Legislature Deadlocked On Sulphur Tax, Prisons

Mrs. Long Takes Stand To Deny Murdering Husband

Widow Of Victim Counteracts All State's Evidence

Alleged Fourteen-Year-Old Paramour Of Defendant Described As "Just As A Child" By Witness

Accuse Mrs. Smith

Blame Of Slaying Placed On Mother Of Youthful "Lover" Of Defendant By Three Defense Witnesses

(By Associated Press)

COURTHOUSE, KINGSVILLE, Feb. 17.—Jim Long's 31-year-old widow, on trial for his murder today, denied point by point the state's evidence against her, rocked backward and forward as she swore she loved her husband and wept while she declared she looked on her 14-year-old alleged paramour as "just a child."

Three of the four witnesses who testified for her, including Julius Long, brother of her husband, had declared this boy, Pat Smith, had told them he believed his own mother, Mrs. Gilbert Smith, had killed Long. The other witnesses were the widow's sister, Mrs. Annie May Long of Houston, her sister-in-law, Mrs. Margaret Hodges of Austin, brother, R. S. Hodges, and another sister, Mrs. Ida Mae Oliver of Houston.

Cared For Invalid.

The accused widow told of having cared for her husband's invalid mother for three years prior to their marriage.

"You married Jim, of course, because you loved him?" she was asked.

"Why, certainly," she replied as she started testifying, speaking rapidly and with many gestures.

"I had known Pat Smith," she said, "about a year before Jim's death. He was a frequent visitor at our house. The boy, she added, often would drink beer and all the neighbors and people from out of town would drink it all up. She testified, 'I didn't want him to drink beer. I didn't like it and didn't like to clean up after they drank it.' She allowed this though, she declared, because she loved 'Jim.'"

Mrs. Smith (Mrs. Gilbert Smith) didn't like her husband to drink at all," she said. Smith, like the son, came to her house often for that purpose, however, the witness continued.

Committee Fails To Call Probe Of Pro Enforcement

Senator Norris, Chairman Of Judiciary Group, Asks Thorough Scrutiny; To Take No Action For Week

No Vote Is Taken

Robinson Claims Proposed Investigation Would Paralyze Enforcement For Period Of Two Years

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The senate judiciary committee debated but failed to decide today whether it wants an examination made of prohibition enforcement, after its chairman, Norris of Nebraska, had advocated a thorough scrutiny.

Senator Robinson of Indiana opposed the proposal by Norris on the ground it would "paralyze" all prohibition enforcement for two years. Both men are republicans.

No Vote Taken

No vote was taken, the committee deciding to let the subject rest for a week. Meanwhile, the points of some committee members who are undecided are expected to crystallize and more argument will take place on Monday.

While the democratic drys appeared to be divided after the session, the western republican independents, of whom Senator Norris and Borah of Idaho are leaders, appeared to be in line for it.

Borah Makes Charge

Senator Borah, also a dry, has charged open saloons are running throughout the country and he is a member of the committee. He is expected to support the proposal, having expressed the opinion that prohibition would never be enforced "with the present personnel from top to bottom."

Senator Brookhart of Iowa, another republican dry, was the word that the attempt to enact the Norris resolution would be taken to the floor, in event the judiciary committee failed to approve the proposals.

Immigration Bill Okehed By Group

Favorable Report Given To Senate On Proposal To Limit Immigrants From Western Hemisphere

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The Harris proposal to subject immigration from all western hemisphere countries except Canada and Newfoundland to quota restriction under the national origins clause of the immigration act, was reported favorably to the senate today by its immigration committee.

Similar action was taken last session but the bill was never considered. Senator Harris, democrat, Georgia, estimated Mexican immigration would be restricted to 1,500 yearly. Last year the total Mexican immigration was about 40,000.

