Lindsay Awards Banquet recognizes 1994 achievers

Lindsay High School honored their students last Friday, May 20, at the annual All-Awards Banquet. The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the UIL Academic State Championship trophy. Pat Wisdom, UIL State Academic Director, presented the award to the school. Lindsay was the top Class 1A school in Texas after competing and winning at the district, regional and state levels. Wisdom noted that Lindsay exhibited curricular skills learned in and out of the classroom and took home top honors in eight different events - Current Issues and Events, Mathematics, Number Sense, Science, Spelling, Cross Examination Debate, Informative Speaking and One-Act Play. The total 180 points was three times as many points as the second place school and nearly twice as many as any school, 1A - 5A, in the state. "I congratulate all who took part in the culmination of this highly commendable achievement: students, faculty, administrators, parents and a supportive and nurturing community," concluded Ms. Wisdom as she presented the trophy to Jim Anderson, high school principal.

Sara Flusche opened the evening with the invocation. Rudy Zimmerer, Lindsay ISD Board president, gave the welcome and thanked the parents for their support. Gina Baugh gave the response.

Ms. Krin Perry, assistant director of Fine Arts Curriculum for the State of Texas, congratulated Lindsay School on their UIL

accomplishments "on behalf of the State of Texas, Commissioner of Education Skip Meno and Governor Ann Richards."

English teacher and UIL coordinator, Craig Hertel, introduced the One-Act Play and speaking and writing event participants.

Coach Larry Spruiell then introduced the girls basketball teams, tennis, cross country and girls golf participants. Coach John Metzler presented boys basketball players, followed by Coach Charles Meurer introducing the football and track teams. The audience enjoyed a poem, read by Meurer, highlighting the two seasons.

Science teacher, Kenny Lowrance, introduced the UIL science event participants. Elizabeth Fleitman named the prose and poetry event students, with Math teacher Troy Edes naming calculator applications, computer science, number sense and mathematics event participants. Carol Hyatt and Mary Holland announced their current events and business events students.

Switching back to sports, Tom Fluker named the boys golf team and music participants. Sonya Block, sponsor of the pep club, drill team and cheerleading squads, recognized their members.

Superintendent Gilbert Hermes presented outgoing school board member Carol Fuhrmann with a plaque before Hermes and Anderson presented students awards in honor roll, UIL and athletics.

Doug Hellinger closed the evening with the benediction.

County residents may choose Sherman or Denton for emergency ambulance transport

The Cooke County Emergency Medical Service will now transport accident and other emergency victims from the scene to the nearest trauma hospital outside of Cooke County upon request following a new policy approved this week by Cooke County commissioners.

The policy refers only to first responder calls, when an ambulance is initially called to an emergency scene, Bob Harbin, CCEMS administrator said. The county ambulance service no longer transports patients who are already at Cooke County hospitals to locations outside of Cooke County, a job which is now handled by

private ambulance companies, Harbin said.

While the new policy will give all Cooke County residents the option to be transported to the nearest out-of-county trauma unit if they fall within the new guidelines, many of those served are expected to be those who live near the Cooke-Grayson or Cooke-Denton county lines, Harbin said. The CCEMS will work with emergency room physicians at Gainesville Memorial Hospital to determine whether a patient can be directly transported to an out-of-county trauma unit from the scene, he said.

Residents eligible for Medicare who choose this option should be aware that Medicare will not pay for a transport outside of Cooke County. Should a victim choose to go to Denton or Sherman, they will be informed that they will be responsible for their own ambulance bill because Medicare will not pay for it, Harbin said.

The new policy came about after

many years of complaints from Cooke County residents who were involved in accidents or other emergency situations, but who had primary care physicians located in Denton or Sherman. The former policy mandated the ambulance service transport victims to either of the two Cooke County hospitals, neither of which have trauma units. "We're forcing them to go to a hospital when their physician is in another place," Harbin said. Many times, a victim would be immediately transferred out of county as soon as they reached a Cooke County hospital, he said. "That causes a great expense to the patient, with double ambulance bills and double hospital billing," Harbin said.

