Sheriff's Department Overtime Pay Questioned Investigation Finds Garza County Violating Wage and Hour Laws

A complaint against the Garza County Sheriff's Department filed with the Department of Labor Wage and Hour Division by a "concerned citizen" was the focal point of the Monday, December 12 all-day session of Garza County Commissioners' Court.

In order to protect the individuals, the Department of Labor does not release the names of people who file complaints.

The complaint made to the Department of Labor, alleging that employees in the sheriff's office were not paid for overtime, resulted in an investigation of sheriff's department payroll records as far back as November 1986, by Tom Button of the Wage and Hour Division.

The sheriff's department was initially contacted by Button, informing the office of the investigation and a planned visit to Post. Button met with Deputy Billy Timms, in the absence of Sheriff Jim Pippin, and requested a list of all employees in the department and the daily activity sheets for those employees. Button also checked the department's records in the Garza County Treasurer's office and had telephone conversations with a majority of the department employees, according to testimony given by those employees on Monday.

Following his investigation, on Wednesday, December 7, Button met with County Judge Giles Dalby and the Commissioners in a special called session to inform them that the county was in violation of the Wage and Hour Law for failure to pay proper wages for

overtime and comp time to sheriff's department employees.

Judge Dalby then began, on behalf of Commissioners' Court, an investigation into the matter by the county. The county's investigation entailed a long, involved process of checking sheriff's department payroll records, individual records, overtime sheets and radio logs for a period of two years - from November 1986 to date.

To help with the county's investigation employees of the sheriff's department were issued subpoenas to testify at Monday's Commissioners' Court regarding hours worked and hourly rates paid.

Giving testimony throughout the day Monday were Sheriff Jim Pippin; deputies Billy Timms, Ron Jenkins, Kenneth Ratke, Maurice Herridge, Lon Saddler; dispatchers/correctional officers Twilight Dudley, Teri Beames, Nancy Kemp and Andy Guthrie; and relief dispatcher Carole Hutto.

All those giving testimony were asked by the Judge and Commissioners about their overtime, overtime pay, comp time and holiday pay; as well as pay for trips to pick up or deliver prisoners and time spent in law enforcement training schools.

After hearing all the testimony, it was Judge Dalby's decision to recess until Monday, December 19 at 9 a.m. at which time he and the Commissioners will talk with individual sheriff's department employees and attempt to negotiate a wage settlement satisfactory to the employee and the Department of Labor.

In other business, prior to the Wage and Hour discussion, the Commissioners voted to replace a door on the north side of the Courthouse, at the recommendation of Donald Windham.

The swearing in ceremonies for all incoming county officials, with the exception the county sheriff were scheduled for Sunday, January 1, 1989 at 9 a.m. The county sheriff will be sworn in at 12 midnight

December 31.

Bids on a new car for the sheriff's department were opened and the bid awarded to Vyas Motors of Post, with a bid of \$13,529. Delivery date on the vehicle is four to six weeks.

Other bids included Pollard Ford, \$14,221 plus fee and McGinnis Chevrolet, \$13,943.55. Present at Monday's meeting

Theatre Visitors Provide Tourism Spurt for Post

This Thursday evening when the house lights come up at the Garza Theatre, a special salute to the people of Post will highlight the opening of the theatre's fourth year of live performances.

The salute to Post and its theatre patrons will recognize the continuing "love affair" between the volunteers at the theatre and the audiences who enjoy the performances.

This 24th production at the Garza is "Mary, Mary" and features an all-star cast including Linda Ellis, Mandy Swafford, Steve Sever, Wes Burnett and Will McCrary.

For the past three years our theatre has gone from a run-down building to a thriving bee-hive of activity, serving as a magnet for visitors from across West Texas.

Now entering its fourth year, the Garza Theatre is offering top-notch entertainment in an era when most small towns only dream of such things.

And the quality of the stage productions has not gone unnoticed as more than 2,500 theatre patrons from out-of-town have visited Post since that first performance three years ago.

The truth of the matter is, more than 75 percent of all tickets purchased for performances at the Garza Theatre are bought by people who live somewhere other than Post.

So, the tourism value should be apparent.

And when those visitors come to see our plays they spend money in Post.

That's what tourism is all about.

An example of the economic impact was the packed house filled by Methodist Hospital's Valu Care tour group during a performance of "The Sunshine Boys."

That was more than 200 people in town for just one event.

And, they will be back.

The Garza Theatre, under the direction and inspiration of Will McCrary, has produced 23 plays, two Shakespeare festivals and two "Willy Award" banquets and was the recipient of the prestigious West Texas Museum Association's award for cultural contributions.

The theatre has benefited greatly through the past three years from the generosity of local patrons, including many of our merchants who offer services and materials with little or no recognition and many civic minded citizens who have made monetary contributions.

Recently the Post-Montgomery Estate has taken an active interest, and Dina Merrill's visit with Will at the theatre during last October's Founder's Day celebration promises to provide new resources.