The house immigration committee now is considering bills by its chairman, Representative Johnson, republican, Washington, and by Representative Borah, democrat, Texas, its ranking democratic member, which would accomplish virtually the same amendment of the 1924 immigration act. These measures were reported by the committee with controversial testimony in the last congress.

KILLED IN BLAST

Coal Mine Shot Firer Is Trapped Under Ground

PITTSBURG, Kan., Feb. 17. (AP)—Louis Garvin, 43, shot-firer at the Central Coal mine No. 51, was killed in an explosion at the mine near Rango early tonight. The body was recovered at 10:30 o'clock by a rescue party from the mine near Rango station, four and one-half hours after the blast.

Alex McAllister of Rango and John Brooks of Girard, also shot-firers, escaped but Garvin was trapped on the sixteenth level and apparently asphyxiated. McAllister was prevented from rescuing Garvin when forced to the top by gas fumes and smoke.

Couple Reported From Lubbock In Clovis Car Crash

Identity Of Victims Established As Mr. And Mrs. T. H. Grayson; Both In Serious Condition

CLOVIS, N. M.—Believed to be Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Grayson, of Lubbock, a man and woman are in the Baptist hospital here in a semi-conscious condition as a result of injuries received when the car in which they were riding was wrecked on a highway near here tonight.

Details of the accident were unavailable here tonight and owing to the condition of the couple, surgeons have been unable to determine the extent of injuries. Although hospital attendants stated that the victims were in a serious condition. Neither regained consciousness after being brought here. Slight information as to their identity was found among personal effects.

The names of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Grayson do not appear in the Lubbock city directory or in the local telephone directory. Efforts last night to determine if they live here failed.

New Home Youth Injured When Shot Accidentally

Slight Hope Is Held For Recovery Of J. W. Blocker

J. W. BLOCKER, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Blocker of the New Home community, was critically injured Monday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock when a 22 rifle was accidentally discharged, the bullet lodging in his neck.

The lad was brought to the Lubbock sanitarium early last evening for emergency treatment. Examination revealed that the bullet had entered the throat, piercing the trachea and esophagus and probably lodging at the base of the tongue. Physicians stated that, when brought in by relatives, the boy was suffering through lack of sufficient air reaching his lungs caused by the wound.

At time of the accident the lad was riding a plow with a neighbor companion, Bert Applegate, and had placed the rifle on the beam of the vehicle. The hammer was accidentally bumped against the beam and the discharge followed. Blocker's brother stated that he had gone into the field hunting.

Condition of the youth last night was considered very serious though some hope was held for his recovery.

Governor Hurt



NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 17. (AP)—Gov. John Trumbull, of Connecticut, was injured today when a glider he was attempting to fly at the Newark airport, crashed to the ground after gaining altitude of only a few feet.

Governor Trumbull's injuries were not believed to be serious. He was bruised about the face and badly shaken. He also complained of pain in his leg.

First Deficiency Bill Comes Today

Forty-Eight Million Fund Will Be Considered By House; Veterans' Bureau To Get Large Sum

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The first deficiency appropriation bill in the Hoover administration, carrying \$48,151,854, of which the veterans' bureau would receive \$15,250,000, will be taken up for consideration tomorrow by the house.

The measure reported today by the appropriations committee, carries \$100,000 for reconstruction of the executive offices of the White House, destroyed by fire Christmas Eve, and \$2,000 for repairs to the capitol, damaged the following week by fire. It would also provide \$32,000 for arbitrating the claims of Canada in the I'm Alone case.

To Pay Dependents

Payment of \$10,000 each to the dependents of the late William W. O'Brien, Pennsylvania; William K. Kaynor, Massachusetts; O. J. Kvale, Minnesota; Elmer O. Leatherwood, Utah, and Leslie J. Steele, of Georgia, representatives who died in office, also would be allowed in the bill.

The treasury department was allotted \$2,777,711, of which \$1,342,000 would go to the coast guard.

The war department was allowed \$2,738,116, of which \$1,894,049 would go to the navy.

