Kiwanians Attend National Meeting

Mr. and Mrs. Dell Barber represented local Kiwanis Club at the 51st annual convention of Kiwanis International recently in Portland, Oregon.

A total of 15,000 Kiwanians and their families were on hand to represent 275,000 Kiwanians in 5,400 clubs in 17 countries of the free world.

The Barber family returned home Monday. Mrs. Barber gave a resume of their trip to Kiwanis Ladies' Night at the Col-Tex Club on Lake Colorado City.

Kiwanians and their families in attendance heard from top personalities during the four-and-a-half-days of the convention: Edward C. Keeffe, Oklahoma City, president of Kiwanis International, who is president; The Honorable Eugene J. McCarthy, United States Senator from Minnesota; The Honorable Mark O. Hatfield, Governor of Oregon; John Fisher, Commissioner of the Canadian Centennial Commission; Mrs. Nita Magidoff, lecturer and former professor of Russian at the University of Louisville, Kentucky; the leaders of Kiwanis' two youth groups — John D. Eadinger, London, Ontario, president of Circle K International, and Daniel W. Richey, Ferriday, Louisiana, president of Key Club International; and, as a special feature, a farewell address by O. E. "Pete" Peterson, long-time secretary of Kiwanis International, who will retire in October of this year following thirty years as a member of the Kiwanis staff.

Work accomplished at the convention included the election of a president, president-elect, two vice-presidents, a treasurer, and six trustees for 1966-67; recognition of the clubs and districts throughout the organization adjudged top in community service work and over-all excellence; and the adoption of resolutions upon which the organization's community service program for the coming year will be based.

Other convention features were a dramatic opening in pagant form; a colorful "presentation of the Flags of Kiwanis Nations"; a President's Reception and Ball; a two-hour professional show starring Marguerite Piazza, prima diva of the operatic, concert, nightclub and TV stage, the comedy team of Rowan and Martin, and other personalities; a special program for the ladies; a program for the youngsters present; and a score of district banquets held throughout the

Portland area. Music and color was provided by many Kiwanis sponsored musical groups, and by professional singers, instrumentalists, and performers.

This Fifty-first Annual Convention of Kiwanis International emphasized Kiwanis' entry into its second half-century of community service, and its rapid expansion into nations overseas. The last time Kiwanis met in Portland was 1920, at which time the famous motto, "We Build," was adopted.

Superintendent Gives Diplomas

Graduation exercises for 114 students Friday ended the first pre-school program for all children in the Colorado Independent School District.

The 114 grads had undergone a six-week program designed to make them better qualified students when they enter the first grade this fall.

Primary School Principal Brooks Teague, who headed the program, termed their system's first endeavor as "very successful."

Administrators, teachers and parents alike seemed very pleased with the accomplishments of the federally financed program.

The program was open to all students in the district and a high percentage took advantage of the opportunity.

Teague reported average attendance of almost 90 percent among the students. "Part of the absences were due to a mild outbreak of measles in the community," Teague said. On that subject 32 of the students were administered measles vaccine during the program.

Five teachers and five teaching aides made up the bulk of the staff for the school while two lunchroom workers and two custodians were also on duty.

The school is anticipating 172 students to enroll in the fall for regular classes. Thus, almost 67 percent or two-thirds of the children on the census roll of the district were given the added training provided by the pre-school program.

Sixty-seven Anglo children enrolled out of 112 on the census list.

The school had 33 Latin Americans of the 45 in the school district. Fourteen of the 15 Negro children expected in the first grade this fall took part in the program.

In previous years the school district had conducted a program designed to aid non-English speaking Latin American children prior to their entrance into the first grade.

Students attended classes from 8:30 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. with bus transportation and lunches being provided.

Checkups were given by school nurse, Mrs. Mike Ham-

mons, on the students' hearing and eyes.

Dr. H. Jene Steakley made a dental inspection on the children.

Personal hygiene was stressed throughout the program, according to Mrs. Hammans. "We tried to teach the children good health habits," she said, "even down to the proper way to wash their hands."

The program was keyed to achieve five basic objectives including:

- basic intellectual development
- improvement in oral language and speech
- encouragement of creativity and imagination
- instruction for self-help in daily living
- development of perception skills

Listening and speaking activities along with self-expression work in dramatics, arts, play and singing were designed to help the students' ability to communicate.

Field trips, looking at pictures and sharing experiences with the other students was encouraged to broaden their backgrounds and give them a greater appreciation of their cultures and those of others.

Another important facet of the program was to better acquaint parents with the workings of the school and how they could help their children through activities in the home.

This was accomplished through home visits and parent-teacher conferences.

Superintendent of Schools James G. McMath presented diplomas to the graduates and school board president Bill F. Carter made a short address.

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Report Notes Insect Activity

Report issued late last week by County Agent Bobby Lemons said "insect activity is increasing, but most cotton in the county is fruiting good."

"With the rapid lush growth of cotton and with the moisture we now have, insects could become a major problem," Lemons added.

The agent noted that hot dry weather should decrease insect activity in the county.

