DALLAS, Dec. 5.—O. C. Baleyman, vice-president of the Texas and Pacific Northern railroad, announced today he had been advised Houston and Galveston had withdrawn their pleas of intervention in opposition to the proposed extension of the Texas and Pacific railroad in West Texas.

A telegram received from the East Texas Chamber of Commerce notified Baleyman that body would intervene in favor of the construction.

Farm Board Report Is Made To Congress

ADVICE GIVEN FARMERS IS REPEATED

PRODUCTION MUST BE ADJUSTED TO DEMAND IS BOARD'S WORD

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The Farm board reported to Congress today that agriculture, to achieve a parity with industry, must adjust production to consumption and perfect a self-controlled, economic system of distribution.

The first annual report of the board contained the views, along with a summary of the past year's studies, accomplishments and experiments.

Out of its own experience with wheat and cotton the board was able to tell the legislators that stabilization operations, without the backing of adjusted production, have a limited field. The board members pointed to the results of their own stabilization efforts as an indication of some of the "difficulties and hazards" involved.

Touch on Cotton Particularly they said, did the failure of cotton producers to curtail acreage substantially in 1930, lead to defeat of stabilization measures.

As for wheat, the board said it had concluded the world outlook would remain gloomy through 1937 with the general price trend downward.

"The board could see no hope," it said, "for arresting such a movement or preventing its serious consequences to American wheat farmers, by co-operative marketing as such, by stabilization measures of the type already employed, or through adopting any of the proposed measures designed to dispose of the surplus abroad at prices below domestic levels."

Must Cut Acreage "The obvious economic remedy is curtailment of production so that the surplus can be absorbed."

COLD SNAP BRINGS SCUM OF ICE AND FROST TO SOUTH PLAINS; ROADS ARE DRYING RAPIDLY AFTER HEAVY RAINS

Lubbock awoke this morning to find a skum of ice on all water left outside and a heavy frost, following the rains of Thursday which exceeded an inch.

Despite the ice and frost, the thermometer here showed a minimum station did not go lower than 33 degrees during the night. At 7 o'clock this morning it was one degree warmer.

Yesterday's range during the day was from 47 for the maximum to 41 for the minimum.

Roads Are Drying Reports to the union bus terminal this morning indicated that while roads were drying up fast, that some were still in "pretty bad shape." The rains extended north and south and to the west, covering most of the territory served out of Lubbock. Eastern lines also were in the rain area.

By noon all service was expected to be normal. Coaches left here as usual this morning.

Reports received by the Santa Fe and Fort Worth and Denver lines indicated that similar conditions to those in Lubbock prevailed over the territory. No rains were reported last night.

Grim Reaper Cheated By Science

Man, At Death's Door, Restored To Perfect Health In Period Of 48 Hours

COLD SPRING HARBOR, N. Y., Dec. 5.—Restoration of a man from death's door to apparently perfect health in 48 hours was revealed today at the Biological laboratory.

The man saved, a patient at the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minn., had Addison's disease.

At the clinic a purified hormone was injected directly into the veins of a farmer, 39 years old by Dr. Leonard G. Rowntree and Dr. Carl H. Greene.

"Before its use," they reported, "the patient was excessively weak, bedridden, depressed, nauseated, losing weight and showed evidence of failing circulation. Within 48 hours he had taken a few leas on life, his appetite was excellent, his strength was greatly improved and he appeared to be in perfect health."

Adison's disease, due to failure of man's adrenal glands, has been recorded in the past in medical literature as invariably fatal.

The hormone used was an extract of the cortex of the adrenal glands of rattle, obtained in the past few weeks in unusually pure form by Dr. W. W. Swingle and Dr. J. J. Piffner of the Biological laboratory and of Princeton university.

These scientists first announced the extract in March, this year, but it was not then entirely pure, containing some epinephrine, a powerful heart stimulant which is secreted by the same glands.

Presence of this stimulant made it dangerous to inject the new remedy directly into the veins of human beings. It had to be administered by a slower method, subcutaneous injection, which caused considerable irritation.

Doctors Swingle and Piffner now announce that recently they have found a method of getting the extract so pure that it contains only one part in one or two million of epinephrine.

HUSBAND SHOTS WIFE AND FRIEND

BRECKENRIDGE, Dec. 5 (AP)—Mrs. Adias Post of Breckenridge and Ted Mecklenburg of New Gulf were taken to a hospital with gunshot wounds today after a shooting in an apartment house. B. D. Post, the wounded woman's husband, surrendered after the shooting.

Mecklenburg was believed fatally wounded. He was shot in the chin. Mrs. Post's injury was not serious, a bullet having entered her right knee.

HIJACKING IS A MYSTERY

PLAINVIEW FACTS ARE WITHHELD; MAN IS HIT BY THUGS The Plainview Evening Herald reported to the Journal this afternoon that its staff was working on a hijacking story, facts in which were being withheld by Plainview officers and individuals involved.