ASSURANCES GIVEN

Arrest Of American Author Branded As Mistake

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 17. (AP)—Carlson Deas, American author and newspaperman, who was arrested and held incommunicado by military authorities for several hours last Friday, today received assurances from President Ortiz Rubio that the arrest was "a mistake and without the sanction of the president."

The president said he deeply regretted the incident and guaranteed Deas complete immunity from a recurrence of such tactics.

Expect To Locate Body Of Eielson By Earl Borland

Remains Of Noted Airman's Companion Found By Crew Of Searchers Near Ill-Fated Plane Wreckage

(By The Associated Press)

MOTORSHIP NANUK, NORTH CAPE, Siberia, Feb. 17.—Momentarily expecting word from the searchers the body of Carl Ben Eielson, noted Arctic pilot, had been found, officers and crew of this ice bound fur trading vessel were preparing today to receive the body of Earl Borland, Eielson's companion on their ill-fated flight November 8.

The finding of Borland's body was the first actual proof of the generally accepted belief that the two men died in the wreck which occurred while they were attempting to fly to the Nanuk from Teller, Alaska.

Bad weather kept Pilot Harold Gillingham from bringing the news to the anxious waiters here, only 50 miles from the scene of the wreck, where nineteen men remained under severe conditions to find the other aviator's body.

With fair flying weather it is believed word of the finding of the second body would reach the Nanuk sooner than the discovery of Borland.

BRIDGE BILL PASSED

Private Toll Spans Okehed By Solons Monday

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17. (AP)—The Denison bill to authorize construction of private toll bridges at Astoria, Oregon; Savannah, Ill.; South Omaha, and Omaha, Neb.; and Fort Hancock, Tex., was passed today by the house, 261 to 28.

The measure, which now goes to the senate, also would extend by three years the time limit for completion of bridges across the Monongahela river at Fayette City, Pa.; across the Rio Grande, at Weslaco, Texas; across the Missouri at Rulo, Neb.; across the Missouri at Brownsville, Neb.; across the Missouri at Washington, Mo.; across the Missouri at Decatur, Neb., and across the Maumee, near Toledo, O.

House Refuses To Concur With Cut Of Proposed Tax

Special Session Expires Today By Constitutional Limitations; Questions Remain Uncertainities

Agreement Sought

Committee Changed In Last Minute Effort To Reach Settlement Of Proposals Between Two Houses

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 17.—The penitentiary centralization legislation conference committee remained deadlocked tonight, in spite of the senate's action in dismantling its old conferees and substituting new timber.

A record vote on four separate propositions failed to bridge either faction, one side standing firm against abandonment of existing properties and the other persisting in an Austin-site centralization plan.

Proposal Defeated

A move to centralize the farming operations near Huntsville and build an industrial unit near Austin was lost when the senate committee voted three to two for the proposal and the house group four to one against it.

Another motion to centralize all activity on any of the farms below Houston was defeated when the senate committee unanimously voted against it and the house committee stood four to one against it.

A third motion to centralize on the Wynan farm deadlocked with the senate group defeating it three to two and the house committee supporting it three to two.

Motion Lost

A fourth motion to substitute the house bill for the senate measure lost by a similar vote.

Although another meeting of the committee is scheduled for tomorrow little hope was held tonight that a working agreement could be reached which would prove acceptable to both houses.

No vote was taken on a motion which would have given the board of control \$750,000 for the improvement.

Naval Parley In A Sea Of Figures

Defeat Of Premier Tardieu Government In France Is Cause Of Delay In Naval Negotiations At London

LONDON, Feb. 17. (AP)—The defeat of the Tardieu government and the premier's resignation in Paris tonight left the London naval conference becalmed in a sea of figures.

Among the delegates in London there was no hope that negotiations could profitably get under way again until France had a new government, strengthened by new blood and firmly seated in power.

