GOEBEL SETS NEW FLIGHT RECORD DALLAS WOMAN KILLS MAN, THEN SELF

PAIR QUARREL AND SHOOTING IS AFTERMATH

DAUGHTER OF WOMAN, SLEEPING NEAR, IS UNABLE TO HELP

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 20.—Mrs. E. M. Wilson, 34, shot and killed Leroy Simerly, 32, here today and then placed the pistol against her breast and took her own life.

The tragedy occurred at the home of Mrs. Wilson. Her daughter, Dorothy Walker, 16, was sleeping in the next room. She awakened at the sound of the shooting and was at the telephone calling a doctor when her mother fired the fatal shot into her own breast.

Asked to Call Doctor
"Call a doctor," Dorothy said her mother told her as she ran into the room and saw Simerly lying on the floor. A moment after she left the room she heard the second shot and returned to find her mother lying beside Simerly. Both were dead when police arrived. An automatic pistol was found beside the bodies.

Employees of a cafe where Mrs. Wilson worked testified the couple quarreled yesterday. Simerly was fully dressed when the shooting occurred. A woman named Mrs. Wilson was found near his body. Mrs. Wilson was seen in a neighborly way. Nothing was known of what transpired at the Wilson home immediately preceding the shooting. Dorothy and two other children, Mary Francis and J. R. Wilson, were not awakened until the first shot was fired. C. B. Walker, father of Mrs. Wilson, took the three children to his home. Police were unable to locate relatives of Simerly. He had been rooming at the Wilson home for several weeks, neighbors said.

Mrs. Billie Turner, another waitress at the cafe where Mrs. Wilson was employed, said today that Simerly had been trying to get Mrs. Wilson to marry him. The shooting occurred soon after the couple left the cafe at midnight.

M'MORRIS HELD ON TWO BONDS

\$1,000 IN EACH CASE SET FOR MAN HURT DURING ARREST

Two bonds of \$1,000 each were set this morning in the case of I. P. Morris, charged with both possession and sale of liquor, who was shot through the shoulder Saturday night when he tried to escape from Deputy Vernon Ford who was trying to arrest him in connection with a liquor raid.

The injury proved not serious, the bullet going through the flesh of the shoulder only. McMorris was released in the county jail Saturday night after medical aid had been rendered at a local hospital, and was reported in a good condition this morning.

Some Paper Confiscated
Several bottles of beer were confiscated by officers at the home of McMorris on Avenue O near 14th street when the man was arrested, officers said.

According to county officers, McMorris was shot when Ford's gun was accidentally discharged as the two were scuffling after McMorris broke away and tried to escape for the second time. The prisoner was captured only after being surrounded by three officers.

Seven Arrested By County On Week-End

It was an active week end for members of the sheriff's department, seven arrests being made. One was for delinquency, four for drunkenness, one for violation of liquor laws, another on a state law for Missouri officers.

FOUR DIE WHEN BUS OVERTURNS

RED WING, Minn., Aug. 20.—Four persons were burned to death and four were injured today when a passenger bus, bound from Chicago to the twin cities, collided with a truck at a highway curve five miles north of Red Wing.

Several persons were brought to a Red Wing hospital for treatment of their injuries while doctors about the countryside were called to the scene of the accident.

TEXAS HEARING OVER NEW RATE SCALE STARTS

CASE IS TERMED MOST IMPORTANT IN YEARS FOR SHIPPERS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Aug. 20.—The state railroad commission opened a hearing today on perhaps the most far-reaching and important case in its history—the application of Texas railroads for authority to apply within the state the new mileage scale freight rates recently promulgated by the interstate commerce commission for application interstate in the southwest on numerous commodities.

General effect of the rates, if authorized for Texas, would be to lessen the cost of long hauls and increase charges for shorter hauls. The rates proposed would apply to practically all important products except what are known as the "heavy moving" commodities, such as cotton, lumber and the like.

Shippers Oppose Rates
Several Texas shippers affected by the probable increase in short haul charges are expected to oppose the railroad's application.

The hearing will last several days. Direct testimony of the railroads and shippers favoring their position will be heard first. With more than 150 rate experts, lawyers, representatives of chambers of commerce, shippers' bureaus and others attending, the hearing under way half an hour late. "BEST DRESSED MAN" IN KANSAS CITY FACES DEATH

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 20.—The fact that he is in jail awaiting decision on an appeal from a sentence that he be hanged for murder has not caused Roscoe F. Warren, Kansas City's most dapper dresser, to slack up any in attention to his sartorial appearance.

