pennsylvania company, has proposed building the regional landfill in southwest Mitchell County, and the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court, after three public meetings were held to tell of the plans, signed a Community Host agreement with the company to assist with the permitting of the facility.

"A lot of people have heard only one side of the story," said Hines, explaining that the video her group showed reveals a different story than what has told at the public meetings.

Although not a scheduled part of the meeting, another video was shown by Jimmy Moody, one of the promoters of the regional landfill. The second video was produced by the Environmental Protection Agency and Vulcan, a company which manufactures incinerators. The video told how safe incineration of hazardous materials can be without polluting the air.

In addition, Kin Slaughter of New Braunfels told about his knowledge of incineration and hazardous waste and that it will

not harm the environment.

The video showed by TAP interviewed residents in communities where incinerators are blamed for polluting the air with cancer-causing chemicals. In addition, residents told how their economies have declined and unemployment risen because of the companies operating incinerators.

The TAP video said that although the steam from an incinerator smoke stack can be seen, harmful gases emitted cannot.

Moody, before showing the second video, said that "we've looked at the safety of incinerators. EPA regulations have changed a lot in the past few years. EPA is telling us the only way to get rid of hazardous materials is by incineration."

Uniform planting date set

The Mitchell County Pest Management Board has set Monday, May 21, as the uniform planting date for cotton growers in the county.

"We have had five mild winters in a row and even with the few cold snaps we had this past winter, researchers are reporting large numbers of weevils in overwintering sites," said Bryan Limmer, county extension agent.

Peak emergence of overwintered boll weevils is usually the last week of May through the first

two weeks of June. The weevils feed only on 1/3 grown cotton squares and without squares to feed on they will die about 18 days after emergence.

Cotton planted in mid-May will produce 1/3 grown squares after the first week of July. By that time most of the boll weevils will have died.

The Pest Management Board urges all producers to observe the uniform planting of May 21 in an effort to avoid a boll weevil outbreak.

organization that provides such services as day care, transportation, nutrition, housing assistance, emergency aid, and human services.

Smith said she is aware that

many of those services are already offered in Mitchell County through other agencies, but that some of the other programs could be implemented here to benefit citizens without any cost to the county.

Council awards bid, allocates motel funds

The Colorado City Council, meeting in special session Tuesday afternoon, allocated hotel/motel tax funds and awarded a bid for a water system improvement project.

The council accepted the recommendation of SK Engineering and awarded the bid for the water system improvements to Underground Utility Contractors for \$151,264. The project will be paid for with grant funds and includes new water lines in the south part of town. Vance Johnson of SK Engineering said that originally, all the bids received exceeded the budgeted amount, and that some items not necessary to the project had to be deleted. The project calls for 14 fire hydrants to be installed, also.

The council adopted an ordinance designating the disbursement of motel tax receipts for 1990-91. The funds, totaling

\$17,200, will go to Colorado City Bass Club, \$500; Mitchell County Bass Club, \$500; Church League Softball, \$250; B&PW/Jaycees AJRA Rodeo, \$750; Colorado City Playhouse, \$2,000; Chamber of Commerce, \$5,000; Ebony Club, \$500; United Girls Softball Assn., \$500; Mitchell Historical Commission, \$2,000; Colorado City Museums, \$2,500; and Colorado City Center, \$2,700.

The funds come from a seven percent motel tax levied by the city.

In other business, the council gave an approval to an increase in user fees after a study showed that the city currently charges less for water connections than what it costs the city. The new fees are \$200 for a 3/4-inch water tap; \$300 for a 1-inch water tap; and \$650 for a 2-inch water tap. The sewer tap will remain at \$150.

Police arrest 3 men

Three Colorado City men were arrested early Saturday morning following the execution of a narcotics search warrant at a residence at 740 East Fifth Street.

Police Chief Bobby Sparks said in addition to the arrests, \$650 in cash, an assortment of narcotics paraphernalia, an automatic rifle, two automatic pistols and a switchblade knife were seized.

