Three Burkburnett Men Met Death In Flaming Truck

Burk Girl To Represent District In Speaking Contest at W.T.C.C. Meet

Pipeline Fuel Truck Ignites Near Burnet

Mrs. Percy Graves Gets Final Decree

Wichita Falls, Oct. 29.—Final chapter in the damage suit of Mrs. Ethel Graves and her minor daughter, Peggy Jean Graves, against Former Sheriff Percy Browning and others in connection with the death of Percy Graves in the Wichita County jail seven years ago was written this week when defendants paid \$11,170 to District Clerk Glenn Haynes.

Last judgment in the case, recently affirmed by the Fort Worth court of civil appeals, awards \$6,750 to the widow and \$4,320 to the daughter.

Graves died less than 30 minutes after being placed in a jail cell here in 1934. He had been arrested in his parked car in Country Club Estates for alleged drunkenness while enroute home from a football game.

Ed Ebers, held in jail here at the same time for safekeeping while a long term sentence from a nearby county was on appeal, was convicted of Graves' murder. The state alleged Ebers struck Graves on the head with an improvised blackjack.

A drizzling rain fell throughout the first half which made the field and ball so slick that holding of the ball and keeping a solid footing was almost an impossibility. However, a large crowd of Bulldog boosters were on hand and the rains kept a large caravan of boosters from Graham from attending the game.

Game In Brief

Burkburnett kicked out of bounds and the Steers advanced on line plays from their 35-yard line to the Burkburnett 8, where Morris covered Lawrence's threat of the game. Figuring in the 57-yard march was a 26-yard run by Lawrence.

The second period brought no such excitement, featuring an exchange of punts by Garrett of the Burkburnett and Knox of Graham.

Again at the start of the third period, Burkburnett kicked off and this time the Steers advanced to the Bulldog 29-yard line. From that point, Knox attempted a pass to Lawrence. Little Chester Todd intercepted on his 1-yard line and dodged through a broken field to the Burk 46.

Later in the third, Bill Bowman shook clear for a brilliant 35-yard run to the Steers' 23, but the threat was never capitalized.

No gains of more than 12 yards were made in the final period although the field by now was firm and the rain had ceased.

Graham's record in the district had previously been clean, but the Bulldogs with a previous loss to Childress now stand one and a half games behind the pace-setting Wichita Falls Coyotes.

The bodies of the three men who met death in a flaming truck near Burnet, Texas, Wednesday morning, were brought here by Owens and Brumley ambulances Thursday morning.

Killed in the accident were Horace Woods, 33, and R. D. Boren, 22, both of Burkburnett, and Travis Fuller, 18, of Thrift, northwest of Burkburnett.

Woods and Fuller were caught beneath the vehicle and were burned beyond recognition. Boren escaped from immediate death when he jumped from the moving truck but died of injuries in a Burnet hospital.

Before his death Boren told investigating officials the pipe line truck which belonged to the Wichita Pipe Line company of Burkburnett had caught fire. He jumped from the vehicle's cab as the fuel line of the truck became ignited. The truck was enroute to Columbus, Texas.

Fuller was the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Forqueran, Thrift. Boren's survivors include a twin brother, L. B. Boren and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Boren all of Burkburnett.

Woods' survivors include the widow, three children, W. D., Richard and Melba Woods, all of Burkburnett; two brothers, Paul Woods, Burkburnett, and Case Woods, Vernon; three sisters, Mrs. O. H. Dixon, Mrs. Eva Hodges, Burkburnett and Mrs. Violet Pogue, Sugdon, Okla.

This Week IN WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C. (NWNS)—Analysis of the vote of the house of representatives on revision of the neutrality act to permit the arming of ships, coupled with the recent vote on the new \$6,000,000,000 lease-lend bill, clarifies the present state of political party differences in our government.

When the majority of Republicans voted for the lease-lend measure, it was believed by many here that party lines were finally being dropped, so far as our attitude toward international questions was concerned. But the house vote on the neutrality act revision showed that this is not the fact—that while the Republicans are willing to support measures for greater production of defense materials, they are unwilling to back the President in any step which tends toward our involvement in the war.

On the neutrality act revision, the Republican members of the house voted against it by the overwhelming majority of 113 to 38, while the Democrats favored it by a vote of 219 to 21. This makes it clear that, after two years of debate over our foreign policy, the Republicans still remain the isolationist party while the Democrats are the interventionist party. And it shows that the Republican members of the house still oppose President Roosevelt's foreign policy just as strongly as they did when the war in Europe started.

Republican leaders here point out that, in addition to a sizeable number of members of their party feeling that we shouldn't become involved in the war, many of them agree with Alf Landon, who in a recent broadcast, said that a small group of New Dealers "are using the national defense emergency as a smoke screen for their attempts to build a collective state."

Mr. Landon charged that this group plans to strangle the small business man because its members believe "he is an economic anachronism, like the livery stable." After concentrating economic power in a few hands, Mr. Landon went on, "they figure that it will be comparatively easy, using again the slogan, hate economic royalists, to insure the permanent establishment of their ideas for a collective state."

This bitter denunciation of the administration by a leader of the Republican party is interpreted here as indicating that the Republican opposition to the whole foreign policy of the administration is being kept alive for fear of "abuse of power" by the President rather than merely to express disagreement on the need for our country's help to defeat Hitler. The Republicans clearly do not intend to let their enmity for the whole New Deal policy be sidetracked by the present emergency.