In the county jail Warren each morning dons a well laundered shirt, a clean bat-wing collar and a shiny, closely.

Never during or since his trial, in which the jury brought in a verdict for death, has he shown the least worry about the final outcome of his case and never has he failed to be one of the best dressed men in a city of half a million inhabitants.

A "Dandy" in Court
Jail bars sometimes make it impossible for a prisoner to be comfortable in a frock coat and jail temperatures sometimes make any kind of a coat difficult to wear. But when temperature does not prevent, jail visitors find Warren impeccable in appearance.

It was during his trial in connection with the killing of John C. Deskin that Warren first attracted attention because of his sartorial elegance. Daily he appeared in court with every detail of his costume well cared for. Never was there any bagging in the knees of his well-tailored trousers, never did his coat fail to hang just right from his shoulders.

Never was his vest unbuttoned and never did he fail to have the cleanest and most stylish of cuffs and collars.

In a coat of black edged with a wide binding, and with striped pearl gray trousers, coats to match and narrow-toed shoes that shone brightly at all times, the prisoner appeared more like a fashion plate.

It is claimed by officers that the charge followed her running away from home.

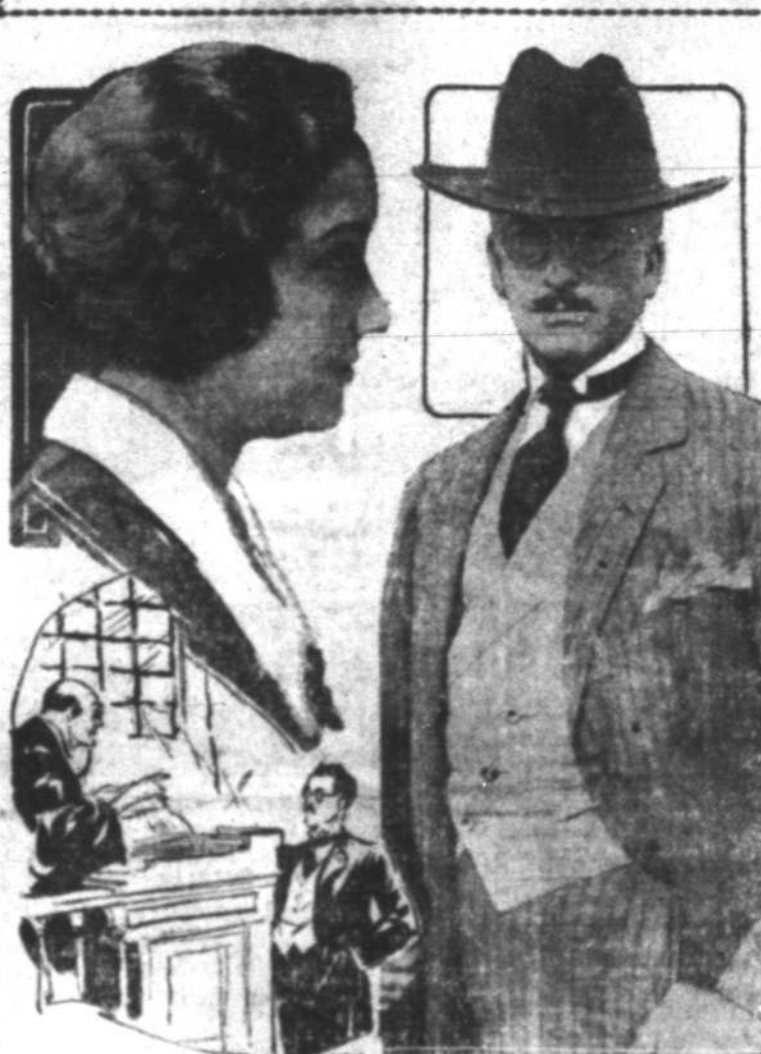

U. S. ENGINEER LEAVES HERE AFTER INSPECTION OF SITES FOR FEDERAL BUILDING; PLANS TO RETURN LATER

H. G. Richey, district engineer of U. S. public buildings, of the treasury department of the government, who has been in the city several days inspecting sites for the proposed federal building here, left yesterday afternoon. He will make a return trip here probably the latter part of this month or the first part of September to complete his survey and inspection tour.