Delay Caused

In circles close to the French delegation it was stated that the cabinet crisis in Paris probably would have little or no direct effect on the naval negotiations beyond delaying them for some days.

The French were believed that the reshuffling of the cabinet would find Premier Tardieu at the head of the government, with Briand still in power.

Dozen Lives Lost In East Blizzard

Thermometers Drop To 41 Below Zero In Atlantic States In Severe Cold Wave Of This Winter

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—After thermometers had dipped to as low as 41 degrees below zero, the severest cold spell of the winter in the north Atlantic states reached its climax today, and temperatures generally began to ascend in fulfillment of the weather man's promise of relief. Eastern Maine was an exception.

A dozen or more deaths were attributed directly or indirectly to the cold. A rescue was found frozen to death today in his hut in the wooded section of South Foxboro, Mass.; another man was found frozen to death in his unheated apartment in Providence, R. I., and ten other deaths in New England over the week end were ascribed to the weather.

New low records were registered in many localities. In New York City, which was among the least affected spots in the cold area, the seven degree minimum this morning was only one degree above the record low for the date.

The lowest thermometer to be reported was at Tupper Lake, N. Y., in the Adirondacks where the reading was 41 below. At Saranac Lake the thermometer descended steadily for 36 hours until it touched 35 below.

School Contract Letting Delayed

Award On Proposed \$650,000 Lubbock High Building Postponed From March 4th To 11th

Date for letting of contract on the proposed new \$650,000 Lubbock high school has been changed from March 4 to March 11, according to an announcement yesterday afternoon by A. C. Jackson, secretary of the board of the Lubbock Independent school district.

It was stated that due to some delay in getting plans and specifications into hands of contractors that additional time would be required. At this time, however, contractors have been submitted the plans with instructions that bids are to be received on March 11.

Plans at this time call for completion of the building about January 1, 1931. The new structure will provide additional space for accommodation of 1,300 students.

New Mexico Auto Theft Ring Broken

Seventeen Automobiles Are Recovered At Clovis By Officers; Four Men Are Placed Under Arrest

(By Associated Press)

CLOVIS, N. M., Feb. 17.—With 17 stolen automobiles recovered, one man in jail at Clovis and three others in jail at Abilene and Coleman, Tex., Sheriff R. M. Witherspoon, of Curry county, said today officers believe they have broken up the most extensive automobile theft ring ever organized in the southwest.

Coleman Armstrong, 27, a Curry county farmer charged with being a runner for the theft ring, is the man in jail here.

After Witherspoon and Deputy Jack Lemmon traced four Texas cars to Armstrong's home, they asked for federal help and the two officers and three federal agents went to Abilene, Coleman and Brownwood, Texas, where they increased the total of recovered cars to 17 inside of two weeks.

City Commission Adopts Charter Amendments For April 1st Election Here

SEVEN charter amendments, to be proposed at the coming election, to be held in this city April 1, were adopted by the Lubbock city commission in meeting Monday afternoon.

The election will be held in the office of the city recorder in the city hall and W. E. Baller, C. A. Burrows and H. G. Love have been appointed as judges.

The amendments, in part, as will be presented the voters, follow: "Amendment No. 1.—The style of all ordinances of the City of Lubbock shall be: Be it ordained by the city commission of the City of Lubbock; but the same may be omitted when published in book or pamphlet form under authority or by direction of the governing authority of the City of Lubbock.

Would Require Notice.

"Amendment No. 2.—The City shall not be liable on account of any claim for specific performance, breach of contract or damages to the person or to any property, or for any character of tort, unless the person asserting such claim shall give the city written notice of such

claim and of the facts upon which it is based 30 days from the time it is claimed such cause of action arose, and no such suit shall be instituted or maintained on any such claim until the expiration of 90 days from the time such notice shall have been given.

"Amendment No. 3.—The City of Lubbock shall have all other remedies for the levy and collection of city taxes as are given by the constitution and statute of Texas to state and county for the levy and collection of state and county taxes.