Those arrested included a 21-year-old man who was charged with possession of a controlled

substance (cocaine); a 30-year-old man charged with possession of marijuana; and an 18-year-old man charged with possession of marijuana.

Cotton information day set

The annual Cotton Information Day will be held Monday, April 9, beginning at 9 a.m. at the Lion's Club Building in Loraine.

"This is the third year that Mitchell and Nolan counties have coordinated efforts to put on this extension education activity," said Mitchell County Extension Agent Bryan Limmer. "Assisting with the planning for the event will be the Mitchell County Pest Management Board, the Field Crops Committee and similar groups in Nolan County.

"We think we have an excellent line-up of speakers for the day and we have asked some of them to address the subject of proper pesticide use and proper disposal of chemical containers," said Limmer.

The program will begin with Dr. Billy Warrick, extension agronomist, San Angelo, who will discuss improved production practices. He will be followed by Dr. Tom Fuchs, extension entomologist from San Angelo, who will discuss the insect outlook and give a boll weevil prediction

for 1990. Fuchs will also talk about pesticide usage. Next on the schedule will be Dr. Robert Metzger, extension agronomist from College Station, who will address the Arsenic Acid issue.

The problems of storage and disposal of agriculture chemicals will be discussed by Charlie Rogers of the Texas Water Commission in Austin. Ending the day's program will be Stanley Bevers, extension economist for marketing in Vernon, who will talk about alternative methods in marketing cottonseed.

A catered barbecue lunch will

be served at noon. The meal will be sponsored by the following businesses:

 May 1, 1990 is the final date to certify all small grain. This includes small grain planted for harvest, grazing, or ACR cover. You may want to certify "0" for farms with small grain bases, but not planted. This could preserve your bases. Small grain left standing on ACR will require a spot check fee of \$10. Cattle, on wheat for grain, must be removed by March 15.

ACR and Paid CU
 All livestock must be removed from paid CU and ACR by May 1,

1990. Mitchell County non-grazing dates are May 1 through September 30, 1990.

Payment Limitations
 All payments limitation must be on file by April 16, 1990 to be eligible for program benefits.

Conservation Needs
 ACP applications will be taken on a continuous basis. If you have need of terraces, waterways, diversion, etc. come by the office and make an application. Funds are limited, but all applications will be considered. Next review period will be April 4, 1990.

ACR Provisions
 Minimum size and width is 5 acres and 1 chain wide. With some exceptions. Windstrips 160 inches wide with small grain, forage sorghum or perennial grass may also be used for ACR. If you have questions contact this office.

Deficiency - Disaster
 Some producers may be overpaid on 1989 deficiency. If so repayment will be due in July 1990. This overpayment resulted in Disaster and Deficiency being paid on the same pounds.

Measurement Service
 Measurement service is available for those unsure of crop acreages. Incorrect reports can cause problems. Fees are charged for this service.

Cross Compliance
 Limited Cross Compliance will be in effect for the 1990 crops of wheat, grain sorghum, and cotton. To be eligible for benefits no program crop (except oats) can exceed its base.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, handicap, national origin or marital status.



The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's (TAES) Texas Range Station will host a range field day in Barnhart, Texas on April 19 beginning at 9:30 a.m.

The Station is located 10 miles south of Barnhart on Highway 163. The field day sponsors are the TAES, Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX), the University Texas Lands-Surface Interests, and the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management.

The day will open with registration and coffee from 9:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. At the close of registration, the formal morning session will begin with a welcome by Dr. Carl Menzies, San Angelo based Director of Research with the TAES. The welcome will be followed by Dr. Robert Merrifield, Deputy Director of the TAES. Merrifield will offer comments on the station's role in research.

Steve Hartmann, Manager of University Lands with the University of Texas System is then scheduled to offer his comments concerning the direction the University Lands is taking.