Meanwhile, realizing that whether we get into the war or whether we don't, our major problem is one of increased defense production, the heads of our government's defense agencies are working up elaborate plans for doubling the speed of pro-

Talking of a goal of 125,000 planes, including 25,000 long-range bombers, by the end of 1943—a "victory program" is now being worked out to divert at least half of our nation's productive capacity to defense production. It is estimated that at the present time, and under present appropriations, only 15 per cent of our productive capacity is engaged on defense items.

The new plan, which is roughly expected to shoot our present defense appropriations of 60 billion dollars well over the 100 billion mark, is aimed at turning out twice as much defense material in 1942 and 1943 as was originally planned. The program is believed to be an answer to the recent statement of William Knudsen, head of the Office of Production Management, who said that this nation must decide between outranking the Nazis after years of effort at present production rates or piling on "every ounce of steam to get this thing over with."

Certain government officials who are impatient to witness a more warlike feeling among the American people, are clearly annoyed over the lack of public anger displayed following the torpedoing of the U.S. destroyer Kearny. This was particularly apparent here at the time of the incident, for news of it came just before the house voted on the neutrality act and it seemed to have practically no effect in convincing the Republican members that we should arm our merchant ships.

Examiners will be on duty in Burkburnett each Thursday from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. Headquarters will be at the Chamber of Commerce office, according to Ray Hill, manager.

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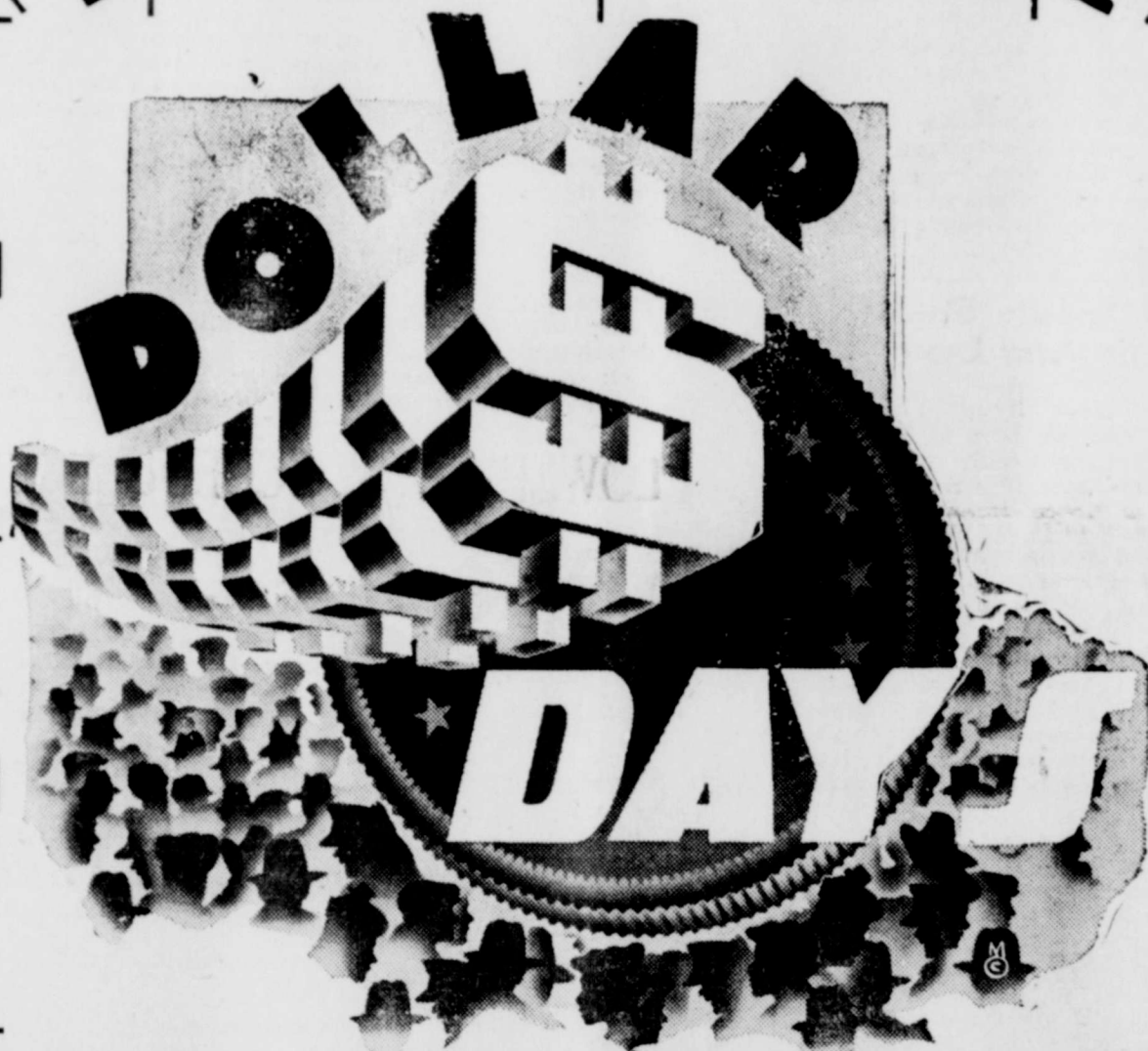

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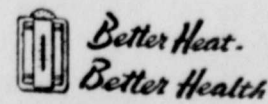