Mr. Richey made no announcement concerning the three sites submitted to the government as the federal building site.

A. S. Page, postal inspector, who represented the postoffice department in the inspection, left Lubbock Saturday night. He plans to meet Mr. Richey here on the return trip.

More Definite Proposal

Failing to get in touch with members of the county commissioners court, Mr. Richey requests that the county's proposed site on either corner of the north half of the court house square be put into a more definite submission.

Following a complete inspection of the proposed sites here, Mr. Richey will make a report to secretary of the treasury who in turn will make the final selection of the building site.

Mr. Richey's headquarters are in New Orleans, but it is not known where he went from here.

HOUSTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A man who said "boo" at a young woman while she was alone at her residence and then slashed her arm with a pocket knife when she went to the door was being sought by police today.

Miss Kathleen Karstadt said she was in her room when the man looked through the window and said: "boo!" Thinking he was a friend although she had not recognized him, Miss Karstadt went to the front door and opened it. The man cut her arm with his knife and fled.

APPEAL IS FILED FOR RATLIFF

AUSTIN, Aug. 20.—Appeals of two murder case convicts were filed today in the court of criminal appeals.

Marshall Hatfield, sentenced to the electric chair in Taylor county for the killing of G. E. Bedford, Glisco police chief, in the First National bank robbery there last December 23, is one of the appellants.

The other is Henry Davis, Marshall county, convicted of killing Ernest Hardin last April and sentenced to 99 years.

HASSELL, AIDE LONG OVERDUE AT GREENLAND

ANXIETY GROWS AS NO WORD IS RECEIVED FROM AVIATORS

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Growing anxiety was felt today for the safety of Bert Hassell and Parker Cramer, good-will flyers from Rockford, Ill., to Stockholm, Sweden, after more than 30 hours had elapsed since last radio signals from the aviators were heard.

The plane was last heard from Sunday morning at 4 a. m. Chicago daylight time, when a Madison, Wis., radio operator intercepted signals sent from the plane then flying over Cochrane, Ontario, to Mt. Evans, Greenland. These signals indicated the flyers at that time were 75 miles off Cape Chidley, flying over Davis Strait, and had completed about three quarters of the 1,600 mile trip from Rockford to Mt. Evans.

As hours continued to pass with out any word from the aviators, the most optimistic ventured the opinion that the Rockford flyers had reached Greenland and made a forced landing in which event days might elapse before they made contact.

Benedict To Attend McDonald Will Case

AUSTIN, Aug. 20.—President H. Y. Benedict of the University of Texas expects to leave this week for Paris, to attend the new trial of the suit contesting the \$1,250,000 will of W. J. McDonald, eccentric oil magnate, providing an astronomical observatory for the university.

President Benedict's office said today he had not decided when he will leave.

The supreme court, the latter tribunal reversed the case and sent it back to Paris for a new trial because the trial court erroneously failed to charge the jury on the question of whether McDonald may have been afflicted with insane delusions when he wrote his will.

WINNER OF DOLE PACIFIC RACE REACHES NEW YORK FROM WEST COAST IN 18 HOURS 58 MINUTES

CURTIS FIELD N. Y., Aug. 20.—The first transcontinental nonstop airplane flight from west to east was completed here today by Art Goebel and Harry Tucker, who crossed the country from Los Angeles in a Lockheed Vega monoplane in 18 hours and 58 minutes.

Their plane, the Yankee Doodle, landed at 11:04 a. m., eastern daylight time, beating by seven hours and 42 minutes the record made by Lieutenant John A. MacReady and Oakley Kelly, who made the east to west transcontinental hop in 1923.

Leaving Los Angeles at 12:06 o'clock coast time, yesterday afternoon, Goebel piloted the Yankee Doodle across New Mexico, passing over Wichita, Kansas, where above St. Louis last midnight and crossed Columbus, Ohio, at dawn today.

LATE BULLETINS

At Controls All Way
Goebel, who won the Dole race to Hawaii, was at the controls throughout the journey. Tucker, Santa Monica sportsman, who backed the flight, rode as a passenger.

Because the Yankee Doodle had been expected to land at Roosevelt Field, few persons were at Curtis Field when the big plane came into view. Frank R. Tichenor, editor of Aero Digest, whom Goebel greeted with a "good morning, Frank," as he stepped from the ship, took the unofficial landing time, since no official timers were present. Tichenor said the Yankee Doodle's wheels touched the ground at 11:04 a. m.