The Herald's scant information was to the effect that five or six masked men had early this morning held up Dave M. Thompson, of the farm implement firm of Cox and Thompson, as he alighted from his car in front of his place of business in Plainview.

Safe Is Rifled After knocking Thompson unconscious the hijackers entered the storehouse and rifled the safe. The Herald said amount of the robbery was not made public but that it was rumored to have been \$30,000.

Chief of Police John Lemond and Deputy Sheriff O. B. Conley said here this morning that they had been advised of the hijacking but had not been given any immediate facts.

ICC Tells Carriers To Cut Cotton Rate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Southern and Southwestern carriers handling cotton to Galveston with a recompression privilege, today were ordered by the Interstate Commerce commission to reduce rates.

The commission directed that the rate from Mississippi points to Galveston should not exceed 92 cents a 100 pounds, and from points in Alabama and Tennessee should not exceed 95 cents. The new rates are to be filed not later than February 23, 1931.

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BCD GROUP TO WORK ON TAX PAYMENTS

COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO STUDY PLAN FOR AIDING CITIZENS

In an effort to lighten the burden of taxation and to minimize the payment of state, county, city and school fees, directors of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and Board of Civil Development this morning authorized the appointment of a committee to investigate present methods of payment. The committee will cooperate with other organizations of the state in seeking a more convenient and less burdensome method of collection.

According to the directors if taxes could be paid in semi-yearly or quarterly payments a large majority of taxpayers would be benefited materially.

All Come at Once With all taxes, state, county, city and school district, coming due at one time, the first of the year, with the added expenditures of Christmas, a majority of taxpayers find the payment a real burden. Directors pointed out that tax funds are sent over the twelve month period, therefore, no useful purpose is served by the various governmental agencies collecting all taxes at one time.

The committee to be appointed will first determine whether or not it would be advantageous to pay taxes on the installment plan and if so will determine whether or not under the present laws any of the

MARYLAND SOURCE OF SUPPLY DIMINISHED BY OFFICIALS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Federal prohibition agents and Washington police reported their first successful today in a joint drive to halt the production of liquor in southern Maryland and its flow into the capital.

A blockade across six entrances to the city, kept every minute since Monday, resulted in capture of two liquor runners and 15 cases of contraband.

Nine Stills Taken Meanwhile, word was received from the office of a federal agent in southern Maryland, that nine stills and 75 gallons of liquor had been seized. The stills were scattered over 154 miles.

CHRISTMAS SEASON IS USHERED IN TONIGHT BY TECH STUDENTS

Featuring a three-part play, "Town of Bethlehem," sponsored by the Thespian and Sock and Buskin dramatic clubs of Texas Technological college, students of the local institution tonight will usher in the Christmas season with an entertainment at the college gymnasium.

Singing of Christmas carols also will be included in the evening's entertainment, which is to start at 8 o'clock. Singing will be under direction of W. R. Waghorne.

The scene of the nativity opens the play which tells the story of several characters, with the influence of Christ as a background. Faustina, daughter of a noble Roman, has scorned the women of Nazareth and refused to give her room in the inn. This role is taken by Miss Eileen Graves.

Carleton, a young Greek poet, declares his love for Faustina but she accepts Pompeius, nephew of Caesar, instead. The second part is an interlude and Faustina, who has been stricken with leprosy, is deserted by Pompeius and wanders over the hills.

The last scene is laid near the cell of David after thirty years have elapsed. Carleton, now in favor, has looked for Faustina for years without success. In wandering over the hills, she is told of a man with magic healing power and discovers that he is the one whose mother she had scorned 30 years before. She is healed of her leprosy after a visit to the Man of Galilee.

The role of Faustina's hand-maiden is taken by Miss Margaret Cooper; Glaucius, a friend to Carleton, is played by Graydon Austin; and the role of Pompeius is taken by Haskell Beard.

This play was first presented by the Ben Greer players on the Christmas tide of 1909 and has been out from its original presentation of 21 years.

BUSINESS URGES SOLONS TO WORK

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5. (AP)—A business prayer was recorded today against any extended discussion in Congress which might upset the equilibrium of this "sensitive time."

It was placed before President Hoover by Julius H. Barnes, chairman of the Board of the United States Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the President's Business Survey conference.

Barnes told the chief executive that business welcomed evidence that both Mr. Hoover and the party leaders in Congress "seemed determined to put the emphasis of legislation on the necessary appropriation for public administration, and to provide emergency measures to increase employment."

But he coupled it with the hope that no protracted discussion of measures, though worthy in themselves, be allowed to bring the threat of an extra session. He commended the "high degree of statesmanship and party leadership" shown by recent events.

