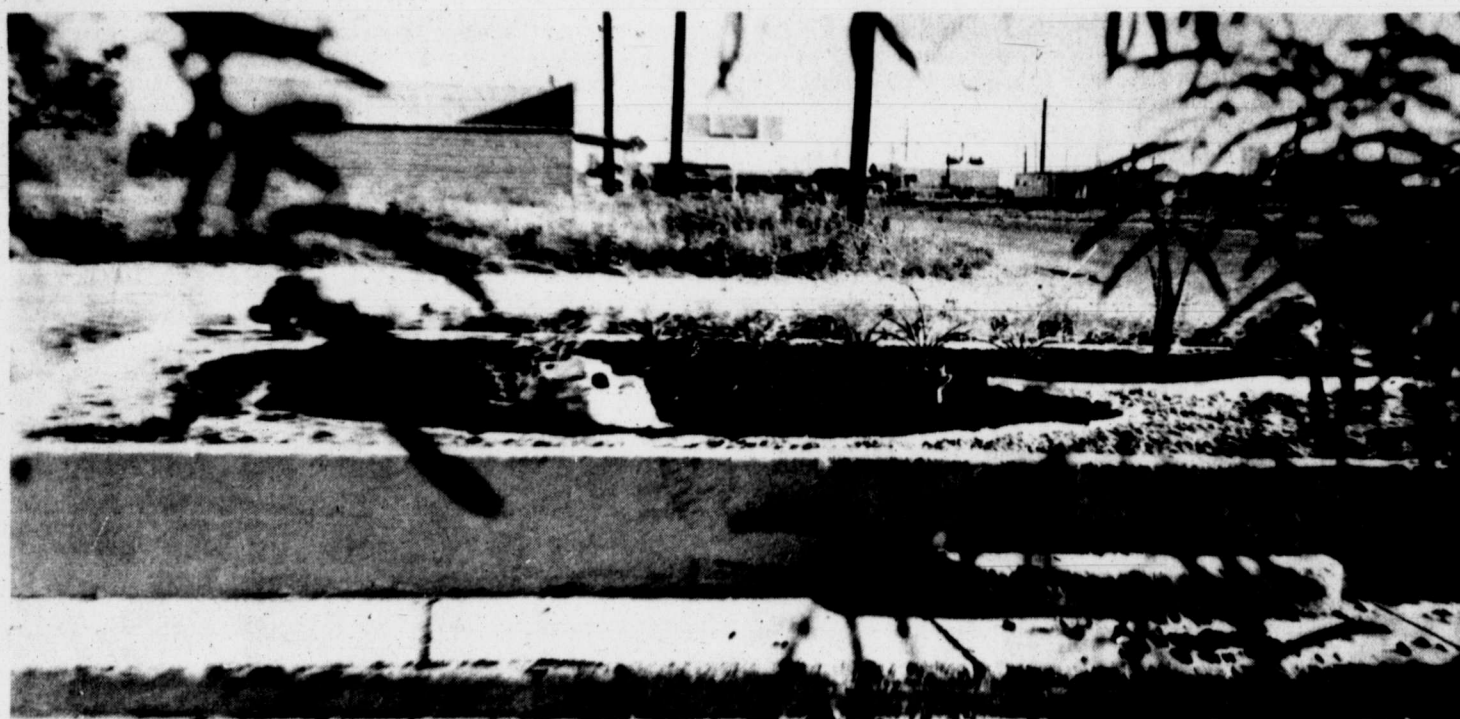




Westbrook Rock Garden

\$14,913.39 Sales Tax

Drop In Receipts Puzzles Merchants

The City of Colorado City today is \$14,913.39 richer, thanks to the one-cent city sales tax.

The city this week received a check for that amount from the state for sales tax collected here during the first three months of 1972.

The total city sales tax collected here was \$15,167.01 but the state receives a percentage of the total for collecting and disbursing the receipts.

The total collected for the first quarter was naturally less than the \$15,523.97 collected for the last quarter of 1971, the last quarter being the top shopping quarter.

One explanation could have been a slow January as many county residents were too busy to shop as they got their cotton out of the fields.

A record sales tax is expected for the second quarter of 1972 as most merchants have reported having the best April, May and June they have had in years.

During the first quarter of 1971, the net sales tax received by the city from the state amounted to \$16,197.17, \$1,283.78 more than was collected here

However, there is no apparent reason for the drop when comparing the first quarter of 1971 to 1972. Most merchants

Two carloads of people pulled into a Colorado City service station during the day Monday.

The owner of the station was asked the same question by drivers of both cars:

"What's happened to your town? Why so many dilapidated buildings?" One car was from California, the other from Dublin, Ga.

The embarrassed station owner was at a loss to explain.

A man from the Texas Industrial Commission, who visited Colorado City recently, also took note of the situation here regarding the condition of buildings.

I have been told on good authority that the city has been asked and urged for several years to start condemnation procedures in order to tear down a number of buildings.

These procedures sometime take as long as two years from the beginning until final court approval.

However, the city of Colorado City has been passing the buck to the council of governments in Abilene, saying the council is working on model city ordinances on all subjects and that nothing should be done until a model ordinance can be adopted.

