

Average Housewife Pays \$3.17 In Federal Taxes In One Day

Gloucester, Mass.—A young friend of mine arrived home the other night to find his wife on the war path. She had kept account for the first time of every cent she had spent that day on taxes. First she went shopping for some of the articles used in most homes as regular necessities. She bought a small container of deodorant (Fed. tax \$.08), and one larger container (Fed. tax \$.12). She also bought one can of baby powder (Fed. tax \$.10), a bottle of baby oil (Fed. tax \$.20), and one medium sized jar of hand lotion (Fed.



tax \$.09). Any woman who does all of her own housework will tell you that the last mentioned item is no luxury. **Everyone Pays** Next, my friend's wife paid two bills, one for her husband's safe deposit box (Fed. tax \$1.00) where a very few government bonds repose. At the telephone company where she paid her second bill, there was a Federal tax of \$.56 for "local service and equipment", another \$.38 on "message units", and another \$.13 on a nearby toll call. The bill was \$7.82. \$1.07 of this amount went to the Government. That same morning she had the family car filled with gas. This tax amounted to \$.45 on 10 gallons, as the Mass. state tax is \$.03 on each gallon and the Fed.

tax is \$.014. All these taxes are in addition to the taxes the corporations (which are already taxed): the hit pay. At noon, this young housewife, sick and tired of Federal and State taxes, went to a restaurant for lunch—one where she could get a "99c special." A choice of beverage was included. She decided to have tea—"iced". When the bill came she found that 5c had been added for the ice. The bill was \$1.10. She figured that having her tea had cost her 11c extra, 6c of that amount going straight to the State Government for the "old age" tax. **Multiplication** The above little story explains why this housewife came home angry and resentful. She had turned over in that one morning

\$2.81 in taxes to the Federal Government and \$.36 to the State—a total of \$3.17. She had not bought what seemed to her, or to any thinking person, a single luxury. Small potatoes? Multiply that amount by all other housewives in the United States out on a normal morning's activities and you will see where the money for social experiments is coming from,—out of your own pockets. C. E. Gleander (Ohio Tax Commissioner and Pres. of the Nat'l Assoc. of Tax Administrators) says that in the past 30 years annual taxes in the U. S. A. have risen 1,500%. Someone has estimated that when a baby is born in the United States he can count on spending several thousands of dollars in gasoline taxes

alone before he dies. "There are 200 separate taxes in the price of gasoline levied at different stages of processing from the oil well to the gas pump," according to the American Petroleum Institute. **Where Is It Going?** You can figure that you are working for at least three months of every year entirely for the Government, not keeping a cent from your labors during that period for living expenses. These taxes are enough to support one government employee for about every seven families in the U. S. In the last 20 years the population of the United States has increased 21%. The Federal employee increase has been 250%. It is your money which is being spent on all

"security experiments". If you save a dollar for the future you have that dollar, plus the interest it earns ready and waiting for you when you need it. But when you hand over a dollar to the Government in taxes, you have very little to show for it. A national health program, for instance, would call for almost as many more Government employees to operate it, and keep the records, as it would require doctors. Your doctor's bills might be less; but your taxes would be more. All these "social programs" mean higher taxes for you, both on income directly and also on what you buy. It is well said that "Government has nothing except what the working taxpayer gives it." You are the working taxpayer. What is

your desire, to spend your money as you see fit or to nearly one third of it over, year, to the government spend? Upon your choice depends the freedom of the dual in this country.

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Garza and the World

While the nation slowly crucifies Gen. Harry Vaughn, who happened to get caught doing the things that it seemed everybody in high government circles was doing during my tenure with Uncle Sam, we will concern ourselves—today at least—with a situation here at home.

Everyone is still talking about the Junior Rodeo. It was a shot-in-the arm to this sleepy community. Up and down Main Street the business men—only a mere handful of whom made a sacrifice to help the boys and girls in the promotion of either last year's or this year's show—are talking about how good it was for business and saying: "We've got something that's going to get bigger and bigger. Believe me, I'm going to help 'em every way I can next year."

We do have something that can grow bigger and bigger, if everybody will show the enthusiasm in getting ready for next year's show as they are showing in talking about it now.

Frankly, George Samson, Alvin Davis, Homer McCrary, Phil Boucher, the junior rodeo directors, and others who have given their time to the last two junior rodeos—whether they could spare it or not—have every reason to be genuinely disappointed and disillusioned at the way the local business firms let the boys down in the rodeo parade which three newsreel companies came here to cover for more than 8,000,000 of the nation's movie fans. It had been well advertised that the newsreel cameramen would be here for such a purpose and that floats were needed to make the parade look like the people of Post were behind the boys and girls in this exciting entertainment project.