MEXICO CITY (AP)—All men were not created equal, in the opinion of Pascual Ortiz Rubio, descendant of ancient Tarascan nobility and president of Mexico, but every man should have opportunity to develop that of which he is capable and therein lies the obligation of the wealthy toward the poor.

Chapultepec Castle philosophy has undergone considerable change during the 20 years since Porfirio Diaz maintained an iron control over the castle's heavy stone walls. It has passed through its "pink" era and come out of chaotic periods to rest in the hands of a serene, deliberate thinker.

Quite the contrary of the picturesque, dashing military leaders and the radical reformers who at various times preceded him in Mexico's epoch of armed upheavals and legislative turnovers, Ortiz Rubio is the staid, retiring type.

He believes all that is necessary has been accomplished in the way of radical measures. Consolidation and development are the by-words of his administration, which he means to make a matter-of-fact, pegaway stage in the nation's progress toward unquestioned stability.

His ideas in regard to relationship of men are typical of his views on important subjects in general. "That has become known as a practical perspective hold sway now in the former home of Maximilian, under the guidance of a man whose forefathers ruled a great part of the country prior to the Spanish conquest."

The president sees in road construction, religious freedom, international harmony, extension of educational facilities and encouragement of orderly, unhampered political opinion some of the prime goals of his government.

Due to rivalry of "caudillos" or military leaders and their influence over politics, it was not until the end of the presidential period of General Plutarco E. Calles, in 1928, that serious thought could be given to creation of peaceful partisan politics.

Calles sounded what the people hoped was the death knell of "caudillismo" when he refused to run for a second term in office. The National Revolutionary Party, a civilian political organization built up by Calles, carried Ortiz Rubio, a retired soldier, into the presidency.

The president seldom appears in uniform—he prefers to be a civilian and while he frankly states his affection for the party which elected him he recently declared to congress that the time has come to encourage other civilian political organizations. Peaceful and impartial democratic decision of national affairs is his hope for the future.

Popular opinion sees in the president a democratic but dignified executive, of conservative tendencies, compared with some of his predecessors, but keeping in constant touch with the common people.

A recent dinner in Chapultepec Castle, at which one common soldier from each of the regiments stationed in the capital was his guest, was an example of the way in which he maintains his contacts.