The report on individual insects goes like this:

Leafhoppers
Beginning to build up with heaviest damage being about 20 punctures per 100 squares and most fields are showing

about 4-5 percent punctures per 100 squares.

"Old fields of cotton are outgrowing these leafhoppers," Lemons said, "but producers should watch the late planted cotton."

Aphids
Very light infestations.

Boll Weevils
Some boll weevil damage has occurred in the early cotton with heaviest damage about four percent on an old field of cotton.

Boll Worms
Some fields have had little boll worm damage. Most of these worms have damaged

Church members voted in a Wednesday night conference, last week, to buy the bus from the Colorado City Independent School system.

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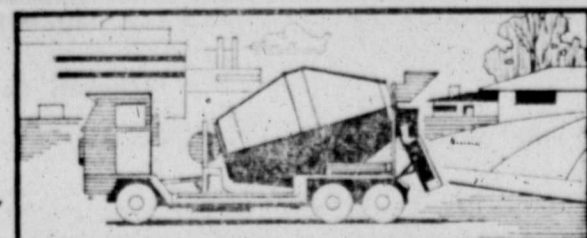
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FEDERAL LAND BANK

Bank Marks Birthday

For some 1,000 people who make their living from agriculture in Mitchell County, July will be a month-long testimony to the fact that they — and most other farmers have — turned out to be good businessmen.

It will be "Land Bank Month," the 50th Anniversary of the Farm Loan Act which helped put farming on a business basis in the U.S. for the first time in history. Farmers at last were able to borrow money on reasonable terms and put it to work as a production tool.

N. H. Pratt, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Colorado City, said that farmers at the turn of the century were regarded as poor business risks. "No one would lend them money to operate the way a businessman must if he is going to grow and contribute to his community," he said. "Interest rates for farmers were twice as high as for city businessmen, and the loans were for very short terms."

"Three Presidents — Theodore Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson — studied the problem, and finally the Farm Loan Act was signed by Woodrow Wilson on July 17, 1916. This Act created the Federal Land Bank System, through which farmers could make long-term, low-cost real estate loans from their own organizations."

The Federal Land Bank Association of Colorado City was created in 1917. It is one of seventy-three associations in

the Federal Land Bank district of Houston, which in turn is one of 12 Federal Land Banks that serve the 50 states.

"Altogether," Mr. Pratt said, "the Federal Land Bank System nationally has loaned its farmer members more than \$12 billion. The Land Bank of Houston has loaned Texas farmers more than \$1 billion dollars."

Not only have farmers proved to be outstandingly good loan risks — Land Bank fore-

losures are almost unheard of today — but, given money to work with, they have proved to be production geniuses of a quality rarely found anywhere in American business," Mr. Pratt said.

"There are half as many farmers today as there were 50 years ago, and they're feeding a population that has doubled in this century," he said. "They rank among the greatest users of technology the world has ever known."

Anyone who doubts it should visit a modern farm today. "What good is a new tractor, new breeding, feeding, and other production techniques, makes many of the old days look as if we and not the farmers are living in the horse-and-buggy days."

I don't know of another industry in the country that is producing more with less methods and equipment of the most part — of 1935 prices. Pratt said that 300 farmers

currently hold Land Bank loans in the 13 counties the association serves. Most of the loans have been used to expand, improve and modernize farm land and equipment. The largest category of borrowers (who are also Association members) produce cotton. Second are producers of livestock. The average size of the loan made by the Association in 1965 was \$20,000.00, compared with an average loan of \$76,000.00 in 1964.

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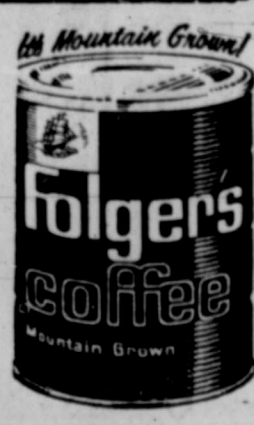

Activities will begin at 7 p. m. with families and people of all ages invited by the youth group, said announcement by the Methodist Messenger, Friday.

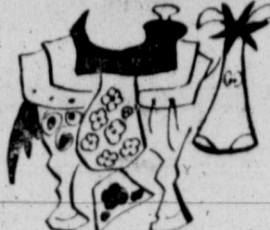

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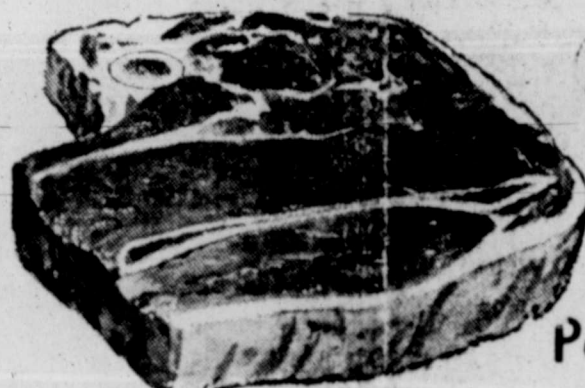
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