I talked to several business men who didn't have floats—including the management of the Post Dispatch—last week and their excuse was that they "just didn't have time." Unfortunately this situation is likely to exist next year because the person who has lots of time nowadays seldom has money enough to finance the colored paper that it takes to decorate a float, or to buy the gasoline that it would take to get a borrowed vehicle up and down the street during the parade.

The three newsreel companies, giving national advertising to the Junior Rodeo, could do more than anything else to make next year's show live up to the glamor implied in its slogan, "The World's Original All-Junior Rodeo." But if you've ever been to a movie and seen nationally circulated newsreels you will notice that little, if any foot-age, is given to run-of-the-mill events, such as a block long parade of kids on horses, four or five floats and no band. Next time you go to a movie, look at the colorful parades staged by the events that merit national attention.

We can give glamor to our

Junior Rodeo, if we will get out of our rut and contribute our share to something which can put Post on the wholesome entertainment map. Next year, let's give 'em a parade that will be long remembered by the spectators and performers from everywhere.

Next year, let's open all of our homes to the visiting boys and girls and their folks who accompany them here. Let's help them find accommodations for their horses, even if we have to figure out a way to build a stable.

It's not too early to be making arrangements for next year's rodeo, because the big things aren't dreamed up in a week or two. It's time now to be dreaming up some other kinds of glamor and begin publicizing same. Let's get a western movie star—Little Beaver, or Roy Rogers or some other idol of the boys and girls—to make an official Junior Rodeo appearance here.

Let's do things up big, because everybody wants to help now and there is plenty of time to make use of everybody's willingness to help. Let's give a big barbecue out on Buffalo Point (above Cooper's Canyon) or some other picturesque spot, in honor of our visiting movie star or stars, and invite as special guests representatives of the big Southwest-ern newspapers like the Denver Post, Amarillo Globe-News, Daily Oklahoman, Ft. Worth Star-Telegram and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, and the cattlemen's magazines, Life and Holiday magazines, the farm and ranch journals, the newsreels and the radio stations and others who can help us establish a tradition.

These engagements have to be booked months ahead of time. Alvin Davis has a letter from Holiday Magazine saying it would have covered the 1949 Junior Rodeo had it not just recently devoted several issues to Texas and was now booked up with the glamor of other states. Life Magazine, no doubt, would have covered this year's show, had it known about it before running the rodeo theme thru the ground for the current summer.

The time to attend to these things is now—while everybody is popping off about being willing to help.

We have an energetic Junior Rodeo manager and Chamber of Commerce secretary who knows how to get the things done almost single-handedly. He has proved this—but how do we know he will keep up his enthusiasm while the merchants sleep.

Let's not allow him to become discouraged and disillusioned. Let's help him and his small crew of faithful workers make this Junior Rodeo bigger and bigger.

A notice on page 2 said that bids would be received by the Post Sanitarium until Tuesday noon for an eight-room addition to the hospital building.

Research On Cotton Fiber Approved For Tech Laboratories

A research project to be conducted at Texas Tech on the nature and adaptability of cotton fiber has been approved by the Cotton Research Committee of Texas. Purpose of the project is to find a way to produce cotton fabric as rapidly as synthetics are produced by the new Tricot knitter.

The Tricot constitutes a genuine threat to the cotton industry, says John Leahy, director of the committee, because it can weave synthetic fabrics 800 times faster than cotton fabrics can be loomed.

The position of research associate was set up by the committee for Tech with salary of \$5,500. An appropriation of \$37,120 was acknowledged for salaries and maintenance. A donation of \$9,000 will cover the purchase of a cotton bailing press and a comb for irrigation produced long staple cotton.

Texas A&M and the University of Texas are to conduct studies of cottonseed and cotton marketing, respectively.

Herbert Kleke, laboratory superintendent at Tech for the Cotton Research Committee will aid in the project.

**Correct Grazing Is
Important In Range
Conservation Work**

Conservation of pastures can only be accomplished by attention to correct grazing, according to observations of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. This includes: (1) grazing during proper seasons, (2) good distribution of stock, and (3) correct number of livestock.

