BURKBURNETT TAKES HONORS AT WTCC CONVENTION IN WICHITA FALLS

Lovely Burk Burnett Miss Succeeds To Throne of West Texas C. of C.

Lovely Miss Barbara Crissey of Burk Burnett was crowned queen of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening by Senator Tom Connally, and assumed her royal robe of red and white velvet to reign for a year as West Texas' choice among 30 charming young community representatives. She was presented with an all-expense trip to Chicago for herself and her chaperone, as the gift of the Braniff Airlines.

Miss Inez Mayo of Denton, queen of the 1937 convention, relinquished her crown to Miss Crissey, who was elected by popular ballot.

The coronation was held at the second and final Oil Festival Revue, held in Memorial auditorium with hundreds of West Texas visitors witnessing the parade of the beautiful community queens.

C. of C. Is Proud Of Record Made At Convention

Herman Engelmann, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, announced Thursday that Burk Burnett was awarded fourth place in advance registrations for the WTCC convention held in Wichita Falls this week.

These awards were made on the number of registrations made in advance of the opening of the convention, and were judged according to population and distance of the town being registered from Wichita Falls. Since Burk Burnett is only a short distance from Wichita Falls, fourth place is an excellent rating, taking into consideration the number of delegates registered, which was 5000.

Mr. Engelmann states that the Chamber of Commerce is exceedingly proud to be able to put Burk Burnett on record for as many honors as were awarded us during this convention. Something of the honor attached to our winning such awards will be realized when it is known that the whole state is divided into only two sections to be represented by Chamber of Commerce activities; they are East and West Texas, and all towns on either side of the dividing line are included in these annual conventions. AN EDITORIAL ON PRINTING

Several cheap-printing salesmen have been invading Burk Burnett from time to time, in fact some of them make Burk Burnett about every two weeks, and it is surprising the number of orders that they receive from the business people who ought to know better. These same business people that patronize these out-of-town houses expect the local people to give them their business but they think nothing of giving a printing salesman an order to be done in Lawton or Oklahoma City, or Chicago or New York, or some other distant city. These same business people expect their home newspaper to give them a boost, and instead of giving their home paper a boost with their printing orders, they give it to some cheap-printing salesman because they can save a few cents on the order.

These business men who send their printing orders out of town because they can save a few cents, forget that people, too, can sometimes save a few cents on their merchandise by shopping elsewhere.

There are some local business men, however, who are 100 per cent loyal to their home town and newspaper, who do all their buying in the home town. To them the Star is deeply thankful for their consideration. This little episode, which took place in a local store recently, illustrates the point:

Printing Salesman: I have some fine samples of printing I'd like to show you.

Burk Businessman: I am not interested. I buy all of my printing in Burk Burnett.

Salesman: But I can save you a lot of money. Your printer can't sell you printing as cheaply as I can.

Burk Businessman: Maybe you can save me money, but why should I buy printing from you for the dollar commission that you will make on the order, which will be printed several hundred miles away in a shop that pays no taxes here nor cares anything about the town except for the few dollars that he takes out of it. My local printer not only pays taxes here, maintains a payroll here, boosts my only pays taxes here, maintains a payroll here, boosts my business and our home town, but he also buys what he needs in my line of merchandise from me. What kind of a business man would I be if I gave you an order for merchandise which I should, in all fairness, buy from him? Maybe I can buy printing cheaper from you but he never questions my prices, even though he can get some of the goods I sell cheaper in the big cities. No, I'm not interested in buying my printing away from home.

Typing Team Wins Waurika Last Sat.

The typing team from Burk Burnett High School added further laurels to their crown with their first place ranking at the tournament held in Waurika on Saturday.

The team is composed of Barbara Crissey, Mary Ruth Cooper, Marginell Chambers and Katherine Houser. This is their third significant win for the year. They won first place in the county meet in March; Barbara Crissey having the highest individual rank with a score of 52 words per minute.

On April 2, they went to Randlett, Okla., where they competed with six other teams, winning first place and receiving a beautiful plaque as award. Barbara Crissey was again winner of the highest individual score with 49 words per minute. She received a gold pin.