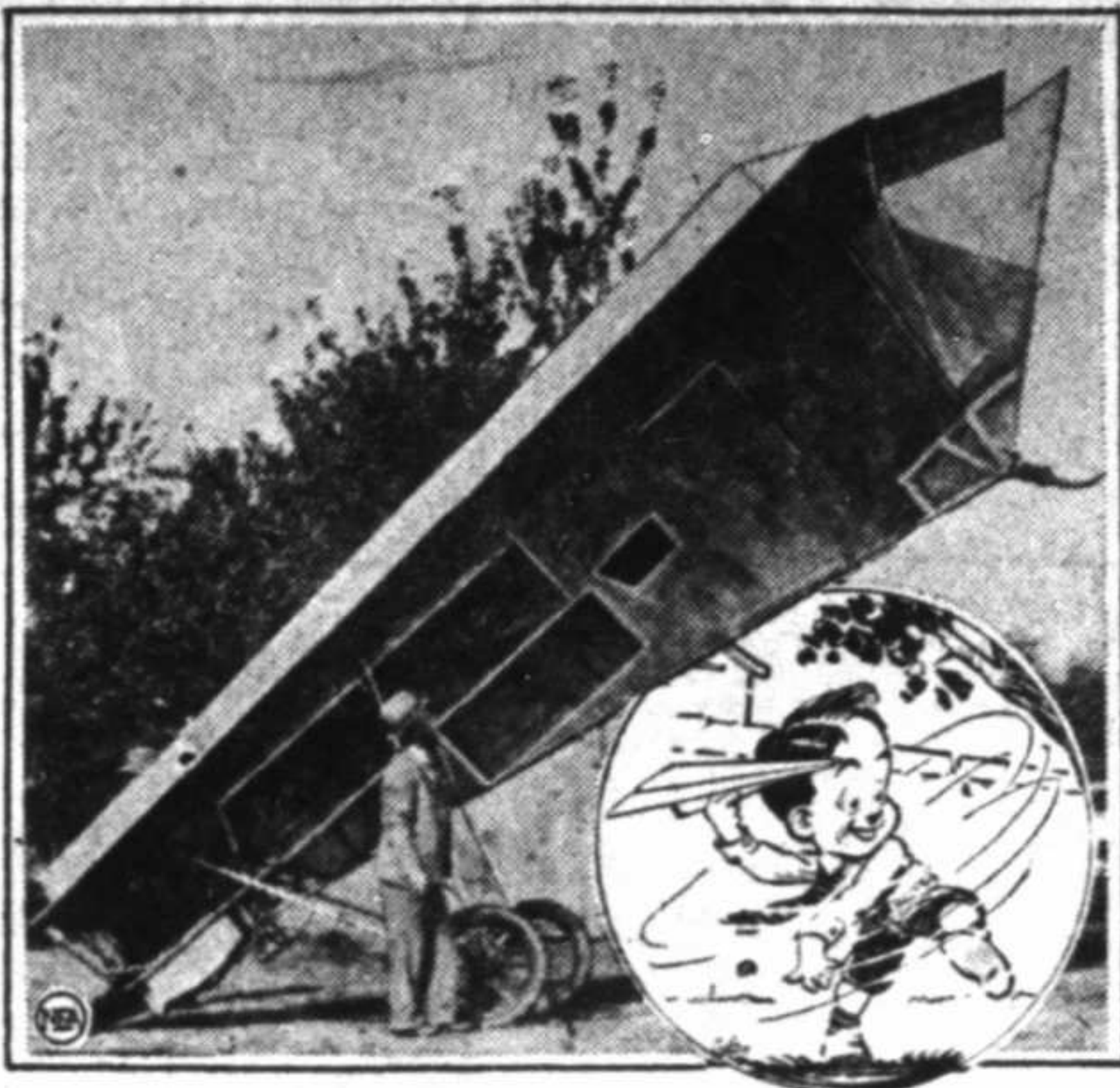

Frightened?

It is a little bit hard to work up
any sympathy for those people who
are all hot and bothered by the
horrid thought that we may have
an extra session of Congress next
spring.

This possibility—which, it must
be admitted, looms rather large on
the horizon—is described by some
people as a veritable catastrophe, a
thing to be avoided at all costs. To
read some editorials or to listen
to certain statements, one would
imagine that an extra session of
Congress is a calamity comparable
to flood, pestilence or war.

Is it, really, quite that bad? Let's
examine it for a minute.

A few weeks ago we had a nation-
wide election. At this election a
great many men were voted out of
Congress, and a great many new
men were voted in. Under the law,
these new men will not take their
seats until December of 1931—un-
less there should be a special ses-
sion next spring.

Now that election meant some-
thing. Interpretations differ, of
course, but no one can deny that a
certain amount of public dissatis-
faction with the record of the exist-
ing Congress lay back of the huge
outrage that the election brought.
The people at large didn't like many
of the things the present Congress
did; so they voted many congress-
men out of the jobs and elected
substitutes.

That being so, it is only reason-
able to suppose that the voters
would at least be willing to see
these new congressmen take office
comparatively soon.

It is argued that we have a tick-
lish business depression on our
hands now and that an extra ses-
sion, for that reason, should be
avoided. But might not that be all
the more reason for wanting to see
this new Congress begin function-
ing? The old Congress certainly
failed to give us any help. It could
not even pass measures that were
presented to it for the relief of
unemployment. Is it not at least rea-
sonable to hope that the new Con-
gress, elected because of the discon-
tent the depression has brought,
might do better?

It is also argued that an extra
session would mean a business and
so postpone recovery from the de-
pression. But one wonders—our
business machinery so delicate, are
our business leaders so nervous,
that the bare thought of the peo-
ple's representatives convening at
Washington to carry out their con-
stitutional functions can disturb
things and make prosperity impos-
sible? If so, we are in a worse jam
than our bitter pessimists have
supposed.

All of this is not to say that a
special session is necessary. That is
for the coming months to decide.
What we are trying to get at is the
fact that it is foolish to look on
this possible special session as a
calamity.

Cop and Horse

It is not at all hard to under-
stand the attitude of that New
York mounted policeman who, called
to the office of his superiors to be
informed that he had been pro-
moted to the rank of detective,
tried to decline the honor and pro-
tested that he would much prefer
to remain a mounted patrolman.

Being a detective is very fine, and
it brings in a bigger salary, but the
mounted policeman is one of the few
remaining majestic, romantic and
awe-inspiring figures in metropolitan
life today. The man on horse-
back has always had an appeal.
Nowadays, however, the mounted
policeman is the only man on
horseback that many people see in
their whole lives. He cuts a gay
figure in the world, does the
mounted cop; he is a Somebody,
and it must make his days brighter.

Of course, the detective is quite a
man, too. But the mounted po-
liceman is in a class by himself.
It is easy to see why this New
Yorker wanted to decline his pro-
motion.

ON ANOTHER page of today's
paper you will find a story tell-
ing of the Slaton Chamber of Com-
merce and Board of City Develop-
ment retaining Lloyd A. Wilson as
secretary-manager for another year.
The Plainsman has been wanting to
write something nice about Lloyd
Wilson—in other words to tell the
truth about Lloyd Wilson—for a
long time and this looks like a good
opportunity. And to make it inter-
esting, The Plainsman is going to
call a spade a spade.