To Limit Warrants.

"Amendment No. 4.—No warrant, voucher or check for the payment of any claim shall be issued by the City, unless such claim shall be evidenced by an itemized account, filed with the City Secretary, approved by the City Manager, and sworn to by the City Auditor.

"Third Asiatic Invasion" Explains Anti-Filipino Outbreaks in West; Violence, Bombings, Death Result

Editor's Note.—The following exclusive story, written by Max Stern, veteran California newspaperman, for Lubbock Morning Avalanche and NEA Service, presents the background of the recent anti-Filipino riots on the Pacific coast. Stern delves back into Pacific coast history to explain the causes of the outbreaks that have been marked by mob violence, bombing and even death.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12. (AP)—The third Asiatic invasion of the Pacific coast, bringing a flood of little brown men to these shores to take jobs as workers in many lines, explains the recent anti-Filipino race riots that have been marked by mob violence, bombing and even death.

The outbreaks have been followed by Filipino protests both in Manila and Washington, and are almost certain to be echoed in Congress when the Welch bill to exclude Filipinos like other Asiatics comes up. At present, Filipinos born in the United States are permitted to enter the United States without restriction.

The Filipino riots have broken in increasing intensity since the first outbreak in Yakima, Wash., recently. California disturbances have occurred in a half-dozen cities. The most serious in Watsonville by the mob inflamed by reports that a Filipino club employed white girl entertainers.

Japan and Chinese Invasions Were Earlier
Three times have Asiatic laborers peacefully penetrated America through Pacific ports and three times Asiatic blood has flowed.

The first wave of Oriental cheap labor threatened to inundate California in the early days of her statehood. In the latter 70's thousands of Chinese imported to work the gold fields and railroads drifted into the cities to take the white workers' jobs. Dennis Kearney

"sandlot orator," inflamed the mob with his cry: "The Chinese must go." And hundreds of Chinese were killed and injured. In 1882 Congress passed the Chinese exclusion law.

The next "invasion" were Japanese farm workers. So numerous they became that whole villages in California valleys were peopled by them. As they prospered and bought land these villages became subject to periodic raids by native white laborers. There followed the 1924 Japanese exclusion law, the result of agitation by Ex-U. S. Senator James D. Phelan, and organized labor.

The third invasion from across the Pacific is that of Uncle Sam's own Malay wards, a mass of young males, avid to work cheaply, learn American ways and dress in the latest fashion. The outward irritant in their presence is social. Less than four per cent of the arrivals are females, yet under California law, Filipinos may not marry white American girls.

But the basic cause of the rioting is economic.

Since they are Uncle Sam's wards and are not classed as Japanese and Chinese as aliens, nothing hinders their coming in any number. Since 1920 they have been arriving in increasing numbers, so that today their number is conservatively estimated at 30,000 in California, 50,000 in continental United States and 60,000 more in Hawaii.

How fast they come may be seen by census figures revealing that the Filipino population in the United States has increased ten-fold since 1920.

The young workers were first recruited from the islands and mountains of the Hawaiian plantations. In their homeland, the wage for plantation workers is 75 cents a day. In Hawaii it is \$1.50. In California it is from \$2.50 to \$5. Thus the "pull" is economic.

Only a few come by way of the U. S. army, and these are the fortunate ones who may become American citizens on honorable discharge.

Once here they go first to the valleys. There they are welcome, for a shortage of Mexican rural workers is noticable. They pick cotton, harvest lettuce, work in melons and winter vegetables.

Leave Farms to Compete With Whites
Being both frugal and celibate it is, however, only a short time before

a group has bought an automobile, formed a club and become "100 per cent American." The lettuce fields call them no longer and they come to town. The jobs they take in town are different, for there they compete with white Americans thousands of whom already are jobless. They become cooks, waiters, house servants, steamship cabin boys, elevator operators.