In the tournament at Waurika on Saturday, the team competed with teams from 10 other schools; a total of 44 contestants being entered. Barbara Crissey was again high point winner with a score of 51 words, receiving a gold pin as award. Competition was very strong in this meet, two other contestants ranking within a fraction of Barbara's score. The team was awarded a lovely 14 inch, gold plated trophy, which is on exhibition in the trophy case at the high school.

M. P. Kimbrow, who is instructor of commercial work in the local high school, is very enthusiastic over the work done by his commercial classes this year, and the record set by his typing team is indicative of the progress made by this department. The girls who make the team are excellent students, ranking high in all their classes.

Their individual ranking by words per minute is as follows: Barbara Crissey, 50 to 55 words; Mary Ruth Cooper, 50 to 52; Marginell Chambers and Katherine Houser, 45 to 50. As a team they average 44 words per minute.

Burkburnett . . . History

As revealed by the files of The Star 12 years ago.

Jack Garner, joint owner with his half-brother, Bradley Price, in Two Brothers Barber Shop, was struck by a car on Avenue D, near the Central School, Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock and seriously injured. Edna Potthoff was driving the car which struck him.

Miss Frances Rutledge of Burkburnett, entered as "Miss Wichita Falls" in the International Review of Pulchritude at Galveston, won ninth prize, which was a \$100 check.

A serious accident occurred Monday night when Misses Inez and Gladys Westbrook were run down by a car near their home on South Avenue D. The car, driven by W. T. Bush, struck the young ladies as they left a truck of hay-riders and started to their home. Neither of them is critically injured. They are member of this year's graduating class.

Thursday night, May 20, diplomas were awarded to forty-three students of the High School. This is the largest number of students ever graduated from the local high school in one class. W. B. Hamilton of Wichita Falls delivered the graduating address. The

salutatorian was Miss Fanette Anderson; valedictorian was Miss Bobbie Womack.

Jake Sims, Herbert Blair and W. P. Smith, workmen at the Nortex refinery one mile south of this city, are in the General hospital in Wichita Falls, as a result of a 50-foot drop late Tuesday afternoon when a scaffold on which they were working collapsed. A woman employee of a Burkburnett office was busily engaged at work Friday evening when suddenly terror broke loose. A square of the tin ceiling gave way and dropped to the floor bringing with it a rain of whiskey bottles full of corn whiskey. The woman rushed into the street and screamed for help. Chief of Police Bill Garland hurried to the scene and after looking over the situation, obtained a search warrant for a rooming house which was located above the office. Mr. Garland went to Wichita Falls Saturday morning, taking with him 12 bottles of whiskey and Henry Carter, negro porter.



Non-Military Appropriation
The House, last week considered throughout the week the Non-Military Appropriation Bill providing a direct annual appropriation of \$196,609,725; and on Thursday finally passed and sent this same measure to the Senate for their consideration.

The Relief Program
The President's new relief program has aroused the opposition, and we are now receiving very largely the same propaganda from the same organizations who have bitterly opposed the entire program. The national income this year indicates a decline of about \$12,000,000,000 over last year, and with business conditions showing the same downward trend, it is hard to realize how our economic problems can be solved by remaining idle and attempting nothing to improve conditions. Forcing money into circulation in a well-planned work program will start the cycle of re-employment and restoration of purchasing power now so badly needed. History records that we have never had prosperous times in this country with low prices and low wages. Prosperity comes only when we have good prices and good wages.

Wage and Hour
The House Labor Committee favorably reported S. 2475 with amendments, which in substance

proposes:
To forbid the employment of children under 16, and to regulate employment of children between 16 and 18 in hazardous occupations.

To prohibit employment at less than 25c an hour the first year, 30c the second, 35c the third and 40c thereafter.

To provide for enforcement through the Federal Courts.

The AF of L and the CIO have united in support of this Bill, and it is believed a favorable rule will be received this week to bring the measure before the House. It is believed that this measure will receive favorable consideration before adjournment.