Most of us oldtimers (if you
lived in Lubbock county seven
years you're an oldtimer as com-
pared to three-fourths of the
population) remember when
Slaton was a city divided within
itself. The Klan question had
everything ripped wide open to
the point where it hurt the
town in a business way as well
as a social way.

ANYWAY, it was bad—in fact it
got to the point where there
were even two chambers of com-
merce—one supported by the Klan
side, the other by the anti-Klan
side. It looked like one of the best
little cities in West Texas was go-
ing to blow up when all of a sud-
den the good people on both sides
got help to what was going on and
decided to bury the hatchet.

Well they buried the hatchet
and one of the first things they
did was to get Lloyd Wilson,
who was then advertising manager
of the Slaton Slatonite, as
secretary of the chamber of com-
merce. Right there was
when the folks in Slaton played
their trump card because
Lloyd Wilson not only became
a jam-up chamber of commerce
secretary but he became a sort
of a good will evangel. He is a
good singer and a good mixer.
He's a church worker but he
doesn't wear a halo. He's smart,
aggressive, capable, energetic
and ambitious—and to top it
off he's one of the most like-
able, co-operative fellows on the
whole South Plains.

THE PLAINSMAN has often won-
dered if the people of Slaton re-
alize just how much Lloyd Wilson
has meant to the Santa Fe Center
of West Texas. A prophet, you know,
is often without honor in his own
country and in this case the peo-
ple of Slaton may have gotten so
used to Lloyd and his way of doing
things that they don't see him as
we outsiders do. Of course, they
appreciate his good work as a
chamber of commerce secretary or
they wouldn't have employed him
for his fifth year. But as The
Plainsman sees it, Lloyd is valuable
to Slaton in many, many other
ways than in the way he's hired to
be valuable—and if it weren't for
fear of embarrassing Lloyd The
Plainsman would fill up the balance
of this column saying a few of the
good things about him that should
be said!

SEVERAL hundred newspapers of
the United States are prepar-
ing to reprint the "most reprinted"
editorial, "There Is a Santa Claus!"
That editorial, appearing in the
old New York Sun of half a cen-
tury ago, is the most reprinted
editorial known but the most re-
markable thing about it is that it
made the wrong man famous.

Probably two-thirds of the
adults of Lubbock and the South
Plains have seen the editorial
and have seen it credited to
Charles A. Dana, who was editor
of the Sun at the time the edi-
torial appeared. But Mr. Dana
didn't write the piece at all—
all of the Sun's editorial
writing was done by his line. Mr.
Dana got the credit, but the man
who answered Little Virginia's "Is
there really a Santa Claus?" is
unknown.

Yesterday's Journal, on the front
page, credited the editorial to

VITAMINS OBTAINABLE
IN CONCENTRATED FORM
Vitamins are so essential to health
that they are now being exploited in
concentrated, or "condensed," form.
The very essence of their value is that
they are present
in fresh foods.
Because this is
not apparently
generally under-
stood, let me give
a table of the or-
dinary foods
which contain the
essential vitamins.
A table? No.
A square table
and a square
meal.

At this square
table and square
meal, begin at
the upper left
hand corner. There are vitamins
A and D. What foods contain A
and D? Fats and oils. Common
ones, easily obtained, are: Butter,
yolk of egg, cream, fish-fat most
concentrated. As is now well known
it is obtained in cod-liver oil.
Going over to the upper right
hand corner of the table, we ask
for vitamin B.
You get it in flour, bread, whole-
wheat bread, yeast, rice, bran and
milk.

Lower left hand corner, is the es-
sential vitamin C.
Present in vegetables and fruits.
More what the articles are served
raw—orange, lemon, lettuce, toma-
toes, celery, potatoes.
In the lower right hand corner,
newcomers—vitamins PP or B2 (we
are not sure of their names yet).
Present in lean meat, fish, cheese,
eggs, yeast and white bread.

HOOVER'S PUBLIC BUILDING PLANS TO HALT UNEMPLOYMENT APPEAR WELL ON WAY; CRITICISM APPARENTLY STILLED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5. (AP)—

President Hoover's plan for spending \$150,000,000 within six months on public building projects was started today on the road to legislative enactment, with the first outburst of criticism apparently stilled.

A detailed explanation of his plan giving the amounts allocated to sub-divisions of the government departments but not naming the specific projects to be built, was accorded a favorable reception as the House Appropriations committee began hearings on the proposal.

Witnesses called

The chief of the Public Roads bureau and the chief of the Army engineers, under whom the bulk of the expenditures are to be made, were the first witnesses on the committee list. With them also was the director of the budget, who prepared the President's detailed list.