Strong as the reaction against violence of law abiding citizens has been, feeling runs equally strong in California against increasing numbers of unassimilable immigrants from Asia.

A few employing groups want the bars down to both Mexico and Asia but the opposite feeling is so nearly universal that the last California legislature adopted a resolution calling for a halt to the influx of little brown men.

The resolution urged Congress to enact legislation to restrict immigration from the Philippine Islands and to prevent all Filipinos from entering the United States who are afflicted with communicable diseases.

Only six legislators voted against it.

Two Remedies Are Offered in California
California sentiment divides itself into two camps as to method of restriction.

The moderates would place all Asiatic countries, including the islands, under quota, arguing that the quota would be too small to affect American stock while the method would save the self-respect of China, Japan and the Philippines. The absolute extremists are behind the Welch bill, now before Congress, that would bring Filipinos under the 1924 exclusion act. Behind this measure is the California Federation of Labor, the American Legion and the "Native Sons of the Golden West."

"Talkies" Celebrate 17th Birthday Monday; Movie Industry Is Changed

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Feb. 12. (AP)—The howling infant called talkies, contrary to popular belief, really a youth at the thinking-of-shaving age. Talking pictures today celebrate their seventeenth birthday.

There was no indication that an entertainment introduced to the public in New York on Monday afternoon, February 17, 1913, was the forerunner of revolutionary change in the motion picture that caused Hollywood to open its mouth and the rest of the world to open its ears and eyes.

Seventeen years ago combined sight and sound was projected by means of a device called the kineophone, perfected by Thomas A. Edison. It was more than a device; it was two devices, the motion picture projector and the phonograph. A belt ran from the motor of the projection machine to the phonograph back of the screen, operating them together. For a short time it amused audiences in New York and elsewhere, but it was looked upon as an oddity and soon was removed from the market.

Little was heard of the talking pictures after the demise of the kineophone, known also as the Edison. It was not until 1925 when it became known that a motion picture company had acquired the rights to a newly-perfected sound recording and reproducing system. In 1926 the first of the new type of talking pictures was shown publicly.

For the pioneer talking picture of 1926 a phonograph record was first made of the actor's voice. Then as the record was played the actor sang or talked again, this time for the camera. When the action was in fairly good synchronization with the record the talkie was completed. It was easy for the record and film to get out of alignment in the showing, and the result was farcical.

Talking pictures date back even farther than 1913, but they were of a different variety. Another camera-phonograph later called the actophone, traceable to the Edison experiments had been perfected by 1905.

The 1905 talkie did not project its pictures on a screen, but ran them in a peep-show affair which accommodated only one customer at a time. As the flickering pictures ran before his eyes, the patron got an ear full of the accompanying sound through two small tubes.

Eva Tanguay was one of the first "talkie stars," singing her famous "I Don't Care" and neither did the public then, for actophones popularity was short lived.

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On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

RECENT ELOPEMENT OF MARGO COUZENS
DEFLECTS FAMILY'S UNCONVENTIONALITYBy CHARLES P. STEWART

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The Couzens' are an unconventional family.

Margo Couzens' recent elopement to marry young Jeffries Chevington in Baltimore, was an illustration of it.

True, one may suspect that Miss Couzens' parents would have suspected something if they had been strictly on the alert. Advance publication of the marriage as required by the church to the obtaining of a dispensation; arrangements for the presence of a "monsignor" to perform the ceremony—all these preliminaries take considerable time. Besides involving a certain amount of publicity.

The inference is rather strong that Miss Couzens was not seriously worried lest her stern father, the Michigan senator, veto the wedding at the last minute.

Young Mrs. Chevington really told the whole story, undoubtedly, shortly after the elopement, when she mentioned her horror of "society weddings."

An elopement, beyond any question, was her only means of escaping one.