The Tax Bill
The morning press indicates the tax conferences have agreed in substance on the undistributed profits tax provision of the House Bill, and on capital gains they have taken the 15 per cent flat rate contained in the Senate Bill. The House Bill was almost a complete surrender to the large corporations and gamblers and speculators which are the ones greatly favored by these proposed amendments to existing law. However, the Senate Bill goes much further than the House Bill and gives these groups everything they wanted. The compromise means the great masses of the people will be forced to pay more taxes while the privileged groups, speculators and gamblers, and those having large incomes from tax exempt securities will be relieved of some \$300,000,000 in taxes. It seems unfair that the masses of the people, from the earned in-

come of their salaries must be forced to bear this additional burden under these trying conditions.

The Calendar
The Senate, last week debated and finally passed the Naval Appropriations Bill, and then began consideration of the Naval Enlargement Authorization Bill. This measure will be considered until disposed of this week.

This week the House will consider reports on Appropriation Bills, District Legislation, Rivers and Harbors Legislation, and a bill to create additional Federal Judgeships.

Shop, Drawing Department Will Have Show 4th

Wednesday, May 4, the Shop and Drawing classes of Burkburnett High School will present an exhibition of their work during the past year. Under the supervision of Mr. Carrold Jackson, our instructor, a lavish display of the departments' work will begin at noon and continue until 9 o'clock Wednesday night. It is entirely free and everybody is invited to come.

As an added inducement to you to attend, we are going to give a beautiful walnut chest to the lucky person. Everybody who comes to the exhibition is eligible to receive this chest. It was constructed in the shop by the boys, of good walnut and finished until it looks as good, if not better, than high priced factory built chests.

The purpose of the exhibition is to encourage boys in high school, or who will be in high school, to take either shop work or drawing. The boys of the classes believe that the work offered is one of the most practical courses in school. We also feel that any boy would enjoy working and drawing for himself. Under the present methods, each boy is given an opportunity to do as well or better than his more talented fellows, by being able to select, to a certain extent, work of interest to him. We also hope to encourage the construction of small home workshops in which the son and his father can work until they are content.

The shop classes offer a complete display of furniture constructed by the students on and with the machines in the school shop. Although, we are very proud of the walnut chests and beds which have been built this year, we find that some of the best work has been done on fruit bowls, and other small articles. The machines will be open to inspection and their uses explained and demonstrated thoroughly by students in attendance. Also on display will be a complete home shop unit owned by B. H. Alexander, Jr., and demonstrated by advance shop students.

The drawing class presents as complete a set of drawings as any one year department in our region. All the students have drawn a few of each type, but after reaching our quota for the year, we have been allowed to draw the type for which we are most talented. There are four main divisions in our work: freehand, machine, drafting and graphic construction and lettering.

Each of these types will be on display and fully explained by competent students. The drawings of the best students compared with those of any high school in Texas that we have seen, and we are proud to say that possibly we are capable of producing as good work as any high school student.

We offer an exhibition of good work, a nice walnut chest for the lucky person, and a cordial and sincere welcome to all fathers, mothers and visitors of our exhibit.