It is time the buck passing is stopped. The people of Colorado City put their trust in the city council when they elected its members.

It is understandable that the council and city manager would want the advice of the council of governments, but the delay in getting this advice has placed an unnecessary burden on the people of Colorado City who want to be proud of their city and want to see it grow.

Westbrook Program Earns State Award

Westbrook is an award winner in the 1971-72 Texas Community Improvement Program. The Mitchell County community's program, begun early in 1971, has been selected as No. 2 community in the sprawling 20-county area of District 2 which has Lubbock as its district hub.

Reagan V. Brown, head of the Texas Community Improvement program, co-sponsored by Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M and electric utility companies operating in Texas, notified, announced Westbrook's award this week.

A \$75 check has been received by the Westbrook Community Association, chaired by Supt. L. M. Dawson, along with a certificate citing Westbrook for "outstanding accomplishments" in the statewide community improvement program.

Westbrook's award winning program included at least 20 major projects--from street paving in the area of school and churches to trash hauling and the removing of wrecked vehicles.

It also included a series of informational entertainment type programs throughout the 12-month period from 1971-1972.

Especially significant was the grass-roots aspects of the improvement program--starting with community type meetings and citizens' evaluation of their community's points of pride, points for which they could not be proud and projects on which they wanted work.

Citizens young and old contributed their ideas and work. Individuals as well as organizations supported the program.

And the award-winning achievements began to mount upward:

Street paving with cooperation of the City of Westbrook, Westbrook School District and Mitchell County officials; voting of school bonds for new additions and improvements for the Westbrook schools; grass for the community's ball park and start of Little League and Pony League baseball.

Clean-up and improvements for the cemetery, plus a thorough clean-up that hauled away trash, cans and debris from the entire community, and a 4-H Club beautification project adjacent to the Post Office.

"Some stands within the county are not as good as we would like," Lemons said. "These were caused by adverse weather. Some farmers have had seedling trouble because of extra wet weather early.

There are at least two patrolmen, besides the chief, on duty during the day, and at least three or four on duty during the night.

Franklin joined the force in March with no previous experience. Before going to work at the police department, he was employed at Fuller Foods.

Franklin, 22, is originally from Parkersburg, W. Va. He graduated from Parkersburg High School in June of 1967.

His wife is the former Carolyn Light.

Wallace, 30, joined the force June 19.

He has had over five years of experience with the Lubbock police department and has an academy diploma.

Graduated from Munday High School, Wallace attended Way-

land Baptist College. The Wallaces have two children, a boy, nine, and a girl, six.

Franklin and Stockton will be attending a police academy in the near future so that they may obtain their academy police diploma.

Each policeman is required to attend a police academy within one year after being employed.

To receive a diploma, the officer must attend 140 classroom hours which takes six to seven weeks.

The students are trained in offensive and defensive tactics, laws of arrest, beat patrol, first aid, firearms training, and many other important things that any law enforcement officer should know.

The three dispatchers also have certification.

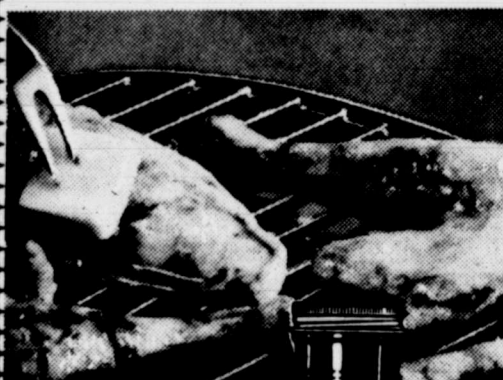

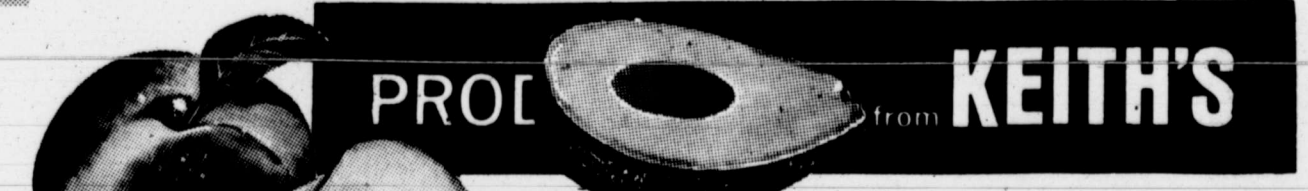

During April there were 12 mishaps and June already has passed the May low mark with another week to go.

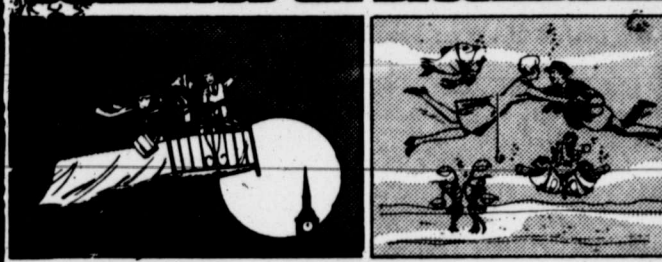