Goebel and Tucker flew at altitudes of from 5,000 to 10,000 feet, and with the aid of favorable winds made an average speed of 150 miles an hour. The plane's consumption of gasoline was 340 gallons.

One of Goebel's first acts was to wire his mother, Mrs. Emma Goebel of Los Angeles, news of his safe arrival.

The fastest previous time for a transcontinental flight was 21 hours and 44 minutes, made by Lieut. Russell L. Maughan in 1924. That, however, was not a non-stop flight. Maughan's route was from New York to San Francisco and five stops were made en route for refueling.

MCDONALD WILL CASE DELAYED

MORE TALESMEN ASKED BY COURT IN MOVE FOR ADJOURNMENT

PARIS, Aug. 20.—Proceedings in the W. J. McDonald will case, involving a contest filed by relatives of the late Paris capitalist of his bequest of \$1,250,000 to Texas University for creation of an astronomical observatory, were adjourned today after the hearing of court today in order that the sheriff's department might summon additional talemsmen.

After the original panel had been qualified today so many were excused for various reasons that Judge Newman Phillips ordered adjournment until more jurymen could be obtained. Examination of prospective jurors was expected to get under way by the middle of the afternoon.

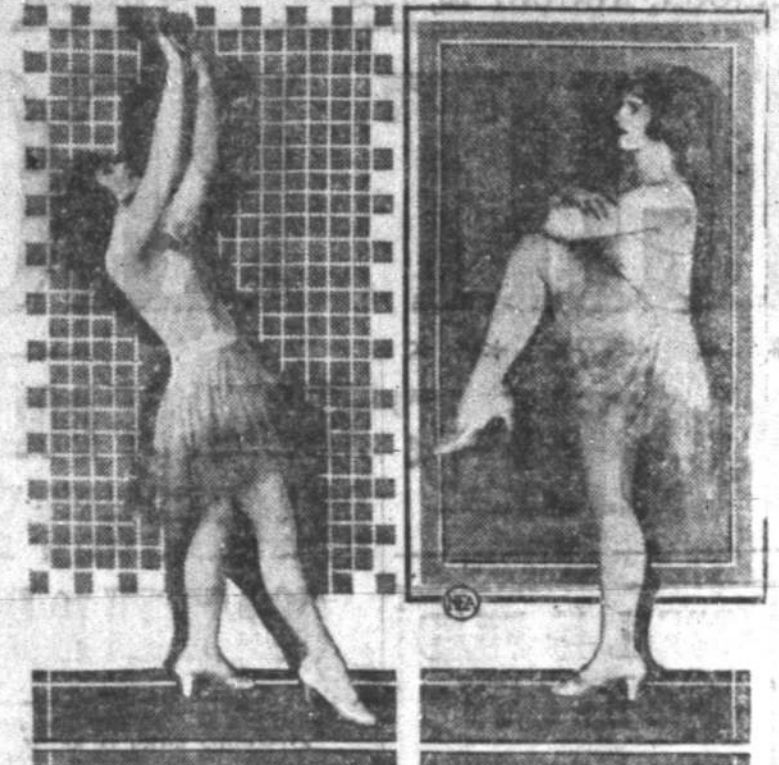

Synthetic Sports Described By Miss Harriet Hektor, Favorite Of Broadway

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Many of us can remember the thrill of playing basketball, and the fine exercise it is.

But who has a chance to play this game, after leaving high school or college, except those valiant souls who go to gymnasiums and keep in practice?

Not long ago I watched a game, played by splendid looking, athletic young flappers, and I decided that some of it might be very well adapted for my own particular dramatic indoor sports.

So I worked out this exercise, which is splendid for strengthening the leg and arm muscles, as well as for keeping the waist line trim. And while you are doing it, you can go back to your midday blouse days and be the pride of the home team.

Stand erect, thrusting the left leg forward, then place your entire weight on the right leg and swing lightly backward, both arms raised above your head, as if holding a basket ball ready for an upward throw.

With a rhythmic swing, bend the body forward, putting the entire weight on the left leg, which has been kept in the original position, lifting the right leg from the ground, and swinging both arms forward over the head.