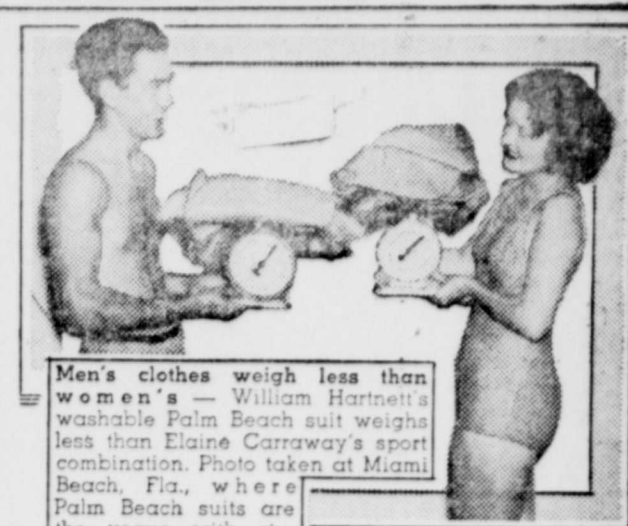

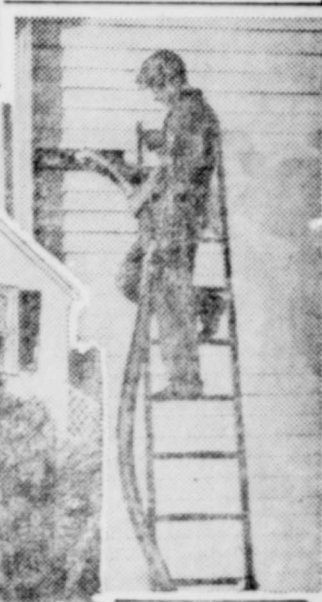

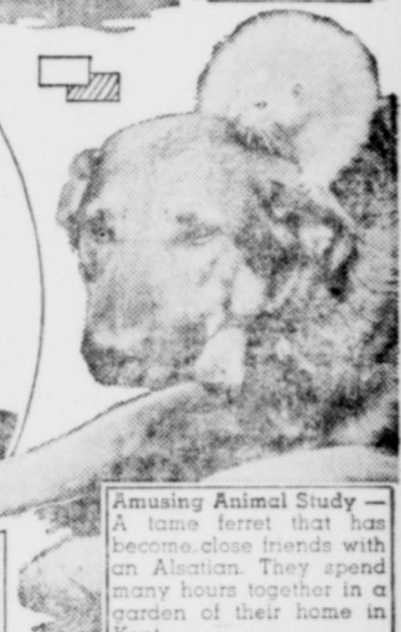

May-Day To Be Child Health Day

The year 1937 in Texas saw
4000 children born dead; 8000
children under one year of age
die from diseases mainly pre-
ventable; 142 children under
fourteen years of age killed on
our Texas highways; and 1320
more children injured in auto-
mobile accidents. These appall-
ing figures show the constant
menace children face.

To lessen in some way this
high death rate, a security pro-
gram has been mapped out by the
Texas State Department of
Health and its co-operating state
and federal agencies to include
maternal and child health ser-
vices; care for crippled children,
extension of the child welfare
services, and aid to dependent
children.

Every thinking citizen realizes
that far too many children die
needlessly. The first day of May
each year is proclaimed by the
President of the United States
as May Day-Child Health Day, a
day of summation of all child
health activities over the nation
and intelligent planning for the
future. Since that day is offi-
cially for children, May Day-
Child Health Day should be the
impetus each year to further ad-
vance all the overlapping child
services by the local clinics and
the governmental agencies.

Workers in this field are strug-
gling against tremendous finan-
cial odds. For some reason, the
cause of child health, one which
touches every citizen of Texas,
cannot be sold to the public.

As long as this attitude exists,
May Day-Child Health Day will
be a comparative failure. Any-
program, however simple, needs
co-operation. A program with the
far-reaching aim of making May
Day-Child Health Day the im-
petus for a year-long drive for
better Texas child health, merits
individual, as well as community
help.

General Hospital Is Not Liable For Any Damages

A ruling that the Wichita Gen-
eral hospital cannot be held li-
able for damages and therefore
does not need public liability in-
surance has been given by Coun-
ty Attorney Ned McDaniel fol-
lowing a request from hospital
board members for his opinion
on this question.

McDaniel quoted a recent su-
preme court decision holding that
a hospital such as this, support-
ed by the city and county, was
performing a governmental func-
tion.

Serious Shortage Of Underground Water Predicted

Austin, Texas, April 26—Un-
less immediate steps are taken to
conserve the State's underground
water supplies, Texas will be fac-
ing a serious shortage of under-
ground water, according to the
Texas Planning Board's water re-
sources committee, which is mak-
ing an exhaustive study of the
State's underground water re-
sources.