Other morning speakers and their topics will include: Dr. Millard Calhoun, Research on Prevention of Bitterweed Losses in Sheep; Dr. Chris Lupton, Improving the Economics of Wool Harvesting and Dr. Allan McGinty, Mesquite Control Update. Calhoun and Lupton are TAES Researchers based at San Angelo and McGinty is the TAEX Range Specialist at Fort Stockton.

The morning's final speaker is Bob Capps of Mason. Capps, the area sales representative for DowElanco, will give the company's mesquite control recommendations for 1990.

A complimentary lunch will be served at noon followed by a brief period of free time so participants may view the station's facilities and livestock.

The afternoon session will begin with a look at supplemental feeding of livestock in intensive and conventional management systems offered by Dr. Ed Huston, San Angelo based TAES researcher. Then Dr. Darrell Ueckert, also a TAES researcher at San Angelo will give results of his studies using a fire/picloram system to reduce health problems in sheep caused by pricklypear.

The afternoon's third speaker is Brian Mihalbachler, a graduate research assistant in Texas A&M University's Range Science Department at College Station. Mihalbachler will present a view of the long-term vegetational changes occurring on the Texas Range Station.

The day's final speaker is Dr. Butch Taylor, Superintendent of the TAES Research Station at Sonora. Taylor will speak on responses of sheep and cattle to varying stocking rates.

The field day will finish about 3:15 p.m.

Although portions of this field day concern sheep production it will be a benefit to the cattle producers as well.

Committee to study teacher contracts

Colorado ISD trustees Monday night agreed to a request from the Classroom Teachers Association that a committee be appointed to study the proposed contract for teachers for 1990-91.

Leslie Perkins, president of the local CTA, said the school district is participating in the Effective Schools Project which encourages shared governance between teachers and administrators and that the teachers are merely asking for a committee of board members, administrators and teachers to go over the contract before teachers are asked to sign it.

Perkins said that the teachers have several concerns about the new contract, including:

- the two-week time period originally given teachers to sign their contracts with an April 2 deadline;
- the change in wording of the contract, and;
- the fact that the teachers were asked to sign contracts without mention of a salary.

Perkins said the local CTA members had contacted CTA attorneys in Austin who told them that teachers from many other school districts throughout the state are sharing the same concerns with their contracts. She said that after comparing the new contract to the present contract, there is not that much difference.

"Morale wise, they are very different," she said. "We're not questioning the legality of the contract, but the interpretation."

"Our main concern is to have a mutual understanding of the contract," she said.

Scouts attend workshop

Mitchell County Boy Scout Troop 100 had four boys participating in the Scout Conservation Workshop held last weekend in Midland's Sibley Center and National Guard Armory.

Only a select group of boy scouts from the Buffalo Trails Council were able to be enrolled in the program. The council area covers a wide territory stretching from Colorado City to Andrews and down to the Big Bend country. Troop 100 leaders were proud that their scouts were able to participate and that they successfully passed all requirements to qualify for the Soil and Water Conservation merit badge and the Environmental Science merit badge.

The workshop was a full and tiring weekend for the Scouts and their leaders who attended programs Friday night through Sunday afternoon. The intensity of the badge requirements had Scouts studying through the night in addition to the time invested in preparation before the weekend. Friday started off with films and lectures on soil and plant relationships, overviews of soil

erosion and plant uses. Saturday morning's session explained the hydrologic cycle, watersheds, soil formation, plant succession, carrying capacity and farmland conservation practices.

A series of demonstration stations on Saturday afternoon gave scouts a hands-on view of ecological principles. SCS officials headed up the various stations which included a plant identification study, a water infiltration experiment and topographic map study, instruction in measuring slope, collection and microscopic study of soil and water samples, a prairie ecosystem study and demonstrations in soil profiles and soil erosion prevention. A unique game of "baseball conservation" was used to review the Scouts on the weekend's material.

After a reverential Sunday morning church service, SCS officials spoke on responsibilities of the Soil Conservation Service.