The county had not been able to allow such an option in the past because there were not enough backup ambulances available to cover for the ambulance that would be out of access while in route to Denton or Grayson county, Harbin

said. The Lake Kiowa Volunteer Fire Department has agreed to provide first responder backup to the CCEMS on calls where victims are being transported to nearby trauma units, Harbin said. "The key is allowing Lake Kiowa to work with us," he said. The Lake Kiowa department will provide an extra set of jaws of life, which will be used for backup extraction and rescue. Harbin said the only problem he sees with the new system would be if an ambulance was down due to maintenance problems, something which the EMS deals with anyway.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Kenneth Alexander, whose precinct lies within the southern Cooke County area that will be among the area most affected by the new policy, said he has received complaints for years about the in-county transport policy. "I get numerous complaints from people wanting to go to Denton because

Commissioners assess storm damage on county buildings

Buildings owned by Cooke County have more than \$70,000 in damage from storms that hit county earlier this month, with most being roof damage caused by hail, an adjuster for the Texas Association of Counties told commissioners this week.

The county's insurance will cover the cost of replacement of the roof of the Cooke County Library, which will cost an estimated \$13,150. Damage to the roof, air conditioning units and other minor repairs to the Cooke County Jail was estimated at \$24,978. The copper dome on top of the Cooke County Courthouse received an estimated \$23,100 in damage. Other buildings damaged included the tax office, which will cost an estimated \$7,000 to repair, the probation office, which has an estimated \$2,565 in damage, and the Cooke County Emergency Medical Building, which has roof damage of \$1,984.

Commissioner Kenneth

Alexander said most of the repair to county-owned buildings will require reglazing the shingles on the damaged roofs and repair of some broken windows. Some of the damage is more cosmetic, such as dents on air conditioning unit covers which remain fully functional. The damage to the copper dome on the Courthouse will include an additional cost for scaffolding, Alexander said. The storms which hit Cooke County included a tornado which caused major damage to a mobile home park and resulted in more than \$5 million in damage to various parts of the county, officials said.

In another matter, commissioners joined other Cooke County taxing entities in approving a six-year tax abatement to a rubber manufacturing company. The company is expected to begin operations in October and bring up to 150 new jobs to the county.

County commissioners approved the abatement for 999, Inc. (c)

which will operate as Rubber Urethane of Texas in a facility located within the Gainesville city limits along north Interstate 35. The 90 percent abatement from property taxes is restricted to the value of new or added real or personal property, such as new buildings or machinery, Gainesville City Manager Lyle Dresher said. Approximately \$1.3 million in existing real estate will remain on the tax rolls, and the company will pay property taxes on all existing property now at the site, Dresher said.

The company is projected to have an economic impact of \$31.2 million annually in the county, Dresher said. Annual payroll is expected to be about \$2.7 million, with hourly wages for employees ranging from \$6 to \$11 per hour. The company, which originally planned to move to Texas 10 years ago, is presently based in California, Dresher said.

Memories of World War II recalled

In observance of Memorial Day, May 30, 1994, a fiftieth anniversary of certain periods of WWII, this feature of "Memories of World War II" in *The Muenster Enterprise* will honor the life of Sgt. Frank Moster, who served in the 5th Army, 36th Division, 106th Cavalry Reconnaissance. Serving in the Recon Unit, he was trained in German and Italian languages, trained in Radio Intercept and in Code Breaking. He gave his life in Italy on Dec. 9, 1943 at age 26, dying of extensive abdominal injuries when the half-track was hit by an armor-piercing mortar round the day before. He survived surgery in a field hospital but died the next day.

Born at Mount Kisco, New York on July 12, 1917 to Italian immigrant parents, Pasquale and Catherine Peccaro, Frank was one of four children - he, Tony, Theresa and Steve - who were orphaned when the father and mother both died in the influenza epidemic that swept the country in 1921.

Along with thousands of others in similar circumstances, children were placed in orphanages. Noting the increasingly overcrowded orphanages, the Children's Aid Society of New York, for several years placed children in homes across America. More than 100,000 children were placed in homes by The Orphan's Train. Circulars were sent in advance to towns along the route and interested families would meet the train to select a child or children they wanted. Sometimes, the children's lot was improved - at other times, results were just the opposite. Paperwork was kept to a minimum. Families were asked only to provide the children an education and raise them in their faith.