Some sections of the state al-
ready are beginning to feel the
pinch of a diminishing supply of
underground water. The under-
ground water table in the fam-
ous Winter Garden area is drop-
ping at an alarming rate and un-
less drastic conservation measur-
es are taken soon, that area will
be faced with a serious under-
ground water problem.

Contrary to popular belief,
most of the cities and towns in
Texas get their water for do-
mestic purposes from under-
ground sources. In some sections
of the State the underground
water is replenished almost as
rapidly as it is used, but there
are other sections where the forces
of nature are unable to keep
the supply replenished. It is in
these sections that stringent con-
servation measures will have to
be taken if the State is to be in-
sured of continuous and bountiful
supply of sparkling underground
water.

The planning board's water re-
sources committee, under the di-
rection of C. S. Clark, planning
board member, and chairman of
the State Board of Water Engi-
neers, is studying several conser-
vation measures. Each of the
measures, however, provides for
the conservation, and orderly use
of the State's precious supply of
underground water.

Retail Sales Good Over Texas Now

Austin, Texas, April 26—Retail
sales in Texas continue to make
a far better showing than in the
Nation as a whole, according to
the Bureau of Business Research
of The University of Texas. Ag-
gregate sales, as measured in
dollars, during March of a repre-
sentative group of department
stores, dry goods, and apparel
stores, men's and women's spe-
cialty stores were only slightly be-
low those of the corresponding
month last year and exceeded
those of February by almost the
normal seasonal amount, the re-
port said.

Reports from 106 retail estab-
lishments showed total dollar sales
during March of only 2.4 per
cent below those of the like
month last year, while the in-
crease over February was 21.6
per cent. The fact that Easter
came in March last year where-
as this year it came in April lends
further optimism to the
current showing.

REAL PROGRESS ON THE FARM

The debate over the recently enacted farm bill goes on. It's sponsors laud it as a measure which will bring great and lasting prosperity to agriculture. Its opponents describe it as a social and economic crazy-quilt, unworkable and beyond human understanding.

Time will tell which side is right. In the meantime, however, without talking about it, or making the headlines, progressive farmers around Burkburnett are carrying on a sound "farm aid" plan all their own, and it isn't supported by the clique or clan. The reference is the fast growing agricultural marketing co-operatives.

IT'S HARD TO HATE A MAN IF YOU KNOW HIM

In a city the size of Burkburnett everybody knows everybody else. Friendship and goodwill prevail in most cases, and are a great civic asset. One unkind remark may create a feeling which not only hurts individuals, but damages the town.

This is no special appeal to smother legitimate criticism. Sometimes it is necessary to speak out in order to right a wrong. But no one should speak critically of another on hearsay or by reason of prejudice.

If you have an unfriendly feeling about someone we suggest that you pay him a visit. Get acquainted with him. If the matter is important and is troubling you, tell him about it frankly and iron it out between you.

Above all, if you hear an unkind or dangerous statement about a man or a firm, challenge the maker of it. Ask him where he got his facts, and whether he knows they are true. Take occasion to check up his statements, and if you find they are not true take the trouble to straighten him out.

Above all, get acquainted with your neighbor—you might like him. He might even like you.

WHAT'S IN A MAN?

What's in a man? Well, to begin with, there's about a nickel's worth of iodine, forty quarts of water, and enough sulphur to kill the fleas on a small dog. There's phosphorus enough for a year's supply of matches, iron to make a small nail, and lime enough to whitewash a chicken-coop. Break a man down on the scrap-heap and he's hardly worth a cent a pound.

But there's something more in a man, something that turns a chemical machine into a living being, something that makes that machine form the notes of a symphony, spell the words of a poem, and seek to unlock the doors to the treasures and mysteries of life.

What's in a man? There's love, hate, fear, revenge, lust, honor, hope, and despair. There's a force that makes him explore the unknown, and a fatality that sends him out to kill in the shot and shell of war.

Pioneer Burk Woman Buried At Paris, Texas

Mrs. S. H. Poteet, 89, Dies At Home of Son

Mrs. S. H. Poteet, 89, mother of Mrs. W. A. Scarborough, Wichita Falls, died in Burkburnett Saturday at the home of her son, B. W. Poteet, on Glendale street. She had been in failing health for several years.