Mr. Hoover's observation that the test of unemployment relief plans lay in the ability to pay wages within the next six months arrested the attention of the legislators. They passed over without comment his other assertion that cabinet allocation had been chosen because of projects by Congress would involve "long delay."

Already Authorized

Then too, the President pointed out that all the work to be done

with the funds will be on projects already authorized by congress. The resolution to carry out the request was introduced in the House by Chairman Wood of the Appropriations committee. A companion measure was placed before the Senate to await the House's action. At the same time the President's emergency committee for employment was busy gathering up odds and ends of red tape in government departments to secure utmost speed in getting the money into circulation after Congress approves.

Colonel Woods, the chairman, saw necessity for some legislation to iron out technicalities, and conferred with Congressional leaders to get it through. He went to the Justice and Treasury departments to find the way around other customary delays and announced site selections would be handled by a dozen committees instead of one, as a single group could not get through in time.

Allocations Made

The president proposed allocating the construction funds as follows: Agriculture department, \$84,324,980; with \$80,000,000 of this for roads; War department, \$57,473,800, nearly half of it to non-military outlays such as waterways and harbors; Commerce department, \$1,083,000; Interior department \$7,757,462,000 for yards, docks, etc.

ALSUP WINNER IN TRIAL

EX-COP GETS VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY IN BANK SHOOTING

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Dec. 5.—John Alsop, former Fort Worth policeman, was free today of murder charges in connection with the fatal shooting of George Terrell, negro, during an attempted holdup of the First State bank of Polytchnic, last April. A jury in District court here acquitted him last night.

State's attorneys had contended the robbery attempt upon the bank, in which Terrell and Will Tate, another negro, were killed, was "framed" for the purpose of obtaining a \$5,000 reward offered by the Texas Bankers association for each dead bank robber.

Beer Enters In

The jurors said the complexity of the case, especially the defense evidence that showed the state's star witness, A. P. Boyd, had been served beer in the Tarrant county jail before he made a signed statement on the bank robbery attempt and alleged frame-up was the cause for the acquittal.

Preparations were made to take Alsop back to the Tarrant county jail at Fort Worth, where he must remain pending outcome of an appeal from a 30-year sentence imposed upon him for the alleged murder of Tate in the same holdup.

COSTLY INDIUM NOW OBTAINED BY ELECTROLYSIS METHOD; WORLD'S FIRST POUND OF MATERIAL MADE IN CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND (AP)—The world's first pound of indium, one of the rarest of metals, has been made here.

It is worth \$7,000—nearly ten times the value of platinum.

Indium is a white, lustrous metal, very soft and ductile, slightly heavier than zinc, and it can be melted with a match.

There have been no uses for indium, because hitherto it was a laboratory curiosity, so expensive that it was scarcely worth experiment.

Discovery at the Grasselli Chemical company of a method of getting it electrically puts the metal within reach of experiment.

The indium is obtained by electrolysis, whereby a current runs through a solution containing indium causes it to segregate and deposit. Success depends upon very accurate temperature controls and use of the proper kinds of electrodes.

Whether this discovery will unlock nature's storehouse of indium, according to a report to the American Electro-Chemical society by Dr. L. H. Westbrook, depends on whether its uses prove important enough to justify the price.

Westbrook believes commercial uses will be discovered, and says: "Like many other rare metals which only a few years ago were mere laboratory or scientific curiosities, and which today have a definite field of usefulness, indium undoubtedly has a definite field of application."

There already is a British patent covering its use as a bearing metal. It has been mixed with another metal, gallium, to produce an alloy for fused quartz thermometers measuring temperatures up to about 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit.

The first pound of indium came from many carloads of crude ores. Dr. Westbrook says it is rather widely distributed in minute amounts in the majority of zinc blends, in some tin ores, pyrites, siderites and tungsten.

POINCARÉ AGAIN RAPPED BY REDS

MOSCOW, Dec. 5. (AP)—The name of Raymond Poincare, the French statesman, was shouted again today in the courtroom where eight men are on trial for plotting to overthrow the Soviet government.

Before the judges who have ruled out all mention of "friendly foreign powers," Krilenko, the prosecutor, shook his finger in the general direction of Paris and accused the former French premier of working hand in glove with counter revolutionaries.

"If Poincare wants to know all the details of this plot in which he played such an important part," Krilenko shouted, "I'll let him have those details. I'll let him know that our people are ready for the worst. When the time comes to fight, we will fight as one man. We will meet the crisis armed and prepared."

FIRE IS HALTED

HALE CENTER, Dec. 5. (Special)—Smelling what she believed to be a burning wire insulation, Mrs. H. P. Tapp, living next to Jack's Cafe, gave the alarm which resulted in the fire department extinguishing the blaze before the flames had gained headway. The wires of an electric refrigerator machine became short circuited, causing the insulation to burn.