One day an Orphan Train arrived at the Gainesville Depot. Fourteen children of assorted ages were taken off and taken to the Courthouse. There were four Catholic children on the train - Tony, Frank, Theresa and Steve. They spoke little English and were frightened and unsure of their fate. Tony had been born in Italy, the others in New York. Tony wanted to try to stay together as a family, at least he was determined to hang on to Theresa and go wherever she went. Steve was three or four at the time, Frank was scarcely two.

On their name tags, pinned to their shirts, was their mother's dying wish that they be placed with families near each other and given the opportunity to always know each other.

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Moster of Muenster, childless at the time, took Frank and Steve into their home. The boys grew up in Muenster and attended school here. Joe and Margaret Sicking of Gainesville, also childless, wanted a little girl and met the train for that reason. So they took Theresa and her big brother Tony. They grew up near Gainesville. The children were able to visit frequently.

The Mosters later had four children of their own - Florence, Joe, Charlie and Tommy (Brother Thomas Moster). In their late teens,

Steve and Frank moved in with the Sicking to help on their farm. Steve stayed on until he got a job with the road crew of Cooke County Precinct 4, and then was drafted in 1942 during WWII.

In 1938, Frank and Tony achieved national publicity when they made two trips across the continent on bicycles. On July 1, they left for a trip to New York, visited Mount Kisco, searched out their parents' graves, then back cross-country to California, carrying a small tent, bike repair kit, a suitcase, cooking equipment and several dozen of whatever they thought they needed to live next to nature. They pedaled 8,480 miles from July through Dec. 9, visiting 21 states and Canada.

At one time, their best speed was 95 miles in seven hours. They experienced nights under the stars, discomforts of rain, wind and mountain roads. They returned with a collection of autographs from many people, including governors of all the states they visited, official government seals and a lifetime of great memories. They shared these memories frequently with family, friends and a number of clubs and organizations where they were invited to speak.

In 1940, Frank Moster was employed in Muenster by the local refinery and then by the Cooke County Electric Co-op (REA). He enlisted in the service in February 1941, trained at Camp Bowie, also at Camp Blanding, Florida and Camp Edwards, Massachusetts. He went overseas with the 36th Division in March 1943; was stationed in the African sector before going to Italy. He was a member of a reconnaissance company with the 5th Army and was on duty in Salerno, Italy. Among honors he earned were the Purple Heart, Campaign Ribbons and Service Bars.

After the war, Frank Moster's body was brought home for reburial. Requiem Mass was held in Sacred Heart Church followed by full military rites in Sacred Heart Cemetery. An earlier service had been held shortly after his death, when a Memorial Mass was offered in St. Mary's Church in Gainesville.

Always closeknit, Tony, Theresa and Steve, and Steve's wife, Mary, endured the trauma of Frank's death. Tony and Steve were in the service when Frank died. Theresa remained to care for her widowed mother. Tony died in 1977; Theresa in 1983; and Steve in 1991.

Memories of My Lifelong Friend, Frank Moster

These are some of my memories of my lifelong friend, Frank Moster, from age five or six until the day I heard of his death in Italy, injured in combat and dying later in a military field hospital. My sister at *The Muenster Enterprise* asked me to give this account, especially of my last visits with him earlier, just days or hours before he died.

street. One occasion is particularly vivid. We had a ball, but no bat. Our only bat was a too-long bois d'arc post.

I was the pitcher but I won't say who was the batter. He missed, lost his grip and the bat hit my brother Bill across the face. The game was suddenly over - Bill and I ran home screaming for Mom - Steve and Frank ran home to Mrs. Schmitz's protection. That event passed eventually. But Frank was waiting for an opportunity to redeem himself with Mom. One day, he saw Mom's chickens in her garden. He knew his salvation was at hand. But, horror of horrors, Mom came home and saw Frank in the middle of her flowers. He reasoned that this last state was worse than the first. But he was only the victim of circumstances and the families remained close friends.

When I was about 12 or 13, we moved to the farm and Frank and Steve were staying with the Mosters. Travel for them was wonderful in my eyes - on horseback! And Frank gave me rides home from school on horseback! My buddy for life!