This should be done 12 times—the first six as specified and the last six by reversing the order of the swing, that is by beginning with the weight imposed on the left leg instead of the right. I've learned, too, that you don't need a track for springing purposes. Just any room with a little cleared space is all you need.

Imagine yourself side by side with Nurni, neatly attired in a snappy suit of white tulle with a monogram on the back. Then, for your arms across your chest, head and body erect. Now thrust the left leg forward, slightly bent, with the weight resting upon it—and the right leg taut.

With a quick spring, bring the left leg backward and the right forward—now the right leg will be slightly bent and your weight resting upon it. Continue this forward and backward movement, remaining in the same spot, with your arms still folded and your upper body taut.

20 times in a stationary running and is very helpful in reducing the hips and waist line and strengthening the legs.

All the benefits of jumping and springing are to be had in this exercise, without leaving the front door.

Fold your arms high across your chest and then, with the weight placed solidly on the left leg, raise the right knee to touch the folded arms—and don't cheat and lower the arms. Then come back quickly to position and raise the left knee as you did the right. Do this reverse jumping movement for 20 counts, and as you become more proficient, raise your arms higher so that your knee will be higher. This encourages flesh around the waist and hips and makes the stomach muscles firm.

Synthetic Shot Put

I never put a shot in my life, and I don't expect to but I improved this exercise, which always makes me think I am taking part in the Olympic games.

Place your weight on the right leg, raise the left, with the knee bent, then swing back as far as possible with the body, left hand raised in a relaxed position, and the right one held taut, close to the body as if supporting the weight of a very heavy ball.

Then, with a quick, long forward movement, swing the body in a semi-circle, so that the right leg is thrust far backward, slightly off the ground. Your right arm will be thrust horizontally forward, the left one straight backward. Repeat this movement twelve times. It exercises the shoulders, waist line and hips.

Yost's Teams Have Fine Records

Within the next few weeks, my good friend Fielding H. Yost will start his twenty-eighth year at the University of Michigan.

During the 27 years that Yost already has spent at the Ann Arbor institution, the Maize and Blue teams have hung up an enviable record in all branches of sport. In fact, I doubt if there is another college or university in the country that can boast as fine an all-round record of success as Michigan can because of Yost's regime.

For 25 years Yost had active charge of Michigan football practices. During that span Wolverine eleven won 58 Western Conference games, lost but twelve and tied three. Half of the defeats were suffered in the hands of Illinois and Ohio State, the Buckeyes turning Michigan back three times in a row.

Wisconsin and Indiana never whipped a Yost-coached Wolverine team. The best the Badgers could do was that memorable 7-7 tie in 1921-out of 19 attempts. In four games Indiana failed to score a point on the Yostmen. Purdue was the only conference school not to clash with a Yost aggregation.

In the 73 traps Yost's eleven participated in against Big Ten teams, the Wolverines counted 1400 points on their opponents' 318, or an average score of about 20 to 5.

Yost's greatest team, without question, was his first—the 1901 aggregation. That outfit ran up 180 points in 12 games for the opposition. It whipped Iowa, 50 to 0. Ohio State claimed the distinction of holding the Wolverines to the lowest score—21 points.

In baseball Michigan has been very successful, too. Especially has this been true in the last nine years, or since the Wolverines returned to the Western Conference. Out of nine championship races, Michigan has won the title six times. The 1928 team was one of the best collegiate nines developed in seasons.

It lost but one conference game in 12 played, that being to Ohio State in the final tussle of the campaign. In track the Wolverines have won 12 of 23 conference classics.

In other words, they have won two more championships than all the other conference schools combined. That's quite a noteworthy record when one considers the sterling teams Harry Gill is wont to turn out at Elkhart from year to year.

In basketball, Michigan has won the title once and tied for it on another occasion during the last three seasons.

Some of the outstanding celebrities of the sport world have been developed at Michigan. Yost, for instance, has brought out such all-American grid stars as Huston, Schulz, Endbrook, Maulsby, Stetevet, Kitchie, Vack, Friedman and Courtbrun.

Baseball teams have sent out several luminaries, the avowed, of course, being George Sisler. Track has produced De Hart Hubbard, holder of the world's broad jump record. Carl Johnson, famous all-around athlete. Garrels, Hester, Witman and others.

Yost's "Hurry-Up" Yost came to Michigan in 1901, the Ann Arbor institution has carved a sensation niche in collegiate athletics—a mark of all-round achievement second to none.