The proper season of grazing is important in range maintenance because of the damage to plants during the early growing season. In the spring, a plant sends up green shoots manufactured from food reserves stored over winter in the roots. This process uses up all of the reserve food and, until new shoots begin to produce more food to replenish the root storage cells, the plant is in a weakened condition. At this time, a plant is easily damaged or set back by grazing.

Proper distribution of stock will provide a longer grazing season and better use of forage. Animals naturally congregate at certain points such as water holes and low or level areas. Steep places and areas far from water are used later. This brings about too heavy use of accessible areas and making it necessary to graze fewer animals. By the use of cross fences, salting and watering development, better use can be made of the forage.

Cottonseed Loan Details Released By PMA Chairman

Details of the cottonseed loan program through which the Commodity Credit Corporation will support the price of 1949 crop cottonseed have been announced by Howard T. Kingsbery, acting chairman, State P. M. A. Committee.

Kingsbery says "Loans will be made at the rate of \$49.50 per ton on clean safely-stored cottonseed having a moisture content of 10 per cent or less. Seed may be stored on or off the farm. Non-recourse loans will be made to farmers through Dec. 31, 1949. These loans will mature April 30, 1950, and will bear 4 per cent interest per annum.

Kingsbery points out that farmers have the option of paying off the loan, plus interest, at any time before maturity date and repossessing the seed. If the loan is not paid off by April 30, 1950, the farmer must deliver the seed to C. C. C. in settlement of the loan.

Applications for loans may be filed at the office of the County Agricultural Conservation Association (AAA). Farmers may bring a sample of their seed with them when applying for a loan. These seed will be sent to a testing laboratory and, as soon as the test can be made, the producer may receive his loan money either at the A. C. A. office or through a local lending agency.

Kingsbery also announced that the C. C. C. construction loan program, which has been available to grain producers, is being extended to cottonseed producers. Farmers who do not have enough storage space for their cottonseed can get a C. C. C. con-

struction loan up to 85 per cent of the cost of the needed structure. These construction loans bear 4 per cent interest and will be made for terms as long as five years. County ACA committees have full details regarding these loans.

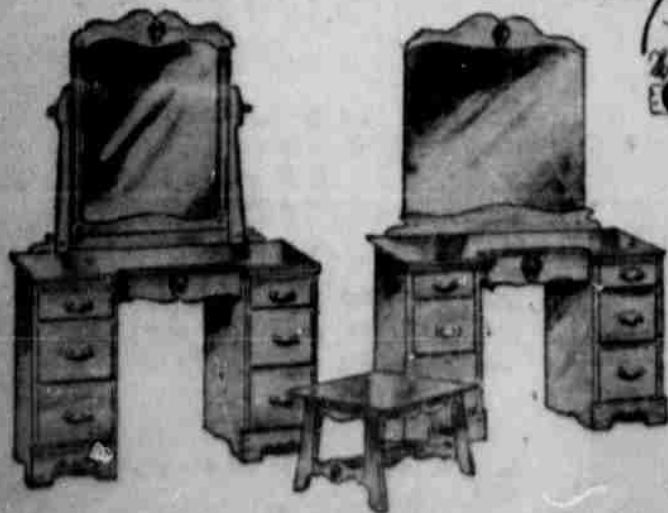

Rye And Vetch Seed Are Available Here

Farmers and ranchers who are planning on planting rye and vetch this fall should be locating their seed now and getting their fertilizer ordered, soil conservation technicians believe. Good planting time for these cover crops is around the first and second week in September, providing there is enough moisture that will germinate the seed. Vetch seeds must be inoculated and planted in moisture that will germinate the seed. Rye seed may be purchased from C. P. Witt in the Calgary community or from W. F. Norman in the Barnum Springs community. For vetch seed and fertilizer, cooperators should see their local feed dealers.

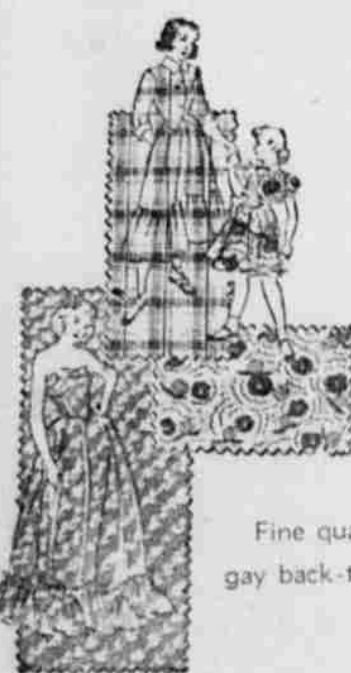
