44 Escape from Texas Prison Two Dead from Poison Gas

(By International News Service)
HOUSTON, June 20.—Posses were believed to be making progress in the Brazoria county bottoms this afternoon in the search for forty-four convicts who overpowered three prison guards at the Clemons state prison and made a get-away today.

This prison break, the most sensational in recent Texas history, occurred when the convicts took shot-guns away from their guards and kidnapped two of them. A third guard is reported to have escaped.

A cattleman living in the Brazos

River valley, shot and wounded three of the convicts, who were recaptured, according to a report to the sheriff's office here this afternoon.

Every community within a radius of a hundred miles has organized posses to aid in the man-hunt.

Weaver was shot from ambush after he and his son and another officer had raided a negro liquor joint outside the city. The victim was shot down as he and his son stopped their car near the woods.

Stowaway Leaving France for Home

PARIS, June 20.—Having achieved his ambition and crossed the Atlantic by airplane as a stowaway in the plane Yellow Bird, Arthur Schreiber boarded a train for Cherbourg at 9:50 o'clock this morning to catch the liner Leviathan, which sails for New York today.

EL PASO, June 20.—Physicians who conducted the autopsy over the bodies of two Mexican children killed by gas last night, reported today that the deaths were caused by hydrogen sulphide. Local chemists, on the other hand, were inclined to disagree with the finding, pointing out that hydrogen sulphide in large amounts would be necessary to prove destructive in the open air.

EL PASO, June 20.—The nature

of the deadly gas which settled on the Mexican settlement near Ascarre, five miles east of here, bringing death to two and suffering to seventeen others, remained a mystery today.

The two killed were Mexican children. The recovery of the other victims seemed probable but the gloomy possibility of permanent impairment loomed for some. First reports were that the gas was hydrogen sulphide from the Pasotex Petroleum Company refinery. Company officials said.

DENVER PUBLISHER WILL AID MANY STUDENTS

(By International News Service)

DENVER, June 20.—Increasing the activities of the Frederick G. Bonfils Foundation, which he established "for the benefit of mankind," F. G. Bonfils, Denver publisher has announced the creation of 100 scholarships in institutions of higher learning in Colorado.

The scholarships will provide full four courses and cover cost of matriculation, tuition, books, library fees, material and student assessments.

The scholarships will be made available to the youth—boys and girls—of nine states: Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, New Mexico, Kansas, Texas, South Dakota, Montana and Utah—and will be awarded to those whose grade and high school records, character, mental equipment and aspirations guarantee the good use the recipients will make of the benefits to be derived from a four year college or university training.

Schools chosen for the scholarships are: University of Colorado, Colorado School of Mines, Colorado Agricultural college, Colorado Teachers college, Colorado college, Regis College (Denver), and Loretto Heights College (Denver).

Before making the announcement, Mr. Bonfils arranged for the cooperation of state superintendents of public instruction, high school principals and deans of colleges and universities.

Commenting upon the creation of the scholarships, Mr. Bonfils said to International News Service:

"For the benefit of ambitious youth of the middlewest who might otherwise be deprived of the opportunity, the Foundation is placing the lamp of education in the hands of many to guide their steps."

"The citizenship of tomorrow is the inheritance of the youth of today, and upon the character, education and ideals of these youth depends the progress of the nation."

"I feel that the Frederick G. Bonfils Foundation could make no more constructive contribution

to the future of America than by extending opportunities for education to boys and girls eager to receive it."

Mr. Bonfils recently also established a number of scholarships in the Denver College of Music and the Lamont School of Music, in this city.

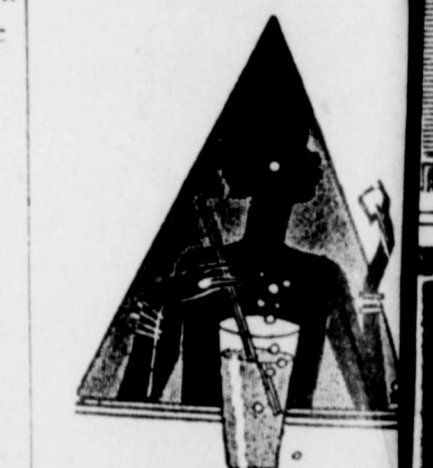

USE BIG ZEPPELIN FOR STUDYING FOG

(By International News Service)

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 20.—To be used in experiments to devise means of battling fogs, the biggest threat of the airmen, a giant dirigible will be stationed permanently at Round Hills, the summer home of Colonel William Green.