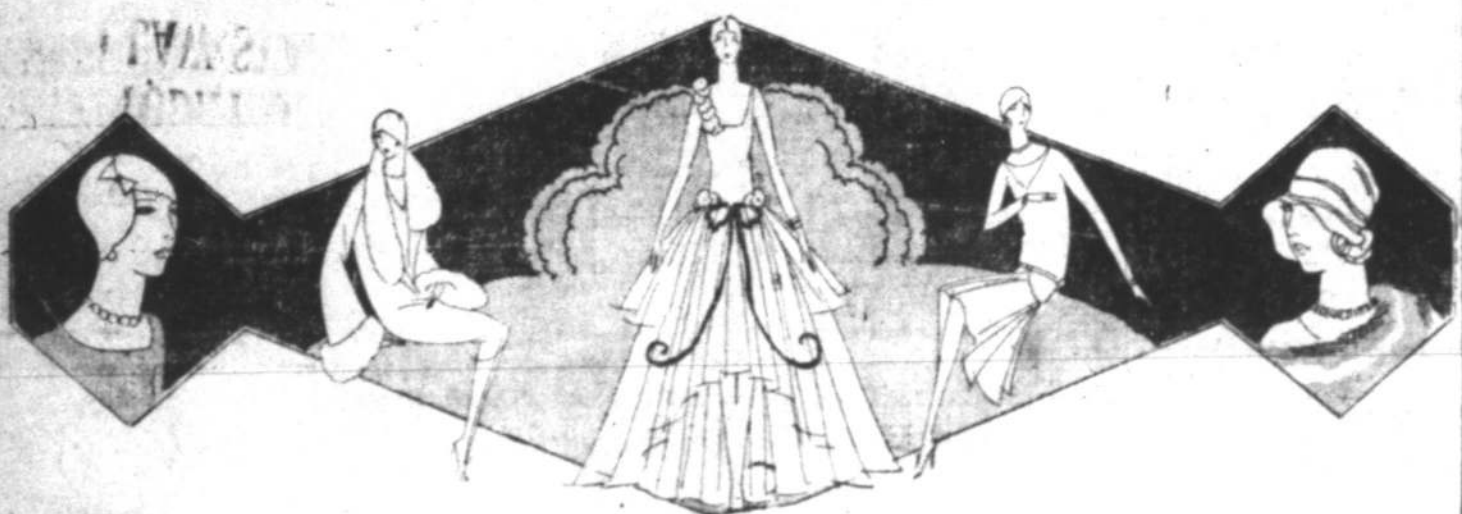
Benton Wins 20th Game

SIGNATURE OF KELLOGG PACT IS BIG EVENT

MUCH DISCUSSION IS
SEEN IN WAKE OF
TREATY ON WAR

By MELVIN COLEMAN

(Cable Editor, the Associated Press)
International spotlight has turned
on Paris where shortly states-
men of fifteen nations will gather to
affix signature to the Kellogg
pact denouncing war as an instru-
ment of national policy. The formali-
ties are likely to be followed by a
deal of talk on results that may be
expected or additional steps that
thinkers believe should be under-
taken.

Advocates of disarmament have
appeared regularly in the discus-
sions that have preceded the sign-
ing. Russian thought is that unless
armies and navies are scrapped the
treaty will be a mere gesture. Ger-
many considers that the pact will
be ineffective unless other powers
reduce their forces to something
near the limit imposed on that
country by the treaty of Versailles.

"Postponement" became the key
word in the Japanese-Chinese situ-
ation. Baron Gonsuke Hayashi,
special envoy of Japan to the fune-
ral of Chang Tso-Lin, assassinated
war lord of Manchuria, returned
from Mukden and announced that
Chang's son and successor had told
him he would put off the junction
of the three provinces dependency
to the nationalist government at
Nanking for at least three years.

This was accompanied by reports
that a new note sent to Tokyo from
Nanking constituted a withdrawal
of the notice abrogating the auto-
matically renewable treaty of 1906
between Japan and the old Peking
regime. Japan had previously indi-
cated she might be willing to dis-
cuss treaty revision with the na-
tionalists but not until the latter
had given up thought of immediate
changes in the status quo.

An attempt to postpone develop-
ments in Yugoslavia was less suc-
cessful. Adjournment of the govern-
ment wing of the national as-
sembly after receiving Netsumo
treaties with Italy and a similar
cessation of the Croation "home
rule" meeting in Zagreb have been
followed by fresh outbreaks.