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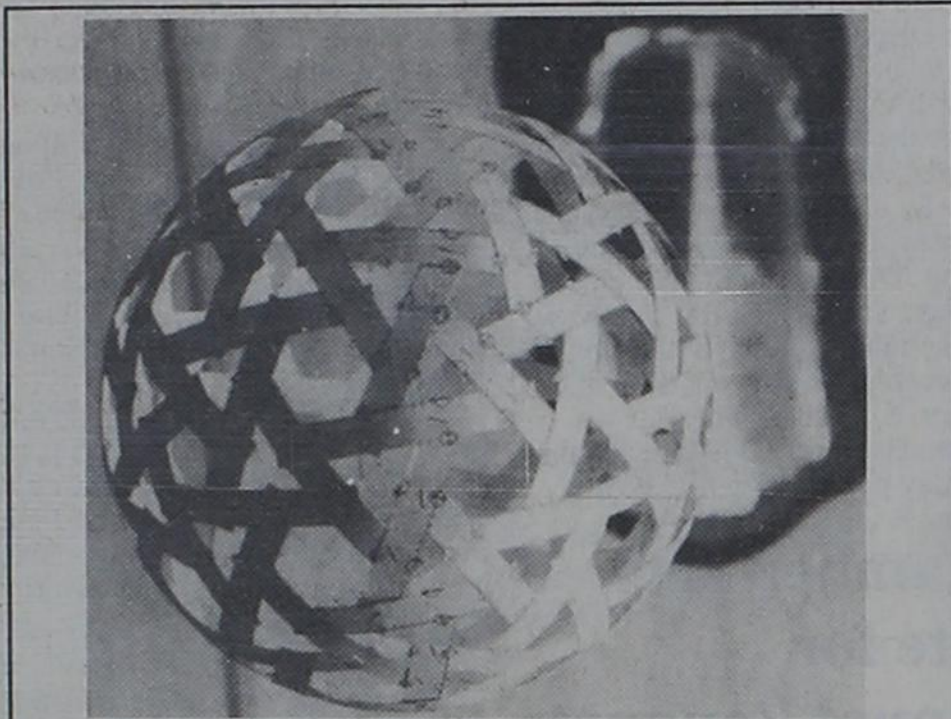

IRS Seeks Taxpayers Due Refunds

Gabino and Sylvia Tarango, who are listed as residents of Post, are among the over 900 North Texas taxpayer's whose names appear on the Internal Revenue Service's list of undeliverable refunds.

The IRS wants to match these taxpayers with the \$406,153 they are owed according to Terry Green, Chief of the Dallas District Taxpayer Service Division.

These taxpayers filed for refunds during 1987. We have processed their returns and issued refund checks, only to have them returned by the post office. With the average refund at \$882, we would like to match the check to its owner," Green said.

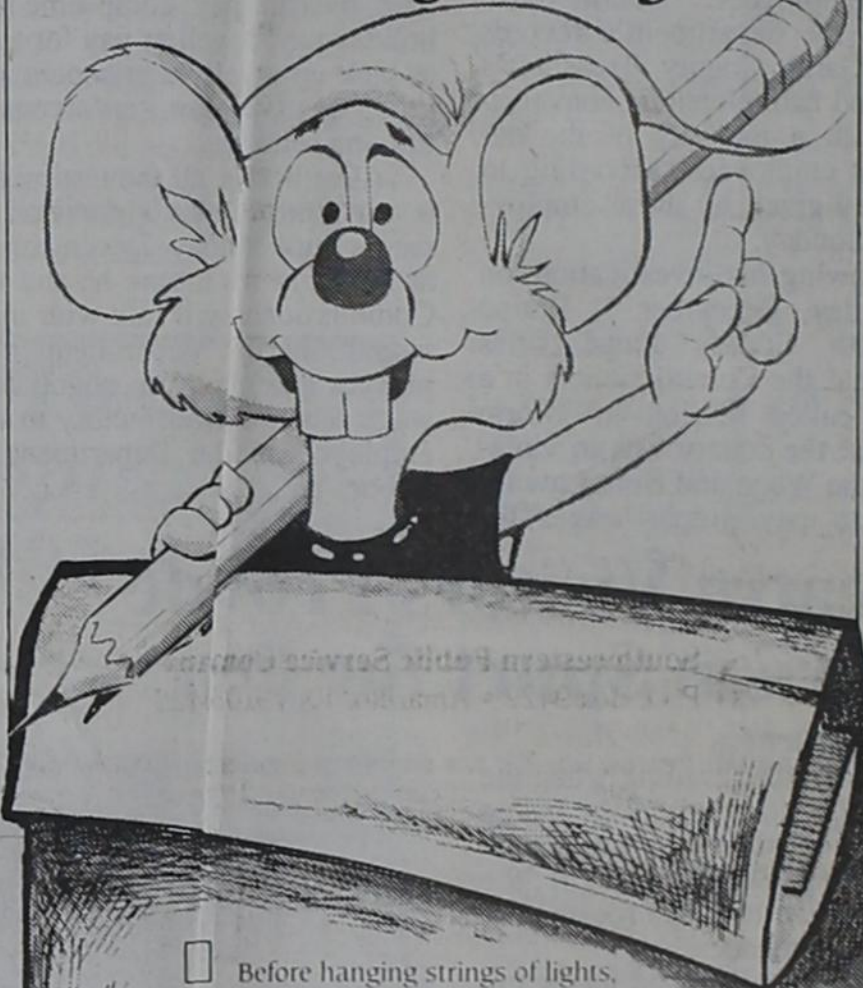
The amount of refund on the undelivered checks ranges from \$26 to \$30,620. He states that the most common reasons for a check being returned are lack of forwarding addresses, illegible handwriting, or name changes since the tax return was filed.

