EV. GOBBEL SPEAKS UPON SALT, LIGHT

Reading Matt. 5:13-16 Rev. G. Gobbel chose "Salt and Light" as the theme to be discussed in his sermon this morning. Each service has been an increase over the previous one in the series of the evangelist's series of sermons.

When God called Abram and Isaac from among his people he gave to him, two legions of angels. "I will bless thee," said the Lord, "and thou shalt be a blessing." Not only did God ordain that Abram should find happiness in serving him, but he also was to be the cause of spreading happiness throughout the world. This same truth is applicable to the Christian life. The Christian is to find happiness in his serving the Lord and also is to be the means of blessing others, or making happy those who pay him whom he comes in contact. The apostle must have intended to teach such a lesson when in Rom. 12:13 he used this language: "For one of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself." Christians need to feel the importance of fulfilling their calling.

"Ye are the salt of the earth," the purpose for the use of salt is to season, to make foods more palatable. Christians should exercise such an influence over the lives of others as to cause the world to become a better place in which to live. They should be a leavening power for good, making the lives of others more desirable, causing them to live up to a more elevated plain. Salt is a saving power. Christ said "Ye are the salt of the earth." Therefore He expected that Christians would, by their lives, be the means of saving others. Before the flood God saw that the hearts of men were evil; there were, however, those who were "the salt of the earth" and through them the world was repopulated. The wonderful works of God were preserved, or saved. When salt is added to the elements, taken out of their natural elements and given attention or care, it loses its usefulness and saving power. Jesus said that it was thus rendered unfit for use. Christians are expected to be the elements of the world. We need to follow the admonition as stated in Rom. 12:1-2 at we not lose our saving power and become unfit for God's using. "Ye are the light of the world," a statement of the Master suggests the thought that the world is in darkness. When He was on earth He said "I am the light of a world." And after His departure His followers are to become at light. The Kingdom of Christ is, since its establishment in the world, been conspicuous. In 2,000 years, lives should be such as to elevate and hold forth to the world the church, the kingdom of Christ. The world is not so much concerned in the reading of the Bible but it is constantly reading the lives of those who claim to be Christians. How necessary that the lights constantly shine; not fully as the blinding flash of lightning, but at all times and under every condition.

It is possible for the Christian's life to lose its light and become darkness. "... how great is an influence over some other persons. One can not hold without taking some other with them, neither can one enter heaven without being responsible for taking others with them. Carefully Christians guard their lives, keeping the light shining and the salt ready as a saving power. These services continue each morning and evening over Sunday 13th.

James E. Walker Died Saturday

GORMAN, Texas, May 11.—James Edgar Walker Sr., died suddenly Saturday afternoon at his home, from a heart attack. He was born Sept. 20, 1851, in Gibson county, Tennessee, and was born of the Spirit in the late summer of 1872, and was received into membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Friendship, Tenn.

In September, 1872, he was given license to preach in Tennessee. In the year of 1886 he was transferred to the old Arkansas conference, and later was transferred to the North Texas conference, where he remained for 14 years, then came to the old North Texas conference. In November, 1906, because of failing health, he was given superannuation relation.

Rev. Walker was married to Miss Mary William Jamison of Clarksville, Texas, Nov. 14, 1877, who has shared with him the toils, hardships, sorrows, and joys which had fallen to his lot these 56 years.

FLINT, Mich., May 11.—A new line of Buick motor cars, priced in the low medium bracket, will be introduced Saturday in Buick dealers' showrooms throughout the United States and Canada.

National Oil Scouts Will Meet May 21

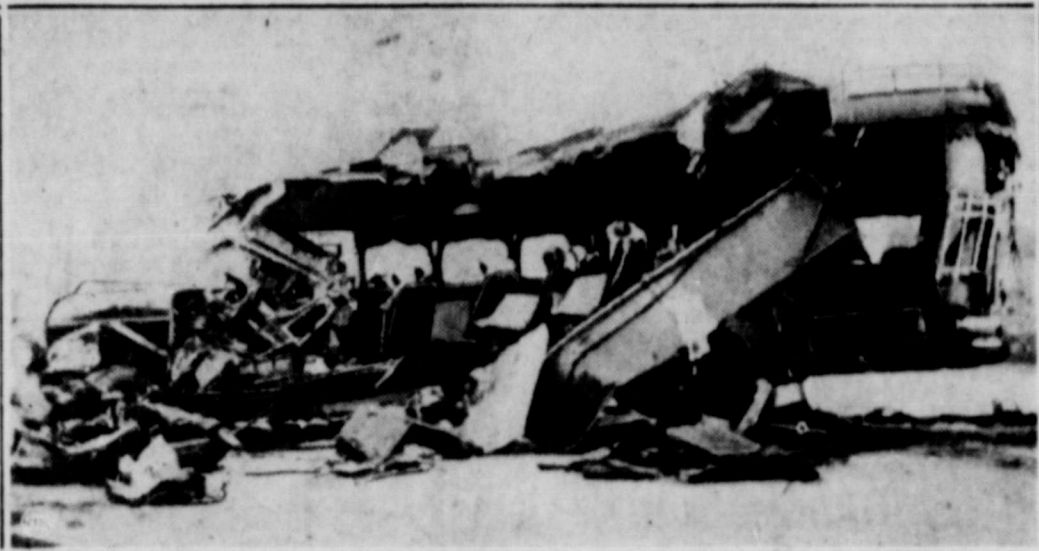