After high school, Frank and Steve went to live with their brother Tony and sister Theresa near Gainesville and all our families continued close. On visits there, the boys gave me my first lessons in self-defense - "pugilistics" they called it.

In 1936, my first year out of high school, I took a course in accounting from St. Mary's School in Gainesville and I was able to return the favor of horseback rides to Frank with motorcycle rides to school. There was one more passenger, Ray Bezner, son of John Bezner. Ray gave me a tank of gas once in a while. The tank held all of two gallons - we got 65 miles to a gallon of gas.

In 1940, the military draft faced us. Frank volunteered and was assigned to the Texas National Guard 36th Division in training at Camp Wolters, Texas. On one special weekend, Frank was home - he, Steve and Mary, Leona and I went across the river on a Sunday afternoon. Frank needed to hightail it back to Gainesville to catch the bus for Camp Wolters or be AWOL. On the way back from "across the river toward Gainesville," we were not very popular with "that bus" following us, but Steve and his trusty car, named "Cesar" got Frank to the station ahead of the bus.

From that day on, happy days were behind us. The DAY OF INFAMY came on Dec. 7, 1941. I was drafted, inducted at Camp Wolters, but did not meet Frank there. Eventually, I was assigned to the 82nd Airborne and transferred overseas.

We were in Africa for several months preparing for the invasion of Sicily. After a few months, we were moved again into Italy south of Naples. The retreating German Army had destroyed the electric power plant and most everything else, but Mt. Vesuvius with its plume of smoke was still a mark for a target. The German bombers came at night to hit ships in the bay. In Naples, I met Frank Moster for

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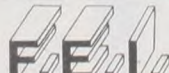

the second last time. I have long forgotten how he found me. We had a great visit and made plans for when we would be back in Muenster again. He talked about his work, as a radio operator on an armored half track.

Our last visit was a couple of weeks later. When I got back to quarters, I found a note on my cot, in Frank's handwriting: "Surprise inspection. Your rifle is dirty. You are gigged. Report for extra duty." But when I got to where he was stationed, that happy-go-lucky attitude was quiet. A change was in the air. Guardian angels pulled extra duty from that day on.

A few days later, we left our present location with full pack, boarded a large ship by climbing a rope net hung over the side. I again learned a tremendous respect for the Navy. We were hardly aboard, before the ship was underway and winches were closing hatches. And soon we heard the voice of Berlin Betty, more affectionately Betty the Berlin Bitch, speaking to us: "Oh, gee, you men of the 82nd, sorry to see you leave. We know you are going through the Strait of Gibraltar, but you will never live to see Gibraltar."

We went in all kinds of directions for 10 days. Rumor was strong that we were heading back to New York to train incoming draftees. But we ended up in Northern Ireland, and preparations were being made for the Invasion of Normandy on the French Coast. While I was stationed in Ireland, I received a letter from home telling me that Frank Moster had died of injuries while on duty in Italy. Leona and my parents had not heard from me for three months and feared the worst.

The last opportunity I had to show my respect for Frank was at his military funeral, after the war ended and after the men returned home. I was honored to play the bugle for Taps for my best lifelong friend.

My Memories of My Adopted Brother, Frank Moster by Florence Grewing

Frank Moster was my big brother and my hero when he went off to war. I was the kid sister back home, eagerly checking the mailbox for the letters he promised to write when he left. He was usually upbeat when he wrote, remembering such things as Mom's good coffee and her chocolate pie.

He wanted to buy a piano for me and arrange for music lessons. He was going to buy my high school prom gown and, when he came home, we were going to paint the town red! I felt like Cinderella. After all, it wasn't that long ago that he and Steve had surprised me with a shiny new pair of roller skates for my birthday.

My dream died one sad December day when I was told that Frank had died of injuries received in action in Italy.

Frank and Steve Moster were my adopted brothers. Their birthparents were Italian immigrants settling in Mount Kisco, New York where they are buried. It seems ironic that Frank would die in the land of his ancestors.