The zeppelin will come here as a result of the agreement between the Goodyear Tire Company of Akron, Ohio, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and will be used in conjunction with the short-wave radio experiments which technology students have been conducting at South Dartmouth for the past three years.

When the Round Hills airport is formally opened it is the intention of Col. Green to turn it over to the United States navy where planes will experiment fighting fog and try out the value of radio beacons. It is to aid in the experiments both with the radio beacon and the fog battling that the Goodyear company will send the 'blimp' here.

Already work on the construction of the hangars for the planes at the proposed Round Hills airport has begun.

The Goodyear interests are pioneers in the field of dirigible construction in the United States and are understood to be considering a proposition to start a trans-Atlantic zeppelin line from Germany. When the Graf Zeppelin flew to this country from Germany, Capt. Hugo Eckener, the pilot, was entertained at the Akron plant.

Spitball, Officially Banned, Still Used By Few Pitchers

By Davis J. Walsh (International News Staff Correspondent)

NEW YORK, June 20.—It may have been as much as seven or eight years ago that the spitball was to be banished to the outer darkness of baseball's forgotten, by an official decree that applied to all culprits except those who, at the time, were earning their livelihood through the use of this discountenanced delivery.

These holdovers were to be tolerated in the major leagues until such time as they bowed to age and the inevitable. It was a moment fraught with deep poignancy. These doddering, old relics soon would go and then spitball pitching, the agency through which Ed Walsh was given to posterity, would be no more.

It wasn't difficult reasoning but it all ran in the colors of Mr. Sweeney, the coal dealer, and a lot of anguish was allowed to parade itself into the light of day to no purpose. Spitball pitching didn't die immediately.

It hasn't died yet and, judging by the evidence presented by Burleigh Grimes, Clarence Mitchell, Urban Faber, Bill Doak and Jack Quinn, it won't for some time to come. Apparently one of the most tangible results accomplished by this legislation was to assure major league jobs indefinitely to the gentlemen in question.

Bill Terry, the Giant first baseman, hit the situation full upon its countenance the other day in these few, well chosen words:

"Everybody seems surprised that fellows like Quinn, Mitchell and Faber are able to hang on so long. They would be more surprised to know that the average ball player expected to see some of them stiek around for eight or ten years more. They have it on the major league hitters of today because their stuff is faced so seldom; how about the major leaguers of tomorrow?"

"There is practically no spitball pitching in the minors because men who might use the delivery know that they can't bring it into the majors; therefore, the young players coming up almost never see a spitter until they get to the big time. Five years from now, the big time will be cluttered up with

faced a spitballer. That kind of these young fellows who never thing ought to keep pitchers of that type around indefinitely."

It may be unfair to associate Grimes' career with legislation that proved unexpectedly beneficial. He was a pitching leader before the rule was enacted, whereas there had been moments when Quinn and Mitchell seemed to be absolutely all over and done with.

Quinn, for example, asked to be given his unconditional release in Boston three or four years ago, saying that he felt he was through and wished to bow himself out gracefully and with some benefit to himself. When he got with a good team, the Athletics, he discovered he could win conclusively, if not as often as before, and for the last three years, he has been one of the club's big winners. Quinn, a pitcher since 1903, admits to 44 years and was off the big time for six years between 1913 and 1919. He undoubtedly has benefited by a rule that makes spitball pitching pretty much of a novelty.

So, too, has Mitchell. The Dodgers thought he was through six years ago; the Phillies were sure of it last year. But he finished the season with the champion Cardinals, who found that his left-handed spitball added spice to mere novelty to give them a pitcher who is highly effective against certain clubs, notably the Giants. Mitchell is 38 and has been in baseball since 1909.

It must have something to do with keeping Urban Faber with the White Sox, too. Urban, 41, and identified with professional baseball for twenty years, can still go out there and pitch a ball game, if you space him properly.