Each year the IRS requests the news media to publish names of taxpayers who had a refund check returned as undeliverable in the hope that they, a friend, or a relative will see their name and contact the IRS with their correct address.

Listed persons are asked to call the IRS toll-free number, 1-800-424-1040, weekdays between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. and give their name, social security number and expected amount of refund.

This information will enable the IRS to reissue the check so each taxpayer can receive the refund due to them.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- ☐ Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- ☐ Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- ☐ Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- ☐ Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- ☐ Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- ☐ If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- ☐ Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- ☐ Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- ☐ Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- ☐ Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- ☐ Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- ☐ When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- ☐ Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- ☐ Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

CCA Representatives at Texas Artsreach Meeting

Caprock Cultural Association members Joe Miller, JoAnn Mock, Marie Neff, and Maxine and Lewis Earl represented the local organization at a Monday, December 5 regional meeting of Texas Artsreach at the Chamber of Commerce in Lubbock.

The all-day session, conducted by the Texas Commission on the Arts, gave the CCA, and other arts and cultural organizations, an in-depth look at available resources.

Advocacy efforts for the arts and cultural organizations within the state were on the agenda for the afternoon session and were explained by representatives of the Texas Arts Council, Texas Accountants and Lawyers for the Arts, Texas Association for the

Promotion of the Arts, Texas Association of Museums, Texas Non-Profit Theatres and Southwest Alternative Media Projects.

It was pointed out that Texas ranks 55th in state arts funding among the 56 states and territories and though the Commission's budget is only two-tenths of one percent of the total state budget, it resulted in serving over 11 million persons in 1988.

It was also pointed out in the session that the Arts in Education projects served approximately 140,300 public school children and 2400 teachers in Texas and that the TCA also serves 600 non-profit arts organizations which employ over 30,000 persons.

Cotton Talks

Snow December 8 put High Plains cotton strippers in "park" only 10 percent or less short of the finish line.

However, the final turnout, guessed in various quarters at from 2.7 to 3.1 million bales, isn't apt to be greatly affected, says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

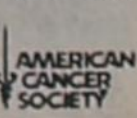

Companions Program is Active in Garza County

Garza County residents Jesus Rodriguez, Irene Guajardo, Callie Harper and Mary Paiz all have one thing in common - they are part of the local "Senior Companions" Program.

The "Senior Companions" Program may not be familiar to you now, but chances are it soon will be as recognition and publicity come to this group of volunteers who give of their time and talents all year long providing care for the elderly and the disabled.

These Companions are persons who are sixty years old, or older, usually retired from other jobs, who wish to remain active in their communities through volunteer work with agencies such as the Senior Companions Program, which is backed financially by the Federal government through South Plains Community Action in Levelland.

These volunteer Senior Companions do many things for the people they serve: they provide companionship and friendship, do errands and very light housework, remind their client when it is time to take medication, help fill out forms not familiar to the client, provide encouragement to a client who is depressed, serve as a good listener, etc.

Currently, Jesus Rodriguez is caring for two homebound persons; Irene Guajardo, Callie Harper and Mary Paiz each has the care of one person.

These local Senior Companions are part of a larger group of 82 volunteers from the eight counties - Garza, Cochran, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry, Bailey and Yoakum - receiving services from the program.

With the support of the Federal government, the program is a big help in keeping the elderly and disabled in their own homes and out of nursing homes. Without Companions, there are approximately 60 persons in the eight-county area who would have to go into a nursing home. These 60 persons can stay in their own homes, in familiar surroundings, because there is a Companion to check on them everyday and provide some basic care.

The Senior Companions Program - and other programs modeled after it - is probably one of the most cost-effective programs for care of the elderly in operation today.

Services provided in the community by the Senior Companions are free of charge to the client. To receive the services, a person must be aged 21 or older and be homebound because of some disability. However, for purposes of the program, a disability may also be an emotional one caused by the loss of a spouse, for example, or a general depression caused by some life circumstance. It does not necessarily have to be physical, though most of the clients also have a physical disability or illness.

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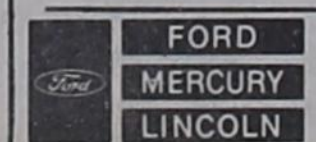

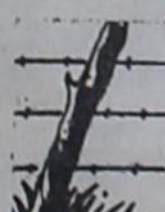