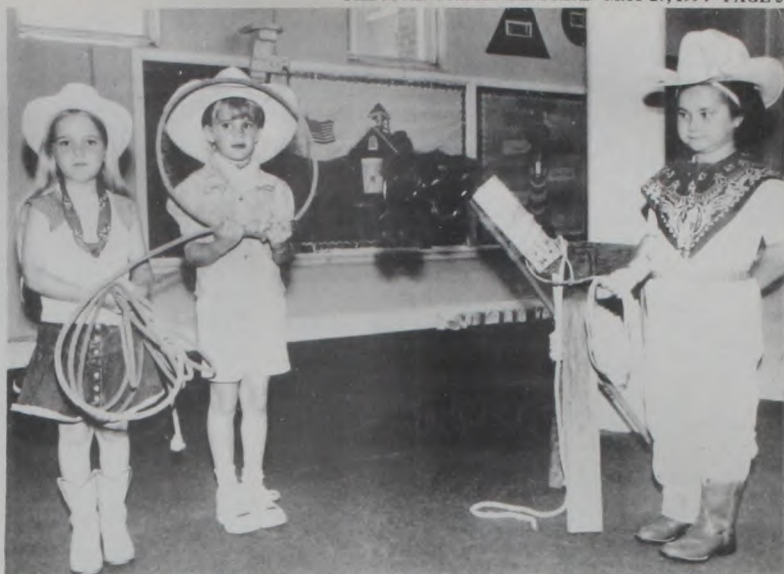

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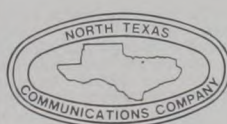
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Muenster Elementary students practice "Save the Earth" techniques

Led by teachers Darla Lile and Sheila Jones, they launched a massive recycling effort that included the placement of recycling bins outside their classrooms. Students filled them with empty containers and paper from home and school. They chose to use cloth napkins instead of paper in the lunchroom and discussed how erosion can be prevented by planting trees and other vegetation. Like the kindergarten, the first graders also worked to clean up the area around school by adopting Seventh Street as a litter-free zone.

Lisa Hettler and Melinda Fuhrmann's second grade classes discussed the Earth's need for pure water and clean oceans. The students drew posters that displayed different kinds of water pollution such as oil spills and chemical wastes. They also talked about the effects of pollution on human and

marine life and ways to prevent it through such methods as organic farming.

Third grade classes joined the second grade in choosing the theme of the earth's water. Their efforts included various scientific projects. Teachers Amy Popp and Becky Scott helped the students develop water filtration systems that actually purified muddy water. They learned about the water cycle through a "rain in the jar" experiment that displayed how vegetation and water are essential to the earth's delicate ecosystem. Third graders also made solar cooker boxes that use no electricity, gas or chemicals. They tested their natural appliances by cooking nachos.

Michelle Darling's fourth graders worked to educate other students and their parents about the importance of keeping the air clean. They discussed how chemicals destroy the much-needed ozone layer that protects plant and animal life from harmful ultraviolet rays. The students also invented air cleaning machines to purify polluted air.

Marjorie Alsop's fifth grade class also studied air and air pollution. The students researched and wrote reports discussing various kinds of air pollution and its prevention. This research revealed that everyday appliances such as air conditioners, lawn mowers and refrigerators cause serious damage to ozone gases. They also discovered various substitutes for the damaging chlorofluorocarbons used in aerosol cans and styrofoam.

The students throughout the elementary school shared and displayed their projects and findings by visiting other classrooms.

Pressure canner gauges to be checked June 2

Homemakers may have their pressure canner gauges checked Thursday, June 2, from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon in the County Extension office. It takes only a few moments to check the gauge using a Master Gauge Tester, so homemakers may bring their canner lids at any time during the scheduled check time.

If gauges need to be replaced, or if an adjusted temperature is needed, the check will give this information. If you need a gauge checked but cannot bring it on the designated day, you may bring it earlier and leave it or call 668-5412. A pressure canner in safe working order is the key to "get-ready" plans for home canning all vegetables.

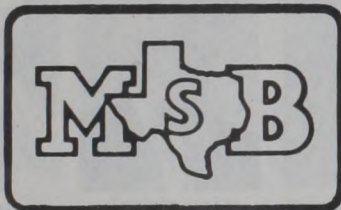

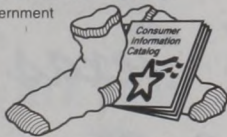

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Emergency Farm Loan applications being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe storms and tornadoes are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Gainesville, FmHA County Supervisor James B. Murdock said this week.