Washington simply would not have endured any other kind. If it had had a word to say about it. We may safely assume, then, that it was "society" the Chevingtons-to-be (and who now are) ran away from, and not the bride's father and mother.

Maybe, as a mere matter of form, Senator and Mrs. Couzens honestly were not told. Maybe they were.

At any rate, the senator threw no fits when informed of the elopement.

He was perfectly calm.

Locked at either way, it was unconventional, which is exactly what might have been expected in Senator Couzens' daughter.

As a multimillionaire product of the most standardized industry on earth (an industry which is largely because of the very perfection of its standardization), the senator is the most utterly unstandardized individual in public life—or almost anywhere.

Naturally this unreliability makes him a terrible trial to the orthodox element he is brought in contact with—and the position he holds brings him in contact with the orthodox element constantly.

Being the richest man in congress, according to all rules the Michigan senator ought to be an ultra-conservative.

Occasionally a very rich young man, who has inherited his money and consequently does not set a self-made capitalist's value on it, bursts out into a pink rash; but this is extremely seldom the case with a hard-boiled older who dragged himself by his own bootstraps into the class of super-income taxpayers, as Senator Couzens did.

And yet he sometimes talks about capitalism in a fashion to make a conservative's blood curdle.

He speaks of it as a system which has got to justify itself.

He accepts it, but he does not appear to approve of it at all heartily—rather as if it were something he had had wished onto us and must make the best of.

He votes this in the senate, too—generally.

And then, right in the midst of it, he will suddenly turn around and vote enthusiastically with the old guardmen.

He is not an old guardman; far from it. The old guardmen never count on him. If they get him, they get him by accident. The senator may have reasoned the matter out in accordance with some theory of his own, but the old guardmen cannot understand it.

On the other hand, the liberals do count on him—nearly. But when he deserts them, they are as puzzled as the old guardmen.

He's a strange senator to come from a Ford Silver factory.

CONFEDERATE CONGRESS

On Feb. 18, 1862, the first Congress of the Confederate States of America convened at Richmond.

Just a year before this date, seven southern states had withdrawn from the Union and sent delegates to Montgomery, Ala., to frame a government. This date, the elected Jefferson Davis, of Mississippi, president of the "Confederate States of America."

After the Confederate congress held its Richmond session, Davis was formally inaugurated for a term of six years. Although the first congress met four times and second congress twice, there was never much popular confidence in either.

This was because the congress held secret sessions, cabinet officers exercised their right to sit in congress, and many personal controversies arose among civil and military officials.

This date also commemorates the taking over of the combined Confederate forces in 1865 by General Robert E. Lee.

"Depistolizing" Of Mexico Rubio Aim

Problem Faced By President Looms As Intricate As One Faced At Naval Meeting Session At London

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 17. (AP)—The 35th President Ortiz Rubio has set for himself an "depistolizing" Mexico bids well to develop into a problem as intricate as that faced by the naval conference at London.

The Mexican president's program has much in common with that of the naval policy, contemplating not just limitation of armament, but "actual reduction." He would limit the army and the police to the right to carry pistols and would reduce the present armament by exactly the number of pistols now strapped to the belts of civilians.

Difficulties Seen.

A superficial knowledge of Mexico is sufficient to give an understanding of the vast proportions of the president's project and the difficulties it presents.

Pistol-toting has been common here for so long it has come to be regarded by the average citizen as his inalienable right. To convince him that he is entitled to no such privilege as expected to take considerable persuasion—and, perhaps, some force.

Efforts Fail.

Efforts have been made in the past to relieve the country's civilian population of its pistols but they have been attended by little success. The word "depistolization" was coined to describe one of the early attempts, and now a veritable depistolization, or depistolization in fact, is promised.

The president's plan goes far beyond former efforts, reaching even to the halls of congress. To disarm congress would have been considered preposterous at one time, but a new school of thought has reached the presidency, and disarming of congress is one of many reforms said to be in prospect.