Dalmatians Demonstrate
There have been demonstrations
in Dalmatian cities against the
treaties, centering upon Italians be-
cause the pact allows citizens of
Italy to own lands on the eastern
border of the Adriatic. Indirect ad-
vices from Albania said that the
government had won the elections
there. This voting was preliminary
to the plan to turn Albania from a
republic to a monarchy.

In Asia aspirations of Syria were
halted by insistence of the nation-
alists that Palestine and Trans-
Jordan be included in the bound-
aries of the projected state. As
Syria is a French mandate and the
other countries are under British
control the French residents could
not satisfy that demand. He ad-
journing the assembly for three
months.

India's all parties conference at
Simla favored a dominion form of
government for that country which
would place the peninsula on a po-
litical par with Canada and Australia.

Latin-American Muddle

In Latin-America several in-
cidents were cleared up. Venezuelan
political refugees were given per-
mission by the Dutch West Indies
colonial government to journey on
instead of being handed over to the
Venezuelan government. In Brazil
a big force of vigilantes ended dis-
turbed conditions in the Elasmoro
valley of Mato Grosso by driving
the malcontents into the neighbor-
ing state of Guyana.

The Colombian congress decided
that liquor restriction laws should
go into effect in October as pre-
viously planned, defeating an effort
to postpone them for a year.