On May 5, President Clinton amended the major disaster declaration for the State of Texas closing the incidence period for the disaster effective May 4, 1994.

Cooke and Denton counties are two of 11 counties in Texas recently named by President Clinton as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from damages and losses caused by severe storms and tornadoes.

Murdock said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent

loss of production to be eligible for an emergency loan," Murdock said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Dec. 29, 1994, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Murdock said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office, located at 4504-B West Highway 82 in Gainesville, is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Inspectors can't do their jobs

The field inspectors at the Texas Department of Agriculture can't do their jobs properly because they can't get basic necessities like thermometers and barometers to check the quality of eggs, correspondence from the department shows.

In notes collected through "Total Quality Management" meetings in the state, the memorandum details inspectors' gripes with the current administration. Among the points of dissatisfaction are lack of equipment and supplies.

"This lack of basic equipment is right in line with the way that department's being run," Marvin Gregory, a candidate aiming to change the department, said recently after receiving the documents. "The inspectors don't even have thermometers to check the temperature of eggs in the grocery stores. They don't even have magnifying glasses to use to inspect the nursery plants. How can consumers have any confidence when the inspectors can't do their jobs?"

Gregory said the budget cuts that have produced this bankruptcy of equipment are the same ones used to fuel the super-bureaucracy created in the present administration. "There's \$900,000 in excess salary in Austin right now. That's what having 14 assistants to the commissioner does. Mr. (Rick) Perry is constantly attacking other administrations about their super-bureaucracies. And, he's not cleaning up his own department."

The Feb. 15 memorandum details the needed equipment, including magnifying glasses, spare tire locks, candle boxes, grading keys, first aid kits, fire extinguishers, safety glasses, gloves, fish eye mirrors, smocks for inspection, extension cords and Mapsco's. The supplies are items needed for routine

State law requires applications in 40 days

A state law requires seed producers, who want their crop certified as disease-free for export, to submit field application inspections to the Texas Department of Agriculture within 40 days of planting, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

"Last year we had a number of farmers who sent in their applications more than 40 days after planting and, as a result, some fields were not inspected before harvest," Perry said.

Each year TDA's phytosanitary certification program conducts about 1,000 field inspections of crops grown to produce seed for export such as sorghum, sunflower and corn. TDA inspectors certify that the crops are free of certain plant diseases, which is a requirement mandated by some countries for seeds exported from Texas.

inspections of consumer goods, such as grocery store items. Other supplies are used in inspections of gas pumps to insure accuracy and assure workers' safety.

The inspectors also complained, the notes show, that paperwork supplies were not received on time from Austin. Supplies include the forms used to grade and certify businesses, such as nurseries.

Among the suggested solutions is for the lead inspector to be responsible for meeting equipment needs. Inspectors are not expected to buy their own supplies. Equipment and supplies are purchased through the department.

Gregory said, "Mr. Perry's been in office for more than three years, and he's still got people trying to figure out how to buy supplies. It's just another thing that backs up what I've been saying. He just doesn't understand agriculture and this department."

Gregory, a Democrat from Hopkins County, said he advocates slimming the top of the department, eliminating 10 of the top administrative positions. "Bringing that number down to four will give us the money to get those inspectors back to working with the right equipment. Plus, we'll be able to hire more field representatives to help out."

In addition, Gregory said the current administration has created a super-bureaucracy out of the Texas Department of Agriculture while lambasting other administrators about their hierarchies. "He's constantly saying, 'Get rid of the bureaucracy.' But he doesn't have the know-how to do it in his own department."

Gregory and Perry, a Democrat-turned-Republican, face each other in November's general election.

County Agent's Report

The pecan nut casebearer is the most common insect pest facing Texas pecan producers. It is found in almost all the pecan growing areas of Texas and can cause serious crop loss nearly every year if left uncontrolled. Casebearer larvae tunnel into nutlets shortly after pollination, often destroying all of the nutlets in a cluster. The most effective and reliable method of control is a well-timed insecticide application(s) made in the spring to kill hatching larvae before they tunnel into the nutlets.