PICKED WRONG NIGHT

ASHLAND, Wis., Dec. 5. (AP)—Every man is entitled to a night off once in a while. Charles Larson, manager of a mercantile company, reasoned as he took one after staying out of bed most of the time for several weeks, guarding his stock against burglars.

While he was gone burglars hauled away \$600 worth of merchandise.



LENGTHY EL PASOAN LEARNING PAINS OF THE FREAK IN TRIP TO EUROPE

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. (AP)—Jackie Earle—eight feet, six inches and 330 pounds of him—was headed for Europe today on a protesting liner. Earle, a spanking lad of 24, who calls El Paso, his home, boarded the Hamburg last night—with difficulty. The first thing he bumped into was the eight foot ceiling of the pier elevator. But his troubles had only begun.

Research acquainted him with the fact that the ship elevators, cabins, salons and enclosed decks all had eight foot tops. The carpenter took one look and started building a two-foot extension to his berth and the steward put in a call for more elongated linen.

Long before Coach Knute Rockne led his Indians stalwarts out of Tucson, Ariz., on the last lap of their long trail, Coach Howard Jones slipped his Trojans out of their stronghold and away to a hotel in an unidentified city. However, announcement that final practice of the home team will be held on a Pasadena field gave a hint as to the city in which Jones and his men sought sanctuary from handshakes and back slappers.

Result In Doubt
Whether the Notre Dame wonder team could round out its second consecutive season without a defeat rested on the lap of the football gods and the mighty Men of Troy.

As the Notre Dame players sped toward the battleground, their heads were filled with "trick stuff," Rockne's famous strategy. Southern California is not so crafty but Coach Jones believes in power with a capital "P."

With the climax game a full day away the railbirds thought the struggle might develop into a battle of giants employing vastly different tactics should the commanders from their conning towers on the bench elect to pit cunning against brawn. The resulting maneuvers may be as interesting as the \$2,000 prospective customers expect.

Great Backs There
The field tomorrow afternoon will be cluttered up with great backs, there being no lack of ball carriers and interference on either team. And the blocking backs of Rockne and Jones will know they have been in a game when it is over. RURAL SCHOOL GAIN SEEN

**DAWSON COUNTY SEES
STEADY GROWTH, IS
WEBB'S REPORT**

(Special to The Journal)

LAMESA, Dec. 5.—Rural schools of Dawson county have shown a steady growth within the last five years, according to figures compiled by W. T. Webb, county school superintendent. In 1925 there were 1499 scholars, 49 teachers, school properties valued at \$79,515, with a taxable value for all districts of \$3,690,000. At the present time there are 2560 scholars, 104 teachers, school properties valued at \$413,200, and a total taxable valuation of \$7,082,389.

In 1925, no pupils were transported to and from the schools, while at the present there are four school buses operated in the county, hauling 200 pupils daily. Ten rural schools of the county are of brick construction, the newest being that in the Klondike district, where a six room building valued at \$20,000 was built this year. Other additions and improvements total around \$15,000 more for 1930. Sixteen of the districts have teachers' salaries, for the convenience of their teachers. All schools of the county are now in session, according to Webb, who is making daily visits to the various schools.

DOAK NEAR OKEY AS LABOR CHIEF

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Barring unexpected developments William N. Doak may be able to take office as Secretary of Labor Monday or Tuesday of next week.

His nomination gained approval of the Senate Labor committee yesterday. The Senate did not act upon it before recessing for the week-end because Senator Couzens, Republican-Michigan, insisted upon the usual procedure under which reports must lie over a day. But Couzens said he had no objection to nomination of the Virginian and no other Senator indicated opposition. The American Federation of Labor withdrew its objection to Doak right after his name was sent to the Senate.

Confirmation Monday appeared probable.

Belle Livingstone Again Afoul Of Law

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—For the third time in recent months, Belle Livingstone is involved with the law. Nine boulevardiers in flawless evening clothes entered her new "salon" near Park avenue last night and made merry around a soda bar. About midnight they announced themselves as Federal prohibition agents.

Miss Livingstone and eight employees were arrested. Some 400 top-hatted and silk-gowned guests were invited to convey their revelry elsewhere. Assorted liquors to the value of \$1,200 found a new home.

Dallas Man Shoots Negro In Robbery

DALLAS, Dec. 5 (AP)—I. F. Hester, proprietor of a pharmacy, shot and killed a negro intruder whom he surprised last night in the act of robbing his store. Hester, whose home is next door to the store, was warned by an alarm bell. His wife guarded the rear door of the store and as the negro ran out the front door, Hester fired with a rifle when the intruder refused to halt.