Mrs. Poteet was born in Beards-town, Texas, April 23, 1849.

The body was taken overland to Paris, Texas, for funeral services Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the Minton-Frye Funeral home with burial in Antioch cemetery. Owens & Brumley Funeral home of this city was in charge.

Mrs. Poteet was a native Texan and a member of the Church of Christ. For the last several years she had alternated her residence with her children.

Survivors besides the two children already mentioned include four daughters, Mrs. W. O. Stallings of Clovis, N. M., Mrs. Rex Lindsey of Durant, Oklahoma, Mrs. F. W. Roberts of Chico, and Mrs. Minnie Sue Stovall of Fort Worth; and a second son, C. H. Poteet of Snider, Okla.; 24 grand-children and 8 great-grand-children.

G. R. McNeil, county agent, after conferring with the expert, announced that a supply of government bran and poison are now stored at the county warehouse, precinct 1 on the Burkburnett road. He expects that May 15 will be the distribution date for the poison and bran from the warehouse.

Gable made a tour of the county, assisted by National Youth administration guides. Cool nights have checked the egg hatch, he said, but as soon as the spring weather makes for warmer nights the county is due for the worst visitation from the hoppers in many years.

McNeil said Saturday that the NYA assistants will be drafted as soon as the distribution campaign begins.

Ben Dozier Warns Anglers of Special Fishing Laws This Year

String Limit 30 pounds
Anglers may not take more than 30 pounds of crappie, white perch and blue gill bream combined, with the legal minimum length of seven inches for crappie and white perch, and five inches for blue gill bream.

Warden Dozier also emphasized the special trot line laws in force at the lakes, which prohibit the taking of channel catfish or blue catfish less than 11 inches. The limit of these for one day is 20 pounds.

Fishermen are allowed only one trot line of not more than 50 hooks, spaced at least four feet

apart, and no two lines may be nearer than 50 together. Only 2 lines are permitted in one party, with the law recognizing a party to be two or more persons who set out to use trot lines together.

General game laws, he said, call for special licenses of \$1.10 for anglers using artificial lure. Persons of all ages are required to buy the licenses. Regular fishing licenses for non-residents cost \$5, although special 5-day permits are issued for \$1.10.

Minnow Seines Legal
The warden also cautioned against illegal minnow seining. Seines greater than 20 feet in length are illegal. The law requires that all bass, species of bass, crappie and white perch, blue gill bream, strawberry bream, regardless of size, must be returned to the water uninjured.

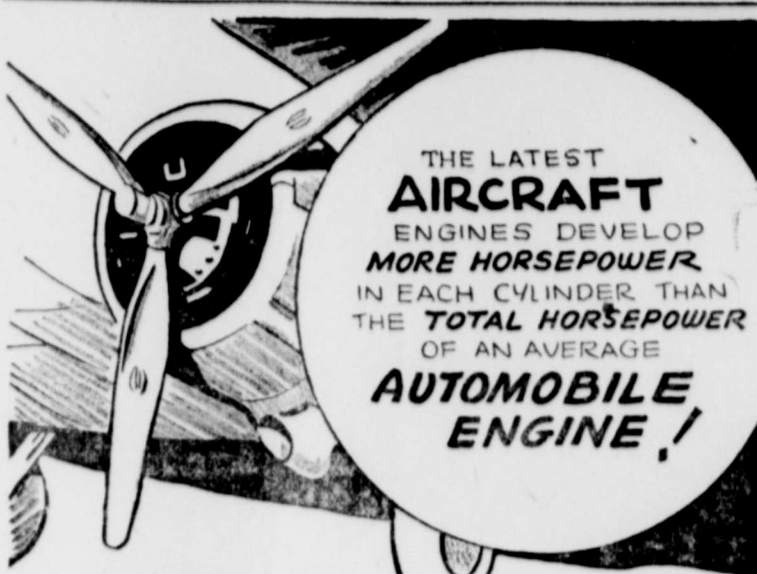