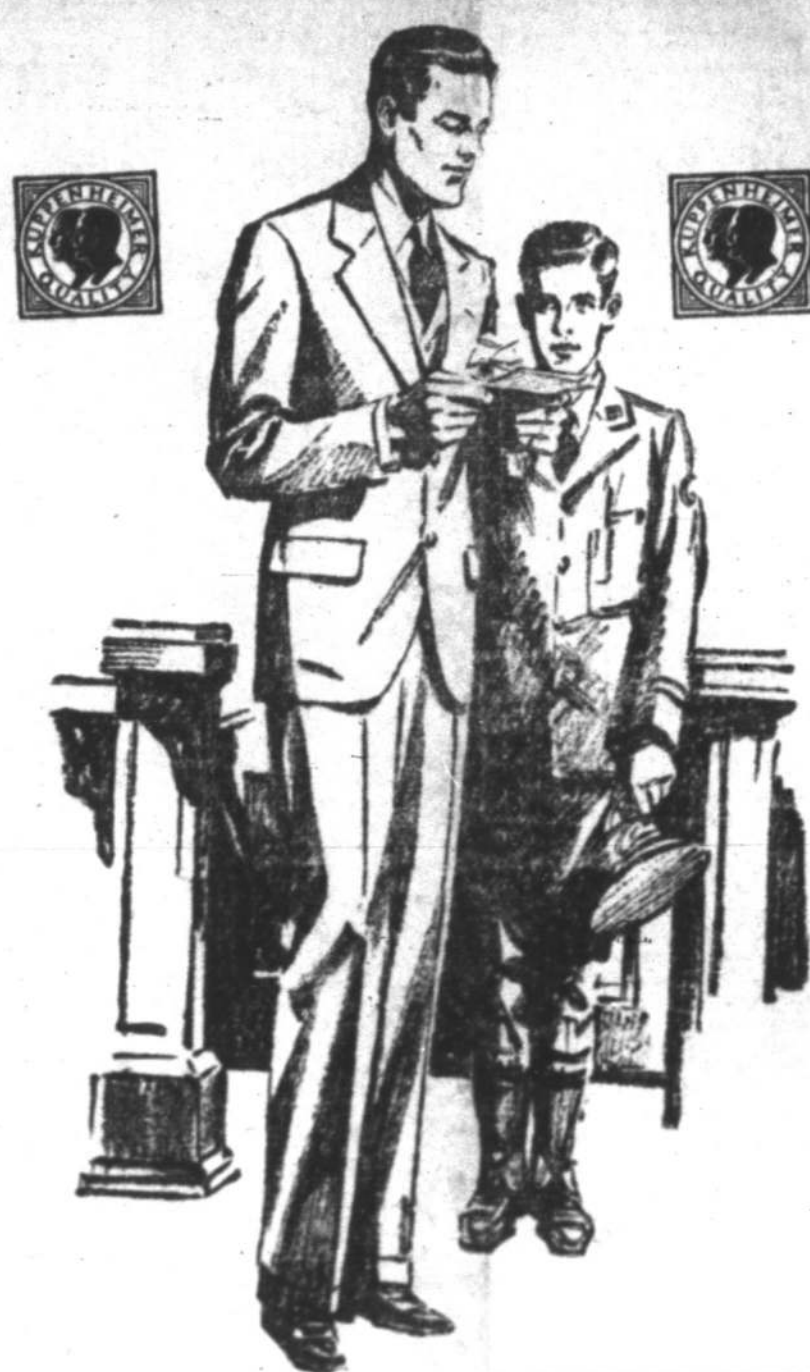

BRITAIN MOURNS HALDINE DEATH IN HEART ATTACK

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 20.—The death of
Vincourt Haldane of Cloan has
thrown Britain into mourning for
a man who though "treated with
the basest ingratitude by his coun-
try," as ex-Premier Lloyd George
put it, nevertheless it recognized
as having been one of the greatest
war ministers Britain ever pro-
duced.

Lord Haldane, in his seventy-
second year, died of a heart at-
tack at his home in Cloan yester-
day.
Lord Haldane entered the British
cabinet in 1906 as secretary of state
for war which portfolio he retained
until he was named lord high
chancellor of England in 1912.
While head of the war office, per-
ceiving the eventuality of Britain
being involved in a war with Ger-
many, he brought about a revision
of the British general staff and the
creation of a new army of "terri-
torials." This reorganization per-
mitted Britain to send a strong ex-
peditionary force to France within
a few days after the great war be-
gan.

But despite his foresight in pre-
paring for the eventuality of war,
Lord Haldane retained a love for
German scholarship that excluded
him from the coalition cabinet
formed in 1915 to carry on the war.
His declaration that "Germany is
my spiritual home" is credited with
having forced him from the cabinet
and resulted in a popular misun-
derstanding of his attitude.

Winston Churchill described
Haldane as one of the "very few
great war ministers" that Britain
ever has produced.

the country.

"We are waiting to get the notifi-
cation over with, and then we'll get
the campaign plans under way;
nothing done yet."

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EDUCATOR RAPS HOOVER'S STAND ON BIG ISSUES

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Herbert Hoover's views on prohibition and a naval program as set forth in his speech of acceptance are rejected by Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University and a life-long republican.

In a letter printed by the New York Times today Mr. Butler breaks silence on politics he has maintained since the Kansas City convention. He expresses confidence that millions of earnest republicans are in agreement with him.

Referring to prohibition the letter says: "What I wish to make entirely plain is that no candidate of my party for president can commit me or countless others like me to any such doctrine or any such policy." In this connection Dr. Butler quotes Patrick Henry: "If this be treason make the most of it."

In regard to Mr. Hoover's acceptance of the time-worn but wholly false argument that what he described as 'adequate preparation for defense' is a factor in cooperation in the maintenance of peace. Dr. Butler writes: "The contrary is now the well demonstrated fact."

Dr. Butler describes the 18th amendment as "an alien and unnatural invader of the constitution," saying it must be deposited if the constitution is to be preserved.

DEFENSE PLANS FORMULATED IN BLACKMER CASE

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 20.—Defense of Henry M. Blackmer on a federal indictment charging perjury, in case he is returned to the United States may be based on the allegation that evidence against him was obtained illegally, his attorney here has revealed.

The multi-millionaire former head of the Midwest Refining company, and missing key-witness in the Teapot Dome investigation, now resides in France. The government is attempting to gain French sanction to his extradition to Colorado to answer perjury charges. Tyson S. Dines, Blackmer's attorney, revealed Sunday that he has an affidavit signed by Miss Martha Thompson, Blackmer's former secretary, in which she charges she was abducted last June by United States secret service operatives and taken to the United States district attorney's office here, where she was grilled regarding her employer's dealings.

Dines said he expected to use this as the trump card in defense of Blackmer if the United States obtained his custody. Miss Thompson is said to be in California now.

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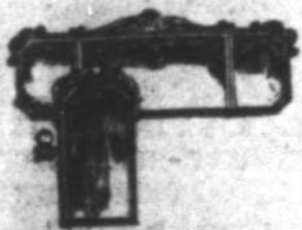
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A GLIMPSE of The Avondale makes one think immediately of four poster beds with canopies and other early American furniture.