An intense written examination determined whether Scouts passed the two merit badges. All four Mitchell County scouts passed with high marks. Boy Scout Troop 100 members passing both merit badges included: Cody Loving, Zane Graham, Cory Carlock and Jody Beavers.

Scout parents providing transportation and assisting with the workshop staff were Irene Graham and Debbie Carlock. Scouts returned late Sunday.


Dr. Jim Ramsey, superintendent, said that it is not unusual to give a 10-day or two-week time limit to sign contracts and that the reason for the earlier deadline this year is so that administrators can know as soon as possible about teacher vacancies. He said a later deadline hampers administrator's ability in recruiting new teachers.

"We never attempted to create any pressure or to frustrate anybody," he said.

Board president Dwayne Harris said that "I feel we can work this out and come to some agreement where we can work out a compromise."

In other business, the board opened bids for a new roof for the shop building at the middle school campus. The bid was awarded to low bidder Barr Roofing Co. of Abilene in the amount of \$9,250. The other bids ranged from \$10,000 to \$15,942.

Following an executive session to discuss personnel, the board voted to reassign middle school computer teacher Phyllis Ramsey to a teaching position in the ISS program for the 1990-91 school year. The board said a computer and software will be provided to enrich the ISS program.

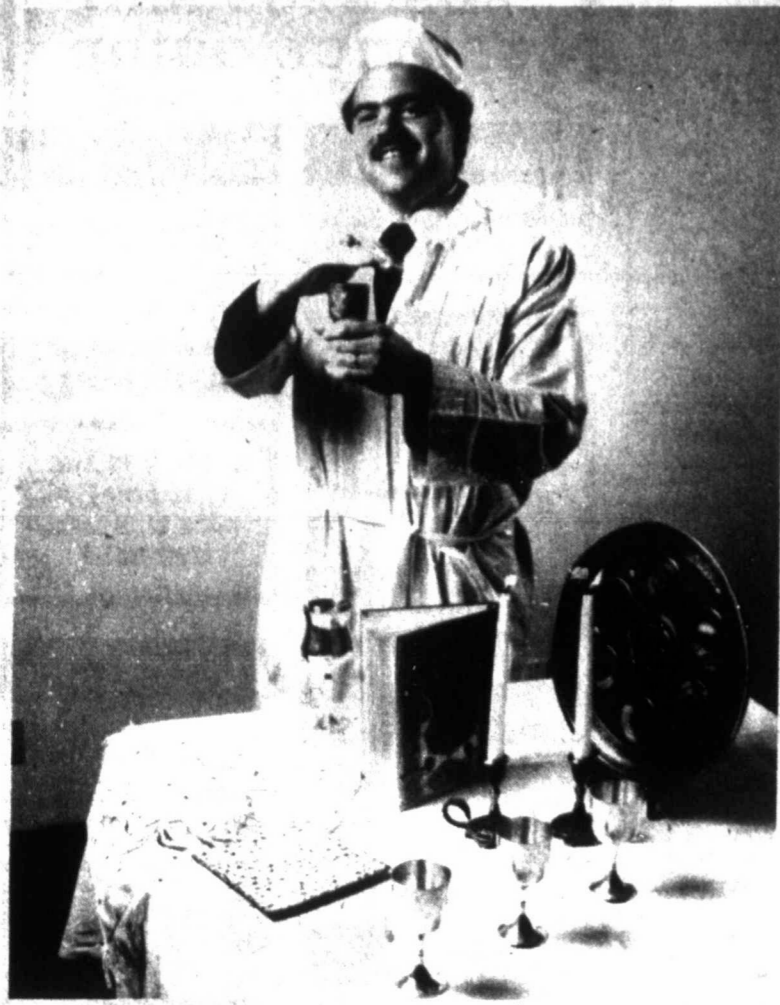

Interstate traffic rerouted

Colorado City residents were treated to a glimpse from the past this week when traffic on the west-bound Interstate 20 was detoured through the downtown area while repairs were made to the west-bound I-20 Colorado River bridge approaches.