The pecan nut casebearer completes several generations each year. Adults of the overwintering generation emerge in April and May throughout Texas and lay eggs on pecan nutlets soon after pollination. These eggs result in first generation larvae which feed

Diesel Permit for farmers

Several thousand Texas farmers and ranchers who hold Diesel Tax Prepaid User Permits in order to get tax-exempt diesel delivered to their operations are being invited by State Comptroller John Sharp to apply for a diesel Fuel Bonded User Permit. The reason is an EPA rule that, effective Oct. 1, 1993, prohibits the burning of high-sulfur diesel fuel in highway vehicles. The agricultural producers had basically two options: Install a separate on-site storage tank or buy the low-sulfur diesel at gas stations and pay the tax. their doctor is there," he said. "It's their (the people's) ambulance service, so we need to figure a way out to serve them."

Precinct 4 Commissioner Virgil Hess was concerned that the policy could open the door to people requesting transport hospitals outside the nearest trauma units, such as in Dallas or Fort Worth. "I have no problem with what you're proposing, but what would we do if people started to ask to go to Dallas or Fort Worth?" Hess asked. Harbin said the only reason the CCEMS was able to propose the new policy at this time was because of the Lake Kiowa department's commitment to provide backup. "There's no way we could cover that," Harbin said. Taking victims longer distances would take ambulances out of the county for four or more hours, which would leave the county without adequate protection, he said.

on nutlets and generally cause the most damage. Second generation larvae attack the nuts in mid-summer about 6 weeks after nut entry by first generation larvae. Third generation eggs are deposited on nuts from late July to early September. These larvae feed only in the shucks if the pecan shells have hardened.

First generation larvae feeding on nutlets usually have the greatest potential to cause economic loss. For this reason, control is directed primarily at this spring generation.

Insecticide applications must be accurately timed to control newly hatched casebearer larvae before they enter the nuts. Once inside, larvae are protected from insecticide treatments.

In the spring, nutlets should be carefully examined for casebearer eggs to determine 1) if egg infestations are great enough to justify treatment and 2) the optimum timing of an insecticide application.

The period of peak egg lay often occurs during a two week period in late May and early June in North Texas.

One method of predicting egg lay is the use of a computer model developed at Texas A&M which uses heat units or degree-days. Temperature data are compiled from cities throughout Texas and used in the model to predict the date when the first significant nut entry by casebearer larvae will occur. This date is the predicted optimum spray date. Around June 1 is the prediction date for Cooke County.

Computer predictions are best used to determine when to look for eggs and to plan insecticide applications. Orchard scouting for eggs should begin a week before the predicted spray date as unusual weather conditions near the spray date can accelerate or delay egg laying activity.

Dr. Allen Knutson, Extension Entomologist, offers the following tips for scouting.

Most casebearer eggs are found at the tip of the nutlet, either on the top (stigma) or hidden just under the tiny leaves (sepals) at the tip of the nutlet. A good hand lens is necessary to identify casebearer eggs and determine their development (hatched, white or pink). Also, look for bud feeding just below the nut cluster to detect the presence of newly hatched larvae.

A good way to sample the orchard is to examine ten nut clusters on each of 30 trees. If 1 to 2 percent (3-6 in 300) of the nut clusters are infested with eggs or newly hatched larvae, an economic infestation is likely to develop and treatment is recommended. Determine eggs color and hatch to time application.

If no or very few eggs are found, scout the orchard again in 2 to 3 days. Rain and cool weather can delay or extend the egg laying period.

Nut clusters with eggs can be tagged with a piece of ribbon and checked each day to determine when hatch occurs. The insecticide should be applied 1 to 2 days after the first eggs hatch, or as soon as nut entry by larvae is first observed. By delaying the treatment, the residual activity of the insecticide is maximized. However, the time required to treat the orchard, and possible delays in spraying caused by weather, should be considered so that the insecticide can be applied before many larvae tunnel into nutlets.

Insecticide sprays should be applied with caution in backyard and urban areas because of the great potential for spray drift onto nearby gardens, pets and living areas.

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