Tragedy Paves Way For Hotel Looting

ERIE, Pa., Dec. 5 (AP)—Burglars awaited tragedy last night to rob the Hoffman hotel. George Herman, the proprietor, accompanied by a friend, William Bright, went out to hunt for Mrs. Herman, police said. They found her in company with a man known as "Scotty" A quarrel in the street in front of the hotel came to a climax when it is said Scotty shot Herman and his wife. Dead he fled. While employees and guests ministered to the wounded couple, burglars entered the hotel office and looted the safe.

MISSIONARIES RELEASED

PEIPING, China, Dec. 5 (AP)—Mrs. L. D. Hayward, American missionary, and her nurse, Miss E. Gomersall, who were kidnapped by bandits and released after being held for a week, were said today to be in moderately good health despite the strain of their experience.

AGAINST PAYMENT

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 5 (AP)—Addressing a meeting of the C. R. O. M., Mexican Labor federation, last night, Luis Morones, labor leader declared that there was no time for Mexico to try to pay its foreign debt. He attacked the Montes de Oca-Lamont agreement on the Mexican debt and demanded that the government make public its full text so that the people could see for themselves its "grave errors."

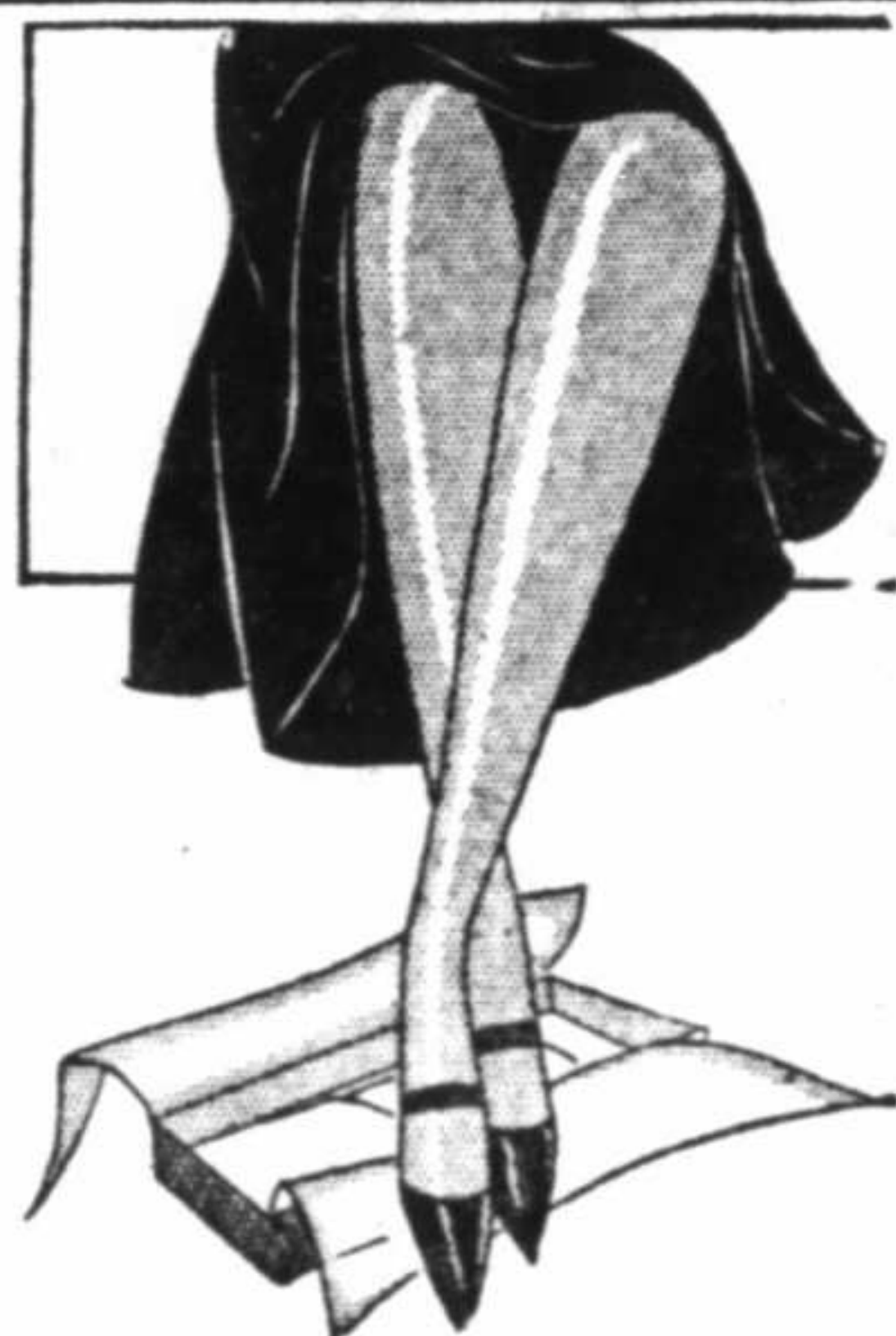
