Fingerprints of Eastland School Children Secured

W. J. Peters, chief of police at Eastland, reported Monday that fingerprints of 802 school children have been recorded and will probably be placed in the files of the Bureau of Identification and Records, Department of Public Safety, at Austin.

The number of fingerprints represents the majority of the school children of Eastland.

Peters stated that the fingerprints were recorded in view of the opinions of authorities that such records many times prove invaluable.

He stated that the department would fingerprint anyone who wants the records in civilian files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Department of Public Safety.

Many authorities state that recording of fingerprints by civilians many times helps invaluable in identifying persons suffering from amnesia and those injured in accidents.

Eastland County Auto Registration Hits 7,000 Point

C. H. O'Brien, assessor-collector, reported Saturday that approximately 7,000 Eastland county vehicles have been registered for 1938.

He stated that in March a total of \$62,244.36 was received by the office from purchase of licenses. Exact figures on collections and license instance are being compiled.

This was the greatest single tragedy in the spring floods which, though dispossessing 20,000 in Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi and ruining crops in the region, took surprisingly small toll of life.

ABILENE AID AT SAFE MEET IS PROMISED

Cooperation in attendance from Abilene was promised Monday night in Abilene at the Booster's club after H. J. Tanner, director, general of the Oil Belt Safety conference to be held Friday, May 6, in Eastland, extended an invitation.

Tanner, who is also secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, was accompanied by L. H. Taylor of Ranger, program chairman for the conference.

"Seven thousand of the babies born in 1938 will be killed in automobile accidents before they are five years old," Taylor told the Boosters in a plea for safety on the highways.

"There's something wrong in all these accidents, but it's mostly between two ears," he declared. "At the present rate," he added, "40,000 persons will be killed in 1938."

As safety expert for the Lone Star Gas Company, Taylor analyzed the problem as one of 40,000,000 drivers, 80,000,000 pedestrians, 27,000,000 automobiles and 3,000,000 miles of highways.

"Add them up," he directed.

Rare Metal Found In Uvalde County

UVALDE—Deposits of molybdenum, a rare metal used in the making of steel alloys, have been discovered in a cobalt mine north of here.

Ryerson Crane, owner of the mine, which is near Con-Can, believes it is the only deposit of the metal ever found in Texas. He said it was located about 50 feet below the surface.

Crane is seeking to determine whether the vein or ore containing the molybdenum could be mined on a commercial basis.

Kokomo Youths to Give Play Friday

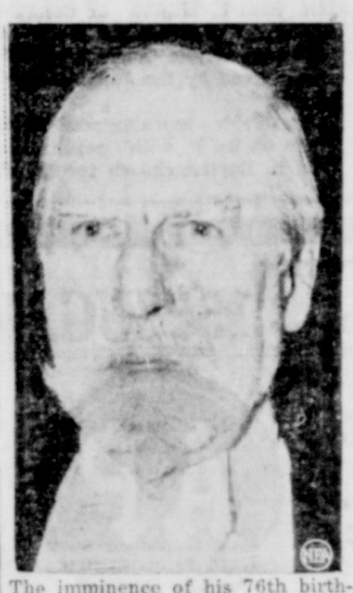
A play to which the public has been invited to attend without charge will be given Friday night, April 15, at Kokomo, Rev. L. R. Higginbotham announced Wednesday.

Original Fire Bell Of Ranger Is Found

What is believed by some to be the first fire bell ever used in Ranger has been discovered by Sam Gamble and was presented to Hal H. Hunter, fire and police commissioner of Ranger. Hunter has presented the bell to the Ranger Fire Department, where it is now located.

Some who lived in Ranger prior to the boom state that there was no fire bell in Ranger, while others believe that there was. The bell is believed to have been located at the old Bryant Hotel, across the highway from the Texas & Pacific Railway Station. Some recall that such a bell was used there to call traveling salesmen to meals.

The bell, which is not very much larger than the bells on the three Ranger fire trucks, carries the notation "No. 3 Yorks—1885" on one side and the name "The C. S. Bell Co.—Hillsboro, O." on the other.

No attempt was made to ring the bell when it was delivered to the fire station by Hunter, as the bell has a long crack down one side.

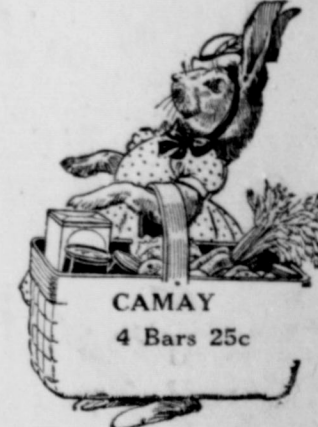

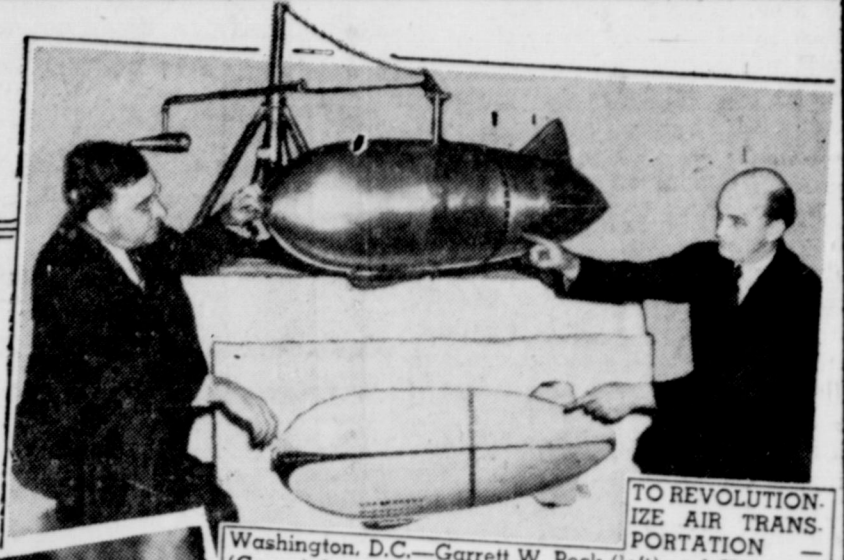

General Electric Has Door Slammer to Test Refrigerator

The door of the household refrigerator is opened and closed more than any other door of the house, according to Harper Music Company, local General Electric dealer.

"A door-slammng machine slams the door of each test model 500,000 times, the equivalent of 30 years' use, before the cabinet design is accepted by General Electric for production," Harper said.

Other interesting refrigerator facts revealed by Mr. Harper are as follows:

A jiggling machine shakes and jostles the test cabinet day in and day out to prove it sturdy. Finally the abused machine goes to the hot room where it is tested for cold capacity.

It takes 24 hours to manufacture a G-E refrigerator, and three-fourths of this time, too, is spent in inspection and testing. Parts are fitted to the accuracy of three ten-thousandths of an inch, or one-seventh the thickness of a human hair. The unit is operated under water. Women, as well as men, inspect each cabinet on the assembly line.

Years of research and experiment are required to perfect each improvement before it is incorporated in a new model. General electric started experimenting in 1912 with various types of refrigeration units, but it was not until 1927 that this company introduced the first completely sealed refrigerating unit.

Thousands of 1927 model Monitor Top refrigerators are still giving satisfactory service, but today a housewife can buy a much improved version of the General Electric sealed unit refrigerator at half the cost; one that will operate on less than half the current used by its 1927 predecessor.