Why? Because Quinn and himself are the only spitballers in the league and hitters don't see enough of them to get acquainted. Doak is barely hanging on, which must mean that he would have been regarded as just plain hopeless, ten years ago.

Grimes is younger than the others and his record benefits accordingly. Right now, he is at the top of his league and, even if the spitballer was rampant through baseball, he probably would be well up with the best. Still there isn't any doubt that the fact that he is an exponent of a delivery that is virtually unknown now has helped him plenty during recent years.

INSTALLATION OF METERS SHOWS BUILDING INCREASE

Guard Company Here Has a New Collar Insignia

Men of the National Guard company here will soon have their uniforms decorated with a new insignia, one recently approved by the War Department at Washington and which reflects the past of the outfit.

Heretofore there has been no insignia for the 142nd Infantry and the local company has paraded for years with nothing but the crossed rifles of that branch of the service. Soon they will be provided with new insignia which will be worn on both sides of the collar of the uniforms.

The insignia will commemorate the regiment's participation in the World War, with particular reference to the engagements on the Aisne River and within sight of the shell-torn Church of St. Etienne.

The shield is of silver with a background of blue representing the infantry arm. The band across the center of the insignia is of red representing the bloody Aisne River, where so much fighting occurred and also represents Red River between Oklahoma and Texas where the original 36th Division was organized. The wavy shape of the red denotes the contours of the two hills between which the 142nd Infantry could see in the distance the church of St. Etienne.

The church with its shattered steeple shown in the center of the shield stands for the objective of the regiment. The torn aspect of the spire shows where the Bogue was driven away by the shelling of the American artillery.

The motto at the bottom of the shield is "I'll Face You," and it comes from an interesting incident that took place while the regiment was preparing for an attack. The story is that Col. Bloer had sent out small patrols all day in an effort to gain contact with the enemy, but none of them had returned.

Finally he sent out a whole platoon, with orders to cross the Aisne, gain contact with the enemy, and return as soon as possible. The lieutenant sent out accomplished his mission, and having caused the Germans to disclose their position by their fire, ordered the return of his platoon.

As there was only one pontoon bridge at this point on the river, the officer caused one part of his platoon to cover the retreat of the other part and to take up fire as soon as they gained the opposite bank. He was the last man to cross the bridge and drew all the fire of the Germans. He picked up a discarded rifle and backed slowly across the bridge, firing all the while. When he had gained the shore, he faced the Germans and said, "I'll retreat—but I'll face you."

Harvard Gives 15 Grants for Varied Studies

(By International News Service)
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 20.—Fifteen grants have been made to Harvard University professors from the appropriations of the general education board for studies in the humanities, the grants totaling \$25,900, according to an announcement made at University Hall.

The studies for which the appropriations were made, are as varied in purpose as in number. They are to be conducted in half a dozen languages and in the literature of more than half a dozen names.

Of the various grants George L. Kittredge, professor of English literature, received three. One was for photostatic copies of MSS., and of unobtainable books relating to witchcraft and to Shakespeare, another for the collection of sailors' songs by J. M. Carpenter, instructor in English, and the third to cover expenses in preparing and printing a volume of Harvard studies in comparative literature. Other grants follow.

Louis Allard, professor of French, to assist him in publishing a second volume on the "Comedie de Mous en France au dix-neuvieme siecle."

Robert P. Blake, associate professor of history, and director of the university library, for a translation of the American version of the Alexander romance.

Walter E. Clark, Wales professor of Sanskrit, to assist him in preparing an annotated translation of the Divyavadana, an old and important collection of Buddhist stories.

Division of modern languages, an addition grant for the current year for the publication of a volume of the Harvard Studies and Notes in Philology and Literature.

Jeremiah D. M. Ford, Smith professor of French and Spanish languages, an additional grant, for printing in connection with the publication of Portuguese letters in Widener Library.

Charles B. Gulick, Eliot professor of Greek literature, for work by Professor O. J. Todd, of the University of British Columbia, and Dr. Ernest Cary of Harvard University on a systematic index of Aristophanes and the Greek comic poets.

Harold Murdock, director of the Harvard University Press, for the University Press to be used toward defraying the cost of publishing Professor Rollins' edition
